## National magazine names LF pool complex "Facility of Merit"

*Athletic Purchasing and Facilities*, a national professional athletic journal published in Madison, Wisconsin, has named the Natatorium Complex at Lake Forest High School among its 1982 selections as a "Facility of Merit". The Lake Forest facility, which houses the swimming pool, was one of four across the nation named in Category III - Recreation, Physical Education, Athletic Facilities at High Schools. The others in this category were the Athletic Center at the Berkshire School in Sheffield, Massachusetts, the Athletic Field House at Fredericktown High School in Fredericktown, Ohio, and the Newman Palaestra at the Isidore Newman School in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Criteria used by the magazine in making its selections were (1) cost saving and energy saving construction and operation procedure, (2) creative use of space, (3) ability to meet program needs, (4) innovative design and (5) other factors - primarily the fulfillment of a need, the ingenuity in making the facility a reality.

According to the magazine, the 5th criterion is "especially meaningful"

because it is the point at which "...creative and social factors are significant." The emphasis is on how the facility is used.

According to Dennis Berry, Lake Forest Aquatics Supervisor, the factor of pool use was important to the selection of the Lake Forest facility. The complex is used by Lake Forest students from the elementary through the high school level. It also provides many services for the community. These include swim and safety classes at various levels and the opportunity for competition offered by the New Wave swim team.

All district fourth, sixth and ninth grade students receive swim instruction. In addition, the pool is the center of a growing number of electives offered at the high school level. The possibility of a competitive swim team for the high school is being considered, but no decision has been made as yet.

One goal set by those who direct the natatorium complex has been to cycle local people into the pool staff. At present, says Dennis Berry, 100% of the lifeguards are Lake forest trained. That means they probably started in

It was inside this building that all the controls of switches, gates, etc., were maintained. Recently it has been nearly stripped of all but bare essentials.

Negotiations are proceeding to allow it to become a memorial to trainmen who served in the Harrington Yard. Conrail officials and the Greater Harrington Historical Society are at the bargaining table, so to speak.

It is the hope of G.H.H.S. to try to make it a working model of the original. Many people who are not Society members are expressing an interest. Trainmen have offered their help.

If you are interested in seeing this become a small museum and remain a Harrington landmark, we urge your attendance at the Greater Harrington Historical Society meeting on this Thursday, Aug. 5, 1982, at 7:30 p.m. at the Senior Center. Express your views, offer your help, listen to Conrail proposals and help decide if we can keep this building.

According to Conrail officials it is the last one of its kind on the N.E. corridor of Conrail. This area includes the New England states through the Carolinas.

For those who might not know of its construction, the building is tile and concrete walls covered with stucco. The window lintels are Keystone design. It has 3 floors, with the top one giving an excellent view of the tracks for quite a distance.

Around the eaves where it looks like wood painted gray, it is really copper. How beautiful this would be cleaned and polished!

Please come out and support us in our efforts to save one more interesting old landmark for our town. This is one of the things which will eventually bring tourists to Harrington, and tourists means a better standard of living for the community through their spending.

Once this building is gone, it will be too late to say "I wish we had...". Get together now and say "Yes, we will!"

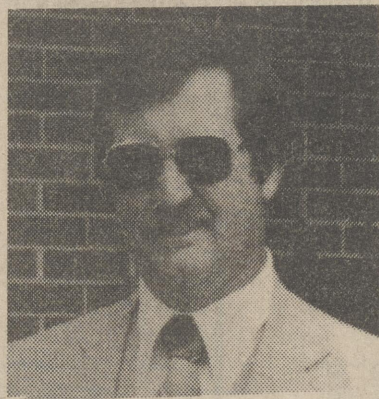
Announcing his candidacy, Quillen said: "My decision to see election to the House of Representatives comes as a result of three factors:

Davis, 21, both of R.D. 2, Lewes, Delaware, allegedly left their infant son locked in their unattended vehicle at the Delaware State Fair parking lot on Friday, July 23, while they attended the fair. An employee of the Strates Show heard the infant crying at approximately 8:15 p.m. and notified Delaware State Police person-

nel who are assigned to work at the fair. The Delaware State Police went to the vehicle and removed the infant and had the baby taken to the Fair-ground First Aid Station. The Division of Social Services was notified and took custody of the infant. The parents were bonded at Justice of the Peace Court 6 in Harrington on Tuesday, July 27, pending a hearing at a later date in Family Court in Kent County. The infant has been placed in a foster home awaiting disposition of the case.

