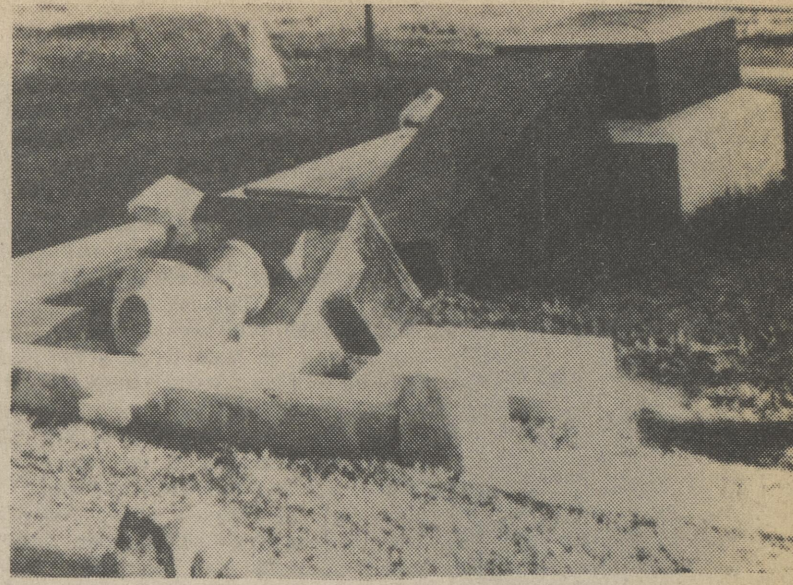

Vandals wreck peace of Cemetery

The spirit of malevolence prevailed in the Hollywood Cemetery near Harrington last week as a vandal or vandals overturned about 40 tombstones and monuments, breaking a number of them. The destruction, called unprecedented by several of those familiar with the cemetery and its history, occurred in the old part of the cemetery along Delaware 14 in sections A and C. Some of these lots were purchased in 1882.

The vandals chose to wreck the peace of the cemetery sometime between 5 or 6 pm Wednesday, April 14, and 10am Thursday, April 15. Mark Weaver, a caretaker discovered the tumbled and broken stones and reported to Madalyn

Tharp, Secretary-Treasurer of the Hollywood Cemetery Company who called the Delaware State Police. Miss Tharp said that while there have been incidents of theft and mischief in the past, she does not recall anything so severe.

Charles Peck, Jr., President of the Cemetery Company, said yesterday that Wm. V. Sipple and Son of Milford had been engaged to restore the stones and monuments to their places. Peck said that while "We've had a stone or two overturned in the past...there's never been anything like this."

Delaware State Police are still investigating the incident. William V. Sipple told the Journal

yesterday that he was not yet able to estimate the cost of restoring the cemetery. He was waiting to see when a crane would be available to help in lifting some of the stones. The length of time the restoration will take may depend upon how useful the crane turns out to be. Sipple cited similar damage in a Dover cemetery several years past in which the work took all summer, partly because lost could not be reached by heavy equipment.

Sipple said he would do all he could to keep the cost of the work down. However, he said he was not sure all of the old stones could be repaired satisfactorily. Replacement, he said, would be very costly.

Housing survey in progress in Felton

Members of the Felton Town Council are or will be in the process of conducting a survey among some home owners or residents of Felton in the course of making application for funds to be distributed under a federal HUD block grant program. The funds are to be awarded by the state of Delaware, but Kent County Levy Court is assisting several towns including Felton, Harrington, Camden and Clayton in preparing their applications. The County is also preparing for Woodside, Leipsic and Cheswold and submitting an application of its own on behalf of the Star Hill area.

The application process must be

complete by an April 30 deadline. Reportedly about 26 communities in Kent and Sussex Counties will vie for something just over a million and a half dollars which will be awarded through the state's Division of Housing in the Department of Community Affairs.

Given the current housing crunch, the county is urging communities to target housing rehabilitation in their applications. The idea would be to help homeowners improve or repair their properties.

Felton's survey must be complete by next Wednesday, April 28 when a public hearing is set for the town hall at 7:30 p.m.

The HUD program goes back to pre 1974 when communities submitted separate applications in each project category for which they sought the federal funds. Later the program was changed to allow more than one project to be included in one application. The title of the program which then became competitive was changed at that time to Community Development Block Grant Program. Communities could submit applications once a year.

This year with President Reagan's new emphasis, the HUD money has been turned over to the states to award. In Delaware, there will be a second round of applications in August.

