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On The Job

Cotta Takes Over City Reins

Joe Cotta who some still know as Joe Scott, head of the news bureau and the noon talk show at WAFL Radio Station assumed his job as the new City Administration for Harrington on Monday. Scott will continue his noon talk show for WAFL,

"...but I will not accept calls on the talk show about complaints related to the City. That they can call me about my Town Hall office in Harrington."

Cotta had been seeking employment outside of the news media area for quite some time. He said the busy hours had something to do with his

decision to make a change. Cotta had been in the journalism field since 1969. He retired in 1972 from the Air Force with 20 years service. He is a native of Waterville, Maine.

Cotta said that he hopes to show that with proper administration of all departments he can contribute a great deal to the proper supervision of the City's affair. "Right now... what's ahead for me for the next few weeks is familiarization with the affairs of the City. I will get it all together though," said Joe Cotta, Harrington's new City Administrator.

The post of City Administrator was created when no one applied for the job of City Manager who could meet the city charter's residence requirements for the job. That requirement stipulates that the City Manager be a resident of Harrington or be willing to move to Harrington when he accepts the job. None of the applicants for the post vacated by Dave Peterson in October was willing to do that. No Harrington residents applied.

Faced with the necessity of getting some on the job, the Council created the new title-City Administrator.

Mayor's Job, Council Seats Up For Grabs

With the filing deadline less the four days away, two seats on the Harrington City Council and the Mayor's job are still up for grabs. As of Monday, no one had filed at City Hall for any of the three positions.

The Reverend Ray Newman, Council member from the Sixth Ward, told the Journal recently that he "would rather not run" for a second term. Newman has served on the Council from the Sixth Ward for the past two years since he was elected to fill the seat left vacant by the resignation of Earl McColley.

Newman said, "I feel it would be better if someone else would run," and cited as his main reason the need to spend more time with his congrega-

tion and with his family. He is the pastor of the Independent Bible Fellowship Church in Harrington. The congregation currently meets in the church building on Liberty St. However, the church is growing and building plans are in the offering. Newman said the church hopes to be in a building program this spring. The congregation has purchased property on the south side of Milford-Harrington Road.

Newman did add that there are "certain circumstances" under which he would run for another term on the Council, but declined any comment on what these circumstances might be.

His two years on Council so far he said have been "in between" reward-

ing and frustrating. He confessed that he has enjoyed the experience "in a sense" and has learned a lot from it. However, he also said that "There have been times when I couldn't get my point across and (felt) frustration in seeing my ideas not used or show down.

As of Monday, the Journal had not been successful in contacting Bill Dill of the Fifth Ward and had no inkling as to whether he would seek another term on the council.

Harrington's Mayor Arthur Cahall announced early in December that he would not seek a third term.

Council members serve for three years; the Mayor is selected for two.

Loan Hearing is Reset

On January 8, the City of Harrington will once again ask city residents for their comments on a proposal to borrow \$189,000, from Farmers Home Administration to cover the city's share of required improvements to its sewage treatment plant. Because of an error in advertising the first public hearing on the question (the original advertisement was incomplete and did not satisfy all the legal requirements), the City Council has set a second public hearing on Thursday, January 8, at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall. The referendum on the question, originally planned for January 13, the date of the City-wide election, will now be pushed back to some time in February.

The hearing and the referendum come almost as an afterthought to a project already well underway. The bid for the improvements and expansion at the local sewage treatment facility was awarded to C.Z. Construction of Edgewater, Md. last summer, and the company has been on location since November.

The city has no choice but to make the improvements which are mandated by both state and federal regulations, and the \$1,125,000 project, Known as Modification and Expansion of Waste Water Treatment Facilities has received the approval of the Delaware Division of Environmental Control and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. State and federal funds will pay for 85 percent of the total cost. The local 15 percent is estimated to come to no more than the \$189,000 the city will seek to borrow.

If Harringtonians give their consent to the money and to issuing the bonds to secure its payment, the City will probably be able to get the \$189,000 from FmHA at a 5 percent interest rate to be repaid over 40 years.

If the voters do not approve the loan, the City will be faced with finding the money from another and probably much more costly source.

The project cannot be cancelled. The city is already in violation of current wastewater treatment regulations and is operating under temporary permits issued with the understanding that the project to correct the situation is already in progress. Dropping the project could bring fines up to \$1,000 per day for violation of the regulations as well as an expensive suit from the contractors already hired.

