Felton firemen dedicate building

The Felton Community Fire Company on Sunday celebrated the completion and the opening of a \$320,000 addition which should make its semi-annual oyster suppers even more tempting to the public. Although the formal dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremonies were not held until Sunday, the first of those dinners had already been staged in a redecorated and enlarged dining room in the spring. In addition to expanding the room to 4,600 square feet of space, the new construction includes a 2,000 square foot kitchen, a brand new company meeting room, new restroom facilities and a sparkling public entry sporting built-in trophy cases already well stocked with mementos of the company's past achievements.

Fire Company Secretary William Myers, Jr., was Master of Ceremonies on Sunday. He introduced Fire Company President Walter Moore and Joyce Sipple, President of the Felton Ladies Auxiliary who gave brief addresses of welcome. Richard Ennis, who counts among his many fire service credits the fact that he is a past president of the Delaware Volunteer Firemen's Association, delivered the major address for the afternoon. He used the occasion to congratulate the Felton Company on its achievement and to lobby for reinstatement of \$9,000,000 for continuation of the United States Fire Administration to the federal budget. -Special Presentations- Continued on page 9

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Fireworks are go for Sussex 4th

GEORGETOWN - Fireworks are go! That's the word from Del Tech Southern Campus Director Jack Owens regarding the "up in the air" question of whether or not there will be a fireworks display for the first and fast approaching Olde Fashioned Sussex County July 4th Celebration on the Southern Campus. "Funding for this traditional finale has been an uphill struggle all the way," Owens said.

"But the people of Sussex County are excited about this event, and with their generous contributions, I can happily report that we are going to have a display this year," he said. According to Owens, the celebration - expected to draw a crowd of 7,000 is a non-profit venture, sponsored by the people of Sussex County and hosted by the Southern Campus. The Clowns of Delaware, an historical movie, an antique car show, a flea

market, craft show, and art exhibit as well as carriage, fire truck and ox cart rides, games for fun and games for prizes, swimming and picnic facilities are a few of the many interests to be presented from noon to dusk on July 4. In addition, life entertainment will be offered throughout the day: 1 - 3 p.m., the Banjo Dusters; 3:30 - 4:30 p.m., Spice; 5 - 6 p.m., The Corn Shuckers; 6:30 - 7:30 p.m., The Diamond State Twirlers and Stoney Creek Cloggers; and from 8 - 9 p.m., Bunkey Eye and The Inmates.

A special Independence Day highlight will be an old fashioned "Political Stump," an open forum (actually a sawed-off oak tree with a three foot circumference) for active campaigners. "All elected officials in the state have been invited," Owens said.

"And we are expecting that more than a few of them will take advantage of the stump," he said.

Also of political interest will be a "Political Dunk." Manned by political volunteer including Georgetown Mayor Layton Johnson and Delaware Representative Brad Barnes, this activity will serve a two-fold purpose.

Proceeds will provide advance funding for the 1983 fireworks display, and a "hit" will provide Sussex Countians the rare opportunity of seeing whether their politician will sink or swim when the water gets deep.

At 7 p.m. the Robbins Hose Company, celebrating its 100th anniversary, will demonstrate its new tiller, a remarkable hook and ladder truck, on Legislative Mall. Following immediately will be a presentation of the colors as an introduction to the United States Naval Academy Band, featuring forty-three musicians from Annapolis.

Mr. Robert Reed, former Delaware Secretary of State and coordinator of the event, will introduce the platform guests midway through the musical program. They will include Lieutenant Governor Michael N. Castle and Brigadier General Robert D. Springer of Scott Air Force Base in Illinois. At dusk a fireworks finale will climax the festivities.

No vending will be permitted in the Mall vicinity. Picnickers are welcome, however, and trash and restroom facilities will be provided.

Rockets to flare over Dover

On Saturday, July 3rd, it will be the rockets' red glare that lights up the flags flying over Legislative Hall.

For the third consecutive year, Dover's city fathers and businessmen, in cooperation with the State of Delaware and the United States Air Force, are co-sponsoring a Celebration of Independence. The state capital hopes to welcome the throng of Delawareans who have turned out in record numbers even for last year's fireworks spectacle veiled slightly--though stunningly--by a misty summer evening.