Easton to host 1982 Delmarva Chicken Festival

The 34th annual Delmarva Chicken Festival, a two-day tribute to the peninsula's celebrated broiler industry, will be held June 11 and 12 in Easton, Md.

Up to 20,000 visitors, including more than 40 food editors and broadcasters from the northeastern part of the United States, are expected to descend

on the town in Maryland's famed Talbot County.

Activities will center on Hog Neck arena, an expansive ice and roller skating rink just north of Easton on Route 50. The grounds of the arena, which may be renamed Chicken Neck Arena for the occasion, will open to the public at 4 p.m. Friday, June 11, and remain open until 9 p.m. Activities will resume on Saturday, June 12, at 10

a.m. and continue again until 9 p.m.

Planning for the Festival is in the hands of a large committee, representing most of Easton's civic, business, fraternal and sorority organizations and headed by Sylvia J. Gannon. Mrs. Gannon, the wife of a prominent Talbot County farmer chaired the committee in 1975 when Easton last hosted the Festival.

Participating on the committee will be members of the Easton Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club, Chesapeake Center, Ruritan Club, Rotary Club, Talbot County Farm Bureau, Jaycees, Country Pride Foods Limited, Alpha Delta Kappa Sorority, Easton Dept. of Parks and Recreation, The Delmarva Farmer and others.

During the course of the Festival, entertainment will abound. Already booked are The Christian Troupers; Eastern Shore Chapter of the Sweet Adelines; Something Special, a vocal group; an aerobic dance troop; and the Banjo Dusters musical outfit.

Other Festival attractions include the Delmarva Chicken Cooking Contest, Delmarva Poultry Princess Pageant, Delmarva's giant fry pan, Festival Parade, chicken capers and educational industry exhibits.

Mrs. Gannon, commenting on the upcoming celebration, said "The Festival is more than just a parade, a chicken cooking contest and a princess pageant; it serves as the focus of an industry which pumps more than \$700 million a year into the economy of the Delmarva Peninsula."

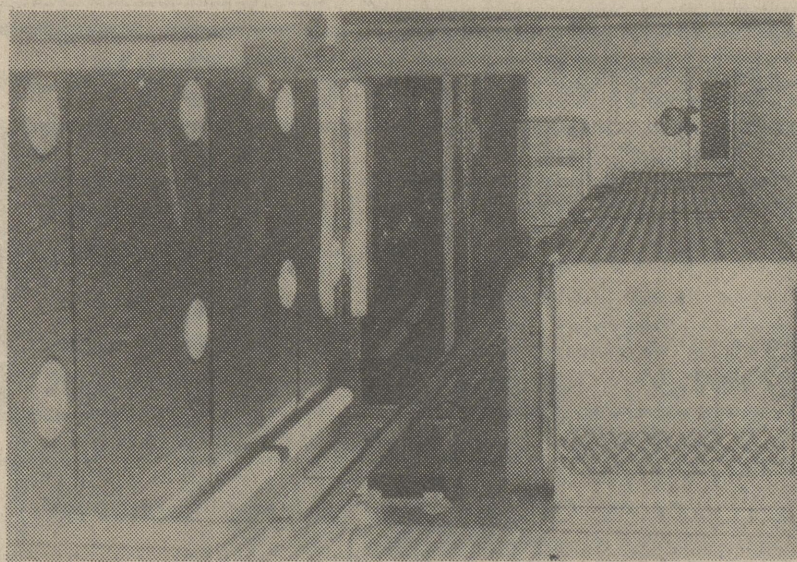
Total cost for the new rescue truck, purchased from Bolan Motors in Dover, Del was \$96,000.00. That includes a 1981 Ford C-800 chassis for \$21,000 and a 17 foot Ranger body for \$55,000. The new truck replaces the old 1962 Ford Boyertown Body truck.

A local committee to over see the purchase and outfitting of the truck was appointed by then fir company president, Ira Huffman in 1978. Chaired by Ken Collins, its members included Gary Minner, Ray Blanchette, J.D. Dennis, Jr., Franklin Derrickson, and Neil Russell.

The committee visited several fire departments in Delaware as well as in nearby states to get an idea of the options and possibilities before deciding on the new truck. WHILE THE TRUCK WAS BEING MANUFACTURED IN Rhode Island committee members made three 900 mile round trips to check on its progress.

