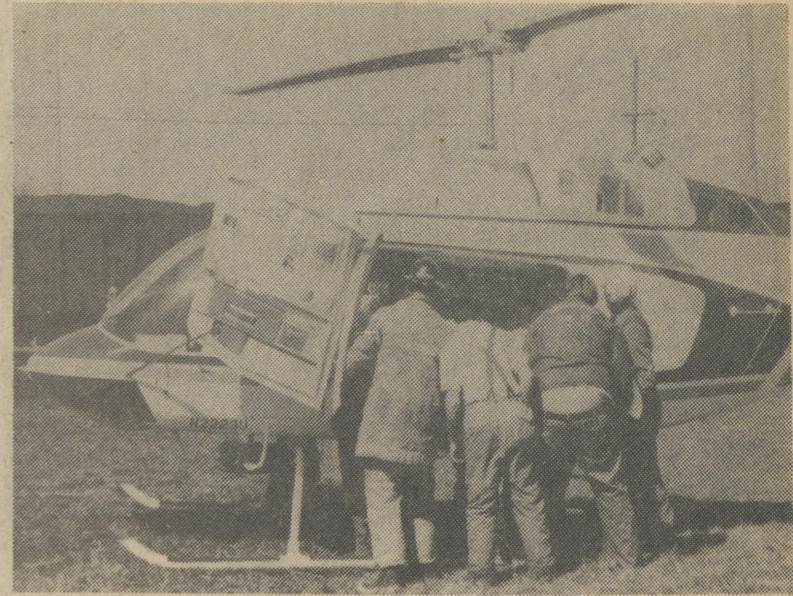




Conrail trainmaster Joe Morris and two rescue workers check on Roger Wix's condition as they prepare to move him.

Roger Wix suffers crushing injuries in RR mishap

Roger Wix was still listed in serious condition Tuesday after a Thursday morning accident in which the 38-year-old Conrail employee was rolled and crushed between the cars of a stationary and a moving coal train in the Harrington yards. Admitted to Milford Memorial Hospital where he was transported by State Police helicopter, his condition was listed as critical. He suffered eleven crushed ribs, a broken collar bone and various internal injuries. On Tuesday night he underwent surgery for the removal of his spleen. As of Tuesday morning, hospital spokesman said he was still in serious condition in the intensive care unit.

The accident apparently occurred as Wix, a brakeman, was riding on the end of a coal car about 42 to 45 cars back of the engine. As the moving train passed a stationary one in an area where there is a very narrow clearance between the tracks, he was somehow caught and rolled between the cars.

Wix's presence of mind plus the fact that he was equipped with a radio may have saved his life. As he fell or after he fell between the tracks he was able

to radio the engineer of the moving train.

A Conrail official, the Harrington Police and the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company were on the scene within minutes. The local police reported that Wix was found lying between the tracks, bleeding at the mouth and obviously in very serious condition.

The quick and trained responses of local emergency personnel may have also been a factor in Wix' favor. Assistant Fire Chief Bob Taylor, officer in charge at the scene, said the Kent County Call Board reported immediately that the new state police helicopter was already in the air. The crew was signaled to come right away and was very shortly setting the helicopter down in Harrington. Within minutes, Wix was on board and on his way to Milford Memorial hospital.

As of this writing, Tuesday, Conrail had issued no official statement on the mishap. It was deemed likely that there will be continuing investigation by the railroad company as well as by federal regulatory agencies including FRA and OSHA.

Area man jailed in murder plot

Former Harrington resident and businessman Kenneth G. Aiken, 56, was jailed recently after he reportedly made a \$2,500 down payment on his son-in-law's murder.

Aiken was arrested in a Winchester, Virginia motel room on March 26 after state police there heard a taped transaction during which Aiken delivered the \$2,500 to an unidentified private citizen who had tipped them off. The money was allegedly the initial payment on a \$10,000 fee to be paid for the murder of Joseph B. Chopek, of Vienna, Virginia. Chopek is the estranged husband of Aiken's daughter Debbie.

