

Troop 76 goes camping

Eight scouts and two leaders from Harrington Boy Scout Troop 76 braved winter temperatures for a camping stint at McColley's Pond this past weekend. The group has had several camping weekends, but for some this was the first experience at surviving in the cold.

Battered by Friday night's winds, the group pulled up tent stakes from the front site, selected and clustered their tents close to a pavillion which provided some protection from the wind chill factor. By Saturday afternoon, with a fire blazing on the pavillion's hearth, they were in cheerful spirits as they spent some free time searching for wood. Then in the dark hours between Saturday and Sunday, the thermometer dropped to 16 degrees, and it was a well chilled group that trooped into the Harrington Restaurant and Newsstand

Sunday morning. However, a hearty ham and eggs breakfast for which Charlie Pitts of Pitts Farms picked up the tab, soon warmed everyone up.

The troop has rounded up the money to purchase the tents used for their campouts. However, most other equipment is "catch-as-catch-can" and not everyone is able to furnish the warm sleeping bag that would make the winter campouts a little easier.

Undaunted by their chilly experience this past weekend, the "survivors" are planning a January or February outing to Jay, Maine. That will probably make December in Delaware look like the tropics.

The active group of over twenty scouts, led by Scoutmaster Wayne Melvin and Assistant David Johnson is concerned right now with finishing its

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Felton man dies in crash

At 11:22 p.m. Saturday night Earl L. Pierce, 66, of R.D. #3, Box 684F, Felton, was returning home with his wife Dorothy, 58, and daughter Nancy, 15. As Mr. Pierce slowed his 1969 Volkswagen Beetle in preparation to turn left into his driveway from county route 240, his car was struck in the rear by a 1973 Chevrolet Monte Carlo operated by Leon P. Carlisle, 20, of R.D. #1, Box 230A, Felton. After the initial collision, the Volkswagen continued 124 feet spinning clockwise before striking a mailbox. Twenty-three feet beyond the mailbox the left rear wheel dug into the ground causing the small car to become airborne for 35 feet. It landed on its right side, sliding 34 feet to a stop. Both Mr. Pierce and his daughter were ejected after the initial impact. The Chevrolet continued 174 feet spinning clockwise to a stop. Prior to the impact the Carlisle vehicle laid down 85 feet of skidmarks indicating high speed operation by Mr. Carlisle.

Earl Pierce was flown to the Kent General Hospital in Dover by a Delaware State Police helicopter. He

was pronounced dead on arrival at 12:20 a.m. of multiple injuries. Dorothy Pierce was removed from the wreckage by personnel of the Felton Fire Company, and transported to the same treatment facility by the Camden-Wyoming Fire Company ambulance. Her condition is stable with facial injuries and multiple contusions. Nancy Pierce was taken to the Kent General Hospital by the Felton Fire Company ambulance, and admitted in critical condition with a broken neck. Leon Carlisle refused medical treatment.

Due to evidence of intoxication by Mr. Carlisle he was charged by state police with vehicular homicide first degree upon the advice of the State's Attorney General's Office. He has been released on a secured bond of \$5,000.

Earl Pierce is Delaware's 108rd highway death for 1981; forty fewer than for December 13th of last year.

None of the four people involved was wearing a seat belt.

Dorothy Pierce was seated next to her husband, Nancy Pierce was asleep on the rear seat of the Volkswagen.

Block house closed

The Harrington block house has not disappeared from the side of the tracks. But today, it is a silent sentinel, almost a memorial to the more personal years of railroading. Yesterday was its final day of operations as Conrail converted the signals operated from the tower to an automatic interlocking system.

The news of the December 15 block house closing was reported to the Harrington City Council Monday night by member Gary Harrington who expressed the opinion that the city might experience increased problems with the automatic system. He said he was told the gates at the railroad crossings, once down, would remain closed for eight minutes unless they were manually operated, presumably by an engineer who would have to leave the train to perform the operation.

