Harringtonians to sing in South Pacific

After auditions last month, it was announced that nine Harringtonians had been awarded roles in the Broadway musical, "South Pacific" to be performed by Dover's Singing Players on May 6, 7, and 8. Actually twelve locals were chosen but three dropped out later.

Brenda Collison who starred in "Annie Get Your Gun" and "The Music Man" as Annie Oakley and Marian Paroo, the librarian, respectively won her third lead role, that of Nellie Forbush.

Matt Burgess, who was the male lead, Frank Butler in "Annie Get Your Gun" also had the top role of Sky Masterson in "Guys and Dolls" and played the role of Lun Tha, one of the young lovers in "The King and I" Matt will be Lt. Joe Cable in "South Pacific."

Keith Burgess, Harrington's "singing mailman" was in all the above musicals except "The King and I" and also was Dr. Grimwig in "Oliver." He's most proud of his role in "The Music Man" in which he was the tenor in the quartet, that sang five numbers.

Dale Jarrell, who has performed in concert with Dover's Community Singers and Singing Players will be making his debut "on the boards" as will his cousin, David Jarrell.

Asbury Church choir director, Jim Alson and Nancy Yost of Houston are other making their Dover dramatic debuts.

Darin Dell is only 16, but has been acting in Dover since 1976 and has had key roles in production by at least three different theatre groups. Gean Martin, a Harrington newcomer, also sang for the Singing Players, in 1976 and again last year.

Everyone mentioned thus far, except for Collison and Martin are involved in the music program at Asbury United Methodist Church here. Anyone interested in seeing South Pacific can get tickets from any cast member.

Almost unnoticed, Harrington has gradually been building a backlog of theatrical talent. There are almost 40 locals, who have appeared in musicals and this does not count high school productions.

Cathy Miller Wetherhold, an accomplished singer-actress had leads in both Finian's Rainbow and in "The Sound of Music." Harrington's mayor, Al Mann was in "The Music Man" and "Most Happy Fella."

Louis Divel of Farmington is another with a history of key roles for at least three Dover groups. Former Harrington resident, Tom Herholdt, who still works here had the lead in "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown."

The list goes on. The talented trio of Mason sisters, Aleta, Joan, and Mary Jean, once performed as "The Andrew Sisters" in addition to other roles.

Other local thespians, some of whom

had important roles were: Penny Galentine, Walt Bishop, Jackie Russell, Tom Clarke, John Morris, Roger Friffin, Fred Greenley III, Teresa Smith Thompson, Mary Ellen Simpson Grinolds, who is with the Possum Point Players at Millsboro, Don Dell, Bertha Belle Neeman Ennis, Imogene Welch Kramedas, Gary "Punky" Harrington and Cheryl Hamsher Harrington, Ronnie and Charlyne Hughes, Sharon Fry and Linda Collins.

Lake Forest High School's new auditorium seats over 1,000 people and is slightly larger than the facility at Dover Central Middle School, where most plays are performed.

The cost of putting on one of these plays at the high school would be prohibitive, but the talent is here, and the seats are there, and we have not touched on the fact that a number of Felton and Frederica people have sung, danced, and acted in musicals, also.

So if "Oklahoma" or some other Broadway blockbuster is still years away from being performed locally, Dover is close and we urge you to support the efforts of the Harrington people performing there.

If we have overlooked anyone from Harrington with acting performance in musicals, not counting high school, let us know and we will list them later.

Area parents speak out on student transfers

A crowd of well over 75 parents and other concerned residents showed up at the Monday night meeting of the Lake Forest School Board to take part in a discussion of proposed solutions to the over-crowded situation at Lake Forest East Elementary School in Frederica. The building there was designed to accommodate 350 students, but now houses 4. The board will make a decision on the alternatives at its March meeting.

The school board had moved its March meeting site to the gym in the Frederica school to make it easier for residents to voice their opinions on the

options under consideration or to offer their own solutions.

