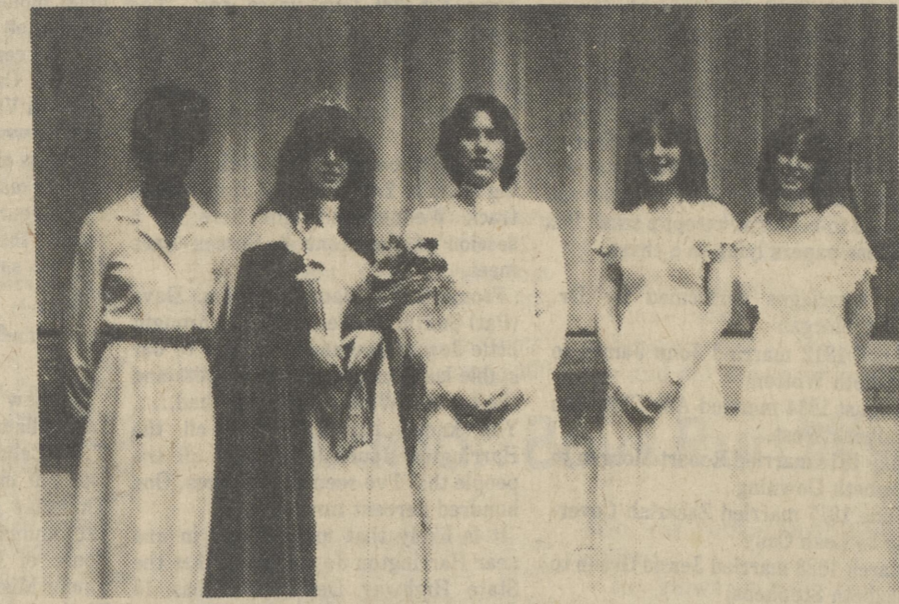
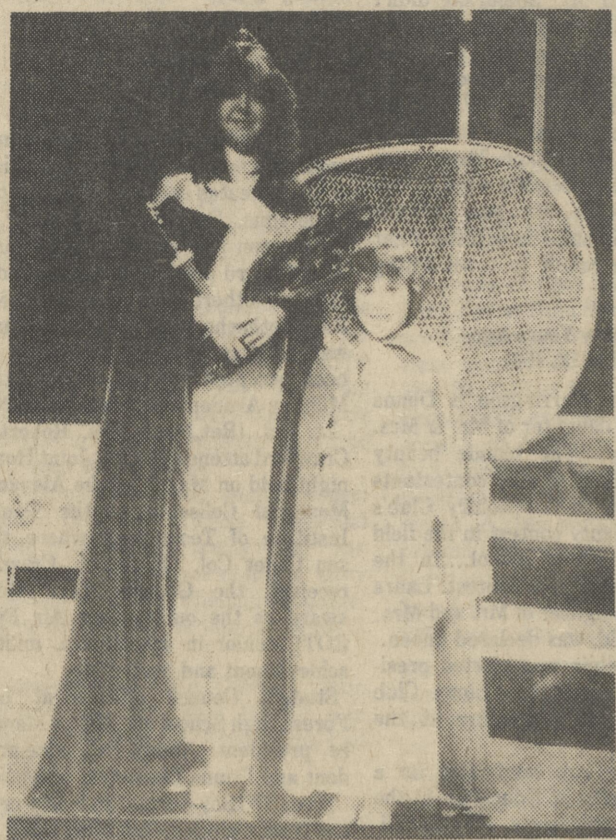

## Patti Draper Crowned Miss Lake Forest

Patti Draper, a seventeen-year-old junior at Lake Forest High School, won the votes of the judges and was crowned Miss Lake Forest 1981 at the climax of a pageant sponsored by the Lake Forest High School Student Government Association Saturday night.

Runner up in the Miss Lake Forest competition was Ruth Ricker, a sixteen year old junior and the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Ricker. The Little Miss runner up was six year old Jill Flannagan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Flannagan.

A "Miss Congeniality" was also selected by the Miss Lake Forest contestants themselves. This year she is Valarie Voshell, a sixteen year old sophomore and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Voshell.

## Gilbert Joins LF Administrative Staff

Dr. Arthur R. Gilbert recently joined the staff of the Lake Forest School District as Supervisor of Curriculum and Special Programs, filling the post left vacant by the retirement last year of Sol Markowitz. Dr. Gilbert comes to this district from the Capital School District in Dover where he served from 1974 until 1981 as Associate Principal at the William Henry Middle School.