Special Agent R.D. Grimes, head of the state police criminal investigation bureau in Culpeper, Va., said the informer, an unnamed West Virginia

man, had reported being contacted by discuss the proposed killing.

The meeting during which the \$2,500 payment was made was secretly taped. It resulted in Aiken's arrest on a charge of soliciting a felony (murder).

Grimes, who said the matter is still under investigation, declined to speculate on a possible motive for the murder plot which was never carried out.

Aiken was held in Frederick County jail, but later freed on \$20,000 bond. Arraignment is set for April 14.

Currently a resident of Springfield, Virginia, Aiken once made his home on Weiner Avenue in Harrington where he operated Aiken Oil Company at the present site of Ocean Fresh Seafood on U.S. 13. At one time he was also involved in the real estate business in the Seaford area.

Motorcyclist badly hurt

Michael C. Outten, 19, of near Harrington remained in serious condition Tuesday morning in the Delaware Division of Wilmington Medical Center after a Monday morning crash in which his motorcycle slammed into the rear end of a tractor trailer on the Whiteleysburg Road, just west of Harrington.

State Police at Troop 3, Camden said the two vehicles, a 1981 Peterbilt tractor trailer driven by James R. Vane of R.D. 2, Harrington and owned by Greensboro Supply Company and Outten's 1979 Harley Davidson motorcycle, were traveling east on County Route 59 about 6:18 a.m. Monday when Outten for some reason failed to see

the truck ahead of him and crashed into its back end.

Outten was taken by Harrington ambulance to Milford Memorial Hospital where he was listed in critical condition and transferred to the Delaware Division.

State police, who say the fact that he was wearing a helmet saved his life, reported that Outten suffered a concussion and a collapsed lung.

Hospital authorities said yesterday morning that although he had regained consciousness, he was still listed in serious condition in the surgical intensive care unit.

Michael Outten is the son of Clifford and Eloise Outten of Harrington.