In addition to parents with children at LF East, there was an equally vocal group representing LF North in Felton. If either one of two proposals receiving serious attention is chosen, Felton would stand to get nearly all the students transferred from Frederica.

One suggestion is to move 70-90 children out of LF East by redrawing geographic boundaries and relocating students across grade levels. Another is to move the entire sixth grade, projected for next year, to be about 72 students out of the school. Other

suggestions included doing nothing, getting trailer classrooms from the State Department of Public Instruction (there aren't any available Dr. Powell reported), and launching a building program.

Complicating the matter is the fact that geographic lines were redrawn several years ago to give Frederica the additional students it then needed. It got 125 from North. Now North, which once had over 900 students is down to about 650, and Frederica is crowded. If boundary lines are redrawn, students who were moved before may be moved again.

According to East Principal Richard Seyler, redrawing its lines would move students, but would not guarantee freeing the classrooms he needs.

Surprisingly silent were those parents whose children would be most directly affected if the sixth grade is moved, those children in this year's fifth grade.

Frederica parents did express a number of concerns:

Bonnie Blades, an East parent, asked about the length of the bus ride for sixth graders who would be going to Felton. According to transportation supervisor Ray Stoops it would be about 55 minutes. That's not an abnormally long route," he said.

If the sixth graders are moved, would they be kept together as a group? Classes, according to Dr. Powell, would be organized to serve the learning needs of students. There would be no Felton/Frederica grouping.

Rosalyn Pierce another East parent, worried that moving the sixth grade might mean "...throwing the baby out with the wash water." The current fifth grade, she noted, has one of the highest California Achievement Test scores in the state. She also asked if teachers would move with the students.

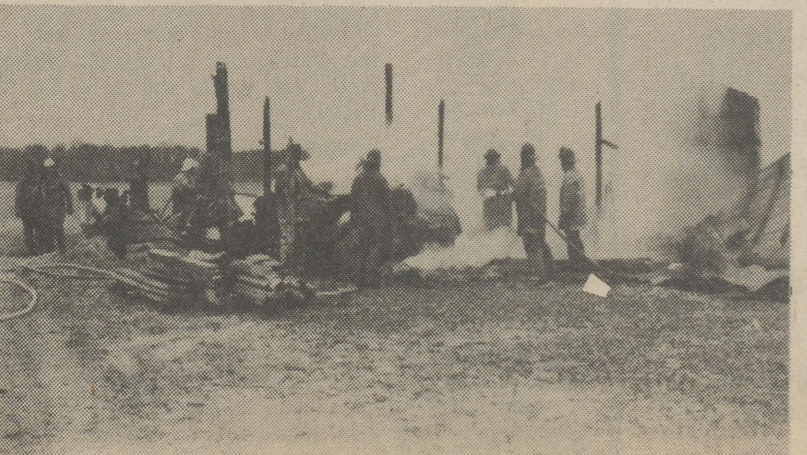
Others worried about continuity programs between the two schools.

Only two alternative solutions were mentioned by parents or others in attendance. One parent suggested art or even music might be eliminated to relieve the situation. The art and music teachers at present share parts of the

The getaway car got it. This brown Mustang lies in a field west of Harrington in the aftermath of a high speed chase Monday afternoon that took its driver, Richard P. Mitchell, formerly of Harrington first to the hospital and then to jail. The car flipped six times after failing to negotiate an intersection as Mitchell fled police. He was first observed by a Harrington Police officer who was stopped at the intersection of Center and Dorman Sts near the Chipman School. The officer initially saw a group of youngsters scattering in all directions and then the Mustang sliding broadside down County Rt. 275, Center St. He hailed the car and approached it on foot when the driver seemed ready to pull over. At that point Mitchell took off and the officer gave chase travelling north past the school on County Rte. 78 travelling at speeds in excess of 90 miles an hour. The Mustang hit a ditch at the intersection of 98 and Co. Rte. 284 and 289. The car flipped into the air and rolled six times before coming to rest in the field. Although he was thrown out of the car, Mitchell was able to walk away from the wreck. He was later taken to Milford Memorial where he was treated for lacerations, contusions and a sore chest. Released, he was incarcerated while awaiting arrangement scheduled for Tuesday morning. Mitchell was to be charged by the Harrington P.D. with driving while suspended, reckless driving, failure to stop on the command of a police officer, and running a stop sign. He was further to be charged by Delaware State Police with reckless driving and having no insurance.