Sources at City Hall said the \$189,000 loan would not put Harrington in excess of the limit for bonded indebtedness of 15 percent of the value of real property within city limits.

New Business

The old Sam Short Grocery Store building will be alive again this week as new owner Mrs. Richard (Penny) Dennis will open a "penny Arcade... pizza...and sub shop." The old building once housed Sam Short's Clover Farm Store which was a Thriving business. According to Mrs. Dennis "we will be catering to kids...with no alcoholic beverages allowed. We are opening with the arcade and the pizzas. The subs will be just a little later, we are still waiting for equipment."

The new business will have a wide variety of electronic games for kids of all ages. All orders for food will be to go. There will be local free deliveries. The store hours will Monday, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays 10:00 A.M. TO 1/2:00 midnight, Tuesday 3:00 p.m. to 12 midnight, and Sunday 12:00 noon to 9:00 p.m.

They intend pizzas to be their speciality.

Police Beat

A break in, in the early hours of Christmas day at Watkins Truck Sale on U.S. 13 Harrington, interrupted the peace of an otherwise quiet week for the City Police.

Harrington Police Chief Carl McIlroy said the local police were called to respond to an alarm at Watkins at 130 a.m. on December 25. They arrived on the scene to find a broken window and an individual inside the building.

State Police at Troop 5 in Bridgeville were immediately notified and arrived in time to apprehend Emanuel Dukes, who was arrested. Four members of the Harrington police remained to assist the state police. Other than the broken window, there was no damage or property stolen.

The police left after the building was secured.

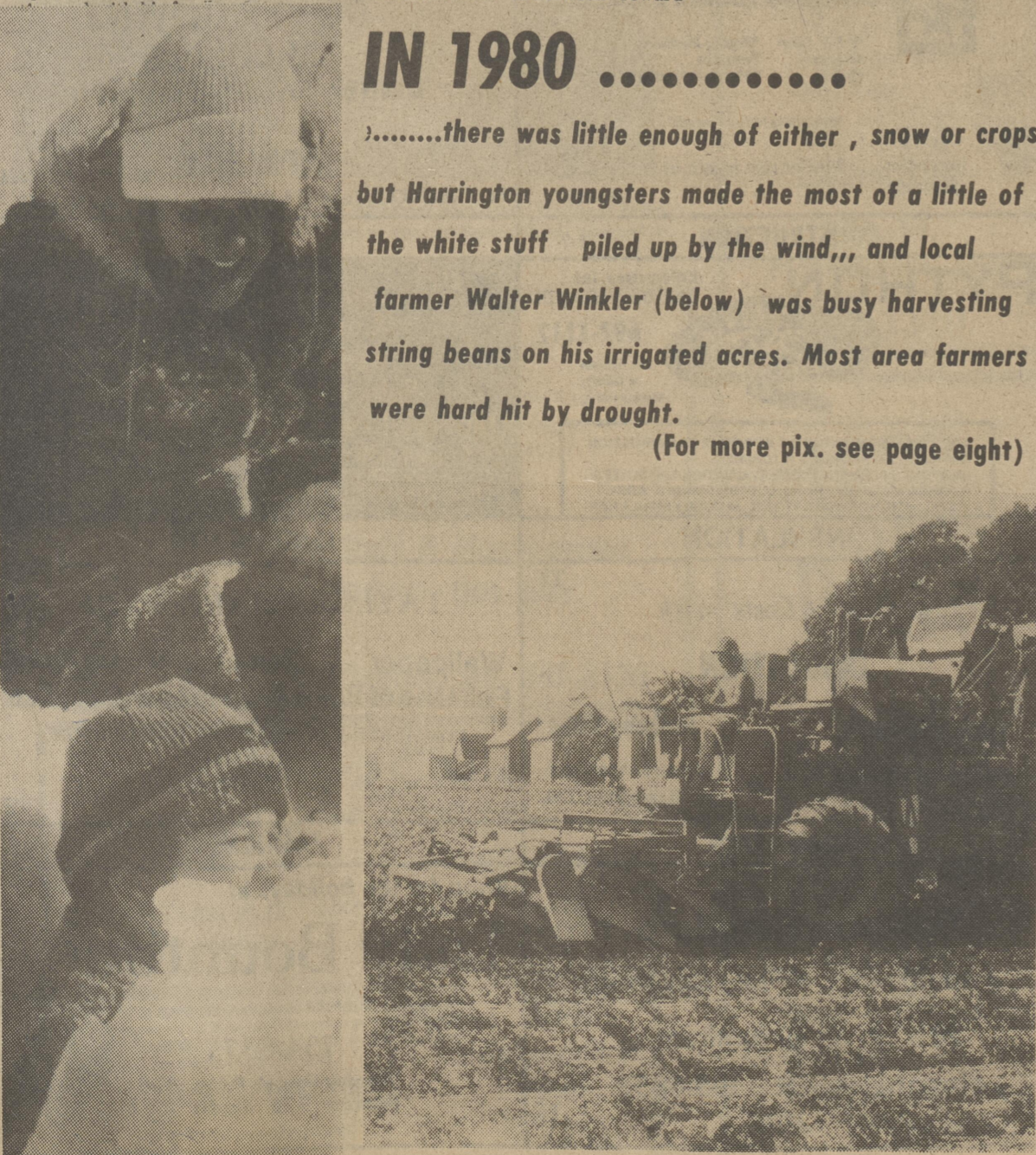
Mellroy also reported that two hit and run accidents had occurred within the city limits over the past week. In both cases the responsible drivers were subsequently apprehended.

