On Saturday night before a packed crowd in the W.T. Chipman cafeteria, Col. William M. Wix the Valedictorian of the Class of 1951, gave the keynote address to the former graduates of Harrington High School. Col. Wix while a student at Harrington High School lettered in three varsity sports, was 1st trumpet in the State Band, participated in many school plays, and rose from that to full professorship on the faculty at the United States Military Academy where he became head of the Political Science Department.

The central theme of his address was "inheritance." What we inherit from our formative years we should give back. "I have inherited a lot from this town and this school district. We need to invest it in our families and our jobs...with responsibility for our actions and loyalty to each other," were some of the points Col. Wix made. The meaningful message was well received by the high audience.

J. Edward Taylor was honored on Saturday night with a scholarship in his name. The recipient of the prestigious scholarship was Joseph Allen Draper, a student at Lake Forest, the

son of Allen Draper class of 1959, and Anna Mae Draper, class of 1961. Taylor who along with his wife founded the local hardware store bearing the family name. He was introduced as having been a moving spirit through this community, but who also helped to found organizations such as Little League in Kent and Sussex Counties. He also serves as President of the Peoples Bank and a member of the Milford Memorial Hospital Board.

Following this presentation, Mayor of Harrington, Mayor Alfred B. Mann, proclaimed May 1st through May 8th as J. Edward Taylor appreciation week. A recognition which everyone felt there on Saturday night as well as elsewhere was well deserved.

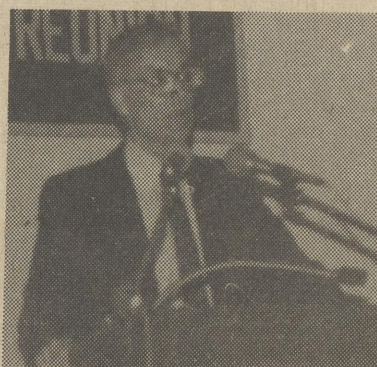
The Recipient of the William Robert Outten award went Stephan Eric Callaway, son of Charles "Pete" ('53) and Ruth Callaway ('53).

Felton completes HUD application

The Felton Town Council has completed an application process that could bring \$150,000 in HUD funds for housing rehabilitation if the State smiles in its direction.

The application was signed by Felton Mayor William Myers after the Council completed a swing of houses in the target area and held a public hearing last Wednesday.

The Mayor told the Council Monday night that it would take six to eight

weeks before the State made its decision. A number of committees in Kent and Sussex Counties have applied for the money.

At Wednesday hearing, Myers said, slides of each home under consideration were shown and the program explained by Mike Thompson of the County offices and a State official.

If Felton is chosen, those who qualify would be residents who are living in their own homes. Kent County would

select the recipients and administer the program.

Myers said the Council encountered some reluctance to insure question in the survey. But he felt as the program unfolded, people would be more receptive.

Properties selected are likely to be those where improvement would be most visible. But such things as sewer, water, plumbing, electricity and insulation would get attention, too.

Voters to choose from 3 school board candidates

Voters in the Lake Forest School District will select one of three candidates to serve a five year term on the school board next Tuesday. The three candidates are the co-owner of Felton's Golden Years Manor, James Sluter; Area housewife and employee of Diamond State Truck Brokers, Doris Draper; and Frederica area farmer and owner of Grier Lumber in Milford, Wallace Caulk.

Election hours are 2 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday May 11; the polling places are the three elementary schools in the district.

A "meet-the-candidates" night was held yesterday evening at the Lake Forest High School auditorium to give the tree three an opportunity to field questions from the public.

Each of the candidates also talked with *The Harrington Journal* giving some personal background and talking about his concerns in running for the school board.

Wallace Caulk

Wallace Caulk has at least two concerns in mind as he looks at the school board seat. One of these is discipline, an area he feels is becoming more and more a problem and one in which "we need to be much tougher". He thinks the school board needs to take a firm stand behind administrators and teachers in dealing with the small percentage of students who would disrupt classes.

Priorities in a period of budget cutting are a second concern. He feels the need to emphasize the basics - reading, writing and arithmetic - and to make sure there are enough books. These should come before other programs.