## Louis Wooten raises Welsh ponies

Running his hand across his forehead and taking a deep breath, Louis R. Wooten, a championship Welsh pony raiser, spoke.

"There's a big difference between ponies and Welsh ponies," he said. "Any Welsh pony owner can tell you that."

Wooten raises up to 40 of the intelligent, stocky animals on his farm on the Harrington-Frederica Road -- as a hobby.

"I'm not in it for a business. I just enjoy it," Wooten proclaimed. "If anything gets to be a hassle, I just get out of it."

Born and raised in Lincoln, Wooten began his hobby when he bought a Welsh for his daughter Colleen. From there it flourished.

In fact, Wooten enjoys his hobby so much that sometimes he doesn't even break even on a sale. "That's mainly because I hardly show and I don't advertise," he said. "But I get a lot of satisfaction by raising them and seeing what I get."

Wooten has shown his beauties in New Jersey and Devon, Pennsylvania as well as the Delaware State Fair. Each time, something good has come out of a show, whether it was a prize or the satisfaction of "knowing you were up with the best," Wooten said.

Charmsley Rift, one of his outstanding stallions, placed fifth out of 19 other stallions when he was in top competition in one Devon show. The chestnut was the second Wooten bought.

Ash Brook Buster, a gelding, has won at least five different classes at the

Delaware State Fair under present owner Erica Somy. This year, Ash Brook Buster won his class in Groom and Showmanship at the Pony Judging Contest Thursday night.

Flipping through a thick black notebook filled with yellow registration certificates from the Welsh Pony Society of America, Wooten expertly explained the bloodlines of his favorites. One is Bayside Proud Morning, a dam of nine ponies and "a good one," according to Wooten. Dams are mothers and sires are fathers.

"Her great-granddam was Coed Coch Ploden, one of the best in the world," he said proudly.

Almost all of his Welsh ponies came from the Bayside Pony Farm near

## Motel murder suspect returned to De.

Richard N. Irwin, 21, Coatesville, Pennsylvania, was returned to Delaware on July 26, 1982 on charges that he allegedly was involved in the murder of Walter Betts. Betts was found shot to death on the floor of his kitchen at the Wil-Lo Motel south of Bridgeville on August 24, 1981. Irwin was released by Pennsylvania authorities in Chester County to Delaware State Police detectives and transported to Troop 4 in Georgetown where he was processed for murder and assorted other charges.

Irwin appeared before Judge Hague at J.P. Court #3 where no bond was given for the murder charge and a total of \$97,000 secure bond was set for charges of burglary, felony theft, possession of deadly weapon and conspiracy. Irwin was then taken from J.P. Court #3 and incarcerated at Sussex Correctional Institute to await trial.