A native of Sanford Maine, Dr. Gilbert completed high school at Sacred Heart Preparatory School in Winthrop. His undergraduate college work was done at Sacred Heart Normal School, Pascoag, Rhode Island, where he received a Scholastic and St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vermont, where he earned a B.A. in science (pre-med).

He also holds a Master's in Educational Administration from St. Michael's and a Specialist Certificate as well as a Doctorate in Educational Administration from the State University of New York at Albany.

For two years he taught grades six and seven at Precious Blood Junior High School in Woonsocket, Rhode Island. The following six years, from 1955 to 1961, he was a science teacher in grades eight to 12 at Mount St. Charles Academy, also in Woonsocket.

For the subsequent nine years he was employed in the public Catholic schools of St. Laurent, Quebec, Canada. (Public schools in Quebec were divided along

denominational lines.) For that time he worked for the Catholic School Board of St. Laurent (now known as the St. Croix School Board) and served as science teacher, and later as science supervisor for grades K to 12. For five of those years he was science department chairman at the Fr. McDonald Comprehensive High School.

Before coming to the Capitol School District in Dover, Dr. Gilbert was administrative assistant in the educational administration department at the

State University of New York at Albany for two years, and held a similar post at Howard S. Billings Regional High School in Chateaugay, Quebec for one year. In Dover, he was Associate Principal at Central Middle School before transferring to William Henry.

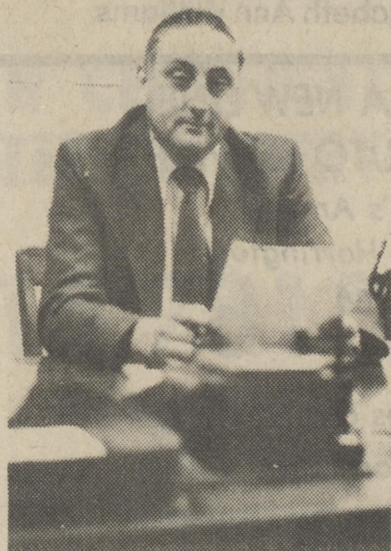
At present he is a school board member for the Holy Cross Parochial Schools, serves on the Catholic Board of Education for the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington and is also a member of the Kent County Advisory Board for Catholic Social Services as well as a member of its Southern Region Advisory Board.

From 1978 to the present he has taught classes for C.C.D. teachers in the Diocese of Wilmington and child psychology classes in Bethany Beach, DE, and Salisbury and Maryland, MD.

His extensive community and educational involvement includes membership in the Delaware Association of School Administrators and service as a member of the Adult Community Education Advisory Council for the State of Delaware.

Dr. Gilbert, who says he hopes to do a good job for the Lake Forest District, has been at his new post since mid April. He reports that the faculty and staff here have made him feel welcome.

A resident of Dover, he has one son, 13 year old Robert Phillip, and is married to the former Joann Roberta Hamsher.

## City to Enforce Parking Regulations

The Harrington Police Department issued a reminder this week to the citizens of Harrington that State as well as City Ordinance requires that all vehicles on city streets and State Highways must be insured as well as have a valid registration for the current year. Starting this week, any vehicle found not complying with the mentioned law and parked on the street will be towed at the owner's expense, and a permit from the Department of Motor Vehicle Division will be required before the vehicle will be released back to the owner stating that the vehicle complies with the law.

The Harrington Police Department will be issuing warnings for the next 30 days on vehicles that are not parked facing the direction of travel of the street that they are parked on. Also warnings will be given to those vehicles violating other parking laws in the City of Harrington. A \$5.00 parking ticket will be attached to those vehicles which do not comply with the parking laws after the 30 days.

Recent changes in the flow of traffic at Commerce Street and Mechanic Street as well as the parking have resulted in yellow striping in the area.

This action has been taken to insure that the street is passable for the motoring public as well as the emergency vehicles that may have to respond to an emergency. Violators who double park on Mechanic Street and in the yellow zones that are marked in the City will be ticketed a \$5.00 parking ticket.

## American Legion Poppy Days

Mrs. Clyde Tudker, President of the Callaway-Kemp-Raughley-Tee American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Harrington announced this week that the Annual Poppy Days will be held on May 14, 15, and 16. On those dates, the red crepe paper poppy will be offered to the public. This reminder of the sacrifice of countless thousands in four wars is an event undertaken each year by Auxiliary members throughout the United States.