Caulk sees some pluses. He thinks Lake Forest is a good district with a good superintendent and he is proud of the restraint with which teachers handled the long contract bargaining process just completed.

Caulk also sees the need to form a committee of board members and teachers as early as this fall to begin the negotiating process for 1983.

A 1959 graduate of Felton High School, Caulk was active in the Future Farmers of America and was named National Star Dairy Farmer in 1958. In 1961 he received the singular honor of being named Regional Star Farmers of America from the Eastern region encompassing states from Maine to the Carolinas. Only one other Delaware farmer has achieved that distinction -

Caulk's father.

In high school he served as president of both the Student Government Association and the Senior Class. In 1967 he was president of the Felton Alumni Association.

A farmer all his life, Grier is also a businessman. About ten years ago he bought an interest in Grier Lumber Company in Milford and has since become actively involved in that enterprise.

He maintains a herd of registered polled Herefords and is now trying to build a herd of buffalo. The Caulks now have four buffalo which they hope to build up to a base herd of 20 to domesticate and sell to various parks around the country. He is married to the former Barbara Biddle. They have two children: Terry, a freshman at Lake Forest High School, and Shaun, a seventh grader at W.T. Chipman.

Doris Draper

Communication and finances are two big items in Doris Draper's mind as she makes a bid for the school board seat. Mrs. Draper feels that the public is not getting the information it needs from the local board of education. As one example she cites the need for publicizing proposals and counter proposals in the long negotiations between the board and the teachers. She also thinks the district could and should do more to make public its finances.

Mrs. Draper is further concerned with the effect of national budget cutting on education. She feels the quality of education in Delaware has gone down and mentions the fact that Delaware this year had no National Merit Scholars while no one from Kent and Sussex counties even made the semi-finals in that competition.

She also says she is bothered by the 30 percent of district children in remedial reading classes, the passing grade level set at a low 64 or 65 and the quality of local vocational programs.

She sees need for the board to communicate more freely with the public and to place children as its top priority. Parents, too, she says, need to get involved. In addition to the vocational courses, she thinks math and English need bolstering.

The former Doris Wechtenhiser, Mrs. Draper is a 1965 graduate of Harrington High School. She was employed at Masten's Trucking and at Webb's Ford Mercury in Mildred before going to Diamond State Truck Brokers where she has worked for the past nine years.

She is married to Donald Draper. They have two children: Donald, a seventh grader at Chipman, and Jackie, in the sixth grade at Lake Forest South.

Both Drapers are active in trying to revive Boy Scout Troop 76 in Harrington. Donald is Scoutmaster, and Doris serves on the Scout committee.

James Sluter

"Obtaining and maintaining quality education for our children" is a major goal of board candidate James "Jim" Sluter of Felton. Sluter has no big beefs with the current school board system. But he would like to see "even better communication between the board and the administration as well as teachers, parents and students."

He would also emphasize getting back to basics, i.e. the "3 R's". Math instruction is one of his pet peeves because he feels we may have gotten too far away from the basic math skills for a number of our students.

Sluter basically considers himself a

Felton woman raped by hitchhiker

A 57 year old Felton woman who walked away from the Delaware State Hospital was raped and assaulted by a hitchhiker at 5:00 p.m., April 27, near U.S. route 40 and the Delaware-Maryland line. The victim had met two hitchhikers (1 man and 1 woman) along U.S. route 40 near Sandy Brae Road. The man withdrew a knife, forced the older woman to a marshy area, and raped her. He then struck the victim repeatedly in the face. Finally, the subject cut the woman's clothing from her body and took her purse containing approximately \$1.00 in loose change.

The victim walked to a nearby farm house, and the resident contacted the Cecil County Sheriff's Dept. Since the incident occurred in Delaware, the woman was transported to the Doris South Wing of the General Division Hospital and treated for lacerations of the body. She was then transferred to the Delaware Division Hospital, treated for severe contusions to the left side of her face, and returned to the Delaware State Hospital.

The hitchhikers are described as a white male and a white female in their early 20's. The man is 5'10" in height with a slim build and medium length brown hair. He was wearing a tan jacket and trousers and a gray sweat-shirt with an unknown emblem. The female companion wore a blue denim jacket and slacks.

