1981 Remembered

Newscasters, newspapers and magazines are busy recapping the events of 1981 from worldwide, national and state vantage points. *The Harrington Journal* focuses on the local scene, especially in the area encompassed by the Lake Forest School District. As most years, 1981 was a mixed bag. Here are some of the events we remember. Our readers may recall others.

In 1981:
•Harrington elected a new Mayor, Al Mann, who took his seat after besting three other candidates in January's city wide elections. Two new council members also won seats as Ray Gagne bested incumbent William Dill and another candidate in the Fifth Ward and Robert "Bobby" Quillen ran unopposed in the Sixth Ward.

•Felton voters chose Tom Jenner to serve on their town council, and the council selected Dave Billings to replace Bill DeLong who resigned.

•In Frederica, Ezekiel Dill and Dan Griffith both accepted a draft to serve on the town council as voters wrote in their choices in an election in which no one filed for the vacant council seats. Dill was selected by his fellow council members to be mayor. But by the end of the year, he had resigned. Dan Griffith stepped into the mayor's shoes, and the council asked Tom Wilmore to serve the remainder of Dill's term.

•Sewer construction, at long last started in Felton and was better than 50% complete by the end of the year.

•Frederica used H.U.D. funds to get its water tower cleaned, sealed and painted.

•Harrington voted permission for the City Council to borrow \$189,000 to pay for its share of the cost of an updated wastewater treatment facility. The construction was underway when the vote was taken. By the year's end, work neared completion on the plant which is funded by an 85% federal,

10% state, 15% local formula. The FMHA loan which will finance the city's share will be paid in 40 years at 5%.

•Harrington adopted a new budget totaling \$563,241 and called for increases in property taxes, the capitation tax, and water, sewer and trash fees to balance it.

•The Lake Forest School District bid farewell to retiring Superintendent William E. Cline and selected former Capital District top administrator, Dr. Edward M. Powell to fill the post.

•The Lake Forest Board of Education and the teachers' organization, the Lake Forest Education Association, started contract talks. At year's end, despite an "impasse" declared by the LFEA in September, the two groups were still talking.

•Magnolia celebrated its first Heritage Day.

•The Greater Harrington Historical

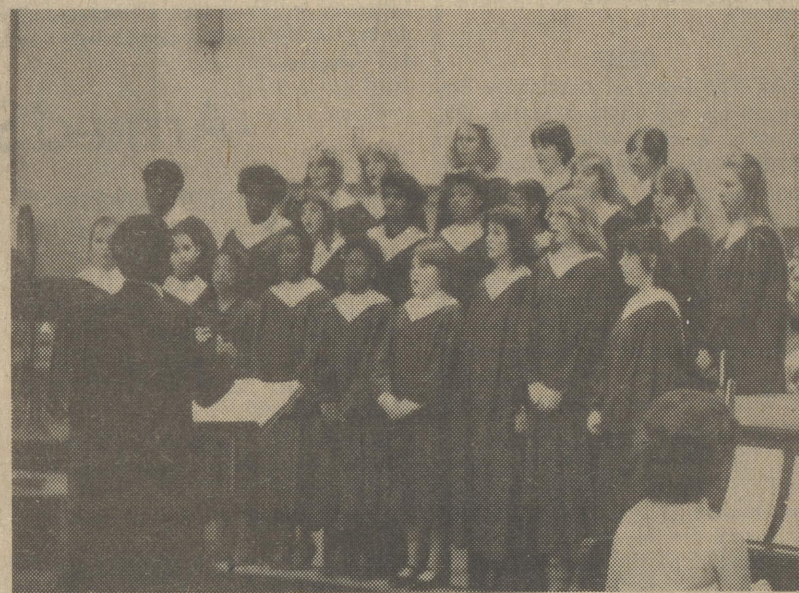

The Diamond Discount Program helps Delaware senior citizens increase their purchasing power, cope with the problems of inflation, and stretch their retirement dollars.

