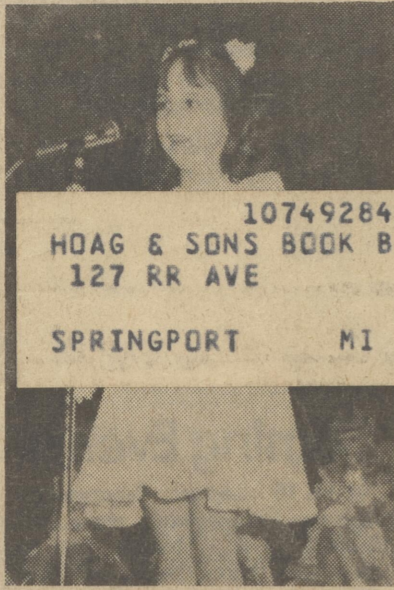

City will collect overdue taxes

The City of Harrington will take legal action to collect \$4,000 in delinquent taxes. On Monday night, the City Council voted to take a number of taxpayers to magistrate court over tax bills which date back as far as 1967 and 1972.

According to Mayor Al Mann, the accounts in arrears are about equally divided between property taxes and capitation taxes.

If the legal route were to follow its full course, some persons could eventually face the sale of their property for taxes.

Other business

In other business Monday night, the Harrington City Council:

granted an appeal hearing to Albert Price of Center Street who protested the amount at which his property was recently reassessed. The hearing was granted because Price had not received the letter stating the new amount until about ten days after appeals hearings were conducted on the new assessment. Price called the assessment of

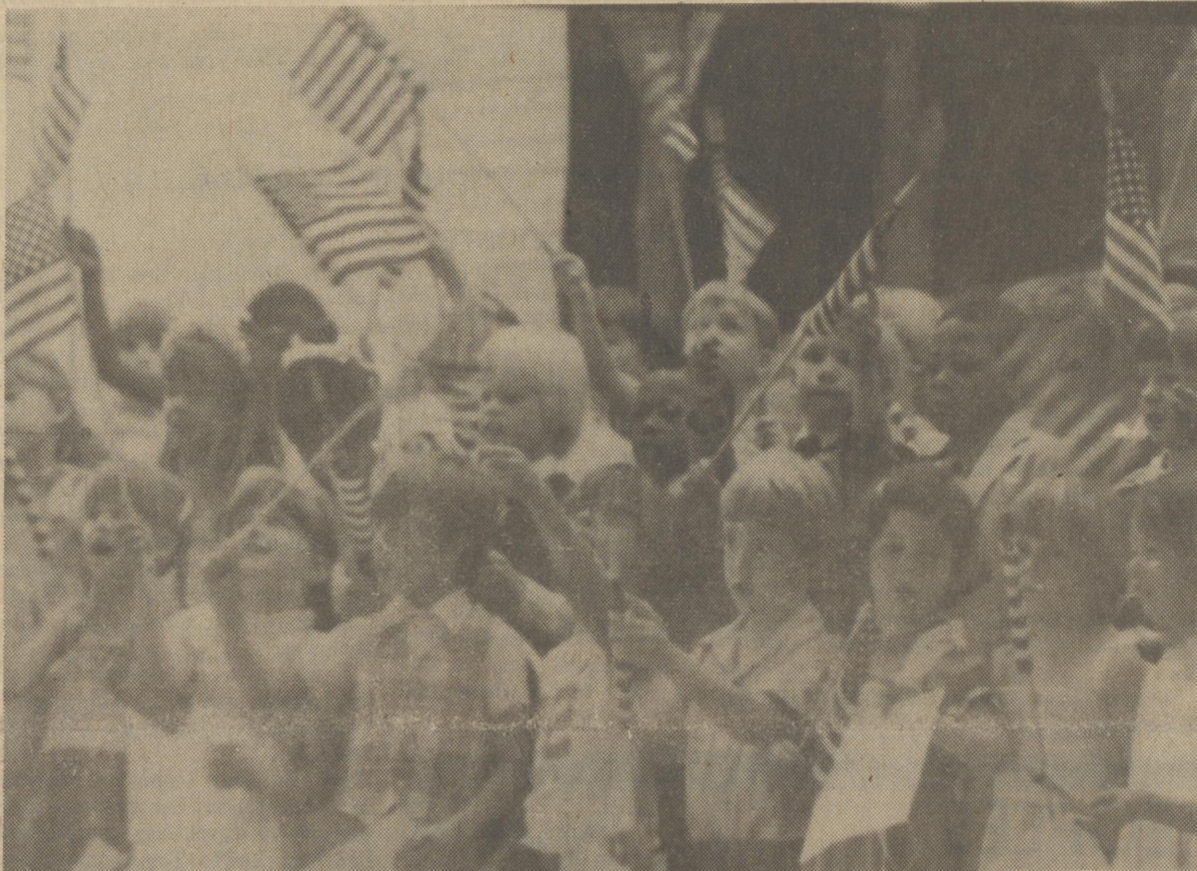
his home, which he said was about \$5,000 higher than surrounding property of similar value, "excessive and unjust." His new assessment is about 5 times the figure adjusted in 1978 after he made an addition to the garage. The 7,500 square foot home was built around 1918. The Council listened to his argument, but after executive session, voted not to change the new assessment figure.

