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# \$3,000,000 inferno destroys Perdue's Felton plant

An inferno which raged out of control for three hours destroyed Perdue's Felton poultry plant on Monday. There were no serious personal injuries, but jobs for the plant's approximately 300 employees were casualties of the disaster.

An official spokesman for Perdue Farms on Tuesday estimated the damages to the plant at \$3,000,000. He said the company was making efforts to offer many of those employed in the Felton packing department jobs at its plants in Georgetown and Salisbury. The Cornish game hen operation, which processes about 300,000 birds a week was moved to the Salisbury plant

As yet there was no decision on whether the company would rebuild the Felton plant which was purchased from Swift in 1977 and converted to processing the Cornish game hens in January of this year.

An official statement released by the company said, in part:

"Perdue Farms is thankful there were no injuries as a result of the fire which partially destroyed the company's processing plant in Felton. This is attributable to the orderly evacuation of the 19 personnel who were in the plant at the time and the rapid response and deployment of local fire companies.'

Company sources attributed the fire which was reported at 2;45 p.m., to a spark from a welder's torch which was being used to install new packaging equipment. Reportedly, the blaze ignited in the "Box Room", an area where wax coated cardboard cartons were stored. According to other unconfirmed, reports, workers at the scene tried to put out the blaze with fire extinguishers and made an attempt to use the pressure hoses that are normally used in the plant's cleanup operation. However, the hoses were turned off because the plant was not in operation. Only a small maintenance crew was on the premises at the time.

The Public Service Commission has received a "letter of intent" from the Delaware Electric Cooperative indicating that the Co-op will file a general rate case in September of 1982. The letter of intent is the very first notice the Commission receives and marks the beginning of the regulatory proc-

the letter. However the Co-op did indicate it will seek an increase in electric rates as well as some changes in its terms of service. The letter cited the rising cost of providing service as the reason prompting the rate case.

The Electric Cooperative's last rate adjustment was in December of 1981 when the Commission granted it a 3-million dollar increase in annual revenue. That adjustment was designed to restore the Co-op to financial integrity. The co-op extends service to 30-thousand customers in rural Kent and Sussex Counties.





## Anne's Kitchen

My family loves anything breaded. By changing the variety of meat around, I usually prepare one breaded ing mix. You can make your own cheaper and better with things right on your pantry

Since I try to limit deep frying. I find the oven fry method is best. It is important to use a large enough pan so each piece has enough room. Poor a small amount of cooking oil into pan and pre-heat oil and pan in the oven just when you are ready to place breaded food into it. Return to oven as soon as food is placed in the pan. This method helps prevent sticking since food sears a little when you place it into pre-heated pan. 400° to 425° works well for me.

Basic Breading 1 cup Bisquick 1 cup bread crumbs (flavored or not optional) Salt and pepper to taste

Combine above and place in a plastic bag. Set aside. Basic Dipping Mixture

2 eggs beaten 1 tablespoon chopped Italian

1 tablespoon grated Italian

1. Dip meat or chicken in

egg mixture. 2. Drop into plastic bag with breading mixture and shake.

You will get better results shaking no more than two medium or three small pieces at a time. Chicken, pork chops, spare ribs and fish work very well with this method.

You can alter the seasonings of both the breading and dipping recipe with different spices and seasonings to suit your family's taste. Thin pork chops usually take about 1/2 hour in a hot oven. I usually turn everything

A simple vegetable and crisp green salad is easy to prepare while the main course is in the oven. You may want to pop a batch of biscuits in the oven the last 15 minutes of baking time. Bisquick has a very easy recipe for drop biscuits right on the box. You can throw them together in just a few minutes. No rolling out or kneading is necessary. ENJOY!

Summer is upon us, and we are surrounded with all sorts of delicious vegetables. This brings the annual summer problem of what to do with squash. They grow with unbelieveable swiftness and present us with a new crop every day. We like squash very much but it does not seem to retain flavor when frozen. In fact the flavor is very bland anyway. I tried cooking it and freezing it in glass, but it was not all that great. Squash fritters are our favorite way, served with gravy or butter and syrup. They are simple to make, except that I hate making anything that involves grating, and it takes a bit of time to grate enough to times a day. And I remember some make fritters. An easier way is to cook the squash and mash it, then proceed. But, of course, you lose a bit of flavor in not using the raw squash. Once you get the squash in the bowl, just add an egg, salt, pepper and sugar, a dash of baking powder, some milk and enough flour to make a batter you can spoon into a pan and fry. And, of course, you use bacon fat for frying.

I prefer my stewed squash sliced and buttered, but Dad will only eat it mashed, probably because his mother always served it that way. A casserole

is very nice made with either Romano or Parmesan cheese and a bit of onion. There's that onion again! Later, when tomatoes are plentiful, I will do some of JoAnn's stew with chunks of squash, tomatoes, green pepper and onion. It freezes well, too.

I often wonder if our complicated bodies require certain foods at certain times in life. For instance, I've always been very fond of onions, but for the last year I just cannot get enough. Whenever I boil potatoes I slip in a couple of onions for my plate. Dad is the same way about raw tomatoes. He can scarcely wait for the first one to ripen on the vine, and from then until the last one is picked, he has them at least once a day, sometimes three years ago, my friend, Mary, developed an awful craving for lettuce. She would eat a whole head every day.

My geraniums are really enjoying the freedom of the summer with their feet into the good earth. They are all blooming like crazy, pink, white, red and also the one I purchased from a greenhouse labeled, "Violet purple". Well, somebody goofed on naming that one. It is definitely a different shade of red and very pretty, but certainly by no means, purple or even violet. Oh, well, what's in a name?





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## It Pays To Compare!



### Who is eligible?

Anyone who has not owned a home in the past three years, and who has a current family income of less than \$37,500 a year, and who meets the normal credit requirements of the lending institution. The first-time buyer requirement does not apply to purchasers buying in the targeted area of central Wilmington.

What kind of property qualifies?

The borrower must have a specific property in mind. It can be any single dwelling (up to four units) located in the state of Delaware, that will be the borrower's primary residence. It must cost less than \$51,900 if it is an existing home, or \$67,100 if it is a new home. Higher prices are allowed in the targeted area. For details on the targeted area, contact any lender.

How do you apply for a loan?

The borrower should telephone any of the participating lenders listed below, starting Tuesday, July 6, 1982 at 9:00 AM. If the borrower is eligible, and meets the lender's requirement, the loan will be made directly by the lending institution. Borrowers should not apply to the Delaware State Housing Authority.

### What will the loan cost?

The interest rate on all mortgages granted will be 1334 % per year. There will also be an origination fee of 11/2% of the amount borrowed, half of which will usually be paid by the seller. Other items, such as lender application and processing fees, closing and mortgage insurance costs, may be charged to the borrower.

How large a down payment is required?

Minimum down payments range from 0% to 5% of the purchase price depending on whether the loan is conventional, FHA, or VA.