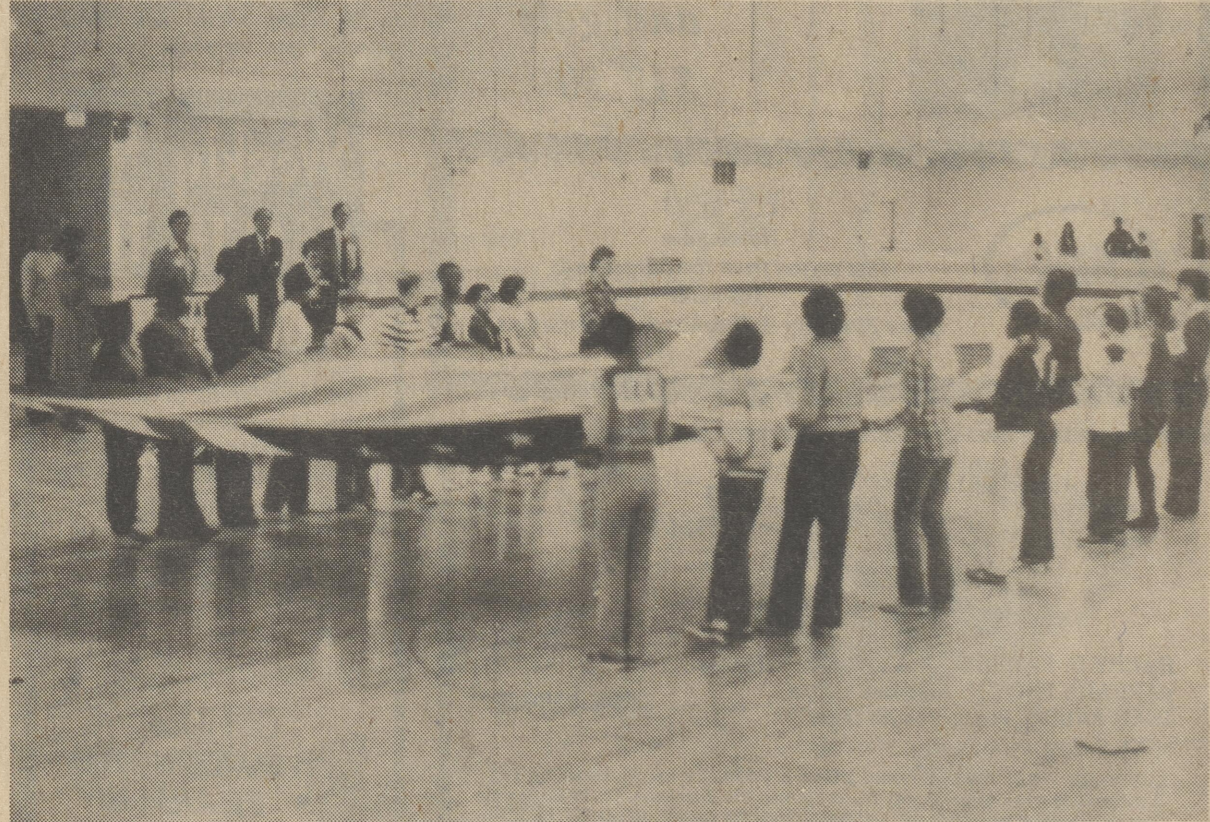
Harrington and others are concerned this will lead to problems with engineering vehicles needing to make immediate crossings. He also said the inconvenience of waiting for the eight minutes, regardless of whether there is

a train in view, would lead people to become more careless about crossing the tracks while the gates are down. This could spell disaster.

However, the Council does not feel that its concerns have made much of an impact on Conrail or that the railroad company has made any special effort to keep the Council abreast of the situation. Ray Gagne pointed out that Conrail's Vice President for Governmental Affairs, Al Arnett, in a visit here last March had promised to keep the Council informed. Obviously feeling that that promise had not been fully kept, Gagne said he first learned the decision to close the tower was final from *The Harrington Journal*. He said, "We've been lied to again, we will be lied to in the future, we ought to act on that basis."

Idling Engines Raise Ire
Meanwhile citizen complaints of railroad engines left idling in the center of town for hours on end, especially at night, prompted the Council to fire off a letter of complaint to various Conrail officials.

Auto thefts plague city

Harrington has been plagued with a rash of auto thefts over the past month. According to Police Chief Carl McLroy, eleven cars have been stolen over the past month. That number, he said, is higher than the normal total for a year.

McLroy said all of the cars had been left unlocked with keys in them. Of the eleven, only the last two had not been recovered. So far the person or persons responsible for the thefts has brought the stolen cars back, abandoning them in Harrington.

One of the cars not yet returned was

taken around 8:30 p.m. Saturday near Calvary Wesleyan Church on Delaware Avenue. The latest incident occurred on Monday.

The Police Chief told the Harrington City Council Monday night that the only vandalism so far involved has been the theft of a scanner from one. He also said license plates were being switched, and that police were having to check serial numbers.

