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\$3,000,000 inferno destroys Perdue's Felton plant

An inferno which raged out of control for three hours destroyed Perdue's Felton poultry plant on Monday. There were no serious personal injuries, but jobs for the plant's approximately 300 employees were casualties of the disaster.

An official spokesman for Perdue Farms on Tuesday estimated the damages to the plant at \$3,000,000. He said the company was making efforts to offer many of those employed in the Felton packing department jobs at its plants in Georgetown and Salisbury. The Cornish game hen operation, which processes about 300,000 birds a week was moved to the Salisbury plant on Tuesday.

As yet there was no decision on whether the company would rebuild the Felton plant which was purchased from Swift in 1977 and converted to processing the Cornish game hens in January of this year.

An official statement released by the company said, in part:

"Perdue Farms is thankful there were no injuries as a result of the fire which partially destroyed the company's processing plant in Felton. This is attributable to the orderly evacuation of the 19 personnel who were in the plant at the time and the rapid response and deployment of local fire companies."

Company sources attributed the fire which was reported at 2:45 p.m., to a spark from a welder's torch which was being used to install new packaging equipment. Reportedly, the blaze ignited in the "Box Room", an area where wax coated cardboard cartons were stored. According to other unconfirmed reports, workers at the scene tried to put out the blaze with fire extinguishers and made an attempt to use the pressure hoses that are normally used in the plant's cleanup operation. However, the hoses were turned off because the plant was not in operation. Only a small maintenance crew was on the premises at the time.



-Up in smoke and flames-

Smoke and flames engulf Perdue's Felton processing plant which up until Monday handled 300,000 Cornish game hens each week. Firemen from 25 companies responded to the emergency as the fire raged out of control for three hours. Aerial equipment such as the snorkel [at right] from the Camden-Wyoming Company were instrumental in getting firemen where they needed to be to fight the blaze. Traffic control kept state police and fire police busy keeping access to the site open as tankers shuttled in water from Killen's Pond and a nearby drainage ditch. [Other pictures on pages 2 and 7].

Although the fire started in one building, the plant was fully involved within 15 minutes. Fanned by a breeze blowing to the southwest, flames spread quickly. Before they were brought under control some 300 volunteers from 25 Delaware and Maryland

fire companies and a total of 65 pieces of equipment were called into action.

The availability of water and the employment of aerial fire fighting equipment were vital to the operation.

Felton's water supply was drained in the initial hour and a half fire fighters

were at the scene. From then on, a tank truck shuttle operation was used to bring water from Killen's Pond and from a drainage ditch south of Felton.

In addition to the water supply there was a problem getting the water to the spot at which it would be most



effective. Ground based fire fighters could not reach the crucial spots within the inferno. This was solved by aerial trucks - a snorkel from the Camden-Wyoming Company and a hook and

LF board swears in Caulk, elects Feutz

The Lake Forest Board of Education on Thursday, swore in Wallace G. Caulk to serve a five-year term. Caulk, a Frederica area farmer and Milford businessman, was elected in May to fill the seat to be left vacant by Cliff Chambers who had decided that one term was enough.

The new member was sworn in by outgoing president, James Gussett, who performed one other official function before handing over the gavel. He presided over the election of his successor.

Frederick Feutz, who begins his third year on the board, will serve as its president for 1982-83. William Garey, in the second year of his five year term, was elected vice president.

The board also decided to continue regular meetings on the third Monday of each month. The public meetings will begin at 8 p.m. following an executive session set for 7.

Co-op to file for rate increase

The Public Service Commission has received a "letter of intent" from the Delaware Electric Cooperative indicating that the Co-op will file a general rate case in September of 1982. The letter of intent is the very first notice the Commission receives and marks the beginning of the regulatory process.

No specific rates were mentioned in the letter. However the Co-op did indicate it will seek an increase in electric rates as well as some changes in its terms of service. The letter cited the rising cost of providing service as the reason prompting the rate case.

The Electric Cooperative's last rate adjustment was in December of 1981 when the Commission granted it a 3-million dollar increase in annual revenue. That adjustment was designed to restore the Co-op to financial integrity. The co-op extends service to 30-thousand customers in rural Kent and Sussex Counties.