Specialized equipment accounting for about \$20,000 of the total cost includes: [1] a 15 KW Onan generator in conjunction with a lighting system that will make the firefighters' job easier, [2] electric and gasoline powered Hurst rescue tools, [3] six MSA pressure demand, self-contained breathing apparatus and 12 spare 45 cubic foot cylinders, and [4] a four bottle 3600 psi cascade system for filling the cylinders.

Ambulance Captain, Ray Blanchette, said "The biggest question asked by the public is why we need such a big truck. But once you explain the type of equipment and its use people understand. The equipment in the truck is the latest available in many cases, but it is equipment that can be used on almost any alarm."



Chipman Talent Show planned

Admission this year is 50 cents for students in kindergarten through sixth grade and \$1.00 for junior high through adult.

Harrington can get HUD funds

Harrington: A public hearing was held on Monday night at City Hall. Certain areas of the County have been selected as areas which might be eligible for a Federal grant used to rehabilitate dwellings.

Members of the Kent County Planning Office and the State Housing Office told the Council how they might apply for funds to upgrade housing on East Street and West Street between Milby and Mispillion Streets. "This is a pure volunteer program by owner occupied dwellings. Right now...we are only concerning ourselves with upgrading properties. There are funds available for demolition, but we would not do that at this time if it means relocating the occupant," said Mike Thompson of the County Planning Office.

The maximum allowed for each unit would be \$10,000 "If a dwelling requires more than that to bring it up to standard, then we would recommend demolition," said Jim Loshiver of the County Planning Office.

The program has built in provisions to keep the recipient from making a quick sale and profit. The County would administer the program, and once it was completed, would turn it over to the City. "It would not cost the City a dime," according to the government officials present.

It is highly likely that the Council will adopt the program.

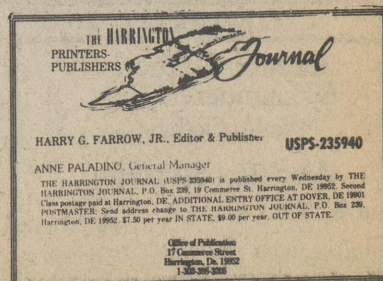
Contributions have been provided by alumni, area merchants and university departments. All proceeds will be applied to the university's 1981-82 Alumni Fund campaign.

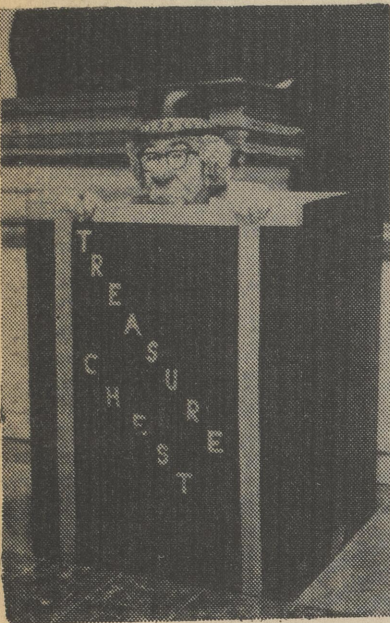
Payment may be made by personal check, VISA or Mastercard. All purchases must be paid on the day of the auction, and all items and/or certificates must be taken on the day of the auction.