The Lake Forest School will be promoting physical fitness for students through a JUMP ROPE FOR HEART. 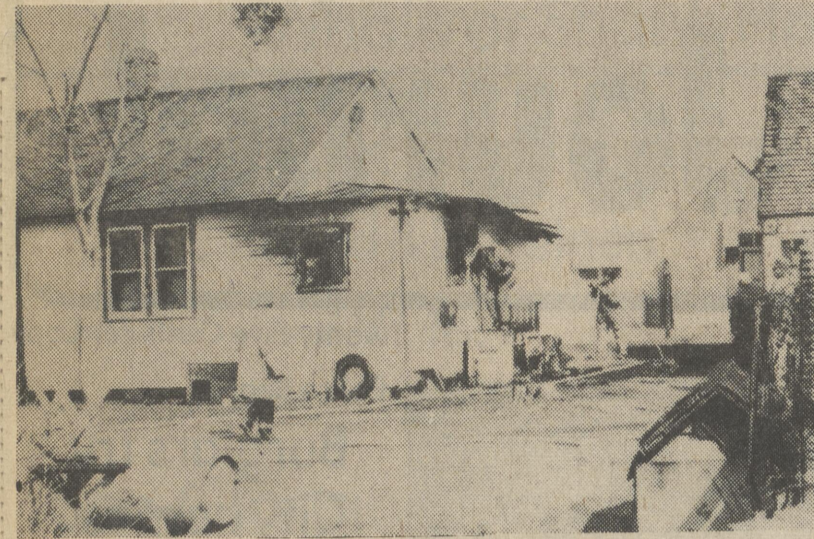

Heard or Seen Around the Cracker Barrel

Eddie Taylor, Taylor's Hardware, starts his 48th year as head of that company this year. That's a long time in one spot...but that is the mark of a successful business. There will be more on that later.

Rep. Ruth Ann Minner broke silence and issued a statement recently concerning legislation on finfishing. She urges Rep. Gwynne Smith to hold public hearings on the proposed legislation. She points out that one of the most controversial parts of the proposed legislation is the fact that it gives the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control the right to set up future rules and regs...and also the area of license fees.

Tommy Eliason of near Harrington, son of Billy and Margaretta Eliason of near Harrington has been accepted to Potomac State College. He will major in agriculture. Potomac State is a junior college branch of West Virginia Univ.

Sen. Wm. Roth, the senior U.S. Senator from Delaware has sent a letter to President Reagan urging him to cease and desist sending more troops into El Salvador.

The Dept. of Natural Resources and Environmental Control has filed suit against DP & L for allowing fly ash from its Indian River plant to blow onto nearby properties on Jan. 10. Investigation revealed that the gray dust clouds that day was due to the fact the water trucks normally used to wet the fly ash with a chemical to prevent blowing were not in operation on that day. It is a violation and can result in a fine of \$1,000 to \$10,000. The case is in Kent County Superior Court.

Senator Roth will again sponsor a Senior Citizen program in D.C. this year. It is designed to give older Americans an opportunity to see government working. If interested contact Maurice Tippet, Division of Aging New Castle, Del (302-421-6791).

Senator Roth has sent a letter to the Reagan Administration expressing his opposition to any introduction of American combat forces in El Salvador.

Gov. duPont has instituted a plan to help the mentally retarded to be able to develop and function in "the community" throughout the state. It is a tying together of the services.

The Public Service Commission has directed D.P.&L. to institute an in house complaint department for responding to customers who dispute their bills. It must first be investigated by DP&L before reaching the Commission. The fuel adjustment hearings on DP&L have been delayed to late April. Roland Hastings retires as PSC head and is succeeded by Donald Jacobs of Seaford who spent 39 years with duPont.

