John Walton, President of the Delaware Farm Bureau, focused on the ecconomic plight of the farmer in an address before the Praye Breakfast sponsored by the Harrington Jaycees Sunday morning. Walton, who also touched on his Christian foundations, told the assembly of about 28 persons that farmers are under increasing pressures which may lead some to serious consideration of selling their farms and investing the money in high interest bearing certificates of deposit.

Local arrest solves Ga. murder

The Harrington Police did more than apprehend a burglar when they assisted in the arrest of Jamie Burden last summer at the Delaware State Fair. since been convicted in the deaths of a mother and her three children.It was learned recently that Burden was found guilty in Washington County, Georgia of the 1974 multiple murder and sentenced to the electric chair. He was picked up at the fairgrounds here on a fugitive warrant on the buglary charge. However, he was also wanted for questioning in connection with the homocides. Burden, employed by the was arrested here on August 2. 1981.

The action of local police in cooperation with the FBI thus resulted in the solution of a muder case which had been under investigation since August 13, 1973, when Louise Wynn and her three Children - James Lamar, 2; Marvin 3, and Melinda, 4 - were killed. ones were simply thrown into the pond and left to drown. The quadruple murder, which happened near Sandersville, Ga., was the subject of an immediate and intensive investigation, but according to Deputy Sheriff Mack Rogers, of Washington County, no suspects had been turned up. The case remained open, but there was no progress until May 1981 when an informer reported a confession.

That informer was Henry Lee "Acid" Dixon, a relative of Burden's, who told Georgia authorities the man had threatened him with a single barred shotgun an warned him not to tell the

Dixon complied with the request, leaving Burden, Wynn and the children at the pond and then driving off to visit his own girlfriend.

On the way back he encountered Burden who was walking alone. When Dix on asked where Louise and her children were, Burden confessed that he had "messed up." He put the single barrel shotgun to Dixon's head and threatened him with death if he ever revealed the information. Dixon was charged in the case, but those charges were later

Once Dixon had come forth with his information, the Georgia authorities were able to intensify the investgation. Ms. Wynn had been hit in the head and They learned that Burden, who had the state and who was wanted on the burglry charge, was in Delaware and would be at a certain place on a certain date. At that point, the assistance of the Harrington police became the crucial factor. Burden was picked up at the fairgrounds without' incident and returned to Georgia. Deputy Sheriff Rogers said that Burden never offically confessed to the crime, but that the testimony of Dixon and other evidence in the case apparently convinced the jury.







1 tablespoon lard

1/2 cup water

1. Combine all ingredients except onion, chopped garlic, lard and water and marinate overnight.

2. When ready to cook, brown slowly the onion and two cloves of chopped garlic in one tablespoon of lard in stew

3. Add the marinated meat, reserving marinade, and let it brown slowly and thoroughly.

4. Strain the marinade and add to the meat 1/4 cup at a time, letting it evaporate before adding the next liquid until all is used.

5. Add water, cover and cook about 1 hour or till meat is tender.



all town and country. Many of you who strive for an area of perfection in an emerald green lawn entirely free from dandelions will wage that battle also.

Now, when I say this, you will know how really weird I am. If I had a beautiful lawn I would not mind the dandelions at all. Those small golden buttons are pretty dotted over an ciety. emerald green lawn! Oh, well, "Nobody's perfect" and not everybody's

The dandelion is a wonderful weed and we do not make half enough use of it. It comes from the Middle English name "Dent-de-lion" which comes from the Old French translation of the Medival Latin, "den leonis" which means "lions tooth" and may allude to the sharply indented toothlike leaves of the plant

My grandfather Bennett was a great one to make dandelion wine which he guaranteed to benefit the liver and to cure rheumatism. Keats, I believe, "It maketh glad the heart of a man." Maybe so. Personally, I do not drink wine, so I'm not interested.

Dandelion "greens" are popular in Delaware and in the south. My friend, Mary, was so fond of them, and I ate them at her house, but they are a bit bitter for my taste. In the south, where I lived for a couple of years, all types of herb greens, etc. are called sallet. For a time I did not know what the grocers were trying to sell me. They would point to the spinach or the collards and say, "How about some nice sallet this morning? I though they were trying to say, salad.
