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Bank Offers \$1,000 Reward

The First National Bank of Harrington has offered \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of three persons who held up its Canterbury branch, getting away with about \$10,000 on December 12.

Since then, the robbery has been under investigation by both the Delaware State Police and the FBI. J. Paul Bell, Senior Resident Agent in the Dover office of the FBI said on Friday that it was hoped the offer of the reward money would encourage someone to come forward with information. As of Friday there had been no new developments. But his feeling was that the robbery was the work of persons in the shore area rather than "out of the city" has been true for most of the cases with which he has been associated in the past.

Bell cited two reasons for believing the job was local in nature: First, the guns used in the hold up were long barreled hunting guns rather than drawers. Response was quick, and the sawed off shot guns which, Bell thought the police may have been because of the relatives ease with which they can be concealed, are trio. most likely to be used in the city. Second, the getaway car had been stolen in this area a week before the bank robbery. Bell thought that persons operating out of the city would be more likely to steal the car to serve as a distraction. On that and stage the robbery on the same

Bell confirmed the fact that the three men in ski masks who entered the Canterbury bank about 3:07 p.m. on December 12, did shoot out the TV camera that could have provided identification.

He said the alarm which sounds nearby Delaware State Troop 3 did go off immediately when two of the men went out over the counter and forced open the four tellers' cash

But he discounted speculation that a minor disturbance occuring at the People's Bank of Harrington about the same time as the incident in Canterbury was related or intended same afternoon Harrington police were called to the Peoples Bank when two young adult males from Wholesale Distributers of Wilmington caused a commotion after the bank refused to cash a check for which the signature was in question.

Harrington Police Chief Carl McIlroy responded at the Harrington Sgt. Jopp took over there when the local police were also called to assist immediately following the Canterbury incident.



On 10 September 1679 while William Penn was "Absolute Proprietary and Governor in Chief of the province of Pensilvania and Territories thereunto belonging" by an order from the court held at Whorekill there was laid out to Peter Groundlike a tract of land called New Seventh haven, situated on the north side of Murder Creek in the County of Kent. Over the years the ownership was changed several times until it was sold 4 October 1698 to William Freeman and after his death was confirmed to his son, William Freeman and a resurvey of the tract showed it to be bounded as follows:

Beginning at a Poplar by a Branch dividing this from the land later of Jonathan Hopkins then North west two hundred eighty five perches to a corner white oak by a Savanna then east south east four hundred perches to a Hickery tree by the marshes of the said Creek then South east one hundred and ten perches to the mouth of a gutt on the creek side then by the water course South west eighty perches to Freeman's Landing place then South East by the said

Creek one hundred and fourteen perches then south west by the said creek one hundred and fifty four perches to the mouth of a Gutt then North by west one hundred thirty six perches to the fast land then by the several courses of the first mentioned Branch two hundred nineth four perches to the beginning, containing five hundred forty three acres.

Included in his use of the land was the right to "Hawk Hunt Fish and Fowle" and for this he was to pay yearly at the town of Dover One bushell of good and merchantable winter wheat for every hundred acres. The Patent was granted in Philadelphia "the fifteenth day of the sixth month in the fifty year of the Reign of our Soveraign Lady Queen Anne over England, Etc. and the six and twentieth of my Government" (William Penn) 1706.

William Freemen's daughter Susanne had married Adam Fisher and on 9 September he gave them a part of New Seventh Haven beginning at a corner marked white oak standing by the north side of Parves Branch and running from thence up the said brach building there with until it

comes to the land of John Courtney and from thence along the line of the said land called Seven Haven until it goeth so far as to take in a hundred acres of land in returning to the first mentioned white oak. (While left a balance of 443 acres in New Seventh

This parcel of land remained in the Fisher Family and was owned by Moliston Fisher when he borrowed Sixty pounds from John Brinkle and Thomas Green trustees of the General Loan Office 13 May 1749. He did not repay the loan nor the interest due and when John Vining and Andrew Caldwell because trustees for the Loan Offfice they sued in the Court of Common Pleas for the loan and interest amounting to One Hundred twenty pounds, and for fortyone shilling and three pence damages. Casar Rodney Sheriff of Kent County was ordered to advertise and sell the land. Thomas Chamberlin gave the highest bid of one hundred and five pounds and the parcel of land known as Fishers Delight being part of a larger tract of land called New Seventy Haven was conveyed to him by deed dates 15 November 1757. It

was bounded in parts by lands formerly of John Courtney. [To Be Continued].

