New Sewer Reaches Felton Limits

After some delays in the schedule, partially because of rain, construction on the new sewer system which will hook area users into the Kent County system reached the outskirts of Felton this week. Equipment and material were lined up Tuesday morning on the grounds behind the Lake Forest North Elementary School to take the line into town. Work has been in progress on the line from Felton down Route 12 to Frederica where it connects to the county waste disposal plant.

Felton Mayor William Myers gave an update on the progress of the construction at Monday night's Felton Town Council meeting.

Gussett To Head Board

In a brief reorganization session last Wednesday evening, James Gussett was chosen to head the Lake Forest Board of Education for the coming year. Gussett, who served as vice president for the past year, succeeds Cliff Chambers who was president for 1980-1981. Frederick "Rick" Feutz will be vice president for 1981-82, and Feutz and Albert Price were selected again to serve on the legislative committee.

Also at Wednesday night's session, new Board member William Garey was

sworn in. Garey succeeds his brother Donald Garey who held the board seat for two five-year terms.

The next regular board meeting will be on Monday, July 20. But with the advent of new Lake Forest Superintendent Dr. Edward Powell there will be a slight change in schedule. The Board will continue to meet on the third Monday of each month, but the public session will not begin until 8 p.m. The Board will hold executive session to discuss appropriate matters such as personnel from 7 until 8 p.m.

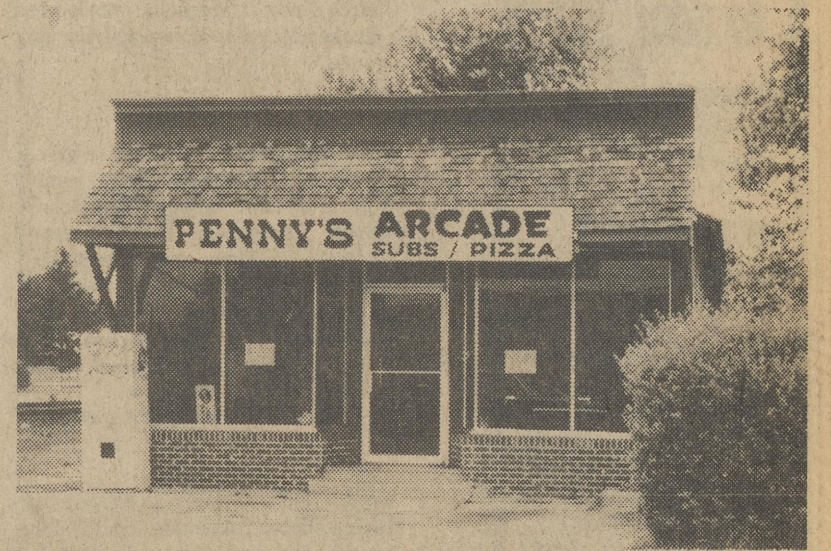

Trash Collection Stations Charge \$2 Fee

Kent County residents who do not live within a city or other incorporated area providing trash collection service must now pay a \$2.00 fee each time they take their trash to one of the three collection stations at Vernon, Barkers Landing or Kenton. The fee went into effect July 1. A spokesman for the Delaware Solid Waste Authority, which has taken over the operation of the collection stations, said the \$2 fee was based on Kent County's figures of \$160,000 for operating the three stations for a year. That figure includes the cost of transporting the trash from the collection stations to the Sandtown landfill site and of its disposal as well as the cost of utilities and of paying personnel to man the

stations. At that rate, 80,000 vehicles would have to use the three stations during the course of a year.

The state will continue to operate the three stations on a trial basis for three months until the end of September. At that time, if the user volume is not enough to bear the cost of the operation, the three collection stations could be closed.

In the event of closing, County residents who do not have trash service would have three options:

- 1) They could haul their trash directly to Sandtown where \$1.00 per car or station wagon or approximately 67 cents per hundred weight of trash for truck loads (based on \$12.50 per ton)

would be charged for trash disposal.

2) They could try to find a private firm that would agree to pick up their trash.

3) Kent County Residents who live in an unincorporated area of 25 or more residents could petition Kent County Levy Court to form a trash collection district. The county would then contract with private collectors to provide service to the area.

