

Clark Street RR Crossing to close as repairs begin

Harrington City Manager Norma Short told the City Council Monday night that she has received word that the Clark Street railroad crossing will be temporarily closed while work is done on it. Traffic will have to be rerouted during that time.

Contacted on Tuesday, the state's Department of Transportation said that Conrail plans to do some rehabilitation work on the Clark Street crossing beginning this Monday. The crossing will be closed Monday, Nov. 15 through Nov. 22. Traffic will be routed around the crossing.

In addition, the state will be doing concrete patching on Clark Street from Route 13 to Commerce Street. There

will be intermittent lane closings while the work's in progress between November 15 and December 10. Tilcon Delaware, Inc. has the \$94,374 project which will include a hot mix overlay, probably to be done in the spring.

Street Commissioner and City Council member Jack Wyatt who has devoted much of her personal time to keeping a watchful eye on the streets, credited the cooperation of Senator Nancy Cook, Senator elect Ruth Ann Minner and Representative Ronnie Darling with helping get the Clark Street project in motion.

Game Room Closed

During Monday's session, the Council heard from Freddie White, operator of F & B Enterprise (the arcade or game

room on Center Street). White had been notified that the business there was in violation of the current zoning. He had been asked to apply for rezoning. However, it is up to the owner of the property to make that application. White reported that owner Tony Pizzadili does not want the zoning change. He said he had told Pizzadili that he would turn in the keys to the property by November 15. He promised to close the business Monday evening after leaving the Council meeting.

It was also reported that water and sewer service to the game room had been turned off because of non-payment of the water and sewer fees.

Those fees, said the city, are the responsibility of the property owner.

White had questions about what he said were rumors about problems surrounding the arcade operation. However he said he had only heard complaints from one neighbor, a resident of the area.

In other business the Harrington City Council:

-noted the placement of new street signs around town. The old street signs were donated to the Historical Society.

-heard the new utility building to be erected on the site of the old water tower had arrived. The tower was recently taken down by John Satterfield.

-approved an agreement with the engineering firm of George, Miles and Burr of Salisbury, Maryland. The firm will be called upon for various city projects, but present consulting engineers, Richardson Associates, will still handle matters pertaining to the sewage treatment plant operation.

-granted Mark B. Carp a one year extension on the rezoning of the property near Peck Avenue. Carp had an option to buy the land from Dudley Willis and is looking for funds to build an apartment complex there. Without the extension, the zoning approved last year would revert the previous classification after a year during which no construction is begun.

-heard a request from Lake Forest School District's Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds, Charles Saulsbury that parking on the east side of Dorman Street in front of the school buildings be prohibited or restricted. Saulsbury mentioned the safety factor when school buses are rounding the

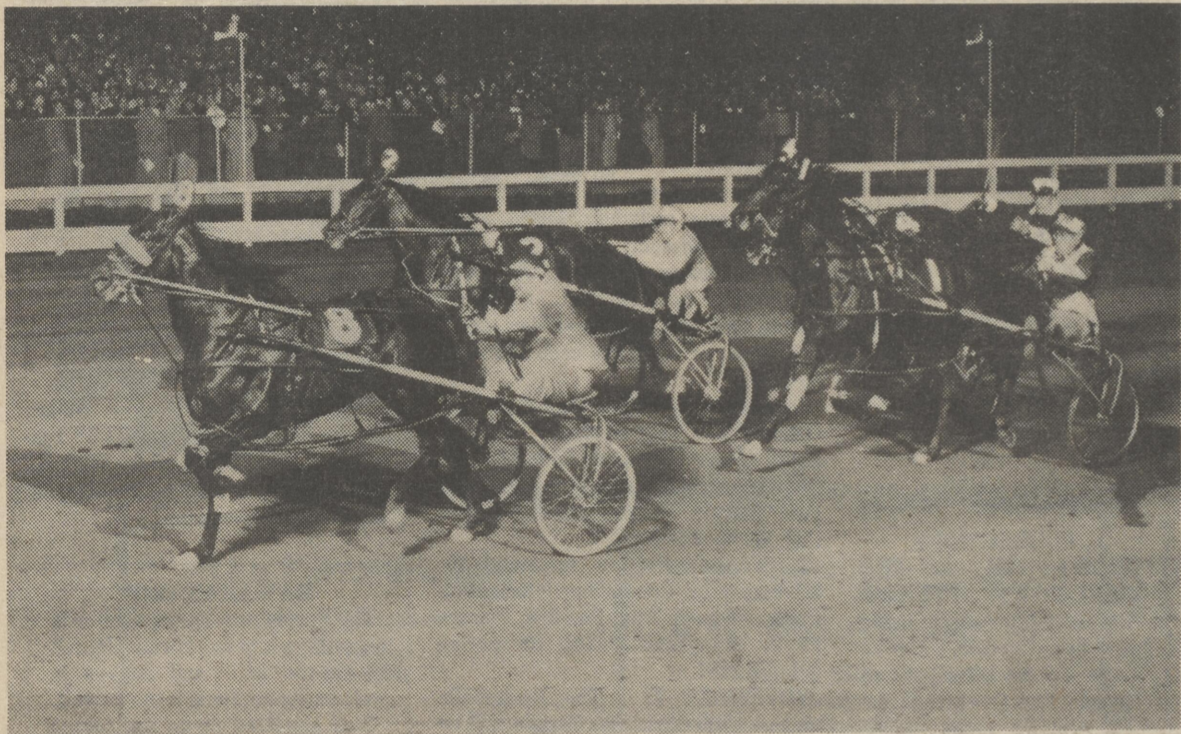
Center Street-Dorman Street corner in the morning and afternoon. Council member Curtis Melvin reported a list of six vehicles parked on the east side of the school during one school day. All of them turned out to belong to school personnel. There is a large parking lot behind the Chipman school building for the use of school faculty, staff and other employees.