Break-in at Lake Forest High School triggers alarm, 2 land in jail

It wasn't exactly a celebration, but it started with a bang, of sorts, and it did ring a bell. The bell was obviously not in the original plan of two area men who broke through a rear window at Lake Forest High School early on Sunday, July 4. However, their forced entry did trigger an alarm, silent at the school, but registering loud and clear at Delaware State Police Troop 3 in Camden. As a result, Charles R. Masten, 18, of R.D. 3, Harrington, and Saoud K. Kahn, 19, of R.D. 1, Felton, were surprised on the premises by the police and chief Lake Forest custodian,

Harry Kemp. The two were taken into custody and finished their 4th of July in jail.

In an apparently short period of time the pair had done at least \$4,000 in damages to the school and had loaded about \$30 of office supplies into their car. According to Harry Kemp, more items were waiting by a door to be loaded when they were caught.

Both police and Kemp were on the scene within minutes after the 1:25 a.m. alarm. Kemp reported on Monday that as he and one of the officers approached a rear door near the gym

and locker room area, they encountered the two at the place where they had smashed through a large window. One of the two fled back into the school, but was soon discovered hiding behind some bleachers when the gym lights were turned on. They were arrested, and the area was later searched with the aid of the police K-9 corps.

As police and Kemp reconstructed events, Masten and Kahn broke through the window in the outer door which is chained, and then through a set of inner doors, setting off the alarm.

In the hall near the guidance office they found three typewriters which had been moved on their stands from a business classroom while the floor was being waxed. These they hurled through the window of the guidance office door so that they could reach through and open the door. Once inside the office complex, they went to the main office where they overturned several file cabinets and on into the teachers' lounge where they broke open a cracker machine and took sodas from a refrigerator.

At some point, they also opened a cabinet in a bathroom near the cafeteria, scattered paper supplies on the floor and spilled acid toilet bowl cleaner on the stainless steel of the cabinet, turning it dark.

Kemp said the two had also damaged the large greenhouse managed by the FFA and a smaller one near the ag mechanics shop. They broke 9 windows in the larger building and fourteen in the smaller one. Doors to both structures were kicked in, drawers of office supplies found in their car apparently came from a desk in the smaller greenhouse. Damage to the greenhouses was probably done before they went into the main building where they set off the alarm.

Kemp said that in addition to the items that were in their car, they had piled a number of things by the door ready to carry out. Among these were some five gallon containers of detergent and the cookies, crackers and sodas from the teachers' lounge.

Both Kahn and Masten were charged with criminal mischief, theft and burglary. They were confined to Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna, in lieu of \$12,000 bond each.

Connie Gerardi elected Girls State Governor

Connie Gerardi, who will be a senior at Lake Forest High School in 82-83 was elected governor by her fellow participants at Girls State this year. The annual event, a week-long, first hand lesson in the state political and governmental process is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. This year's Girls State, the fortieth, was held in Dover on June 21-25.

From the state level, Connie will go to a similar experience in national government and politics as she attends Girls Nation in Washington, D.C. on July 17-24. She and Karen Pieslak of Archmere were the two young women selected from Delaware to go.

Connie is the daughter of Eugene and Wanda Gerardi of Harrington.

Also chosen from Lake Forest High

School to participate in Girls State was Deanna Arrington, daughter of William and the late Mary Lou Arrington of the Felton-Frederica highway.

Other area participants at Girls State were Jill Conaway, Joanna Barnes and Karen Hawk of Woodbridge and Molly Brown and Kimberly Hoey of Milford.

Before dividing into two parties for the election, the girls were addressed by a panel representing the major elective offices of state government. There were six state offices to be filled by the election. Connie, who was encouraged by a friend to make the race for governor, was a member of the minority, Federalist, party. She was one of three candidates to seek that party's nomination.

The day and a half of campaigning

started with the primary election bids during which the candidates made campaign posters and addressed their respective parties.

Following her victory in the primary, Connie chose a campaign manager, Jennie Ross of Ursuline Academy, who helped her in the brief race again at the candidate of the Nationalist Party. This concluded with a speech before the combined Girls State during which the two candidates expounded on their party's platform. The election using voting machines followed.