Employers Pay Higher Taxes

Wilmington, Del.--Employers in the State of Delaware are subject to higher Federal unemployment taxes for 1980, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The increase, six-tenths of one percent of the wages subject to the Federal unemployment tax paid in 1980, results from reduction in the credit allowed against this tax for payments into the State of Delaware unemployment compensation fund.

Title XII of the Social Security Act provides for advances to states or areas that need additional funds to pay unemployment compensation benefits. Upaid advances are recoverable by a reduction in the credit

allowed against the tax. The Department of Labor has informed appropriate officials of the State of Delaware of the six-tenths of one percent increase on 1980 wages subject to FUTA.

The Employer's Annual Unemployment Tax Return, Form 940, for 1980 is due February 2, 1981.

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Funds Available, for **Assistance**

The State Department of Community Affairs and Economic Development, Office of Econimic Opportunity the grantee of record, for the Del. Low-Income Energy Assistance Program has received fuel assistance funds from the Dept. of Health and Human Services. Client assistance funds are being transferred to the local administering agencies and should be finalized no later than Dec. 23, 1980, with payments to vendors within the next two weeks.

Local grantees began accepting applications on Nov. 24, 1980, and to date have received approximately 50 percent of projected number to be served. The majority of applications have been processed and vendors are being notified of each client's eligibility and benefit amount. Also, clients eligibility notification letters are being mailed immediately to ensure fast service.

The Low-Income Energy Assistance Program should be able to assist approximately 14 000 households

with an average benefit of \$325 per household. Benefits will range from \$200-\$500, depending on household income, number in household, type of fuel and dwelling type. It must be emphasized that LIEAP assistance is meant to supplement the rising cost of energy, not to pay fuel bills for the



Prepare for the cold winter season by readying your home with proper oinsulation, weather stripping and energy-saving techniques says Delaware •extension family livin ageny Mary Alice Morris.

Insulation can reduce the drain on your heating equipment and also lower your utility bills. Find out if you need insulation. A reputable insulation dealer in your area or a local building inspector can help. The Extension Service recommends R-30 insulation for ceilings (about ten-

inches of fiberglass); R-19 for floors; R-19 for walls in new homes; and R-11-13 for walls in existing houses. R-values are insulation-efficiency

Check the insulation in your attic floor or top floor ceiling. If you have less than six inches of old insulation, you need to increase it. The attic area should be an efficieny rating of R-30. Ask questions before you buy.

Besure that the insulation is at least three inches away from eave vents, precessed lighting fixtures, or other heat-producing equipment on the attice floor. Floors over unheated spaces, such as crawl spaces and garages, should Palso be insulated.

It may be necessary to caulk and weather-strip your doors and windows. Try this simple test to find out. Move a lighted candle around the frame and sashes of your windows. If the flame dances around, you need caulking and/or weather stripping. Next, try skipping a quarter underneath your docrs. If the quarter slips through easily, you need weather stripping.


Caulking and weather stripping are easy to do yourself. Materials for an average size house cost about \$25 but could save you money on heating costs.

Storm windows can be installed to further weather-proof your home. Combination screen and storm windows are the most convenient and energy efficient. An alternative is single-pane storm windows, which have to be removed to admit outside air. Another idea is to tape clear plastic film tightly Ito the inside of the window frame.





Dearly Beloved in Christ: During Advent we prayed with the Church that as God's people who look forward to the birthday of Christ we may come to experience the joy of salvation and celebrate the feast with

love and thanksgiving. Today that expectation is realized as we ponder the mystery of the Son of God made man and open our hearts to receive Many things of course react to the

mystery before us mostly on the level by feeling and emotion without trying very hard to penetrate it by quiet reflection. Biden Report

The fuel assistance program, designed to keep people who can't afford the ever increasing costs of fuel oil from freezing in their homes, is getting off to a bad start again this year.

After learning last week that eligible recipients, who had run out of fuel, could not get the aid which Congress provided for them, I made an inquiry. Learning that the Delaware share of the funding had never been sent to the state and that a bureaucratic snafu had delayed the program, I made a phone call. Apparently the right person was on the other end of the line because he said the money would be wired immediately to Del. and it was.

Problem number two was the inordinately lenghty time which program officials claimed would be needed to process the funds so the fuel could be delivered. A second phone call was placed-this time to State Treas. Tom Carper who had not, until that time, been informed of the problem. He quickly agreed to do what he could to help. He asked for the paperwork, put his people on the case and processed the funds over the weekend. People now are received the needed fuel.

Hopefully next year a program can be developed so that those people facing a crisis regarding heating fuel can receive the aid when they need it. Neighboring Pa. overcame the same type of problem by using state funds

to get the program started, all of which is reimbursed by the federal program. That way people don't freeze waiting for one bureaucracy to work out details with another bureaucracy.