Delaware Diamonds

William Freeman died intestate before 31 July 1713 when his land was divided between his heirs, John Fisher and Adam Fisher the younger, and Cornelius Sullivan and his wife Sarah who was Freeman's sister. Vincent Emerson was then Sheriff of Kent County and he with Daniel Ruddy, Michael Lober, William Rodey, Edward Williams, John Nowell, Daniel Hudson, William Nowell, Christopher Jackson, Jeremiah Jackson, William Bookstad, Jerimiah Nicholson and John Smith surveyed and divided the land into two equal portions each containing about two hundred twenty three acres.

The part allotted to Sarah Freeman Sullivan and her husband contained two dwelling houses, one barn and one milk house. John and Adam Fisher were given the part bounded by the one hundred acres already conveyed to Adam Fisher and his wife Susanna. Adam Fisher was a resident of Sussex County when he sold, on third day of February 1729 for twenty five pounds, to John Fisher his share in the divided half part of New Seventh Haven that was then in the possession and occupation of John Fisher. Lydia Fisher, the wife of Adam Fisher, also sold her right and claim for five shillings paid to her by John Fisher. The deed was witnessed by William Manlove and L. Flowers.

John Fisher died intestate before 9 February 1763 when his wife Hannah was appointed Administrator of his estate. Then in 1767 George Dill was appointed guardian to John Fisher, a minor, and the court appointed Andrew Caldwell, Benjamin Warren,

and Phillip Barrett to go and value his lands. As a result of these happenings George Dill Shallopman and resident of Murderkill Hundred and Mary his wife who was one of the heirs of John Fisher sold the land 12 November 1767 to Samuel Smith.

The deed mentions that the parcel of land being conveyed was part of a larger tract called New Seventh Heaven originally conveyed was part of a larger tract called New Seventh Heaven originally granted to Peter Groundlike and that Thomas Chamberlin shared a boundary line and then owned a part of the whole tract. The deed states the purchase price of one hundred forty-three pounds for a total of four hundred forty-three acres.

Which was two hundred and twenty acres more than he was entitled to as that portion had been deeded to Cornelius Sullivan and Sarah his wife in 1713.

Cornelius Sullivan and Sarah told their share of New Seventh Haven to William Amand; they bought it back from him and lived their for some time. On 14 February 1723 for eighty-five pounds he purchased from John Sippy of Kent County of Delaware, planter, and Susanna his wife, one hundred acres of land in Murderkill Hundred while John Courtney had sold to Stephen Simmons the father of Susanna Simmons Sippy. The next day, 15 February 1723 John Sippy purchased for one hundred pounds Sullivans share in New Seventh Haven.

The deed states that the parcel of land containing two hundred and twenty three acres was already in the

tenure and possession of John Sipple and the boundaries were as follows; Beginning at a corner marked Pop-standing by the marshes of Murther Creek and running from thence South East to the said creek one hundred forty and six perches then down the said creek binding there with one hundred forty and four perches to the landing place then down the said creek north east eighty perches to the mouth of a gutt then north west one hundred and ten perches to a corner Hickory then west north west one hundred seventy six perches to a corner maple standing by a swamp then south nineteen degrees east along the line of John and Adam Fisher, the younger land, one hundred eighty six perches to a red oak then south east five degrees east one and sixteen perches to a red oak then south east five degrees east one and sixteen perches to a pear tree then north east five degrees north twenty perches to the corner of an orchard then south east by east ten perches then south seventeen degrees east seventeen perches to the first bound-er poplar.