During her brief term as Governor of Delaware, Connie sat in on legislative sessions of Girls State as well as observing the actual state legislature in action. She also attended a session with the board of pardons, and spent

most of one day and part of another with Governor duPont. Her duties included signing into law the legislation passed by the Girls State legislature. But she says she did not follow Governor duPont's advice to veto every fifth bill to "remind them who's in charge."

On Thursday night, she spoke at a Girls State banquet, and on Friday, both she and the Governor addressed the Girls State Legislature.

Connie had words of praise for the governor and his staff who she said were courteous and helpful. She reports that she had the opportunity to see the Governor in many situations with people he had never met before and with those he had known for a long time. He was "the same person" she said, with all of them - "...calm, congenial and on top of things." She also reports that the Governor is "...a character."

This has been an exciting year for Connie who was chosen Miss Harrington in March and selected Lake Forest FFA Sweetheart earlier in the year. At the state FFA convention she was runner-up for State FFA Sweetheart. She was also among those who represented Lake Forest and the state at the National OEA convention and was selected to take part in the Presidential Classroom, another close-up experience with national government.

An active student and a member of the National Honor Society at Lake Forest, Connie has combined an academic and a business curriculum.

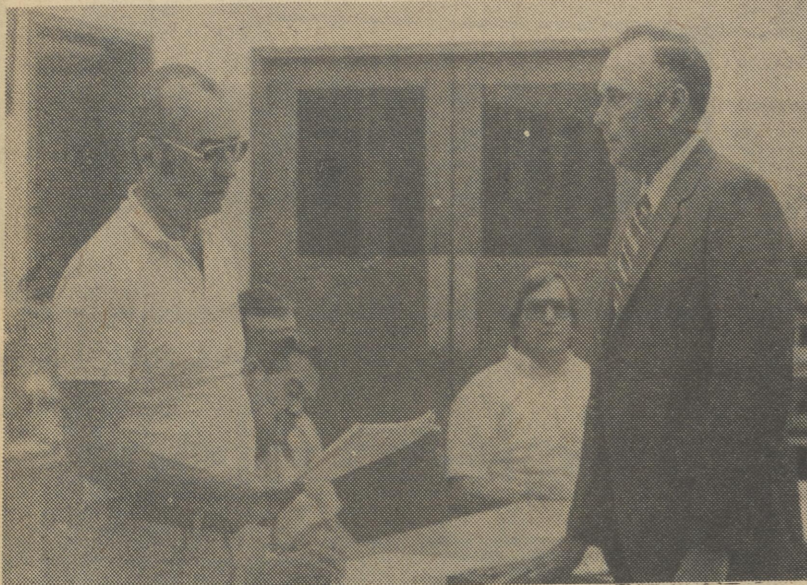
She plans to attend college after graduation. With her experience in Washington and Dover this year, she finds government and politics very attractive. But she has made no firm decision.

Girls State participants were housed at Wesley College, Dover, for the week. Before attending Girls State they had been hosted by their respective county governments at a "County Day

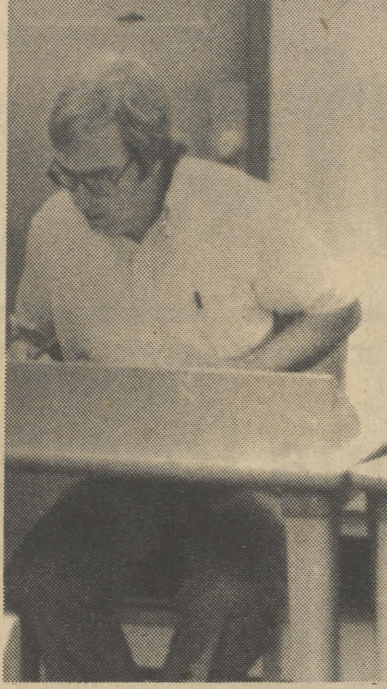

did not leave the scene until 10:24 a.m. on Tuesday. He and others had been on the job for nearly 20 hours.

Deputy Chief Fire Marshall John Hurd added his kudos to the effort put forth by the area's firemen. He said many of the men had never before been tested in an emergency of that size and that the whole operation had been beautifully organized and handled.

