## Melvin, Henry are winners

In a five-way race for two seats in the Harrington City Council, voters in the Second and Fourth Wards last week selected Curtis Melvin and Richard Henry to serve three year terms. They replace Council members Gary Harrington and Harold Brode who chose not to run for second terms.

In the Second Ward, Curtis Melvin, with 53 votes was far ahead of his opponents, Donald West (15) and Jose F. Soriano (12). Fourth Ward voters gave Richard Henry the 2-1 nod with 41 votes as opposed to 20 for Shirley Corrin.

Henry and Melvin were sworn in by City Alderwoman Anna Hampton in brief ceremonies at the Council's annual reorganization last Wednesday night. Harrington Mayor Al Mann took the occasion to remind the reorganized

Council that it was composed of six people with six different minds. They were bound, said Mann, to disagree. But he hoped they could pull together for the betterment of the City.

In other business, the Council chose Jack Wyatt as Vice Mayor, Norma Short as secretary and Howard Wagner as treasurer.

There was some discussion of changing the Council meeting night from the second to the first Monday night each month and of setting the second Monday as a regularly scheduled workshop session. However, no action was taken, and the matter will not be decided until the next regular Council session which will be on the second Monday of next month, February 8, 1982.

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## Fire smothers 20,000 chickens

20,000 chickens perished on the farm complex of Peggy Gerardi near Vernon Tuesday morning as smoke from an early morning electrical fire smothered them. The Harrington Volunteer Fire Company which responded to the alarm at 7:23 a.m. Tuesday, January 18th, said the blaze apparently originated with an electrical receptacle which may have had a short circuit. They reported the fire under control at 8:43 a.m. with some interior damage to the building, particularly the ceiling insulation. But Bob Taylor, officer in charge at the scene, said the structure itself remained sound.

The fire company said there was very little use of water, but heavy smoke smothered the 20,000 five-week old

broilers being raised for Country Pride. No dollar estimate of the loss was given. There were no personal injuries.

Three volunteer fire companies from Greensboro, Farmington and Houston assisted at the scene of the fire. For the duration of the emergency, Felton Fire Company covered for Harrington; Milford for Houston, and Greenwood, for Farmington.

En route to the fire, a pumper from Houston suffered very minor damage when it went off an icy road and turned over in a ditch. Another truck from the Greensboro Company slid into a ditch on the return trip.

The Gerardi farm is on County Road 296, west of County Road 298 near Vernon.

## After three years, Deputy trial begins

Nearly three years after Alberta Byard Smith were slain in their Harrington home on February 7, 1979, Andre S. Deputy, one of the two persons accused in the murder is on trial. Selection of the jury for the trial began in Superior Court yesterday.

The other person involved, William Henry Flamer, a nephew of the Harrington couple, was tried and convicted in 1980. He received the death penalty.

Deputy's trial was delayed because Superior Court Judge William G. Bush ruled that the evidence against Deputy was obtained illegally because there was no reason to suspect him of the crime when he was picked up while walking along U.S. 13 with Flamer. Police, at the time, were looking for Flamer only. That evidence included items taken from the Smith home in his possession and his statements under questioning by the state police.

Delaware Supreme Court overturned Judge Bush's rule in a decision last summer. That paved the way for the trial which is expected to last six days. Following that decision, Deputy was reindicted on four counts of murder. Deputy was already serving a 30 year prison sentence for an unrelated manslaughter conviction.

Flamer's conviction and sentence are still being appealed.

## Harrington man jailed for injuring troopers

Randy Baynard, 19, of Harrington is in Sussex Correction Institution at Georgetown under \$30,000 bail after an incident in which he injured two Delaware State Police Troopers who were placing him under arrest.

Cpl. Martin Gordy, of Troop 5, Bridgeville, and Trooper Eric Swanson, Troop 7, Dewey Beach, were injured slightly when Baynard, who had become abusive was placed in handcuffs and put in the squad car. After the young man began kicking the dashboard and door of the car, the two troopers tried to quiet him. At this point, Swanson was kicked in the leg and Gordy in the head. Both refused treatment.

The incident apparently originated with a domestic dispute at the home of Nettie Cannon on Sussex Route 44, west of Milford.

## Teachers' contract extended again

Lake Forest teachers received another month's extension on their old contract Monday night as the Lake Forest School Board took action to renew its master agreement with their representative organization, the Lake Forest Education Association. The agreement was extended for another month to Monday, February 15, the next regular board meeting.

