Teachers get new contract

After months of negotiations, the Lake Forest Board of Education and the Lake Forest Education Association produced a contract that was ratified by the teachers on April 28, and signed by the two parties on May 3.

The new contract covers the two years from July 1, 1981 to June 30, 1983. This time next year the Lake Forest Board and the teachers' association hope to be completing another contract package. If they are successful fairly early in the negotiations, it may be because of the ground work laid over the past months. Much of the credit for that hard work is attributed by both sides to school board member Rick Feutz.

Among others who have worked long and hard is Peggy Coyle, gym teacher at Lake Forest North, who headed the LFEA negotiating team. Mrs. Coyle last week outlined some of the provisions of the new contract:

SALARIES

The local salaries negotiated represent the fraction of teachers' pay that is the local supplement to the state base. Major changes were outlined as follows:

Number of Steps

The number of salary steps was increased with the intent of rewarding both seniority and professional advancement.

Sample Increases Over a 2-Year Period

The new salary supplements are retroactive to September, 1981. Mrs. Coyle said they make pay for Lake Forest teachers comparable to that in surrounding districts.

OTHER CONTRACT FEATURES

Beginning immediately, the district will pay \$15 (instead of \$10) per month of the extended benefits on teachers' Blue Cross/Blue Shield coverage. The state pays the basic premium. This is for individual coverage only. Teachers who want their families included pay the difference themselves.

The district's grievance procedure for teachers has been rewritten to allow more flexibility.

A parental complaint procedure has been added to insure that complaints are handled through the proper channels and that they are immediately brought to the teacher's attention. The procedure refers to board policy in handling such matters. For example, the recommended approach for parents who have a complaint would be to try to work it out with the teacher first. Then the problem would go to the teacher's immediate supervisor, usually a principal, and if it could not be solved at that level, on to the superintendent.

Teachers maintain the exclusive right to determine grades. No grade given to a student by a teacher is to be changed without prior consultation with the teacher and then only after the change and the reasons for making it are put in writing by the teacher's supervisor.

A section has been added governing procedures to be followed on the event of an assault upon a teacher.

The length of the teachers' work day district-wide has been set at 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. This applies to the time teachers are expected to be on the job, not to the length of the student day.

Guidelines have been set for the extra meetings teachers are expected to attend.

Certain facilities and supplies including a desk and chair, adequate storage space, locked storage space, and adequately maintained parking space have been guaranteed each teacher.

A Policy Analysis Committee to include four teachers and administrative representation has been set up to analyze, review and recommend changes in board policy which directly affect professional staff. Mrs. Coyle said teachers regard this as an important step which could, if properly carried out, give the district's teachers a more realistic opportunity to suggest and react to changes affecting them before they are adopted by the board and made policy. The committee will periodically review policies such as the RIF (reduction in force) procedure that affect teachers. Sections were added governing additional school programs (summer school, home bound teaching) and discipline.

RIF PROCEDURE


With declining enrollments and federal budget cutting a reality, the procedures used by the district to determine who must go when the number of teachers must be trimmed has been an item of major concern. Shorthand for these procedures has been the initials RIF (reduction in force). Lake Forest teachers and the district Board of Education have not been far apart on how a reduction in force should be handled. But the teachers thought the RIF procedure should be a part of their contract, while the board maintained its right to keep that as board policy. The RIF procedure has not been written into the new contract, but the board and the teacher's have worked out a new policy based on a point system. Under that system seniority with years of teaching experience in the Lake Forest district are given the heaviest weight. Other factors considered are the area of certification, the depth of preparation (the amount of education extra degrees, etc.) a teacher has in his area of certification, and breadth of preparation (additional areas in which he may be certified to teach).

District teachers are unhappy with one provision of the new policy that does not allow them to exercise seniority in an additional area in which they may be certified but may have had no teaching experience within the district.

The Lake Forest School Board election was held yesterday as the Journal went to press. See next week's paper for results.

