The 1982 Little League Season gets underway in Harrington and the surrounding area this Saturday with the traditional parade in Harrington and the opening games in the afternoon. With the start of the season imminent, the local Little League organization chose the time as opportune to address the following open letter to the community:

### Open Letter to the community

It is our feeling that Little League is an important contribution to our children's overall growth. They not only learn the fundamentals of baseball, but good sportsmanship as well. These young people are the future leaders of our fine community and we feel they deserve the very best guidance we can provide.

Little League recognizes that children of Little League age are in their formative and impressionable years. Evaluation statistics accumulated over many years provide conclusive evidence of benefits gained through participation in Little League.

The indoctrination values of teamwork, fair play, courage, loyalty and discipline are widely accepted as recognizable benefits of Little League.

Respected authorities in the field of education, physical fitness, medicine and other agencies concerned with the welfare of youth concur in the conclusion that those who play Little League are generally better equipped physically, mentally and emotionally to face the problems of growing up.

The parents of more than three million Little Leaguers combined with their youngsters, league officials, umpires, managers, coaches, auxiliary members and countless volunteer agencies, including sponsors, represent an

imposing cross section of this nation. PARENTS SHOULD ACCEPT THE FACT THAT THEY MUST SHOULD DER RESPONSIBILITY AND TAKE INITIATIVE TO MAKE THE LOCAL PROGRAM SUCCESSFUL. Little League is not a club in which membership implies baby-sitting benefits and entertainment privileges.

Practically speaking, Little League is an adult, volunteer project conducted, supervised and assisted by parents who desire to make its benefits extend to their children.

Each parent should join in the total effort. There is a place and a job to do for all. The burden of operating the league should not fall on a few. The parent who shrinks this responsibility cannot, in turn, expect others to assume the burden.

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## Two Lake Forest teams score firsts in state "Olympics of the Mind"

Since the ancient Greeks named their Olympian games for the real mountain which was the fabled home of their mythic gods, the word "Olympic" has signified the ultimate in competition. The modern revival of the ancient contests, now known as the Olympic games represents the mountain peak of achievement for amateur athletes. The more recently developed "Special Olympics" recognizes young people who, though they may be limited physically or mentally by some disability, scale the heights in spirit and in their determination to succeed. Added to the list of the ultimate in competition is the "Olympics of the Mind" which held its second annual state championships at the Redding Middle School in Middletown on Saturday, April 24. The "Olympics of the Mind" tests creative problem solving and involves students participating in gifted and talented classes.

In Saturday's competition, eleven different teams won the privilege of representing the state of Delaware at the National Olympics of the Mind which will be held in Glassboro, N.J. on May 27 and 28. Two of those first place teams are from the Lake Forest School District, one from the eighth grade at W.T. Chipman Junior School and one from Lake Forest South "A" Elementary School in Harrington.

Two other teams from the Lake Forest School District were second place winners, and one of those, representing the seventh grade group at the W.T. Chipman School received the special "Ranatra Fusca Award" for the creative, innovative way in which its solution to a long-range problem was presented. The other second place winner was from Lake Forest North Elementary in Felton.

Lake Forest sent seven teams from its F.L.A.G. (Focus on Learning for the Academically Gifted) classes to the competition in which over eighty teams from around the state participated. The teams at the state competition were mostly at the Division I (Kindergarten through 5th grades) and Division II (grades 6-8) levels, but a couple of teams from Division III (high school) did enter against no competition in order to qualify for the nationals.

Those teams which participated compiled scores on the basis of their solution to one of five long range problems given them about two months in advance and also on their reaction as a team to various spontaneous problems posed during the heat of competition. In addition to objective points earned by accomplishing certain goals stated in each problem, they received subjective points awarded for the style in which they addressed the problem and staged its solution.

The long-range problems which are new for each year of competition have to have an unusual twist, have to lend themselves to a number of different solutions, must be fairly inexpensive to solve and must be entertaining to spectators.

This year the following five long range problems were given to the teams in advance:

**CRUPPETS** - The team had to design five creative puppets, write a script, design and make a playbill and settings, and present their play.

**EARTHQUAKE STRUCTURE** - The problem posed was the building of a structure from 1/8" balsa wood that would withstand the greatest weight and vibration. Structures were tested on the spot.

**OMANAUTS** - The team had to design and build an earth exploration vehicle equipped with some sort of device to collect samples for analysis from the planet earth. Samples to be picked up were sand, water, fruit, a soda can, a cereal box, a nail, a brick, a balloon and a coin. The vehicles had to be powered by the energy of a 12 volt auto battery.