But duPont says it will not sell teflon finishes to any ammo makers who produce or develop armor-piercing bullets for sale to the public. One...fulminate of mercury...the devastator...explodes at the slightest contact.

Southern State Cooperative held its regional board conference for local agricultural leaders and young farmers at Delmar, Md. Feb 18th. William Vanderwende of Bridgeville chaired the meeting. Reported that sales were down for same period a year before. Other board members and young farmers attending were Michael Bullock and mark Cain...from this area.

Gov. duPont recently released his 1983 budget...\$714 million. Proposes to spend \$330 million for education; \$144 million for public health; \$60 million for roads, and \$40 million for prisons.

Homer W. Torbert has been chosen 1981 Outstanding Cooperator by the Board of Supervisors of the Kent Conservation district. Mr. Torbert manages 300 acres plus near Frederica. KANSAS CITY, MO - Dr. Zosimo A. Buendia has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

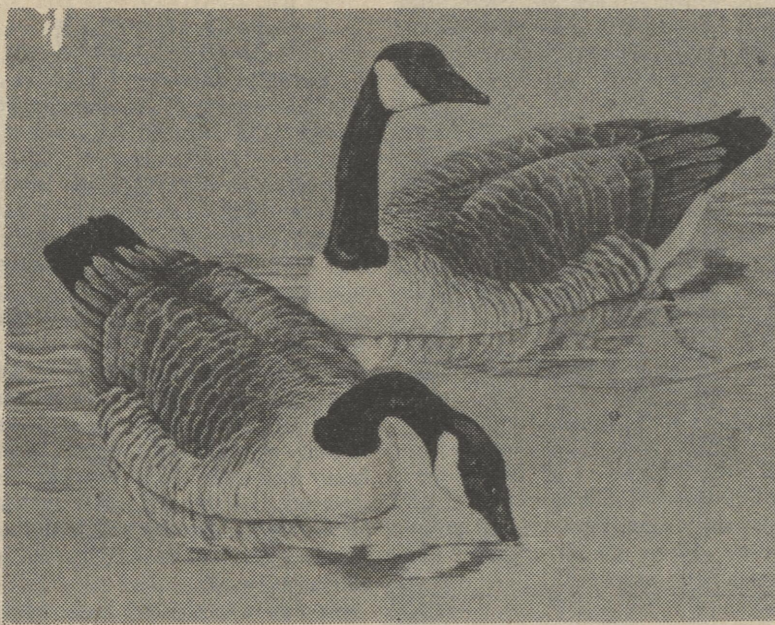

Butler Wins Duck Stamp Contest

Lois Butler, a Newark resident, came up a winner on Thursday night when her print was chosen by a panel of five judges as the piece of art that will illustrate the 1982 Delaware Migratory Waterfowl Stamp.

Butler's winning entry features two Canada geese and was chosen from over 60 entries. Butler, who has a degree in art from Kutztown State College in Pennsylvania, is a graphic designer for the College of Marine Studies at the University of Delaware. Her print will now adorn the face of the 1982 Delaware Duck Stamp which is required of all licensed hunters in order to hunt waterfowl within the state. Proceeds from the sale of the stamp, which costs five dollars, is used for habitat improvement within Delaware and on nesting areas in Canada.

The winning artist receives a cash award of \$5000 and 150 artist proofs of the limited edition print series. The

State retains all reproduction rights to the piece of art, which will be reproduced in a signed and numbered limited edition. The market for those limited edition prints is a national one and the demand for the prints can best be described as brisk. The prints have proven to be one of the best investments available, with their value escalating, far outstripping the inflation rate.

The unit count (the number of teachers justified by the enrollment) would make the difference.

