Perdue has offered jobs in its George-
town Salisbury operations to all 300 town Salisbury operations to all 300
employees left jobless by the fire which ravaged its Felton plant on July 5 .
However, the company last week discontinued the bus service to George-
town it had provided for 75 of the 90 employees that had so far accepted the employees that had so
offer. Many of those employees have transportation to work.
The remaining employees have ap. parently been waiting to hear Perdue's decision on whether to rebuild its
Felton plant before making their own Although some of the buildings at the Felton plant were left standing the destruction as a result of the fire was
described as $99 \%$. If the plant is not rebuilt, employees will have to consider commuting, moving to the George-
town or Salisbury area, or looking town or Salisbury area, or looking
elsewhere for employment.