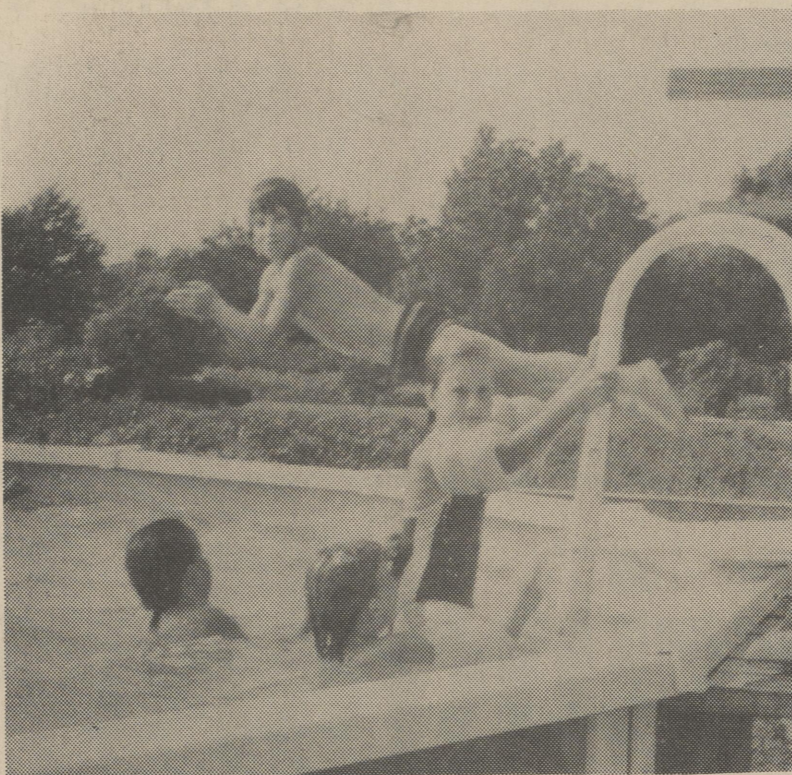
He is also a Vestryman, St. Stephens Episcopal Church, and is a member of the Harrington Historical Society.

## Felton to look at ordinances

The town of Felton has a new charter prepared by the League of Local Governments and recently approved by the state legislature. Next it may take a look at its collection of ordinances. These may need revision, updating or deletion. According to Town Council member Tom Jenner, who suggested the project at Monday night's meeting, one outdated ordinance sets the speed limit within town limits at 12 miles per hour.

Felton Mayor William Myers agreed, but said the project would be somewhat complicated by the fact that all four books which contained the ordinances seem to have disappeared. However, he said they could be traced through the minutes of Council meetings. The Council will have to sit down in private session to assemble the complete list and discuss changes before the ordinances could be presented and voted on at an open meeting. Actually, the Town Council has not passed any new ordinances recently. Most of its action has been taken in the form of resolutions. Myers said both ordinances and resolutions are allowed for in the charter. He is not sure but that the resolution is the most effective way of handling most town business.

In other business, the Felton Council heard that most town streets torn up by the sewer construction are being put back into shape blacktopping, except for some patching, is virtually complete, but there is still some tar and chip work to be done.

heard Fred Casper suggest the Council consider some benefits for the police department. Sick time and automatic cost of living increases were mentioned. No action was taken.

received a suggestion from Police Chief Lee Vincent that more speed limit signs be placed in town. 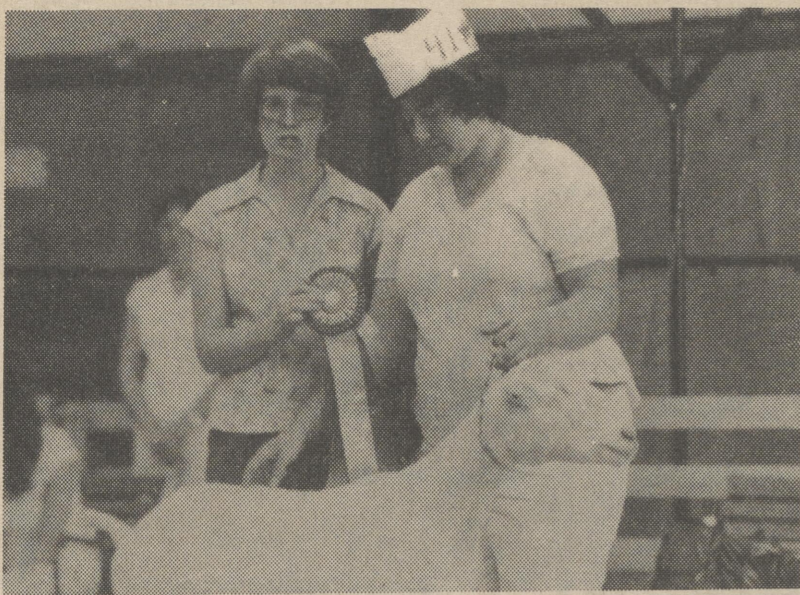

### Pa. farm family has 3 Champions

Joanne and Dennis Dominick of Fogelsville, Pennsylvania counted their first day at the Delaware State Fair a super successful one. They brought and took home with them three grand champions in the Dairy Goat Show held in the show arena on Friday, July 30.