Houston swears in new mayor

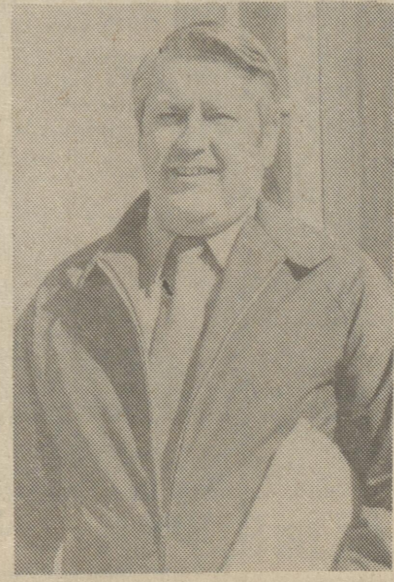

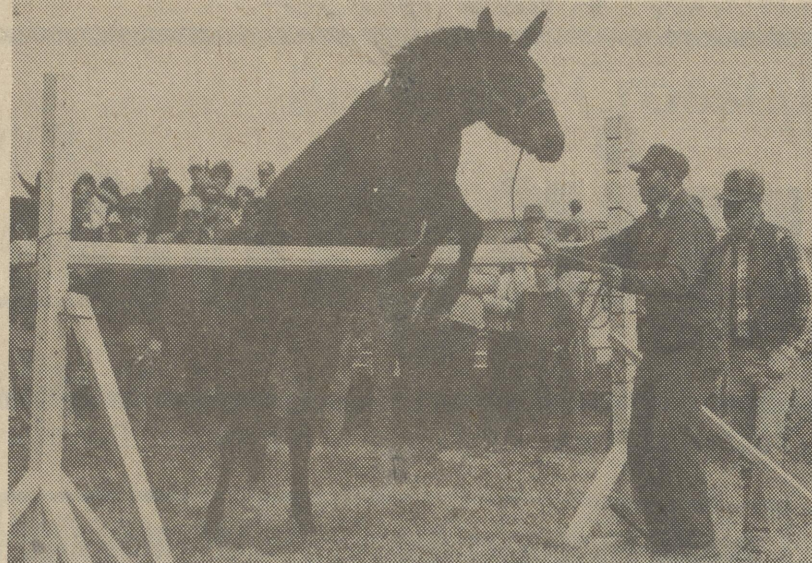

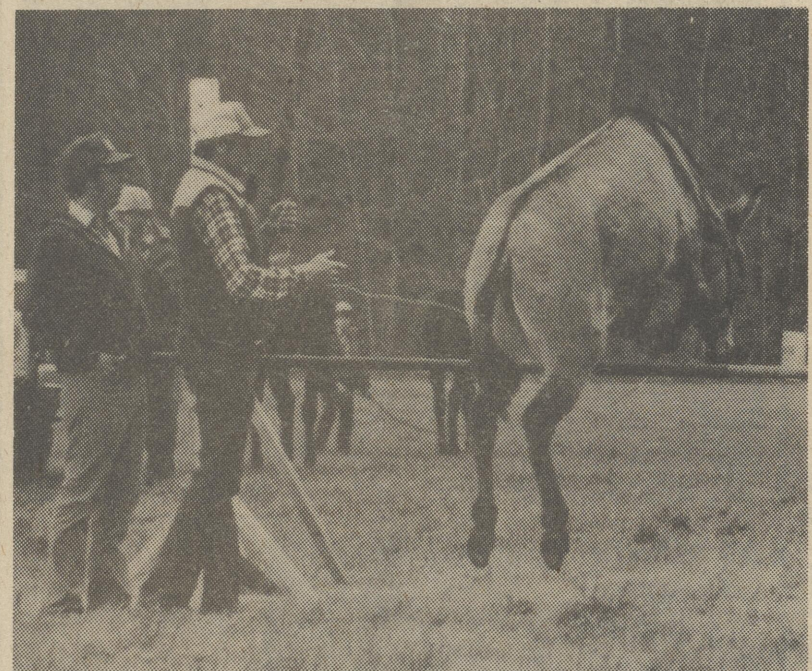
Members of the Harrington Fire Dept. prepare to move Roger Wix onto the stretcher after last Thursday's accident.

"B.B.", the little bush bunnie sleeps cozily in his small nest and the gulls are back. How do they know, thirty or forty miles, away over at the seashore,

when the farmers start plowing? They follow the tractors in flocks with squeals of joy for the fat grubs and other goodies turned over by the plow. They seem to return home to the shore at sundown.

The plows will not run many days before we will hear the happy call of the killdeer as she flies over, searching for a suitable earth cavity in which to make her crude nest. It is only a few stones and sticks pulled together, but of course her babies start running as soon as they creep out of the shell and dry off. I suppose she feels it is not much use to spend time making an elaborate home.

This morning also brought me a call from my dear friend, Karen, over at Lincoln, and it always an inspiration to talk with her and a blessing to renew our faith together. This is true, also, of my friend Tess, who always seems to have something practical for me, too. This morning she suggested that I gargle with warm salt water and vinegar for the sore throat and then "paint" it with a bit of Vick's salve. This I have done and it is some easier.

Lake Forest lost a close track opener, at Cape Henlopen, by a score of 75.66. It seems that the Spartans cannot get the break or two needed to win, at Lewes.

The locals rebounded to win 80-61 at Milford but a 2-0 log, at this point, would have been very encouraging. Ironically, the distance events, which used to be the strong suit around here dating back to 1956, is now the Achilles heel. This fact is brought about by the rapidly diminishing number of candidates for cross-country, although the Spartans have a quarter of a century of nothint but winning teams.

