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15th Jaycee parade a success

The flood came, but the rain didn't

Just over a week ago, Harrington Jaycee Parade Chairman Bruce Hickman was worried. There were only 40 entries, and it looked as though the 15th annual Christmas event would be one of the smallest ever. But then Hickman's phone started ringing...and ringing...and ringing as a flood of late entries swelled the ranks to over a hundred separate units.

On Saturday morning, Hickman was worried again. At 7:45 a.m., skies were threatening, and he had until 8 to decide whether it was "Go" or "No Go". Then the sun came shining through, and the parade was on. By parade time, those skies were threatening

again, and even shaking down a few warning drops. But the weather held off as the parade proceeded.

Terming the event a success, Hickman gave credit to the whole community of Harrington for a "100% effort". He said there was nothing he asked for in the way of assistance that he did not get. Pressed to name names, he mentioned his co-chairman Bruce Stewart, the City Council, Walt Messick of Taylor and Messick, Leroy Calhoun of L. & D. Electronics, Raymond Brown, all the Jaycees and Jayceettes...the list, he said, could go on and on as almost everyone gave support.

When it was put together the parade offered a variety of floats, marching units, vehicles and 8 marching bands including Lake Forest's Spartan Marching Band; the W.T. Chipman Junior Band; the North Carolina High School Band from Caroline County, Maryland; the Milford High School Band; the Milford Middle School Band; the Woodbridge Junior High School Band; the Dover Central Middle School Band and a band from Citizen's Hose Company in Smyrna.

Trash disposal costs going up

Getting rid of trash in the "throw-away" society is getting more expensive all the time. Ask any Kent County resident.

Citizens of area communities which provide collection service have faced escalating costs since the Delaware Solid Waste Authority took over what was formerly a county operation. At that juncture the cost of trash disposal at the Sandtown landfill site went from \$7.50 per load to \$12.50 per ton. That caused communities providing trash service to unstable fees if they did not have them and others to hike their charges.

Now those County residents face another cost increase as the Delaware Solid Waste Authority voted last Thursday night to raise the Sandtown rates to \$14.50 per ton July 1, 1982; \$16. per ton July 1, 1983, and \$16.50 per ton July 1, 1985.

Mann defends City's budget decisions

HARRINGTON, CAVALLO'S RESTAURANT - Last Wednesday night in an address before the Harrington Chamber of Commerce, Harrington Mayor Alfred G.B. Mann came out swinging and presented a well-researched and awesome presentation on the state of the Town of Harrington.

Using charts and a base year of 1976, he was able to show what the Town government was making and spending in every department of the Town. In some cases in past years "...the balance sheet reflects budget spending. In 1976 and 1977, the Town received \$31,500 for street improvements...but none was done. In 1980 and 1981, revenues were up 41% but expenses were also up 39%." From the Mayor's address, it would appear that a great percentage of the revenues came from traffic fines.

Mayor explains new rates

In an address to the Harrington Chamber of Commerce last Wednesday night, Mayor Alfred Mann pointed out that part of the 36% increase to the trash collection department was due largely to setting aside \$10,000 for trash truck replacement.

Currently the present trash truck was purchased following the breakdown of the old truck. "Trash trucks take a lot of abuse...and they don't last long. When the old one went, we were hard-pressed to come up with another one. We located a second hand one... and I think we made a good buy! But...we were lucky this time. We need some insurance in the future," said the Mayor.

With the water department, there is a proposed 38% increase in the rates. It was explained that the increase was necessary in order to first bring the

In Frederica

Hydrants pose problems

Three fire hydrants, two of them accident casualties, have left the Frederica Council in a financial quandary. It seems all three will have to be replaced to the tune of \$7,500 (\$2,500 each). The

Council does not have that kind of money lying around unused.

At their regular meeting Wednesday night, Council members decided to get a second opinion on the three hydrants before scheduling a special meeting later in the month to address the problem. Meanwhile, Mayor Dan Griffith asked them to be thinking of ways and means to finance the replacements.

