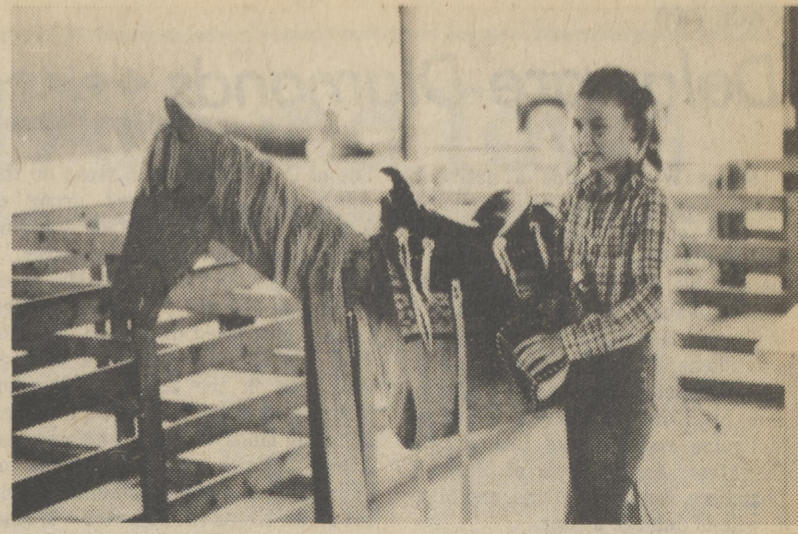




Checking out her finer points - 4-Hers and FFA members deliberate the qualities of this Holstein in dairy judging competition at the Fair.

Teachers/LF Board Keep Talking

Negotiations between the Lake Forest Board of Education and the Lake Forest Education Association, which represents the district's teachers, are quietly continuing this month. The teachers' current contract expired June 30, but it was extended until the end of July. With that date rapidly approaching, L.F.E.A. President Ed Gabrielson (who was contacted Monday night) forsook the probability of the teachers asking for another extension as talks go on.

Lake Forest Board President James Gussett said the board would have to vote to grant such an extension.

Although he would make no prediction either way, Gussett did comment that he hoped negotiations would continue in the "amiable and gentlemanly" spirit in which they have proceeded thus far. He said he thought the teachers had been fair in the manner of their presentation.

Neither Gussett nor Gabrielson would comment on the bargaining particulars. But Gabrielson did say that under the leadership of new district Superintendent Dr. Edward Powell, he thought the negotiations would go forward. He said Powell should be "an asset to the district in every way."

Dallas & Deep Creek Symphony Win Fair Country Music Contest

Several hundred country music lovers endured heat and sawdust Sunday afternoon as they crowded into the show arena at the Delaware State Fair to watch and listen as 23 entries vied for three awards in the Fair's 5th Annual Country Music Competition.

Dallas and the Deep Creek Symphony, a group that appeared last year under a different name, walked off with the first place trophy, \$100 and the guarantee of a free six-hour recording session at Birch Studio in Secretary, Maryland.

"Dallas and the Deep Creek Symphony" return to the fair Thursday night when they will appear with "The Carter Family" for two grandstand shows. The group hails from Princess Anne, Md.

Hot on the heels of the first group was second place winner, the "Denise Rene Band," which took home a trophy and \$75. Denise Rene has been a perennial in the fair's country music competition.

Third place went to a relatively new group, "Touch of Country", from Greenwood. A popular choice with Sunday's audience, the band was the last entry to appear on the program. "Touch of Country" received \$50 and a trophy.

The Oakley Sisters (Joy, Jill & Jackie) of Harrington were among the entries as were two others from Greenwood, "Interlude" and "Bill Mo Cleary". There were two groups from Georgetown - "The Dalton Gang" (which opened the program) and "Kevin Short and the Good Ole Boys". Grey Green of Lincoln, Kim and Karen Mears of Seaford and Leilani Wall of Milford were other area contestants. Entries came from Delaware, Maryland and Pennsylvania.

Last year's winners, "Joe Dawson and Sweet Water Run" put in a special appearance to entertain during the judges' deliberations.

This is the first year the country music contest has been held in the show arena at the fair. Opened last year, the arena more commonly houses livestock shows and judging competition. In previous years, an earlier country competition served to narrow the field to six finalists who appeared in a grandstand show in the evening of the Children's Day at the Fair. The top three were then selected from the six. Emcee and producer of the country music show was Dennis Hazzard. Sound was handled by Raymond Brown of Harrington.

This year's judges included Joanna Birch (of Birch Studios); Dave Speicher (of "Dave & the Astrotones," a

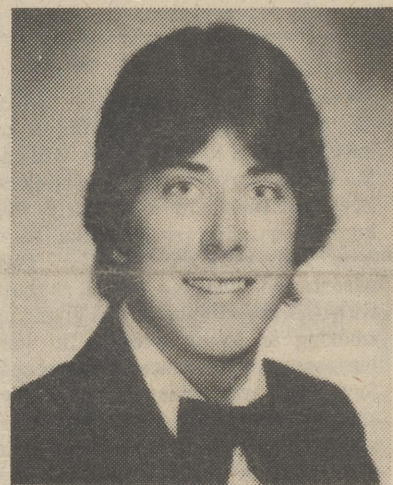

SS Annual Meeting Planned

Election of Advisory Board, Farm Home Advisory Committee members, as well as operations reports, will highlight the Southern States Cooperative's annual membership meeting for Peck Brothers Farm Supply on August 6 at the Fairgrounds Restaurant. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m.