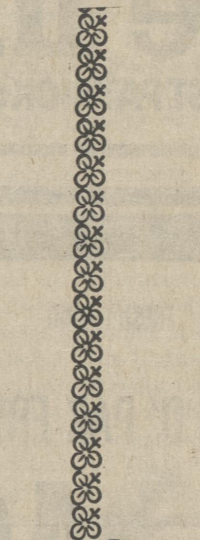
Powell also revealed that a team from the State Department of Public Instruction will visit Lake Forest North to see how the building can be used if students are transferred.

East Principal Richard Seyler, who used a series of charts to demonstrate enrollment figures projected through 1985, said there was no firm basis for expecting any population increase in the Frederica area.

Two Frederica parents, one of them Carol Reid, supported moving the sixth grade rather than redrawing district lines and shifting younger children who might have to be moved again. A positive attitude on the part of parents, Mrs. Reid contended, will make all the difference. The incoming sixth graders, she said, can handle the change.

The school board listened and will decide at its April 12 meeting.

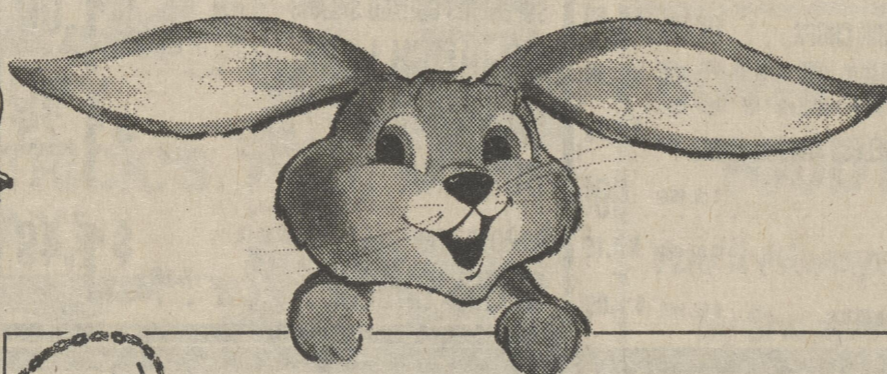

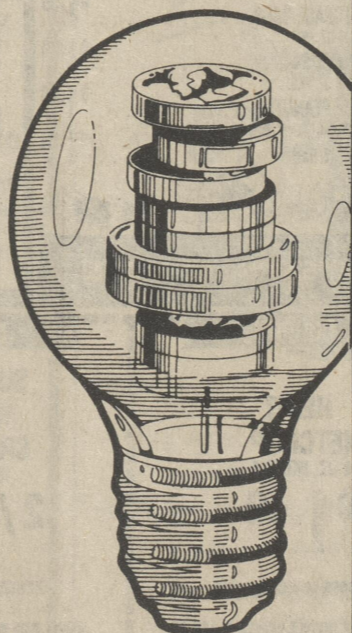

REV THOMAS TURKINGTON, SR. METHODIST MINISTER, Dies at 87

The Rev. Thomas John Turkington, Sr., a Methodist minister in Denton, Md., since 1931, died Friday in his home in Denton.

The Rev. Turkington, 87, was born in Portadown, Northern Ireland, and came to the United States in 1913 at the urging of his uncle, The Rev. Albert J. Turkington, also a Methodist minister, who had emigrated from Northern Ireland several years before.

He entered into evangelistic work with his uncle as song leader for the "Turkington Evangelic Party." He was awarded U.S. citizenship as an enlistee in the U.S. Army during World War I, when he was stationed in France. After the war he again went into evangelistic service, traveling throughout the country, then attended Westminster, Md., Theological Seminary, graduating in 1922.

He served as pastor of Chincoteague, Va., Methodist Protestant Church from 1922 to 1925, West Wilmington Methodist Protestant Church from 1925 to 1926, and First Methodist Protestant Church in Washington, D.C., from 1926 to 1931, before becoming pastor of Grace Methodist Protestant Church, later Grace Methodist Church in Denton in 1931. He served in that capacity until he retired in 1960, when Grace Methodist Church merged with First Methodist Church of Denton to form St. Luke's United Methodist Church. But he continued to serve as an associate pastor of St. Luke's until last year.

