Burglars ransack two Harrington firms

Two burglars who ransacked five buildings at Delmar Packaging and Callis Thompson on U.S. 13 in Harrington early Monday morning were detected by the Harrington Police and subsequently arrested. Confined to Delaware Correctional Center in Smyrna were Ronald Robinson and Naham J. Bloodworth, both of Felton. Also arrested was Robinson's girl friend, Beulah L. Lawrence of Felton, who was committed to Woodhaven-Kruse in Clayton.

The Felton pair broke into three buildings at Callis Thompson and two at Delmar Packaging before they were discovered. A considerable amount of interior damage was done to the buildings as they were ransacked and a number of items were stolen. These last included a small TV, 3 portable radio, a small electric heater 2 pairs of gloves, some wrenches, 125 in coins, a pair of boots, a bar of soap and some sandwiches. With the exception of the sandwiches, all of the items were recovered. The burglars managed a snack, but apparently had no time for a bath.

The burglary in process was discovered when a "silent alarm" was triggered at Delmar Packaging and the Harrington Police alerted.

Arriving at the scene, HPD Patrolman Cook observed an open window and kept the building under surveillance as he contacted the Delaware State Police for an assist. While he waited, he observed two individuals inside the building.

With the arrival of two state police units, one of them canine, one of the suspects ran from the building and fled into a nearby woods where he was followed by the canine unit.

Meanwhile, Patrolman Cook concealed in a field kept the building under observation. Shortly after the state police unit left the scene, the second suspect, Bloodworth, tried to escape but was immediately apprehended by the Harrington officer and turned over to a third state police unit.

Cook then responded to County Road 433 where the canine unit had tracked Robinson who had left the area in a 1975 blue Dodge Dart. That vehicle turned up on Road 239 where its owner, Ms. Lawrence, tried to further Robinson's escape by giving the officer a false story. Robinson was discovered after Lawrence was taken into custody.

Charged with 5 counts of 3rd degree burglary, 1 of 2nd degree conspiracy

and 2 counts of theft, Robinson was jailed in default of \$29,000 secured bond. Bloodworth, who is in DCC in default of \$8,000 secured bond, faces identical charges.

Ms. Lawrence was charged with hindering prosecution and imprisoned in lieu of \$1,000 bond.

Three state police units assisted the Harrington Police. The silent alarm at Delmar Packaging went off about 1:58 a.m. on Monday.

Chipman School hit

Harrington Police are investigating a break-in which occurred at the W.T. Chipman Junior School in Harrington sometime between Sunday evening or Monday morning. An unknown person or persons broke through a pane of glass in a cafeteria door and reached inside to unlock it. Panes in three locked classroom doors were also broken out.

Police said no other damage was done and nothing was missing from the school premises. The continuing investigation involves checking out some blood stains found on a hall floor, which police think may have come from an injury when some panes of glass were broken out.

Overcrowded LF East poses problems

The Lake Forest School Board of Education will move its March meeting to Lake Forest East Elementary in Frederica as it looks for answers to the overcrowding which has the building there filled 20% beyond its capacity. The school built for 350 pupils now has 427 enrolled.

The March meeting has been set for Frederica to open the forum for parents and others concerned to comment on five alternative solutions to the problem, and/or to offer suggestions of their own.

At Monday night's regular meeting of the school board, L.F. Superintendent, Dr. Edward Powell discussed the situation and described the five alternatives. He said the district could (1) do nothing and allow the overcrowding to continue, (2) try to get mobile classrooms or trailers, (3) build, (4) take another look at geography and move 70-90 students chosen across all grade levels to Lake Forest North in Felton, or (5) move the entire sixth grade (with the exception of 8 or 9, who would be closer to South in Harrington) to North in Felton.

Powell offered little hope for getting additional trailer classrooms. A building project, he said, would take at least three years and involve legislative

approval plus passing a referendum at the local level. He does not think a building project is needed.

Train was delayed

The *Harrington Journal* story last week which said there was no train coming and no delay to a Houston Fire Truck on its way to back up the Harrington Fire Company at a fire west of Harrington in January was incorrect. Curtis Melvin, who used the "hot line" to alert Conrail, said there was a delay to the Houston truck.