"Catch A Song: Art of the American Indian" is an exhibit devoted to the intricate crafts of the first Americans, which will open on the 3rd at the Visitor Center, Federal and Court Streets, from 3-7 p.m. The public is invited without charge to enjoy the exhibit and refreshments.

Barnes sets sights on 35th district

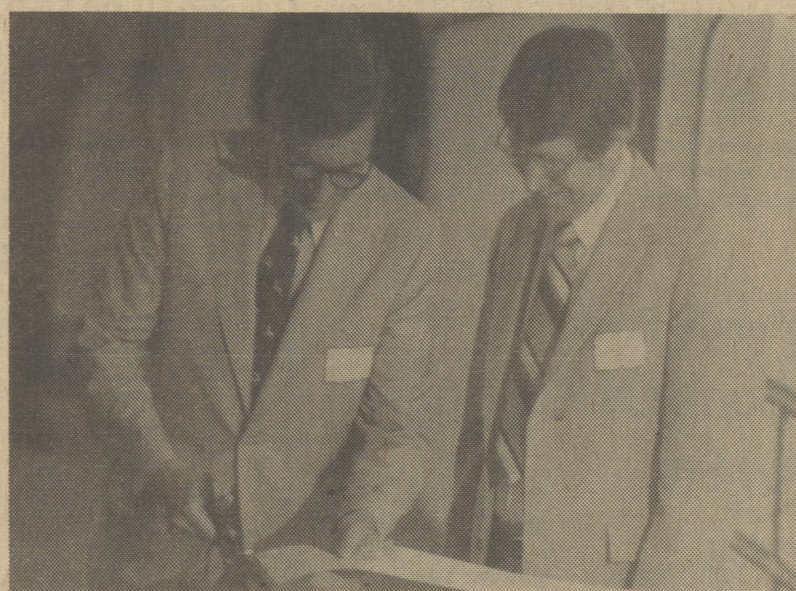
Representative B. Bradford Barnes, R-Bridgeville yesterday announced his intention to seek re-election to the Delaware House of Representatives for the new 35th District. Barnes, who is completing his first two year term as the Representative of the 38th District is organizing his campaign for 35th District formed as the result of re-apportionment following the 1980 census figures.

The new 35th District will consist of portions of both Sussex and Kent Counties. In general, the Sussex County area includes northwest Sussex County, Bridgeville, Greenwood, western Milford, and western Lincoln, from the Maryland line to Route 113. The Kent County area consists of lower

Kent County, Andrewsville, Farmington, Hickman, Houston, and a northern "panhandle" extending to Andrews Lake.

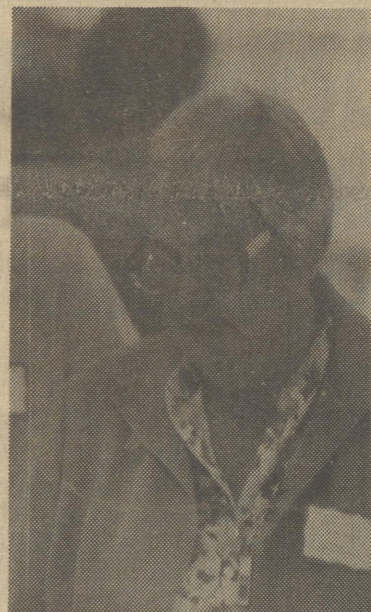

Frederica plant adds space to space industry

The rural quiet of Frederica seems quite far removed from the excitement of Cape Canaveral where another spectacular space shuttle flight was launched early this week. However, Delawareans who work at Dover ILC's plant near Frederica actually play an important role in the space industry. Among other things, they supply the wearing apparel that makes life in space possible for America's astronauts.

Plans are for the Frederica area to devote even more of its energies to the products of the space age. On June 24, the company dedicated a new assembly building and connecting annex which nearly doubles its space. The completion of the building was hailed by company officials as "...the first step in accomplishing ILC Dover's future product and facility expansion plans."