Frederica Mayor Dan Griffith resigns

Frederica Mayor Dan Griffith startled the Town Council in an otherwise quiet session last Wednesday by submitting his resignation. His decision becomes effective tomorrow evening at 7 when the council will meet to appoint one of its members as his successor.

This is the second time in less than a year that Frederica has lost a mayor. In September, then Mayor Ezekiel Dill resigned in a flap over rumors that he had tried to influence the legal process in the arrest of a fellow council member's son. The rumors, denied by Dill, were never substantiated.

Griffith's reasons for vacating the top Frederica post are his increasing obligations to his family and to his job.

He is Chief of the Bureau of Archeology and Historic Preservation for the state of Delaware, and he and his wife have two children. Now is the time, he says, that he is most needed as a father. He leaves the post with great reluctance, but his decision is firm.

Griffith told the Council he will remain interested and would like to help the Planning and Zoning Commission, newly formed during his first stint as mayor, complete the development of a comprehensive plan for the community.

Actually Griffith had intended to relinquish his Council responsibilities after March 1981 when he did not file for re-election. However, no one filed

for the two council seats then open. Griffith and Ezekiel Dill agreed to serve when they were drafted by write-in votes. At the time he said he would fill the council seat but would not be mayor. But Dill's sudden September exit put him on the spot once more.

Again this past March, Frederica had to depend upon write-in votes to fill two of three Council seats. Those votes were divided among twelve different people. In addition to re-electing Virginia Simpler who had filed for a second term, the townspeople recalled Helen Powers and tapped Rosalie Cline for the third seat. The other spot on the council is held by Tom Wilmore who

Food Rite will show Winston No. 1 Buick

Junior Johnson won 50 NASCAR Winston Cup races during his remarkable career. But he has been even more successful as a car owner, and stock car racing fans in the Harrington area will have a chance to see one of Johnson's winning autos when the Winston No. 1 Buick is shown at The Harrington Food Rite on May 13 from 1 - 5.

Johnson's cars have won more than 70 races and \$3.5 million since he quit driving and became one of the best car builders in the sport's history.

The Winston No. 1 Buick was actually raced by Darrell Waltrip, who drives for Johnson, on the Winston Cup circuit in 1981 before R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. purchased the auto.

So it, unlike so many show cars, it not just a vehicle painted to look like a race car, but an actual race car that is capable of speeds approaching 200 miles per hour.

The Buick's engine, body, chassis, suspension, cooling system, rear end and fuel tank are all either modified or reinforced to meet safety requirements prescribed by NASCAR, the sanctioning body for the Winston Cup Series, and to keep the car out front on the race track.

The red-and-white race car is powered by a 358 cubic inch small block V-8

engine producing in the neighborhood of 600 horsepower.

The 3,700-pound auto uses a heavy-duty Muncie four-speed transmission with a Hurst shifter.

The Winston No. 1 car utilizes a special 22-gallon fuel cell which is required on all NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National cars. The tank, which is lined with a rubber bladder to

prevent explosion, is fueled through a spring filler neck which was put into use in 1973 to reduce spillage, thus lowering the risk of fire.

Goodyear Eagle racing tires, 8.25 x 15 on 9 1/2 inch rims, are used on the car. In addition to appearing at local stores and shopping centers, the Buick can be seen at all the Winston Cup races this season.

Frederican dies in auto crash

A 70 year old Frederica woman became Delaware's 37th fatality for 1982 when she hit a car that pulled into her path at an intersection 9/10 of a mile north of Milford.

Delaware State Police Investigators from Troop 3 in Camden say that Alida G. Vittengl, 70, of Lot 231 High Point Trailer Park, Frederica, was south bound on Route 113 at 10:25 a.m. Wednesday, May 4th approaching the intersection of Routes 113 and 409.

Claude E. Lynch the 3rd, 19, of R.D., Milford, Delaware, was crossing Rt 113 east bound, had crossed the north bound traffic lanes and entered the median strip where a stop sign governed his access across the south bound lanes of Rt. 113. Claude Lynch either stopped and failed to see the oncoming vehicle or disregarded the stop sign and pulled directly into the path of the oncoming Vittengl vehicle, causing the Vittengl car to hit the left side of his car.