**MONSTERS MENACING MANKIND**

The problem was to design and construct three characters - an Endangered Creature, a Monster and a Super Hero or Heroine. The team's task was to have its hero save its own endangered creature while its monster captured the opposing team's creature. To complicate the problems, monsters and heroes had also to attempt to put the other side's hero or monster out of commission by hitting a certain area on the character with a velcro dart. Teams of the Division I level could operate their characters by pushing or pulling them with sticks or strings. But at the Division II level, the monster and super hero had to be operated by remote control. Small radio controlled cars were the means selected by the teams, a solution which posed its own problems when characters operating on the same radio frequency stalled each other out.

**STRIKE IT RICH** - The team had to develop an audio communications system to guide a blindfolded "prospector" through a course of hazards and to gather and protect "gold nuggets" (popcorn kernels).

Teams realized 0-200 points for achieving certain goals set within their problem. They could get minus scores for incurring any of a number of penalties. They could also earn up to 50

## Social security by phone

People who live or work in Sussex and Kent Counties and who plan to retire in the next four months can save time and energy by applying for social security by phone. In most cases there is no need to visit the Social Security Office at all.

Applying for social security by phone is quick and easy. Here's how it works: 1. In Sussex County call the Georgetown Social Security Office at 856-6301

and say you wish to "apply by phone". In Kent County call 674-3610.

2. An appointment will be made to call you back and to complete your claim at a mutually convenient time.

3. The Social Security Office will fill out the application; mail it to you for your signature, and ask you to return it with all of the needed proofs, a list of which will be enclosed.

4. If you do not wish to mail back the signed application and all necessary proofs, you can stop by the office where a social security representative will look over your proofs and return them to you on the spot. This is much faster than a long wait in the office to be interviewed.

To apply by phone or to ask a question or to get a benefit estimate, call your Social Security Office.

Pending the results of today's ratification vote, the contract signing has been set for 5 p.m. next Monday, May 3, at Lake Forest High School.

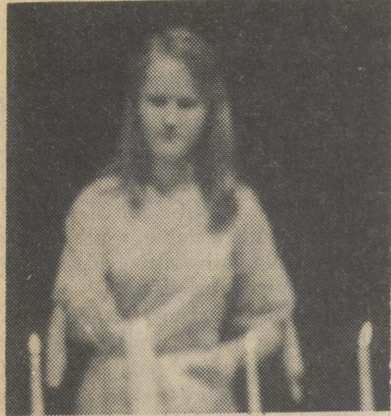

points for the unique style with which they addressed the situation. Often that involved a theme which tied in all the elements of their presentation. There was a cost limit of \$35 on their solution.

In addition to its long-range presentation, each five member team was closeted with a separate set of judges who confronted it with a spontaneous problem which had to be solved on the spot. One example, used in previous years, was to roll a large die to select a number from one to six. The number so chosen would represent an object which would then be passed from one team member to another. Each member would have to come up with an improvisation, a different way of using the item. Points were awarded for each new and appropriate answer. Only team members were allowed to be in the room. This helped compensate for any undue adult help students might have received in advance on the long-range problems.

Scores determining the winners were based on the teams' totals in both long-range and spontaneous competition. In addition, any judge or group of judges could nominate a team for the "Ranatra Fusca Award" for special creativity in their solution to the long range problem and their responses during the spontaneous competition. This award originated with one of the first competitions at the college level when the problem was the design of a vehicle for moving over water. One student came up with a device that operated on the principle of weight so that legs on the vehicle spread out or moved in according to whether the occupant stood up or sat down. The device looked something like a water spider. Although it didn't work very well, judges thought the presentation so innovative that it deserved special notice. Thus, the *ranatra fusca* (Latin for water spider) award.

Lake Forest's 7th grade team ran into

a radio frequency deadlock in operating its solution to the *Monsters Menacing Mankind* long-range problem. However, its presentation was so unique that four judges unanimously deemed it a winner.

