

Trains will travel faster -- take care!

The completion of a 6 million dollar rehabilitation program on Conrail's rail lines from Harrington to Millsboro means that trains can travel faster and more safely. For all the motorists who must wait at crossings, that is probably good news. Mile long coal trains that have been crawling up and down the Peninsula at 5 mph will now be traveling at 10 mph through town and 30 mph in the country. That means that crossings that have been blocked for as long as 20 minutes will be cleared much more quickly.

However, Conrail officials are also issuing a strong word of caution especially directed at the foolhardy who like to race trains or the unwary who takes those country crossings casually. The word is - STOP, LOOK, LISTEN...and above all, if there is any sign of a train, WAIT. Thirty mph, by highway speeds, may seem unimpressive, but for a massive train, it is a lot faster than 5 mph.

Conrail's Assistant Vice President for Governmental Affairs Alvin Arnett says young men, particularly, are prone to becoming victims of the urge to beat the train to the crossing. Company statistics, he says show that girls in the driver's seat seem to resist that temptation. But boys are "drawn to the flashing red lights as moths to a

candle." The word to those young men is "DON'T..." The results can be fatal. Arnett also says for anyone who must navigate crossings (and that is almost everyone), extra precaution is in order. Once again, those trains are going to be traveling considerably faster...TAKE CARE!

Extra Protection Coming

Meanwhile, Conrail and the state of Delaware will be installing crossing protection in the form of flashing lights at 34 additional crossings. The new flashers, customized for each crossing and costing roughly \$50,000 each, will be operated by motion sensors, electronic devices which can allow for the speed of the oncoming train. The older devices operated by a switch that was tripped by the passing engine. But

these made no allowance for speed. The lights would come on at the same time for a fast train as for a slow one.

The first new flasher, being readied in Columbus, Ohio, will be installed on Route 318 at "Cabbage Corner" south of Georgetown. According to Arnett, it should be in place sometime after Christmas. Work on the rest will extend into the spring.

Funds for the crossing protection come through federal and state governments and are taken out of the gasoline trust fund (monies accumulated through taxes on gasoline). The source is 80-90% federal and 10-20% state.

Rehabilitation work on the lines has included the installation of contin-

uously welded rail on the Harrington-Millsboro Railway system. In addition, the Harrington Clark Street crossing got a big overhaul with a new asphalt and timber treatment and the removal of one rail line that led to the siding where the engine and caboose have been parked on Heritage Days. The work blocked the crossing for about ten days, but now that it is complete, motorists should be able to make the passage without shaking loose their back teeth.

Arnett reports that Conrail Chairman of the Board L. Stanley Crane made an inspection trip on the line last Thursday. He disembarked in Harrington for the return trip to the office.

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Lake Forest teachers organization supports suit against state board

Lake Forest Education Association President Ed Gabrielson said last week that his organization supports the state teachers' group in its suit against the State Board of Education. The Delaware State Education Association filed suit in U.S. District Court on November 12 charging the state board with exceeding its authority in enacting new teacher certification requirements.

The Delaware State Education Association contends that the right to set or change certification for teachers rests with the state legislature. In September, the state board adopted two new requirements. One of these calls for inexperienced teachers to take basic skills tests before they are certified. These would be competency tests in reading, writing and mathematics. The second requirement applying to experienced teachers, would make it necessary for them to take six semester hours of courses each 5 years to keep their professional certification current.

The DSEA contends that the board's action is in violation of Delaware code and also of the United States Constitution which states that property (in this instance, teaching certificates) may not be taken away without *due process of law*. According to the teachers' organization, changing

certification requirements is a function of the state legislature, not the state board of education.

Gabrielson, who also serves on the executive board of DSEA that voted to file suit, says that the LFEA supports the position that the state board overstepped the bounds of its authority in adopting the new teacher certification requirements. He pointed out that in this case the property to be denied without *due process of law* (the teachers' certificates) is something on which teachers depend for their jobs.