Police departments along the eastern seaboard have been notified by teletype to be on the lookout for these two subjects.

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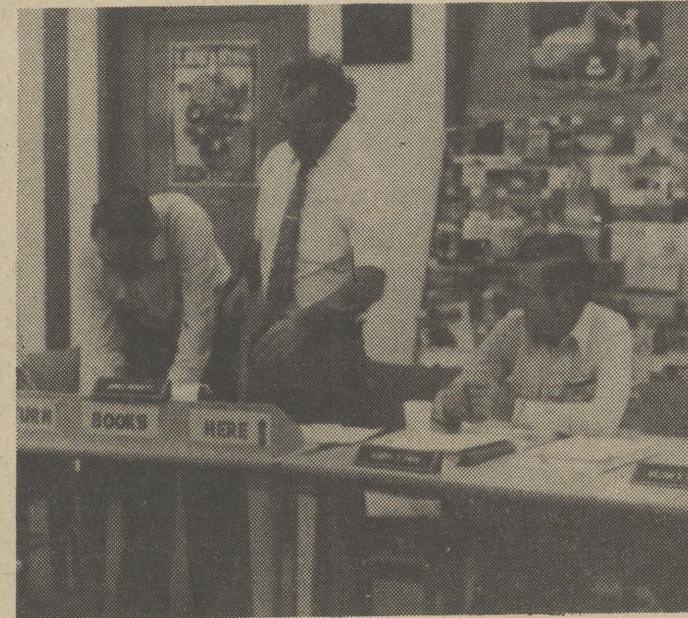

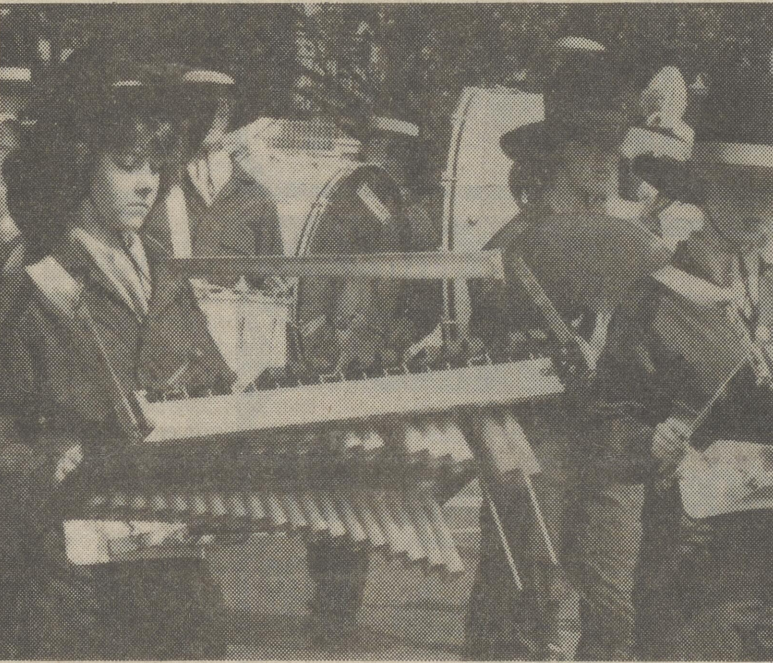

Three Pagans arrested in assault on Dover woman

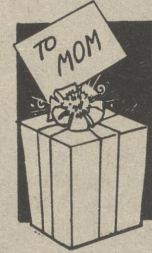

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ABDOMINAL HERNIA

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The two phases of the Second Coming of Christ

by the Rev. Ray Newman

The correct way to interpret the prophetic portions of the Scriptures or any other section for that matter, is to take them literally. The literal method of interpretation simply takes the words and statements of the Bible to mean what they say. In other words, the literalist accepts the words in their normal sense unless there is some indication from the context of the Scripture passage itself to do otherwise. Of course one must allow for figures of speech, idioms and other writing techniques, but it must be remembered that these devices have a literal thought or meaning behind them. For example, in the statement, "Wow! He really blew his stack" we cannot take each word in a literal

fashion, but we do understand that the one being described did actually become very angry.