Bob Taylor of the local fire company also reports there have been numerous delays to firemen reporting to the fire house in answer to an alarm. There have been times when the gates have been down, no train has arrived and the firemen have gone around the gates to make the crossing. Taylor said so far, local fire trucks have not been held up because most of the alarms have been east of the tracks. He has

also heard reports of trains going through the crossings with the gates still up.

Jarrell is Mayor

Shirley Jarrell, who was returned to the Magnolia Council for another two-year term last month, was recently selected by her fellow council members to serve a fourth term as Mayor. Ms. Jarrell is a special education teacher in the Caesar Rodney School District.

James B. McIlvaine was voted in as vice mayor, and Diane Cahall as Secretary/Treasurer in the town's annual reorganization meeting last week.

Deputy to hang

Andre S. Deputy, convicted last week in the double murder of Byard and Alberta Smith of Harrington, was sentenced Friday in Superior Court to death by hanging.

The Smiths were stabbed 145 times in their home on the Vernon Road on February 7, 1979. The murder weapons were a 10-inch bayonet and a kitchen paring knife.

The six man/six woman jury was out four hours last Wednesday before returning the verdict of guilty on four counts of first degree murder, two of robbery and one of possession of a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony. That same jury returned to Friday and after five and a half hours of deliberation handed down the death penalty. Deputy joins four other inmates of Delaware's "death row". But no actual death sentence has been carried out since 1946.

William Henry Flamer, a nephew of the Smiths, was convicted of the murders in 1980. He was sentenced to hang. Brought in during the Deputy trial, Flamer was prevented by his attorney from answering any questions. His case is still on appeal.

In the course of his trial which began on January 18, Deputy's lawyer, Dean C. Johnson, based his defense on the contention that Deputy was pressured to confess in 30 hours of on and off questioning in which he was threatened, deprived of sleep and promised a drink if he would tell the story as state police detectives wanted to hear it.

Taped confessions by Deputy figured heavily in the trial. At first he claimed he only stood by and watched while Flamer stabbed the Smiths. Later he admitted stabbing Mrs. Smith "three or four times" after she grabbed his arm in a plea for help as Flamer attacked her husband.

On the witness stand, Deputy claimed the confession came after he had been threatened, left in a Bridgeville jail cell to sleep with no mattress or blanket and promised a drink for his cooperation. He said a wallet and watch belonging to Byard Smith were planted on him by police detective Harold Brode. During the taped statement, he claimed Flamer had given them to him. But in court Deputy said he had been too "scared" to say that at the time he was questioned.

The detectives who conducted the interrogation were Brode, William H. Porter, Daryl Chaffinch and Raymond P. Callaway. Chaffinch, Brode and Porter were called to testify by Deputy Attorney General Dana C. Reed, but Judge William G. Bush refused to allow Deputy Attorney to question them concerning their interrogation of his client. Bush also ruled against letting Johnson question Deputy about his drinking and his past commitments to a mental institution. Johnson is expected to appeal the decision.

I have been contacted by the City Council and residents of the town of Harrington concerning Conrail operations.

Harrington, Delaware is a town steeped in railroad tradition. These people have long recognized their valuable contributions to the economy of the State of Delaware as a railroad town. They know their relationship with the railroad has benefits for Harrington, the State of Delaware and Conrail. The people of Harrington accommodate rail traffic as a way of life and have always recognized the favorable aspects of railroad business in their town.

He went in the evening with some boys and men to Brandywine Creek to fish, who represent that he returned to the Concord Turnpike with them about 12 o'clock

midnight and that he started to his father's house about one quarter mile from where he came to the Turnpike, since when he has not been heard of. He had on blue drilling pants striped summer roundabout straw hat and was barefoot. The boy is stout made with light hair, large front teeth. His name is William Maxwell, Jr. Whoever will give information to Isaac G. Talley on Concord Rd. or to Curtis Tweed, Esq., near Wilmington will oblige a distressed parent.

Powell has asked for a decision by April, in time to make plans for the '82-'83 school year.

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OVENS

Today's automatic meat timers, advanced temperature controls and other convenience features on modern ranges make it possible to get quality baking results with a lot less time and effort. However, you may be surprised to learn that even better results are possible with the right cooking utensils.

For cakes and cookies, use aluminum cake pans and cookie sheets. The aluminum will spread the heat evenly whereas dark pans absorb heat and make browning uneven.

