

# Harrington Council holds public hearing for new town hall

HARRINGTON, City Hall - Last Wednesday night the Town Council members met to present three properties under consideration as possible sites for the proposed new Town Hall. "This meeting here tonight is to let the citizens of Harrington know that we have these properties under consideration. Those who came here tonight can ask questions following the presentation by Councilmen Ray Gagne and Curtis Melvin", said Jackie Wyatt who was filling in for Mayor Alfred G.B. Mann who it was believed was still in Kansas following the death of his mother. The three properties

under consideration as being the final three the building committee thought warranted the most consideration are as follows: 1-a lot on the corner of Liberty Street and Gordon Street belonging to the Catholic Church; 2-the building which was the former Peoples Bank, and 3-a building belonging to Gayle Smith on Commerce Street across from Burton's Sport Shop. The latter is the one the committee strongly advises the City to purchase. The lot would cost \$12,500 plus a steel building of \$85,000 making the total \$97,500.00. The Peoples Bank building would cost \$65,000 for the purchase

plus \$45,000 for interior renovations and another eighteen thousand five hundred dollars for incidentals for a total of \$128,500. The Smith building would cost \$59,000 (140,000 for the building and \$19,000 for the house to the rear) plus other expenses including furnishings, paving, landscaping, remodeling the front of the building and a contingency fund for a total of \$118,500. The committee rated the Smith Building as the best prospect, the new building second best and the Peoples Bank least of all. Other properties such as the Harrington Cleaners and the lot

between the cleaners and Raughley Insurance and a lot owned by Dudley Willis on the south side of Peck Avenue were not considered. The increase in the tax rate would be according to the following chart:

The proposal for a new City Hall will

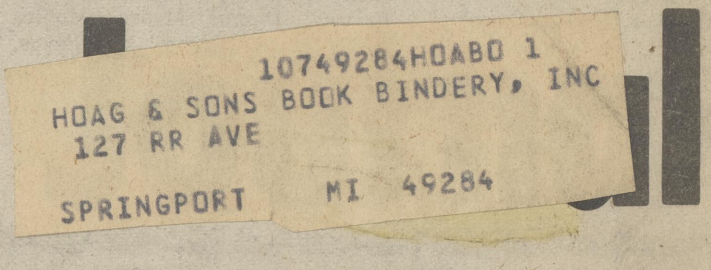
be put on the ballot during the City's election coming up on January 11th. It will be on the ballot in the form of a referendum. It must pass by the voting public before the City Council could proceed. Talk around the council table on Wednesday led to the conclusion

that perhaps the new hall could be paid off in fines. The new shop building going up near the water tower was underwritten by fine money. "We programmed \$28,000 for fines in the '82 budget. All of the fines went into the General Fund plus all excess went there too. The net result is the building

going up now around the water tower...the City pound." said Councilman Curtis Melvin.

It was also pointed out that senior citizens would not be exempt from the property taxes. Their exemption would be as it relates to the capitation tax. Former Mayor Alfred B. "Buck" Cahall called for applying fines now to the property tax "...which would reduce the current taxes that would help some people here in the City". The property taxes under the plan presented would mean an increase of \$12 to \$15 per property.

## Man freed following fatal shooting

Curtis Harmon of Lake Forest Mobile Home Estates was freed last week after Judge Trader, Kent County Court of Common Pleas, ruled that there was not enough evidence to support the charge of manslaughter placed against him. Harmon had been arrested on December 7 following the fatal shooting of Gary A. Wilson, also of Lake Forest Mobile Home Estates. At the preliminary hearing, Judge Trader released Harmon saying he had the right to defend himself. He shot Wilson when the latter came to his home and threatened him with two knives.

alleged to have gone to his kitchen and got two knives placing a knife in each hand and demanded Harmon to leave his residence. Harmon complied and proceeded to his residence where he removed a .22 caliber revolver from his bedroom. Harmon was in his trailer when he heard Wilson drive up. Harmon went out to meet Wilson still in possession of the revolver and confronted Wilson who was still carrying the two knives, one in each hand. Harmon allegedly shot Wilson when he feared for his own safety due to Wilson not stopping his advance toward him. Wilson was struck in the

right shoulder and abdomen. Wilson was given emergency treatment at Milford Memorial Hospital but died at 10:50 P.M. Harmon was charged with manslaughter and taken to J.P. Court #7, Dover, where secured bond was set at \$15,000. Harmon was first incarcerated at Delaware Correctional Center Smyrna, in default of bond. But he was released after the December 9 preliminary hearing.