By applying the literal method of interpretation to the subject of the Second Coming of Christ, two phases of this event are clearly discernible. The first phase, called the Rapture by theologians, is imminent and is the next great event to take place in the history of the Church of our Lord. Following the Rapture, there will be a seven year period called the Tribulation. At the end of the Tribulation period, Christ will return to the earth in great glory to establish a kingdom. This second phase of the Return of Christ is called the Revelation of Christ.

The Rapture is clearly set forth in I

Thessalonians 4:13-18, I Corinthians 15:51-58, Philippians 3:20-21, Titus 2:11-15, and I John 3:1-2. (There are other allusions to this great event, but

Lake Forest's distaff track team may be heading for the Henlopen Conference championship. The locals are unbeaten, at this juncture and can win it all, barring an epidemic. The only strong team left on the schedule, is Dover and the Spartans are far enough ahead, to lose this meet and still win all the marbles. But Coach Jim Blades and his charges aren't about to roll over and play dead for the Senators either.

In the 75-77 Spartan win, Woodbridge took two relays, the hurdles and the shot, but everything else was all Lake Forest.

Tara Gladden, Donna Pardee and Carolyn Browne were double winners. Gladden won a pressure-packed 1600 meter run, from one of the fleet Felder sisters of Woodbridge. The two ran together the entire way with Gladden, slightly in the lead. Felder inched ahead, in the home stretch, but Tara fought back and outleaped her rival, at the tape. The 5.56 clocking, on dirt, was a good one. Gladden returned to win the 3200, over her friendly rival, Melissa Wilson of near Greenwood. Wilson had beaten Tara earlier this campaign.

Two Lake Forest freshmen combined for eight big points, in the 100 meters with Carolyn Browne nosing out Joann Smith. Browne later annexed the 2001, in 27.9. Smith later won the long jump (15-7) then united with Browne, Sheri Durant and Patty Drew, to take the 400 meter relay, in 53.6.

Donna Pardee fought off a spirited challenge from teammate, Pam Pierce, to finish first in the 800 meters, in 2:41.7. Donna then captured the 400 meters in 62.8. Pierce, a powerful improving runner, also was a strong third in the 1600 meter run, in personal best time.

Sharon Burton broke her own school record, in the discus, as she spun the platter 107 feet, 10 inches. Burton is something like 17 feet better than the No. 2 person on the all-time list. She's only a sophomore and like Rob Prutzman, it may be many years before anyone can touch the discus record, when she finally reaches her peak, in 1984, hopefully.

Karen Gibbs, Patti Drew and Ann Irby swept the high jump. Gibbs was third in the long jump. Irby was third in both hurdles. The Spartans appeared to be snake-bit, in the timber-topping events. Irby was leading the 100 hurdles, but, hit, one and lost momentum. Lynn Mills hurt, an ankle in the race and could not compete, in the 200 hurdles. Irby then fell down in the first heat. Debbie Jester did the same in the second heat. Woodbridge's Laurie Hamstead then crashed, in the third heat. Irby got third eventually, because she was up faster than the other two fallen gladiators.

Caritha Clarke was the final Spartan winner, annexing the triple jump, with a leap of 33 feet, 8 inches. Christine Nichols was third, Angie Akins, a fine shot prospect, was second in that event.

Sheri Coburn was the Lake Forest record-holder, in the now-defunct 1500 meter run. That was two years ago. The year before that she was the top point scorer, on the team as freshman. The last two years she has been slowed drastically by leg problems. A lesser person would have resigned. But Sheri is still around doing what she can to help the team. She finished behind Pardee and Pierce in the 800, to complete the Spartan sweep, then was third again, in the 3200 meters. We mentioned her last, but she's definitely not the least.

Do Derby winners automatically go to the Preakness?

You might have wondered sometime how many Kentucky Derby winners have skipped the Preakness. There have been some. The horse which won the Derby on Saturday, Gata Del Sol, according to his handlers and owners... all but cancelled out of the upcoming Preakness.