Along with the state organization, the local teachers' group is not necessarily opposed to some sort of requirement for keeping their professional skills up to date. However, they think the proper action should come through the state legislature. Gabrielson said, should that come about, he thinks the University of Delaware and Delaware State College should be more responsive in making relevant courses available within a reasonable driving distance and time for downstate teachers (possibly within 30 minutes).

He further pointed out that there are some areas in education for which there are no courses available within the state of Delaware.

Gabrielson said the fact that the state board feels it necessary for beginning

teachers to take competency tests in basic skills reflects on the institutions which graduated them.

Dr. Ervic C. Marsh, State Supervisor of Certification of Personnel, said this is the first time since 1974 the state board has sought to impose recertification requirements on experienced, active teachers. Before that time there was a requirement that a certified teacher who had not taught for three of the last five years take 6 credit hours of courses - three in their field of certification and three in a professional area. There has been a refresher requirement for teachers who have not taught for three of ten years.

The new requirements, he said, go into effect for new teachers in July of 1983 and for experienced teachers October 1984. The state board has extended the time for public comment until January 20, 1983.

The teachers organization has also indicated a willingness to give the board additional time for a response.

Over 600 teachers turned out at county meetings staged by the state Department of Public Instruction early in November to explain the new regulations. The teachers left the somewhat stormy sessions with many questions unanswered.

2 counties, 28 towns apply for block grant funds

Harrington, Felton, Frederica, Bowers Beach and Magnolia were among twenty-eight municipalities in lower Delaware along with Kent and Sussex county governments who requested \$5,976,770 in Community Development Block Grant funds by last week's deadline, according to Secretary Owen F. Peagler of the Department of Community Affairs.

The total of 30 funding proposals received by the State Division of Housing was six more than participated in the Fiscal Year 1982 Program. The dollars requested also increased by approximately \$500,000. The federal funds will be the same as last year, Secretary Peagler said, in the amount of \$1,500,000. He added that the six municipalities applying for the first time include Rehoboth Beach, Dagsboro, Ellendale, Bowers Beach, Frederica, Harrington and Magnolia.

Secretary Peagler also noted that the proposals received were evenly divided between Kent and Sussex counties with 14 municipalities plus the County in Sussex and 14 municipalities plus the County in Kent. Together they constitute 65% of the 46 eligible units of local government in lower Delaware.

The next step is a comprehensive review process that will take place over the next three months, according to Secretary Peagler. Grants to be awarded will be announced about March 1st, he said.

- Among those submitting proposals were the following:
- Sussex County #1** - (Dagsboro, Ellendale, Greenwood) 30 units of housing rehabilitation plus water improvements in Dagsboro, \$300,000;
 - Sussex County #2** - (3 unincorporated areas) 30 units of housing rehabilitation, \$300,000;
 - Bridgeville** - 15 units of housing rehabilitation, 20-25 units of demolition and land acquisition for a park for use by senior citizens, \$300,000;
 - Bowers Beach** - road resurfacing, 15 units of demolition, \$95,139;
 - Felton** - 8 units of housing rehabilitation, \$100,000;
 - Frederica** - upgrading a water line, \$33,165;
 - Harrington** - Water improvements on West Dorman, on North Streets, mainly the installation of a 10-inch line on West Street. The work would facilitate looping the water line around the school if that becomes a possibility later on, \$300,000;
 - Woodside** - 5 units of housing rehabilitation, \$62,500;
 - Wyoming** - 5 units of housing rehabilitation and 1 unit of demolition, \$62,250;
 - Kent County #1 [Magnolia]** - Water system improvements, community development planning, \$182,100;
 - Millford** - 20 units of housing rehabilitation (renter 1 owner); acquisition and demolition, water system improvements, \$300,000;

Thieves raid freezer at Felton School

It is not known whether the thieves who invaded Lake Forest North Elementary School in Felton were planning a musical feast. But if they were, they got all the necessary ingredients. Sometime on Sunday, an unknown person or persons broke into the school and raided the cafeteria freezer before making a foray through the rest of the building. One of their stops was at the music room where two guitars valued at a total of \$500 were taken. The food stolen was estimated at \$640.