Gerald "Peanut" Perry, one of Delaware's top dashmen, was a double winner at Lewes, racing to a 10.9 and 22.8 victory in the 100 and 200 meter dashes. Perry also anchored the victorious 400 meter relay, teaming LaSalle with Ray DeShields and James Browne. Browne, DeShields, Sheldon Powell and Nelson Mosley annexed the 800 relay.

Sophomore Rob Prutzman and senior

Pae Pulley went 1-2 in the shot and discus, totalling 16 points between them.

Tony Scott upset Cape state champ, Vince Glover to win the triple jump with 44 feet, 7 1/2 inches, just missing the Spartan school record. Kevin Smith was a strong third (43 feet, 10 inches).

Tony Scott was only a tenth-of-a-second off the winner in the intermediate hurdles and was second to Jerome Scott, in the high hurdles.

Fred Goodman won the high jump again while Jim Shuman and Dave Decker went 2-3 in the pole vault.

At Milford, the Spartans did not perform well, as a team, but had too much strength for the Bucs.

Gerald Perry took the sprints, setting a new Spartan record of 22.4 for 200 meters.

Rob Prutzman spun the discus 137 feet, 9 inches setting another team standard. The old mark was set, also at Milford, by Matt Burgess in 1975.

Prutzman, a 6-2, 205 pound sopho-

more, has the size and strength to put the discus mark, out-of-reach, with almost three, full seasons remaining. Prutzman also won the shot with 44-10. Page Pulley was second in both weight events.

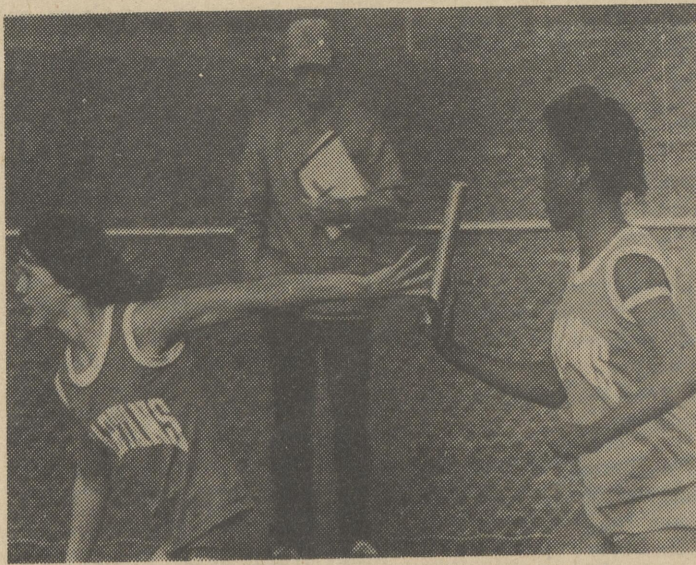
Jerome Scott (15.8) and Tony Scott (15.9) were 1-2, in the high hurdles, with Tony capturing the intermediates in 43.3.

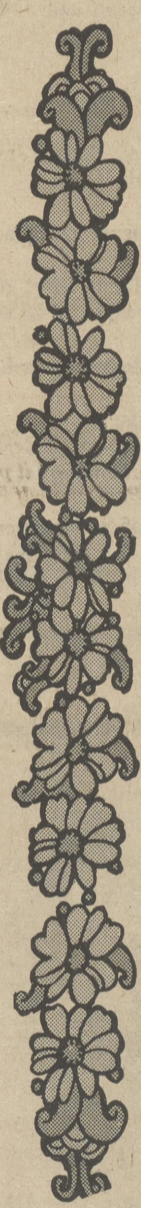

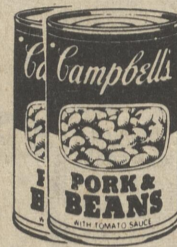

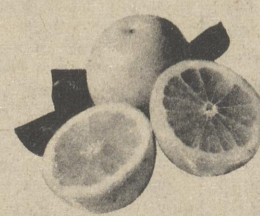