Delaware residents age 60 and over may apply at any senior center or nutrition site statewide and must show proof of age such as a Medicare card, driver's license, or any documentation that will verify age. Qualified applicants will receive an I.D. card and a

Delaware Diamonds

Sussex County Vignettes from the Memory of Mary Elizabeth Warrington [1907-1960] - Christmas, 1910, I remember vast stretches of undisturbed white as I looked out of the window of the old Wilson home near Coolspring that my father bought when he brought his family from Staten Island, New York. The farm was only about three miles from my grandfather's farm, which was the original Martin land, owned by the family since they came to this country. The old house was used as a meat and storage house and attached to it was a carriage house. The new house was built around the turn of the century. It had two parlors separated by a hallway and stairs, three porches and a summer kitchen off the south porch. The kitchen stove beneath the register in the bedroom floor warmed the bedroom in the winter. Baths were taken beside the stove in large wooden tubs. Holidays meant the gathering of the clan from far and near and Christmas or Thanksgiving dinners were events to be remembered. We were first introduced to "olives" at Uncle John's, and he had the prettiest Christmas Tree I ever saw, a fat cedar reaching to the ceiling literally covered with orna-

ments and tinsel, and lighted candles that were in holders that pinched onto the branches.

Things I remember were the scream of the wood saw, which frightened me; baskets of apples from our trees; lightning striking our barns; a dog that died of hydrophobia. And the outstanding event of our lives in 1912 was the coming of a darling sister whose black curls and huge blue eyes endeared her to everyone.

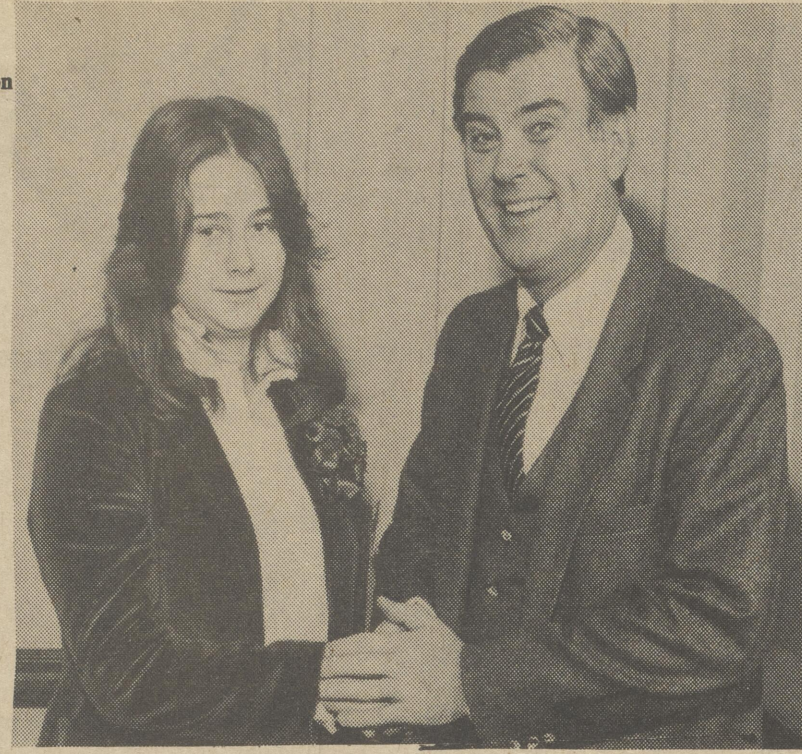

Included in his gifts was a farm in Duck Creek Hundred as well as his land in Mispillion Hundred and he bequeathed "My hotel property in Camden to my son William T. Van Gesel on condition that he shall pay to my son Edwin Van Gesel the sum of one hundred dollars; also paying my son Asbury Van Gesel one hundred dollars annually during his natural life. My will in regard to Jonathan Carrow the present tenant of the hotel that he shall remain and occupy hotel property under the same terms that he has held and occupied the same under me during his natural life if he shall choose to do so."

Dear Editor:

The 1981 holiday season may remind many of us that some things haven't changed. This year, once again, we feasted upon a traditional (and probably lavish) turkey dinner, watched spectacular holiday parades, gathered around the television set to watch myriad football games and fought crowds in search of the perfect gift. Some things haven't changed in other

parts of the world either. This year, as in years past, people have been forced to flee their homelands, find shelter in crowded and unsanitary refugee camps and suffer the debilitating effects of malnutrition and diseases.

In the Northeast African nation of Somalia, close to a million people are living in these camps. They are alive today because international relief

agencies are providing them with the food, water and medical care they need to survive. But I am concerned about the dependency this assistance tends to create.