A spokesman at the school said the thieves made off with 495 pounds of ground beef, 18 pounds of fish sticks and 20 pounds of turkey ham from the cafeteria freezer. They also took a case of Hi Grade white milk (pints), 20 loaves of sandwich bread and 10 pounds of lasagna noodles.

In the music room they picked up a school guitar valued at \$100 and the

music teacher's personal guitar worth \$400. The latter was decorated with inlaid ivory and carving on the side.

Also stolen were two cassette recorders valued at \$40 each, about \$15 from teachers' desks and two soccer balls.

The school said the main office had been entered, but nothing was taken from that area.

The thieves broke two locks in the physical education area and took a cafeteria door off its hinges. Otherwise, there seemed to be little or no damage.

It is not known for sure how the thieves entered, but there was speculation that it might have been from the roof through a boiler room.

The incident, which occurred sometime between 7 a.m. Sunday and 4:45 a.m. Monday, is being investigated by Delaware State Police at Troop 3.

Roth favors renewing aid to small cities

Senator William V. Roth, Jr., R-Del., recently announced he will introduce legislation to reauthorize the General Revenue sharing Program on the first day of the 98th Congress. "It will be a simple reauthorization for three years at the current funding level of \$4.6 billion and will employ the same allocation formulas as the present program," Roth said.

In a letter to his colleagues, Roth said the existing General Revenue Sharing Program is flawed in some respects and he expects many of its cosponsors

to introduce legislation seeking changes in areas of concern to them. "It is important, though, to find a vehicle early in the next Congress to demonstrate strong Senate support for the concept of revenue sharing," Roth said. With strong support, this bill will make the point emphatically that the current program, flawed as it is, will be the minimally acceptable...starting place for possible improvement or broadening into a more comprehensive New Federalism program," Roth

wrote.

The General Revenue Sharing Program expires on September 30, 1983. Twice reauthorized by Congress since its inception in 1972, Revenue Sharing has provided valuable general purpose fiscal assistance to State and local governments.

Although a relatively small component of the overall grant-in-aid system (comprising about 5.5 percent in FY 1981), General Revenue Sharing is very important to many local

governments.

Over forty percent of all small cities receive no other federal aid. In the last year, 56 municipalities and all three counties in Delaware received some General Revenue Sharing funds. According to a recent survey of cities across the nation, 80 percent of those surveyed said they would be forced to cut services next year if the program were reduced or eliminated, and 50 percent felt they would be forced to raise taxes.

Delaware Choral Society

Last Sunday afternoon, before a very enthusiastic audience, the Delaware Choral Society, under the able direction of Peter J. McCarthy, gave a professional reading of J.S. Bach's "Christmas Oratorio", a noteworthy achievement. The performance was given in the Education-Humanities Theatre, Delaware State College, Dover, where the accoustics added to the enjoyment of the afternoon.

The Christmas Oratorio of Bach is not of the traditional type, but a series of six cantatas, each of which was given in Bach's lifetime for performance during the Christmas season at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, Germany, where he was cantor, a sort of modern day organist and choir director. He was never to have been known to have a choir of more than 30 singers.

Last Sunday's rendition consisted of the first three of the cantatas that comprise the complete work. Dr. McCarthy directed the chorus of 43 singers and a full orchestra of 21 with ease and comprehension. It might be added that Glenn Jarrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Jarrell, Harrington, was a member of the trumpet section.

The oratorio tells the story of the coming of the Christ child and the fulfillment of the prophecy with quiet

compliance to its religious significance. With the exception of the final Choral, "Rejoice and Sing", there are no wild and glorious choruses as are marked in other works of observance, but, true to Bach's religious nature, staid and strict steadfastness to his firm belief in the Supreme Being that served him all his days. That feeling pervaded this performance, and one came away with a devotional effect of having shared this fervor, one of quietness and deep religious devotion.

