Roger Wix suffers crushing injuries in RR mishap

condition Tuesday after a Thursday train. morning accident in which the 38-yearold Conrail employee was rolled and crushed between the cars of a stationary and a moving coal train in the Harrington yards. Admitted to ted that Wix was found lying between Milford Memorial Hospital where he was transported by State Police helicopter, his condition was listed as critical. He suffered eleven crushed ribs, a broken collar bone and various internal injuries. On Tursday night he underwent surgery for the removal of his spleen. As of Tuesday morning, hospital spokesman said he was still in serious condition in the intensive care unit.


The accident apparently occurred as back of the engine. As the moving train way to Milford Memorial hospital. passed a stationary one in an area where there is a very narrow clearance between the tracks, he was somehow caught and rolled between the cars. Wix's presence of mind plus the fact that he was equipped with a radio may have saved his life. As he fell or after he fell between the tracks he was able

Assistant Fire Chief Bob Taylor, officer in charge at the scene, said the Kent County Call Board reported immediately that the new state police helicopter was already in the air. As of this writing, Tuesday, Conrail had issued no official statement on the mishap. It was deemed likely that there will be coninuing investigation by the railroad company as well as by federal regulatory agencies including FRA and OSHA.

So far in 1981-82 Connie has won numerous FFA honors including being voted chapter Sweetheart and being selected first runner up in the state FFA Sweetheart contest held at the annual convention last month. Just recently she represented Lake Forest in the Presidential Classroom held in Washton, D.C. Later this year she will be a participant in Girls State.

Area man jailed in murder plot

Former Harrington resident and businessman Kenneth G. Aiken, 56, was jailed recently after he reportedly made a \$2,500 down payment on his son-in-law's murder.

Aiken was arrested in a Winchester, Virginia motel room on March 26 after state police there heard a taped transaction during which Aiken delivered the \$2,500 to an unidentified private citizen who had tipped them off: The money was allegedly the initial payment on a \$10,000 fee to be paid for the murder of Joseph B Chopek, of Vienna Virginia. Chopek is the estranged husband of Aiken's daughter Debbie.






