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## Rain defers to Lake Forest graduates

### Honors Speakers

First on the program following the invocation by the Reverend C. Jackson Robinson were the four top Lake Forest graduates: Valedictorian Crystal Gerardi, Salutatorian Terrence Caskey, Third Honors Donna Blessing and Fourth Honors Ruth Knapp.

Beginning with the fourth honors address, the four spoke to their classmates on the leadership, knowledge, character and service that combine for success.

### The Rev. Miller: "You Count"

Starting with the Biblical text from Psalms 8:4 "What is man that thou art mindful of him..." the Reverend William Miller told the graduates "You count". He challenged them with two questions "What does God think of you?" and "What do you think of yourself?" Saying that each one has a purpose in life and something to contribute, he urged them to act on their own decisions, not to be led by companions and circumstances into reaction.

In presenting the graduating class to Lake Forest Board president James Gussett who awarded the diplomas,

Superintendent Edward M. Powell said of the few simple things in life that really count are the words "I love you" and a hug of encouragement.

## Ralph Tilden receives doctorate from Columbia

In 1964 a young man from Harrington who had already distinguished himself by graduating as Valedictorian with many other honors achieved the further distinction of being named to the United States Military Academy at West Point. This was and is an uncommon honor for any young person. But given the changing but still uncertain climate of the time, Ralph Butler Tilden Jr.'s appointment to the military academy was an extraordinary achievement. He was reported to be the first Negro from Delaware to go to West Point.

Recently Tilden recorded another achievement. In May he received a doctorate in political science with a thesis in International Relations from Columbia University.

The son of the late 1st Lt. Ralph B.

Tilden, Sr. and Ola P. Tilden, he grew up on Mispillion Street in Harrington and attended elementary schools in Kent County.

On his graduation as valedictorian from William Henry High School in June 1964, Tilden also received among other awards, an International Latex Scholarship, the Danforth Award for Qualities of Leadership and the annual L.G. Balfour Award given to the graduating senior with the highest scholastic average.

Appointed as an alternate to the military academy by U.S. Senator J. Caleb Boggs, Tilden was eventually selected by a special academic board to fill vacancies in the plebe class. His appointment thus did not take up any of the quota allotted to Delaware for that year.

He graduated from West Point in July 1968 as a second Lieutenant.

Overseas tours of duty included Vietnam and Germany. Upon his return to the states, he was a company commander at Ft. Benning, Georgia. After that, he earned his Masters Degree at the University of Pennsylvania.

Recalled to West Point, he served as a recruiting officer. Upon completion of his military service, he moved with his family to New York where he studied at Columbia University.

He is married to the former Florida Anthony and has one daughter.

His mother, Ola Tilden, still a resident of Harrington, is a former school teacher.

In 1979, Tilden was named an "Outstanding Young Man of America."

## Medical student spends week in Harrington

She measures just slightly above 5 feet in height, but what she lacks in height, she makes up for in sheer determination. Being a female student today in college is not something worthy enough to write home about, but a female medical student...well that is something else...let me tell you.

Recently Dr. Margaret Mary Corboy, a 3rd year medical student at Jefferson Medical School, visited for a week in the medical offices of Dr. Vincent Lobo of Harrington. The program which brought Miss Corboy here is part of the program known as "Physician Certified in Family Practice in the Country." She was referred to Dr. Lobo through Dr. Bernadine Paulshock who is part of the "Family Practice" program.

This program is part of the training for a third year medical student at Jefferson Medical School where they also go out to different hospitals as well. In the case of Dr. Corboy, she wants a general practice. "I have always felt that I would be better suited serving in that capacity...and

stay away from a specialized career," said Dr. Corboy.

To get a medical school, the road for most is a rough one. It hasn't been any different for Margaret, who studied and worked hard in college in order to arrive at Jefferson. She maintained a 3.8 index for four years at St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia of a possible 4.0 index. Through the first two years at Jefferson, she has had to work very hard as any medical student must in order to keep up with the tremendous work load. The schedule is a demanding one, and many students...outstanding in college are unable to keep up the pace in Medical School. As an honor student at Holy Cross High School in Riverside, N.J., she spent two summers working in a science program. The program was for those interested in science. The research was in diabetes. Following high school, she returned each summer to follow up on the project. She worked at Hahnemann Hospital, which also has a Medical School, one summer.