The able soloists were Lisa Rudnick, soprano, a graduate student at Temple University in Philadelphia; Jean Scatessa, alto, presently studying in Washington, D.C.; Robert Lyon, tenor, studying at Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia; and Paul Berkolds, bass, of Washington, D.C., and a native of Seattle, Washington.

Kathryn Copple was the rehearsal accompanist.

It is commendable that there are such noble groups in lower Delaware such as the Delaware Choral Society that contribute so ably to the musical culture of our area, bringing the world's great choral works to our front door, so to speak, and it is our fondest hope that this will continue long into the future.

County Post founder dies

MILLSBORO - Funeral services were at 9 a.m. Friday, in St. Mark's Episcopal Church, State St., for Miles L. Frederick of 215 Morris St. who died Tuesday, Nov. 30, 1982, at the Beebe Hospital in Lewes of heart failure. He was 76.

Mr. Frederick was founder, editor and columnist of the weekly newspaper The County Post. He was co-founder and past editor of Delaware Today. He had retired as editor of the Post in January.

He had continued his columns, "Trumpets and Brays" and "Around Sussex County."

A Navy veteran of World War II, he served as chief press officer for the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Washington and from 1952-1955 as state commander of the Delaware VFW.

He was named Delaware Coast Man of the Year by the Delaware Coast Press. He founded the County Post with former Milford Chronicle publisher Ted Townsend.

Carrington Burgess, former editor and publisher of The Harrington Journal remembers Frederick for the time when Frederick was in the state Development office. Burgess used to visit the state office to solicit printing. He recalls Frederick telling of an experience when he was selling advertising for a newspaper in Kutztown, Pennsylvania. Frederick was leaving a business establishment

where he had been attempting to sell advertising. As he went out, he heard the proprietors, speaking in Pennsylvania Dutch, saying that they would not give any business to "Americaners". When he returned to talk to them, he was able to explain his background. He had learned Pennsylvania Dutch as a youth. After that, the relationship went more smoothly, and presumably Frederick was able to sell some advertising.

He was president and co-founder of the Fort Delaware Society, was an active member of the Greater Millsboro Chamber of Commerce for several years, was a member of the church vestry of St. Mark's Episcopal Church and was a founding board member of the Mid-Sussex Health Center in Millsboro. He was an active member of the Indian River Senior Center in Millsboro.

He is survived by his wife, Mary E.; two sons, A Bruce of Brookport, N.Y., and Barton K. of Woodbury, N.J.; a daughter, E. Liane DiGrazia of Newport News, Va.; 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Friends called from 7-9 p.m. Thursday night at the chapel of Melson Funeral Services, Main Street, Millsboro.

Burial was in the Grace Lutheran Church Cemetery, Hatfield, PA.

Delaware State Police at Troop 3 have arrested Kevin D. Dixon, 24, of 227 Concord Avenue, Wilmington, Delaware, for the murder of his wife, Terri Marie Dixon, 22, of 1 West 20th Street, Wilmington, Delaware.

Investigation revealed that the Dixon's were apparently having marital problems and were living separated from each other and went for a ride on Saturday to discuss the situation. Apparently an argument developed as the pair drove on County Rt. 266, 7 1/2 miles west of Felton and Kevin pulled the car off the road and allegedly produced a knife. Terri ran from the car and was chased into a field by Kevin when he caught her and allegedly stabbed her several times in the upper portion of her body. It is believed that the incident occurred between 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Saturday. Kevin then dragged his wife, Terri, to a ditch and drove back

to Wilmington.

Kevin walked into the Wilmington Police Department and reported the stabbing to Wilmington Police who in turn notified the Delaware State Police at Troop 2. Troopers then took Kevin Dixon into custody and Dixon showed them where he had dragged his wife and left her.

The body of Terri Marie Dixon was taken to the Deputy Medical Examiner's Office at the Nanticoke Memorial Hospital in Seaford pending an autopsy. The crime scene was processed and Dixon was taken to Troop 3 where he was charged with murder 1st degree and possession of a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony.