Funds collected on Poppy Day are used to assist the needy veteran and his family. It is a self-help program, for

the Auxiliary's poppy is hand-made in Poppy Shops by disabled and hospitalized veterans petal by petal.

The memorial flower was adopted by the American Legion Auxiliary in 1920 and since that time, programs have been conducted each year, often near Memorial Day.

All proceeds are channeled directly into rehabilitation and welfare work for children and youth as well as for needy veterans.

## Harrington Council Will Let Jack Wyatt Finish Alley

The Harrington City Council Monday night voted to allow Council member Jack Wyatt to complete work to improve an alley from Peck Avenue to the rear of his property at his own expense. But Wyatt said later he has not decided whether or not he will follow through.

If he chooses not to complete the work at his own expense, the City will be right back where it started with the Peck Avenue entrance to the alley still torn up and a group of Wyatt's neighbors whose properties abut the alley unhappy that the work was started in the first place. And whatever the Councilman's decision, the group led by spokesman Claude Neeman hinted they might take the question to the state's attorney general.

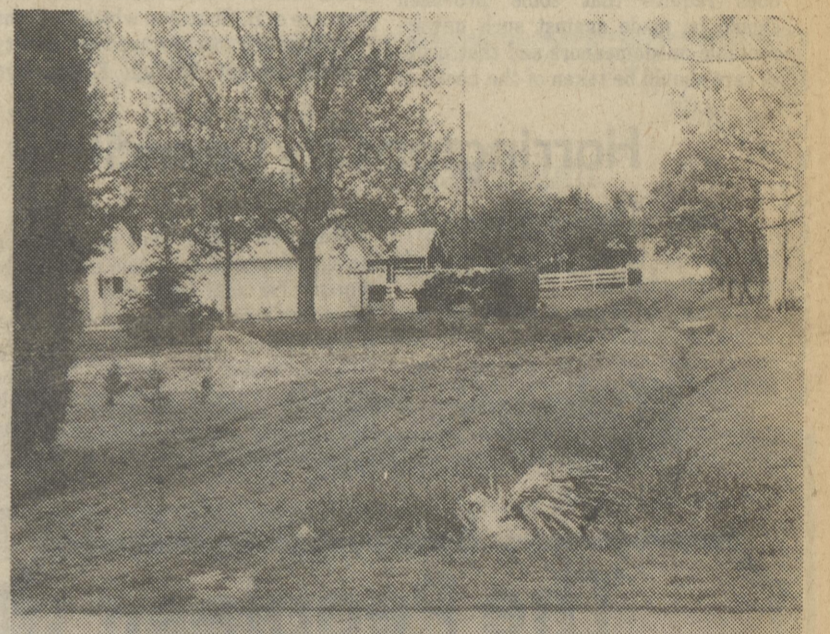
The controversy first erupted at the April 28 Harrington City Council meeting when the citizens came to question why the improvements to the alley had been initiated without consulting them and without the knowledge of the Mayor and Council. They also voiced their opposition to the project and their preference for keeping the alley as they say it has been for the past 40 years - basically a grassy area with little traffic.

Wyatt would like to make it easier to haul in wood to his property. He said he was surprised at the reaction of his neighbors.

argument that the action had been taken without properly consulting the residents involved and cited a section of the charter which gives the city authority to open, alter or widen alleys or streets, but says it must state the day, hour and place where citizens may appear before the governing body to voice questions or objections. He said this had not been done. He further said, "We think that before the work was started, all eight property owners should have been contacted."

Jack Wyatt later defended the project on the strength of another section of the city charter or ordinances which gives the City Manager the authority to keep streets and alleys in good repair. The section reads, in part, "All public streets, and alleys and sidewalk pavements shall be in good repair. Such repair work, whether done by the city or by the abutting owner, shall be under the supervision of the City Manager. It shall be the duty of every City Officer and employee becoming cognizant of any defect in any street, alley or sidewalk, or any obstruction thereof, to report the same to the City Manager as soon as possible."

However, it was reportedly the Supervisor of Public Works and not the City Manager (or Administrator) under whose authority the work on the alley was undertaken. Wyatt defended the

Work actually started on opening or improving the section of the alley late in March and was well underway when Harrington Mayor Al Mann put a halt to the project until the Council could meet. At that time letters were sent to the property owners concerned asking their preference in the matter. Reportedly, the great majority, six out of eight, were opposed. Jack Wyatt and Earl Yoder are the only two of the property owners who have voiced support.

Discussion of the matter at the April Council meeting was heated with Neeman's group charging that the city acted improperly, spending tax dollars for the benefit of one citizen without consulting others concerned.