Adios Harry dies at 31 Winner of 1955 American Pacing Derby

GREENWOOD, DE - One of the all time great harness horses died last week in a place that has been his home since he retired at stud in 1958. Adios Harry will be remembered for his blazing speed and endurance on a race track.

"Harry" was a racing institution. He set records that stood for 20 or more years before they were broken. His records were speed records...world records. His most prestigious events were winning the 1954 Little Brown Jug in two heats despite a pre-race injury, the record mile of 1:55 at Vernon Downs in 1955, and the biggest pay day of his career...the \$75,000 Eastern State Championship at Yonkers. Recognition of his ability continued throughout his life. Just recently he made it into the new Delaware Valley Harness Writers Hall of Fame. He was the first horse of pre-'60 vintage to do so. That's a record he will keep all to himself.

All of these events gain lip service after awhile, but the real story is what led up to victory. "In the '54 Jug, Harry was lame. He had kicked a hole in a partition in his stall the day before

the race. It damaged his hind leg. We sat up with him all night with an ice bag on the injury. It was his own fault. He got mad when a groom closed the top door on his stall to shut off his view of a mare romping in the paddock across the way. He was hurting when we warmed him up that day, and right up to the time he saw the gate leaving...he was hurting. He soon forgot the pain when the field began to move. He was game - winning both heats easily", said Luther Lyons, the man who trained, drove, and owned him.

Vernon Downs was the scene many times of fast miles for the proud son of the greatest sire of all times...Adios. The big three-quarter mile track allowed Harry to do something no other horse has done before or since and that is always going the first quarter in a blaze of speed and the mile in 1:55, which was a world's record. Vernon was the biggest track he raced on. "It seemed that every time we got ready to go to Kentucky he wasn't right even though he was basically a very sound horse," said Luther Lyons. Had Harry raced over a mile track, it is no telling how fast he could have gone.

"He just wouldn't quit. He'd sulk a lot if you didn't take him out on top", he added. Harry also set a world's record at Vernon by going two heats in 1:55.2 and 1:56.1. The record had lapped nearly two seconds off a record held jointly by Samson Hanover and the great race horse Good Time, driven by Frank Irvin who also drove Adios.

Adios Harry got too old too fast before the top purses came into play. His greatest pay day was winning the Eastern Championship at Yonkers which was worth \$37,500.

Paul Vinyard drove Harry as a 2 year old in 1953 and gave him a record of 2:05. "Paul always said he was the kind of horse that would try pacing faster than he could keep up with himself. He always went in that first turn at a fast clip. Usually when he went off stride...it was in the first turn," said Luther Lyons.

One of the things that most agree separated Adios Harry from the rest of the field was that he could leave at a burning speed and come home the same way. He usually had that final terrific kick. Most horses that tried to go with him were worn down by the

George Mahony retires at Harrington

HARRINGTON, DE - George B. Mahony, longtime horseman and for the past 12 years a harness racing Judge will retire at the conclusion of Harrington Raceway's Fall season on November 13th. Mahony, who drove his first horse to a "Winner's Circle" finish in 1933 at the Groton Fair in Groton, Mass. leaves behind a career spanning five decades and numerous assignments in the industry.

Harness racing started as a hobby for Mahony while driving a few of his father's horses on the Fair circuit in Massachusetts. His father, the late Amos (A.D.) Mahony, owned and operated a thriving funeral establishment in Ayer, Mass. and young Mahony was licensed to practice and had initially chosen that field for his life's work.

But then World War II broke out and without wasting time, Mahony enlisted in the Navy and served his Country with distinction in the South Pacific. Shortly after enlisting, his father passed away and by the time he was able to gain his discharge in 1946, the business had been sold by his Mother and Mahony was to begin his career in harness racing.

As well as training and driving many horses of his own, he served side by side as 2nd Trainer for the veteran Del Cameron. He went to work with Cameron in 1949 and that partnership lasted until 1964 when Mahony moved with his wife Wilma to Harrington to train horses for attorney Herman C. Brown. In 1970 he obtained his Judges license from the U.S. Trotting Assoc.

and has since served in that capacity at all three Delaware harness tracks; Brandywine Raceway, Dover Downs and Harrington Raceway. He's long been noted for his warm generosity, careful attention to detail, lively wit and thoughtful consideration of friends, fellow workers and family.

The Mahony's have two children; Donna who lives in South Carolina and George who makes his home in New England. He's a member of the Moose Lodge, American Legion, and the Masons. He's also a member of the Asbury Methodist Church in Harrington and was a longtime member of the choir there. He and his wife built a home in Pinehurst, North Carolina during the early 50's and they plan on retiring there within the next year.

Student wins local Century III Award

Connie Gerardi, a senior at Lake Forest High School, has been named the school's top Century III Leader according to Dr. Margaret B. Phelps, principal.