Kevin Dixon was taken to J.P. Court 7 later Sunday for commitment to Delaware Correctional Center in Smyrna.

Disability under Social Security

People may apply for disability benefits under Social Security, at any age, if they have worked long enough in covered employment to be insured.

How disabled must one be? In general, an individual must have a physical or mental condition which prevents him or her from doing any substantial gainful work, and the condition is expected to last for at least 12 months.

Medical evidence from physicians, hospitals and other sources should show how severe the disability is and how it prevents the individual from working.

People should apply for disability benefits as soon as possible. This will allow the Social Security Administration the time needed to process the claim. Benefits begin on the sixth full month of the disability.

Disabled people who may qualify should phone the nearest Social Security Office.

State Forester W.F. Gabel announced today that the State Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture is accepting orders for 1983 tree planting stock. The tree seedlings available, including loblolly pine and white pine, are sold at a modest cost to Delaware landowners who may qualify by owning at least two (2) open acres and who order at least 500 seedlings. 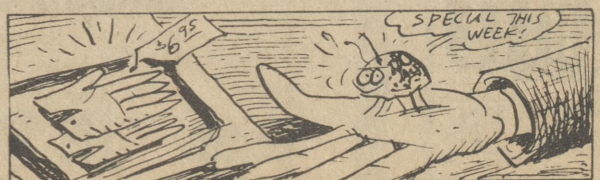





WATCH FOR IT!

Flu season is back!

Flu season is back, and Delawareans are being urged to take this disease seriously.

The influenza alert is particularly important for older people and those with chronic diseases, such as diabetes, lung or heart disease. These high risk people should check with their family physician about the possibility of receiving flu vaccine.

Influenza is a contagious, "catching", disease, so it is important to take steps to protect family members. Proper care can help keep influenza to a minimum. The following precautions can help prevent the spread of influenza:

- Needless exposure to larger groups of people should be avoided.
- Sneezes and coughs should be covered with a handkerchief or tissue.
- Anyone caring for a flu patient should be sure to wash their hands after contact. Tissues should be

discarded in a paper bag, which is frequently replaced.

Reyes syndrome, which normally develops in the wake of a viral infection most often affects young people between 5 and 16. Its symptoms include vomiting and delirium. Severe cases of Reyes syndrome can result in coma and death.



NIGHTTIME LEG CRAMPS

A simple stretching exercise has worked 100% in curing habitual leg cramps and preventing their recurrence, states Dr. Harry Daniell of Redding, CA. With your shoes off, stand facing a wall 2 or 3 feet away. Place your hands against the wall. With your heels on the floor and your legs straight, lean forward until you feel a tense, but not painful pulling in the calf muscles. Hold the stretched position for 10 seconds. Stand up straight for 5 seconds, then repeat the 10 second stretch. Dr. Daniell recommends the stretch 3 times a day - taper off as cramps disappear.

Immanuel Episcopal Church Rededication

The Consecration and Rededication of Immanuel Episcopal Church on the Green, New Castle, Delaware, will take place on December 18. The Reverend Myles Edwards has announced that the first service in the newly constructed church will be held at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 18, for the parishioners of Immanuel and invited guests. Parishioners will receive personal invitations and, because of limited seating capacity, admission will be by ticket.

At 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, December 19, there will be a service for the community at large, and members of the other churches in the community will be invited. This service will express the deep gratitude of Immanuel parishioners to the community for the love, concern and support extended in an ecumenical service held at St. Peter's R.C. Church on the Sunday following the 1980 fire and during the long reconstruction period.

Parish House on Harmony Street, lead by the Choir, and proceed to the churchyard for the initial ceremony. Special music for the service is being prepared under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Gardner, Choir Director and Organist. The new organ, a 21-rank Austin, will be blessed by the Bishop. An anthem for the occasion has been commissioned from Mr. Ned Rorem. The anthem which will be sung for the first time by Immanuel Choir is based on Psalm 85: 10-13, "Mercy and Truth Are Met."