Using the right cookie sheet is important. Allow two inches of free space on all sides of the sheet and bake one at a time.

Glass absorbs heat and bakes faster. If you use glass dishes for baking, reduce the temperature by 25 degrees.

Now that you know how to make Italian spaghetti sauce, Marinara, or meat sauce, you can go on to more varied Italian dishes. The easiest and probably most popular is "Baked Ziti". While Ziti type macaroni is traditional, I sometimes use large shells, ribbed spears and even wagon wheels.

You can make your sauce several days ahead and refrigerate. When preparation time comes, all you have to do is cook the macaroni and put everything together.

Baked Ziti

- 1 lb. container Ricotta
- 1/2 lb. Mozzarella - diced
- 1/2 cup grated Italian cheese
- 1 egg
- 1 lb. Ziti

1. Put pot up to boil for Ziti following package instructions but cutting down cooking time to half.
2. Select large baking pan and spoon in just enough sauce to cover bottom.
3. Into a large bowl, beat egg, and add all other ingredients except Ziti. Blend very well. Set aside.

4. Drain Ziti very well and put in baking pan. Pour ricotta mixture over top and mix in completely. Spoon sauce over top and blend in with rest of mixture till everything is pinkish orange. Spoon sauce over top and bake at 400° till bubbly, about 1/2 hour. Serve at once.

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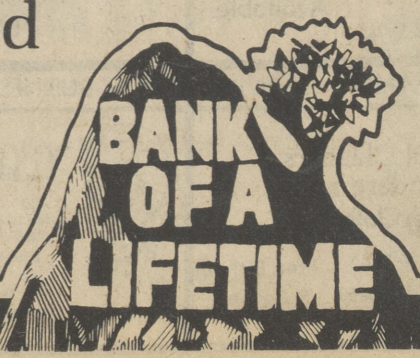