Delaware Governor Pete duPont was the major speaker at brief dedication and ribbon cutting ceremonies followed by a tour of the plant and its products on Thursday. Homer Reihm, President and General Manager of ILC Dover, welcomed duPont and introduced other guests including top company officials Leonard Lane, Chairman of the Board, and Anthony Trapani, Chief Executive Officer of Industries.

Among the other invited guests were Ruth Ann Minner, State Representative from the 33rd District; S. Allen "Skip" Pikus, Levy Court Commissioner; Allen Hedgecock, Executive Vice President of the Delaware Chamber of Commerce; Helen Powers, Mayor of Frederica and David Brandon of the Delaware Development Office.

The new building, a 350' x 110' structure joined to the original building by a 186' x 25' annex adds a total of 43,150 square feet to the 55,000 square foot plant. A fully insulated, prefabricated steel structure, it was built by Meridian Construction Company of Dover. A new parking lot containing 117 parking spaces was added at the same time. Ticon Delaware, Inc., also of Dover, was the contractor.

The new building will house a main assembly area, a fin test area, a heat seal area, space for shipping and receiving, a sewing area, a heat seal area, a cementing area and a loading dock.

Although the Apollo and Skylab space suits may be the most famous products of Dover ILC, they are just one feature in a number of efforts that are outgrowths of space technology. Also on display during the dedication and

Though the lost is something the family will never forget, it has not made them bitter. Instead, they honor Craig's memory by continuing to breed and show Jerseys.

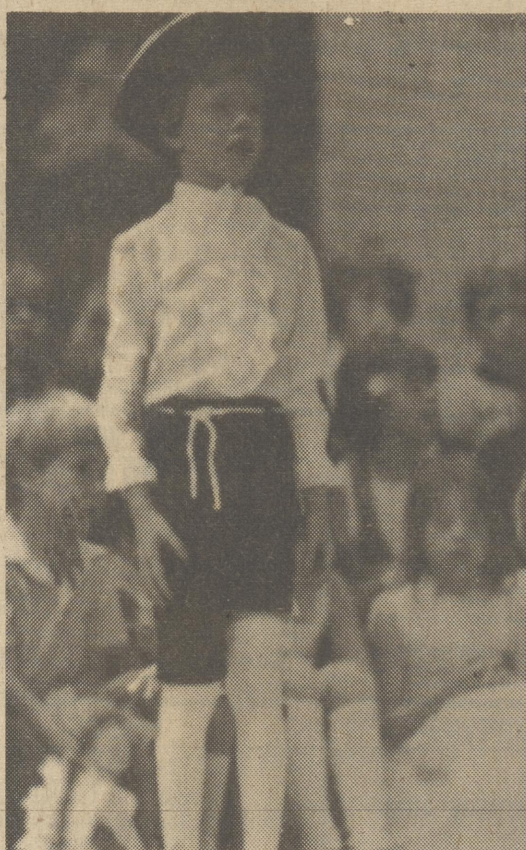
Though Eliason is a member in good standing of the American Jersey Cattle Club, he's not strictly loyal to the breed. To him, a good cow is a good

