


## Dr. Powell: There will be changes...

Next year, promised Lake Forest Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Powell, there will be some changes made. Powell was speaking of Lake Forest High School where he says absenteeism and tardiness are too high. There are also too many teacher referrals of students to the office for behavior problems.

He told the Lake Forest Board of Education Monday night that the faculty and administration at the high school are working to tighten up a lax attitude toward some things and to create a more positive atmosphere in the school.

Powell mentioned a few of the changes he has in mind.

-A student who is late to class will get a detention the first time, his parents will get a call the second time. This is in contrast to the present policy which allows a student three tardys before he gets a detention. That makes it possible for him to be as late as many as fourteen times before getting three tardys in any one class.

-Parents of students who are absent will get a phone call each time. Powell says the absentee rate is too high.

-There will be no more three day vacations, more formally known as out of school suspensions. Instead there will be in school suspensions during which students will be assigned to a classroom for the entire day and accompanied to the cafeteria and to the bathroom. Federal block grant money will be used to pay for the necessary supervision.

-There will be a self-contained unit for constantly disruptive students.

-A number of teachers are now completing a summer workhop on positive behavior reinforcement.

On the positive side, Powell said this year's district California Achievement Test scores would show a marked improvement. As a matter of fact, he said, the CAT scores have been rising steadily over the past four years. CAT scores will be made public at a

#### Truck drivers hold roadeo by Judy Weller

The Eighth Annual Delaware Safe Truck Driver Roadeo was held on Saturday, June 19th, behind the Highway Administration Building in Dover.

This year's event was dedicated to the officers and personnel of the Delaware State Police in recognition of their continued support and efforts to promote safe driving and highway safety. The contestants were allowed to compete in the roadeo only if they had not been involved in anyway in an accident during the past year. As an example of the stringent enforcement of this rule, Earl Solloway, previous roadeo and overall champion and member of the 1,000,000 mile safe driver group, was disqualified from this year's competition because he had

been hit by another truck while trying

to avoid the jack-knifing 18-wheeler. Contestants were required to negotiate 6 events in the course-parallel parking, freight door, right turn, offset alley, straight line and stop line. The most skillful driver with the least time used would be the winner. Trophies were awarded for first, second and third place, best score by a first-time participant and best overall score.

Felton youth killed

Twenty-Five Cents Per Copy

Sixteen-year-old Roger L. Cole, of R.D. 2, Felton, was dead of massive internal injuries Sunday night after he was struck by a train south of Viola.

According to Delaware State Police at Troop 3, Cole was walking his bike from east to west across the tracks close to County Route 240 about three-tenths of a mile south of Viola when he apparently stumbled and fell. His fall left him in the path of a Conrail engine operated by Thomas P. Hales, of R.F.D. 4, Salisbury. On impact, the youth was thrown 39 feet, 5 inches.

Cole was transported to Kent General Hospital by State Police helicopter where he was pronounced dead at 11:30 p.m. by Dr. Baker. The accident occurred at 8:48 p.m.

Second Fatality

Cole was the second area youth to suffer fatal injuries on Sunday. Earlier seven-year-old Jeneen White of Dover became the state's fifty-first traffic fatality this year when she darted into the path of a Cadillac driven by Jay R. Hausler of Pennsylvania. She was pronounced dead at Kent General Hospital at 7:45 p.m. on Sunday. The accident occurred on U.S. 13 just south of Lakeview Avenue near Dover.

## Chase starts in Felton, Md. youth jailed

Paul J. Oross, 18, of Denton, Mary land, was jailed last week after 131/2 mile chase that originated in Felton. Eventually the pursuit covered sections of U.S. 13 and 113 A and led to the wrecking of the brown 1972 Chevy station wagon driven by Oross who used it to ram two different police vehicles. In addition to Felton Police Chief Vincent, the Delaware State Police and the City of Dover Police were involved.

The Delaware State police furnished

the following account: At. 10:50 a.m., June 15, Chief William Vincent of the Felton Police Department observed a vehicle being operated in a reckless manner on route 12 within the limits of Felton. Using the marked car's emergency warning equipment, Chief Vincent attempted to stop the violator. The operator accelerated the brown station wagon onto U.S. route 13 and fled northbound toward Dover.