The 1981 holiday season should remind many of us that it is time for some things to change. It is time to put an end to widespread hunger and to dependence upon daily shipments of food. Some voluntary agencies, such as Save the Children, have taken a giant step in this direction by providing the Somali refugees with the skills and resources they need and want to provide for themselves. Instead of just handing out food, Save the Children is handing out techniques for growing food and for planting seeds, trees and small-plot family gardens.

The holiday season encourages us to share our love with family and friends. Anne's Kitchen

Now that the holiday turkeys and hams are over with we should look for something different to spark up our everyday meals. This recipe will serve 4 to 6 people. I'll admit the wine and mushrooms add a little to preparation cost, but I think you will find the investment worthwhile. I always like to serve rice with this recipe and a large crisp green salad with homemade Italian dressing. Fresh fruit and cheese go well as a typical end to an Italian meal, especially refreshing after all those Christmas sweets.

"ITALIAN PORK CHOPS"
1. Heat in a large heavy skillet with a tight fitting cover, 2 tablespoons olive oil.

2. Add and cook till lightly browned, one clove of garlic, minced.

3. Season 6 rib pork chops with salt and pepper. Place into oil and garlic mixture and slowly brown on both sides.

4. Meanwhile, clean and slice 1 lb. mushrooms and 2 green peppers. Add to browned chops.

5. Stir in 1/2 cup crushed tomatoes and 1/2 cup dry white wine.

6. Cover skillet and cook over low heat 1-1 1/2 hours, depending on thickness of chops. From time to time stir and turn. If liquid dries up, add a little more wine, cut with water.

Gabfest

Lunch is over and I'm tired from Christmas baking. So I'll sit down and write to all of you. At least I'm never too tired to talk...gabby old soul that I am!

Yesterday afternoon when I came home from last-minute shopping I made a double batch of Dream Bars. This recipe was shared with me by my good friend, Marilyn Lyons, a number of years ago, and I have made them every year since...I won't tell you how many the children can consume on a trip through the kitchen. You would not believe it anyway. Here's the rule: Mix 1/2 cup of butter or Crisco; 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 cup flour and dash of salt. Press this into a thin crust on a cookie sheet and bake 375 degrees about ten minutes, watching that it does not scorch.

Meanwhile: Beat 3 eggs and add 1 cup brown sugar, 2 tsp. flour and dash of salt; 1 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 cup nut meats, 1 cup coconut. Spread this over the baked crust and bake again at 375 degrees for about 20 minutes. Cool and cut in bars.

Another similar one is to do the baked crust as above. For the mix beat 2 eggs, 2 tsp. flour, 1 cup sugar, 1/4 salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 6 to 8 ounces of candied fruit, 1 cup nuts,

1 cup coconut. Bake as for the other and cool, and cut.

This morning I have made the traditional Minnehaha Cake and this I have shared before. If you've lost it, just call. This is a large cake and I always run into difficulty getting the creaming done. The steel beaters of the electric mixer whirls merrily away, but it still felt grainy. So I am reminded of Grandmother Hatfield telling me that the only satisfactory way to cream the butter and sugar for a cake is using your hand. It is the warmth that does it. Now, I have a thing about getting my hands into anything, be it baby diapers or Christmas cake, but I pride myself on rising to the occasion, so I removed the bowl from the mixer stand and sat down with it in my lap as I've seen the old folks do. I have to admit the warm hand did a fantastic job quickly, but I was glad to get the gooey mess off my fingers!

Now for the mince pies and the pumpkin pies and then at the last minute the mashed potato rolls. By the time you read this column it will be history and all the memories will be filed away to cherish. Then will come my 78th birthday on January 2. Oh, well, I shall just enjoy it because someday I will be an old lady!!

Top trotters for '81 selected

COLUMBUS, OHIO-Fan Hanover, named Harness Horse of the Year earlier this week was not the only filly to claim a top honor in the U.S. Trotting Association's annual polling of North American harness writers and race secretaries.

Panty Raid, a 3-year-old owned by the Stoner Creek Stud of Paris, Ky., was voted Trotter of the Year. The daughter of Nevele Pride, trained by Stanley Dancer, finished in front of Banker Barker, Shiway St. Pat, and 22 others who received at least one vote in the top trotting category.

Panty Raid won \$382,292 in 1981 after finishing first in 11 of 21 races, including the rich inaugural of the World Trotting Derby at Du Quoin, Ill. She was also named "3-Year-Old Filly Trotter of the Year" by a majority of the 248 voters.