Alida G. Vittengl's car spun around and came to rest 110 feet from the initial point of impact. During the course of the collision, Alida Vittengl was thrown from her car onto the roadway.

The Carlisle Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance responded to the scene and

Houston awards trash contract

Low bidder Eastern Disposal won the contract for Houston's trash collection. Two other firms who submitted bids for the service were N.L. Wilkins and Son and Denham. The contract, awarded at last Thursday's regular meeting of the Houston Town Council, will be effective for the fiscal year July 1, 1982 to June 30, 1983. Eastern Disposal is the company which presently serves Houston.

In an otherwise routine business meeting, the Council heard several citizens complain of dogs running loose and overturning trash. Houston Mayor Virgil Emory reiterated a warning that it is contrary to state law to allow dogs to run loose in the town. Those who do so are liable to a fine.

But Emory also explained the proper way to channel such complaints. After attempts to settle the problem with the animals' owners have failed or after efforts to locate the owners have been unsuccessful, the game warden should be called. The number is

Among a number of items of routine business Monday night, the Harrington City Council:

-set next Monday night, May 17 at 7:30 p.m. in City all as the time and place for tax appeals. Citizens who have questions about their tax bills, should plan to be present.

-heard Mayor Al Mann report that the newly upgraded wastewater treatment plant is producing effluent (treated wastewater) almost as clear as drinking water. But, said Mann, disposal of a high volume of sludge is still a problem.

-approved several minimum design standards for Mobile Home Parks in the city. These include numbering lots visibly for emergency identification purposes and the installation of street signs and traffic control signs and devices.

-approved as the second reading an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance mandating the approval of a site development plan before building permits are issued.

-heard that work on improving West Street has been put up for bids by the state. Relocations of water mains along West from Mispillion to Commerce is included. The Council agreed to share with the state the cost of replacing 2 inch mains with 4 inch ones.

-gave the Harrington Pony Club permission to ask the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company for assistance in filling its tank truck for the 500 gallons of water a week it uses. The Council does not want the Pony Club or any other individual, business or organization to tap fire hydrants on its own.

Reminiscences of Our Harrington Heritage

I will say, "Good Morning to the World". It is Spring! She arrived Saturday, the 20th at exactly 5:56 p.m.

Today is Monday, March 22, 1982 and a beautiful morning it is. It is very quiet here in the country. I'm here by choice. My husband bought this little spot near Harrington for me. I love the people who have passed through this area, also ones that are here today.

I know I was born with an individual character. The Harrington people are also of a special breed. If you don't have it, just stay around long enough and you will acquire this special something.

I came in this world in a house that still stands. It is known as the Fleming Farm located about four miles northwest of Milford. The farm at that time was owned by Miss Caddie Fleming, known to everyone as Miss Caddie or Aunt Caddie.

I couldn't wait and decided to come in the New World early. My weight was about 4 lbs. If I didn't have such a loving mother and caring father, I just wouldn't be around to tell the story. I was their first child. My parents must have wanted me. I understand I gave them a hard time...cried for six weeks. Imagine taking care of a small premature baby in those days.

My grandmother is Amelia Archer. She was born in England. She would tell me stories my mother wouldn't mention to a child. From my grandmother's eyes I was the most ugly little thing she had ever seen. I'd fit in a teapot - long black hair and red skin. I also had little weak blue eyes that they kept covered with cotton...and she had been looking forward to having a grandchild?

In my family, children were seen and not heard. All my father had to do is give us a look. We were taught to say, "Thank you", "Yes Sir" and "No Sir". Baby talk was out. My first school was Church Hill located on Route 14. Next was Cedarfield School. The little school house is gone, but the name "Cedarfield" still comes up occasionally. Our transportation was by foot.

Miss Caddie to me was a real queen. She lived in a big white house at the corner of Mechanic and Fleming Sts. Where it stood, a nice parking lot has been made for the adjoining building, the Harrington Senior Center. She was tall, straight and wore dark suits - the skirts came to her ankles. I always remember her with a white high neck blouse. She loved to come out on the farm and walk the land with my father. I'd run and try to keep up with them. They were too much for me. With a lovely smile and a pat on the head, I knew Miss Caddie loved me.