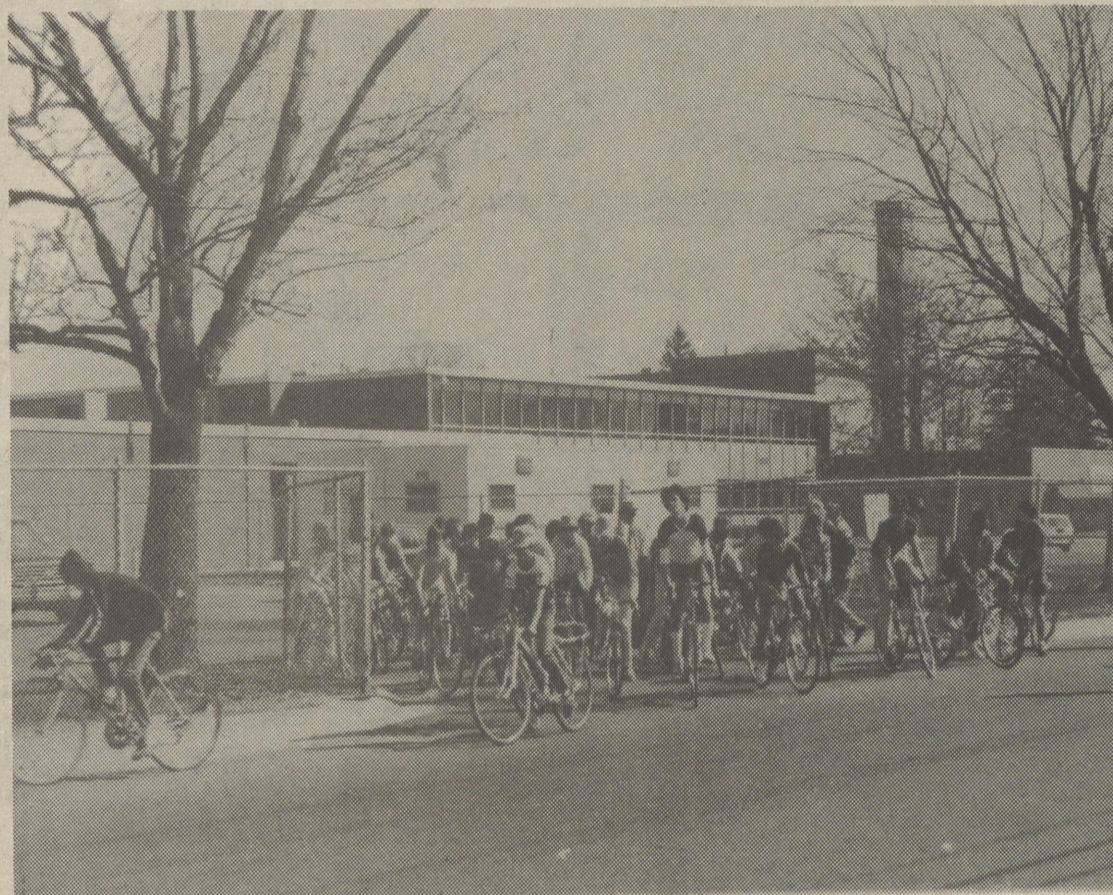
The President provided a useful inspiration for the Division II team from Lake Forest South whose Cruppets won first place with an original script entitled "President Reagan and the Jelly Bean Planet". Their efforts earned the team and the President (as characterized) a trip to national competition in Glassboro, N.J.

Another Chipman team, from the eighth grade F.L.A.G. program won first place in the Omonauts Division II level with its vehicle that roamed the Redding Middle School gym picking up "earth samples."

"Olympics of the Mind" under the aegis of Creative Competitions, Inc. is a result of the synthesis of the inspiration of two men - Dr. Sam Micklus, teacher of Industrial Design in the Department of Industrial Education at Glassboro State College and Dr. Theodore Gourley, New Jersey State Director of Gifted and Talented Education. Dr. Micklus had been using creative problem solving as one aspect of his courses, and Dr. Gourley was looking for a way to involve students in creative problem solving competition. The meetin of the two minds resulted in the first "Mind Olympics" competition.

This year's Delaware competition, hosted by the Redding Middle School, was funded by E.I. duPont deNemours & Co., Inc. Ruth J. Reynolds was tournament director, heading a committee which included Sharon Lynch and Pam Reisinger from the local district. Awards were presented by Dr. Henry C. Harper and State Superintendent of Schools, Dr. William B. Keene.