-A Few Injuries- Injuries to six area firemen, thankfully minor, were mostly related to inhalation of smoke and ammonia. All six were treated and released at Milford Memorial Hospital. Those injured included the following:

Harrington - Assistant Fire Chief Ed Welch - contusion to the left arm, Kevin Twilley - back strain, David Johnson - smoke and ammonia inhalation;

Houston - Assistant Fire Chief Danny Ansteine - contusion to the knee (A rumor that Ansteine had suffered a broken leg proved false), Robert Wilhelm - smoke and ammonia inhalation, and

North Bowers - Jack Vogel - smoke inhalation.

ladder from Milford's Carlisle Fire Company.

An ammonia tank which exploded early on complicated operations at the site of the fire, and there was also some concern that upground gasoline storage tanks might be involved. However, Deputy Chief State Fire Marshall John Hurd said that the flames never got close to the gasoline tanks.

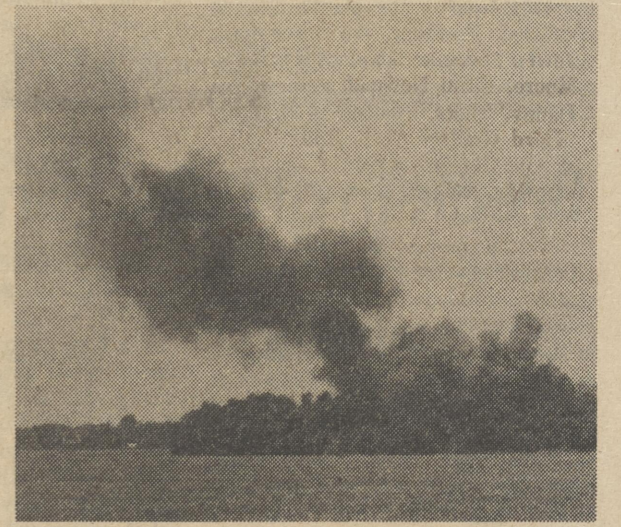
With the strong breeze blowing clouds of smoke and bits of flaming ash over nearby fields of ripening grain and stubble, there was some concern for the spread of the fire. At one point a minor blaze did start in a stubble field in which soybeans were planted, but quick action with a hose put it out. During the time, Walter Messick of Harrington, an onlooker at the scene, was observed stomping out a small flame that had started in another part of the field.

Asked if a change in the wind direction could have made the fire worse, both Felton Fire Chief Wayne Wheeler and State Fire Marshall John Hurd said, "No."

-Firemen Did A Bang Up Job-

Wheeler who was in charge of the massive operation had nothing but praise for the men who responded in the emergency. He said "As far as I'm concerned, everybody there should have gotten a medal...it was a good operation...everybody worked their butts off."

Wheeler, obviously relieved that there were no serious injuries, was also obviously exhausted. Although the blaze was brought under control around 6 p.m. on Monday, Felton trucks

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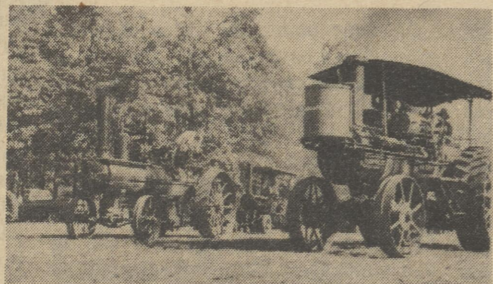

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Jim Blades attends National Sports Convention

 Lake Forest's track and cross country coach, Jim Blades, is well respected by his fellow coaches in Delaware. Blades, on several occasions, has guided his Spartan cross country teams to state championships and has never had a losing season. He represented Delaware scholastic cross country teams at the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Convention, held recently in Greenwood, Indiana. Joe Newton of York High School, Elmhurst, Illinois, perhaps the nation's best-known high school cross-country coach and Blades were on the same panel "Motivating the Athlete." The writer and Coach Blades met Coach Newton at a national high school meet in Annapolis, MD a few years ago. We have a copy of Coach Newton's book, "The Long Green Line" which tells the story of Newton's ultra-successful high school teams. Shelly Smith of Caesar Rodney, Delaware's cross country champ, ran in the National High School Cross Country Championship Race, held on the two-mile course, at Valle Vista Golf