The star member of the star cast from the Dominick farm is GCh Milky Vale Cathy, a 2-year-old Nubian. The GCh in front of her name designates Cathy a Permanent Grand Champion.

To achieve that distinction, she must have been named a Grand Champion in three separate shows by three different judges. She must also be a star milker. Cathy is a three star milker. The star is awarded on the basis of a certain number of pounds of milk produced over a 305 day period. For a two year old that is 1530 pounds. Cathy is a three star milker because both her mother and her grandmother were star milkers before her. A certain percentage of butterfat in the milk is another standard.

The yearling Saanen Gay Mar's K.P. Kambric, who has received classification of 89 (Very Good in relation to a Perfect 100), was another Grand Champion for the Dominicks. When she scores a 90 she will be counted Excellent.

The third Grand Champion from the Pennsylvania farm was Ch Horseshoe Acres VS Jasmine. The letters VS in Jasmine's official name refers to her parents Viking and Shasta. Jasmine won the Grand Championship in the Record Grade Milk Class. According to Joanne Dominick, record grade goats are the offspring fathers who "jumped the fence", i.e. the products of crossing two purebred lines. They might also be goats purchased at a sale for whom no record of ancestry is available. Jasmine is a Nubian-Saanen combo.

Among the goats, the Dominicks brought to Delaware was a youngster who shows promise. Abraxas BB Brook's Odessa (Dessie for everyday) was named a Junior Champion in the Yearling Nubian Class.

The Dominick family includes two children who take an active interest in goats. They are 10 year old Chris and 4 1/2 year old James. Although this was their first trip to the Fair, they did show here at the 21st Delaware Dairy Goat Show in May.

Actually shows and fairs take up only a small portion of their time. The main source of their income is the raising of veal calves. The goats provide the milk which is the exclusive diet of the calves until they are sold. The Dominick family enjoys goat's milk, too, and Joanne Dominick says it makes excellent butter.

The Saanens (originally from the Saanen Valley in Switzerland) and the Nubians (developed in England as Anglo Nubians) shown by the Dominicks are just two of the breeds which appeared at the Dairy Goat Show. Among the others were Alpines, Toggenburgs and LaManchas. The last

named are a highly dominant strain developed in America. Their most obvious feature is the absence of outside ear flaps.

### Block to attend U. of D. field day

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block is expected to participate in noontime activities at the University of Delaware's upcoming Farm and Home Field Day, Wednesday, August 11, at the university's Georgetown substation. According to Gary Patterson, special assistant to U.S. Sen. William Roth, Block will be in the state to attend a special fund-raiser breakfast and plans to take part in the Georgetown festivities while he is here.

The field day event, now in its 38th year, takes place from 8:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. at the university research farm on Route 28 just west of Georgetown.

In the morning, there will be wagon and bus tours of field plots. During the day, there will be a number of special events as well, including demonstrations of aerial seeding of vetch into standing corn and soybeans, a commercial farm equipment display, and simulated farm rescue. Throughout the day there will also be consumer-oriented talks and demonstrations on such topics as edible wild plants, sewing with muslin, soybeans and how to cook them, and creative ways to prepare Delaware-grown potatoes.

9th grade swim classes here and moved on through the necessary advanced training. 50% of the instructional staff is composed of Lake Forest trained people.

The community swim team, the New Wave, put up a 5-0 record in the winter and so far boasts a summer record of 3-4 in its second year of competition. A number of its swimmers started in Lake Forest beginner swim classes, and some have progressed as far as Junior Olympics competition. It shows particular strength and promise in its younger swimmers.