The business session will be preceded by a supper. Tickets should be picked up well in advance at the agency.

John M. Curtis, Jr. of Harrington will serve as chairman of the local meeting.

Harry W. Dickerson of Seaford, a member of Southern States Cooperative's regional staff, will report on the over-all Southern States operations. This report will also include a 12-minute slide-tape presentation entitled "The Importance of Being Politically Active", which was produced by the

National Council of Farmer Cooperatives. It points out that farmers now represent only about 3 percent of the population and they should exert extra effort to make their voices heard in the halls of government. The presentation urges co-op members to communicate with their legislators and let them know their views about pending legislation.

Local operations and services rendered to agriculture in the community will be discussed by manager Thomas Peck.

Slides featuring local services to members will be shown. Theme of the meeting will be, "Involvement: Your Vote for the Future."

CC Offers Corn for Sale

Farmers and other interested persons will be eligible to purchase corn from the Commodity Credit Corporation starting July 27.

James S. Metz, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said the CCC will offer corn for unrestricted use sale at market prices, but not less than the formula price which is 115 percent of the county loan rate for corn where stored plus 54 cents per bushel

carrying charges. "The minimum quantity that will be considered for acceptance is 1,000 bushels," Metz said.

According to Metz, offers will be received and sales will be made on a first come, first serve basis.

"Getting to Know You" - It's Not Easy!

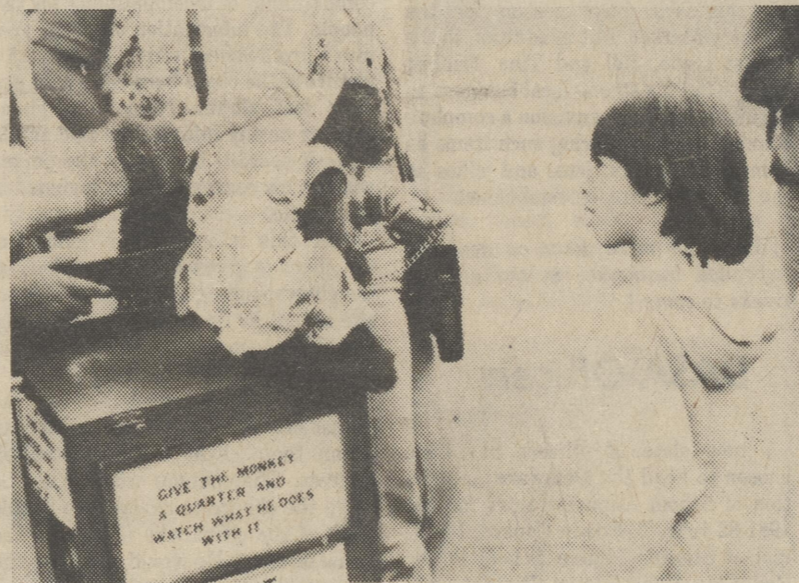

But the process is not all that easy, especially when it involves one adult looking for a compatible companion of the opposite sex. This is no automatic dating service in which people are matched by a computer and arbitrarily paired. No two people are introduced to each other unless both have expressed an interest in having that meeting occur.

This is what happens: The person who becomes a client of "Professional Introductions" is first interviewed by Will or Mo Hannah and is given a vocational preference inventory, a tool that is often used in connection with

Business Update

The Harrington area business community in recent months has seen some welcome expansion as new businesses have located here or established firms have varied or expanded their operations. Included in this activity are the addition of "The Loft" at Welch's Seed Service, expanded facilities at McCullough's Tire and Service Center, the move by Chick's from their East Street location to U.S. 13, the establishment of a Montgomery Ward service center here and the opening of a Country Market at the location of Gruwell and Sons Greenhouses.

MONTGOMERY WARD SERVICE CENTER-Montgomery Ward has established a new service center on U.S. 13 South in quarters formerly occupied by Kirby & Holloway Equipment Company. The company has leased the property for 10 years.

Opened this summer, the center is headquarters for Montgomery Ward service south of the C & D canal and "from bay to bay", serving the Eastern Shore of Maryland as well as Dela-

ware. It offers service on all Montgomery Ward appliances and on others as well.

Manager of the new facility is Edward Albertson who heads a local staff of twelve people including Mark Stayton, Rudy Lyles, Ruth Simpson, Janet Griffiths, Donna Messick, Ginger Rogers, Tom Heather, Henry C. Clendaniel, Peter Berntsen, Elmer Donovan, Will Irwin and Ralph Harmon. The service center is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

CHICK'S-Chick's has been in business in Harrington for about three years. Formerly located on East Street in "Mrs. Greenly's Warehouse", it has been a mail order business offering a full line of harness and horse supplies. Chick's mails out catalogues to 40,000 people twice each year.