Several of the cars were taken from the American Legion which is in state police territory because it is outside

Apartments approved, mobile park decision delayed

The Harrington City Council Monday night gave the green light to the construction of an apartment complex near Peck Avenue by Mark B. Carp and Company. However, it delayed any rezoning decision on rezoning property owned by Robert Passerin to permit construction of a mobile home park and a future shopping center on Delaware Rt. 14 across from Hollywood Cemetery.

The motion to approve rezoning the Peck Avenue property from IMP (Industrial) to R-4 (residential multi-family) was made by Council member Ray Gagne on the grounds of the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission and the public hearing on November 23, at which he said no opposition to the project was voiced.

The effective date of their appointments must be within 30 days of November 28, 1981. These appointments add to the increasing number of Postmasters named by the U.S. Postal Service under the non-political merit system established by the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970.

not mean that the apartments will be constructed. Mark B. Carp and Company is still waiting for the allocation of the FmHA funds to finance the project. And it is not certain that the complex proposed for Harrington will be one of those approved.

If the construction of the complex becomes a reality, the complex would consist of 40 one and two bedroom units. Although the apartments will all be on one level with a number equipped for the handicapped, there has been no assurance that their rental would be limited to senior citizens. According to the letter written to the City Council by the local Planning and Zoning Commission, the apartments would be for lower-middle income level families. That, former Mayor "Buck" Cahall was a significant change from the earlier Case Edwards proposal in which the idea of housing for the elderly was emphasized. Cahall's point was made after Monday night's Council meeting.

The Council's vote of approval was 5 in favor with one member, Harold Brode, abstaining.

Robert Passerin, by letter, had asked the city to delay any decision on the rezoning request he has made for his

