Calvert County fugitive arrested here

The Felton Police with the assistance of the Harrington Police Department captured an escapee wanted on fugitive warrants issued in 1979 in Calvert County, Maryland. Earl K. Breeden who was sought in connection with two burglaries and thefts in Calvert County Maryland turned out, upon investigation to be the person wanted by the Calvert County Sheriff's office. Breeden had been serving time there on a felony conviction.

Breeden, along with Harry L. Roberts, Jr., Robin L. Roberts and Thomas N. Cahall, all of Harrington, was arrested on Hanley Street here. The four were picked up and charged in connection with thefts which reportedly occurred in November 1981 at the old feed mill on Walnut and High Street in Felton. The incidents, however, were not discovered until early January when they were reported by the mill's owner Harold C. Hill. The mill is no longer in operation, but some items are stored there.


that he was an escapee. But he was described as "acting uneasy". A check with the National Crime Information Center turned up the Calvert County warrants. The sheriff's office there asked the local police to hold Breeden. He was also charged by the Harrington Police Department with carrying a concealed deadly weapon, an 81/2 inch folding knife. Bond on the deadly weapon charge was set at \$2,500. There was no bail set on the fugitive charges. Breeden is now being held at Delaware Correctional Center until he can be retured to Calvert County to face charges as an escaped convict

Taken on two separate occasions were conspiracy and receiving stolen goods. Released under \$3,000 unsecured bond, was Robin Roberts who was charged with burglary, theft and conspiracy. Freed on \$1,500 bond on charges of theft and burglary was Thomas Cahall.

The arrests were made by Felton Police Chief Mike Olliver and PFC Ronald Fortin, assisted by Harrington Patrolman Jeffrey Cook. Sergeant William Jopp of the Harrington force was instrumental in tracking down information. The Harrington Police Department said this was the second arrest of a criminal fugitive here in two

In Felton, Chief Mike Olliver reported a string of ten or more fire wood thefts were apparently solved with the arrest of two Felton area men William C. Finkbiner and John James Hickman. The two were observed in the act of taking firewood by Frances W. Morris of Felton. They were charged with attempted theft.

Landlord arrested

A Harrington area landlord was in Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna this week after he allegedly pulled a gun on two of his former tenants.

Thomas Steerman was taken into custody after he pulled a car over on Commerce Street in the block between Dorman and Mispillion Street and cocked and aimed a 22 caliber pistol at its occupants. In the car were Robert Warren, Jr. and his wife who were former Grant St. tenants of Steerman. Also in the car was Robert Warren, Sr. of Milford.

The apparent issue was a civil dispute involving the Grant St. house formerly rented by the Warrens. Steerman reportedly was under court order to allow the Warren's to retrieve their personal property from the house. He had earlier locked up the residence and refused to allow them to take anything from it.

After the incident last week, Steerman was arrested and charged with reckless endangering and two counts of criminal solicitation. After being arraigned in Court 6, Harrington, he was confined to DCC in default of a total of \$45,000 bond pending a preliminary hearing at the Court of Common Pleas on February 4.