Club. Shelly ran two miles in 12.10 to finish 20th. Shelly arrived in Indiana a day later than originally planned. This probably hurt her chances for a higher finish. But the short length of the race hindered her even more. At three miles, the length often run in these parts, Shelly is very, very tough. We think she would have been in the top ten finishers, at three miles. Lake Forest cross country offers candidates this fall, one of the best chances in many years to earn a high-ranking spot on a team that has never had a losing season. Cross country started here in 1958, at a time when the only harrier teams in Delaware, were north of Newark. Most of last year's team was lost by graduation, thus giving newcomers an opportunity that is not present most years. Candidates would be well advised to start working out now. By late August, when official practice begins, an ambitious youngster could be well on the way to earning that coveted varsity monogram L.F.

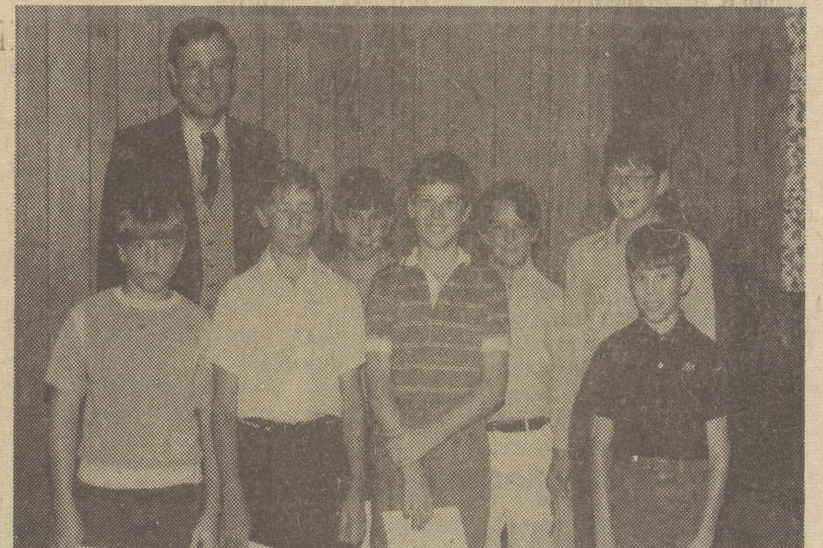

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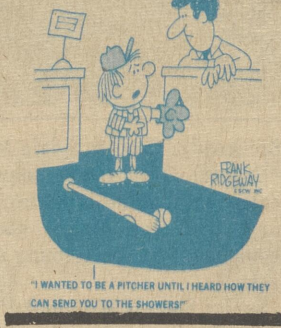