Other winners in the various trotting divisions were Self Confident, Crevette, Banker Barker, Final Score and Kading.

Self Confident, owned by Richard S. Staley, Beverly Hills, Ca., and Crevette, belonging to the 9 Star Stable, were the leading vote getters in the 2-year-old colt and filly categories respectively. Incredible Nevele and Ginger Belle each finished a close second in voting for the freshman colt and filly champions of 1981.

Banker Barker, a consistent gelding owned by M.A. Benson Jr. and Paul and Jim Felice, all of Pontiac, Mich., took home honors in the 3-year-old trotting males section. Banker Barker led Super Juan, Shiway St. Pat and Smokin Yankee in the tabulations. He was a seasonal winner of \$318,279, and set a world record (1:56.2) over a mile track.

Final Score, a 4-year-old son of Super Bowl, and Kading, also four, each captured year-end honors for the second consecutive year. Final Score, now retired, was named "3-Year-Old Colt Trotter of 1980" and received more votes than Ideal du Gazeau to win the aged trotting title this year. He is owned by Hubert H. Riedel, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

Kading won the Aged Mare title largely on the strength of her victory in the American Trotting Championship at Roosevelt Raceway. Arnold H. Bachner, Stamford, Conn., and the Armstrong Brothers of Ontario, share ownership in the Hickory Pride mare who won \$138,090 in 1981.

Fan Hanover named 1981 Harness Horse of the Year

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Fan Hanover, the most consistent standardbred performer in a year filled with upsets and surprises, has been voted the 1981 E. Roland Harriman Harness Horse of the Year by a wide margin.

In balloting conducted by the U.S. Trotting Assn. and the U.S. Harness Writers' Assn., the 3-year-old pacing filly received 133 of the 248 votes cast, and became the first female pacer to win this distinguished honor since the

inception of the award in 1947. Royce, a 4-year-old pacing stallion, finished a distant second with 20 votes, followed by McKinzie Almahurst (17 votes), Rambling Willie (12), and Ideal du Gazeau (9). Overall, 23 different horses received at least one vote in the 1981 competition.

Announcement of the year-end tabulation was reported in the January edition of HOOF BEATS, the official monthly magazine of the U.S. Trotting Assn.

Fan Hanover, sold as a yearling for \$20,000 at the 1979 Harrisburg, Pa., Sale, won 17 of 23 races in 1981 and earned \$497,717, a record one-year total for a female harness horse. But perhaps of more importance to voters was her victory in the Little Brown Jug. Fan Hanover became the first filly to capture harness racing's most prestigious pacing race in 36 editions of the annual classic.