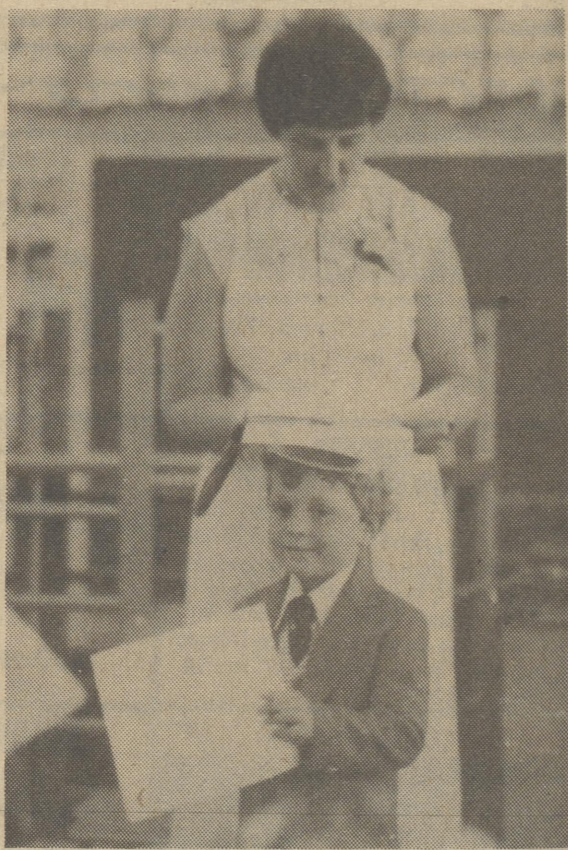

Tuckahoe Steam Show planned for July 10-11

Farming methods will be set back more than 50 years on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 9, 10 and 11th at the Tuckahoe Steam and Gas Association's 9th annual show.

The show, to be held at the Tuckahoe showgrounds located on Route 50, five miles north of Easton, will feature sawmilling, wheat threshing, rock crushing, shingle sawing, flour milling, blacksmithing, broom making, soap making and other old-time methods throughout each day.

On Friday and Saturday there will be 5 Percheron work horses from the Pennsylvania Amish area driving a horse power which will be operating machinery to thresh wheat and saw firewood. A railroad caboose built in 1943 has recently been moved to the show grounds and will be on display throughout the show.

The schedule of events includes a parade at 5 p.m. and a horsepulling

contest at 7:30 p.m. on Friday. 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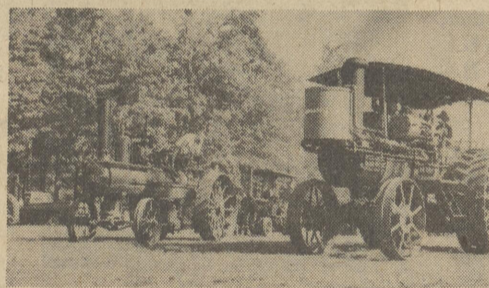

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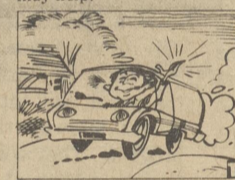

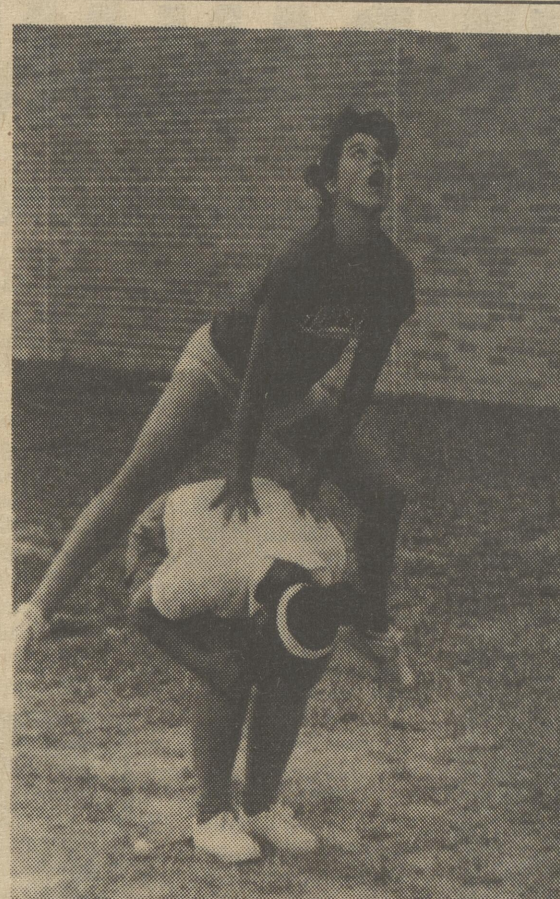

I have to do the dishes by hand because the dishwasher requires so much water. I had forgotten how time-consuming is the cleaning up dishes after each meal. I kept thinking that I wish it had happened earlier in the spring, but really, when you come right down to it, there is no convenient time for the kitchen sink to be stopped up, is there?