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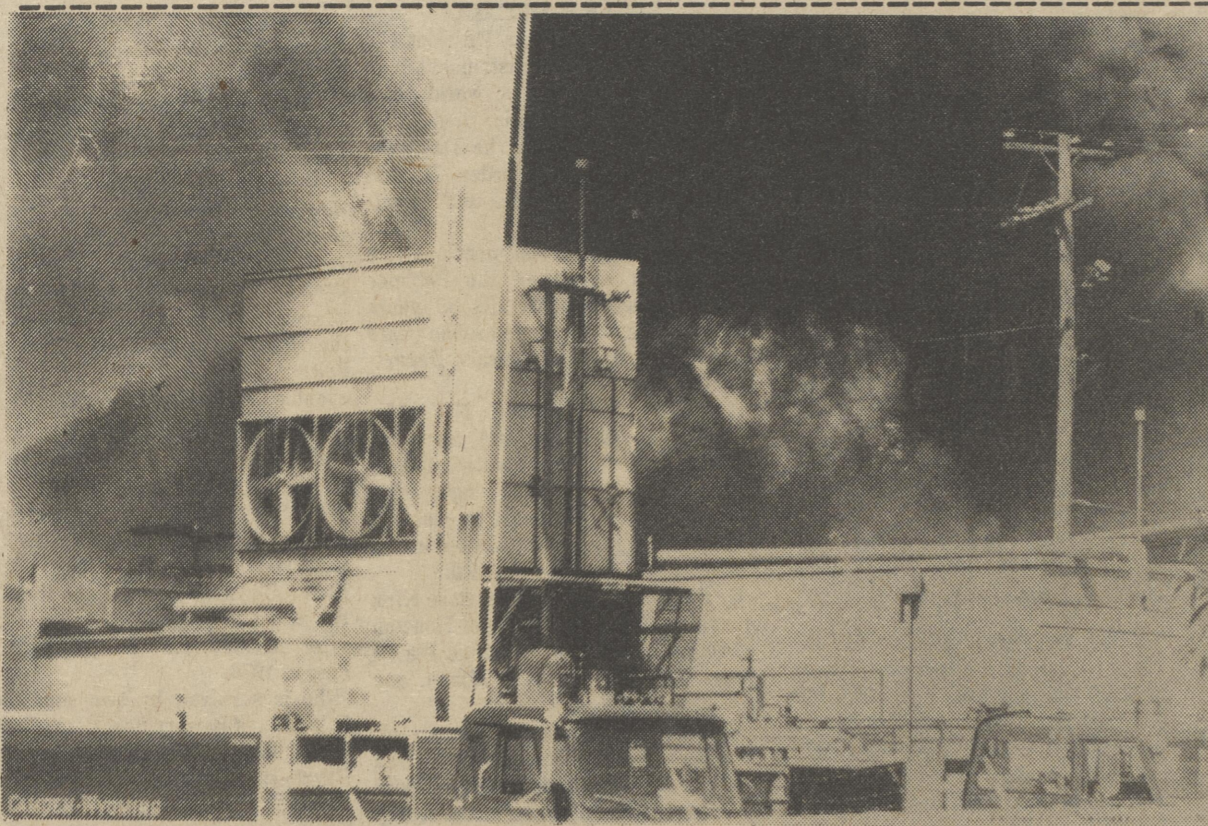

The Delaware State Housing Authority Home Mortgage Program



Owning a home is the dream of many Delaware families. Unfortunately, in recent years the cost of a home mortgage has increased dramatically, making it more difficult for moderate income Delawareans to afford to own a home.

Through this program, we hope to make it easier and less expensive for eligible families to purchase a house for a lower interest rate. The participating lending institutions, along with the financial backing of the State, will make available lower interest rates to interested home buyers.

We encourage eligible families to apply for these low-interest mortgages so that they too can realize the dream of owning their own home.

In response to the problems created by high mortgage interest rates, the Delaware State Housing Authority is continuing its home mortgage program to assist low and moderate income individuals in the purchase of homes. The Authority has entered into agreements to purchase conventional, FHA,

or VA mortgage loans from twenty-four mortgage lenders statewide. Borrowers who qualify will benefit from low interest rates and better terms than are common now. Funding for the loans will be provided by the Authority's sale of mortgage-backed revenue bonds.

Who is eligible?

Anyone who has not owned a home in the past three years, and who has a current family income of less than \$37,500 a year, and who meets the normal credit requirements of the lending institution. The first-time buyer requirement does not apply to purchasers buying in the targeted area of central Wilmington.

What kind of property qualifies?

The borrower must have a specific property in mind. It can be any single dwelling (up to four units) located in the state of Delaware, that will be the borrower's primary residence. It must cost less than \$51,900 if it is an existing home, or \$67,100 if it is a new home. Higher prices are allowed in the targeted area. For details on the targeted area, contact any lender.

How do you apply for a loan?

The borrower should telephone any of the participating lenders listed below,

starting Tuesday, July 6, 1982 at 9:00 AM.

If the borrower is eligible, and meets the lender's requirement, the loan will be made directly by the lending institution. Borrowers should not apply to the Delaware State Housing Authority.

What will the loan cost?

The interest rate on all mortgages granted will be 13¾ % per year. There will also be an origination fee of 1½% of the amount borrowed, half of which will usually be paid by the seller. Other items, such as lender application and processing fees, closing and mortgage insurance costs, may be charged to the borrower.

How large a down payment is required?

Minimum down payments range from 0% to 5% of the purchase price depending on whether the loan is conventional, FHA, or VA.