Miss Gerardi is now eligible to compete with other local winners from around the state for one of two \$1,500 scholarships and an all-expense-paid trip to the national Century III Leaders Conference, slated for March 4-7, 1983, in Colonial Williamsburg, VA. State winners will compete for the national winner's prize of an additional \$10,000 scholarship.

The Century III Leaders program is designed to bring together and

recognize student leaders who show both strong leadership abilities and an interest in the future of America. Connie was judged on the basis of leadership skills, school and community involvement, and a current events examination. She also wrote a short essay on a particular issue that challenges America in its third century.

This is the eighth year of the Century III Leaders program, which awards a total of \$218,500 in scholarships to 204 young leaders. Century III is sponsored and administered by the National Association of Secondary

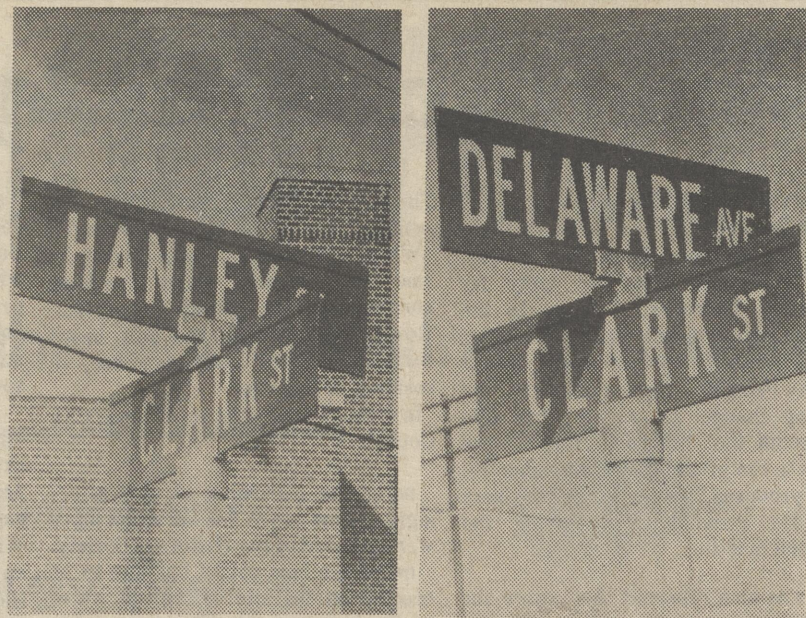
Delaware, provides a supportive link between former 4-Hers and the ongoing clubs.

Tax on unemployment benefits revised on '82 returns, IRS says

Taxpayers who collected unemployment benefits and had other income during 1982 should be aware of a change in the law, the Internal Revenue Service said. This change applies to 1982 tax returns.

According to the IRS, a single taxpayer will owe income taxes on unemployment compensation if his or her total income tops \$12,000. Married taxpayers filing jointly will be taxed if total income exceeds \$18,000. Previously, unemployment compensation was taxed if a single taxpayer's income was more than \$20,000 or a married couple filed jointly has an income greater than \$25,000.

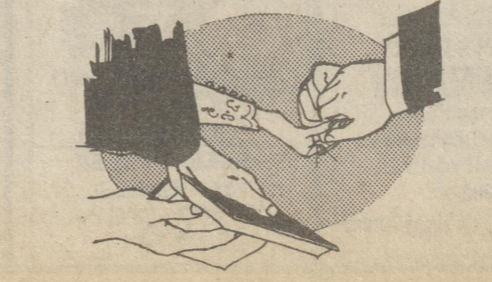

Physicians at U. of Rochester, NY noted repeated bursts of alarming abnormal heartbeats in obese but otherwise healthy persons taking a liquid protein diet. The physicians concluded "all further use of liquid protein diets should be continued until we fully understand how to prevent their dangerous effect upon the heart."

Evangelist Lester Roloff killed in crash

Evangelist Lester Roloff, 68, a crusading fundamentalist who won a battle with the state of Texas over licensing his homes for wayward youths, was killed last week when the small plane he was piloting slammed to the ground in a field outside Normangee, Texas. Very severe storms were reported in the area at the time of the crash.

With Roloff in the Cessna 210 were Susan Lynn Smith, 28; Elaine Wingert, 30; Cheryl Palmer, 24; and Enola Slade, 25. All were victims of the crash.

The group was on its way from Corpus Christi, Texas to Kansas City, Missouri. A service at Calvary Baptist Church, Roosterville, MO was the

object of their trip. An evangelist, Roloff had devoted much of his life to the establishment of homes for young people in trouble - those "no one else would take." The homes operated on a strict Bible based program including natural foods, Bible reading and a ban on television and rock music.

The licensing problems came in 1973 after parents visiting their daughter at the Rebekah Home for Girls reported seeing a girl whipped. District Judge Charles Mathews, of Austin, Texas toured the facilities and later ruled in Roloff's favor.

Roloff is survived by his wife, Marie and two children.