Berry said that credit for the honor awarded the Natatorium Complex in that it has been named a "Facility of Merit" by the national magazine goes first of all to the staff who "have not been contented to be just another pool", but have worked to "be the best."

The famous poet, Shelley, tells us how to appreciate July. I have before me a copy of the Old Farmer's Almanac for the year 1887. They had the hot days of July in them, too! And at the top of the month they quote these lines from Shelley: "All things rejoiced beneath the sun, - the weeds, the river, and the cornfields, and the reeds, the willow leaves that glanced in the light breeze, and the firm foliage of the larger trees." Shelley.

In the conversation paragraph for the farmers, they write about the chemical used at that time for potato beetles. It was called Paris green. The directions are one teaspoonful to two gallons of water, so it must have been potent stuff. It warns not to use it on vegetables that are to be eaten without cooking. My grandfather did not hold with these new-fangled ideas: "probably kill us all", he said. And by 1912, he figured that a small blonde pig-tailed granddaughter with a can of kerosene and a stick could take care of the beetle situation. And I can testify that it did! But I was always glad of my heritage of growing up in the country near to nature's heart.

On another page of the Almanac there is paragraph entitled "Farm Life" by the famous naturalist, John Burroughs. Quote: "It is a common complaint that the farm and farm life are not appreciated by our people. We long for the more elegant pursuits or the ways and fashions of the town. But the farmer has the most sane and natural occupation, and ought to find

Have you tasted them? Aren't those fresh peaches out of this world? I've been waiting since last year. Enjoy them while they last. Don't miss the chance to turn them into jams, can and freeze them for winter and most of all make a cobbler. The recipe for this one is delicious hot or cold; in either case a scoop of soft vanilla ice cream goes just beautifully. Forget the calories for today and give it a try. Maybe you had better make two. No keeping this dessert a secret; the smell from your kitchen will betray you.

### PEACH COBBLER

- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shortening
- 6 to 8 tablespoons cold water
- 6 cups sliced fresh peaches
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 cup butter (divided)

1. Combine flour and salt mixing well.

2. Cut in shortening with pastry blender till mixture resembles coarse meal. Sprinkle cold water evenly over surface. Stir with a fork till all ingredients are moistened. Shape dough into a ball and chill 30 minutes.
3. Combine peaches, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir well and set aside.
4. Roll out 1/2 of dough to 1/8" thickness. Cut into a 9" square.
5. Spoon 1/2 of the peach mixture into a lightly buttered 9" square baking pan. Dot with 1/4 cup butter and top with pastry.
6. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes or till pastry is golden brown. Spoon remaining peach mixture over baked pastry and dot with the rest of the butter.
7. Roll out the balance of the chilled dough and cut into 1" strips. Place lattice fashion over filling. Return to oven for additional 30 minutes or till lightly browned. Serve warm or chilled with ice cream or without. Any way at all, it is delicious.