The daughter of Albatross-Farm Nor-

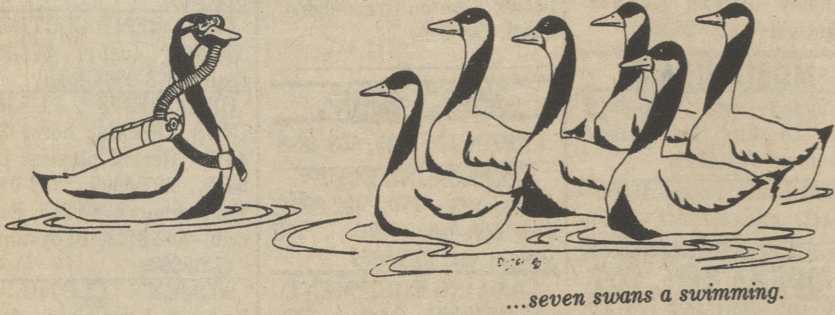

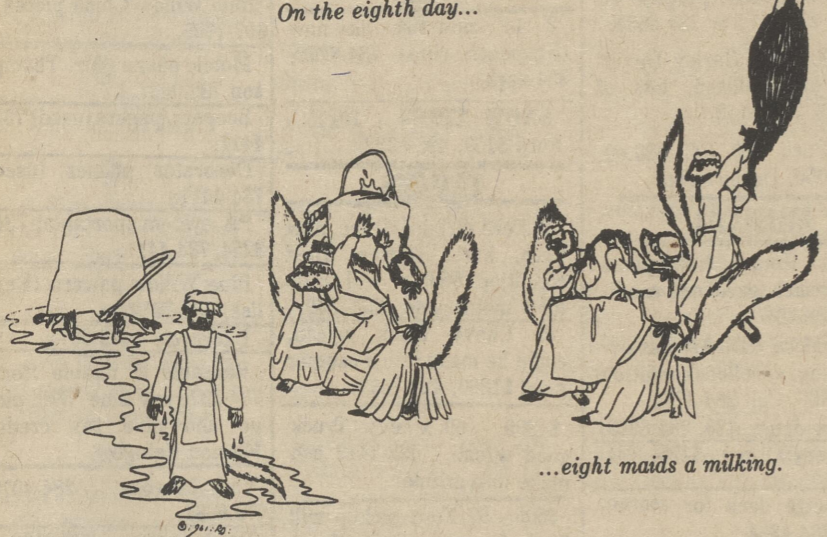

The Delaware Soybean Board announced that it will receive proposals for its 1982 Grant-in Aid program through January 15, 1982. This is the second year of this farmer-run self-help program. Last year the Board selected twelve projects ranging from variety testing, under Delaware's conditions, to participating in an international soybean marketing program.

The Board's Chairman, Mr. Joe Hughes explained that they will be able to fund proposed research, educational and production projects or market development programs related to soybeans. Mr. Hughes stressed that proposed projects must present an opportunity for results that will benefit Delaware Soybean producers. 1981 In Review

Society gratefully accepted the gift of the Fleming Street building which was the original site of St. Stephens Episcopal Church from the John Satterfields. The building will be restored and renovated for use as a museum.

- The Historical Society with the cooperation of people and organizations throughout the community, sponsored the third annual and successful Heritage Day here.
- The Harrington Jaycees put on another Christmas Parade spectacular.
- The 61st Delaware State Fair drew a record 177,600 attendance.
- Eleven horses perished in flames which engulfed a stable at Harrington Raceway.
- Conrail and local police were able to handle an October coal train derailment with a minimum of inconvenience to the community.
- Felton Police Chief Mike Olliver and Mayor William Myers clashed head-on over the aftermath of a high speed chase which started in the town.
- Olliver was put on the disabled list after an incident in which a scuffle with a prisoner damaged his knee. Reportedly several Felton residents watched the scuffle without offering any assistance.
- In answer to increased concern over

Conrail's proposal to close the block house (the signal tower from which switching operations could be manually controlled) and install an automatic system, the railroad's Vice President for Governmental Affairs, Al Arnett, assured the City Council in March that he did not think the closing would happen for at least a year and that the Council would be kept informed. By the end of the year, the block house was closed, and the Council did not feel it had been fully informed. A letter announcing the Federal Railroad Administration's decision to allow the change had been received. But the Council did not feel it had been offered a real opportunity to have input on that decision. Several Council members said they learned that Conrail had given a "go ahead" to the project only second hand through a report in *The Harrington Journal*.

- Felton, through efforts coordinated by Town Council member, Don Jacobs, won National Register of Historic Buildings recognition for its railroad station.
- Harrington police were pleased to report they had arrested a person allegedly responsible for at least four of 13 auto thefts within a month's time. The arrest hopefully put an end to the string of incidents.
- The City of Harrington hired a firm

to start reassessment of property within city limits.

- The 1980-81 Spartan girls varsity basketball team dueled Indian River to a virtual standoff, statistically speaking, for the Henlopen South Conference championship. But Lake Forest was edged out for the title because two of the games it did lose were to Indian River.
- Lake Forest's Pat Dyal was named Henlopen Conference hockey coach of the year.
- Al Drummond was named Lake Forest Teacher of the Year.
- Jim Fleming's varsity football team had its best season ever, completing a 7-2-1 season record and capturing the Southern Division Henlopen Conference championship. The Spartans, however, were defeated by upstate Archmere in their state tournament debut. Several Spartan varsity players were named to the first and second All Conference teams. There were a number of Honorable Mention choices from Lake Forest. Senior Dale Benson was a second team All State choice, and several of his teammates received All State honorable mention.
- The community learned with sadness, of the death of a number of its citizens including Sam Short, Darcy Hamsher and Ruth Peck.

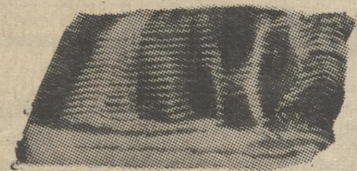