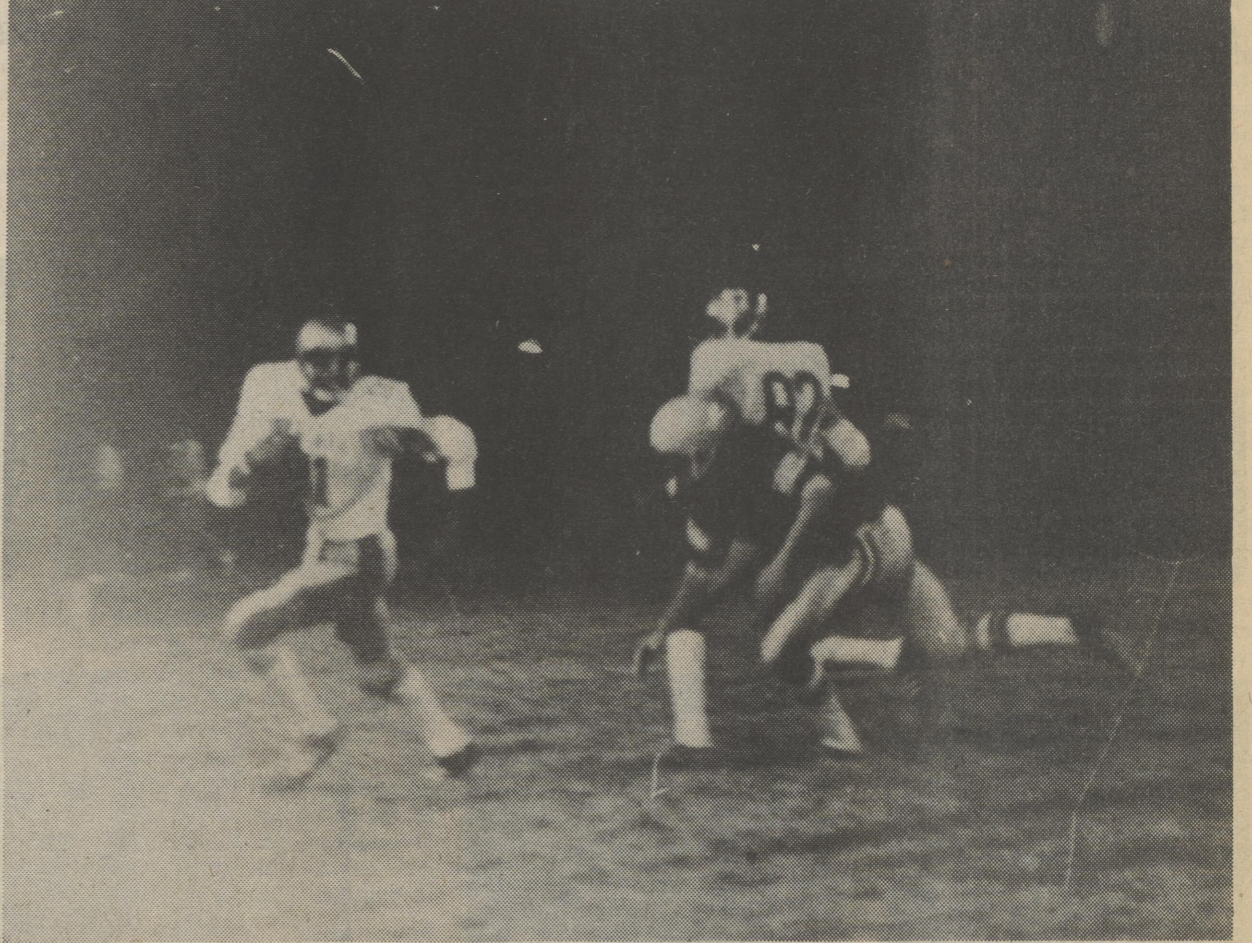

Spartan Harriers are 3D in Loop run

Lake Forest's boys' cross country team finished third in Henlopen Conference dual meet competition (6-2) and third in the conference championship run; held at Killen's Pond State Park.

Cape Henlopen's Danny Harmon, making his final downstate scholastic appearance, ran three miles in 15.43, to pace his team to the loop title. Caesar Rodney was second.

Junior Danny Donovan was tenth and sophomore Danny Haines was 13th. Rob Manaraze, a senior, made his final home state a good one, by chopping 16 seconds off his best previous local effort. Manaraze was 18th with junior Bob Smith and sophomore Mike Melvin completing the Spartan scoring, in 31st and 34th positions, respectively.

At the start of the season, it appeared that the Spartans might post their first losing season. But hard work and talent paid off. Danny Donovan, a first-year runner, was an instant success ending up with a No. 2 team

ranking, after leading the Spartans in something like five meets.

Haines, the team's No. 1 runner improved from 18.01 (1981) to 17.02. He's still got two years of stardom left. Mike Melvin, out with a foot injury for ten months, was a big question mark. But, a late summer trip with Coach to consult with Del State trainer, Roger Hunt, corrected the problem. Melvin was way behind in his training, but worked hard and is now close enough to Haines and Donovan to indicate a three-way battle for the No. 1 rank, in 1983.

This kind of competition will make all three Spartans better runners and will thus make the team stronger. Donovan is "Harrier of the Week", the last one of 1982.

Manaraze is the top-five runner, lost by graduation. Freshman Billy Haggerty, a fine prospect, could take over the No. 5 spot with Bob Smith moving into Manaraze's slot. Smith, who returned to cross-country

after sitting out two seasons, was a dependable No. 5 runner all season, usually showing a courageous finishing sport.