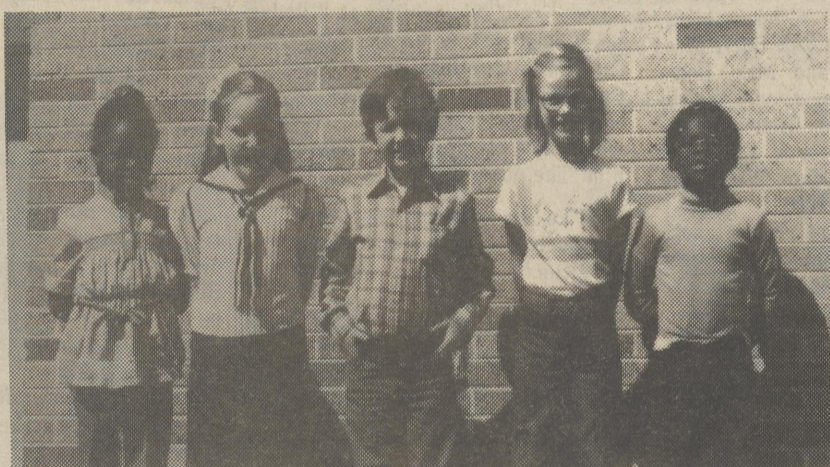

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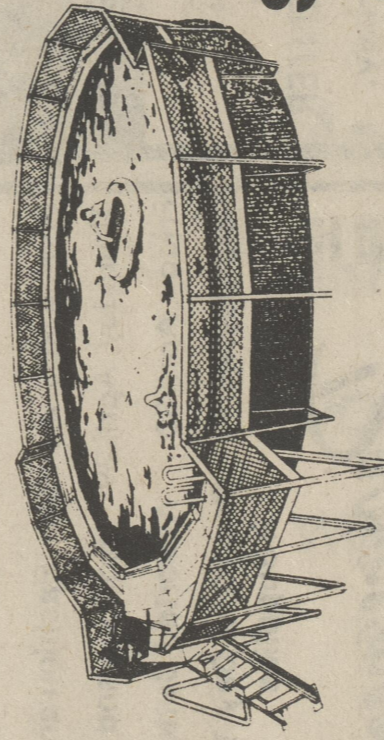
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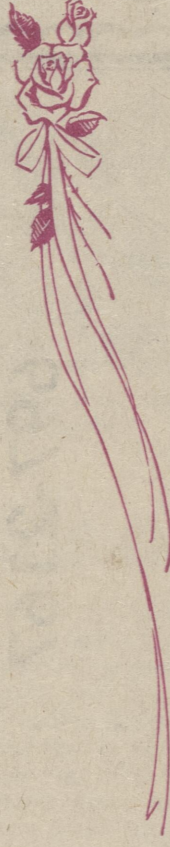
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
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
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## Spartans vie at Delmarva relays

In the girls competition, Lake Forest was second in the shot put with Angie Akins, Sharon Burton and Regina Abrams.

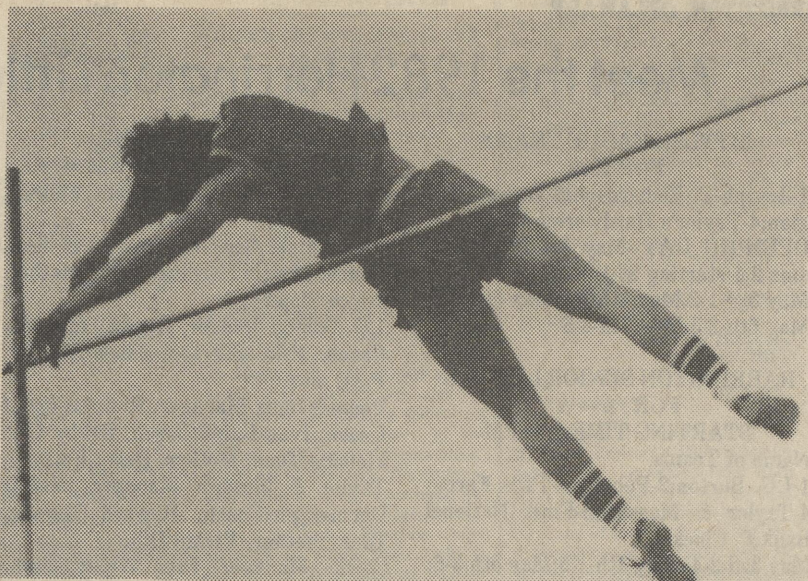

Sharon Burton, Angie Akins and Teresa Tatman were third in discus competition. Burton's 98-4, is her best throw of 1982.