He was a hunting and nature enthusiast. He also collected canes and antiques firearms and swords.

His wife, Juanita Turkington, died in 1973. He is survived by four sons, T.J. "Bud" Turkington Jr. of Hughes Springs, Texas; William David Turkington II of Princess Anne, Md.; Harry Albert Turkington of Denton, and Robert Paul Turkington of Easton, Md.; two daughters, Emma Shehan of Salisbury, Md., and Juanita Jean Turkington of Portsmouth, Va.; a brother,

The Rev. William David Turkington of Denton; a sister, Sadie Forde of Portadown; 11 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

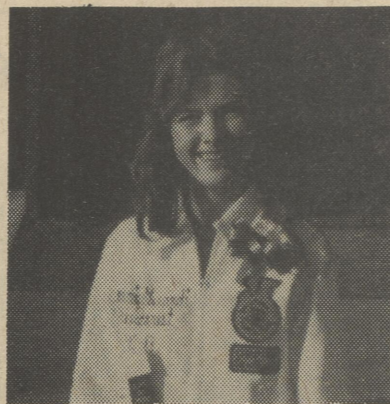

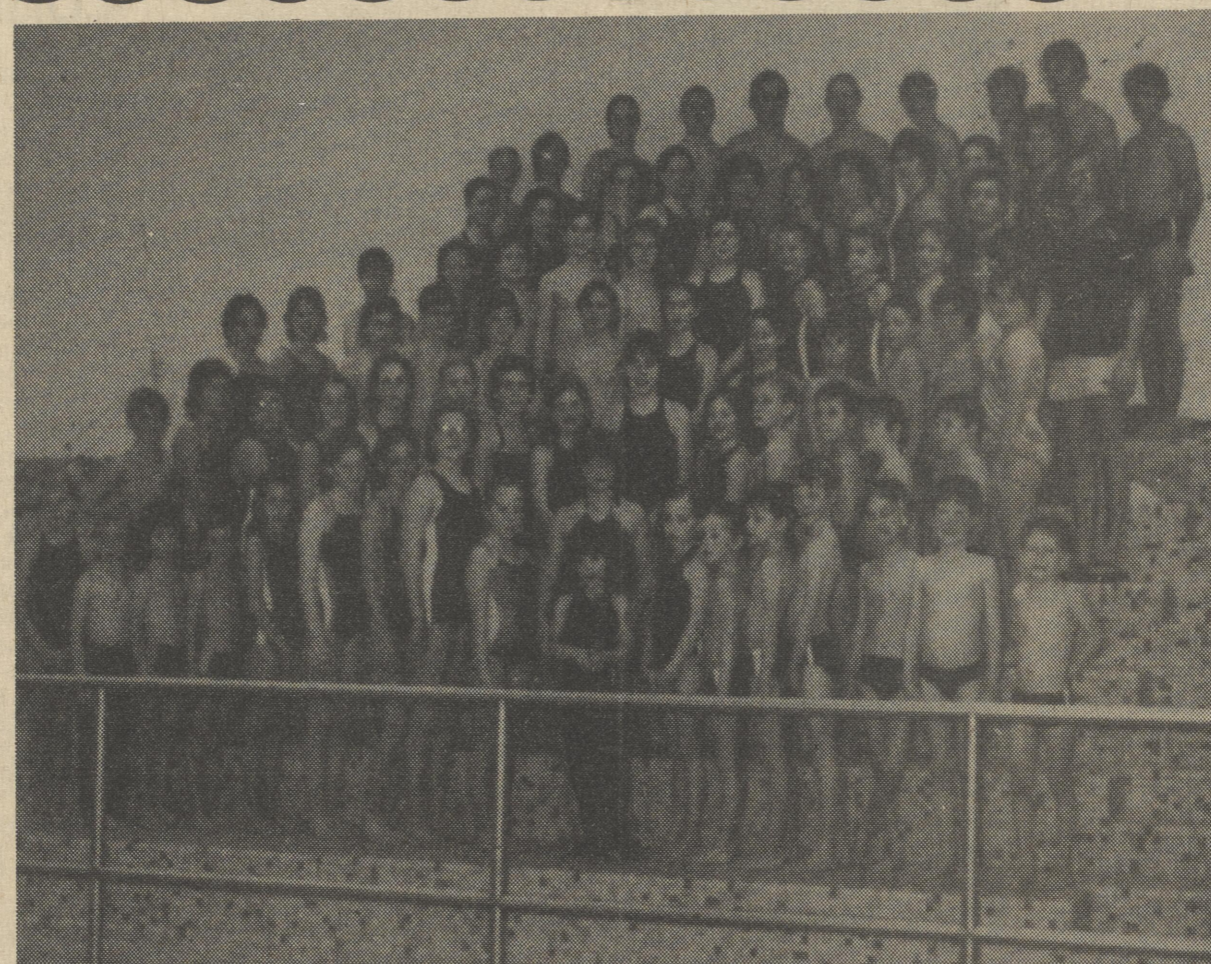

CITY OF HARRINGTON ADOPTED AMENDMENT
 Adopted by Council 8 March 1982

Section 11 (E) city manager

The City Manager shall be neither the Mayor or member of Council. He/she may or may not be a resident of the City of Harrington. He/she shall hold office for such term and at such compensation as Council may determine. He/she shall collect any and all taxes, assessment any liens which may be levied or assessed by Council, collect all bills due and owing the City for water or in any other manner, and shall also perform any and other duties prescribed by the Council. He/she shall recommend to Council the employment of such employees and agents of the City as in his/her judgement may be necessary for the proper and diligent performances by him/her of all the above duties; and shall render to Council a monthly report of the condition of City affairs under his/her management together with such recommendations as he/she may deem proper including budgeted or probable expenditures. He/she shall render to Council on the first day of each and every month a true, accurate, and detailed account of all monies collected or by him/her received in performance of his/her duties, and shall promptly turn over the same to the Treasurer of the City. He/she shall file with the City Council a bond with corporate surety in the sum of \$5,000 approved and paid for by Council, for the faithful performance of his/her duties.