Lafayette Bell, a hard-luck runner has been plagued by a bad back for some time. Bell, if 100 percent healthy, could completely rearrange the team ranking. John Caskey has asthma but manages to do a good job, in spite of it. Mark Mosley, Mark Goodman, Tom Milligan, John Layton, Jeff Beene are other harriers who should improve with another year of competition under their belts.

From Chipman School, Ray Powell, is a threat to move into the top five, at Lake Forest. With very little experience, he nevertheless has an 18.15 clocking for three miles. Eric Payne is another solid candidate from Chipman. Chris Caskey, Mike Grogan and Jerry Mosley are seniors with 18 seasons of dedicated service, to the sport of cross country.

Spartans Upset CR, 20-19

Friday night's Spartan-Rider confrontation had all the ingredients of a fictionalized football thriller - the kind of story in which the underdog team comes from behind in the closing seconds to win the game. Except...This one was for real.

In a heart-stopping final quarter, the Spartans widened a fragile one point lead to seven points only to see it dissolved by two Caesar Rodney touchdowns. Then, with nine seconds remaining, Lake Forest reclaimed the victory from an almost triumphant CR team.

If we were forced to name a hero for the evening (and we're prohibited by the rules of hero picking from naming the whole team), it would have to be Tony Scott. Scott intercepted a CR pass that could have cost the Spartans dearly, caught a 42-yarder from Brian Gladden to set up Lake Forest's first touchdown - and - grabbed the final Gladden pass to twist into the end zone for the winning score on fourth down and desperation.

The game was a definite upset. Virtually no one had expected Lake Forest, winless in Northern Henlopen division, to defeat the frontrunning Riders. Most of the pre-game speculation was about how big the CR victory would be. Fortunately for Lake Forest, Jim Fleming and his team did not share in the gloomy prognostications. The Spartans played like a team that could win - and did.

The Riders took an early lead as the game opened to a more expected scenario. CR won the toss, elected to receive and promptly marched the ball deep into Lake Forest territory. The

Riders were then forced to punt, but a penalty against Lake Forest put the ball back in their hands for a first in ten with good field position. Shortly thereafter, they were on the scoreboard with a 19 yard, Courtney-Surguy pass combination and a successful kick by Jones.

The score remained at 7-0 for the rest of the first half as Spartans traded possession of the ball several times.

In the third quarter, Spartan quarterback Brian Gladden completed a 42 yard pass to Tony Scott who grabbed the ball just inside the line to put Lake Forest in good position for a TD. That came just a few plays later as Gladden pushed for the final yard into goal line pile-up of Spartans and Riders. The decision to pass for two instead of kick for one paid off as Gladden hit Scott in the end zone to edge the team past CR 8-7.

In the fourth period the Spartans hit again with a 20 yard pass from Gladden to James Browne who scooted across the goal line and did a little dance in celebration as the upset looked like a possibility. Lake Forest went ahead 14-7. The TD culminated a 73 yard drive for the Spartans.

However, there were still 7 plus minutes in the game and a determined and talented Rider squad to contend with. CR's standout halfback Vincent Williams returned the kickoff 40 yards. 37 yds. later he covered the final one to make it 14-13. The pass attempt failed.

As the remaining game time dwindled, CR sacked Gladden and forced a fumble giving the Riders possession of the Spartan 37. Within a few plays Williams bulldozed a 12 yard

path across the goal line to put CR ahead 19-14 with just 1:19 remaining in the game.

At this point, the Spartans got a break and made it work for them. After the kickoff return the Riders were assessed a 15 yd. unsportsmanlike conduct penalty that put L.F. on their 47 yard line. The Spartans quickly capitalized with a 20 yard pass from Gladden to Brian Hudson to make it to the 33 with about 28 seconds left.

For the rest of the game it was agony and ecstasy: 28 seconds - first and ten - Gladden pass incomplete; 24 seconds - second and ten - Gladden pass incomplete; 20 seconds - third and ten - Gladden pass incomplete; 13 seconds - fourth and ten - last chance. The Riders were expecting another long pass attempt, but Scott turned away from his guard, took a short one from Gladden, ran it to the center and headed for the goal line. There were nine seconds on the clock when he crossed that line to give Lake Forest the 20-19 upset victory.

The win brings Lake Forest to a 4-4 overall record with two games remaining in the season. These include Woodbridge on the Raider field on Friday night and Milford at home for the "Battle of the Bell" on November 19.

CR's loss plus a Dover victory over Sussex Central on Friday night set up a three-way Northern Division tie between the Riders, the Senators and Cape Henlopen's Vikings. The classic CR-Dover showdown on the 19th may also be the championship battle.

