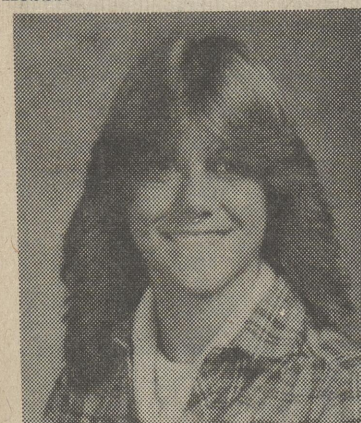

At a brief meeting last Wednesday the Frederica Town Council reorganized selecting officers for the year and swearing in three Council members voted in as a result of the March 1 election.

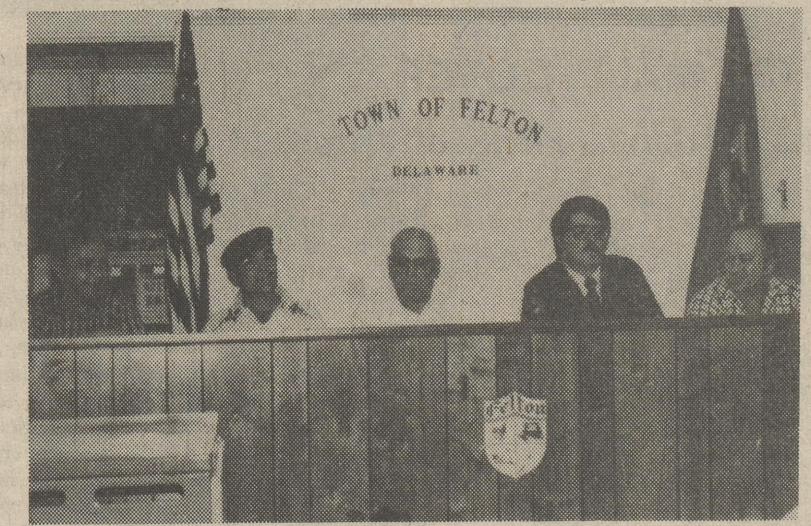
Those sworn in were Helen Powers

Verdict restores faith in jury system

The March 4th acquittal of former Division of Maintenance and Communication chief William H. Felty is seen by his attorney, A. Richard Barros, as a confirmation of his faith in the jury system. The jury deliberated for 1½ hours before finding Felty innocent of charges of theft, official misconduct, and falsification of reimbursement forms.

Regarding the seven day Superior Court trial Barros stated: "An honest man was found not guilty by a jury of his peers. The decision reinforces my faith in the jury system as a system which the Congress of the United States has considered altering, and a system which legislators have considered changing. But I believe in that system, and feel that Mr. Felty did receive a fair trial."

Will the block house disappear?

Harrington's block house, watchtower of railroad switching operations here for well over a half century, was closed to active operations in December. Now citizens are concerned that the historic structure itself may disappear. At a public hearing last week, Conrail official D.E. Schaefer, Philadelphia Division Superintendent, expressed his company's intention of demolishing the building. His comment, an aside in a meeting concerned with more immediate matters, caught the ears of a number of area residents who then approached the Greater Harrington Historical Society to see if something might be done to save the building.

Representing the Historical Society, Grace Welch approached the Harrington City Council Monday night with the problem. She said correspondence was underway from the society to the Delaware Historical Society, to the Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs, to Conrail through Schaefer's office, and to U.S. Senators Biden and Roth. The local historical society, which has undertaken a major project in the restoration of old St. Stephen's Church on Fleming Street, for use as a museum, does not feel financially capable of taking on another large scale effort. What it hopes will happen is that some interested group or combination of groups will come forward to shoulder the task. It also hopes that Conrail will be willing to listen to petitioners and perhaps to donate the building and sell a small plot of ground on which it stands to those who would be willing to maintain it for historical purposes. Mrs. Welch said she thought the height of the building and its substantial construction (It reportedly has walls which are two feet thick) would make it impossible to move to another site.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed that Conrail had made application for a permit to demolish the block house, but no action had been taken. The permit was awaiting the signature of the building inspector.

NOTE—It was learned on Tuesday that the city office had been in contact with Al Arnett in Conrail's Washington office and that the railroad company has agreed to wait thirty days before pursuing the matter further.

Citizens concerned for the preservation of the block house hope that it might remain standing as a visible reminder and even as museum to the railroad which was the catalyst in the formation of Harrington as well as of any number of other communities on Delmarva. Grace Welch says she is not sure just when it was first erected, but she has heard that it was "remodeled" in 1918, giving it an age of well over sixty years. Called an "anachronism" by Conrail officials last week, the building was probably one of the last, if not the last, of its kind in active service.