-heard complaints from several citizens:

Mary Dudley resident property owner Mary Dudley said she had received her tax bill after the date of the city's tax hearings. She said she did not know about the hearings. Council members said the taxes were hung in the post office, at several business places and in City Hall as required. The tax hearings were advertised in the newspapers.

Martha Cole questioned the city's charges for extra

Harry Terry enters 33rd District race

Harry K.F. Terry, attorney with the law firm of Terry, Jackson, Terry and Wright announced Monday that he will be a candidate for the state representative from the 33rd district. 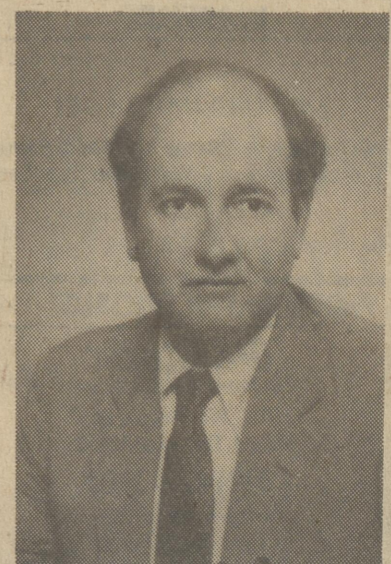

Radar truck will appear in Dover

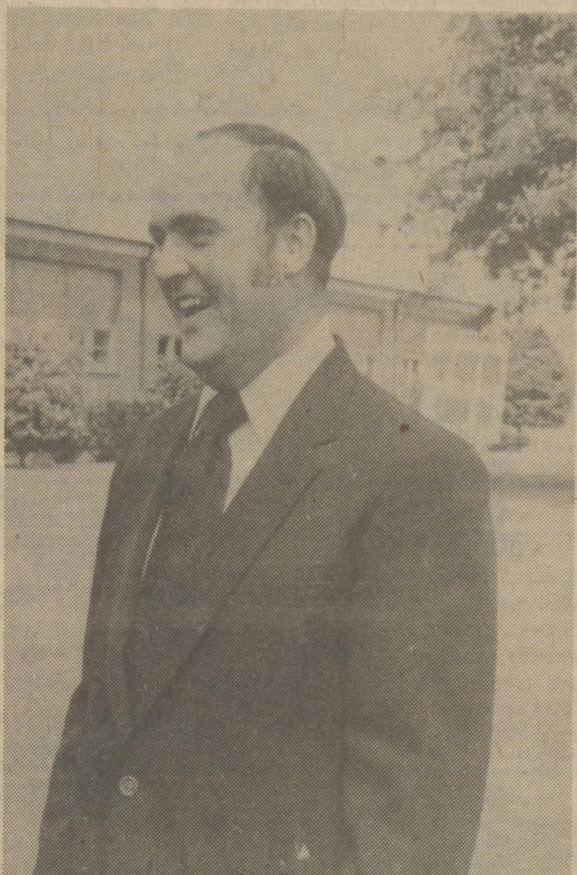
Preston Trucking Company's radar truck which appeared twice on the TV show "That's Incredible" will be on display from 3 to 5 p.m. this Friday, June 18, at the company's Dover location on U.S. 13 just north of Marker's Hatchery. It can be seen again all day on Saturday at the Delaware Motor Transport Association Rodeo behind the Highway Administration Building across from the Blue Hen Mall.