The state has been in the trash business in Kent County since the

Sandtown Landfill site went into operation on August 23, 1981. In New Castle County, it has been handling trash disposal since January. Sussex County is still responsible for its own trash disposal but the state will phase into that operation in 1982.

The collection stations at Vernon, Barkers Landing and Kenton are presently open Monday through Saturday from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Local Druggist Takes Bike Trip

Nabbed in Shoplifting

Willis T. Matthews, of Harrington, was in jail at Sussex Correctional Institute this week awaiting a presentence hearing after pleading guilty to several charges related to a shoplifting incident in Milford on June 26. Matthews faced several charges following the incident, but as a result of plea bargaining, pled guilty to only three - shoplifting, resisting arrest and a reduced charge from second to third degree assault for attacking a police officer. Matthews was being held at SCCI in default of \$19,000 bond.

The incident began on Thursday, June 26, when Milford Police were called to the A & P after meat valued at

TRASH COLLECTION SCHEDULE FOR THE CITY OF HARRINGTON

Regular Household Refuse:

West side of railroad tracks - Thursdays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M.

East side of railroad tracks - Fridays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M.

All trash should be put out prior to 7:00 A.M. on your scheduled day to insure pick up.

In the event that a scheduled holiday falls on a Thursday, Thursday's route will be collected on the preceding Wednesday.

In the event that a scheduled holiday falls on a Friday, Thursday's route will be collected on Wednesdays and Friday's route will be collected on Thursdays.

All refuse put out for collection shall be placed in containers or secured in bundles of such size and weight that a person of reasonable strength can lift such containers or bundles in such a manner so as to empty or place them in trash removal vehicles utilized by the City. In no event shall any non-containerized or unsecured refuse be collected by the City crews on regular trash collection days.

Special Pick Ups

Brush, tree clippings, or other substances or materials, too bulky to be placed in the regular containers shall be collected on Mondays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M.; provided, that special arrangements have been made by calling City Hall in advance.

All such items shall be placed at the curb line or alley line in the same location of the regular trash pick up.

In the event that a scheduled holiday falls on a Monday, special pick ups shall be made on the following Tuesday.

Construction debris shall not be collected by the City and shall be removed by the owner.

"The Crystal Palace," a traveling exhibit from the Gallery Association of New York State, will arrive in Seaford this month thanks to a grant from the Delaware Arts Council.

The exhibit will be on view in the vacant Wrangler's Wranch store at the Nylon Capital Shopping Center, Seaford, July 12, 17, 18 and 19. Seaford District Library and the Sussex County Arts Council are co-sponsoring the event.

Thirty-three photographs on eighteen free-standing panels document the reconstruction of the great Crystal Palace, site of the first World's Fair, on Sydenham Hill near London in the 1850's.

British photographer Philip Henry Delamotte made the prints which record the building process. They are of special value today because the Crystal Palace burned to the ground in 1936.

The "Crystal Palace" will open with a public reception on Sunday, July 12. Hours for the exhibit are: Friday, July 17, 2-8 p.m.; Saturday, July 18, 10 a.m.-4 p.m.; and Sunday, July 19, 1-5 p.m.

The nation's best chicken cook will be selected in Ocean City, Maryland on July 29th. The 33rd annual National Chicken Cooking Contest (NCCC) will be staged under the sponsorship of the National Broiler Council (NBC) at the Ocean City Convention Hall. Fifty-one contestants, representing each state plus the District of Columbia, will vie for the \$10,000 grand prize and the distinction of being named the nation's top chicken cook.

State finalists were selected on the basis of recipes submitted earlier this year. Chicken will be prepared in a variety of ways using conventional and microwave ovens, portable appliances and outdoor grills. Over fifty of the nation's top food editors will also be in attendance to participate, either as judges or observers of this event.

The contest originated on Delmarva in 1949 and continued to be an activity of Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc. (DPI), the local trade association representing the tri-state area's huge broiler industry until 1972 when sponsorship of this national event was relinquished to National Broiler Council. The cook-off has since been held in other broiler producing areas around the country and now returns to Delmarva for 1981.

The July 29th cook-off will begin at 9:30 A.M. at Convention Hall and is open to the public at no charge.