The Council seemed sympathetic to the problem as it approved Jack Wyatt's suggestion that the city set up a meeting with Conrail officials to discuss what might be done. Officers of the Historical Society would be invited to that meeting.

In other business in a meeting presided over by Jack Wyatt in his capacity as Vice Mayor and acting in the absence of Mayor Al Mann who was attending a symposium in Wisconsin:

—set Monday, March 22, as the date of the next workshop meeting. Workshop sessions are open to the public.

Peach Blossom 4-H wins honors

Peach Blossom 4-H Club, Farmington, has won top honors and a cash award for its outstanding conservation of natural resources program. County extension 4-H agent Marion MacDonald and club leader Ruth Ann Messick accepted a \$50 check provided by John Deere to recognize the club's efforts. The award will be used to further conservation activities among 4-H members.

The Peach Blossom 4-H Club is one of 15 programs across the nation to receive checks in the conservation awards program arranged by National 4-H Council. Winners were selected by the Cooperative Extension Service. Conservation plays a large role in the Peach Blossom 4-H Club's activities.

The club members conduct community clean-ups, make conservation posters, and present demonstrations on conservation themes. The club also obtains 500 pine seedlings a year from the Delaware Department of Agriculture, and the members plant them as windbreaks.

Members of the Peach Blossom 4-H Club learn about energy conservation and practice it at home. They also build and maintain bird feeders. And by collecting more than 2,000 pounds of old newspapers per week for recycling, they not only conserve trees, but also earn funds for their club treasury.

The 4-H conservation program is designed to encourage an understanding of effective citizenship in conserving resources for the future.

Newsstand to which representatives of the local civic clubs and area churches have been invited.

Should there be no interest in the continuation of Boy Scout activity for Harrington, the troop will be disbanded and the charter returned to the Council. It is hoped that this will not happen and that enough interest is manifest for its continued activity.

One dead, three injured in auto crash

Three Dover area girls were involved in an automobile accident that fatally injured one of them at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday evening, March 3rd.

Susan Krebel, 22, of 120½ W. Water Street in Dover was driving a 1974 AMC Matador east bound on Route 44, 2 miles east of Hartly with her sister, Deborah Ann Purcell, 20, of 49 Moores Drive, Magnolia and Deborah's sister-in-law, Margaret Purcell, 23 of D 33 Fairway Lane, Country Club Apartments in Dover, both riding in the front seat of the car with Susan Krebel.

The Krebel vehicle, for a yet undetermined reason, ran into the west bound traffic lane and into the tractor tires of an approaching tractor trailer, owned and driven by Jerry Humphries, 50, of R.D. Dover.

The Krebel car then spun into the rear tires of the tractor trailer and both Deborah Ann Purcell and Margaret Purcell were thrown from the vehicle onto the roadway as the car came to rest.

All three occupants in the Krebel car were taken from the scene of the accident by the Hartly Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance to the Kent General Hospital.

Susan Krebel was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital at 7 p.m. from apparent head injuries.

Deborah Ann Purcell was treated and released at the hospital for a laceration to her head and a broken ankle.

Margaret Purcell sustained no injuries that required treatment.

Jerry Humphries the operator of the tractor trailer, sustained no injury and was not transported to the hospital.

Delaware State Police Investigators from Troop 3 in Camden say that Susan

Krebel had been drinking at the time of the accident and that they believe this was a contributing factor in the crash.

None of the people in Susan Krebel's car were wearing seat belts at the time of the accident.

This raises Delaware's highway fatalities to 18 compared with 6 for the same period last year.

Two Games Complete Spartan Year

It's been a good year for the Spartans. That, despite the obvious disappointments of last week's two concluding games, has to be said. The 1981-82 basketball season saw Bill Falasco's Spartan basketball varsity come from an early season second place to take over first as they carried the banner of Southern Division Henlopen Conference Champs into the state tournament which started last weekend. It saw the standout performances of seniors Dale Benson (All Henlopen Conference First Team) and Kevin Moehlenkamp (All Henlopen Conference Third Team). Benson and Moehlenkamp led the Spartans in double figure scoring for most of the games. It saw the emergence of a fine, scrappy basketball player in the person of senior guard Tommy Dixon, a newcomer to the team, and the development of a number of fine young men, among them Jerom Scott, Darryl Tolson, Rodney Young, Tony Scott, Nelson Mosely, Brian Gladden and their teammates. It gave Spartan fans a lot of good basketball to watch. These things are not likely to be forgotten.