One of the hydrants was a casualty of the trash truck on collection day. Insurance will provide about \$600 for repairs. But apparently, the hydrant cannot be repaired; it must be replaced. According to the firm contacted by the Council, the same thing is true of another hydrant, this one on the corner of Market Street and St. Agnes, which was broken off by a vehicle which did not stop to report the damage. The diagnosis - repairs would be more expensive than replacement. A third hydrant, located on David Street, is leaking, and the verdict is the same.

One possible source of funds is the \$25,000 the town has stashed away in long term certificates of deposit. This was originally put aside for some emergency with the water system. But a major development such as the need to

replace the water tower or a pump had been envisioned.

The Council Monday night discussed the possibility of withdrawing those funds, paying any penalty and re-depositing them in shorter term certificates of deposit bearing a higher rate of interest than the 7.5% now being realized. Whether some of that money could be applied to the hydrant situation was not decided.

-New Council Member-

Serving on the Frederica Council now is a new member, Tom Wilmire, who has taken an active interest in the town since he and his family have been residents. Wilmire was appointed to the Council to serve the term of former Mayor Ezekiel Dill who resigned earlier this year.

In other business the Frederica Council:

-discussed the purchase of a chlorinator tester for the water system. The town is now using one on loan from the state health department. But there are funds remaining in the H.U.D. account for the purchase.

-said it would follow up on an earlier motion to get Delmarva Power and Light to replace the 175 watt bulbs in the town's 35 street lights with 100 watt ones.

-discussed street signs that need replacing and preparations for winter weather including snow removal and sanding icy intersections.

Felton will sell old police car

In a brief business session presided over by Councilman Don Jacobs in the absence of Mayor William Myers Monday night, the Felton Council decided to sell the town's old police car. The cost of repairs and maintenance, they found, would probably exceed the value of any use the town might get out of it. Patrolman Ronald Fortin, still holding the fort for Police Chief Mike Olliver (who has been out on disability since he was injured in a scuffle in the process of making an arrest) was asked to begin stripping the car to make it ready for sale.

Fortin was also asked to begin a program of regular maintenance for the new police car. Gas mileage has slipped on that vehicle, and Fortin revealed it had not been in for regular servicing since it was purchased. It has about 13,000 miles on it.

-School to Get Street Light-

When the Felton Council held a referendum to annex the property on which Lake Forest North Elementary School stands, it promised two things: 1) police protection and 2) a street light near the school.

It had been and continues to provide police protection. But the street light is not yet in position. Don Jacobs reported that he had been in contact with Delmarva Power and Light, and had learned that the proper place to put the light would be on the pole across the street from the main entrance to the school. There was some concern that this might be outside the town limits. But Jacobs said the property annexed included the state right of way on both sides of Delaware 12 that is also Main Street in Felton and that passes the front of the school.

The farm contained 80 acres more or less with 45 acres wooded and 35 acres clear. The highest bidders for the farm were Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Stayton. The price was \$90,000.00.

Driver in training for life

When Eddie Nickle is driving, he doesn't display one of those signs that says "Caution - Student Driver." He's not taking a high school driver education course. But he is definitely in training for what he sees as his life work - caring for and driving harness horses. And in preparation for that lifetime, he recently passed two milestones - taking a sixth place in national junior driving championships at Northville Downs, Michigan and getting his provisional license as a harness driver from the United States Trotting Association.

Eddie won the right to go to Northville Downs by winning a preliminary race at Freestate Raceway in Laurel, Md. during the summer. In that race which featured \$2,500 to \$3,000 claimers, he took the pacer "Hasty Yankee" to a 2:05 finish.

At Northville Downs on Nov. 9, the junior drivers in competition were provided horses (all \$10,000 claimers) and the racing gear for the race. Nickle says he got away 11th (in a field of 11) from the 7-hole and had a chance to see the whole field in action before passing five horses to finish 6th with "Bow Relucto". The winner of that race went in 2:04.3.