Although she has spent many hours in

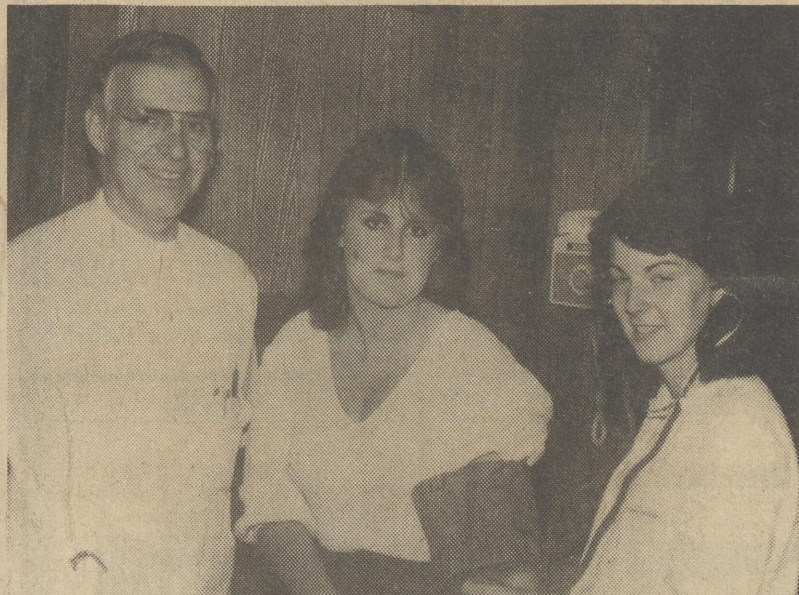
the laboratories of science departments and hospitals, she is a person who enjoys other things in life. She has studied piano since she was four years old and she loves the out-of-doors, which is something she does not get a chance very often to enjoy. She still appreciates it very much.

It is because of these interests that she has considered the Peace Corps when she becomes a full fledged doctor.

When asked about what made her turn to medicine for a career, she had many answers, and maybe it is a combination of many reasons. Her mother, a registered nurse, died a few years ago of cancer, and you can tell from your conversation with her that her mother obviously had a tremendous influence on Margaret. "I think in order to be a doctor....you must like people and you must be able to relate to them. Otherwise, I am sure it would give you a great number of problems. And helping them, and a desire to help them has to be there too. An absence of these concepts would not make it worth it to enter the medical field as a career.

It was a first for Margaret to come to the country, and she liked it. "I found the people down here in the country to be very, very nice. I couldn't get over how friendly everyone appears to be here. They talk to each other here, and they seem to care. I don't think you find that in the city. While here, Dr. Vincent Lobo and his wife, Herla, showed Margaret the area. "We ate at many good restaurants, including The Village Inn. I would like to come back to Harrington some day," said Margaret Corboy.

For a person who lives in a big cold city and where she is constantly under pressure to perform...and perform mostly in a man's world, Dr. Margaret Corboy has been able to maintain her warm, sensitive composure which enabled her to settle in so well in Harrington.

## Frederica may hold election

If the Frederica Council follows through on a motion passed last week, the town may hold a special election in the near future. Should that happen, there would be two Council seats to be filled.

The motion, originally made by Tom Wilmore, was that a special election be held to fill the post left vacant by the resignation of Dan Griffith. Wilmore said that if the seat were filled by the appointment of the Council, as has

been the practice, that would leave the town's governing body with 40% of its five members not elected by the people. Wilmore is himself an appointed member who was asked to fill in after the resignation of Ezekiel Dill. He said that if the special election is held, he will step down so that both Council positions can be elected.

## In Houston-----a quiet growth

To the casual visitor it might appear that little or nothing is going on at the old Libby's plant in Houston, Delaware. On any given week day, there will probably be a few cars parked near a gate. But most of the rooms most immediately visible seem empty, and there is little to be heard except the sound of running water.

Appearances can be deceptive. As the residents of Houston can tell you, Louis Marks and the Trappe Packing Com-

pany have been on the scene since 1979 when Paris Foods, a business firm of which Trappe Packing in Houston and a Trappe, Maryland are subsidiaries, bought the old plant which once employed a reported 1200 people.

At present, Trappe Packing Company in Houston employs just 12 people in the packaging of frozen vegetables and orange juice. Its 20,000 cubic feet of freezer space is used for the storage of 5 million pounds of frozen foods.

So far the company has been very quiet part of the Houston scene. Now it is starting to grow. According to Louis Marks, that growth will not approach anything like the growth of the old Libby's plant, but it will be substantial.