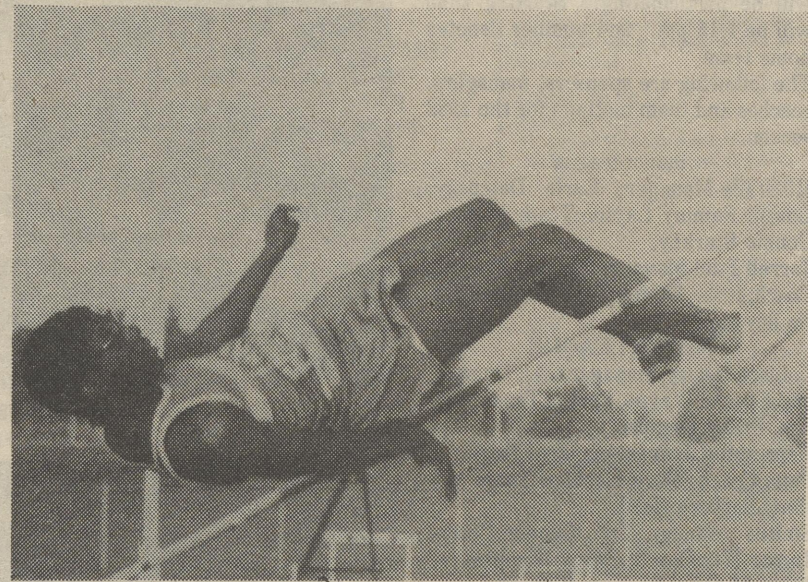
Burton, Akins and Regina Abrams were second, in the shotput.

Jim Shuman's second victory of the afternoon occurred in the pole vault, with Dave Decker runnerup.

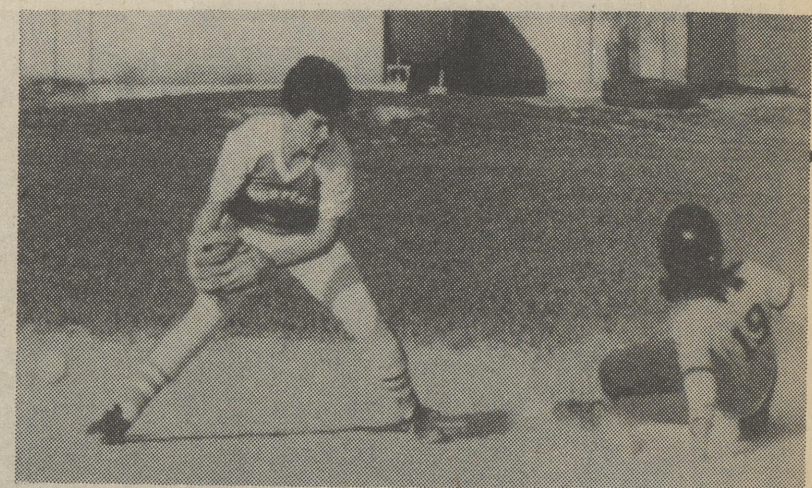
Fred Goodman cleared 6-2 in the high jump, with James Brown placing with 5-10.

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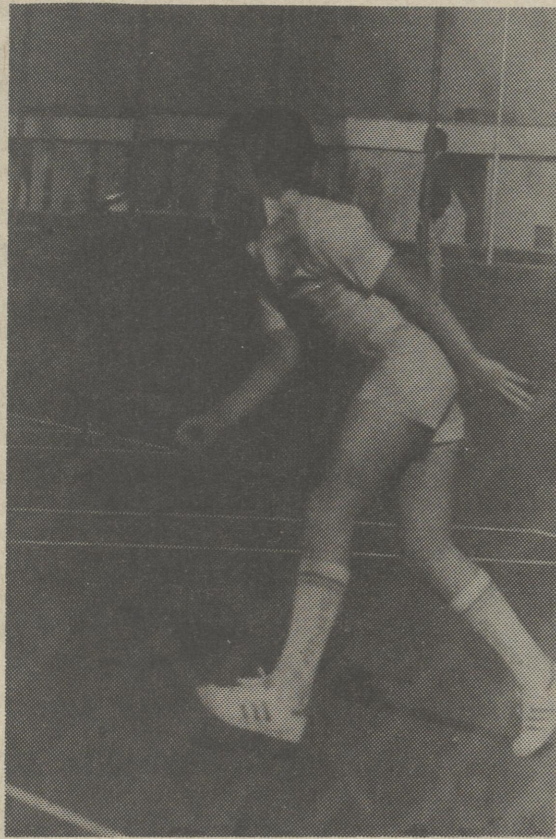