When was the last time this happened? It was 23 years ago when a horse named Tommy Lee after winning the Kentucky Derby was shipped back to California from whence he came...and the Preakness committee that year wasn't put out that much. Tommy Lee was an average horse. He did not race in the Preakness or the Belmont that year but played around in the California sun. He never won another race. Soon after his Derby victory he was injured and was retired. He never produced as a sire either. Royal Orbit won the Preakness that year and the great one...Sword Dancer won the Belmont. Only the latter proved to be a good all around horse and sire.

In 1955 the great Swaps won the Derby but passed up the Preakness and the Belmont. It was another great horse Native Dancer who won the Belmont. That year the Preakness missed very much the opportunity to

have Swaps run on the Maryland oval. Dollar and cents wise...it hurt, for Swaps was one of the greatest race horses of all time.

This year whether Gata Del Sol runs in the Preakness or the Belmont isn't going to amount to much tears on the part of the racing committee at either track. There just won't be a triple crown winner this year.

What reasoning would a trainer or owner follow in skipping certain races? Well...in thoroughbred or flat racing... distance and number of races "...back-to-back" has a lot to do with it. In the case of Gata...they have said he will run in the Belmont. Why? Well in the case of Gata he has had 3 touch races in 5 weeks. What about the distance? Well...the Derby is 1/16th of a mile longer than the Preakness...but The Belmont is 5/16's longer than the Derby.

What other factor would cause them to skip the Preakness? There is another horse in the barn right now at Pimlico. His name is Linkage and he beat the pants off Gata Del Sol in the Blue Grass Stakes...which by the way is 1/16 of a mile shorter than the Preakness. What about that?

And finally why did Linkage pass up

the Derby? I mean The Derby...wow! The owner of the horse and its trainer said the horse has had too many races in such a short period of time. With thoroughbreds you can hurt them to be sure. Well...there might be something else too. The horse is owned by Mrs. Harry Lunger of Greenville, DE. She has made several trips to my church... St. Stephens Episcopal Church... where she is very much involved with affairs of the Diocese. Mrs. Lunger took the Queen Elizabeth II last week back to Southampton, England. She was at sea when the Derby was being run. It is probably all coincidental... but. Oh Well...he is still a great horse...I just personally think that he could have won the Derby and the Preakness.

Finally the last time she visited St. Stephens Episcopal Church I asked about her son...a pretty fair Formula I race car driver in Europe. She asked me how I knew her son...and my reply was that once in a while I read that racing paper printed locally that is circulated all over the Delmarva Peninsula and other places on the East Coast. Couldn't think of the name of that paper at the time!

Raiders outrun track Spartans

The Woodbridge Blue Raider track team, heading toward an unbeaten season, hurdled the last serious obstacle in their path by defeating Lake Forest 95-46.

Gerald "Peanut" Perry, the Spartans ace sprinter was ill costing the locals up to 15 points. Jim Shuman, Lake Forest's pole vaulter, broke a pole last week and did not have enough time to get used to the new one. These two setbacks plus a couple of other bad breaks, kept the Spartans from making the final score much closer.

Jerome Scott upset a pair of talented Blue Raiders, in the 110 high hurdles, winning on a slow dirt track in 15.7 seconds.

Lake Forest's other two victories were recorded by the powerful sophomore weightman, Rob Prutzman.

Prutzman set a school discus mark, this spring and came within four inches of adding the shot put mark, when he hurled the heavy iron ball, 48 feet, 8 1/2 inches. Prutzman is 6'2", 205 pounds. Jim Minor, who set the shot record several years ago, was in the neighborhood of 6'5", 260 pounds. At any rate, Prutzman should eventually

be larger and may set shot and discus marks that may last until the year 2000. Don't bet against him!

Page Pulley added seconds in both weight events, to enable Lake Forest to outpoint Woodbridge 16-2.

Manny Hernandez was second, in the 1600 meter run, but set a new Spartan mark of 4:56.7. Maurice Coverdale was next in 5:00.2. Hernandez and Jerry Mosley were 2-3, in the 800.

A very fine effort was turned in by junior Marvin Parker. Parker was third, in the 400 meters in 52.7, missing the school record, by only one tenth of a second. The Woodbridge track is a slow, dirt oval, indicating the flying Parker might have had a 51.9 if the meet had been contested on Lake Forest's fast, all-weather composition surface.