Anne's Kitchen

It's hot. Who feels like heating up the kitchen to make a pie? On the other hand the family still would enjoy a nice dessert. This recipe for a chocolate cream pie is just the thing. If you feel ambitious, you can make your own favorite crust. In a pinch, a frozen pie shell will do. You get equally good results with a store bought graham cracker crust or use the chocolate crumb crust listed below. I'm usually the one who insists home-made is the best, but in this case I feel I can make an exception since the filling is so super good. You may want to try the variations to the recipe. I've tried them all and find one better than the other. You may come up with a few variations of your own.

CHOCOLATE CREAM PIE
9" baked pastry shell or crumb crust
1/2 cup cocoa
1/4 cups sugar
1/2 cup cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
3 tablespoons butter
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Sweetened whipped cream

1. Prepare pie shell and cool if necessary.
2. Combine cocoa, sugar, cornstarch and salt in medium saucepan.
3. Blend in milk till smooth.
4. Cook and stir over medium heat till mixture boils; boil and stir 3 minutes (be sure and time yourself)
5. Remove from heat; blend in butter and vanilla.
6. Pour into pie shell; cover filling with plastic wrap to avoid filling thickening on surface.
7. Chill at least 4 - 5 hours. Serve with whipped cream.

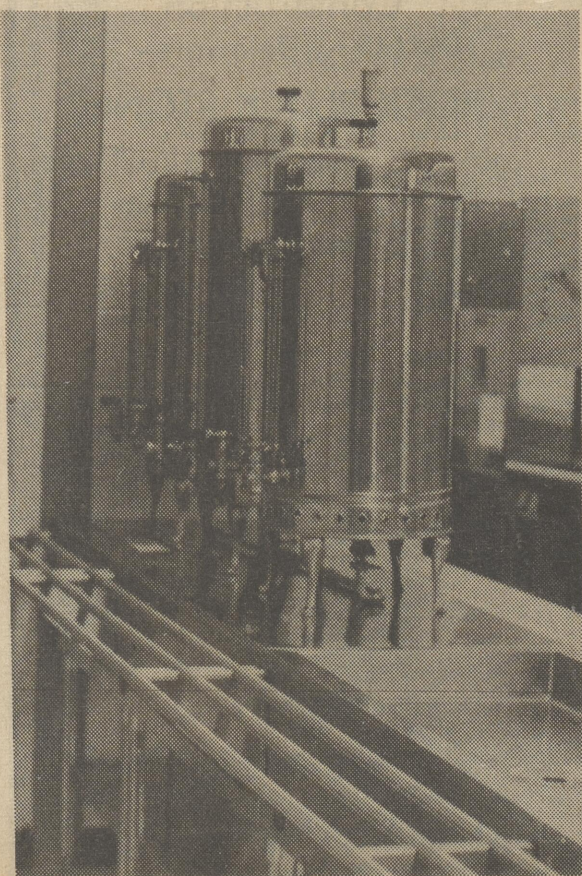
MOCHA CREAM PIE: Add 2 teaspoons instant coffee granules to dry ingredients.

CHOCOLATE BANANA CREAM PIE: Prepare chocolate pie filling; cool 10 minutes. Cover bottom of baked pie shell with a small amount of filling. Slice two bananas onto filling and cover with remaining filling.

CHOCOLATE CRUMB CRUST
1 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs
6 teaspoons cocoa
1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
6 tablespoons butter, melted.

1. Combine crumbs, cocoa and sugar in a bowl.
2. Stir in butter.
3. Press mixture onto bottom and sides of 9" pie pan.
4. Bake at 350° for 10 minutes. Cool.

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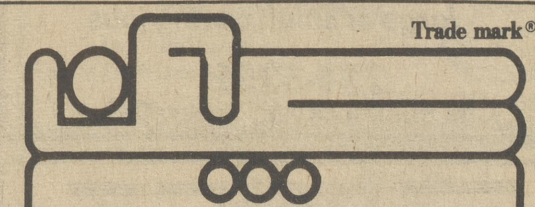


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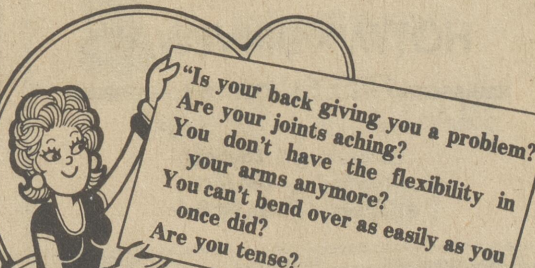