The truck features a radar unit built into the front bumpers that is attached to a computer under the hood. The computer is attached to the brakes. Working together, the system prevents a driver from coming up too close on traffic in front of him. Preston Trucking Company is publicizing the \$15,000 unit in the hope that enough interest will be aroused for the auto industry to mass produce the units at a more economical price.

Reportedly, the Ford Motor Company is considering offering the units as a safety option in its Lincoln Continentals.

Felton man jailed after abducting Magnolia woman

Edmund L. Cole, Jr., 32, of Felton was jailed following the abduction Sunday afternoon of Mary R. Kruger of near Magnolia. Arrested at his home by Dover police, Cole was charged with kidnapping and with possession of a deadly weapon prohibited by the Delaware State Police.

The victim in the incident which began in a Dover parking lot at the corner of U.S. 13 and Townsend Boulevard on Sunday afternoon was Mary Kruger. Ms. Kruger was sitting in her car in the parking lot when she was forced into the suspect's car. With the help of a person who remained unidentified, she later managed to escape in Camden.

During the ordeal, Ms. Kruger was beaten. She was treated for bruises at Kent General Hospital in Dover.

Cole was confined to Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna, in lieu of \$30,000 bail.

All donations are tax deductible. If not enough funds are collected to have fireworks this year, those that are received will be earmarked for next year.

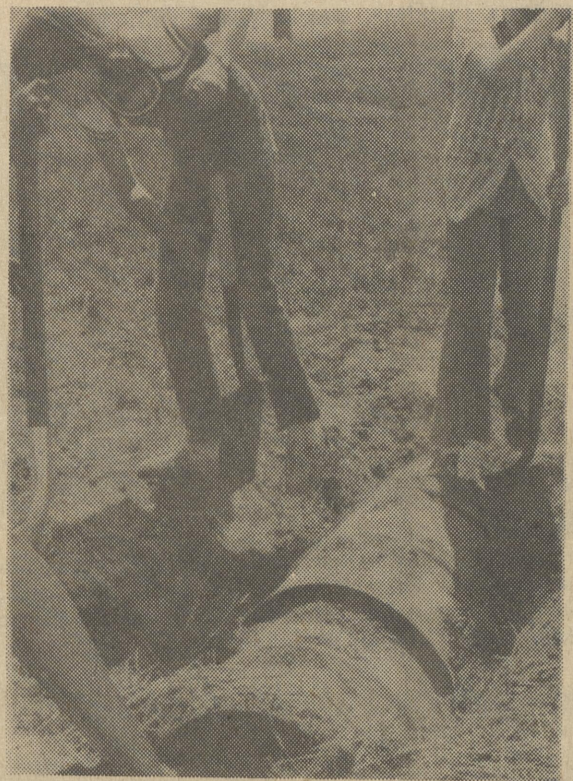

DPL issues new identifications cards

Someone wearing blue work clothes knocks and calls out "Meter reader!" The homeowner opens the door without a second thought. The imposter is polite, but while supposedly checking the meter he or she is also inspecting the home with the eyes of a thief. The imposter may come back to steal.

To help its customers protect themselves against just such an occurrence, Delmarva Power & Light Company is issuing new "positive identification" photo-ID cards to all of its employees. According to Robert W. Burkhardt, Delmarva's manager of security, the new cards must be carried by all Delmarva personnel who, he said, understand the need for the cards and even expect to be asked for them.

"Sometimes people feel like they're imposing if they ask to see someone's identification," he said. "The imposter will take advantage of that to bluff his way into a home. Our people know the value of the ID in helping our

customers protect themselves, and will never feel put upon or insulted when someone asks to see it."

