Adios Harry dies at 31 Winner of 1955 American Pacing Derby

GREENWOOD, DE - One of the all time great harness horses died last week in a place that has been his home since he retired at stud in 1958. Adios Harry will be remembered for his blazing speed and endurance on a race

"Harry" was a racing institution. He set records that stood for 20 or more years before they were broken. His forgot the pain when the field began to records were speed records...world records. His most prestigious events were winning the 1954 Little Brown Jug in two heats despite a pre-race injury, the record mile of 1:55 at Vernon Downs in 1955, and the biggest pay day of his career...the \$75,000 Eastern State Championship at Yonkers. Recognition of his ability continued throughout his life. Just recently he made it into the new Delaware Valley Harness Writers Hall of Fame. He was the first horse of pre-'60 vintage to do so. That's a record

the race. It damaged his hind leg. We "He just wouldn't quit. He'd sulk a lot if you didn't take him out on top", he added. Harry also set a world's record at Vernon by going two heats in 1:55.2 and 1:56.1. The record had lapped nearly two seconds off a record held jointly by Samson Hanover and the great race horse Good Time, driven by Frank Irvin who also drove Adios.

Adios Harry got too old too fast before the top purses came into play. His greatest pay day was winning the Eastern Championship at Yonkers which was worth \$37,500.

Paul Vinyard drove Harry as a 2 year old in 1953 and gave him a record of 2:05. "Paul always said he was the kind of horse that would try pacing faster than he could keep up with himself. He always went in that first turn at a fast clip. Usually when he went off stride....it was in the first turn," said Luther Lyons.

One of the things that most agree separated Adios Harry from the rest of the field was that he could leave at a burning speed and come home the same way. He usually had that final terrific kick. Most horses that tried to go with him were worn down by the

George Mahony retires at Harrington

HARRINGTON, DE - George B. Mahony, longtime horseman and for the past 12 years a harness racing Judge will retire at the conclusion of Harrington Raceway's Fall season on November 13th. Mahony, who drive his first horse to a "Winner's Circle" finish in 1933 at the Groton Fair in Groton, Mass. leaves behind a career spanning five decades and numerous assignments in the industry.

Harness racing started as a hobby for Mahony while driving a few of his father's horses on the Fair circuit in Massachusetts. His father, the late Amos (A.D.) Mahony, owned and operated a thriving funeral establishment in Ayer, Mass. and young Mahony was licensed to practice and had initially chosen that field for his

But then World War II broke out and in the Navy and served his Country with distinction in the South Pacific. Shortly after enlisting, his father passed away and by the time he was able to gain his discharge in 1946, the business had been sold by his Mother of friends, fellow workers and family. and Mahony was to begin his career in harness racing.

As well as training and driving many horses of his own, he served side by side as 2nd Trainer for the veteran Del Cameron. He went to work with Cameron in 1949 and that partnership lasted until 1964 when Mahony moved with his wife Wilma to Harrington to train horses for attorney Herman C. Brown. In 1970 he obtained his Judges license from the U.S. Trotting Assoc-

iation and has since served in that without wasting time, Mahony enlisted capacity at all three Delaware harness tracks; Brandywine Raceway, Dover Downs and Harrington Raceway. He's long been noted for his warm generosity, careful attention to detail, lively wit and thoughtful consideration

> The Mahony's have two children; Donna who lives in South Carolina and George who makes his home in New England. He's a member of the Moose Lodge, American Legion, and the Masons. He's also a member of the Asbury Methodist Church in Harrington and was a longtime member of the choir there. He and his wife built a home in Pinehurst, North Carolina during the early 50's and they plan on retiring there within the next year.

This kind of competition will make all three Spartans better runners and will thus make the team stronger. Donovan is "Harrier of the Week", the last one of 1982





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


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Retired group offers **Drivers Course**

Delaware Insurance Commissioner, David H. Elliott, has directed that a 10% discount be given on the liability and personal injury protection premiums on private passenger cars operated by drivers who voluntarily complete an approved defensive driving course of instructions after January 1, 1982.

The American Association of Retired Persons, a national 13 million member organization, has such a program called 55 Alive/Mature Driving, which is one of the two approved courses given in the State of Delaware. However, this course is open only to persons 55 years of age and older, and has been designed with the older driver in mind. Among other things, it covers the concern for the normal age-related driving, as well as to increase awareness of appropriate techniques for driving in today's complex traffic patterns. One need not be a member of the Harrington Senior Center or of the AARP organization to participate.

The eight-hour course is being sponsored by the Harrington Senior Center and will be open to all persons 500 years of age and older, on Wednesday, November 10th, and Friday, November 12th from 9:30 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. A person must attend both sessions in order to receive a certificate to file with his insurance company for the 10% discount, and this certificate will be good for a three-year period. The discount will be applied to the car driven by the individual who completes the course. If such an individual has more than one car in a household, the discount will apply to the car he uses most. If there are two drivers, and two cars, each must take the course. The cost is \$12 per person, and includes all course books and fees paid to the State of Delaware for processing records. The instructor is a trained volunteer. There will be a second course offered beginning November 17 at Luther Towers in Dover. Those who were not able to register for the Harrington session, may enroll in the second course. If further information is desired, you may call the assistant coordinator, Marguerete Madsen, at 422-6561, and she will answer any question you may have.



Postmaster offers Christmas mailing tips

With the Christmas mailing season carton. Brown paper and twine cord just ahead, Harrington Postmaster, Ralph Starkey is offering tips for customers to assure that their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line.

"It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code", Starkey

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 31/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers will follow a few simple suggestions:

CUSHION: Make sure contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item -- including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also make good cushioning

DONT OVERWRAP: Just use your

are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in processing equipment. SEAL PROPERLY: Close your parcel

with one of the three recommendedtypes of tape: Pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive. AVOID SMUDGES: Use smudge-

proof ink for your addressing. POSITION ADDRESSES PROP-ERLY: Put your recipient's address in the lower right portion of the container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

USE ZIP CODES: Be sure to include the ZIP Code in both the recipient's and your return address.

TIME IT RIGHT: Mail early in the month and early in the day. USE THE RIGHT SERVICE:

Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other valuables, should be sent by registered mail.

IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME: Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings. The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and special delivery. Customers interested in Priority Mail should contact the post office for details.