Meanwhile, LFEA president, Ed Gabrielson expressed quiet confidence in the outcome of the negotiations which he said were progressing well. The board and the teachers have apparently reached an understanding which has led them back to the bargaining table since the September crisis in which the teachers' organization declared the talks were at an impasse.

In other business, the Lake Forest Board of Education:

- hired Bruce Peris, Vocational Education, Lake Forest High School; Ruth Saulsbury, Special Education, W.T. Chipman and Donna Allinson, psychologist in the Diagnostic Center at Lake Forest North Elementary.

- heard from a disgruntled group of band parents who presented a lengthy letter of complaints. The letter, signed by about 10 persons at the meeting, was read by Ken Aycoth - Focus of the complaints seemed to be personnel differences between band members, parents and an advisor for one of the

high school band front groups. The parents were not satisfied that their complaints had been taken seriously or the situation handled in the proper manner. They were also dissatisfied with the qualifications and performance of the particular advisor. The school board promised to take the letter under consideration and to look more closely at the situation.

- tabled a motion to hire an extra assistant coach for spring track until Student Activities Director Dave Adams can be fully consulted. Head track coach Jim Blades reportedly requested extra help in coaching the 110-115 young people who participate in the program.

- received a report on measures taken to warm up a cold wing at Lake Forest East Elementary School in Frederica Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds Charles Saulsbury said the situation had improved after air intake through vents had been decreased and some baffles in the heating system were removed. The district will also look at enclosing a passage between the new wing and the older section of the building as funds are available in the future.

- agreed to let the Felton Little League use the baseball diamond behind Lake Forest North Elementary School for the formation of a Senior League.

## O'Bier over McDowell

The Greenwood Town Council Monday night selected a new president, Charles Todd, to replace Floyd E. McDowell, who was defeated in his bid for re-election Saturday. Challenger Robert G. O'Bier bested McDowell 76-56 in Saturday's town election. McDowell, who has been on the Greenwood Council since 1967, served as its president for the past eight years.

Also elected to the Council were incumbents Robert A. Reynolds, Jr. (103 votes) and Bruce D. Bowman (107 votes). Both were unopposed.

123 Greenwood voters turned out to vote for the three candidates who will serve 2-year terms.

Two other Council members, Harry Nelson Torbert and Charles Todd, will be up for re-election in 1983.

## Groundwater heat pump system brings savings

A sample ground water heat pump heating and cooling system installed by Delmarva Drilling in the Greenwood-Bridgeville areas has realized energy-cost savings for its owners, according to Kevin Burdette, a spokesman for the Sussex County drilling company.

Burdette said a month-by-month cost check had been run on the system since it was installed last summer. The energy use was monitored both through the outside meter installed by the power company in the all-electric home and through an inside meter on the ground water heat pump. Those costs were compared with the total electric bill for a neighboring residence the same size, that is more heavily insulated and uses an air-to-air heat pump.

For the month of December, the electric bill for the residence served by the ground water heat pump system was \$120.55 with a total of 1960

K.W.H. (kilowatt hours) consumed. Of that total the heat pump used 1174 K.W.H. or \$71.84 of the total bill. The rest was consumed by background electric (lights, appliances - not heat related uses).

The comparable residence with the air-to-air heat pump received a December bill of \$183.47. Assuming a similar background electric use for a home of the same type and size with the same number of people in residence Burdette estimated a 2453 K.W.H. usage.

The sample system has been installed in a one-story, 18,000 square foot home with three bedrooms, two baths, dining room, kitchen, living room, utility room and a garage that is partially heated by the system. It is home for two adults and a 5 month old child. In the all electrical residence, "at least one clothes washing and drying is necessary every day." The home has

insulation in the walls and ceiling, but, in contrast to the home with which it

was compared, it does not have floor insulation. The home was formerly heated with an oil, hot-air baseboard system.

The ground water heat pump, which will also provide air conditioning in the summer, is supplied by the domestic well serving the home which draws from Delaware's ground water that maintains a year round temperature within one degree of 55°. The heat pump will operate with water temperatures as low as 45°. Even with the sub-zero temperatures experienced recently the ground water temperature has remained constant.

The water used by the system is returned to the ground in one of three ways: 1.) It is returned to a well; 2.) It supplies an underground irrigation system that waters the roots of bushes and grape vines on the property, and 3.) In summer, it will run a pop-up sprinkler system for the lawn.