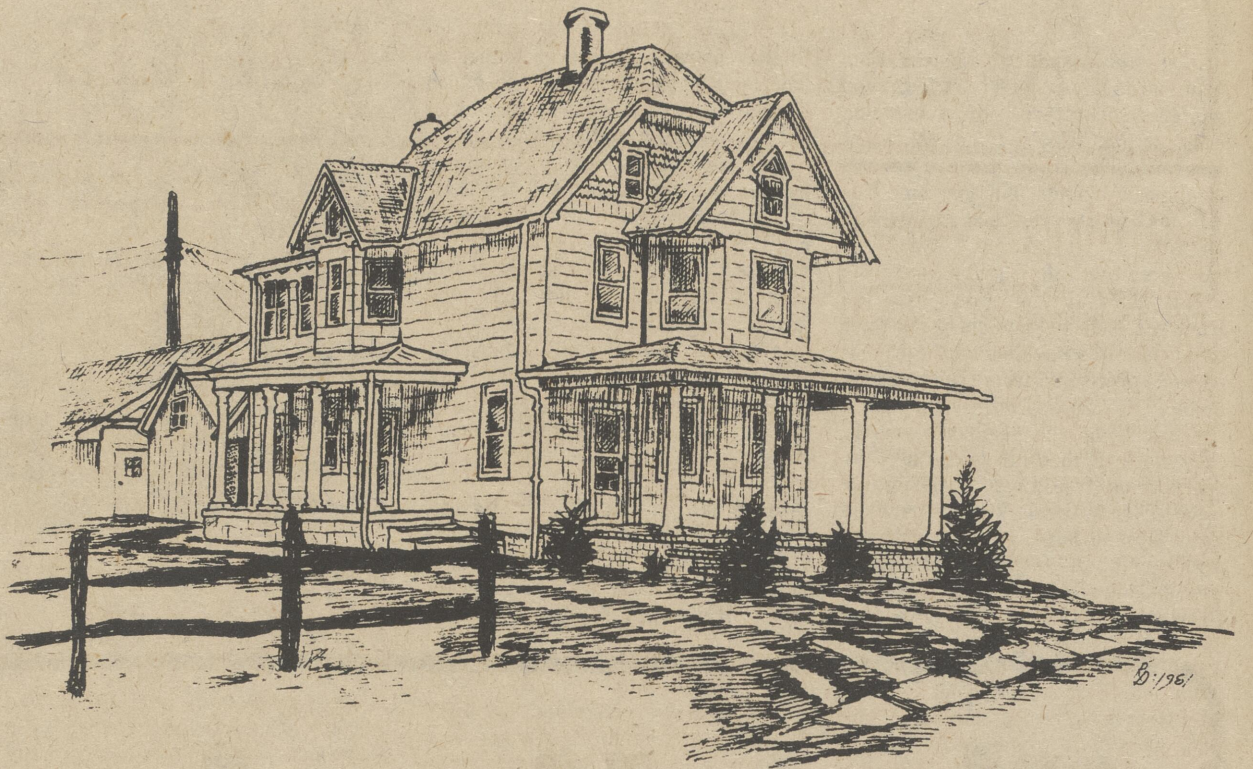

Matthew Clark's will was written in February 1804 in which he left his entire estate to his wife Mary Clark during her lifetime and after her death to descend to his two sons Zadoc Crapper Clark and Matthew Jarrett Clark. The Plantation containing about 500 acres and adjoining lands of Waitman Booth, James Finsthwait and others was to be divided "beginning... old stump standing near Sarah Harrington being a boundary of lands formerly property of Benjamin Clark deceased as well as a boundary of lands formerly the property of Archibald Curry and running from said stump to leave all the houses, the garden on the farm where Inow live, also to include seven large red oak trees which stands near my dwelling house...All lands to

west of the said dividing line to my son Zadoc Crapper Clark and his lawful issue except a tract of land called Lantern Ridge...To my son Matthew Jarrett Clark a tract of land called Lanterns Ridge...and all land eastward of said dividing line. Also to Matthew Jarrett Clark 54 acres of land being part of tract called Over Push. ...If either of sons die without issue his share to his brother...if both sons should die without issue all the estate unto Zadoc Crapper and Eliza Crapper children of Doctor John Crapper". He also gave "to my loving friend Thomas Stroud the tract of land that he lately lived on lying between the head of Brown Branch and Fork Branch suppose to contain 70 acres". Mary Clark renounced executorship

30 May 1804 and the court appointed James Finsthwait and Thomas Clark as administrators on 4 June 1804. In 1806 they appeared in Orphans Court to petition that the plantation be surveyed and laid off in small parcels to be sold for payment of debts and settlement of the estate. The land divided into five different sections was purchased as follows: No. 1 containing over 131 acres by Benjamin Harrington. No. 2 containing 10 acres by Benjamin Harrington. No. 3 containing 8 acres by Benjamin Harrington. No. 4 containing 163 acres to John Wheatley. No. 5 containing 237 acres to Walter Douglas. This last and largest part of the original farm owned by Matthew Clark is the land Douglas then sold to George Dorman.

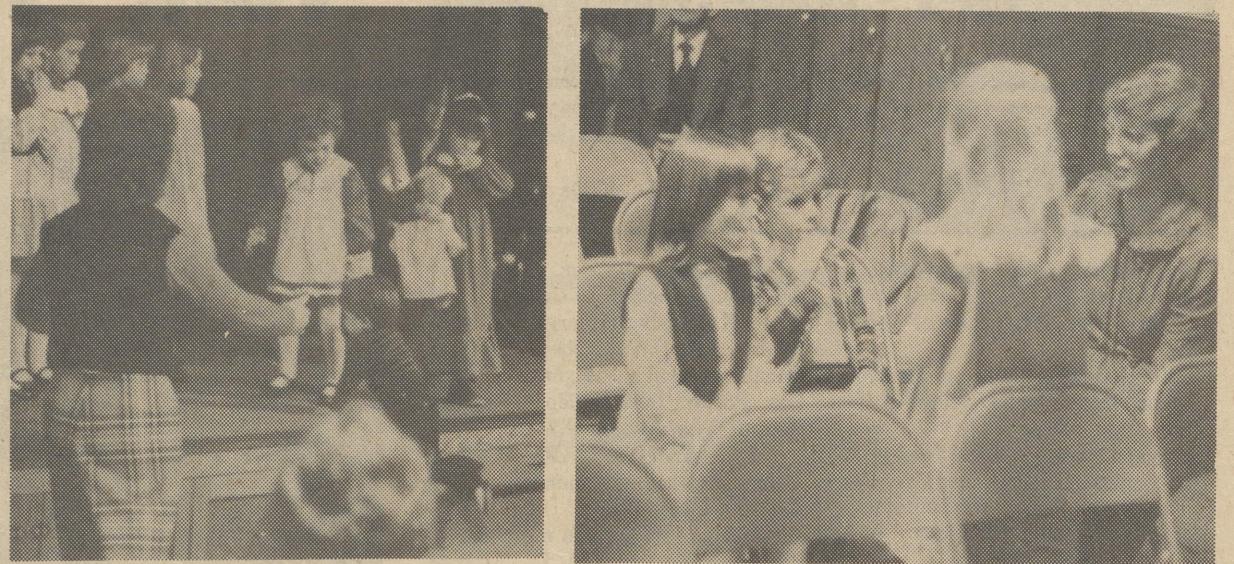

Gary Harrington, Council liaison with Conrail reported the reason the engines are left idling for hours was that it was more impractical in cold weather to turn them off and restart.

