Harrington City Council:

New assessment lowers tax rate 78%

The new assessed amount is in for the Town of Harrington. It is a record amount topping the measuring stick at a whopping \$29,402,246.00 as compared to the old amount 12 years ago of \$11,500,000. At the same time, Councilman Curtis Melvin voted to base the tax rate for the twenty nine million figure at 32 cents per \$100 which is a record low. The old figure of a year ago was \$1.21 per \$100. This is a reduction of the tax rate by 78% or 89 cents lower.

A year ago the tax rate was \$1.00 per \$100, and the council voted to raise it by 21% to \$1.21. At the time, this created quite a stir in the community; however the amount of tax dollars then as compared to the new assessment ...and the reduced tax rate will be approximately the same figure, which is \$90,229.00, which figure was budgeted.

Mayor Al Mann praised the new assessment and lower tax rate saying "...because the 100% tax base will be attractive to lenders and the low tax rate will be very attractive to new businesses and industry". He also added that the tax list will be hung in

strategic places in the Town "at City Hall, Post Office, and the like. The citizens can come and review the lists and amounts throughout the day. The appeals will then be heard on May 6, 7, 8, and the 10th by appointment", added the Mayor.

In other action, the Council denied a request by Robert A. Passerin to have the piece of property east of Town on Route 14, across from Hollywood Cemetery, rezoned as follows: 3.16 acres from R-1, single family dwellings, to C-1, commercial, and 14.84 acres from R-1 to M.H.P., mobile home park.

The Town's Planning and Zoning Commission had voted in favor of the change.

The Council discussed picking up trash belonging to people living outside the Town limits "...in areas where they pass these places with the trash truck in order to make their turn arounds". These areas are Weiner Avenue, Wheeler's Park, and west on Route 14 to Buck's Auto Repair. It could not be determined at Monday night's meeting whether there were 6 or 26 such stops. These people have been having their trash picked up at the regular rate. It was decided at Monday's meeting that

these people will now be charged at one and one half times the regular fee for such service. In another trash related matter, illegal depositors were discussed, but at the present time it is unsure if these matters can be enforceable. It will be under the new code according to Mayor Mann. BUT would be violators run the risk of severe fines for any infractions along these lines, and the Council intends on testing the matter.

concluding matters

Concluding matters related to awarding the bid to replace a pump at #1 well located at the present water tower to Shannahan Artisan Well Co. in the amount of \$4,929. The next bidder was Delmarva Drilling Co. for \$4950. A change was introduced to the Zoning Map in that Article 7 now will have a clause requiring a site development map first before any building permits or mobile home stands will be issued for the project. A federal grant will be presented at a public hearing on April 19th at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall based on a survey of certain areas of the Town that could be eligible for this grant. East Street and west of West Street are two areas under consideration.

East will send sixth grades to North 6th grades

Beginning in September 1982 most sixth graders who would have attended Lake Forest East Elementary in Frederica will go to North in Felton. A few, who live closer to Harrington, will be relocated at Lake Forest South. The decision to move the sixth grades out of East came at Monday night's meeting of the Lake Forest Board of Education. The move was one of several alternatives under consideration as the board mulled over ways to alleviate overcrowded conditions at the Frederica school.

Other options reviewed by the board and discussed in a public session held in the gym at Frederica in March included a building program at East, moving a number of students across all grade levels through sixth grade by redrawing district lines, trying to get some sort of mobile or trailer classrooms and doing nothing. □

In acting on a motion by Cliff Chambers to move the sixth grades, beginning in September of the 1982-83

school year the board reserved the right of taking a new look at the situation at this time next year when projected enrollment at East might tell the same or a different story.