To the present operation, the frozen vegetables packaged in lots for sale to restaurants and institutions and the recently added 12 ounce frozen orange juice line, there will be a 6 ounce orange juice line and a gallon size citrus fruit salad line. The company is also investigating the possibility of making its own plastic containers and toying with the idea of processing or packaging soybean oil (used in cooking oils).

There is plenty of room to grow. Marks reports that only 1/3 of the 12 acre plant is in use at the present.

Trappe Packing Company's other plant on the Delmarva Peninsula opened in an existing facility in Trappe, Maryland in 1976. It packages frozen vegetables, also in large sizes. Smaller than the Houston plant, it has a bigger cold storage area (800,000 cubic feet).

## Shouting match ends Felton Council session

An otherwise quiet Felton Town Council Meeting Monday night ended in a shouting match between Gary Gay, owner of "The Depot" on High Street and Mayor William Myers. The session ended as Gay returned to the Town Hall, after a brief departure, and made a move as if to tackle the Mayor physically. He was taken out of the room and quieted by the Felton police officer, Lee Vincent. A chair was knocked over in the process.

The battle began when Gay presented a back water bill he owes the town and demanded it to be marked paid. He also demanded to know when the street outside his business would be made passable again.

High Street has been torn up with the ongoing sewer construction. With the recent rainy weather, it has been difficult to impossible for traffic to move in certain areas. Gay said he had been losing business because of the situation. He claimed Myers had promised to take something off his water bill in compensation.

Myers said he had made no such promise. Gay called him a liar and the implication was returned.

At one point Myers threatened to cut off the water supply to "The Depot" within 24 hours and Gay threatened to put up a rope keeping people off his property. Several residents including council member Johnny Hopkins have had to drive on the edge of his property to get around a mud hold in the middle of the road.

Gay accused the Council of being less concerned for his business than for the one on Main Street. He said the others have not been forced to close any days because the construction and street conditions have made it impossible to get in or out of their businesses. He has, and he said "I'm the one with the empty wallet." He said he had accommodated the town to the point of allowing a crane on his property to dig one of the necessary holes. The crane blocked the front door of his business.

Myers said he had spoken to someone in charge of the construction and told them that Gay must have an "in" and "out" at his business. Gay said a couple of buckets of gravel had been thrown down leaving conditions still soupy.

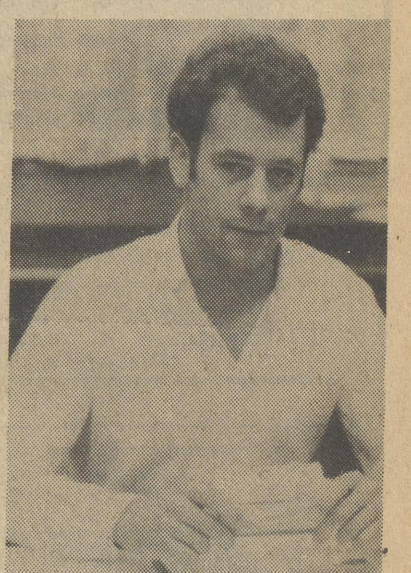

## Harrington man killed

Albert Taylor, 21, of Clark's Corner, Harrington, was dead Sunday morning in the wake of a street fight during which he was stabbed. The fight followed an argument between Taylor and Howard G. Hampton of Dover. According to police, the two men began arguing on Kirkwood Street in Dover, separated, and later met around the corner on the 600 block of W. North Street, this time with weapons. Hampton came with a knife; Taylor with a tire iron which he used to club his attacker.

Taylor was pronounced dead at Kent General Hospital shortly after the 1:40 a.m. stabbing.

Hampton was arrested Sunday afternoon at the Kingscliff Trailer Park. He was jailed and subsequently arraigned and charged with manslaughter. He was confined to Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna in default of \$25,000 bond pending a preliminary hearing.

official in charge and get him to pressure the construction company to provide access to "The Depot".

As Gay left the town Hall, dropping an epithet in reference to the Mayor. Myers said that it might be better if he went home and "took another pill." That was when Gay returned to the room, making for Myers who was seated behind the divider which separates the council from the rest of the room. He was intercepted by the police officer, who took him outside.

Council member Don Jacobs thought Gay had a legitimate gripe. But he said the construction company, not the town owed him compensation because of the lost business.

In other business:

-heard that some work has started in patching streets torn up by the sewer construction. Myers said everything will be over overlaid or resurfaced after the patchwork is done.

-said the Council would get together

to do some "tearing out and laying out" at the railroad station before deciding who to hire and what must be done to renovate the inside.

