## No Smoking

Beginning May 1, 1982, Millord Memorial Hospital To Prohihit ALL SMOKING in Patient-Cure Areas.

No Smoking policy in patient-care areas will go into effect in Millord Memorial Hospital May 1, 1982.

- The new prohibition of smoking applies to patients as well as visitors.
- The new policy is intended to discourage all smoking by patients while under the Hospital's care and to protect non-smoking patients and visitors trom exposure to unwanted smoking.
- The new No Smoking policy was established by the Hospital's Board of Directors upon the recommendation of the Medical Staffl
- No Smoking signs are posted in all patient areas.

The Surgeon-General of the United States recently cited new evidence of harm being done to non-smokers by exposure to "second-hand" smoke. The Surgeon-General's report also emphasized the mounting evidence of smoking as the cause of cancer, pulmonary diseases, and other heallth problems. The report declured that smoking was a serious health hazurd to smokers and to non-smokers exposed to tohacco smoke and uryed that non-smokers he protected trom this