Burdette said the persons living in municipal areas served by city or town systems would need to drill a well to convert to the system. But, he said, the ground water heat pumps would be non-polluting and, since all water is returned to the ground, would not deplete the water table. He thought it would be well-received by municipalities.

For \$5, watermen and their wives will be serving all the oysters on the half


shell and steamed you can eat. Also, for this price, each person will be entitled to either hot oyster stew or an oyster fritter cooked the Tilghman Island way.



## Anne's Kitchen

What's for dinner? I get tired of asking myself that same old question each day and wish someone would give me some new ideas. I'm sure you have repeated this phrase to yourself over and over again. Well they say there is nothing new under the sun, and I believe that's true, but there are different things to do with old ideas that will spark interest and result in a pleasant surprise. My meatloaf recipe will do just that. Nothing is older than meatloaf, it can't be, yet this recipe will give you a whole different outlook, and I promise you will never make a meatloaf in an oven again. Granted, this one takes a little more stove watching than the oven method, but you will find it is well worth it. The resulting sauce makes a delightful topping for rice or noodles to go along with the meat. A crisp salad and hot buttered biscuits and you will have a meal fit for a king, well, maybe not a king but a prince charming anyway.

### MEATLOAF

- 1 1/2 lbs. good quality ground beef
- 2 whole eggs
- 2 cans tomato sauce, 8 oz. each
- 1/4 cup grated Romano cheese
- 3/4 cup bread crumbs (approx.)
- 1/2 lb. crisp fried bacon crumbled
- 1 small clove garlic, minced
- 1/8 cup chopped Italian parsley, minced
- 3 or 4 hard-cooked eggs, shelled
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3 tablespoons olive oil

1. Select a large bowl. Put in raw eggs, 1/2 can tomato sauce, grated cheese, garlic, parsley and salt and pepper. Beat with a fork till all ingredients are blended.
2. Add ground beef and bacon and blend well with hands.
3. Start adding bread crumbs, working

into mixture. You may need a little more or less than amount specified. You want to result in a firm loaf that can be handled without too much trouble. The hard-cooked eggs should be placed in the center of the loaf whole. A good tip to help you is to use a loaf pan, place half of the meat mixture into it, place the eggs in a row, then top with the rest of the mixture. Unmold and pat together till all openings are covered.

4. Choose a heavy domed skillet or dutch oven with a cover. Heat the oil and place your loaf in to brown, turning to brown all sides.

5. Allow browned loaf to cool down (to avoid splattering) and pour 1 1/2 cans of tomato sauce on top of loaf. Rinse cans with about 1/2 can of water transferring from can to can till all sauce is recovered. Pour this also over top of loaf.

6. Cook on low or simmer heat spooning sauce over loaf often, always remember to return cover. From time to time turn loaf to different position to allow sauce to seep into loaf.

7. The cooking process should take about 1 to 1 1/4 hours. If sauce gets too thick, add a little water to cut it down. You will have to do a little pot watching and perhaps adjust heat.

You may serve at once, or fix early in the day or day before and heat at serving time. If you don't want to use the sauce on noodles or rice, use it on the loaf. As you slice into the loaf and place it on your serving platter, the whole eggs will show up in the center of each slice and create a really different touch. If your family is opposed to the hard cooked eggs, they can be left out. No recipe adjustments are required.

iana is Clabber Cheese in Missouri, Dutch Cheese in both North pockets of the East and West Coasts, smears in Pennsylvania, curd in Texas, and also generally known as Cottage cheese throughout the country.

The breakfast dish known generally as pancakes becomes battercakes in South Carolina, flannelcakes in Pennsylvania, fritters in the Deep South, Flitters in Kentucky, corncakes in northern Maryland, pannycakes in Maine and New Hampshire, and stacks in Kansas.

If you want your egg poached or coddled, you can order anywhere, but you have to head south if you want it poached or to New England if you like it dropped.

Bacon can be had anywhere, but it is Fritch in Pennsylvania (and in old time Delaware) middling in Maryland, salt side in Colorado, and streaked meat in North Carolina.

To get a fire going, in New Hampshire you bring in an armful of wood; in Indiana, it's an armload. In South Carolina, it is a Turn, in Iowa a bundle and in Georgia an arm of wood.

To start the fire, Kindling is generally known, but it's splinters in Georgia, N. Carolina and Florida; lightwood in South Carolina, shavings in Maryland, chips in the north and kindlings in New England.

