

Monday night gave its approval of the first reading of a policy governing student behavior on buses. A dozen or more district bus drivers showed up at the meeting to ask questions, but also to demonstrate support for the policy. This marks the first time Lake Forest has actually had a specific discipline policy concerning bus behavior.

The policy approved is an expanded form of one presented and tabled at a special meeting in August. Its purpose

> For minor violations of school bus safety regulations, disciplinary procedure starts with the filing of a School Bus Conduct Report which also constitutes a warning. A second report filed would mean a three-day suspension of bus riding privileges. For continued

until a hearing can be held.

For a major violation, the bus driver may suspend a child from riding the bus the very next day. But he must notify the transportation Supervisor and both must make every effort to notify the parents that evening. A major violation also means suspension of bus riding privileges for up to five days during which time a hearing between the child, his parents, the bus driver and school officials will be set up. Serious misbehavior could lead to a further period of extension, permanent suspension or (after a hearing before the school board) removal from school

Minor Violations of School Bus Safety Regulations, including but not limited to: 1. shouting in or out of bus; 2. not staying in seat; 3. throwing objects; 4. littering; 5. talking back to driver; 6. horseplay; 7. putting arms or head out of window; 8. endangering one/all students on the bus; 9. disrespect for the driver (abusive language) 10. disregard to driver's instructions; 11. major distraction to the driver endangering students on the bus - loud noises

Even with the specific violations listed, the operation of the policy will depend to some extent upon individual bus drivers and the way they see or handle particular situations. #### -Part II of III -

The little "ant" brings forth another collection. Mr. Knapp, was a most learned gentleman in our neighborhood. He had taught school in the little one room building, among other avocations. He was a constant scholar never ceasing to grasp and absorb and consider, nor did he ever cease this search for answers in our everyday world. His family was dedicated to this fine gentleman and even when I knew him last, he was well into his 90 years, and his family brought him to visit my father. There was a special purpose for this visit. It was to see a multitudinous colony of black ants, in a large old stump on the top of the rise in pure pasture field. An ant colory, in itself, is a wonderment, but when it is studied and watched and digressed upon by a learned man like Mr. Knapp, nd I was a child, the ant was not "lowly" anymore, but before my very eyes, it became a farmer, a grocer, a doctor, a child's nurse, a carpenter, an engineer, and a king of all it surveyed. So, as we stood there watching the activity of this colony of ant master workers, Mr. Knapp, so kindly and so softly spoken, turned to my father and asked. reverentially, and simply, "Henry, do you believe that ants have souls?" As some time passed on, and perspec-

tive changed and developed, I began to notice how much care some people put toward their trees, and their flowering shrubs, and, too, toward their own animals, and to the wild ones in winter, too. So, like so many other caring people, I still wonder if an ant, or a tree, or a rose, has a soul.

Going further, there came the day when we were visiting an ornamental tree and shrub nursery. In one of the long buildings several men and women were busily doing what was called "budding". They were taking little "buds" of growth from the stalks of beautiful hybrid rose plants and, after making a slit in the stem of a very ordinary wild rose plant, were inserting the "bud of growth" from the beautiful hybrid, into the slit of the wild rose plant. Then, they wrapped it firmly, protecting and thereby healing the "injury" and adhering the delicate baby bud. Almost all these plants with the implanted hybrid bud lived, thrived, grew, and then flowered - not with their original blossom of only four or five separate petals, but with the gorgeous rose and foliage of the prized hybrid rose plant. The wonderment of this process was not apparent then, but, now, I think of the extremely more complicated procuedure of a cornea transplant to the eye, so a blind person may see, or a kidney transplant

#### Boy Scouts offer Tiger Cub Program

joins with an adult. They spend their year in Tiger Cubs participating as a 'We emphasize the word 'adult' as

opposed to 'parent', "Taylor explained. The participating adult in most cases will be the parent. But the boy can also be joined by an aunt or uncle, a grandparent, or an adult brother or sister, or even a neighbor.

The program is organized this way because of the increasing number of nontraditional families that exist in the country today. We wanted Tiger Cubs to be as flexible as possible so all boys, no matter what their family situation, can join."

Taylor noted that Tiger Cubs stresses fun, simplicity and flexibility. The official uniform consists only of a Tiger Cub emblem (an adult tiger and tiger cub side-by-side) that is ironed onto a T-shirt, polo shirt, or blouse. Tiger Cub groups, consisting of four to eight boy-adult teams, meet monthly.

Tiger Cubs will use a Family Activity Book that lists dozens of activities and projects to bring the boy and family closer together. Tiger Cubs includes none of the badges or ranks that are part of traditional Cub Scouting and Boy Scouting.