**wins 3rd in a row**

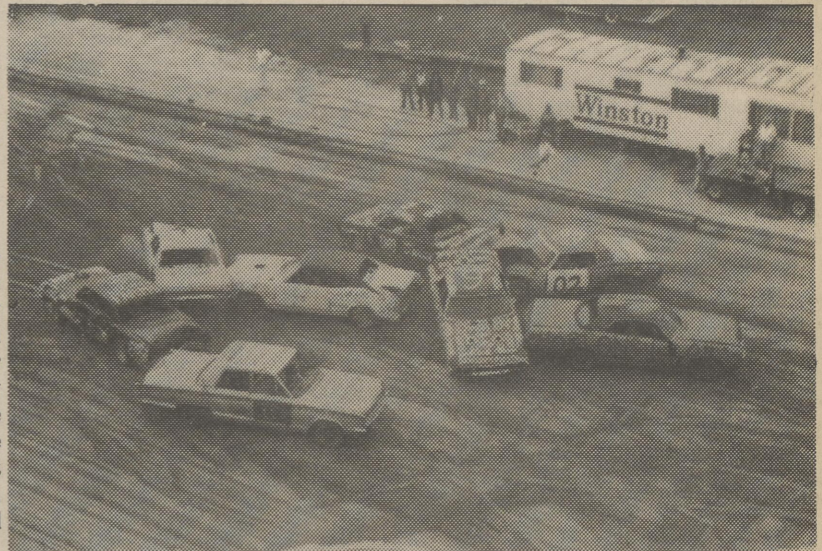

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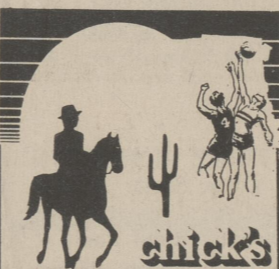


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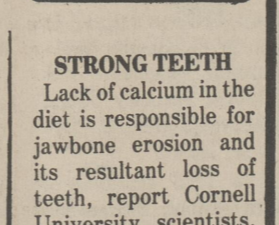
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## Veteran Driver Aims Arndon Toward Hambo

COLUMBUS, OHIO - The times, they are still a changing.

A few years ago, the celebrated heroes in the sporting world were young like jockey Steve Cauthen or gymnast Olga Korbut. Both are in their early twenties now.

But the country has grown older and so have many sport fans.

Now many sports heroes are older. Tennis has Billie Jean King, 38. Baseball has Pete Rose, 41 and Gaylord Perry, 43.

And harness racing has Hall of Famer Delvin Miller.

At 69, Miller is heading into harness racing's premier event, The Hambletonian, as the trainer and driver of one of the leading contenders, Arndon. Often called "Mr. Harness Racing," Miller drove his first harness race in 1930.

Should Miller win the race, he won't be setting any age records, however. Bion Shively won The Hambletonian at age 74 with Sharp Note in 1952.

If anything, Miller will be breaking speed records in this year's \$850,000 contest at The Meadowlands in New Jersey on August 7.

"Arndon is the fastest trotter I have ever driven in my life and I've driven some great ones," Miller says.

Arndon has already exhibited his speed this year setting a world record of 1:57 2/5 over a five-eighths mile track in the Montreal Trot at Blue Bonnets and setting a track record of 1:56 4/5 in his elimination division of the Founder's Gold Cup at Vernon Downs.

In 12 starts this year, Arndon has been beaten twice; once when he threw a shoe in the Dexter Cup and once when he went offside in the final of the Founder's Gold Cup.

"He's a great horse to race because he leaves the starting gate well and has speed and everything," Miller says. "I do have to be very careful with him because he wants to trot by a horse awful fast. When I pull him out to pass a horse, he wants to trot by him immediately."

"I know he's a good horse," Miller adds. "But to win The Hambletonian, you have to have a horse that can darn near do anything."

And there are many who have contemplated a storybook finish. Arndon wins the big race and Miller hangs up his famous racing silks.

"No, I'm not going to call it quits if I win The Hambletonian," Miller responds. "I take each year as it comes and when I feel I can't do my job right, then I'm going to quit."

Miller plans to race Arndon through this season and if the owner, R.A. McKenzie, New Zealand, decides this fall to race Arndon next year as a 4-year-old, Miller most likely will continue as trainer and driver.

Win, lose or draw this time around, Miller can still sit back and rest on the laurels he's earned in his distinguished career.

He's already won The Hambletonian once with Lusty Song in 1950, which was also the same year he won the classic for pacers, The Little Brown Jug, with Dudley Hanover.

Berlin, Maryland after the owners traveled to Wales to choose and later import a few mares.

Wootten's purebreds are mainly from line breeding and stand at 12 hands or 50 inches. All are selectively bred in order to preserve such Welsh characteristics as a wide chest, a flat rump and well shaped and round feet with dense hoofs. "A Welsh pony is supposed to be stocky," he emphasized.

The mares roam Wootten's 20 acres of pasture all year round. The stallions are always penned, except when they are exercised on lunge lines. Eventually, Wootten sighed, he'll partition off the five interlocking fields.