Wyatt defended the city's action, citing his right as a taxpayer to have the alley improved. In this he was supported by Council member Dr. Vincent Lobo who also pointed out the hours of service Wyatt has given the city. Lobo said the city has had an ongoing policy over the past several years of improving alleys and that his project was in line with that policy and did not need the prior approval of the council. It was, he claimed, within the proper authority of the Supervisor of Public Works, Bob Hasset, to initiate and carry out. Wyatt said although he had mentioned the alley as one possible project, it was Hasset who made the decision and started the work.

Mayor Al Mann voiced the opinion that the city had acted legally, but with perhaps improper procedure in the situation. He pointed out that the alley had apparently never been abandoned by the city and was still within its proper jurisdiction. However, the question was tabled until the City's attorney, Harry Terry could be consulted.

The alley question was again at the fore as citizens gathered at Monday night's Council meeting where they heard City Solicitor Harry Terry confirm the fact that the alley had never been abandoned (thus, it is not a matter of "opening" the alley) and that the city was within its legal rights to either improve the alley, leave it alone or have individuals pay for the work.

During the ensuing discussion, Councilman Harold Brode pointed out that it was not local tax dollars but Municipal Street Aid funds (from state tax revenues) which go into street improvement.

Neeman reiterated the group's

action because the work was within the \$500 discretionary limit beneath which Hasset does not have to go to Council for specific permission on a project within his jurisdiction.

At the outset of Monday night's discussion, Councilman Ray Gagne offered the comment that the city had acted imprudently in the matter, but that it was time to put it all behind them. He therefore offered the motion which would allow Wyatt to complete the work on the alley to his property at his own expense.

The motion was opposed by Dr. Lobo who said the city had created the problem and should not ask Wyatt to spend his own money to correct it or to finish the work. Lobo again cited the ongoing policy of making improvements to alleys which he said had been adopted by the Council. He claimed the

# Delaware Diamonds

Everyone, who has been reading this column, will recognize most of the names in the following document; or you may have seen them listed in the current telephone directory!

"Patrick Gordon Esq. Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Pennsylvania and counties of New Castle, Kent, Sussex on Delaware-To Mark Manlove, Timothy Hanson, John Housman, Hugh Durborow, James Morris, William Barnes, and John Holliday of the county of Kent, Esquires, or to any three of them Greetings:

Whereas in pursuance of the power of the Honorable the Proprietor of the said provinces and counties an enquiry hath been made into the state and condition of the respective offices held and devised on Benjamin Shurmer, Clerk of the said county, and by the report thereof it Doth appear that a great part of the records of the said county is wanting as well many whole books as all the original deed and wills which were in the custody of the said Clerk. A loss so great it is much doubted how the same can be made up to the persons who are the sufferers in as much as it must unavoidably create great confusion both in the mettes and bounds of their lands but more especially that the inventories of the estates of intestates, and all their lands entered into for the deceased. Administrations of such estates are likewise wanting from the beginning of the government till about the year one thousand seven hundred and twenty four or one thousand seven hundred and twenty five where by the condition of many orphans became very deplorable and it appearing by the acknowledgement of the said Benjamin Shurmer that he used sometimes to leave blank Letters of Administration signed by him with his clerk to be made use of in his absence by which means his said clerk or servant had at times the Power of Disposing of the best estates in the said county to the ruin of the children or relations of Intestates and Whereas the honor of the Government as well as the security of the People does require that some provision should be made against such unwarrantable misdemeanors and that proper care should be taken of the books of

records and other papers belonging to the Prothonotaries Clerk of the Peace's Register and Rolls Office that yet remains of which a list is here unto annex and These are to Authorize and require you the said Mark Manlove, Timothy Hanson, John Housman, Hugh Durborow, James Morris, William Barnes, and John Holiday or any three of you to take and receive into your custody and safe keeping all the books and papers in the List aforesaid mentioned and all other books, papers, and writing to the said office or either of them appertaining and belonging until my further directions shall be given herein. Permitting nevertheless the said Benjamin Shurmer at reasonable times to have recourse to the same for making our Writs, Copies of Declarations, Deeds, Wills, and soforth and in case of his neglect or from refusal you the said Hugh Durborow are hereby authorized impowered and required to execute and discharge the said several offices of Clerk of the Peace Prothonotary of the County Court of Common Please Register for the Probate of Wills and granting Letters of Administration and Keeper of the Rolls Office in their several parts and branches according to Law until my further orders shall be given herein. Given under my hand and seal and arms at New Castle the fifth day of August 1735 ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second by the Grace of God of Great Britain France and Ireland King Defender of the faith and soforth (signed) P. Gordon". It is possible that this investigation began as the result of a complaint. William Ellis had stated that an administration was granted to him on his brother Benjamin's Estate and he had paid fifty shillings to B. Shurmer for the Letters of Administration. There is a statement to the fact "the Will of Benjamin Ellis is entered at Large with the Probate of the Will in Pennsylvania and Letters testamentary granted in Maryland...but no date of the time of recording. There is an affidavit of one William Burroughs taken before the Justices in the presence of B. Shurmon which is all the Proof made of the payment of the fifty shillings except William Ellis's own