Delaware State Police at Troop 3 investigated the shooting that occurred at the Lake Forest Mobile Home Park on U.S. Rt. #13, 1 1/2 miles south of Felton at 8:40 p.m. on Monday, December 6. Investigation revealed that Gary A. Wilson, 27, of Lot 9, Lake Forest Mobile Homes, Felton, Delaware and Curtis B. Harmon, 30, of Lot 70, Lake Forest Mobile Homes, Felton, Delaware got into an argument at the trailer home of Wilson. Wilson is

## Harrington man fires in self defense

Harrington Police last week responded to the scene of a shooting with thoughts of arresting the man who wielded the gun. Instead they apprehended the person who was shot.

into Benson's house. Harrington Police were called to the area when someone reported that Matthews was shot as he attempted to enter the house to borrow \$2 from Benson. The original claim was that Benson shot at him through the door.

It turned out that Howard John Benson, 61, of 112 Milby St., Harrington, was shooting in self defense when he wounded Willis Troy Matthews, 21, of Clark's Corner, Harrington. Matthews and a companion, Lawrence Lee Casson, also of Clark's Corner, were trying to break

It took about an hour for police to persuade the wary Benson to open the door. However, when he did, his story confirmed police suspicions when they examined the physical scene. There

was no bullet hole through the door. Benson told police he shot Matthews when the latter forced the door open.

Matthews forced his way into the residence, Benson shot him in the upper right chest with a 22 caliber colt action rifle.

It turned out this was not the first time Matthews had given Benson trouble. In October they robbed him of \$175, and on November 2, Matthews alone beat him up and took \$150. Neither incident was reported to the police.

In addition to Matthews and Casson police arrested Kevin Flamer and Leroy Polk, both 17 and both of Harrington. The two youths had accompanied the older men.

This time, however, Benson decided to take action in his own defense. When

Polk and Flamer were committed to Stevenson House in default of \$10,000 bond. They have since been released.

Casson is in Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna in default of \$10,000 bond. The wounded Matthews is in Delaware Division in Wilmington.

Charges against the four are burglary second degree and attempted theft.

Harrington police said further charges against Matthews and Casson are pending. Benson was not charged. State Police at Troop 3 assisted in the investigation.

## Frederica woman arrested on drug charges

At 8:00 a.m. on December 3, Delaware State Police arrested Regina R. Pastre, 30, of the High Point Trailer Park, Frederica, Delaware. Ms. Pastre was charged with one count of possession with intent to deliver marijuana and one count of promoting prison contraband. The arrest culminated a six month investigation by detectives assigned to Troop 4, Georgetown. Investigators determined the woman to have smuggled marijuana into the Sussex Correctional Institution for delivery to an unidentified inmate who would distribute the contraband to other prisoners within the Sussex facility. Regina Pastre is employed by the Department of Corrections as an accounting assistant and bookkeeper within the Sussex County facility. She was arraigned at Magistrate Court 3 in Georgetown pending release or committal on a secured bond totalling \$25,000. Ms. Pastre was suspended by the Department of Corrections with the intent to dismiss pending a departmental hearing.