After the birth of a colt, Wootten checks after the newborn but doesn't break it in, selling it as such around its second birthday. Buyers are usually those desiring a pony as a pet for a child.

"I try to place them high enough so they won't go to the killers," Wootten said, referring to those who buy horses or ponies to kill for the meat. "That way," he continued, "they'll have to take a loss."

By being around his Welsh ponies, Wootten knows that the animals pull surprises. "Usually if given a chance and if you'll be easy with them, they'll do more than you expect."

Wootten used the widespread fear of stallions as an example. "Most people fear stallions, but he's no different than any mare. You want to treat him just like a mare."

"I have one stallion that helps me zip up my jacket; another rears up but when I feed him he calms right down," he said.

Through the years Wootten has had some harrowing surprises as well. Once prized mare Bayside Proud

Morning and her foal "went through that electric fence like it wasn't there." After tracking them through corn fields for two and a half days, Wootten finally found them resting by a stream. "She looked at me as if she were saying, 'well, here I am,'" Wootten smiled.

Another time he and his neighbor Shelby Harrington aided a mare in a difficult birth. Newborn ponies enter the world foot first, but there were complications in this one.

"We were doing what we thought was right. I wanted to help her, but I should have just let her go," Wootten frowned as he recalled the only time he's had to play doctor.

The newborn died. "That was one scary time," Wootten said.

Still another tale is about a pony who was a little too high strung. Wootten was breaking one Welsh in to pull a cart when suddenly the Welsh shied "and went through that electric fence - he, the cart, and me."

Wootten jumped off the cart and soon afterwards, the dragging reins stopped the wheels "naturally." Evidently, the pony's lesson was well learned.

"When I tried him again, he did all right," Wootten said.

Besides these pulse-raising episodes, Wootten also has to worry about his Welsh ponies eating too much protein and getting stiff in the shoulders and back, called foundering. The ailment is caused by eating damp grass.

"Once they've foundered, it can come back, say in a wet season," Wootten said.

Since the extra protein makes their hooves grow faster than their normal growth rate, Wootten keeps all of his ponies' feet trimmed regularly. He also watches what they eat and when.

Before Louis Wootten shut off his Frederica grocery's lights for the night, he summed up, "I think they're the prettiest there is of all ponies."

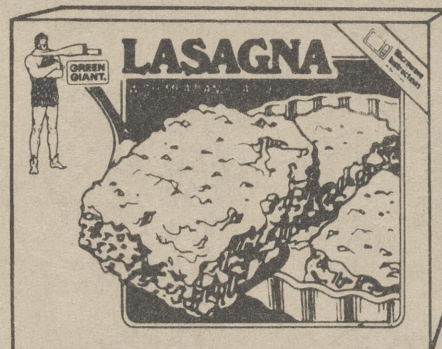

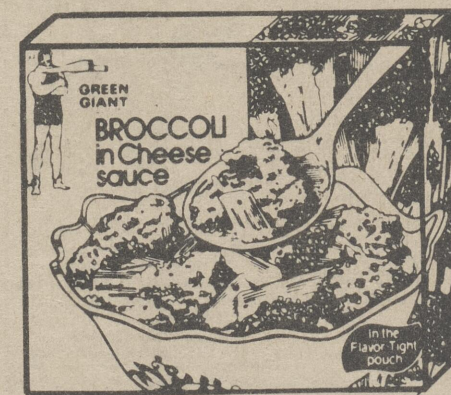

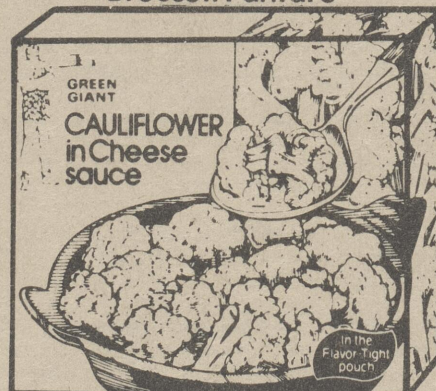