word." The List of the records taken into the custody of Mark Manlove and the other commissioners included books of records of Judgements, court-proceedings, marks of cattle, Deeds, copies of Bonds, Surveys, Earmarks, Returns of Warrants for the years 1680 to 1702, Wills, Letters of Administration, Commissions to the Justices and Letters of Commissions, some dated as late as 1724. "There are no more books or records of Wills to be found from 1710 to 1718. Mr. Shurmer said they are burnt. All the Wills, Administration Bonds, all Writs, Declarations, Writs of Enquiry and Writs of Execution from the beginning of the Government to the year 1728 are not to be found and are said to be burnt except a small Box of Loose papers lying in a chest."

14 Oct. 1823 married Demand Hollis to Kitty Twiford.  
25 March 1824 married John Allen to Meriah Phillips.

(Dr. William Morgan was a lay preacher WITH THE Methodist Episcopal Church on the Seaford Circuit. He was also a physician, treating body as well as soul. He performed many marriages in Sussex and lower Kent Counties).

city would be acting arbitrarily in passing the motion.

The motion did pass on a roll call vote with Harrington, Gagne and Quillen in favor; Lobo and Brode voting "No", and Wyatt abstaining.

Neither side was especially pleased with the outcome, and since the city cannot require Wyatt to complete the work, the status of the matter is still

uncertain. Mayor Al Mann went on record as being opposed to the action taken in the motion. He said later that no citizen should be required to pay for improvements to the streets or alleys. But he also expressed the opinion that the procedure in the whole matter, if only from a public relations standpoint, had been improper and said proper ways of dealing with such questions would be developed and adhered to in the future.

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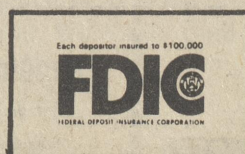

## Anne's Kitchen

I'm sure you will think this recipe out of character for me, but it truly is one of my favorites. I'll agree it is one of those things you have to be in the mood for, and since you have to start four days ahead it is often hard to decide you want to bother. I do get to make it about four times a year, and enjoy it very much each time. Don't let the instructions frighten you. They really are quite easy, and the result well worth the extra effort.

### Saucerbatan

4-5 lb. rump or bottom round roast  
1 tablespoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
2 medium onions, sliced  
1 carrot, sliced  
1 stalk celery, diced  
4 whole cloves  
4 whole black pepper corns  
1 pint red wine vinegar  
2 bay leaves  
2 tablespoons fat  
1 tablespoon butter  
5 tablespoons butter  
2 1/2 tablespoons flour

2 tablespoons sugar  
10-12 crushed ginger snaps

1. In a large glass bowl, place beef. Combine salt, pepper, onions, carrot, celery cloves, pepper corns, vinegar, and bay leaves. Pour over beef. Cover, refrigerate 4 days and turn 2 or 3 times a day.

2. Remove beef from the refrigerator, drain, reserve marinade. In a dutch oven with fat and 1 tablespoon butter brown beef on all sides 15-20 minutes. Add marinade, bring to a boil and simmer covered about 3 hours.

3. In a saucepan melt 5 tablespoons butter and stir in flour to make a paste. Add sugar and slowly stir into pot with meat and marinade. Continue to simmer, covered about 1 hour or till meat is fork tender.

4. Remove beef to heated platter. Add crushed gingersnaps and cook stirring till thickened. Skim off fat. Slice beef and pour gravy over slices. Pass the rest around for extra helpings.

Refreshments will be on sale for Naval relief, free balloons and bumper stickers to the first 250 people.