My father was a farmer. He mostly kept two steady hired hands and when the children were small, a housekeeper. He tilled over 200 acres. Over 65 years ago, that was a lot of land for one farmer. This was before the tractor. (Don't miss visiting Walter & Marie Messick's Museum on Heritage Day. It will give you a good idea of progress and bring back memories as well as educate the young.)

The farm was fenced in with posts and barbed wire. There was no electric those days. We used Aladdin lamps with incandescent mantels which gave light equivalent to approximately a 60-watt electric bulb. We also had several kerosene burning lamps. Mother operated a treadle sewing machine and very well. We also had

something a lot of other farmers didn't have - a windmill to pump water for the stock.

My father owned land near Milford, Del. He also had a trade of business. He was a livestock dealer which mainly consisted of horses and mules. He would break and train them for work. His animals loved him. I never saw him beat them and he fed them well.

I always enjoyed helping father bathe and dress the injured animals. He always used a weak HGCL solution - the same solution they used in the emergency room when I was in training. I never did tell anyone, but I always knew my dad was a good "horse doctor".

Mr. Eddie Chambers from the Felton, Del. area was my father's farrier. In later years, Mr. Eddie worked at the Fairground with the trotters.

The Harrington Fair opened in 1920. My neighbor and friend Miss Mary Korbel still has her first ribbon she won in 1921, and ribbons for every year since, including 1981. They had no car, so each year her father drove to the fair with a horse and small wagon. There was a lot of room for her exhibits - some needlework, but mostly vegetables and flowers.

I remember my first visit to the fair with my sister and two brothers. My third and youngest brother was added to our family at a later date.

The dresses were finished - the lunch basket packed and a white tablecloth to spread over the carriage blanket. We were all dressed up like we were going to an Easter Parade - hats and all the trimmings. In those days, families dressed and looked forward to seeing their friends at the fair. It must have been in 1925. We rode in our first automobile - a Chevy from I.G. Burton's. It was black - open touring. Father never owned any other make of car. Do you know, Dad drove that open touring right through the gate onto the fairgrounds. We had our lunch inside the fence behind the stables. Now haven't times changed?

The children had a day at the fair, and mother and father had their day. They had grandstand seats to watch the races and visit with friends. My father had so many friends around Harrington. I was an old lady in my early twenties before I was able to enjoy the grandstand.

They always had dinner in a restaurant before coming home. I wonder where they ate? I heard them mention seeing Mr. Will and Miss Olive Sharp. Those two dear persons loved to watch the trotting races. I'm sure they just watched - no betting in those days.

I had no idea one day I would be a Professional Nurse to the President of the Fair, I'm speaking of Mr. J. Gordon Smith. I loved him as a person. He had a sharp mind and was witty and very unselfish. He would graciously help a stranger. I know his many friends and his family loved him dearly and miss him.

Milford man drowned

According to Marine Police Officer, George F. Gourley, a Milford man Keith D. Breeding, age 21, fell overboard about 300 yards off Bennett's Wharf and is still missing and believed to be drowned. According to the Marine Police, the fishermen were wearing the wrong type of clothing and footwear. They were attempting to pull in their fishing nets when they fell overboard. They were wearing waders as opposed to customary boots that allows water to seep out the bottom of the boot. They were also in a small 15

ft. flat bottom boat called a "john-boat" instead of the larger heavier boat that would allow the fishermen to walk around and use leverage to draw the nets out of the water. They also did not have a life preserver.

The other man, Emory Lynch, also 21, was able to free himself from the waders, swim ashore and seek help. It is believed that the weight of the water is holding Breeding under, and if his body is not found, the police said it would surface in about a week.


Students win in Math League competition

Gab Fest

I promised to tell you some more interesting things about dandelions. Since they are with us in abundance this year, I think the time is now, so if you wish to do any of this "good stuff", you'll have the material.