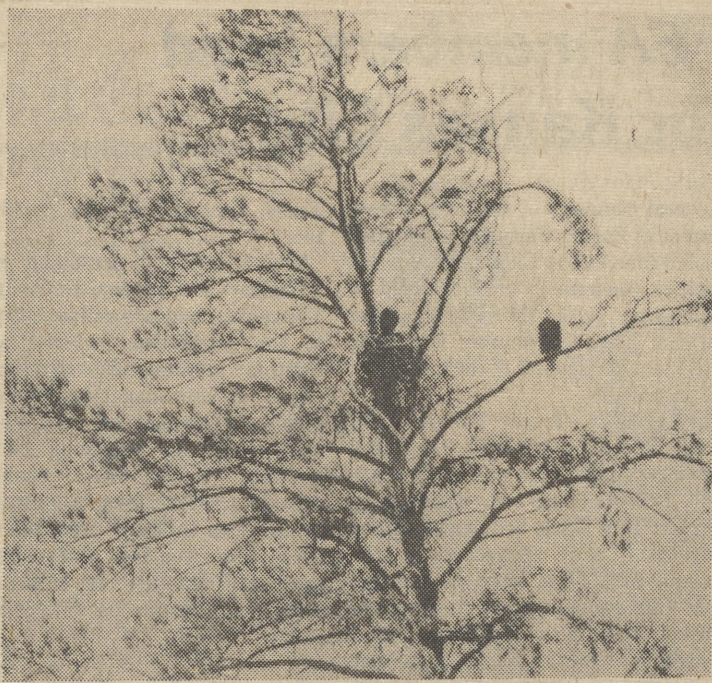

Cam Fella is October Horse of the Month

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Cam Fella, winner of the \$259,578 Messenger Stake, the third leg of pacing's Triple Crown, has been selected the October Harness Horse of the Month by the United States Trotting Association. Earlier in the year Cam Fella captured the Cane Pace, the first jewel of the Triple Crown, but was ineligible for the Little Brown Jug. Nicknamed "The Pacing Machine" by his fans, the three-year-old son of Most Happy Fella now has victories in 12 consecutive months. The inexhaustible pacer has now

recorded 27 wins in 32 starts during 1982, with earnings of \$829,723. He is trained and driven by Pat Crowe for owners Norman Clements and Norm Faulkner of Ontario. Jazz Cosmos also closed out an excellent season with brilliant performances in October. He equaled the world record for three-year-old trotters with a 1:55 clocking at The Red mile in Lexington, Kentucky. Six days later Jazz Cosmos won the Kentucky Futurity, the final leg of the trotting Triple Crown. The victory increased his earnings

this year to \$608,248. Jazz Cosmos is owned by the Sunbird Stable of Florida. Trim The Tree, whose nine race winning streak was snapped earlier in the month, returned a week later to break the world record for two-year-old pacers. His time of 1:53 3/5 trimmed 1/5 of a second off the old record, set last year by Merger. In a pair of time trials, Arndon trotted the fastest mile in history, 1:54, while 1982 Horse of the Year, Fan Hanover, paced the fastest mile ever by a mare, 1:50 4/5.

LF Community Swim Team begins winter program

The schedule has been upgraded to include the Wilmington Aquatic Club and the North Wilmington Neptunes (JCC) as well as the Wicomico Swimmers.

The split team setup will enable the coaches to address the needs of the swimmers rather than having the entire team present for practice sessions. Novice Team will meet on Saturday mornings until January then increase practice times to three times a week. The Junior Team will meet Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sundays until January. Coach Monroe stated that "...with the novice swimmers aside with their own sessions, we can get a lot more done in regards to mechanics without competing for time and space with the older

Retired group offers Drivers Course

Delaware Insurance Commissioner, David H. Elliott, has directed that a 10% discount be given on the liability and personal injury protection premiums on private passenger cars operated by drivers who voluntarily complete an approved defensive driving course of instructions after January 1, 1982.

The American Association of Retired Persons, a national 13 million member organization, has such a program called *55 Alive/Mature Driving*, which is one of the two approved courses given in the State of Delaware. However, this course is open only to persons 55 years of age and older, and has been designed with the older driver in mind. Among other things, it covers the concern for the normal age-related driving, as well as to increase awareness of appropriate techniques for driving in today's complex traffic patterns. One need not be a member of the Harrington Senior Center or of the AARP organization to participate.

The eight-hour course is being sponsored by the Harrington Senior Center and will be open to all persons 500 years of age and older, on Wednesday, November 10th, and Friday, November 12th from 9:30 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. A person must attend both sessions in order to receive a certificate to file with his insurance company for the 10% discount, and this certificate will be good for a three-year period. The discount will be applied to the car driven by the individual who completes the course. If such an individual has more than one car in a household, the discount will apply to the car he uses most. If there are two drivers, and two cars, each must take the course. The cost is \$12 per person, and includes all course books and fees paid to the State of Delaware for processing records. The instructor is a trained volunteer. There will be a second course offered beginning November 17 at Luther Towers in Dover. Those who were not able to register for the Harrington session, may enroll in the second course. If further information is desired, you may call the assistant coordinator, Marguerete Madsen, at 422-6561, and she will answer any question you may have.

of the race. Olin Davis of Harrington, who was one of the top reinsmen in the country during Adios Harry's career, drove him to a world record at Rosecroft Raceway in the mile and sixteenth in 2:07.1. "He was a great horse...one of the very best," Davis said recently at his home in Harrington where he continues to train horses at the local oval. He once told me how it felt driving the big son of Adios as well as a seventh sense he felt for him. "It was like holding onto a powerful force that just pulled you along with a great rush. I used to tell people that if you put your hand on his side you could hear the motor running inside of him," commented Davis.

Adios Harry was foaled in 1951, and sold to J. Howard Lyons at the Harrisburg sale in 1952. Folklore has it that he obtained his name by virtue of President Harry S. Truman and his exit from office.