As the Lake Forest Board was deciding what to do about overcrowded East Elementary, Superintendent Dr. Edward Powell made some long range proposals for the rehabilitation and use of the district's buildings. Powell asked the board for authority to request advance planning money from the State Department of Public Instruction to hire an architect to do a cost estimate to help determine the feasibility of any or all of the following projects:

1. renovate Lake Forest North in its entirety. Powell said the work needed on the physical facilities there would probably cost more than the district would ever be able to afford on the basis of current state and local funding. It needs extensive work, he said, "to bring it back into the 20th century."
2. adding four additional classrooms at Lake Forest East in Frederica so that an overcrowded situation forcing the district to move a grade or take other such stopgap measures is not likely to recur.
3. a minor renovation at South and at W.T. Chipman which would include turning administrative offices there back into classrooms.
4. erecting a storage building behind Lake Forest High School.

students (it was the largest or second largest elementary school in the state) and now enrolls about 680, it is the only place in the district where there is any extra space. Powell proposed the renovation include centralizing district offices there. That would include administrative, maintenance and central storage. That would free additional classrooms at Lake Forest South and W.T. Chipman in Harrington where the district's offices are now scattered throughout the building.

Frederica will urge back accounts to pay up

A letter approved by the Frederica Town Council last week will urge town residents who have overdue tax water and/or trash bills to pay up. The letter will offer those back accounts the option of doing so within 30 days without incurring a penalty. This would apply to both those who pay in

full within the 30 days or those who make reasonable arrangements in that time to catch up on their bill by making a series of partial payments.

The letter is one step in the efforts of the Town Council to recoup nearly \$10,000 owed in taxes or in water and trash fees.

Frederica Mayor Don Griffith suggested a three step effort:

1. A letter sent to overdue accounts by general delivery.
 2. A more strongly worded letter sent by registered or certified mail.
 3. Action to collect the money, probably by turning still delinquent accounts over to the town solicitor.
- Council member Rosalie Cline stressed the fact that partial payments in a sincere attempt to pay up would be acceptable and encouraged.

2 businessmen receive award

J. Edward Taylor and Howard S. Wagner of Harrington as two of those Americans in 1982 whose achievements have merited inclusion in *The National Cyclopaedia of American Biography*, have been awarded the James Terry White Memorial Award by the Fellows In Free Enterprise (FIFE).

Their biographies will be included in the next addition to the current seventy two volume works, recognized as the most comprehensive national illustrated reference by librarians, colleges, newspapers and governmental agencies of outstanding Americans past and present was based on their creative support of our National Heritage. Taylor and Wagner and the directors of Peoples Bank of Harrington have provided invaluable guidance to FIFE during its crucial formative years.

In 1888 the late James White realized that while publications such as Burke's Peerage and other works covered the careers of many Europeans, no complete reference existed in this Nation despite the great and extensive contributions Americans had made to the progress of mankind. The work of the Cyclopaedia is being continued by the founder's great grandson, William H. White in collaboration with the American Institute of Fellows In Free Enterprise.

Cal Hollis III, of Houston, long a champion of basic education, has been active in FIFE since its inception in 1972. His wife, Vicki, illustrated most of the books *You Can Do It!* for middle school students.

Calvin V. Hollis, Jr., also of Houston, is President of FIFE as well as its Founder and Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Mary Hollis serves as Assistant Treasurer.

Anne's Kitchen

There is no denying that a package mix is fast, easy and sometimes quite good. When it comes to Brownies you can find several mixes that will do fine. But when you want something special with that chocolate homemade goodness a mix just won't do. Try this recipe and I'm sure you will agree.

Brownies

- 2/3 cups flour (self-rising)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate melted
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1. Sift flour once. Measure into sifter with 1/2 cup sugar.
- 2. Melt shortening with chocolate.
- 3. Beat eggs till thick and light.
- 4. Add 1/2 cup sugar gradually, beating well. Add chocolate, nuts and vanilla.
- 5. Bake in greased 8" x 8" x 2" square pan at 350F oven about 30 minutes. Do not overbake.
- 6. Cool in pan and cut in squares.