When you are picking your dandelion greens, save the roots to roast and grind for a coffee-like substance. Scrub the dandelion roots, drain and place on baking sheet. Roast in very slow oven, 150°, until roots are dark and dry... about four hours. Cool, and grind in food grinder or blender. Store in covered jar. To make a cup of this kind of coffee, you boil 1 heaping teaspoon of the ground roots and 1 cup water for three minutes. Strain and serve with or without cream and sugar. Or you may just add some of the ground roots to your regular coffee as they do with chicory.

You may dry the dandelion leaves and use them to make a tea which is said to be very effective in such ailments as drowsy, eczema, anemia, and insomnia. It is also an excellent diuretic which gives it such homely names as "potty herb", etc.

The dandelion blossoms are rich in pollen, making them very nutritious for humans. To prepare the blossoms, pick new ones on short stems, rinse well in lightly salted water. Cut off the stem ends close to the flower heads, leaving only enough to hold the petals

together, since the stems and greenery are bitter. Roll the flowers in paper toweling to blot up moisture, then dip each one in a batter made of 1 egg beaten with 1 cup milk, 1 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and a pinch of pepper. Drop the batter-coated blossoms into deep hot fat and fry until lightly browned. Drain on paper towels, sprinkle with more salt if needed and serve as a hot hors-d'oeuvre. Make dandelion jelly: Pick one quart of bright fresh blossoms. Rinse quickly in cold water to remove any insects lurking therein and snip off the stem and the green collar under the blossom.

In an enameled saucepan, boil the blossoms in 2 quarts of water for three minutes. Cool and strain, pressing the petals with your fingers to extract all the juice. Measure out 3 cups of dandelion liquid; add 2 tablespoons lemon juice and one package of powdered fruit pectin.

Bring the mixture to a boil in a large kettle. Add 5 and 1/2 cups sugar, stirring to mix well. Stir and boil for 2 1/2 minutes. Pour into jelly glasses.

I wondered what on earth it would taste like, but then I read on and my information says that it tastes remarkably like spring honey. Well, I could handle that o.k. If it were not for risking the waste of sugar, I would be tempted to try it. Is anybody brave enough out there?

You can also make dandelion root dye. Place 3 pounds of fresh roots in a five gallon enamel container. Cover with 3 1/2 gallons of rain water and boil for 1 hour. Strain and return liquid to dye pot. Add 1 pound of wet wool which has been mordanted. (The dictionary gives the word "mordanted" as a substance for fixing dye.) So your mordant with copper for a shade of dark khaki; or chrome for pale green; or alum for tan, and simmer 30 minutes.

Someone has said the dandelion should be proclaimed "The Weed of Tomorrow". Since "weed" is the corruption of the Anglo-Saxon word for herbs or small plants, the term weed is not too obnoxious.

We had our first asparagus of the season today. Too bad we can enjoy them fresh for such a short while. Naturally low in calories I like them best stir fried and with a pinch of dried hot pepper. All those rich creamed sauces usually associated with asparagus hides the really good taste of the vegetable itself. Try the following recipe, and I think you will be pleasantly surprised.

- "Stir Fried Asparagus"
1. Wash and trim tough stems from asparagus.
 2. Using a heavy skillet, brown one clove of garlic in 1/4 cup olive oil. After garlic is browned, discard.
 3. Add asparagus, salt and pepper to taste and a pinch of dried red pepper. Toss and turn till vegetable is fork tender. Do not overcook.
 4. Serve at once with a squirt of fresh lemon juice.

Jim Blades' Lake Forest boys' track team set four new school marks and tied another, as the Spartans crushed Indian River and upset a strong, favored Seaford Blue Jay squad, en route to a 6-2 seasonal log.

Indian River won only five of seventeen events and would have had only three, except for the absence of ailing Gerald "Peanut" Perry, the Spartans' premier 100-200 meter ace. The Indians picked up those two events, but were largely neutralized there, as Andy LaSalle and Ray DeShields were second and third, in the 100, while Ralph Young and freshman Buck Bordley, did the same, in the 200 meters.

