New Sewer Reaches Felton Limits

After some delays in the schedule, partially because of rain, construction on the new sewer system which will hook area users into the Kent County system reached the outskirts of Felton this week. Equipment and material were lined up Tuesday morning on the grounds behind the Lake Forest North Elementary School to take the line into town. Work has been in progress on the line from Felton down Route 12 to Frederica where it connects to the county waste disposal plant.

Felton Mayor William Myers gave an update on the progress of the construction at Monday night's Felton Tow Council meeting.

Council Member Don Jacobs reported Monday night that an application has been resubmitted to Washington for inclusion of the Felton Railroad Station on the National Register of Historic Buildings. He said the original application had been turned down because it was not filled out properly and because an architecht's drawing had been requested.



FOR THE CITY OF HARRINGTON Regular Household Refuse:

West side of railroad tracks - Thursdays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. East side of railroad tracks - Fridays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. All trash should be put out prior to 7:00 A.M. on your scheduled day to insure

In the event that a scheduled holiday falls on a Thursday, Thursday's route will be collected on the preceding Wednesday.

In the event that a scheduled holiday falls on a Friday, Thursday's route will

be collected on Wednesdays and Friday's route will be collected on Thursdays. All refuse put out for collection shall be placed in containers or secured in bundles of such size and weight that a person of reasonable strength can lift such containers or bundles in such a manner so as to empty or place them in trash removal vehicles utilized by the City. In no event shall any non-containerized or unsecured refuse be collected by the City crews on regular trash collection days.

Brush, tree clippings, or other substances or materials, too bulky to be placed in the regular containers shall be collected on Mondays 7:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M.; provided, that special arrangements have been made by calling City Hall in

Peter Lowber obtained the land on Pa. and Margaret his wife, on 19 which stood the Lowber Mansion, a October 1808 sold to Jonathan Manlove present Magnolia landmark. However by 1798 he was in great financial difficulties and was sued by Caleb North and Thomas Haskins. The Kent County Court of Common Pleas ordered his lands to be seized and sold at public auction. Joseph Barker was the highest bidder and in 1805 he received a deed conveying to him "all Peter Lowber's share of division of his Father, Matthew Lowber's real estate said to contain about 147 acres, being in Murderkill Hundred adjoining lands of Joseph Barker, heirs of Daniel James deceased, and Jonathan Jackson and on both sides of the main road leading from Dover to Frederica."

The said parcel of land in the division of the real estate of William Walker deceased, late of Kent County was laid off and allotted to his daughter Susannah who afterward intermarried with a certain Henry Harrington and Susannah afterwards died leaving issue two children, a son and a daughter, which daughter afterwards intermarried with Peter Lowber and afterwards died leaving issue one child, which child afterward died in its minority so that Peter Lowber became lawfully possessed of and in, one third part of the tract or parcel of land allotted to Susannah Walker Harrington in the division of the real estate of her father William

On 28 November 1808 Jonathan Manlove and Anne his wife sold the tract of land "whereon Jonathan Manlove now dwells which he purchased from Joseph Barker", to John Marim.

Orphans Court Records reveal that John Marim died intestate 18 Feb. 1815 at his residence in Kent County. His heirs were his widow Hannah Marim and six children; Ruhamah, wife of Cornelius P. Coniggs; Susan wife of James Bateman; Thomas Marim; Mary wife of Richard Lemans; Elizabeth Marim and Charles Marim.

In the division of lands Susan and her husband James Bateman received the parcel of land purchased by John Marim of Jonathan Manlove which included the brick dwelling house and which was surveyed to contain about 117 acres.

The survey map shows that there were two channels of the Beaver Dam Branch the main one running parrallel with the north boundary of the land and the south east prong dividing the Marim land from the acres still held by Joseph Barker. Directly across the North Beaver Dam Branch and on the east side of the Road to Dover (which would be almost directly across the iwell, 11, made after his recent heart street from where the Methodist Church is now in Magnolia) was located a Quaker Meeting House and Burying Felton celebrated their golden wedding



What to feed a hungry family, serve at a buffet dinner, a nice change from the usual potatoes? You guessed it! Macaroni and cheese. I find it really stretches the meat course and always comes up a winner. I have tried many methods, with different types of cheese but get the best results with this recipe. If you really want to go all the way you can scatter a pound of very crisp crumbled bacon when you blend the cheese sauce with the macaroni.

MACARONI & CHEESE 1 pound Velveeta cheese 3/4 pound white cheddar cheese

1/4 pound butter 1 pound macaroni (ziti) quart milk 1 medium onion bread crumbs pepper to taste

1. Butter good-sized roasting pan. 2. Sprinkle in bread crumbs and shake

to coat sides and bottom of pan. 3. Chop onion and cook in melted butter. Do not allow butter or onion to brown.

4. Dice cheeses.

5. Add milk to butter mixture and heat to warm. 6. Add cheeses and cook on low heat till

melted. Careful not to burn. 7. Cook Ziti till half done.

8. Drain macaroni, return to pot, add

cheese sauce and blend well. 9. Pour into prepared baking dish and

put in pre-heated oven at 375 degrees. 10. Bake till degree of firmness you

No flour is necessary to thicken sauce. Since the macaroni will finish cooking in the oven it will absorb most of the moisture. If you prefer a much softer macaroni, cook a little longer before mixing. Remember however, that in this case you may have to extend the baking time a little.