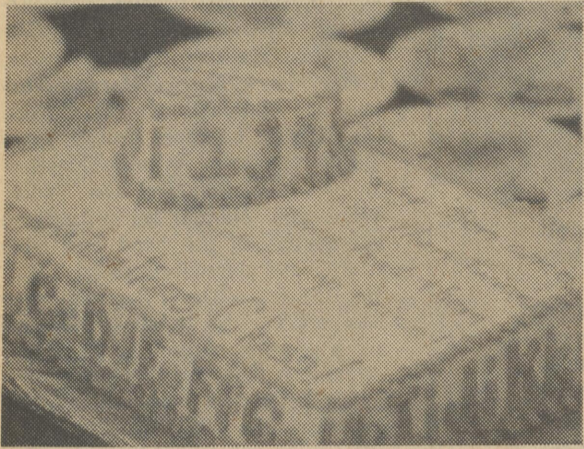

-History-

Along with the program on Sunday, the Felton Community Fire Company provided this brief history of its 99 years:

The Felton Fire Department was organized on February 26, 1883. The first officers of the Felton Fire Department were Chief Engineer, Mr. Fred Hubbard; Assistant Engineer, Mr. David Hugg; Elected Assistant, Mr. W.T. Parvis, Mr. W.P. Waldman, Mr. A.P. Hugg, Mr. W.T. Sapp, Mr. Charles Cook, Mr. Wilbur Needles, Mr. B. Lewis, Mr. J.H. Morris, Mr. Edward Hugg, Mr. William Hugg, and Mr. J.H. Parvis.

A committee was selected to solicit subscriptions to pay for a fire engine and hose. Those on the committee were Mr. C. L. Luff, Mr. J.M. Hargadine, and Mr. J.H. Hubbard. In 1884, they were to inspect and purchase, if suitable, wheels, as well as other material needed to build a hose cart.

For a few years, the fire department was inactive and the old hand pumper remained the only piece of fire fighting equipment in the community. In the fall of 1889, a group of citizens called a meeting to reorganize the fire company. Thirty-one men became members; and a committee was appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws. The first President of the reorganized company was Mr. J.E. Glackin and the first Fire Chief was Mr. W.C. Milbourn. The first fire house was on Lombard Street in the building that had served as Town Hall and Jail.

On February 4, 1940, with a loan from Mr. and Mrs. Walter Moore and donations from members, the company purchased a Seagraves pumper from the Denton Fire Company. The first alarm came in on February 17, 1940, at the residence of Mr. Cornelius Hurd.

In the 1951, the company built on the present lot, a building which included a meeting room, dining room, and a kitchen.

Also in 1951, the firemen purchased two more pieces of equipment.

In 1965, the company purchased an ambulance and a fourth truck. The company was forced also, to erect across the street, an auxiliary building to house the ambulance.

The company in 1969, realized that the need for more space was evident and thus the addition of an engine room was erected which housed six units.

In 1980, the membership began to realize the need for the renovation of the present building. After many meetings, the decision was made that the Company would renovate and expand the present structure. It is with pride that the Felton Community Fire Company, Inc., displays its building to the public and its residents. We extend our appreciation to the residents of Felton for their support over the years.

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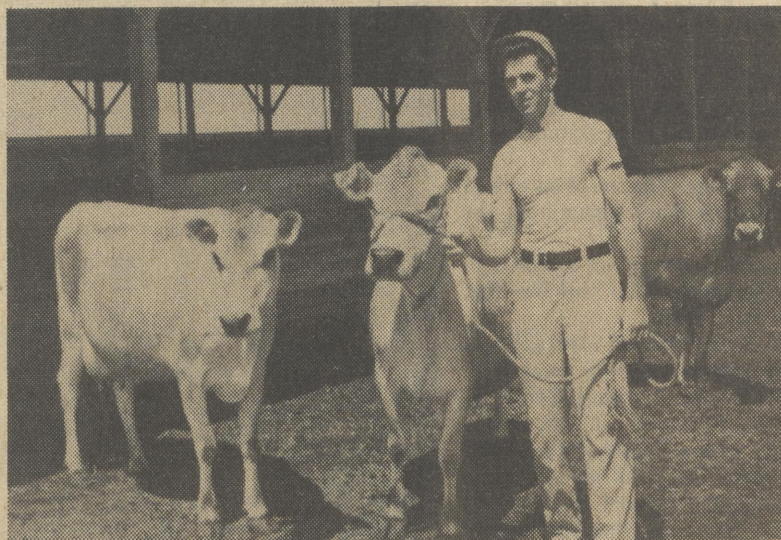