Manny Hernandez (4.50) set a Lake Forest record, in the 1600 meters, while runnerup, Maurice Coverdale (4.52) was also under the old mark.

Sophomore Jerome Scott tied th Lake Forest mark of 15.1 in the 110 meter high hurdles. Tony Scott (15.6) and Micah Parker were next.

Rob Prutzman, sophomore strongman doubled in the shot (46-10) and the discus (134.4).

Talented Tony Scott added five victories, in the 300 intermediate hurdles (42.11) and the triple jump (44-9) to his second place, in the 110 hurdles, for a fat afternoon total of 13 points.

Kevin Smith was second in the triple jump, while Jerome Scott and Micah Parker went 2-3, in the intermediate hurdles.

Fred Goodman cleared 6 feet, in the high jump, with James Browne next. Browne was also on two winning relay quartets. He united with Ralph Young, Andy LaSalle and Ray DeShields, in the 400, (45.5) and with David Decker, Young and DeShields, in the 800 (1.43.5).

The 1600 meter relay saw an unopposed Spartan four of Manny Hernandez, Marvin Parker, Sheldon Powell and Nelson Mosley, cruise to the finish in (3.47).

Larry "The Bird" Guessford, Terry Caskey and Tom Silkworth swept the 3200 meter run.

Jim Shuman (11 feet) Dave Decker and Josh Howerin, accounted for all the pole vault points. Shuman and Kevin Smith were 2-3, in the long jump.

Sheldon Powell and Nelson Mosley, recorded 52.64 seconds and 52.7, respectively, for second and third, in the 400 meters. Mosley never ran that fast before. Manny Hernandez and Maurice Coverdale were second and third, in the 800 meters.

Three new records were set, in the 80-61 upset of the loaded Seaford squad. "Peanut" Perry came off the sick list to record swift clockings in the 100 meters (10.8) and the 200 (22.7). Perry also anchored the winning 400 meter relay unit, as he combined with Andy LaSalle, James Browne and Russell Elliott, a transfer student, from Syracuse, N.Y. to create a 44.8 victory.

Key victories in the meet, in addition to those just mentioned, were the three jumps, where Lake Forest outpointed the Blue Jays and the capturing of the three relays (21-6).

Jim Shuman (19 feet, 11 3/4 inches) Jerome Scott (19.9) and Kevin Smith (19-7) swept the long jump. Tony Scott set a new Spartan mark of 45 feet, 6 inches in the triple jump, with Kevin Smith, next. Shuman (11-6) and Josh Howerin were 2-3, in the pole vault.

Manny Hernandez, Marvin Parker, Nelson Mosley and Sheldon Powell ran a swift 3.37 to capture the 1600 meter relay.

Fred Goodman (6 feet) James Browne (5-10) and Jay Harmon (5-6) swept the high jump. Harmon, a good sprinter, has not been able to run the dashes here because of injury.

Seaford has powerful weightmen, in Rosas and Dowd, but Rob Prutzman of Lake Forest, more than held his own against them. Rob beat both of them, in the shotput, hurling the iron ball 47 feet, 8 inches, then spun the discus to finish second, to Dowd, in that event.

Frederica's mayor is not elected to that post; he is chosen by the Council from among its members.

In other business the Frederica Council:

—heard Tim Wilmire's report on the second annual town parade to be held on Saturday, June 5, the day of the yearly Street Fair sponsored by Trinity United Methodist Church. The parade will begin at 10 a.m. on the school grounds and proceed up David Street across Market to the fire company parking lot. Wilmire said two bands and the Dover Air Force Base color guard have agreed to take part. He asked the Council for help in traffic control. Cars are not to be parked along the parade route from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

—announced that money from several certificates of deposit that had matured had been put in a short term certificate. The \$31,364 thus invested will earn Frederica \$2087 in interest over six months.

—received final 1980 census figures which put the town's population at 864 with 327 households. Average residential property value, as estimated by owners, are \$22,000, one of the lowest, Dan Griffith said, in the county.