Spartans Yield Conference Championship to Cape
Last Wednesday night Lake Forest felt the sting of revenge as the Spartans went down to a well put together Viking five which gave Cape Henlopen its fourth straight Henlopen

Conference Championship. Earlier in the season, Lake Forest had upset the Northern Division champs, 61-55. Last week's game in the Seaford High gym was to prove a different story. After starting with a 6-2 lead early in the first quarter, the Spartans lost ground and fell behind. They were never able to make up the difference.

In the thir quarter the Spartans narrowed the gap to 40-34. But that was as close as they would get. Foul trouble, which seated both Dale Benson and Kevin Moehlenkamp in the fourth quarter, left the team apparently rudderless for the closing minutes.

Mohelenkamp, usually dependable under the boards, sat out a large part of the game after he accumulated three fouls in the first half. Benson played the majority of the game. But both fouled out late in the crucial fourth period.

While Lake Forest was running into foul trouble, Cape was putting up a defense that denied the Spartans inside shots. Dale Benson, high scorer for the Spartans and for the game good for 20 points, but even the Benson bombs were off their usual mark. The percentages and the final score - 71-57 - were in Cape's favor.

In addition to Benson, Tony Scott, with 12 points, was in double figures for the Spartans. Others scoring were

Kevin Moehlenkamp, 8; Tommy Dixon, 6; Jerome Scott, 5; Nelson Mosely, 4, and Rodney Young, 2.

Spartans 42, Rams 57

Falling behind in the first period as the Dickinson Rams jumped out to a nine point lead, the Spartans lost in the opening round of the boys' state tournament Saturday night. The final score in the game, which took place in the Milford High gym, was 57-42. The 15 point gap, however, is no clue to the overall game. LF girls compete in tournament

Pat Dyal's Spartan girls' varsity basketball squad carried its second place Henlopen honors into the state tournament over the weekend and came up with a win over Friends in the preliminary round on Friday plus a near upset of favored St. Elizabeths in the quarterfinals Monday night. The games complete a fine session for Lake Forest which started out running ahead of the pack only to see a mid-season slump in which three lost games dropped the team to third place. After that, the Spartans resumed their winning ways and concluded regular season play with a defeat of Delmar and an upset over Indian River to clinch second place and a state tournament berth.

Lake Forest 26, Friends 23

On Friday in the opening round of the state tournament, Lake Forest accomplished what it had been unable to pull off for the previous six years of tournament play--winning. Outlasting Friends in a slow paced waiting game the Spartans posted a 26-23 victory to progress to the quarterfinals.

During the game played on the Milford High court, a tight knit Spartan defense all but denied Friends close up access to the boards. No more than four points ever separated the two teams, but with the exception of a brief 19-19 tie in the final period, the Spartans held the lead from the outset.

They were just ahead 24-23 with one second to go when Stephanie Tolson took a pass from the sidelines to the hoop for a 26-23 final.

Spartan scorers were Lolita Seth, 7; Stephanie Tolson and Pam Harris 6 each; Dee Dee White, 4; and Pam Pierce 4.

St. Elizabeth's 62, Lake Forest 55

With the Spartans surviving their opening round game with a three point lead and St. Elizabeth's creaming A.I. DuPont 71-36 in the first round game, it might have been said that the results of the Lake Forest-St. Elizabeth's quarterfinal contest Monday were a foregone conclusion. No so. It is true that Lake Forest did lose 62-55, but it was not before the Spartans came very close to pulling off an upset victory over their upstate opponents.

The Spartans came from behind an 11-3 deficit to outscore St. Elizabeth's 15-13 in the first quarter and continued to dominate the game for the next two periods and carried the momentum to a fourteen point lead with 7:07 left in the game. But after foul trouble sent Lake Forest's Pam Harris to the bench, the stunned Vikings pulled their act together to score 29 points to the Spartans' 12 and take the game by a seven point margin.

Sophomore standouts Stephanie Tolson and Pam Pierce racked up 18 points each for the Spartans while Dee Dee White contributed double figures with 13 and Pam Harris with 6.

Pat Dyal has shepherded a young team that has shown a lot of talent this year. It's a bit early to look forward to 82-83 but only one starting senior, Lolita Seth, will be lost to the team. With a number of fine juniors, two outstanding sophomores and a freshman who played varsity ball this year plus a starting five from a JV squad that posted an 8-2 season, the prospects look exciting.