In this area the new Tiger Cub Program will be available at Lake Forest North Elementary School in Felton.


As coordinator of Heritage Day 1982, I would like to express my appreciation for all the help I received.

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#### -Promised History-

As promised last week, here is the brief history of the Frederica Volunteer Fire Company which appeared in the program book for their 50th anniversary celebration.

A Brief History of the Frederica Vol. Fire Co., Inc.

From the middle 1800's to 1932, the town of Frederica was protected from fire by the antique hand pumper now housed in our present building.

In 1932, a group of concerned citizens incorporated the fire company. The first President was John C. Darby and the first Cheif was Leslie Rentz. The members purchased a used Seagraves pumper from the Robbins Hose Company in Dover as the town's first motorized piece. Not having a building in which to house the engine, Mr Rentz allowed the fire company to keep it ina garage at his place of business [now Edge's Arco]. Unfortunately [and much to the members' embarrassment] the garage caught fire later that year and burned to the ground with the truck still inside.

To replace this loss, the members then purchased an open-cab Reo pumper which was in service until the early 1960's, when it was sold to Mr. Hardy Foraker. The Reo is still at Mr. Foraker's property at the present

The town was in desperate need of a fire house to store the equipment of a growing company. However, the country was in the clutches of The Depression and money was very hard to come by. The SPA, Works Progress Administration, was developed to help communities with projects that would give local people employment. The late Banksom T. Holcomb, who resided near Frederica, was the administrator of this program for the State of Delaware. Through the efforts of some of our civic-minded citizens working with 1217. Auctomo, we were able to get assistance for this project. The build-

ing was completed in 1936, and was known as the Frederica Community Building with the first floor to be used as a fire house. The Town of Frederica was bonded for the local share of the cost. Some time later, the firemen started dances which proved quite successful for many years. The Ladies Auxiliary also assisted with suppers, card parties, etc. The Fire Company took on the obligation of paying off the balance of this cost to the town and finally the Town Commissioners deeded the building to the Fire Company.

In order to provide a better water supply to the Fire Company, we purchased a Chevrolet chassis and a thousand-gallon tank in the early 1940's. The late Marion Stevenson and Reynolds Gooden, President and Chief respectively, were responsible for the leadership in the members assembling this truck on their own. This truck was sold to the Farmington Fire Company and is still in service.

In 1961, a dramatic change took place at the Fire Hall. Through the efforts of Zora Tatman and many others, Bingo games were started. With the ample revenue from these games, it was not necessary to go door-to-door for fund raising. Bingo has made us very self-sufficient and to this day we have not asked the Town Council or the citizens of our fire district for any out-of-the pocket donations. Most firemen are very proud of this fact.

In 1960, prior to starting Bingo, the Bradley property behind the Fire House on David Street was torn down, and the present Post Office Building was erected by the Fire Company. The Post Office had previously been located in the Fire House where the T.V. Room

and Radio Room are now located. In 1962, a new Hahn pumper was purchased at a price of \$28,000. The truck has a 1,000 gallon tank and a 750 gallon per minute pump on a Ford chassis. purchased at a cost of \$13,000 dollars and is a Ford chassis with an Oren body. It has a 850 gallon tank and a 500 gallon per minute pump. This truck pumped for almost two weeks straight at the Rothwell Grainery fire in 1959. A Dodge brush truck was purchased

in 1968 for fighting woods and field fires. Purchase price was \$13,000 and it contains a 200 gallon tank, four-wheel drive, a 250 gallon per minute pump, and a 10 ton winch.

The new engine room with four truck bays and two bathrooms was dedicated in 1972. The project cost \$65,000 and gave us much needed for our engines. Contractor was Herman Myers.

Shortly after the addition, the Company purchased a 1967 International Van for a Rescue truck. Many tools were purchased and put into service, largely due t the efforts of Zeke Dill in his planning and remodeling of the van. This truck changed the Company thinking and provided a large ambulance training program to help the citizens of the community until a neighboring ambulance could arrive.

In 1974, we purchased our "Super Tanker." Truck 5 has a 1,000 gallon per minute pump and carries 2,000 gallons of water. It has a Great Eastern body and was purchased for \$59,000.

A new Saulsbury rescue truck replaced the International van in 1976. The truck has the much needed room for all of our heavy rescue equipment. The truck has a 9.2 cubic foot per minute compressor for breathing air, a 15 Kw generator, eight 500 watt Quartz lights, a power saw, and various other rescue tools. Cost of this truck was \$62,000. In March of 1979 we thtained Hurst ["Jaws of Life"] tool totally funded by the Federal Highway Administration for use at auto accidents. A rescue boat was purchased in the early 1970's after a drowning occurred

at the Market Street Bridge. Our present equipment consists of three pumpers, a rescue truck, a rescue boat, a brush truck, and a mobile lighting and generating unit.