The deed from Sipple to Sullivan conveying the Simmons acres was witnessed by Francis Alexander, Benjamin Furbee and Michael Lobar. The deed from Sullivan to Sipple conveying part of New Seventh Haven was witnessed by Andrew Caldwell and John Bowers.

John Sipple lived in Murderkill Hundred on this farm and was very prosperous during the next twenty years. In his will written in 1752 he names his sons William and John as executors together with his wife

Prudence Sipple. (He did not bequeath anything to these two men as he had already conveyed by deed over a hundred acres to each, of the land he had purchased from Andrew Caldwell part of a tract known as Rights Lott but reserved under the name of Much-ado). He also names as his heirs daughters, Rachel, Sarah, and Joanna and other sons, Uriah, Nathaniel, and Martinus Sipple to whom he gave "the plantation I now live on containing two hundred acres...I likewife except out of the above...four acres being and including the burying ground to the northward of my house."

Martinus Sippy held the land until 1760 when he sold it to Michael Furbee and then moved into Duck Creek where he died in 1793, his heirs were Sarah and Rebecca Sipple and a friend John Cole. (To be Continued).

Snow Shovellers Take Care

It's been said before but bears repeating with every heavy snowfall. Snow shoveling is strenuous exercise. When you tackle the job, be sensible about it, particularly if you're over forty and out of shape. If you have a history of heart disease, check with your doctor before you attempt to shovel snow.

The Heart Association offers these tips to help you avoid overexertion and make snow shoveling a vigorous, and healthy exercise.

Don't shovel immediately after eating. Tackle the snow before you eat, or at least an hour after a meal.

Don't smoke while you shovel snow. Smoking causes constriction of the blood vessels, just as cold air does. The combination can be dangerous.

Dress warmly in light, thin layers of clothing. Keep your ears and throat

warm and your hands and feet dry. When you shovel, life your entire body, keeping your back straight.

Pace yourself and don't shovel to the point of exhaustion.

If you run out of breath, stop until breathing is easier.

If you feel a tightness in the chest, quit.

If you suspect any of the warning signs of heart attack, get to a hospital emergency room at once. The signals of heart attack are an uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of the chest, lasting two minutes or more. This pain may spread to the shoulders, neck or arms. Dizziness, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath also may occur. 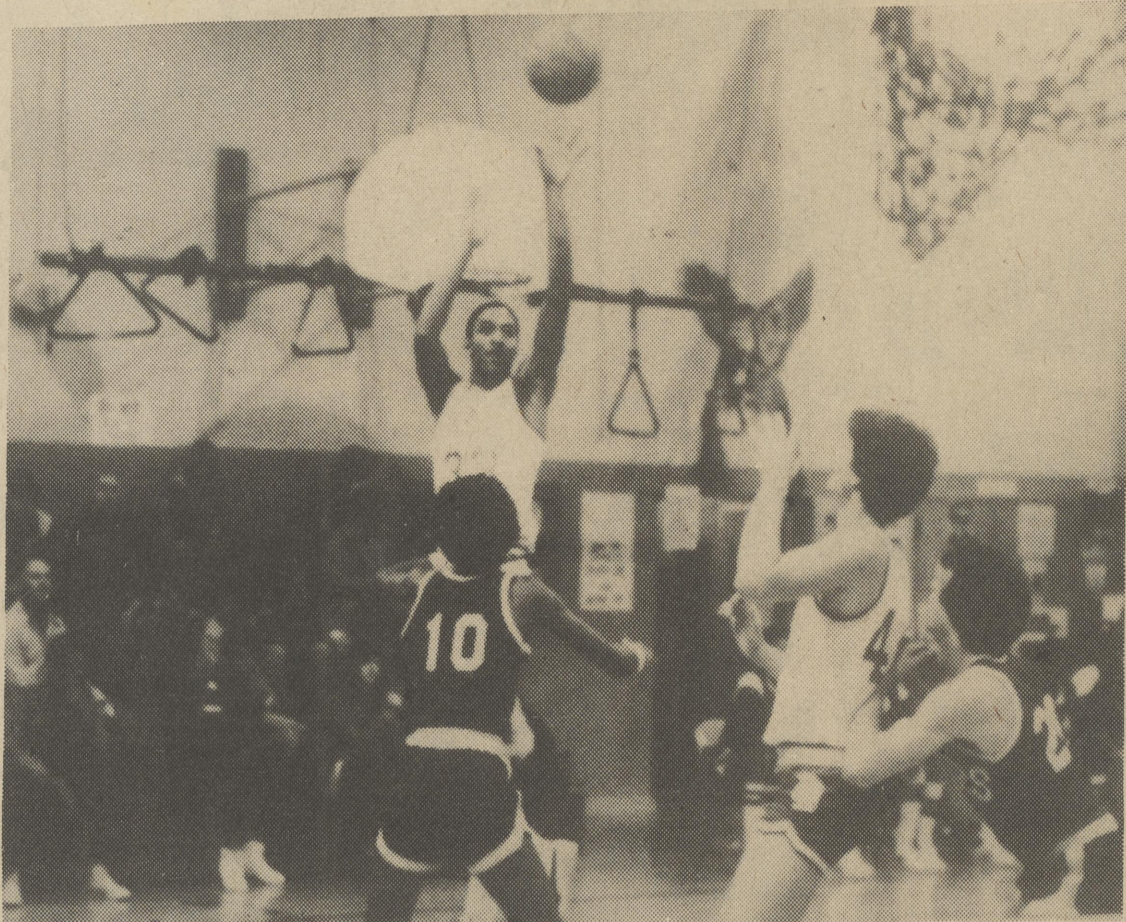