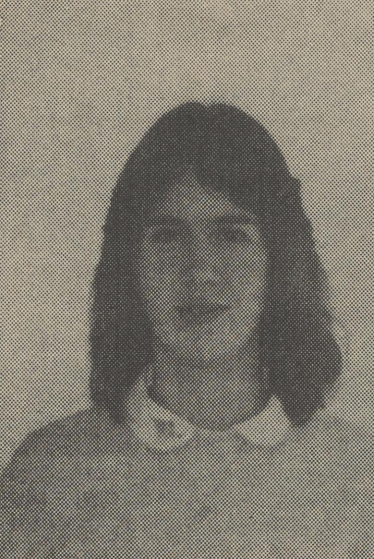

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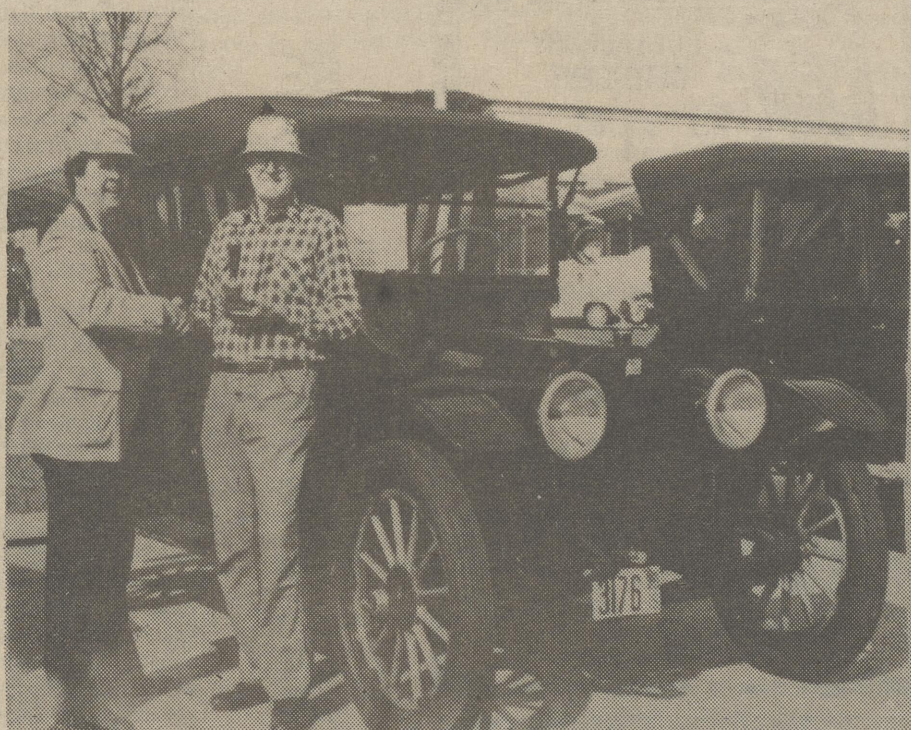