Leaving them in the center of town, he said, was a matter of convenience for the engineers. But Council felt the health and comfort of the citizens more important and said there was no way the city should have to accept the constant noise that in the words of one Council member, wore away at the nerves "like Chinese water torture". The engines could be left north or south of town where they would not be such a noise nuisance.

In other business the City Council:

-switched \$700 to appropriations from funds budgeted for heat so that the fire company could receive the same \$6000 it got last year and the Harrington Little League could get its \$100.

-approved an agreement between the city and the Kent County Conservation District with respect to the soil and erosion control program. The agreement lets the city pass on smaller building permits, but asks a review of the county body before any large projects are approved.

-approved the Mayor's signing of an agreement with the state concerning drainage work on West Street.

-passed resolutions accepting the Farmers Home Administrator's bid on the \$189,000 sewer bond at 5% to be paid in 40 years.

-set a workshop session this Thursday on a police policy to govern the local department and a separate policy addressing the use, by police, of deadly force.

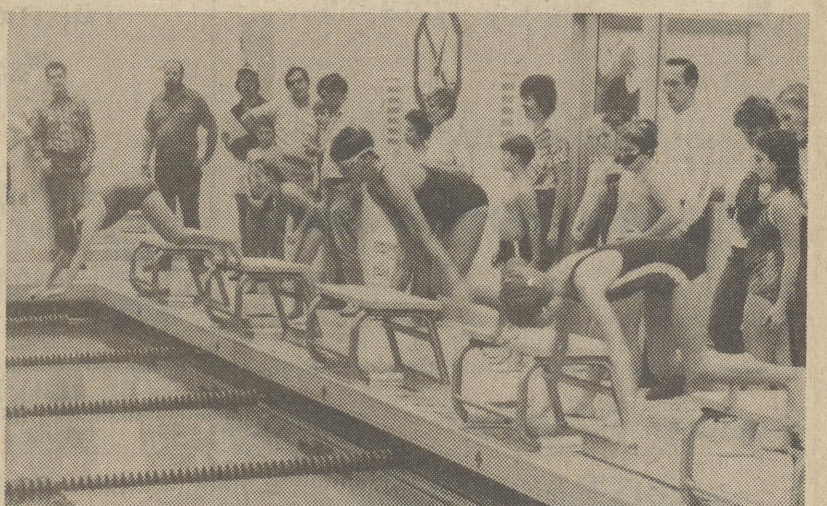
Gwenn Scott named

city limits. The rest were stolen in town.

The current rash of auto thefts echoes an earlier spree of a similar nature in which several cars were taken from in front of Quillen's Market on Dorman Street. All were later recovered, and two juveniles were arrested, one by the Harrington Police Department, the other by the state police.

The most recent thefts are still under investigation. Meanwhile, city police caution everyone to take their keys when they leave their cars, even for a few minutes.

The thefts, McLroy told the Harrington Council, helped boost the local police department's caseload of criminal investigation to around 100 hours for the month. There have also been a number of assaults (three first degree) and a large number of incidents involving worthless checks. Delaware 14 property until the January meeting. But the Council will probably delay longer than that.

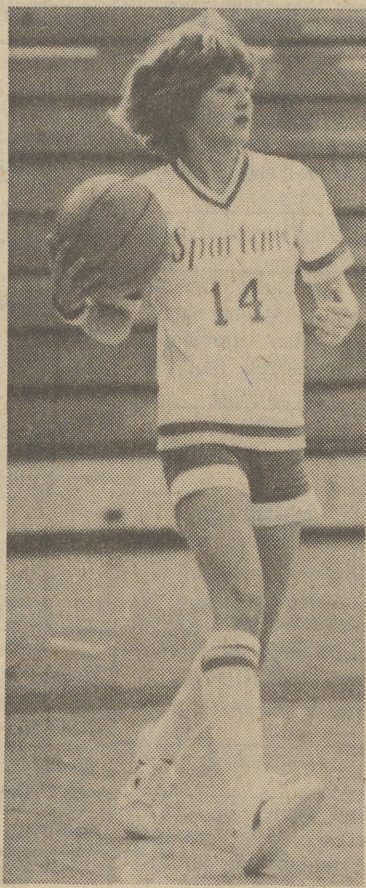