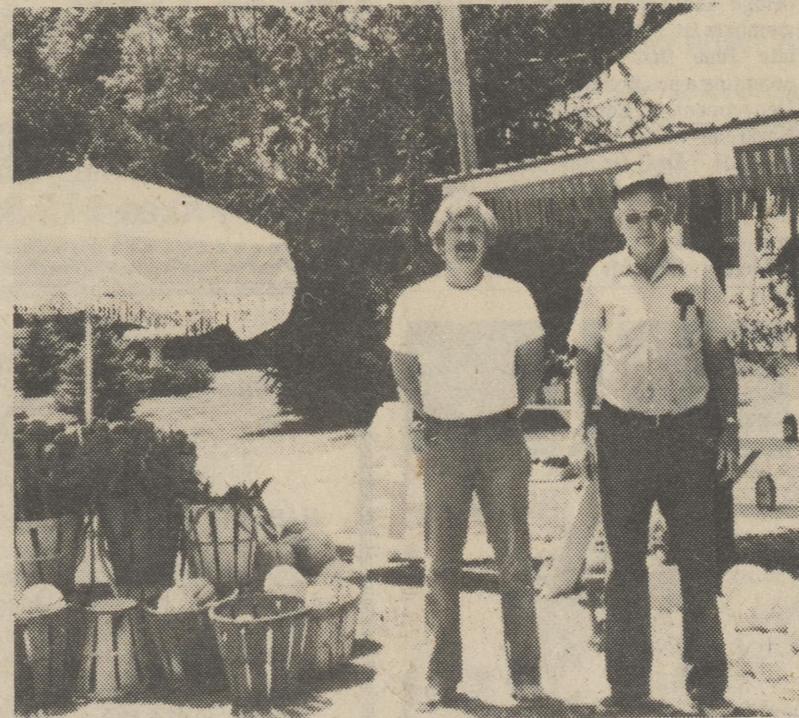
With the move in April to new quarters on U.S. 13 opposite the fairgrounds, the business which is owned by Frank Chick, added an extensive line of Western wear. In the fall, the firm expects to include a line of English riding apparel.

Delaware Diamonds

Thomas W. McIlvaine a native of Sussex County, in his lifetime allotted to each of his children lands and tenements which he owned. At the time of his death his heirs were his widow, Nancy. His sons; William S. McIlvaine, Henry W. McIlvaine and his wife Phebe, McIlroy McIlvaine and his wife Elizabeth, Thomas H. McIlvaine and his wife Hester J., Wixham McIlvaine and his wife Luaner. His daughters; Ann E. wife of Mark G. Chambers, Emily McIlvaine, and Mary J. wife of John S. Jester.

McIlroy McIlvaine's portion was conveyed to him by his father's deed dated 16 October 1847 and was described as "All that tract of land on which McIlroy McIlvaine now resides, lying in Murderkill Hundred, being part of two tracts of land which McIlroy McIlvaine purchased of Jeremiah Nixon and John Hunn, joining lands of John Chambers, Thomas James and others. Commencing at a stone in Dover Road and in the north side of the road where the Landing road crosses... to a stone by a cedar bush on north side of the road a corner for Chambers in

line of D. Jackson...to a stone on the south side of the head prong of Murther Creek in line of Carohne Manor...containing about 172 acres."

On 4 July 1839 Thomas W. McIlvaine of Indian River Hundred, Sussex County purchased from John Hunn of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania a tract of land then in the tenure of William Moore, situated in Murderkill Hundred adjoining lands of John Chambers and Joseph Alford and other lands of Thomas W. McIlvaine containing about 151 acres. It was the same tract of land assigned to John Hunn in the division of the real estate of his father Ezekiel Hunn, late of Camden in Kent County.

Thomas W. McIlvaine had already purchased 14 October 1834 from Jeremiah Nixon and Mary his wife, a tract of land and marsh in Murderkill Hundred beginning at the southeast corner of the wharf at Barker's landing on St. Jones Creek and running from there southwest along the middle of the road leading from the landing to Canterbury...to a stone corner of lands formerly of James Jackson, Joshua Longstreth and the heirs of Joseph

George deceased...to a stone corner of Joseph F. Rowland's land...to a pile of stones around a white oak stump near the head of Pidgeon Gut Branch...containing about 459 acres. This was part of the lands conveyed to Jeremiah Nixon and Mary his wife by four separate deeds.

produce that Bill Tribbitt checks out in the field before he purchases it. He brings to the business a number of years of experience as operations manager in Florida for a large food corporation with headquarters in Houston, Texas. In addition to checking the produce he buys on location, Tribbitt offers his customers the advantage of seeing every peach, potato, ear of corn or other produce item bagged at the time of purchase. That way, there is no question of inferior or rotten fruits or vegetables turning up at the bottom. If a bad item turns up in the bagging, Tribbitt replaces it with a good one.

The Country Market plans to stay open until after Thanksgiving offering fruits and vegetables in season. In addition the greenhouses will stay in operation through Christmas when poinsettias and flower arrangements will continue to be available.

The Tribbitts and the Gruwells intend to continue the retail operation of the greenhouses and to expand their wholesale operation. They also hope to upgrade and rebuild where possible and necessary.

With traffic at its heaviest along U.S. 13, this is a busy season for the Country Market. But in addition to the tourist trade, Bill and Tina Tribbitt hope to build a strong local business as a foundation. They envision a complete country market offering such items as homemade breads, jams and jellies as the business becomes established.