Chief Vincent requested the assistance of the Delaware State Police. A plain-clothes member of the Delaware State Police, operating an unmarked police car, entered the pursuit ahead of the fleeing vhicle in an attempt to "box in" the car. The operator swerved from the left to the right lane, pulled alongside the unmarked state police car north of route 10, and intentionally rammed the right side of the police car. In the area of the Rodney Village Shopping Center, the police car was rammed a second time by the fleeing

## School board action in brief .....

At its special and regular sessions on June 15 and June 21 the Lake Forest School Board:

•approved the purchase of new telephone equipment for the high school and for the Lake Forest South - W.T. Chipman complex (which contains the central administrative offices for the district). Buying the phones and interval wiring will give the district a guaranteed rate for the next ten years. It will mean a minuscule .49 per month savings over the cost of renting equipment from the Diamond State Telephone Company. B ut at the end of the ten years, the district will own its telephone and that cost, some \$600 per month, can be eliminated. The new system will also give the buildings three intercoms and a conference call capability that will not tie up outside lines. That means a principal in one part of the building can be in contact with a supervisor in another part without causing the phone lines coming into the school to give a busy signal.

•raised the superintendent's salary to \$39,000 (or \$37,000 plus \$2,000 for expenses). Just over half the \$5000 raise comes from state funds and is mandated by a raise given by the state.

The other portion comes from the local funds. Dr. Powell started with the district a year ago at \$32,000 plus \$2,000 for expenses.

•did an about face in the school calendar question. At the May 17 meeting the board had changed the first day of school, September 7, from a half-day for students to a full day. The change and the manner in which it was made had angered district teachers, many of whom showed up at last Tuesday's special board meeting only to be told they were not on the agenda. However, the board did hear them in an executive session (at their request). Monday night on a motion by Cliff Chambers, the board reversed its decision by a 3-2 vote. The first day of school this year will be a half day for

•rejected both bids for trash removal after high bidder All Rite of Felton protested low bidder Eastern Disposal had violated a technical specification by not submitting its bid on a company letterhead. However, Eastern Disposals bid was over \$1000 lower than that of its competitor and the board decided to call for new ones.

TALL SHIPS ON THE SHORELINE On the morning June 16, 1982, there were 24 Feltonians motoring to Delaware City to see the Tall Ships of 82, on the Shoreline. These magnificent sailing vessels were visible along the entire Delaware River Coastline. Our viewpoint was at Pea Patch Island at Fort Delaware where we had access by boat from Delaware City. Hundreds of individuals throughout the state joined together to see and celebrate, by

bringing along their cameras, binoculars, suntan lotion, picnic lunches, blankets and umbrellas. Many people took their boats out into the Delaware to welcome the Tall Ships. The first ones in view were "Welcome", U.S. sailing vessel, "Pride of Baltimore", this vessel was hand-built in the city's revitalized Inner Harbor, a Topsail Schooner. "Esmeralda." one of the largest Navy training ships on earth from Chile, "Eagle", the United States Coast Guard, officers, crew and trainees. Her original large carved eagle, figurhead was donated to the Marine Museum at Mystic Seaport. "Gloria". one of the world's newest training ships and is able to remain at sea for 60 days without replenishing. "Our Svanen", United Kingdom, under charter to the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets. "Simon Bolivar," the world's newest tall ship, "Venezuela", named in honor of "The Great Liberator," Simon Bolivar. "Providence", she was built as a Bicentennial project for the State of Rhode Island. "Elinor", this vessel is used as a training ship in the Baltic during summer and West Indies in passenger charter traffic during winter. The recipe which follows is the one which brought Paul Hayes of Georgetown first place in the Chicken Cooking Contest at the 35th Annual Delmarva Chicken Festival.

CHICKEN STUFFED POTATO SHELLS

1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts 11/4 teaspoons salt, divided 3/8 teaspoon pepper, divided

2 cups water 2 large baking potatoes, baked 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 cup sour cream 1/2 cup mayonnaise 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion

1 tablespoon seasoned breadcrumbs In deep saucepan, place chicken.

Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon of the salt and

1/4 teaspoon of the pepper. Add water. Cover and simmer about 1 hour or until fork can be inserted in chicken with ease. Cool. Separate meat from bones. Discard bones and skin. Dice chicken and set aside. Halve the potatoes lengthwise, scoop out the centers and set potato pulp aside for another use. In bowl, make stuffing by mixing together diced chicken, Parmesan cheese, sour cream, mayonnaise, onion remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt and remaining 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Pile chicken mixture into the potato shells; sprinkle with breadcrumbs. Bake, uncovered, in 350° F. oven about 30 minutes or until breadcrumbs are light brown. Makes 4 servings.