The Johannes Brass Ensemble will play in the churchyard prior to the service, while the congregation is assembling, and during the service. Following services, the change-ringing bells will be rung under the direction of Ms. Jane Owen, Tower Captain.

Immanuel-on-the-Green was founded in 1689. The original nave was built in 1703 and the church was enlarged in 1820 when the transepts and tower were added. It was extensively damaged by fire on February 1, 1980. The walls and towers, which were left standing, have not been altered and the exterior of the church looks much as it did before the fire. The steeple was rebuilt to the same dimensions, and the tower clocks were replaced by the Trustees of New Castle Common.

Cornices, doors, and windows with their antique glass are all exact copies of these elements as they existed before the fire.

Most of the interior elements have been reconstructed to duplicate their pre-fire appearance, including the porch, choir loft, vaulted plaster ceiling, arched windows with panelled

jambes and louvered shutters, and marble wall plaques.

The Acquisitions Committee, chaired by Mrs. Robert R. Davis, has selected furnishings from the early nineteenth century period.

The Baptismal Font has been donated by the congregation of St. James Church, Kingsessing, Philadelphia. The first Episcopal Rector of that church was a former resident of New Castle; the present Rector, Reverend Reed Brinkman, was formerly Assistant Rector of Immanuel-on-the-Green. The font is believed to date from about 1840.

A new Processional Cross has been made by Mr. F. Lytton Patterson from wood salvaged from the mast which held the steeple of the church before the fire. It is ornamented with a brass medallion designed by Mr. Robert R. Davis and Mr. Clay Bridgewater. The ship's mast held the steeple which was built in 1820. It is thought to have been about 75 years old. On examination, the wood showed 113 rings; thus the wood in the new Processional Cross is about 350 years old.

Four burial plaques salvaged from the fire have been replaced in the brick aisle. A new plaque, noting at least two burials uncovered during excavation, has been added.

Although the overall ambience has not been changed, some alterations have been made to meet functional and liturgical needs.

At the Community Service on Sunday, the Bishop will be the principal officiant and will preach the sermon. Pastors of the other churches in the community will be invited to participate in the service.

The principal celebrant at the Consecration and Rededication service will be Bishop William H. Clark. The Diocesan Council will hold its regular meeting in the Presbyterian Christian Education Building, New Castle, on Saturday morning to enable the Bishop, his staff, and Council members to be on hand to participate in the Consecration and Rededication service.

Weather permitting, the congregation will assemble in the churchyard before the service and follow the procession into the church after the doors have been opened by the Bishop and the Church has been consecrated. Early seating will be permitted for the handicapped.

Cam Fella named Harness Horse of the Year

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Cam Fella, 1,000 pounds of sheer determination with the agility of a ballerina, has been voted the 1982 E. Roland Harriman Harness Horse of the Year.

The 3-year-old pacer received 164 of the 309 votes cast in balloting conducted by the U.S. Trotting Assn. and U.S. Harness Writers' Assn.

Ghenghis Khan, a 6-year-old pacing horse, finished second with 48 votes, followed by Three Diamonds with 31, Jazz Cosmos with 14, and Fortune Teller with 12.

From January into November, Cam Fella was simply "awesome" for his Ontario owners, Norman Clements and Norman Faulkner.

It wasn't, however, sheer speed which propelled Cam Fella to Harness Horse of the Year honors. His fastest

time of 1:54 is almost five seconds slower than the 1:49 1/5 world record held by Niatross.

What Cam Fella had this year was sheer racing determination, which earned him the nickname, "The Pacing Machine."

In 33 starts, Cam Fella finished first 28 times and second twice. He finished out of the money only twice for trainer and driver Pat Crowe. His season began with an 11-race win streak which stretched from January 15 to April 23 before the major stakes had begun.

Supplemented to the first and third legs of pacing's Triple Crown, the Cane Pace and Messenger Stake, Cam Fella won both of those. He couldn't, however, supplement to the middle leg, The Little Brown Jug.