-Thirty Years Ago-
July 27, 1951

Royal Mist, owned by Franklin Hastings, of Berlin, Md. and driven by Bill Fleming, established a world's record for 2-year-old pacing fillies on a half-mile track Wednesday afternoon in a race here at the Kent & Sussex Fairgrounds. The filly set a mark of 2:05...This is the first world's record to be established here...Berty York, owned by J.M. Davis Clayton, and driven by Olin Davis, established a new track record for 3-year-old pacers Wednesday afternoon in 2:04.3.

The Rev. Robert E. Van Clear, pastor of Asbury Methodist Church, plans to attend the summer encampment of the Delaware National Guard which begins Sunday...This will be the third year that Mr. Van Clear will attend the encampment as chaplain of the 945th AAA AW Bn., which has batteries at Milford, Seaford, Laurel, Georgetown and Dagsboro.

The 32nd annual Kent & Sussex Fair got off to a good start this week with the attendance expected to better more than 120,000 before closing time Saturday night...The biggest crowds are expected today - Firemen's Day, when state fire companies will parade for \$900 in special prizes - and Saturday, Auto Race Day. For the second year, five of Delaware's high school bands are included on a special evening program. Each band has been assigned an evening to give a half-hour concert in front of the grandstand. The Harrington High School Band, Director Melvin L. Brobst, will give a performance Tuesday night.

W. S. Bradley, who lives near the site of Rice's Schoolhouse, no longer raises peaches. Once he had 18 acres of Belle of Georgias, Elbertas, Golden Jubilees, etc., but the frost killed the blossoms six years in a row, and the orchard got old and that settled that...he remembers when peaches were evaporated, or dried, in this section...He drilled 30 acres of yellow soybeans but can't remember the variety. However, he says they are doing good.

Ralph Tatman, Harrington, recently acquired a registered Holstein-Friesian bull from the herd of Archie Dill, Felton.

-Note under the heading "The Old Hoss Runs Again": Last week's Journal contained a poem written by Sam A. Short, Jr., of Harrington. The Old Race Hoss. Sam A. Long, Sr., of Steubenville, Ohio, is here attending the races. Impressed by the contrast in names, Mr. Long has written another "Old Hoss" poem. There follows the poetic tale of a bumblebee, a race that was won by a nose, and a winner who used his head. -Question - Was Sam A. Long, Sr. an alias?

In the Greenwood notes from The Harrington Journal, Feb. 4, 1916: The Silver Canning Co. are labeling cans and hope to get through this week. [Editorial note circa 1981: We do, too.]

-Twenty Years Ago-
July 28, 1961

At the reorganizational meeting of the Harrington Board of Education Thursday evening, July 22, Keith Burgess was elected president of the board for the 1961-62 school year. Mrs. Musetta Cox was elected vice president...At the reorganizational meeting of the Building Commission, Roland Hitchins was elected chairman and William W. Shaw, vice chairman.

A large crowd saw Afton Love win the 2-year-old pace at the stake races at the Kent & Sussex Fair here Wednesday afternoon...The pacer, driven by J. Wilcutts, won both heats in 2:08 and 2:07.1. Purse was \$10,773.50.

(At the Kent & Sussex Fair) Harrington High cross-country coach Harold MacDonald acted as starter and gave the "go" signal to 9 junior high lads in the 1 1/2 mile race. Bob Smith, at 13 the youngest boy in the race took the lead and held it for most of the first mile. Randy Jernigan, 14, of Elsmere, who is the junior high state champion in the half mile was the only runner close to Smith at this point. For the last half mile lap the two youngsters set a furious pace, and the issue was in doubt until the last few strides when the older youth finally hung on to win

by two scant seconds...Wayne Carson and Frank Cain finished strong only twenty seconds behind the leaders. The two Harringtonians put on an exciting dog fight coming down the homestretch with Carson getting the nod in a near photo finish.

William W. Shaw has been named general manager of the Kent and Sussex Racing Association for its 1961 fall meet.

The Chamber of Commerce, at a special meeting...in the First National Bank Building, voted to recommend that the City Council put the parking meters out of action for a trial period...of at least 18 months.