animal with sharp shoulders. Delaware extension dairy specialist Dr. George Haenlein once told him they often indicate a superior producer, and he's since found it to be true.

Until recently, Eliason had almost as many Holsteins as Jerseys. Now he has only twelve. Holsteins produce more, he acknowledges, but they also eat more and take up more space. And since Jersey milk is higher in protein, solids and fat, it brings a better price at the dairy cooperative. All in all, Eliason feels the advantages and disadvantages of the two breeds balance out.

It was not dissatisfaction with Holsteins that led Eliason to sell over 20 of them a few months ago. Three of the animals that weren't producing up to snuff got one-way tickets to the auction at New Holland. Ken Carlisle bought the rest.

Ken Carlisle started working for Eliason part-time when he was an agriculture student at Delaware Technical and Community College in Georgetown. He moved into a trailer on Eliason's property and continued living there and helping out even after he graduated and started working for a commercial breeder.

Warm, outgoing Margaretta Eliason treated Carlisle like another son, and Bill came to depend on his assistance with the animals. Eventually Carlisle started to work for the Eliasons full-time.

Over the years the Eliasons helped Carlisle start a herd of his own. They let him keep up to 20 cows in their barn. They absorbed the costs and kept the milk.

At the same time he was building up a herd, Carlisle also was starting a family of his own. His wife Charlene moved into the trailer, and their first child was born there. The Eliasons are like a third set of grandparents to the boy.

The Carlises are expecting their second child soon, but this one will be a native of Maryland. With Eliason's help and blessings, the Carlises have just started their own dairy farm in Chestertown.

The littlest Carlisle will be no stranger to Delaware, however. The family makes frequent visits to Ken's parents in Woodside, Charlene's in Georgetown and the Eliasons in between.

Eliason speaks of helping the Carlises

get started as if it were nothing more than a business deal. But if Eliason had cared only for his own self-interest he might have tried to make it difficult for his herdsman to leave. Eliason's son Tommy, his other trusted herdsman, has won several scholarships to Potomac College in Virginia. He'll be leaving in September.

So within a few months time Eliason is losing two seasoned workers. He admits they'll be hard to replace, yet he wouldn't think of holding back either one. And though he's very pleased his son plans to return to the farm in two years, he's equally proud of his daughter's career in state government.

The Eliasons enjoy helping young people grow in whatever direction their talents take them. That's why they let FFA students from several high schools practice daily judging on their cows.

"I was never especially conscious of dairy type," Eliason admits, "but the kids asked me so many questions that I was forced to learn. Now I realize that a good type cow is likely a good producer, too."

Another way the Eliasons reach out to young people is through their involvement with the Delaware State Fair. Margaretta helps train the girls who are candidates for Delaware Dairy Princess. Bill is superintendent of the Jersey and Guernsey exhibit, in which young people and entire families take part.

The Eliasons like to show their own cattle, not only at Harrington but also at Timonium, MD and Harrisburg, PA. In 1979 and 1981 they had the grand champion cow at Timonium. In 1980 and 1981 they had the grand champion bull at Harrisburg.

Says Eliason, "We show for the fun of competition, but also when a cow places well, her offspring sell for a better price." Another aspect of the competitions they enjoy is the opportunity it gives them to meet people. They've developed friendships with Jersey breeders from Maine to Alabama.

The friendly, outgoing Eliasons also make it a practice to join in on the Delaware Cooperative Extension Service's dairy tours and other events like Dairy Day. "I always pick up something that will do me some good," Bill says.