The junior driving championship competition came none too soon for 19-year-old Nickle. He has since gotten his U.S.T.A. preliminary license and can no longer be considered a junior driver.

The preparation for that second accomplishment took a lot longer and will probably be a lot more important

to the careers of a young man who sees harness horses in his future.

First step in that process was getting a qualifying license. That required making application to the U.S.T.A., getting five licensed drivers to recommend him and passing a written test on the rules.

The qualifying license allowed him to drive in qualifying races only. To go the next mile - getting the provisional license - he had to record 12 good drives. Eddie said that took more than 12 races as he had some trouble with horses that broke stride. But he made it. Now he's qualified to drive at almost any track.

In the licensing procedure, he has one last hurdle to conquer - getting his "A" license from the U.S.T.A. That will require posting 20 good drives.

Home base for Nickle is the stable belonging to his aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Roman Miller, near Harrington. Miller owns, trains and drives horses. For about the past four years, he has had the help of his nephew. The Millers in turn have given a lot of love and have supplied the opportunity for Eddie to be near the horses he loves.

In a freak occurrence a few years back, one of those horses nearly cost Eddie his life. But his aunt was close by and came to the rescue. Eddie was swimming a horse at a pool in Maryland when the lead rope got tangled around his wrist and he was pulled beneath the surface of the

Delaware Diamonds

These building lots were part of the original farm consisting of about 237 acres which had been in the Dorman family for three generations. George Dorman had purchased the farm on which he was already living in 1812. He died intestate in the month of September 1815 leaving to survive him a widow, Elizabeth, and four children: Thomas Dorman, Solomon Dorman, David Dorman and Elizabeth Dorman. His daughter Elizabeth later married Josiah Wolcott. After the widows dower was assigned the balance of the farm was purchased by Thomas, the eldest son. Thomas Dorman died intestate in 1843 leaving no child, only his widow, Mary, who later married Richard H. Meriken. Joseph Booth was a tenant on the farm in 1847 when the heirs petitioned the Orphans Court for settlement of the estate. The widows dower was assigned and the balance of the land was to be divided between his sister, Elizabeth Dorman Wolcott, and his nephews and nieces, the children of his deceased brother, Solomon Dorman: George W. Dorman, James R. Dorman and Thomas H. Dorman, and the children of his deceased brother, David Dorman: Martha Dorman, Mary Dorman, Solomon Dorman and Jane Dorman. The farm was said to contain about 200 acres and was adjoining lands of Benjamin Harrington, William Shaw, Hasty Cain and others. Solomon's son George W. Dorman purchased most of the farm which at the time of his death was said to contain about 140 acres.

George W. Dorman died 2 February 1864 but his estate was not settled until his daughter Mary Elizabeth who married Beniah Fleming reached majority 4 Oct. 1869. His widow Lydia had

married Edward Mileham and her dower lands included about nine acres of woodland intersected by the railroad which was also sold at the public auction held on 22 August 1903 and purchased by William B. Fleming. George Dorman (Sr.) had purchased the plantation in Mispillion Hundred adjoining lands of Matthew Clark, Benjamin Harrington and others, from Walter Douglas, a miller. Douglas had purchased the farm at a public sale held by the executors of the estate of Matthew Clark. Matthew Clark was a son and heir of Benjamin Clark who wrote his will in January of 1796. In this will he bequeathed to his wife "the dwelling plantation during her lifetime"; to his son Thomas Clark "track where he lives called Song Choice" and in the boundary lines he mentions the mill pond and the mill dam; to his son Matthew Clark "small tract called the Folly where his dwelling house now stands...lately surveyed and patented under an old warrant granted unto Thomas Clark Esq. deceased...and after death of my wife I give to Matthew Clark my present dwelling plantation called Seppleington". To his daughter Sarah Harrington, wife of John Harrington "the residue of the tract called Folly whereon the said John Harrington now dwells containing about 121 acres and also a new tract of land lately surveyed and patented under a warrant in the Present Land Office called the Over Plush".