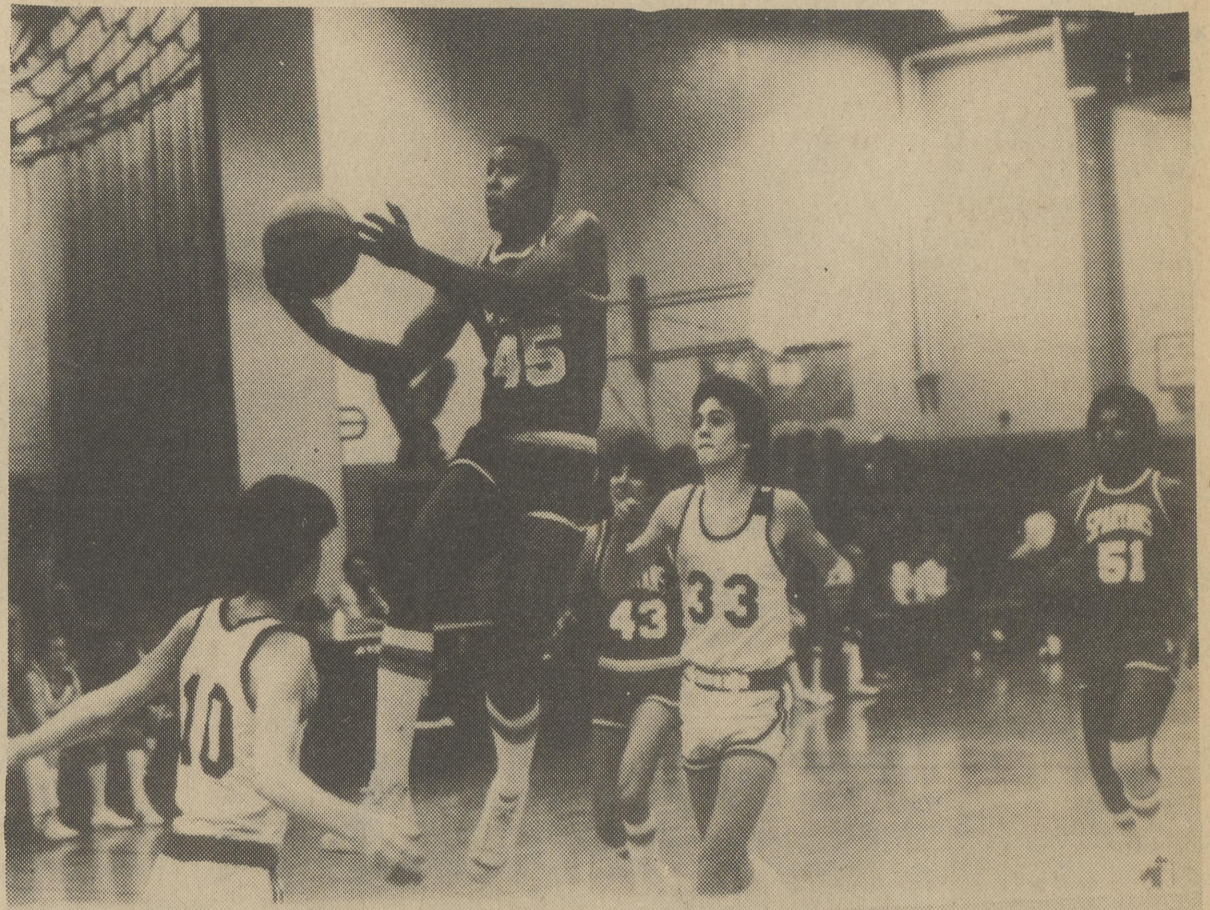

WHEREAS, the Council is authorized by Section 22(A) of Chapter 167 of Volume 40 of the Laws of Delaware, subject to approval of the electors of the City as hereinafter provided, to borrow money and issue Bonds of Certificates of Indebtedness secured by the faith and credit of the City for the purpose of the construction or repair of sewer or sewage disposal equipment or to defray and cost of the share of the City of the cost of any permanent municipal improvement;

WHEREAS, a project for the City known as Modification and Expansion of Waste Water Treatment Facilities studies and design has been approved by the Delaware Division of Environmental Control and United States Environmental Protection Agency;

WHEREAS, the City is presently operating under temporary permits issued by state and federal authorities permitting the City to operate its waste water treatment facility in variance to state and federal law;

WHEREAS, said project is necessary in order for the City to be in compliance with clean water requirements under both state and federal laws and avoid to cancellation of the temporary permits;

WHEREAS, the total cost of the project (including preliminary planning and studies which have been performed) is estimated to be approximately \$1,125,000;

WHEREAS, the City has received grants for the project from the federal and state governments covering approximately 85 percent of the total cost of the project;

WHEREAS, the City's share of the cost of the project is estimated not to exceed \$189,000;

WHEREAS, the City plans to offer said bonds for sale, at competitive bidding, to the best and most responsible bidder;

WHEREAS, the City has applied to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for a loan and/or grant of up to \$189,000 which would be used to pay the City's share of the cost of the project;