No doubt you call that top room your attic. In Maryland, it is a garret, a loft in Arkansas, under the eaves in Rhode Island and in South Carolina, the plunder room. And so it goes. Isn't it fascinating?

National prizes include Singer model 6136 Sewing Machines, a Simplicity \$500 scholarship, a trip to the National Grange Convention next November, a portable TV set, and a \$1,000 Best in Show award. There are also many merchandise awards for the top three winners in each class at the state level; plus special awards by Blumenthal, Inc. 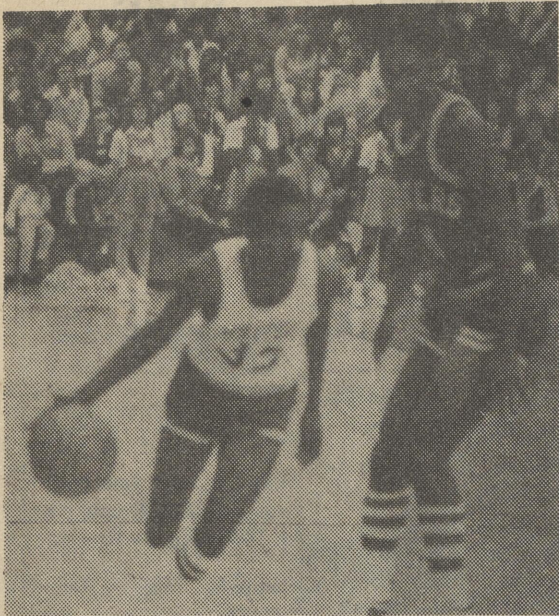