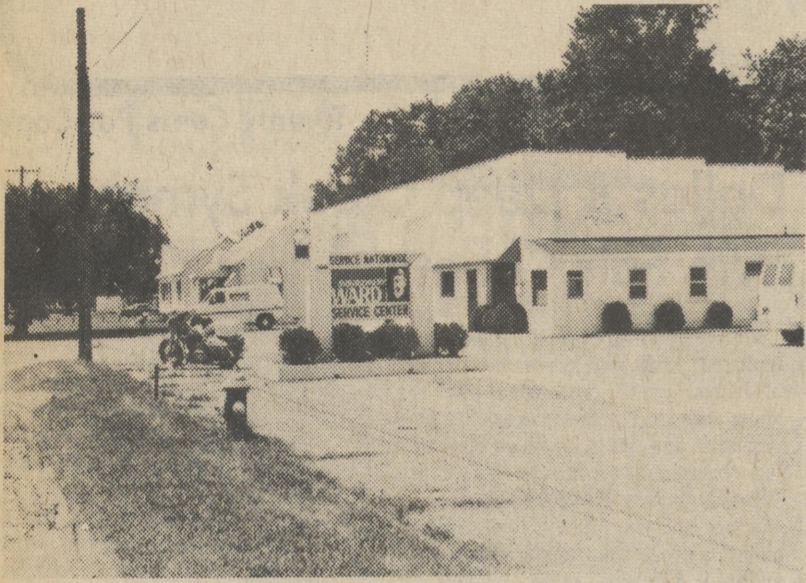
-Ten Years Ago-

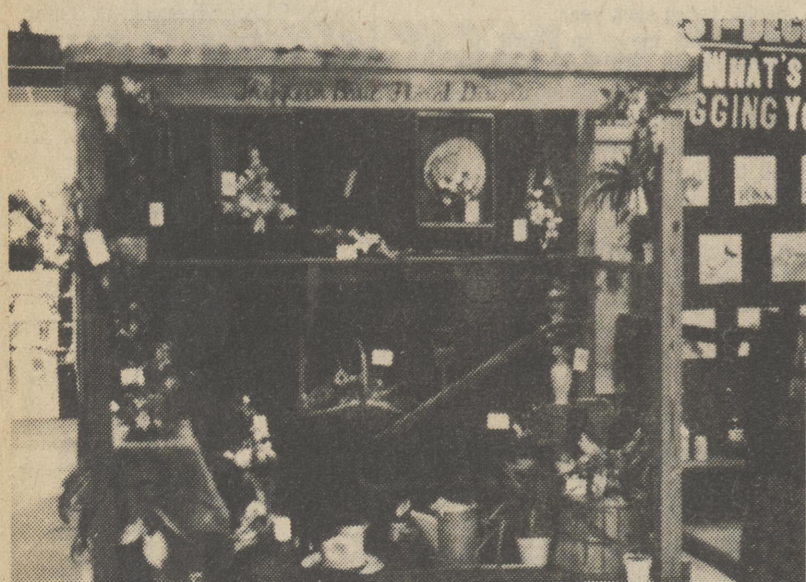

career counseling, but which can also help indicate interests that might mean compatibility or incompatibility for two people. The information obtained goes into a profile sheet which, along with a picture of the client becomes a part of a loose leaf album. Name and phone number or any information that might make it possible to contact the person without his consent are not included in the profile.

After this information is complete, the client is given a chance to look at the corresponding album for the opposite sex. If he finds someone whom he would like to meet, he can indicate that preference to the counselors.

The next step would be for the counselors to contact the person in whom their client has indicated an interest. That person would then be given the chance to review the profile sheet of the client who expressed the initial interest. He would also have the opportunity of asking questions of the counselors who have already met the people involved. At this point, and only if it is mutually agreeable, names and phone numbers are shared. Either

client might make the phone call. The process could stop with the phone conversation, or the two people could decide that they really would like to meet. How or whether the friendship develops is strictly up to them.

The service offers two ways of meeting people -- choosing or being chosen. A client can say, "I'd like to meet that person." But he may also be the person in whom another or others express an interest. The charge is \$20 for the initial interview and the first introduction which actually results in meeting another person. Each additional introduction requested by the client costs an additional \$10. But "being chosen" is for free.

There are some basic ground rules to which all parties agree. The first is that no one is ever forced to meet someone else. Clients agree not to try to contact anyone who has not indicated an interest in meeting them and not to pursue the introduction any further than is mutually agreeable. All information is confidential and no one other than the two counselors ever sees the albums containing the personal profiles.

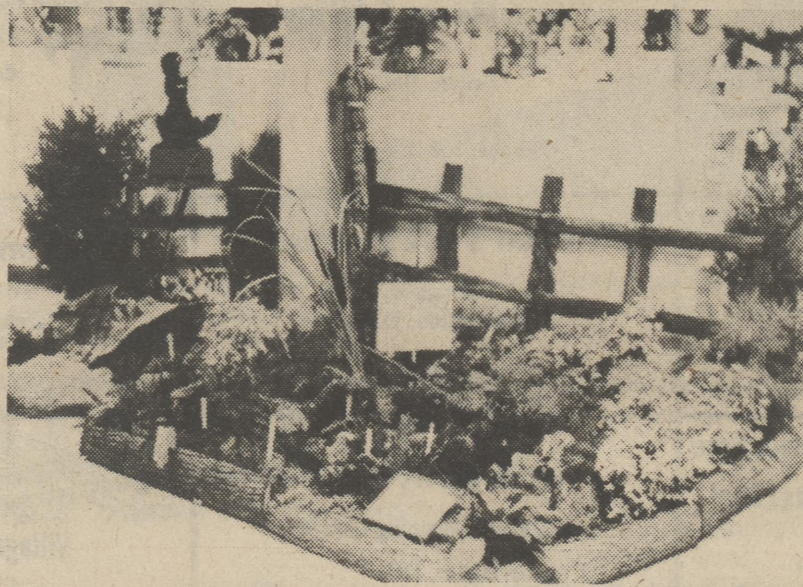

Gabfest

July is certainly a busy month. The hot sun bears down upon us and the humidity makes it hard to breathe, but nevertheless, summer is a glorious time. The flower gardens are full of day lilies, tiger lilies, and hydrangeas and daisies. And the vegetable gardens are overflowing with colorful and luscious food. But sometimes after a hot day like yesterday there comes a violent thunder storm (we called them "gusts" when I was small) and the trees bend with the terrific force of the winds and the rain slashes against the window panes in fury. But then, it brought the east wind and the cool refreshing air, and we count our blessings.