## Beneficial Insects - Nature's Pest Control

become more apparent, it's reassuring to know that nature has its own ways of preventing some destructive insects from overpopulating the environment. By maintaining conditions favorable to insect predators and parasites, farmers and homeowners can help these beneficial insects be more effective as pest

Some of the most important beneficial insects native to this area are ladybird beetles (ladybugs), lacewings, ground beetles, praying mantids, dragonflies, wasps, syrphid flies (flower flies), ant lions (doodlebugs) and lightning bugs. In order to take full advantage of these helpful insects, one must be able to recognize them and protect them from indescriminate pesticide use. Except in cases of a severe outbreak, many crop pests can be effectively controlled by natural predators, if these are present. Here is some information to help you make the most of the beneficial insects



LADYBIRD BEETLES OR LADY-BUGS - These small, bright orange-red (or yellow) beetles with their black (or white) wing spots are familiar to almost everyone. But many people are not familiar with the immature or larval stage of the insect, which is just as important as the adult in keeping down the "bad guys." The larvae of most ladybug species are blue-black and orange and they're alligator-shaped. Eggs of the beetle are yellowishorange and spindle-shaped. Females lay anywhere from 300 to 1500 eggs during their lifetime, depositing the eggs in compact clusters on foliage or ground litter.

Both adults and larvae feed chiefly on aphids, but they also eat scale insects, mealybugs, spider mites and small egg masses of other insects. A few even eat mildews. A single beetle may consume more than 5,000 aphids during its



LACEWINGS - Named for its gauzy green (sometimes brown) lace wings, this insect has jewel-like gold eyes and produces aphid-devouring larvae. The grayish-brown larvae are about threeeighths of an inch long, with sharp curved jaws that extend beyond their head. They feed on aphids, scales,

As mankind's ecological mistakes mealybugs, thrips, mites and insect eggs. The larvae's appetite seems to increase with each pest consumed, says Boys. It can eat a hundred or more insects a day



PRAYING MANTIDS - These exoticlooking insects feed on a variety of insects. They wait to ambush their prey with front legs held in the raised position that gives them their name. They're also cannibalistic. If food isn't plentiful, they will eat each other until only one remains. Though the mantis has been observed on field and garden crops, Boys says its value as a predator appears to be more in control of harmful meadow and pasture insects such as crickets and grasshoppers.

Other beneficial insects that farmers and gardeners should try to protect are syrphid flies, ground beetles, dragonflies, wasps, ant lions and lightning

DRAGONFLIES - These large insect dart and soar over ponds and streams with a freedom the most daredevil of pilots might envy. Dragonflies catch and eat their prey in flight. Mosquitoes and other flies make up a large part of their diet.

BRACONIDS AND OTHER WASPS There are many species of parasitic wasps, some so tiny they're seldom seen. They lay their eggs in the bodies of other insects, including caterpillars, aphids, thrips and borers. Once hatched, the larvae feed on the inner body fluids of the hosts. Some of the most common of these wasps parasitize sphinx moth larvae like the tobacco and tomato hornworms.

SYRPHID FLIES - Commonly called flower flies, these may be brightly colored and many resemble wasps and bees hovering over flowers. However, the flies do not sting. Larvae of most species are predaceous, feeding on aphids. They may also feed on the young of termites, ants or bees. ANT LIONS - Also called doodlebugs,

these queer-looking creatures have sickle-shaped mouthparts. They're more common in the south and southwest, but a few species are found locally. The larvae hide in the burrows in the ground, waiting for ants to stumble in. Once inside, the ants are quickly gobbled up.

GROUND BEETLES - This beetle family contains hundreds of species. Though they differ in size, shape and color, most are somewhat flattened, dark and shiny. Look for ground beetles under stones, logs, bark, debris, or just running about on the trip on July 13 at the Hukill's near ground. Most hide during the day and Angola.

feed at night. Nearly all prey on other insects. Some also feed on snails.

LIGHTNING BUGS - During the early summer, adults of this insect are a familiar sight as they fly about in the evening, flashing their yellow lights. Most larvae are luminescent, toohence the name, "glow worm." The larvae feed on various small insects and

**Buying Beneficial Insects?** 

Some predatory insects such as ladybird beetles and praying mantids are available for sale for use in the control of plant pests. Does it pay to buy these beneficial insects for release on your own property?Probably not.

Ladybugs bought in the spring were probably collected somewhere else during their winter hibernation. When released, they're quite likely to fly to other crop plantings some distance away. Or they may stop feeding and exist only on stored body fat, once they're turned loose.

Plant growers will be better satisfied with natural controls if they try to conserve the beneficial insects already present in the area through careful use of insecticides and through the recognition of eggs and immature stages of beneficial species. In home gardens he also recommends removing ants that tend aphids, scales and mealybugs, since the ants interfere with the work of the natural enemies of these pests.


