Negotiations between the Lake Forest Board of Education and the Lake Forest Education Association, which represents the district's teachers, are quietly continuing this month. The teachers' current contract expired June 30, but it was extended until the end of July. With that date rapidly approaching, L.F.E.A. President Ed Gabrielson (who was contacted Monday night) forsaw the probability of the teachers asking for another extension as talks go on.

Lake Forest Board President James Gussett said the board would have to vote to grant such an extension.



McIlroy McIlvaine's portion was conveyed to him by his father's deed dated 16 October 1847 and was described as "All that tract of land on which McIlroy McIlvaine now resides, lying in Murderkilm Hundred, being part of two tracts of land which Thomas W. McIlvaine purchased of Jeremiah Nixon and John Hunn, joining lands of John Chambers, Thomas James and others. Commencing at a stone in Dover Road and in the north side of the road where the Landing road crosses... to a stone by a cedar bush on north side of the road a corner for Chambers in Longstreth and the heirs of Joseph

Thomas W. McIlvaine a native of line of D. Jackson...to a stone on the south side of the head prong of Murther Creek in line of Caroone Manor...containing about 172 acres." On 4 July 1839 Thomas W. McIlvaine of Indian River Hundred, Sussex County purchased from John Hunn of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania a tract of land then in the tenure of William Moore, situated in Murderkill Hundred adjoining lands of John Chambers and Joseph Alford and other lands of Thomas W. McIlvaine containing about 151 acres. It was the same tract of land assigned to John Hunn in the division of the real estate of his father Ezekiel Hunn, late of Camden in Kent County. Thomas W. McIlvaine had already purchased 14 October 1834 from Jeremiah Nixon and Mary his wife, a tract of land and marsh in Murtherkill Hundred beginning at the southeast corner of the wharf at Barker's landing on St. Jones Creek and running from there southwest along the middle of the road leading from the landing to Canterbury...to a stone corner of lands formerly of James Jackson, Joshua

He brings to the business a number of years of experience as operations manager in Florida for a large food corporation with headquarters in Houston, Texas. In addition to checking the produce he buys on location, Tribbett offers his customers the advantage of seeing every peach, potato, ear of corn or other produce item bagged at the time of purchase. That way, there is no question of inferior or rotten fruits or vegetables turning up at the bottom. If a bad item turns up in the bagging, Tribbitt replaces it with a good one.. The Country Market plans to stay open until after Thanksgiving offering fruits and vegetables in season. In addition the greenhouses will stay in operation through Christmas when poinsettas and flower arrangements

will continue to be available. The Tribbitts and the Gruwells intend to continue the retail operation of the greenhouses and to expand their wholesale operation. They also hope to upgrade and rebuild where possible and necessary.

With traffic at its heaviest along U.S. 13, this is a busy season for the Country Market. 

If an individual finds the first distasteful and if he is not a joiner, the possibilities may seem slim. It can be a difficult and lonely situation.

The Hannahs say they derive a deep sense of personal satisfaction out of helping their clients take the risk of meeting new people. In the few months since launching their new venture, they have developed about 160 clients. Surprisingly enough, these are equally divided between men and women, and they represent age ranges from around 20 to 78. They are secretaries, teachers, government employees, police officers, retirees - a wide range of occupations and personalities.

Both Hannahs recently received degrees in the Master of Counseling program at the University of Delaware. Before that Mo Hannah completed undergraduate work in psychology at the University of Arizona and Will completed his undergraduate program in theatre at Florida State College. Their experience includes serving as live-in teaching counselors at a residence for children with social and emotional problems. For both the experience served as a very intensive introduction to counseling.

In recent years, they returned to Delaware, where Mo Hannah grew up, to participate in the Master of Counseling Program at the University. After coming here they joined the professional service where Mo's father is also a counselor.

Will Hannah says that drama and psychology are not as far apart as they might seem. Motivational insights are vital to both. His business is professional counseling, but in it he has not abandoned the knowledge and experience he gained through his undergraduate concentration in theater. And he has not completely given up all interest in drama. Each year for the past three years, and hopefully for a fourth to come in 1982, the Hannahs travel to Tucson, Arizona where Will plays the role of Christ in an annual passion play that portrays the life of Jesus through the eyes of Simon Peter. Will says the role demands seeing the world through the eyes of someone totally motivated by love. And that, perhaps is not totally removed from the service the Hannahs hope to provide and the satisfaction they derive from their joint venture, "Professional Introductions".


### Friends Assist Space Creature





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