WHEREAS, the FmHA is currently granting loans similar to the one applied for by the City at an interest rate of 5 percent per annum and repayable over 40 years;

WHEREAS, if the City does not receive said loan and/or grant from the FmHA, it would have to seek the funds from some other source in which case the loan terms would not likely be as favorable as those currently quoted by FmHA; and

WHEREAS, Section 22(D) of Chapter 167 of Volume 40 of the Laws of Delaware provides that the City may not incur bonded indebtedness in excess of 15 percent of the value of the real property situated within the limits of the City as shown by the last assessment preceding any proposed addition to said indebtedness and the addition of \$189,000 to the City's bonded indebtedness will not cause the City to exceed that limitation.

NOW THEREFORE,
BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Harrington as follows:
(1) Pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Section 22 of Chapter 167 of Volume 40 of the Laws of Delaware, the Council hereby proposes to the electors of the City of Harrington that:
(A) a sum not to exceed \$189,000 shall be borrowed to finance a portion of the costs of the construction, modification, expansion and rehabilitation of the City of Harrington waste water treatment facilities in order to comply with state and federal requirements with respect thereto;
(B) said sum shall be borrowed by the issuance of bonds of the City of Harrington of an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$189,000 for the aforesaid purpose;
(C) the interest rate on the bonds shall be determined by competitive bidding;
(D) as required by Section 22(c) of

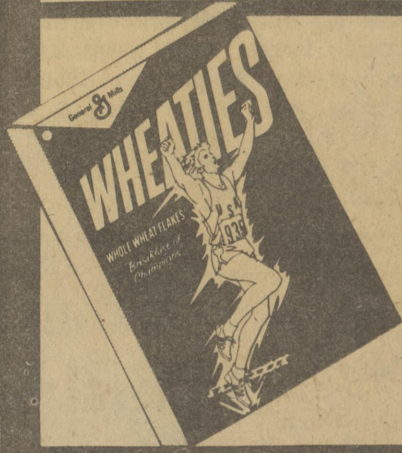