Many tributes go out to this once great race horse, but no one should overlook the real reason Adios Harry was able to develop into the great race horse he became. It was because of the "Lyons Touch". The success that carried J. Howard Lyons down through life as a businessman and farmer spilled over to his horses where he knew, as does Luther Lyons, how to bring a horse around and make a good race horse a great one.

It was their love and attention as well as their patience that brought Adios Harry to the level of a world champion. That in itself does not come easy. It means a lot of sacrifice and hard work. Adios Harry, great as he was, was an extension of the "Lyons Touch". The force that pushed Howard Lyons was the push needed to get Adios Harry going. Maybe not...but I came to share that view with others.

There is a general rule of law...or a rule of nature when it comes to racing that the horse...or if you will...the race car, is 50 percent of the battle. The other fifty percent belongs to the driver. In Luther Lyons, the son of the owner of the horse, you have a craftsman with all the natural abilities to take a horse like Adios Harry and

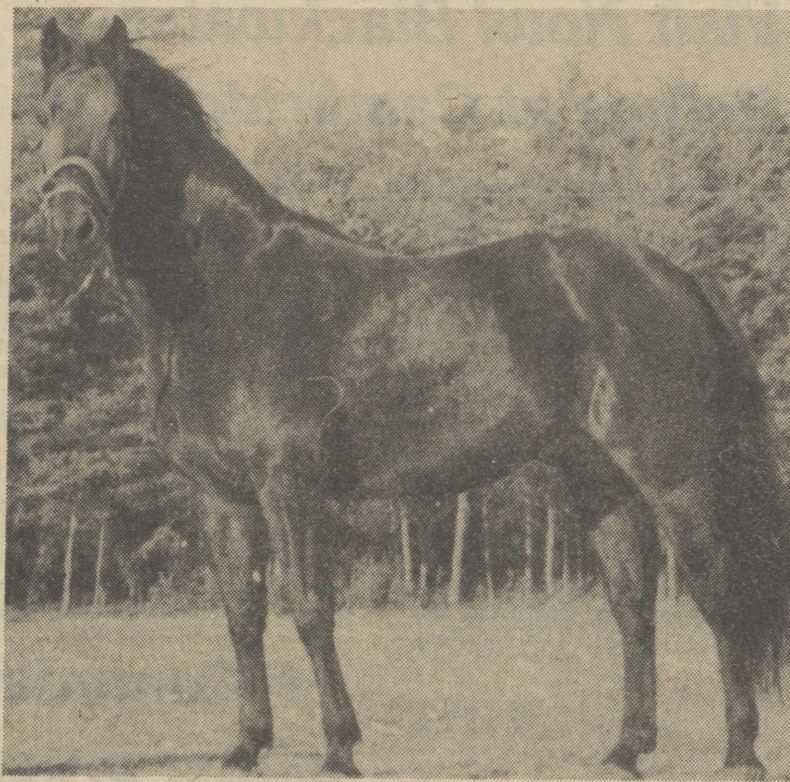
race him to national prominence. It was Luther who took over the reinsmanship of the powerful beast and drove him to world records. In addition to this he maintained a farming operation of over fifteen hundred acres of tillable land. Again the "Lyons Touch...the Lyons force," became a factor, for winning was what they knew. The critics over look this point.

Some people in the field of life travel between their 20 yard line and the opponent's 20 yard line and establish all kinds of rushing records -- but they never score, which is the name of the game.

Luther scored however...and oh how he scored. He took the horse he loved so much to the top and made him a world champion. When you sit and talk to Luther Lyons today you still find the quiet man of a few words. He doesn't talk about the money won by Adios Harry or how much money his father was offered for the noble beast because simply all the money at Ft. Knox could not have bought him. Why? Because he belonged to them, and they loved him so much that they would not wish to be separated from him.

Adios Harry won many tributes...but did Luther Lyons? Yes! Probably the single most coveted award was the Dan Patch trophy which he won following his record setting race mile at Vernon Downs in 1955 with Harry going 1:55. The Patch trophy was first awarded in 1904. Luther Lyons was the first driver to break the 1904 record of Dan Patch and win the trophy forever. This was a 51 year old record. The trophy is on display at the Smith Family Museum at the Delaware State Fair. It's late coming, but congratulations, Luther! One individual that night at Vernon clocked Harry in 1:54.4.

If I were asked to render an opinion on Adios Harry as a race horse I would say this -- "...no harness horse could beat him to the (first) quarter pole...and if you were to catch him coming home you had best lighten up the sulky...and in between those two points...well he was like a freight train...out of control...running downhill."

New betting system operators in training at Dover Downs

DOVER, DE - Wilmington's Frank Wise has been a very busy man at Dover Downs Raceway recently. The central Delaware harness racing facility is installing a new sell-cash computerized betting system for its upcoming racing season and he's in charge of training the people who will be behind the windows.

More than 90 people are being trained to operate the machines which will provide a variety of services to the betting public. "Patrons can now conduct all transactions at just one window," said the newly appointed mutuel manager, "up to four different bets, including different denominations can be handled on a single ticket. Winning tickets can also be cashed at the same window, eliminating the need to stand in various lines." Previously, patrons had to cash winning tickets at a cashier's window and then move to various sellers windows to wager on an upcoming race.

Wise has more than 20 years of racing experience and is also the assistant mutuel manager at Brandywine Raceway in Wilmington, Delaware. He's been associated with Dover

Downs Raceway since its opening in 1969, except for a recent two year absence.