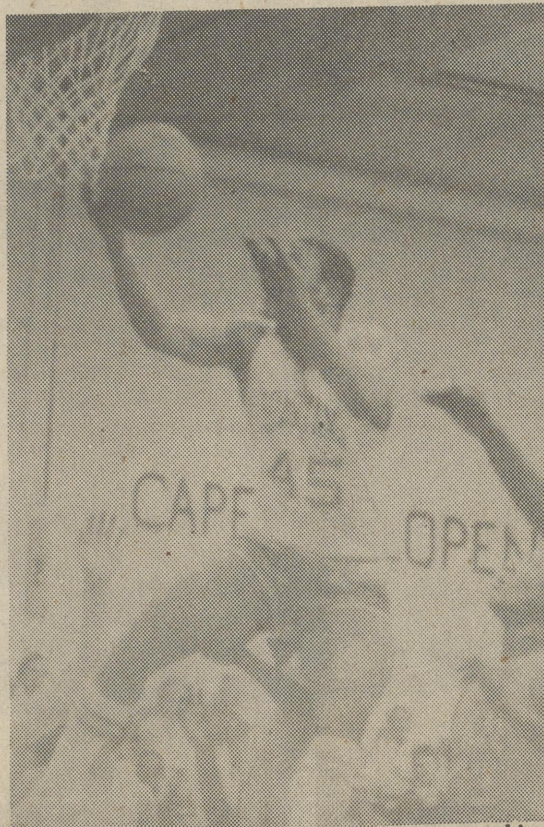

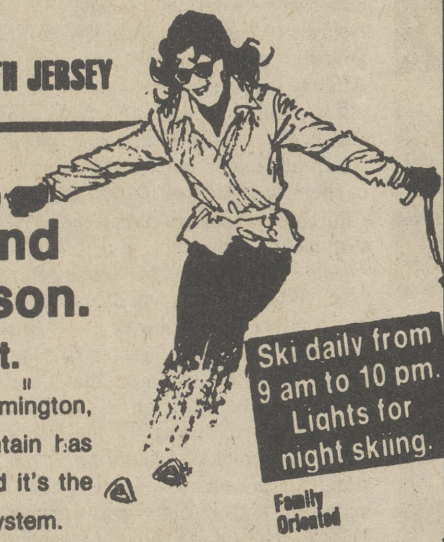
Spartan Pam Pierce gets off a shot in the state tournament game against Friends.

Anne's Kitchen

Most of the sauce and pasta dishes in this series have been on the heavy side. I think it's time we tried something a little lighter and quite different. By now you are an old pro at the sauces, but just to keep things simple you will only have to make the first step of the sauce and cook to the "Marinara Sauce" stage. This gourmet delight is called "Shrimp Marinara in Verdi". Verdi in Italian means green and it is to green noodles that I refer.

Shrimp Marinara in Verdi

1 recipe Marinara sauce
1 lb. medium size shrimp (fresh is best)
1/2 lb. green noodles, made with spinach
1/8 teaspoon dried red pepper.

1. Have your Marinara sauce cooked and ready.

2. If using fresh shrimp peel and devein. If using frozen shrimp, defrost, rinse and set aside. Do not cook!

3. Add 8 teaspoon dried red pepper to sauce. Bring sauce up to almost boiling stage, being careful not to burn. Add raw shrimp to sauce and continue cooking till shrimp are cooked, about 15-20 minutes.

4. Meanwhile cook green noodles according to package instructions, drain very well and place on large deep platter. Put some sauce over top and toss till all noodles are coated. Add more sauce and remove shrimp with a slotted spoon and place on top of noodles. Sprinkle generously with fresh minced Italian parsley.

Save remaining sauce for those who like extra. A one dish meal you will like I'm sure.

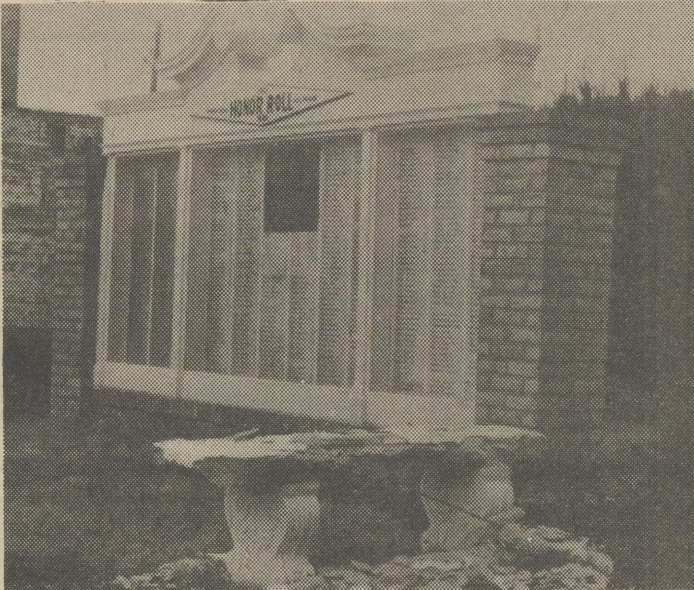