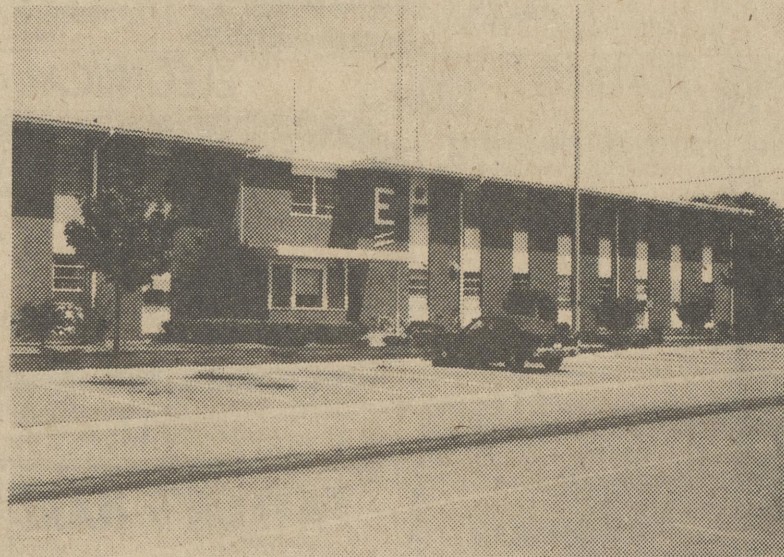

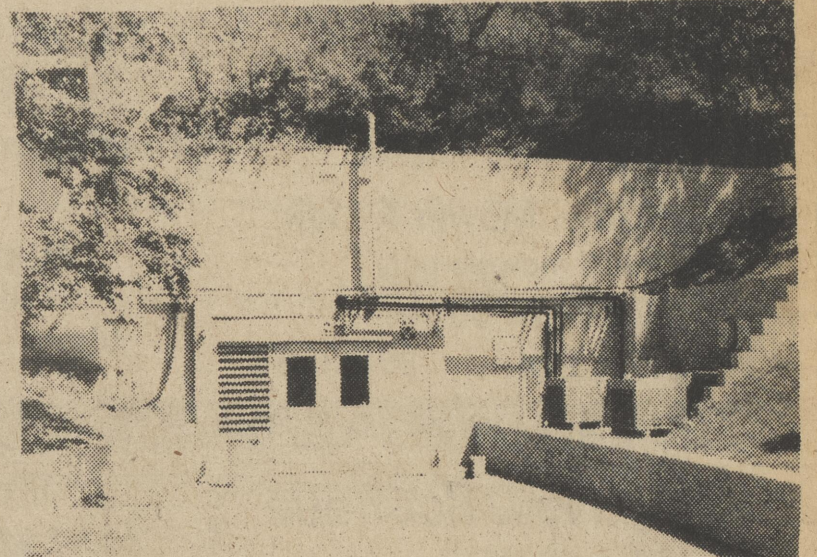

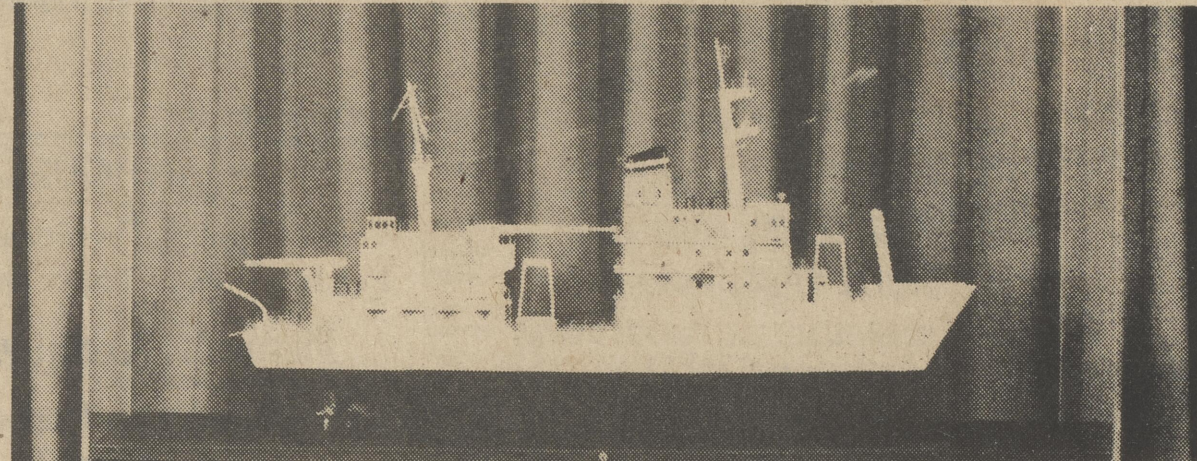