Now the job I dislike most in the summer is all over and done with. The pickled beets are safely stowed away in the jars. I do not like to do them. In the first place they take forever to cook. And they have to be scrubbed especially good, because I use the water in which they are cooked for the final mixture with the sugar and vinegar. This gives a better flavor to the beets and also a deep red color which never fades out. I made nine quarts and twelve pints this year and they all sealed. For once they did not boil over on the stove and onto the floor, which was a real bonus!

Now the big, fat red tomatoes are coming in by the basket. I canned five quarts already. I like to have a good supply and I much prefer my home canned ones to those in the store. When I make a big pot of soup on a cold winter's day, I usually use about three quarts. And then Dad's favorite is plain stewed tomatoes, and of course there are those tomato fritters. Spaghetti sauce I do not make any more. I like

the homemade kind fine, but at this age I am content to let Ragù or Chef Boy-ar-dee do it for me.

We had two exciting nature discoveries yesterday. Dad found a wee bird's nest in one of our big tomato vines. Isn't that the oddest place for a little bird to choose. The tiny nest has two eggs in it, very pale blue, but almost covered with brown spots. We have not yet seen the little mother. Could it be a Song Sparrow? They always seem to sit on low-growing weeds to sing their dainty little song.

Now, for our other exciting story. Night before last, Dad was digging potatoes and he saw something move a bit under the fork. He thought perhaps it was a mole tunneling near the surface. However, on a closer look, he discovered it was a nest of baby bunnies. He tried to pull the grasses and stuff over them like the mother had it but of course it was not the same. True to the ways of the wild life, she did not come back to them. So we had to come to the rescue. Ellen scooped it all up in a box. We sent Teddy on his bike to the vets to get some of the formula for baby wild life and we are, or rather Ellen is, feeding them with a tiny bottle. There are five, just getting their eyes opened. But the book tells us that in about two weeks they will be able to make it in the clover patch. Meanwhile we are anxiously caring for them until they are able to join their many little cousins in our back yard.

When Dad waters his garden, five or six little ones will come out and play in the water and drink it. It is a lovely sight.

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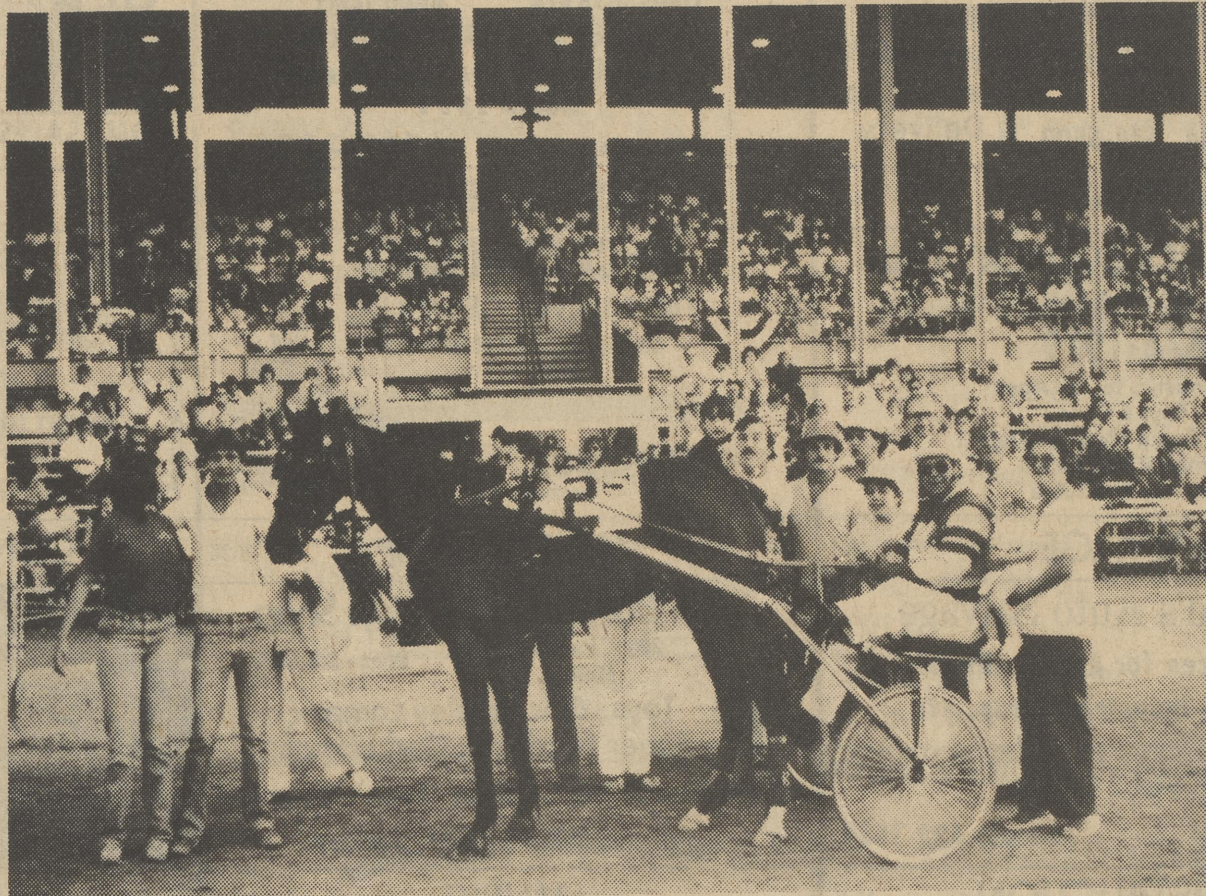