CITY OF HARRINGTON ADOPTED AMENDMENT TO CITY CHARTER
 Insertion of Paid Annually to Adopted by Council 8 March 1982

Section 14 Paragraph 2

All taxes when, paid annually and as collected by the City Manager shall be paid to the City Treasurer and all taxes shall be due and payable at and from the time of delivery of the tax list to the City Manager. A discount shall be allowed by the City Manager of three percent on every tax paid before the first day of May in each year; of 2 percent on every tax paid before the first day of June in each year; of one percent on every tax paid before the first day of July in each year and to every tax paid after the thirtieth day of September, no discount shall be allowed by the City Manager, and to every tax paid after the thirtieth day of September in each year, there shall be added and collected one per centum for every month or fraction of a month after the said thirtieth day of September that the said tax remains unpaid. Before exercising any of the powers herein given for collection of taxes, notice shall be given to the taxable of the amount due. Addition of Section 14 (A - 1)

The City Manager shall, by agreement with taxables of real property, collect taxes on a quarterly basis, capitulation tax excluded. Under a quarterly tax payment no discount shall be allowed. Under the quarterly tax payment any taxes 30 days or more over-due for any quarter will become due and payable in full and all remaining taxes shall be subject to collection as provided in section 14 A thru 14 E of the charter of the City of Harrington.

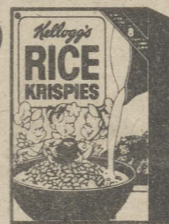

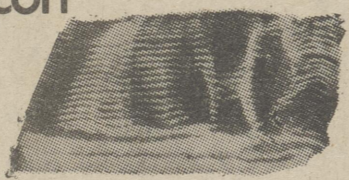

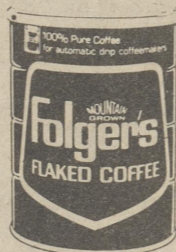