Mann last Wednesday night before a meeting of the Harrington Chamber of Commerce, I can conclude that they missed a very informative state of the Town message. The address was a very well prepared and informative one. The address was given in defense of the raising of taxes, trash, water and sewer rates...but raising them so abruptly.

Even though the presentation to the Chamber left no alternatives for the citizens of this community, the people should have been prepared for the shock. Following the recent presentation, there was no doubt in the minds of the beholders that Mayor Mann knows what he is doing. If the Council had elected to do that earlier, the community...I feel...would have backed City Hall completely.

A couple of years ago we wanted to paint the water tower. It was to cost \$15,000. I thought it was a good time to test the procedure used by the community to the south of us. Nothing came of it however...and for about \$5.00 a head special tax we could have done it.

Where are we headed in this community...once a thriving business community? There are about 19 different ways to skin a cat. The door is never shut completely on you. There are always options. And the ones who explore and find these options not only will survive...but will get in second gear and pass the pack. For the newcomers on the "...council..." the Mayor and Ray Gagne who I am sure played a great part in preparing the presentation on Wednesday night, we have two extremely competent people sitting at the Council table. If they can come up with a presentation such as that last Wednesday night...I know they can come up with a presentation for the people of this community which will enable this community to be able to return to the days of old when it was a thriving business community.

There is nothing you can ask of this community that the citizens won't respond to. Historically they have always been industrious and thrifty. All is asked is to work with them...restore their pride that was once theirs. Where are those outside this community who continue to use Harrington as the butt of their jokes...and some go to great lengths to accomplish this feat. *But the community keeps marching on...* and I think the community would do more if invited.

Simple as it is, each ingredient is vital, so make sure you have all the things you need on hand. It goes well with any dinner and is a nice change on your buffet table. The flavor is definitely Italian, the taste absolutely delicious. Try it this holiday season and you'll be glad you did.

"ITALIAN POTATO SALAD"

- 6 baked potatoes
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon dried hot red pepper.
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1 clove garlic
- oliveoil

1. Bake potatoes in their skins any time you have your oven on. Peel and

refrigerate till ready for use. When you are ready to add dressing, cut in cubes about one inch square.

DRESSING

1. Using a pestle and mortar, grind garlic and salt.
2. Add parsley and work into a paste.
3. Add all other dry ingredients and blend in.
4. Add enough oil to loosen ingredients and scrape all around bowl to gather them together.
5. Add to cut up potatoes, scraping bowl well, using finger if necessary so as not to leave behind any seasonings.
6. Add enough oil to coat all potatoes until they glisten. Turn well so all potatoes are coated trying not to break them.
7. Refrigerate covered one day. Serve at room temperature turning several times to distribute seasonings.




New Wave swimmers tune up for Ocean Pines



Trash fees to escalate

A rate hearing will be held on January 6 at 6:30 p.m. in the Central Conference Room at the Highway Administration Building in Dover. At that time, the public will be invited to comment.

The news for Kent Countians who live in rural unincorporated areas of the state is no better. When the state took over trash disposal services, collection sites at Vernon, Barkers Landing and Kenton began charging for a service that formerly was free. Residents responded by making fewer trips. Now the state is not getting enough money to keep those collection stations in operation. The Vernon site closed December 1, and the Solid Waste Authority has voted 5-1 to shut down the two remaining - Barkers Landing and Kenton - on January 31.

Kent County residents living outside city limits will now have to drive to Sandtown to dispose of their trash. Another option would be to pay a private firm to do it, probably an impractical choice for isolated rural families. Those who live in developed areas might also choose to petition Kent County Levy Court for the formation of a trash district so that the county could deal with private contractors who would bid to provide the services.

Here is something special for the children at Christmas. If you decide to use the recipe for gingerbread men, you can count on a yield of 1 dozen men. If you want to speed things up and make round cookies, you will be able to count on 3 1/2 dozen.

"GINGERBREAD MEN"

2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/3 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ginger

Sift above ingredients together and set aside.