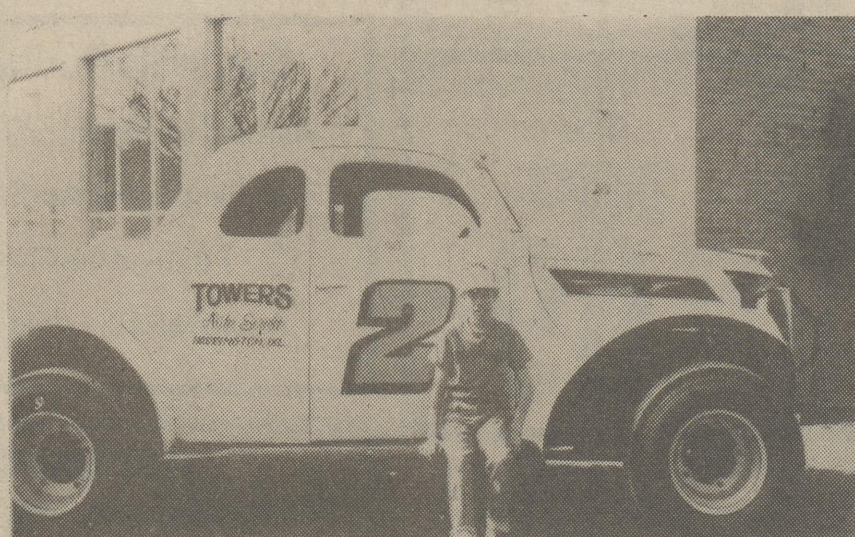

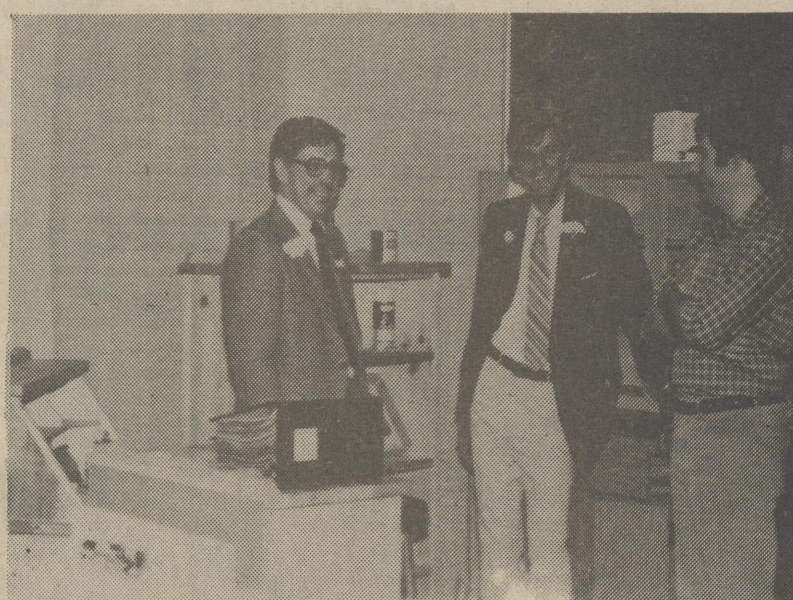

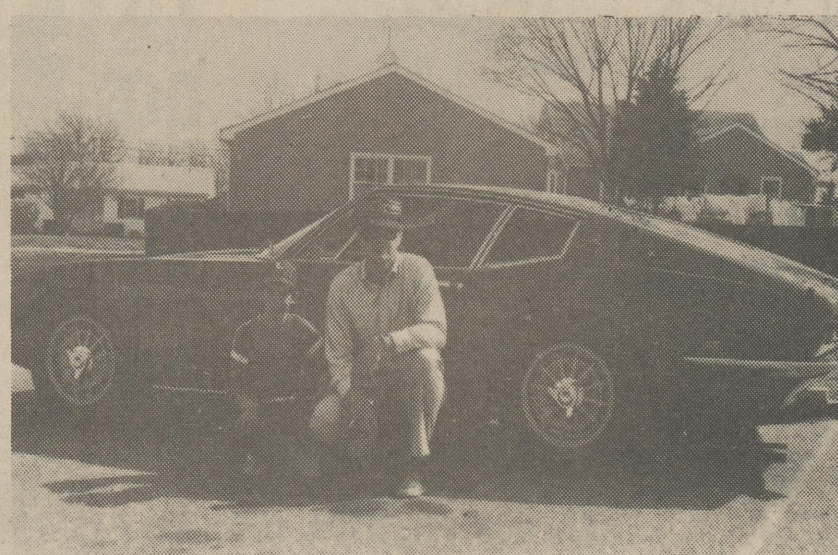

"The Second Coming of Christ"

by the Rev. Ray Newman

Recently, I was asked if the second coming of Christ and the resurrection of Christ form the dead were the same event. While it must be admitted that there are some theologians who would answer that question in the affirmative, the Bible clearly distinguishes these two events.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is a past event. It took place three days following the death of Jesus on the Cross. All four of the Gospel writers testify to the actual death of Jesus Christ. John the Beloved, an eyewitness at the scene of the crucifixion, reports that a Roman soldier pierced the side of Jesus with a spear, "and forthwith came there out blood and water" (John 19:34). The mention of

both blood and water indicates the spear plunged first into a kidney, and then ripped its way into His heart. There is no doubt that Jesus actually died.

Likewise, all four of the Gospel writers were, or were close companions with, eyewitnesses who saw the Risen Christ. Jesus remained on the earth forty days following His resurrection, making at least eleven appearances to different individuals and/or groups ranging in size from seven to as many as five hundred people. (See Matthew 28, Mark 14, Luke 24, John 20-21, Acts 1,8,9, and I Corinthians 15) John F. Walvoord states, "The fact of the resurrection of Christ, therefore, is one of the most well-attested events of

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Lake Forest hosts 3rd Aquatics Workshop

The 3rd Annual Lake Forest/AAHP ERD Aquatic Workshop was held at the Lake Forest High School pool March 27, 1982. This year's program was again loaded with highly respected professionals both as speakers as participants.

Louise Priest, Executive Director of the CNCA gave the Keynote Address on Attitudes and how they affect teaching. Louise is an internationally recognized authority on the problems facing the impaired citizen and has authored the American Red Cross text on Adapted Aquatics which deals with teaching the handicapped and impaired simple swimming, fitness and safety skills. Her talk addressed the way we feel towards the handicapped as people and how pre-conceived notions as to their behavior often hinder the teaching process.

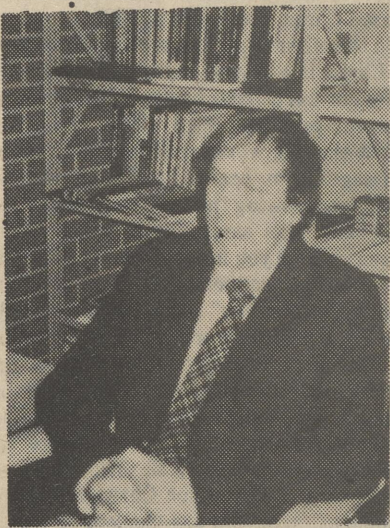
The program then broke off into two sessions: Dr. Jay Seay from Salisbury State College spoke on how SCUBA Diving activities can be incorporated into high school physical education classes, while in an adjacent section of the auditorium, Dale Rothenberger of Kane Area High School of Northwest Pennsylvania was speaking on Developing Water Polo as a club or high school sport prior to an Olympic year. Patricia Dyal of the Lake Forest High School physical education department spoke on Swimming Fitness Programs and detailed how people should use swimming as a tool for total fitness. She explained how such a program might be implemented.