Larry Guessford ran 10.59 for second in the 3200 meter run. Kevin Smith was second in the long jump, by three inches and third in the triple jump (43.4).

Tony Scott had good efforts with seconds in the 300 intermediate hurdles (43.5) and the triple jump (45 feet).



This passage states, "the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven" (v. 16). The same Jesus Who died for our sins, arose from the grave, and ascended into heaven, will come again. He will raise the dead saints first (v. 16), and the living Christians will be "caught up together with them" (v. 17). Please note that this meeting takes place "in the air" (v. 17).

In First Corinthians, the Apostle Paul reaffirms the teaching that not all Christians die. Some will be alive at the Rapture, but whether living or dead, all saints will be changed (15:51-55). Paul is more explicit about this change in Philippians 3:21. There he states that Christ shall fashion each Christian's body "like unto His glorious body." The Apostle John wrote, "But we know that, when He shall appear, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him as He is" (1 John 3:2).

Please note that in these passages the Rapture, the return of Christ for His saints, is considered as an event that may happen at any moment. Paul summarizes this concept in Titus 2:13.

'Looking for that blessed hope and the glorious appearing of the great God, and our Savior, Jesus Christ.'

The Revelation of Christ has a different set of circumstances associated with it. In this phase of the Second Coming, our Lord will return to this earth, not just to the atmospheric heavens (Acts 1:11). He will return with His saints, not for them (I Thessalonians 3:13, Jude vs. 14-15, Revelation 19: 11-21). The purpose for His return to the earth is to judge the nations (Matthew 25:31-45, II Thessalonians 1:7-10), and to set up a Kingdom over which He will reign for a thousand years (Revelation 19:11-20:10).

The main question for the people of this present age is, "Am I ready to meet the Lord should He come today? Since it may happen at any moment, the better part of wisdom would be to be ready. Receive Him as Savior now lest you be left behind when He comes for His own. "And unto them that look for Him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Hebrews 9:28).

Graveside services were Wednesday afternoon at 2 in the Bethel Church Cemetery.

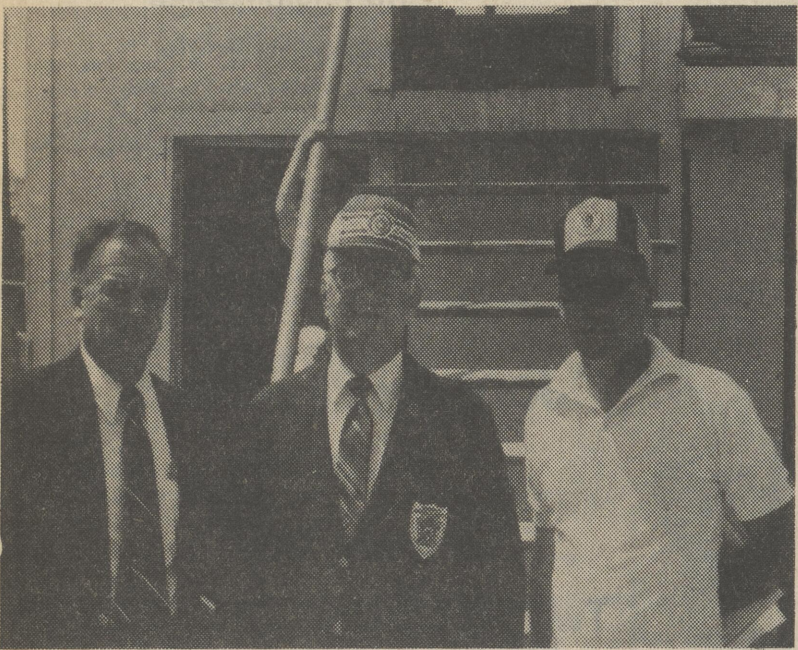
EVANS SERVICES

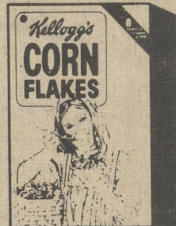

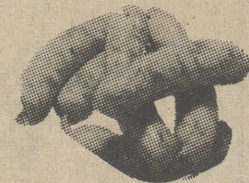