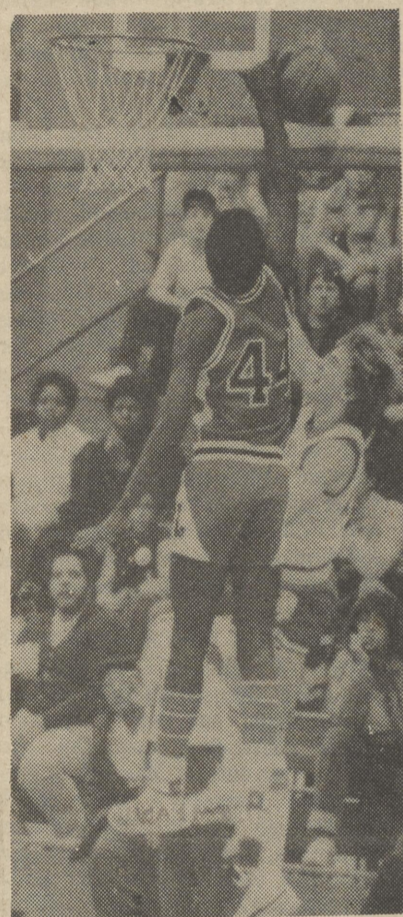

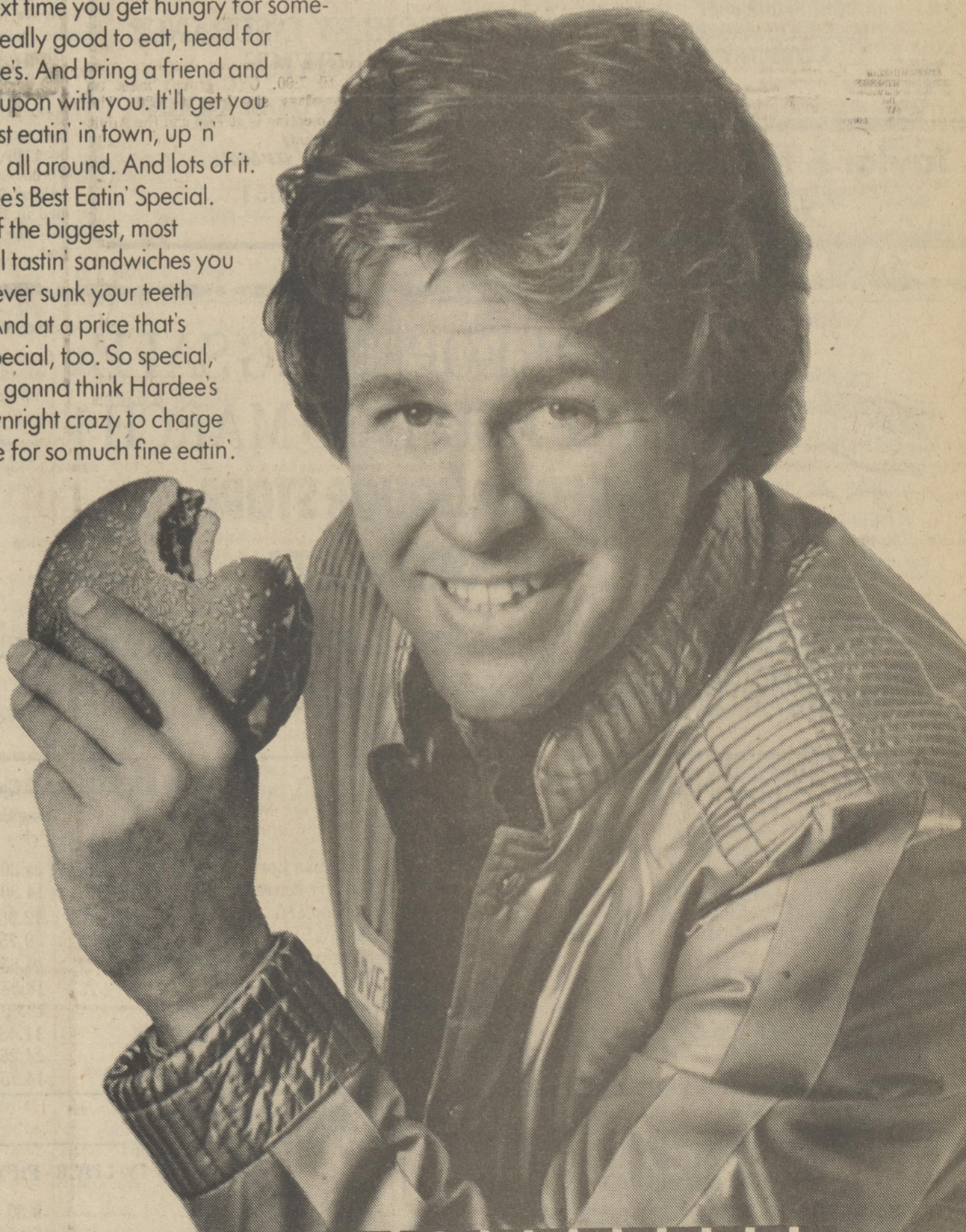

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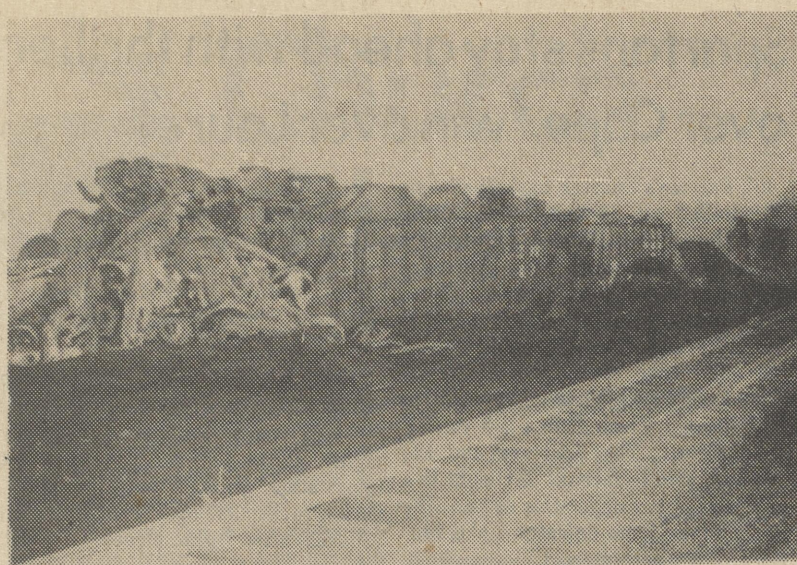
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Tom Holstein, right, of Harrington at the scene of the derailment over the weekend near Clayton.