For instance, he's now following the extension dairy specialist's advice and including hay in his cows' diet even in summer. Even Jerseys need roughage to keep their milkfat level where it should be.

Eliason is also following Haenlein's advice about breeding his cows to better bulls. His efforts are paying off in higher production. Last year Eliason produced 11,253 pounds of milk and 536 pounds of fat—an average of 4.8 percent fat. He had the highest producing two-year-old and three-year-old.

But even with all that production, the Eliasons have the sense that they're still learning, still trying to make their way like everyone else. Bill shrugs his shoulders about a ramshackle building he hasn't gotten around to tearing down yet—maybe never will. Margaretta jokes that her friends tease her about mismatched kitchen appliances. But there's a friendly warmth in that kitchen that no one could miss, and everybody who knows the Eliasons realizes they have their priorities straight. They care for their cows, and even more, they care for people.

DSHA completes bond sale for low interest mortgages

The Delaware State Housing Authority sold \$40 million in Home Mortgage Revenue Bonds recently to a syndicate headed by Morgan Guaranty Trust Company of New York at an interest cost of 13.325 per cent. Mr. Hammond worked for the D.D. Salvage Co. in Milford.

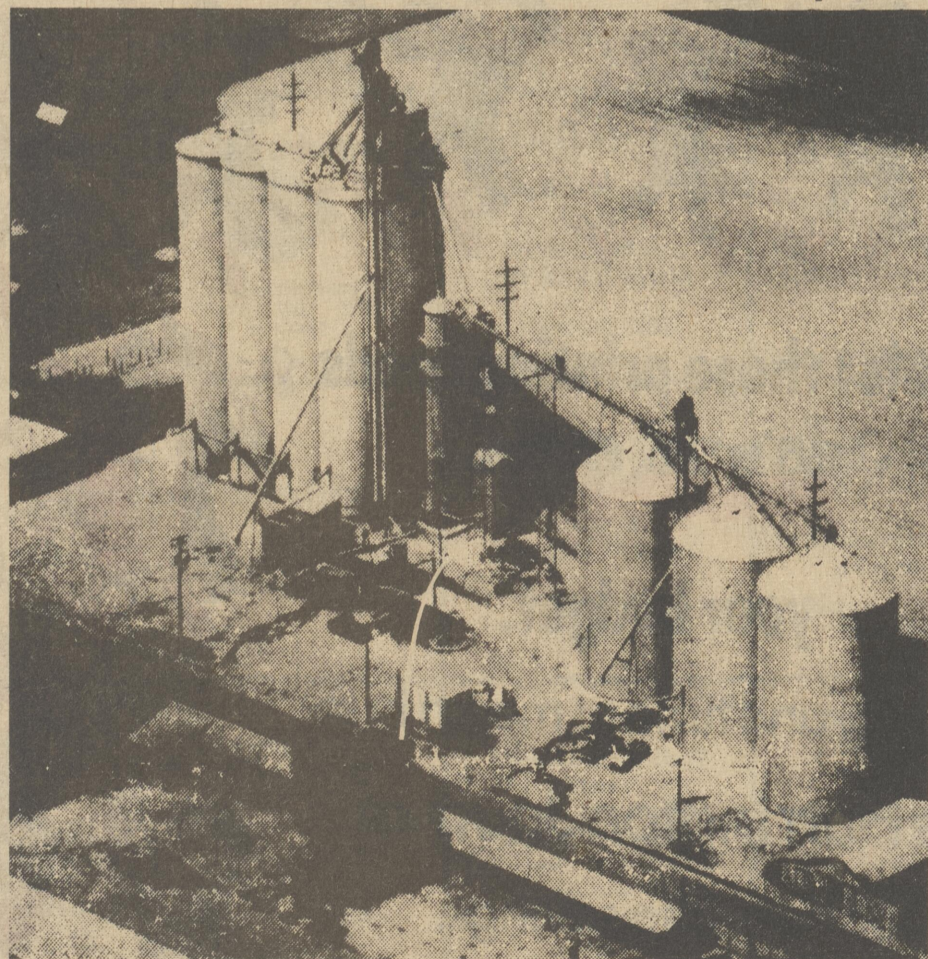