Heat 1/2 cup butter and 1/2 cup molasses in a large saucepan over low heat till butter melts. Add the sifted dry ingredients and 2 tablespoons hot tap water. Stir till blended. Chill completely. Meanwhile prepare "Apple Butter Filling".

"Apple Butter Filling"

Cook 3/4 cup apple butter, 1/3 cup chopped dates and 1/3 cup sugar in small saucepan for 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Blend in 1 tablespoon butter and cool.

Back to the "Gingerbread Men": Knead chilled dough into a ball on lightly floured board. Roll out to 1/8 inch thickness.

Cut dough with cookie cutter and place men on ungreased baking sheet.

Spread about 2 teaspoons filling over heads and bodies keeping filling toward center and away from edges. Top with another man (no need to seal edges.) and decorate with raisins to mark features and buttons. Stretch the arms and legs into curved position and the men will look like they are dancing or running.

Bake at 400 degrees 8-10 minutes. For plain cookies 5 minutes. After 5 minutes remove to a wire rack to completely cool.

Something I always associate with holidays, special occasions and fun times is "Zepole".

You might call them an Italian donut, but they really are far more special.

Preparation is very easy, and can be done hours ahead. They must be eaten hot so there is last minute work to be done with frying. This too can be fun because the family loves to stand around the stove and watch the "Zepole" turn themselves in the fat. Deep frying is an absolute must.

"ZEPOLE"

4 eggs, slightly beaten
1 lb. Ricotta
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups flour
8 tablespoons sugar
5 teaspoons baking powder

1. Some time during the day, mix beaten eggs, Ricotta, sugar and vanilla.

2. Add dry ingredients, mix all together well, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate till ready to use.

Select a heavy 3 1/2-4 quart pot suitable for deep frying, or a regular deep fryer and melt solid shortening to fill pot about 1/3. Bring temperature to about 380 degrees. Drop Zepole by rounded teaspoon fulls into hot fat. Do not try to fry too many at a time since they will need room to turn themselves over. When nicely browned, remove with slotted spoon to absorbing paper. If a few Zepole refuse to turn themselves, you may have to encourage them. When all are fried, remove to platter and dust each layer heavily with powdered sugar. Serve at once.

"FERMENTED FRUIT STARTER"

3/4 cup drained canned peaches cut in pieces.

3/4 cup drained canned pineapple chunks

3/4 cup maraschino cherries, halved

1 1/2 cups sugar

1 package dry yeast

Combine ingredients in glass apothecary jar with loose cover. Stir several times the first day and once daily for two weeks using a wooden spoon. Keep in a cool place (not the refrigerator).

Now you are ready to proceed with your gift making "Friendship Fruit". You have had two weeks to find your jars, some Christmas ribbon to decorate them and trimmings to make your "Friendship Fruit" look extra Christmasy.

Place three cups "Fermented Fruit Starter" in a jar. Add one cup of fruit and one cup of sugar every two weeks until you have a total of six cups. At this point you must divide, use or give some to a friend. In any case, you now have 2 portions of 3 cups each. Perhaps you will want to start one new batch with one portion and make a gift of the other. You must remember that you may never work less than 3 or more than 6 cups.

Variety of fruit may be introduced now to make things more interesting. You may add canned, drained fruit cut small such as fruit cocktail, pineapple, peaches, pears, cherries, apricots, or mandarin oranges.

Always stir with a clean wooden spoon. Mixture will bubble and foam. Every two weeks you must add fruit and sugar.

Use as a topping for puddings, ice cream, pound cake, pies, or as a dessert by itself.

When giving as a gift, you must also give instructions on keeping it going. A small index card will be fine or you may opt to write instructions on your gift card. With good planning "Friendship Fruit" will be a good item for charity bazaars and bake sales.

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
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
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
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
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'Twas the Night Before Christmas



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

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
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The First Noël

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
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What Child Is This?



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
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
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"Twas the Night of God's Coming"