Wise has been conducting extensive training sessions for his operators and said everything will be ready for the Sunday, November 14 opening. The race program will also include an outline of how the new system works and he expects the patrons will have little or no trouble adapting to the more convenient methods.

Other highlights for the season will be the addition of a second trifecta wagering event in the daily racing card and color television race monitors throughout the facility.

Dover Downs Raceway opens its harness horse racing season on Sunday afternoon, November 14 with a 12-race card. Post time is 1 p.m. The track will be dark Mondays and Tuesdays of each week. A 10-race card is scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday evenings and 12-races are highlighted on Friday and Saturday evenings. Post time for the evening races will be 8 p.m. Sunday afternoons' 12-race card will begin at 1 p.m. The season will run through Saturday, March 26.

Postmaster offers Christmas mailing tips

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, Harrington Postmaster, Ralph Starkey is offering tips for customers to assure that their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line.

"It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code", Starkey says.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers will follow a few simple suggestions:

CUSHION: Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item -- including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also make good cushioning materials.

DONT OVERWRAP: Just use your

carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in processing equipment.

SEAL PROPERLY: Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape: Pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive.

AVOID SMUDGES: Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

POSITION ADDRESSES PROPERLY: Put your recipient's address in the lower right portion of the container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

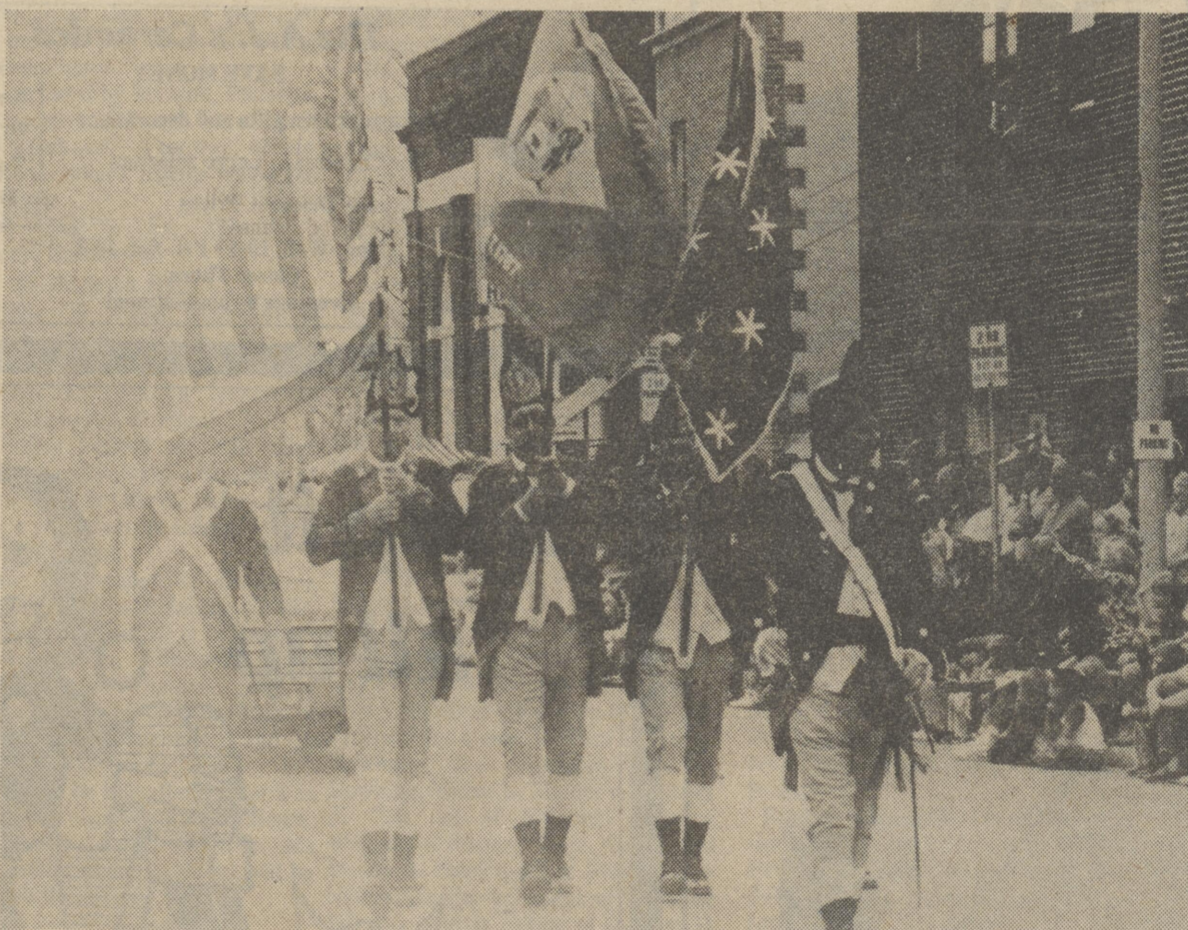
USE ZIP CODES: Be sure to include the ZIP Code in both the recipient's and your return address.

TIME IT RIGHT: Mail early in the month and early in the day.

USE THE RIGHT SERVICE: Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other valuables, should be sent by registered mail.

IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME: Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings.

The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and special delivery. Customers interested in Priority Mail should contact the post office for details.