The recently opened Luther Towers in Dover depicts the most powerful engine for change in our society-the involvement of people who believe in In this case community residents, public servants, churches and volunteers

are involved in providing homes for senior citizens in Kent County. The 149 unit high rise apartment building in Dover represents the concern, commitment, and cooperation that makes our society strong.

Luther Towers of Dover is the third such complex sponsored by the Martin Luther Foundation and the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development to provide low-income housing to the elderly. Residents are required to pay one-quarter of their gross yearly income as rent for a home in which they can live with dignity, without fear, or worry about how they will maintain or afford a home.

The volunteers and churches involved in bringing the Towers to Dover didn't go away after it was constructed. They are still there to care for our elderly. And I believe that our society will, in large part, be judged on how concerned we were, how much we did for our elderly the people who in their youth built our nation but in seeking the fruits of their labors met dilemma and poverty. Can we do more?



Drip Irrigation-Drip Irrigation has been a very useful tool for successful vegetable production in many areas of this country and the world. It has found wide acceptance among vegetable growers in South Jersey. Briefly, drip irrigation puts water right in the root zone of plants by emitting small quantities of water out a hose-like material. Usually this material, the drip-line, is placed under black polyethelene mulch.

When the drip tubing is used the black poly mulch, an ideal environment for root growth is obtained. Soil moisture is better maintained at optimum levels. Weed competition is essentially eliminated. Soil temperatures reach higher levels in the spring. All of these factors enable crops to get off to a fast start and keep growing quickly.

Because the mulch takes up about 3 feet of surface area and the expense of the mulch and drip line, the systems lend itself to the high value vegetable crops that are transplanted or directed seeded into rows that are 5 or 6 feet apart. It does not lend itself to the "row" vegetable crops. Cantalopes, peppers, squash, cucumbers, tomatoes, eggplants have all responded to Drip Irrigation under plastic mulch. Examples of farm yields include 10-12,000 cantalopes/ acre; 1,00 boxes of peppers/acre; and

8-900 bushels of cucumbers/acre. These are well obtained on a commercial scale. Each of these examples had markets developed for each commodity. This is essential for any vegetable operation. The diameters of the main and submain must also be calculated ahead of time, so they are not restrictive. One should plan on using a good, clean water source, and on using a filter.

The connections of the drip tubing into the submains are fairly easy to make. The drip tube is attached to a feeder tube which is inserted to a previously punched hole in the submain. The length of the feeder hose, (which only has 1/4" inside diameter), acts as pressure reducer. It typically reduces the submain pressure of 20 PSI down to 6 PSI in the drip tube.

All of these factors must be thought out well ahead of installation to insure proper functioning.

On a small scale of 1-2 acres, domestic pumps can be used by dividing the fields into zones that do not require more water than the pump can supply. Also, plants can be transplanted by hand on this scale. There are machines available that transplant into the mulch for larger acreages.

Other potential problems that can crop up are weed control in the

When the General Assembly convenes on Jan. 13, there will be 15 new members of the Legislature, which is almost one-quarter of the entire membership. Most certainly these new members will have some fresh ideas on how to hold down the cost of Gov., on new programs and on providing better services to the people of Del. I am looking forward to working with

Also there will be several new members of my Administration in Jan. They too will bring new initiatives to State Gov. It will be their job to make the gov. run more efficiently with a better quality of service to their

By the end of Jan, I will be presenting the fiscal year 1982 budget proposal. This document will outline my recommendations as to how the State should allocate its resources, what new programs, if any, should be initiated, and what programs should realize an increase or decrease in funding.

The recession has, of course, created layoffs in many manufacturing jobs and a concurrent reduction in State revenues. However, I believe that we will have another balanced budget as we have had in the past four years.

Finally, Jan. will be highlighted by the swearing in the new General Assembly, and the inauguration of the new State officials. Lt. Gov. elect Mike Castle and I will take the oath of office at 12:01 a.m. on Jan. 20, 1981 at Legislative Hall. You are invited to attend the ceremony. I hope you will enjoy the program that night.

I am very pleased to report that the Congress has provided the money to launch the operations of the Solar and Energy Conservation Bank, which I cosponsored and strongly supported in the Congress. The Bank was created by the "Energy Security Act of 1980" and will make an important and cost effective contribution toward solving our energy problems.