-heard the state's Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs had been in town photographing and collecting information about houses constructed before 1946. The pictures and information will be catalogued and a report made. The town will get a copy of the report. Several Felton residents had been upset because they thought the state people sent to gather the information were tax accessors.

-discussed with Voshell his plans to build about eight FmHA houses in the northeast corner of Felton near the ball park.

- 2 tablespoons finely chopped Italian Parsley
- 3 tablespoons olive oil

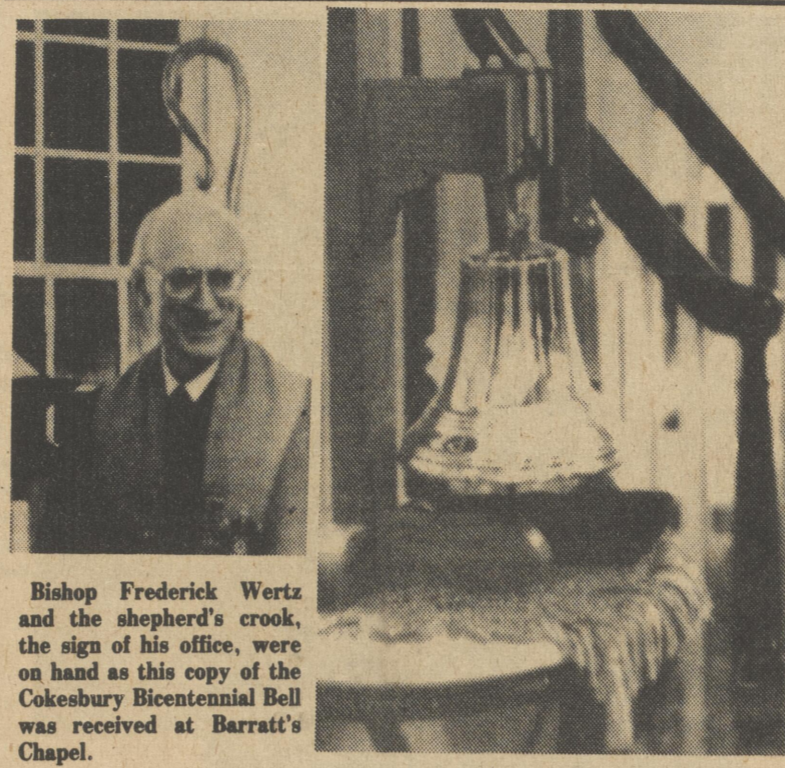

branch, the Camden location and a sales office in Washington, D.C.

From Louis Marks I, the business passed into the hands of his son, Francis Marks. Five of Francis' ten children (8 sons, 2 daughters) are now involved.

The location and the existence of the available plants in Trappe and Houston were the factors which brought the company to the Delmarva Peninsula.

Louis Marks II says there was a time when companies were moving west because of cheaper freight rates. Paris Foods bought the Maryland and Delaware plants when those rates started to go up. It uses its own trucks, shipping 8 to 10 trailer loads a day out of the Trappe and Camden plants.

The company handles the whole operation from the packaging of the foods (bought processed in bulk) to the distribution to various institutional or

retail outlets. As a result, it can offer its customers savings. The 12 ounce orange juice packaged in Houston under its Topco label, for example, over many major brands. Most of the retail sales are to large independent grocery chains not operating in this area. Louis Marks II, who makes his sells in supermarkets in Baltimore for 79 cents to 89 cents, a 15-20% savings

at home in business in Houston and looks forward to the growth of the company there.

By the way, I promised you the special recipe for the Chocolate Pound Cake. This is an old Southern recipe and at last, I feel that I have discovered the perfect pound cake when it comes to texture. If there is any secret to it, it is to make sure you beat a long time when you are creaming the shortening and sugar and then again well after you add each egg.

Into large mixing bowl put: 1/2 cup Crisco; 1 cup margarine; gradually add 3 cups of sugar, beating until very fluffy. Add five eggs, one at a time, beating well after each egg.

Into another bowl measure: 3 cups all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup cocoa. Measure 1 and 1/4 cups milk, add 1 tablespoon vanilla extract; add to creamed mixture alternately beating more slowly with the milk.

Pour batter into greased and floured 10 inch tube pan and bake at 350° for about 1 hour and 15 minutes or until tester comes out clean. I have made two of these and found that they were not done until about 90 minutes. But you'll know. You may of course ice this cake. I like a creamy vanilla icing.