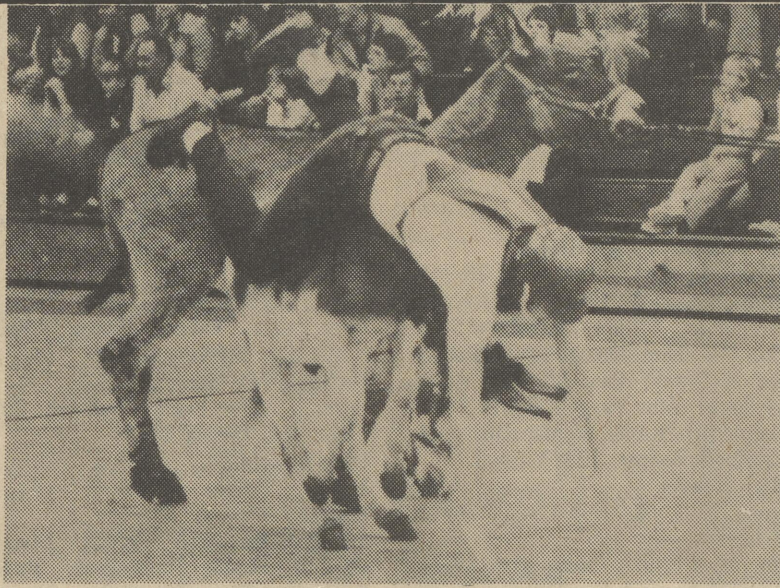
He also raced 12 times in Canada and won that country's version of the Triple Crown, the Prix d'Ete, Queen City Pace, and Confederation Cup.

Cam Fella came into the 1982 campaign an unknown. His racing career began late in his 2-year-old season on August 11, 1982. When December ended, Cam Fella did not stop. He raced his way right into January and his final start this year was November 7.

Sired by Most Happy Fella and out of Nan Cam, Cam Fella has proven to be a profitable investment. He was initially purchased at the 1980 Lexington Tattersalls Yearling Sale by Ontario horseman Doug Arthur for \$19,000. Following his 2-year-old season, Cam Fella was sold for \$100,000 to his present owners, who acted on the advice of Pat Crowe.

His earnings for this year total \$879,723.

Cam Fella will not retire to the breeding shed as present plans call for him to race in 1983.

Justin Passing is Horse of the Month

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Justin Passing, stablemate of the 1982 Harness Horse of the Year Cam Fella, has been selected as Harness Horse of the Month by the U.S. Trotting Association.

Undeclared in four starts during November and riding an eight-race win streak, Justin Passing won the first two \$20,000 legs of the Criterium du Grand Nord Series at Blue Bonnets in Montreal.

The 5-year-old pacer has earned \$768,843 lifetime for original owners John Applegath and Doug Arthur, both from Ontario, Canada. Norman Faulkner and Norman Clements, owners of Cam Fella, as well as Cam's trainer and driver, Pat Crowe, purchased an interest in Justin Passing

earlier this season.

Justin Passing is being syndicated and will stand at stud next year at Castleton Farm in New York.

Two other exceptional performers during November were pacers Fan Hanover and Ravenova, both setting world records.

Fan Hanover, 1981 Harness Horse of the Year, established a new mark of 1:56 for 4-year-old pacing mares over a half-mile track. Ravenova set a 1:55 record for 3-year-old pacing geldings over a five-eighths mile track.

Another record by Niatross may soon fall. Four-year-old pacer, Courageous Red, scored his 24th victory in two-minutes or less this season during November, which ties the mark set in 1980 by Niatross.

Top 1982 pacers named in poll

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Cam Fella, voted Harness Horse of the Year in the U.S. Trotting Association's annual polling of harness writers, was also named "Pacer of the Year" and "Three-Year-Old Colt Pacer of the Year" for the 1982.

Other divisional winners in their respective pacing categories are Fortune Teller, 2-Year-Old Colt Pacer; Bardot Lobell, 2-Year-Old Filly Pacer; Three Diamonds, 3-Year-Old Filly Pacer; Ghenghis Khan, Aged Pacing Horse; and Fan Hanover, Aged Pacing Mare.