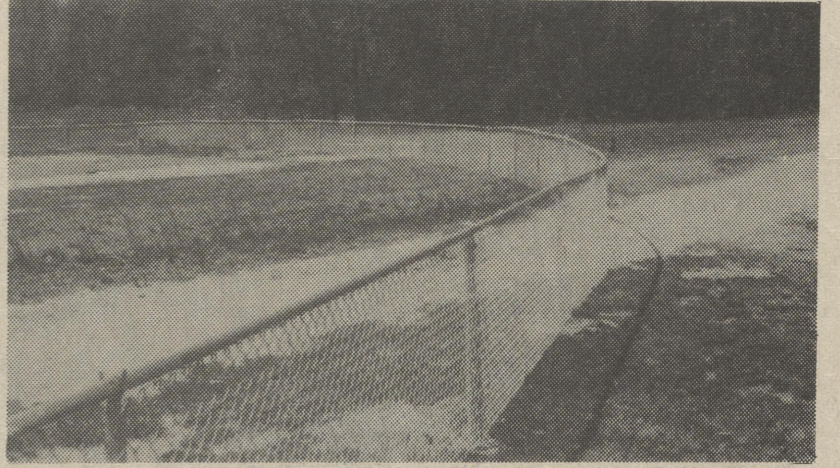

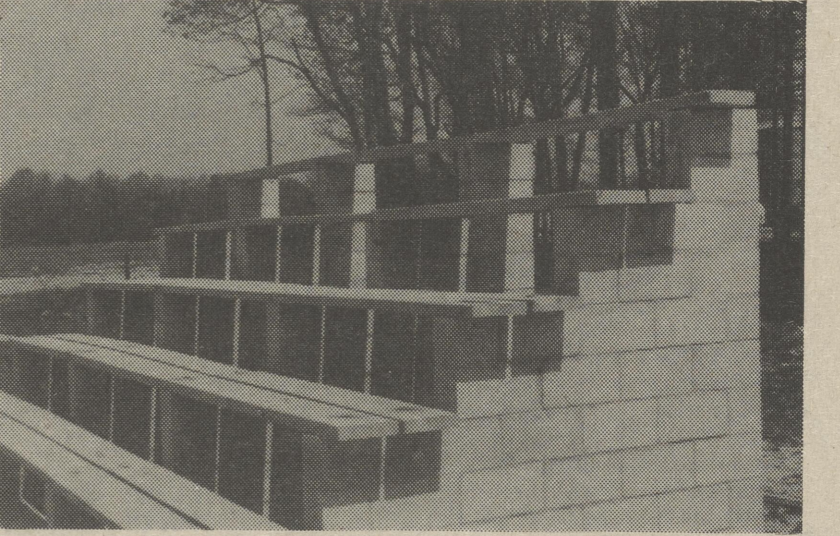

**Beginning May 1, 1982, Milford Memorial Hospital To Prohibit ALL SMOKING in Patient-Care Areas.**

- No Smoking policy in patient-care areas will go into effect in Milford Memorial Hospital May 1, 1982.
- The new prohibition of smoking applies to patients as well as visitors.
- The new policy is intended to discourage all smoking by patients while under the Hospital's care and to protect non-smoking patients and visitors from exposure to unwanted smoking.
- The new No Smoking policy was established by the Hospital's Board of Directors upon the recommendation of the Medical Staff.
- No Smoking signs are posted in all patient areas.

The Surgeon-General of the United States recently cited new evidence of harm being done to non-smokers by exposure to "second-hand" smoke. The Surgeon-General's report also emphasized the mounting evidence of smoking as the cause of cancer, pulmonary diseases, and other health problems. The report declared that smoking was a serious health hazard to smokers and to non-smokers exposed to tobacco smoke and urged that non-smokers be protected from this hazard and that smokers discontinue smoking tobacco entirely. The Medical Staff of Milford Memorial Hospital agrees with the Surgeon-General's report and, therefore, recommended the new restriction on smoking within the Hospital to the Board of Directors.

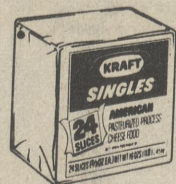

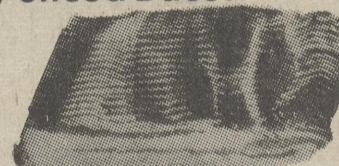

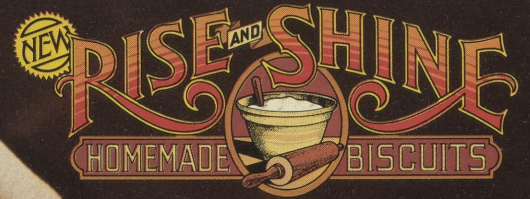