Brandywine Record Makers

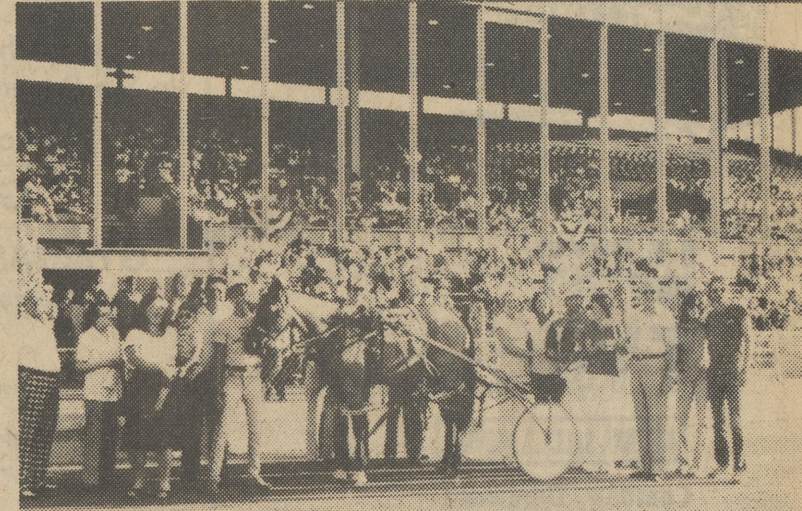

Salem's Leigh won the 2nd division of the 2-yr. old Filly Pace Thursday night at the Fair. Photo by H.G.F.

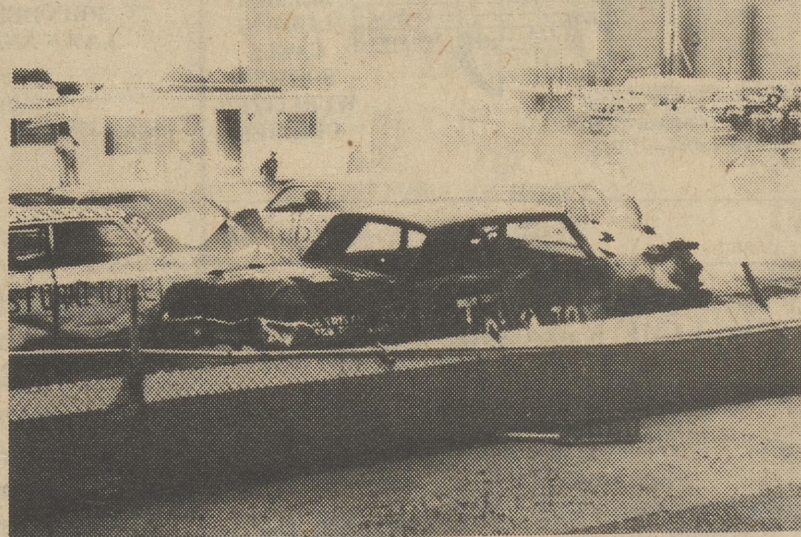

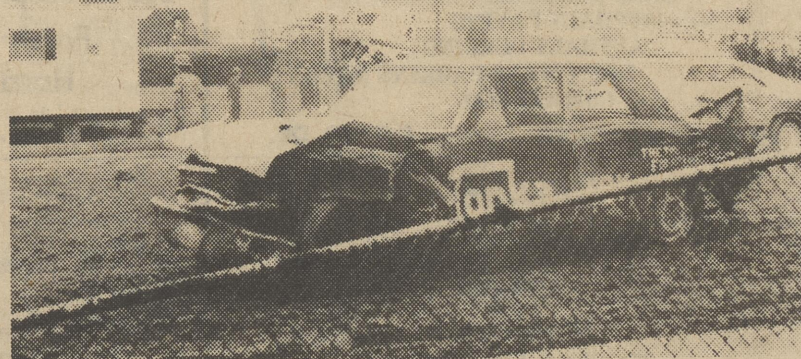

Are you an artist? Have you ever painted any wildlife art? Or, if not, are you willing to give it a try? If so, the Division of Fish and Wildlife of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control would like to see your effort of a Salmo Gairdneri, a Salmo trutta or even a Salvelinus fontinalis.

Wait a minute - don't panic. Those fancy names are nothing more than the scientific designation for three of the species of trout commonly stocked in the state of Delaware: the rainbow, brown and eastern brook trouts.