Melvin L. Janvier, meter reader field supervisor, agrees. "There have been cases of people going around taking money from elderly customers and even giving them phony receipts. It makes the regular meter reader angry to see his customers and his name misused that way. Most of our people wear their IDs on the outside, clipped to their pockets. People doing a legitimate job have nothing to hide. We don't feel badly about being asked for an ID, and our customers should never feel badly about asking for it."

Delmarva employees have carried identification cards for some time. But to increase its value as a positive identification device, the new card has a new look. The ID features the employee's name, employee number, color photo, validation sticker and company logo on the front. The

employee's hair color, eye color, and height are on the back.

The card is signed by both the employee and company president Nev-tion. If that person makes some excuse about not having one you're sure of, don't let him in. Call us right away, even if he does look like a lineman or a meter reader.

"Don't guess about letting strangers into your house," says Burkhardt, "and don't feel shy about making sure. One of the best ways to protect yourself and your property is to ask to see the identification of anyone who wants to enter your home."

"If someone saying he is from Delmarva Power wants to come in, make sure. We expect to be asked for identification. If that person makes some excuse about not having one you're sure of, don't let him in. Call us right away, even if he does look like a lineman or a meter reader. We all carry company identification. Even the president and the chairman of the board. We carry ID badges for your protection, so don't hesitate to ask us for them."

We have always known that Harrington is a great place and the people are some of the cream of the crop. Last Saturday just proved this to us once more.

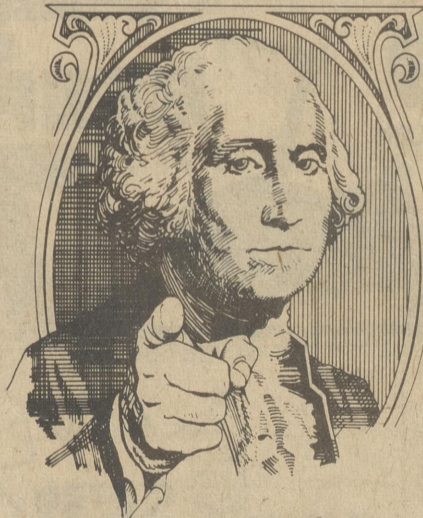

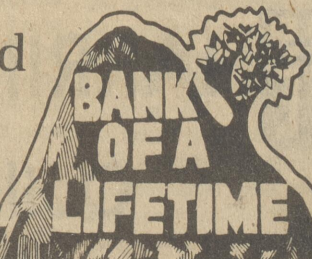


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Health Tip OF THE WEEK

Anne's Kitchen

This recipe is a tasty treat as well as a gourmet delight. The secret is in using the crabs while they are still alive and not boiling first. I'll admit it is a little tricky and requires a bit of a knack but it makes all the difference in the world. To clean crabs while they are alive, follow these instructions: Turn crab upside down. Hold claws against crab's torso with one hand. With the other hand pry with a small dull knife into the area where the flap is. Force off the top of the shell and discard. Rinse well and save bottom with claws. Now you are ready to begin.

Linguine with Blue Crab Sauce
2 1/2 cups very ripe Italian plum tomatoes, skinned and cut up, or 1 can 2 lb. 3 oz.
1/2 cup olive oil (approx)
3 tablespoons chopped Italian parsley
2 cloves fresh garlic minced
1 pinch oregano
Dash dried hot pepper flakes
3 or 4 leaves fresh basil
6 blue crabs cleaned as described above.
Salt & Pepper
1 pound linguine

Maryland Blue Crab (claw, lump, or regular). Judging will be on the basis of taste, appearance, originality, and ease of preparation. Recipes featuring the Maryland softshell crab may also be used, allowing up to six (6) crabs per entry. Crabmeat (1 pound) or soft crabs will be provided.

- Add tomatoes to oil and begin to simmer. Add salt and pepper to taste and the rest of the ingredients. Continue to simmer about 1 hour. During this time stir often and do not cover.
- After sauce has simmered about one hour add the crabs to the sauce. Continue cooking approximately 20 minutes.
- Have ready a large pot of boiling water (at least 7 quarts). Just before adding the Linguine, add two table-spoons of salt. Cook briskly till al dente. Drain at once.
- Pour linguine into large shallow bowl and pour sauce over top. Place crabs around perimeter of bowl and garnish with additional chopped parsley. Serve at once.