Fortune Teller is the 1982 money leader with earnings of \$1,313,175, which is the most money ever won by a 2-year-old during a single season and ranks second on the all-age list. Trained by Eldon Harner, he is owned by Max Buran, New York, N.Y. and Stanley Becker, Merrick, N.Y.

The fastest 2-year-old pacing filly ever, Bardot Lobell set a mile record of 1:54 4/5 and won 12 of her 15 starts for trainer Howard Beissinger. She is owned by William Rosenberg, Boca Raton, Fla., and Alan J. Leavitt and

Jack E. Rosenfeld, New York, N.Y.

Three Diamonds showed the same class this season she possessed in 1981 when voted "Two-Year-Old Filly champion. She set world records in 1982 of 1:53 1/5 over a mile track; 1:55 3/5 over a five-eighths mile oval; and 1:56 1/5 over a half-mile track. She earned \$502,270 during the season and was trained by Gene Riegle for owner George Segal, Highland Park, Illinois.

Ghenghis Khan paced to eight wins timed in 1:54 or less, one of which is the second fastest race mile ever, 1:51 4/5. The 6-year-old is owned by Ghenghis Khan Farms, Ltd., Flushing, N.Y. and Nevaacal Stable, Inc., Paramus, N.J. He was trained by Eddie Cobb and earned \$551,050 in 1982 before retiring to stud.

The 1981 "Harness Horse of the Year," Fan Hanover, won aged pacing mare honors. Her 1:50 4/5 mark in a time trial is the fastest mile ever by a female and ranks second only to the 1:49 1/5 mark set by Niatross.

She is owned by Dr. J. Glen Brown, Brampton, Ontario, and is trained by Glen Garnsey.

Top trotters for 1982 selected

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Jazz Cosmos has been named as the "Trotter of the Year" by North America's harness writers.

The Sunbird Stable of West Palm Beach, Florida owns Jazz Cosmos, who was also selected as the "Three-Year-Old Colt Trotter of the Year." The son of Speedy Crown won the Kentucky Futurity, The Colonial, and elimination heats of The Hambletonian and the World Trotting Derby in 1982.

Jazz Cosmos, who was driven by Mickey McNichol and trained by McNichol and Joe Caraluzzi, equalled the world record of 1:55 for three-year-old trotters.

His closest competition for Trotter of the Year came from another three-year-old colt, Mystic Park.

Other winners in the trotting divisions are Dancer's Crown, 2-Year-Old Colt Trotter; Armbro Blush, 2-Year-Old Filly Trotter; Dance Spell, 3-Year-Old Filly Trotter; Bobbo, Aged Trotting Horse; and Delmegan, Aged Trotting Mare.

Dancer's Crown was perfect in 1982, winning all nine of his starts, culminating in a victory in the \$653,250 Peter Haughton Memorial. The colt

was owned during the racing season by his trainer-driver Stanley Dancer, of New Egypt, N.J., his wife Rachel Dancer, and the Rose Hild Breed Farm of New Hope, PA.

Armbro Blush was nearly flawless, as she won 16 of 20 starts for her owner, Armstrong Bros. Farm of Inglewood, Ontario. Glen Garnsey trained and drove the Speedy Crown freshman filly, who edged Winky's Gill in the balloting.

Dance Spell was the overwhelming choice for "Three-Year-Old Filly Trotter of the Year." Trained and driven by Howard Beissinger, the Speedy Crown lass is owned by Hanley Dawson, Jr. of Chicago and Hugh Grant, Jr. of New York.

Bobbo was selected as the best Aged Trotter, a category which saw no fewer than 11 horses receive significant support. The five-year-old gelding is owned by Gregory Coleman of East Norwich, New York.

Delmegan followed in her mother's hoofprints in being named the outstanding "Aged Trotting Mare." Her dam, Delmonica Hanover, received the same honor in 1974. Delmegan is owned by the Armstrong Bros. Farm of Canada.