## Tested boars attract Del. buyers

Twenty-three boars sold for an average of \$338 each at Delaware's latest tested boar sale, held earlier this month at the state fairgrounds in Harrington.

Well over half the animals went to Delaware buyers. A few also were sold to producers in Maryland and Pennsylvania. Prime purpose of the sale was to provide Delawre pork producers an opportunity to upgrade the genetic base of their herds with tested board performing offspring.

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TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

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The highest selling boar from this year's test was a Droc consigned by Edwards and Edwards of Rich Square, N.C. It was purchased for \$700 by J. Quinton Johnson of Salisbury, MD. This was the highest indexing boar in

Eleven pens with four boars each began the test last spring. Of these, the top 23 were sold on the basis of soundness and performance. The top index was 163.7, indicating perfora move that pays off in better mance 63.7 percent above the average of boars on test. Performance data for the 35 animals that completed the trial include an average daily gain of 2.32 pounds; feed required per pound of gain, 2.13; and an average backfat thickness of .72 inches.

This was the fifth year for the trial, Delaware Pork Producers Association. "right reason"). They plan to start another test next spring which will be completed with a sale early in September of 1983.

Carol became involved in the local United Methodist Church and its activities along with her husband and

Then there came a time of illness and difficulty following the birth of her second daughter during which she stayed away from the church and its activities. Reconciliation came through a new minister to the Marydel charge. As he and his wife became personal friends of the Beyers, she got a new view of the ministry. A minister became a human being with the same individual and family ups and downs as others. Always before, Carol Beyer says, she thought of ministers as separate from and somehow above ordinary human beings. As their friendship with the couple "who had their little spats, just as David and I.." grew, so did Carol's reacquaintance with the church.

Strangely enough, it was through her husband David that the first thought of becoming a minister was planted in Carol Beyer's mind. He said, "I think you ought to consider the ordained ministry.

It was a startling statement that took her back more than a little. Women's lib had certainly never been a big issue for her. In the Brown household, she says, there had been no sense of division between women's work and men's work. Her mother and father took equal responsibility for whatever needed to be done. However, when it was suggested that she enter the ministry, she discovered that she shared the same bias with a lot of other people. Women were just not supposed to be ministers.

The decision did not come swiftly, nor with ease. Carol Beyer says, "The Lord...just worked with me...five or six years...until there was no other choice...I couldn't keep sitting on the fence.

The turning point, she thinks, came in a moment of darkness before the light. She had attended a conference for women considering the ministry held in 1979 at Wesley Theological Seminary. While there she became very upset because it seemed to her that some of those in attendance were doing the right thing for the wrong reason. It appeared the motivation behind their going into the ministry was to prove something - that they could succeed in an area formerly considered a man's province. She was so disturbed, in fact, that she left the conference early. In the aftermath, she realized that there was also a "right reason", the desire to spread the Gospel and help bring about peace. Thus, she wound up "leaving it to the Lord's direction" and making the committment. (Since then, she says, which is sponsored by the Delaware the women she has encountered in the Cooperative Extension Service and the ministry have been guided by that

It was a scary decision. She had been out of school for sixteen years. There were a great many family responsibil-

ities. Her husband, David, a lab technician at ILC near Frederica, carried the burden of financial support for their family which now numbered four children. There were seven years of college and seminary ahead. For that first year after she decided to go back to school, they got through she says,

"by the grace of God." Two years later she had earned an associate degree in human services from Delaware Technical and Community College. She completed work on her B.A. in behavioral science at Wilmington College where she graduas Cum Laude this year. As a student she made the Dean's list each year and the National Dean's List in

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This fall she is enrolled in Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C. and will make the two and a half hour drive three days each week. For the other four, she will serve the four churches of the West Harrington Charge - Trinity in Harrington, Prospect, Bethel in Andrewsville and Salem in Farmington. Bethel and Salem alternate in having church services, so there are three services at which she presides each Sunday.

None of this could have been achieved without the total support of her family and the warm encouragement of friends, pastors and members of the Marydel and Wsley (Dover) congregations. As an example of the kind of support she has gotten from her family, she cites the willingness of her husband to make a major move, even when they ghought her first pastorate was going to be in Berlin, MD. That would have meant a long drive to work every day for him. As it worked out the move (from Dover) was to Harrington. It actually put him closer to his job.


As it has been with her family and friends all along, so she expects it will be as she serves her first pastorate here. She regards the ministry not as an "I" thing, but a "we" thing in which the pastor and the congregation share in the work of the church. Thus, there should be no great distances between the Rev. Carol Beyer and the people she serves, no pastor on a pedestal. She believes in the close-up experi-