As to why the Division is looking for pieces of trout art, well, it's time for this year's Delaware Trout Stamp Art Contest. The deadline for submitting entries to this annual Contest is August 31.

A trout stamp is required for all licensed anglers fishing the seven designated trout streams during the spring season. But the stamps have also become quite popular with both philatelists and collectors of fishing memorabilia.

For those of a different musical persuasion, the Australian group "Air Supply" will appear Friday evening.

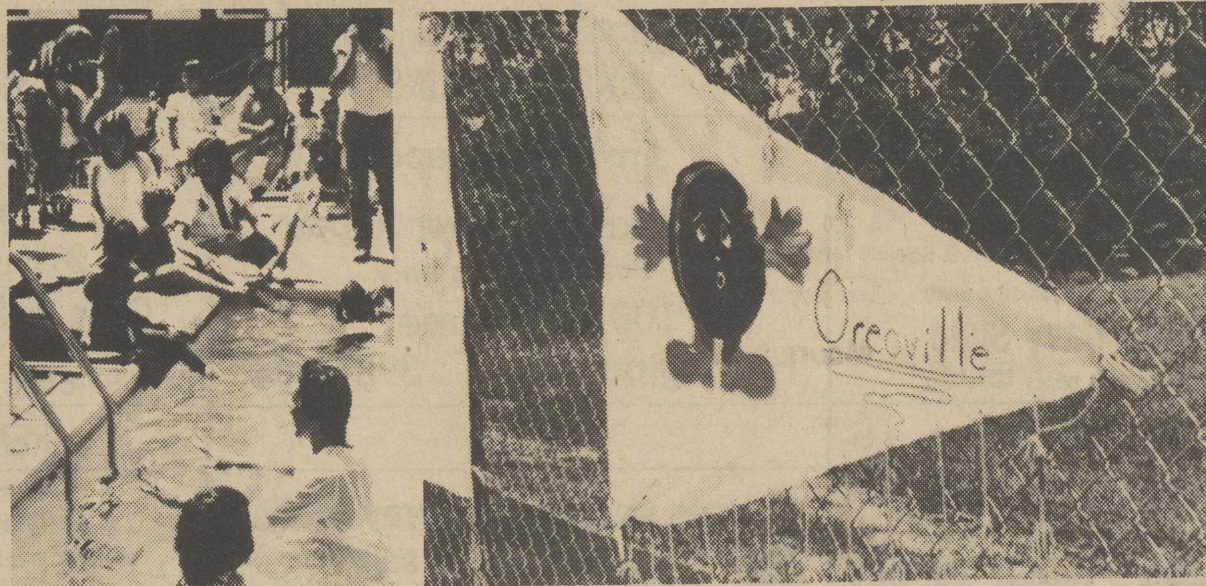
Locals in "Stampede"

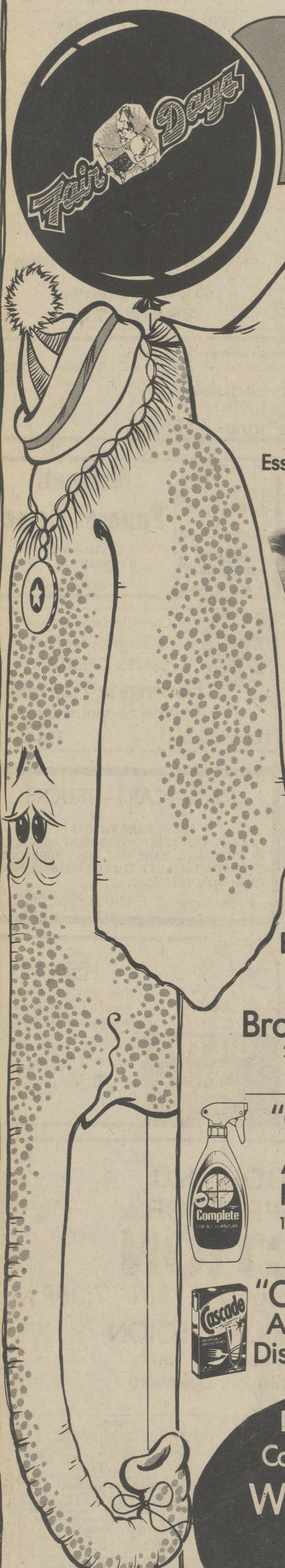

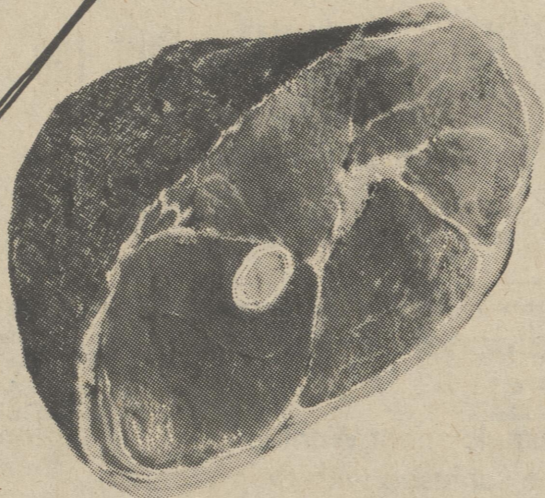