Star Pettyjohn and Durant were third, in the 100 and 200 races, respectively, with Durant clocking her fastest 200 ever.

JoAnn Smith doubled by long jumping 16 feet, 3 inches with Caritha Clarke and Christine Nichols, completing the sweep.

Clarke, the finest triple jumper in Spartan history, won her specialty with a leap of 32 feet, 10 inches. Nichols was next with a personal best of 31-9. Karen Gibbs was third. Gibbs later cleared five feet, her first clearance of that height. Freshman Patti Drew, an extremely agile athlete, was next (4-10).

Other double winners were Ann Irby and Tara Gladden. Irby (17.5) Debbie Jester and Lynn Mills swept the 100 meter low hurdles. Irby (33.6) and Jester then ran 1-2 in the 200 hurdles. Gladden (14.05) Sheri Coburn and Justine Caskey ran 1-2-3 in the 3200 meters. Tara then clocked 6.09 in the 1600 meters, ahead of Pam Pierce and Gina Turner.

Donna Pardee outraced Indian River's best athlete, in the 400 meters, with Carolyn Winder, in third. Pardee did a good 62.4, here then joined Winder, Sondra Warren and Pam Pierce in a winning 1600 meters relay (4.36).

Pierce had earlier annexed the 800 meters (2.39) with Sheri Coburn third. Angie Akins, Spartan record-holder, in the shot, won that event (34-4) with Sharon Burton and Regina Abrams, completing the sweep.

Burton (99-2) Teresa Tatman and Elaine Grant did the same, in the discus. Sheri Durant, Ann Irby, Pandora Scott and Patti Drew took the 800 meter relay in 1.55.

Against Seaford, the local girls set five, new school records. They have set or tied nine such standards, this campaign. Some of the marks have been improved two or more times.

Caritha Clarke is an athlete, who is definitely worthy of more recognition. She improved her Lake Forest school triple jump mark to an excellent 35 feet, 2 inches, to win that event over a pair of versatile athletes (Karen Gibbs and Patti Drew). Clarke has recently

bettered 16 feet in the long jump and is a threat to the school mark there, which is currently held by Joann Smith.

The powerful Smith (15-9½) edged Gibbs (15-9) and Clarke (15-7¼) in a torrid three-way contest. Smith later was first, in the 100 meter dash, with Carolyn Brown (12.7) in third. Browne, another fleet freshman, then scored 200 meters, in 26.8 breaking her Lake Forest mark, set one meet earlier.

Browne, Smith and Patti Drew, all freshmen, joined sophomore Sheri Durant, to crash the record book again. They ran the 400 meter relay, in 51.2. Records are often broken by fractions of a second, even in the longest of races. But Tara Gladden doesn't follow this formula. Earlier this year, she was clocked in 13.19 for 3200 meters, slicing a half minute off her old Lake Forest standard.

Against Seaford, the slender, blonde, freshman, called "Goldilocks" by some of her male counterparts, put together a superb effort, racing 3200 meters, in 12.49 down another 30 seconds.

It was in the nick of time, since she lost her school mark in the 1600, when sophomore teammate Pam Pierce, clocked an excellent 5.49.8, with Gladden next in 5.54. This pair might do some more pairing in the 1600. If not this time, they should do major surgery in this event, over the next two springs.

Pierce later was clocked in 2.35.4 in finishing second to Donna Pardee, in the 800 meters. Pardee had the same time, then doubled by taking the 400, in 62.2. Pardee, who has racked up a ton of points for Lake Forest since she made her debut as an instant star, a year or two ago, joined Pierce, Carolyn Winder and Sondra Warren, in a winning 1600 meter relay (4.21.5). This might be the top local effort, in this event, this season.

Sharon Burton spun the platter 98 feet, 9 inches to win the discus. Sharon was third behind Angie Akins (33-7) in the shot. Three high jumpers cleared 4-8. Karen Gibbs was first and Patti Drew third, using the fewer misses rule. Ann Irby (16.8) and Debbie Jester were 1-3 in the 100 hurdles and 2-3 in the 200 hurdles.