Distress Signals Required Gear

A new federal law passed this year requires all boats on coastal waters of the United States and U.S. Registry boats on the high seas to carry visual distress signals as part of their regular gear, according to George Stewart, boating administrator of the state Division of Fish and Wildlife.

In Delaware this includes the Delaware Bay and River to a point where it is less than two miles wide, as well as Atlantic waters.

"The new law requires that all boats 16 feet or more in length carry Coast Guard approved signal devices as specified for day or night use," Stewart explained. "Boats of less than 16 feet, when used in the defined waters, must

carry signals suitable for day use." Exceptions, he said, are boats used in daytime parades, regattas or races, manually propelled boats and sail boats of less than 26 feet that are completely open and not equipped with motors.

There is a wide variety of signalling devices, any combination of which is acceptable as long as it adds up to three signals for day use and three for night use. Three day and night signalling devices meet both requirements.

Acceptable visual distress signals are: hand-held red flares for eigher day or night use; floating orange smoke signals for daytime use; pistol-projected parachute red flares for either day or night use; rocket propelled parachute red flares for day and night use; hand-held orange smoke distress signals for day only; floating orange smoke distress signals for day only-red aerial pyrotechnic flares for day or night use; an orange flag for day use; or electric distress light for night time

Rambling Willie Returns

At eleven, most harness horses look forward to a life of luxury in retirement, romping around in grassy paddocks and remembering their racing accomplishments.

Rambling Willie, though, has no time these days for looking back on his past, even though it is one of the most distinguished in harness history. No, Willie is too busy preparing for the future: rewriting the sport's record books even further, drawing new and wildly cheering fans to the races--and doing the work of the Lord.

The amazing gelding is presently in the midst of an 18-city nation-wide tour, a tour which makes its tenth stop at Brandywine Raceway the week of July 11th. The bay son of Rambling Fury races each week against the best pacers on the local scene, as he will at the Big B on Saturday the 11th.

However, the primary purpose of the tour is to promote Rambling Willie's biography, Rambling Willie: The Horse That God Loved, written by Don Evans and Phil Pikelny, who organized the multi-city blitz. The 207-page book, published by A.S. Barnes and Co. of San Diego, California, is an in-depth chronicle of the ups (and downs) in Rambling Willie's career, and what a fantastic career it has been--110 wins, 69 of those victories in 2:00 or better, a mark thought of as just as untouchable as Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak. Along the way, Willie has amassed \$1,893,932, just \$100,000 short of the lifetime total of Superstar

The book covers all of the records in detail. It also spends much time on the problems Willie has encountered: the bowed tendons that have plagued the horse throughout his career, the serious injuries suffered by Willie's trainer/driver, Hall of Famer Bob Farrington. But perhaps the most important aspect of the book is the description of the faith that Vivian Farrington, Bob's wife, has had in God and her horse, of how Willie and Bob's recoveries to health seem little short of divinelyinspired, and of Vivian's tithing of her share of the horse's winnings--roughly \$95,000 at this point to her father Rev.

C. L. Harris' church in West Mansfield, Ohio as thanks to the Lord.

The fact that Rambling Willie is still the principal benefactor of Deacon Harris's church at the advanced age of eleven is little short of unbelieveable. Although he no longer campaigns against the top free-for-all pacers, as he did in 1977 when he set a world record for aged geldings of 1:54.3 at Brandywine, Willie can still meet and defeat a very good calibre of horse. On his current tour, the Rambler is 8 for 9, including a spectacular 1:56.4 win May 16 at Liberty Bell, where he defeated such Delaware Valley stars as Ripping Russ and Full Respect. Sunday, he posted a track record 1:58.2 victory at

The oldtimer's durability and gameness are tremendously appealing to race fans throughout the country, and the cry of "Willie! Willie!" has been heard from coast to coast as the champion recorded another victory. The tour puts Willie even further in public view, with TV and radio appearances scheduled at every stop. The gelding visited the American Bookselers Association Convention in Atlanta in May, where he met with the bigwigs of the industry. Willie also visits shopping malls, he will appear at the McMahon Books, Christiana Mall near Wilmington, just down the road from Brandywine, on Friday, July 10, the day before he is scheduled to race at The Big B. These mall appearances are immensely popular, mostly because purchasers of Willie's book can have their copies "hoof-o-graphed" by the star, since Willie has his own stamp pad to leave his mark on the book--and on his fans.

Not since the days of the legendary Dan Patch at the turn of the century has a horse undertaken such a barnstorming tour of the country. But then again, few horses have captured the hearts and souls of harness racing fans as has this amazing senior citizen. The week of July 11--Rambling Willie week--promises to be a highlight of the sporting season in the Delaware Val-



Fatal Accident Claims Bridgeville Youth

Delaware State Police investigated a fatal accident Wednesday, June 24, noon 1 2/10 miles south of Millsboro. The death of the 18-year-old Bridgeville boy brought the state's highway death toll to 40.

George L. Pruitt, Jr., 18, of R.D. 2, Bridgeville, had worked at Vlasic Pickles only one week. He left there after work Wednesday, accelerated to an apparent high rate of speed, and had only gone 3/10ths of a mile before the crash occurred.

He was operating a motorcycle northbound on Cty. Rt. 331 at 4:47 p.m. when he attempted to negotiate a curve to the left. The motorcycle struck the guardrail on the right side of the road, and slid along the rail for 150

ft. before he was thrown into the Indian River. The cycle continued along the rail for another 300 feet.

After a short dragging operation George Pruitt was recovered from the Indian River by Millsboro Fire Co., and transported to Nanticoke Memorial Hospital. George L. 