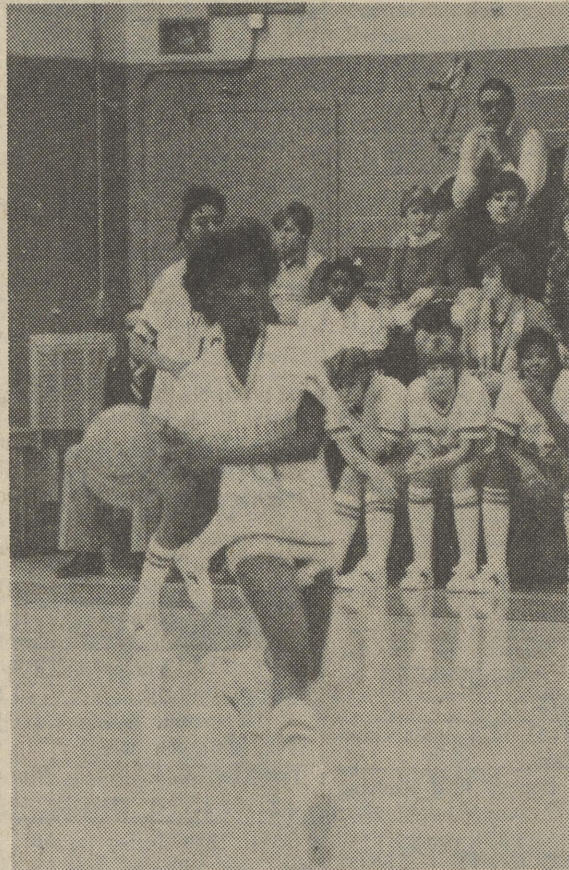

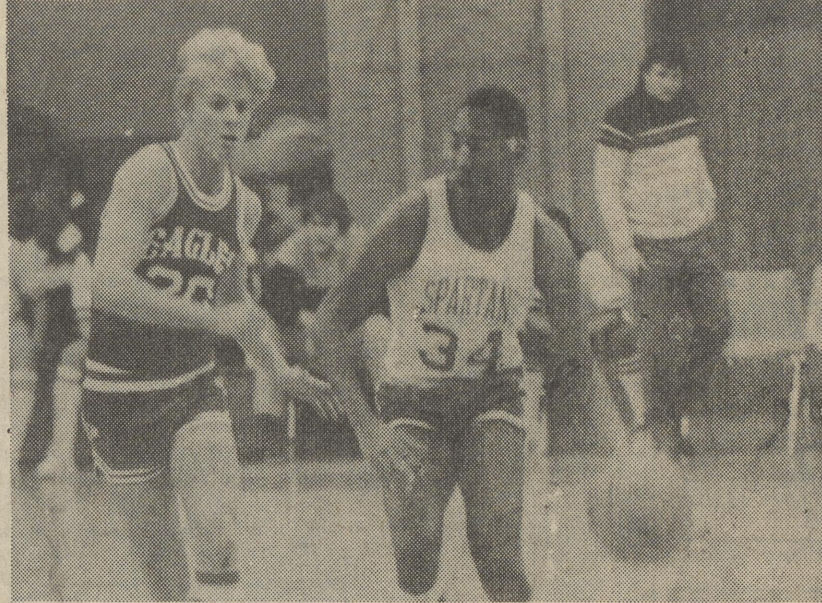

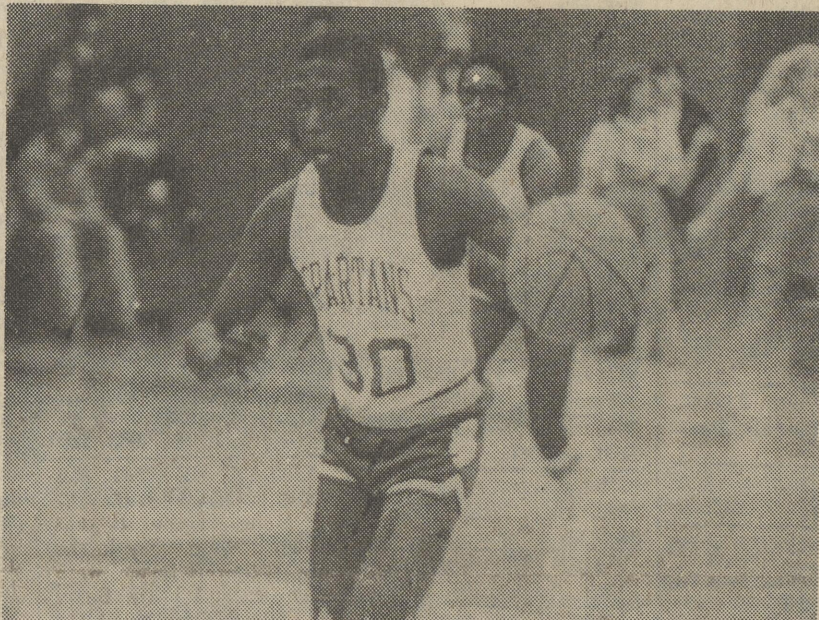


Spartan Lolita Seth [11] takes the game to the Smyrna end of the court.

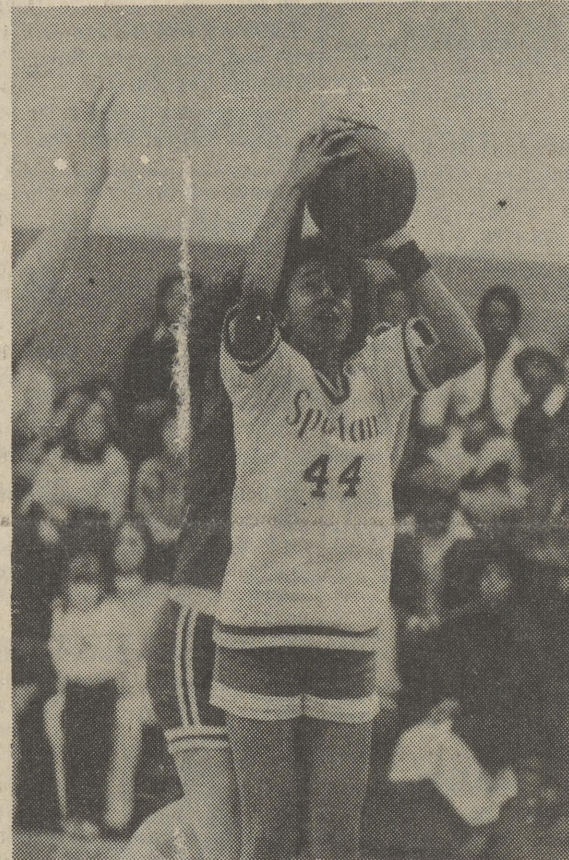


Lake Forest's Jerome Scott [34] looks for a way around his Smyrna opponent.

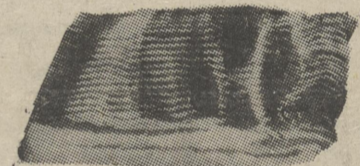