The American Red Cross also ran an update program for (WSI) Water Safety Instructors on new material. Kathy McOnroe, Roger Wood and Bonnie Blades joined Shawn Stevens from the Wilmington branch in presenting material on audio-visual equipment, beginner programs, teaching strategies and survival techniques.

Louise Priest spoke to a group of swim instructors on techniques of working with impaired swimmers, while in the pool, Robert Moser from Central Cambria H.S. and Jim Cooper of Marion Center H.S. both in Pennsylvania gave an excellent presentation on stroke mechanics. The participants were exposed to Bernoulli's Principle and its effect on swimmer performance.

After lunch, Walt McCann from Dewey Beach gave a demonstration of windsurfing skills. Inside the pool, McCann "surf"ed the entire pool area aided by drafts from open doors. Richard Baker, Chief Lifeguard at the Assateague National Seashore of Maryland and Virginia presented the topic of rescue in the surf environment through a role playing demonstration. This was followed by John Hollis, former Swim Coach at Seaford Gold and Country Club which has won over 50 consecutive dual meets. John spoke on motivation factors and how he views this in regards to coaching.

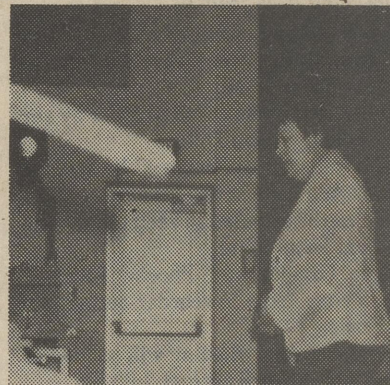
In the auditorium, Virginia Reister from Ocean Pines, Md. was giving a slide presentation on current facility design concepts and the need for administration courses for pool operators. In the guidance office of the high school, Principal Richard Moretti presented a computer based program on the high school's terminals featuring basic water safety concepts and simple quizzes for swim instructors. He also showed how computers can be used to evaluate cost efficient spending for facilities. Several people from the D.A.H.P.E.R.D. Executive Committee were present and seemed to agree that this computer method of educating students as to the dangers of

- The new policy is intended to discourage all smoking by patients while under the Hospital's care and to protect non-smoking patients and visitors from exposure to unwanted smoking.
- The new No Smoking policy was established by the Hospital's Board of Directors upon the recommendation of the Medical Staff.
- No Smoking signs are posted in all patient areas.

The Surgeon-General of the United States recently cited new evidence of harm being done to non-smokers by exposure to "second-hand" smoke. The Surgeon-General's report also emphasized the mounting evidence of smoking as the cause of cancer, pulmonary diseases, and other health problems. The report declared that smoking was a serious health hazard to smokers and to non-smokers exposed to tobacco smoke and urged that non-smokers be protected from this hazard and that smokers discontinue smoking tobacco entirely. The Medical Staff of Milford Memorial Hospital agrees with the Surgeon-General's report and, therefore, recommended the new restriction on smoking within the Hospital to the Board of Directors.

ancient history and is given prominent place in the scriptural presentation" (Jesus Christ Our Lord, p. 132).

On the other hand, the second coming of Christ is a future, happening. Even after our Lord Jesus had ascended into heaven, promises were made to the effect that He would return. The first message from heaven given to the disciples following the Lord's ascension was that "this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11). Also, the last promise recorded in the pages of Holy Writ relates to the return of Christ (Revelation 22:20). In fact, three times in the last chapter of the Bible Jesus stated that He was soon to come again (Revelation 22:7, 12, 20). Since the return of Christ for Christians is imminent, believers are challenged to be watching eagerly (Matthew 24:42), waiting with great expectation (1 Thessalonians 1:10), and ready for they do not know the day or the hour of His coming (Matthew 24:44).

When the Lord Jesus does come again to receive us unto Himself, those who have been saved by grace through faith (Ephesians 2:8-9), will see Him and instantly become like Him (1 John 3:1-2), for He shall change them by giving each of them a body similar to His glorified, risen body (Philippians 3:20-21).