Creating the Bank was a significant step forward in our national energy strategy because it recognizes that conservation is a permanent and necessary part of our effort to reduce America's unhealthy depedence on OPEC oil. Unfortunately, many people are already burdened with staggering utility bills and cannot afford to either insulate their home properly or purchase energy conservation devices which utilize solar power. The Bank will accelerate the purchase and installation of solar and energy conservation devices by providing low-interest loans to homeowners. The Bank's activities will lower the financial barrier which is preventing many family from achieving economical energy efficiency.

This achievement is important because it will demonstrate that conservation should not necessarily be equated with a reduced standard of living. Until now, our conservation policies have short-sightedly compelled people to do without or to live uncomfortably. Consequently, some people may mistakenly oppose spending on conservation programs because they incorrectly identify conservation with deprivation.

I believe this is incorrect. The energy savings resulting from the activities of the Bank will lessen some of the hardships caused by high utility bills while allowing families to enjoy a comfortable lifestyle.

Conservation and the expanded use of solar energy will lessen the use of crude oil for the generation of electricity and the demand for home heating oil. This means that over the long-run, more liquid fuels should be available for our transportation network. In addition, the Bank's activities will assist the development of the solar industry and expand the supply of productive jobs for our workers.

The Solar and Energy Conservation Bank will achieve these goals if it is given a proper chance to work. Congressional approval of this appropriation is the first step in that direction. I hope the President acts promptly and signs this measure into law.

The 'Terpil-Wilson Case' Sends Chills Up CIA Spines

By JACK ANDERSON and JOE SPEAR WASHINGTON

-- Two upper-class Englishmen, Burgess and Donald McLean, betrayed the British intelligence apparatus during the Cold War by working as Soviet moles with masterspy Kim Philby. To this day, the mention of Burgess and McLean can cause a British intelligence expert to rattle his teacup. The three secret Soviet agents succeeded in defecting to Russia unscathed after having spent years funneling innermost secrets to the Kremlin.

Now two former CIA operatives are creating similar consternation in the upper echelons of the Washington intelligence establishment. The secret file on their renegade operation is known to insiders as the Terpil-Wilson case.

Frank Terpil and Edwin Paul Wilson both vanished from the country after being indicted on gun-running charges. They are believed to be serving the terrorist interests of Libya's rabid leader Muammar Qaddafi.

Terpil was last reported to have found refuge in Syria which has formed an unholy alliance with Qaddafi while Wilson apparently took it on the lam to Libya.

The two American fugitives would be warmly welcomed by Qaddafi because of their CIA expertise in training terrorists. They are suspected of having delivered explosive booby trap devices to PLO gangs and

training Arab killer squads in using them. The deadly plastic bombs can be planted in such seemingly innocent objects as telephone books in airports, tubes of toothpaste, or luggage lock-

Even more alarming to the CIA, according to our sources, is the fact that Terpil and Wilson may have revealed some of the agency's most carefully guarded counter-intelligence operations against Arab militants. From the inner sanctur

the CIA in suburban Virginia, officials report that Libya has suddenly demonstrated a sophisticated awareness of U.S. intelligence capabilities. Qaddafi tactics in the beleaguered revolutionary neighboring country of Chad and elsewhere in the volatile Middle East reflect a new awareness of Washington's moves before they take place.

CIA analysts privately admit they are "curious" about this turn of events. They're deeply worried that Libya's sudden knowledge of American operations throughout the world is not guesswork, but the result of a couple of turncoat "technical advisers' known as Terpil and Wilson. URUGUAY'S LIBERTAD

HELL: A super-secret report has reached Washington which divulges an appalling look at the living hell which prevails in Uruguay's infamous Libertad prison where the military regime has condemned political dissidents. The documentary report was written by a representative of the International Red Cross who penetrated the grim precincts of Libertad.

Almost without exception, such reports to the International Red Cross never are allowed to be seen by outsid-

But the Libertad story of shame has reached our hands. Here are some of the dreadful findings of the Red Cross emissary, Jean Francois Labarthe, who visited the Uruguayan dung lier this year:

-- Nearly one-third of the prison's 1,200 inmates are in solitary confinement, some of them for as long as seven years, 24 hours a day. Many are denied their only privi-lege -- a one-hour daily walk outside the cells. Even outside the cell, a

Libertad prisoner is psychologically at the mercy of the guards. "Whenever a prisoner moves outside of his cell." Labarthe wrote, "he has to keep his hands behind his back and his eyes fixed directly in front of him. A glance over his shoulder or up to the floor above, and he will forfeit the walking hour for several days, which means being confined in his 9' by 6' cell, 24 hours a day. prisoner becomes a walking number.

Family visits can result in additional inhumane punishments, particularly when a child of a prisoner is involved. Labarthe reported: 'The child who comes to visit leaves his or her mother