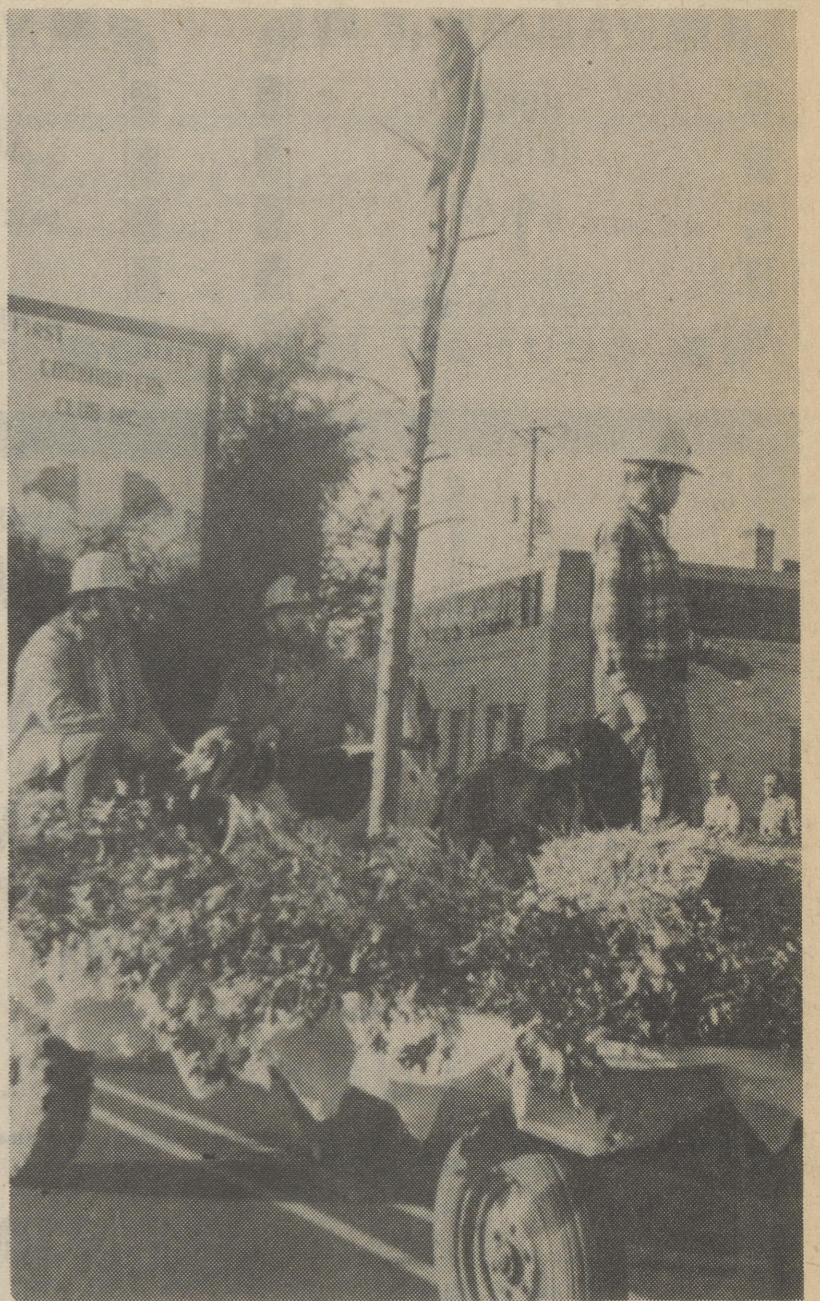

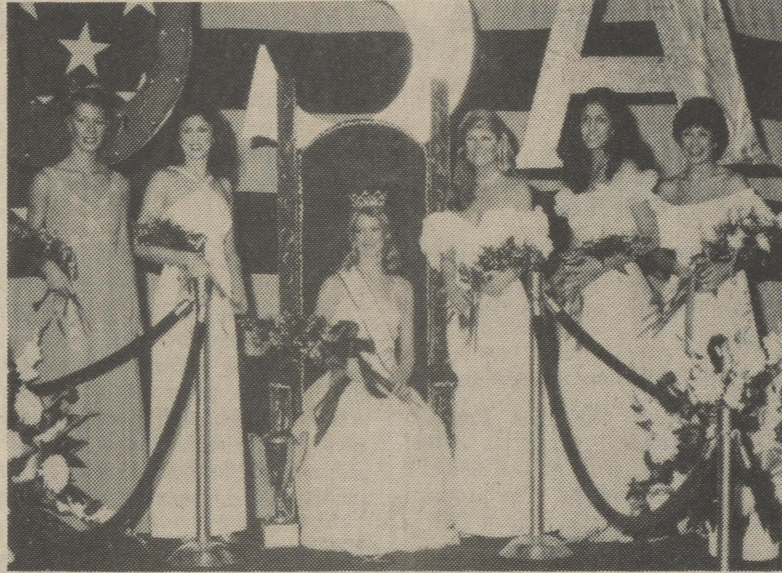

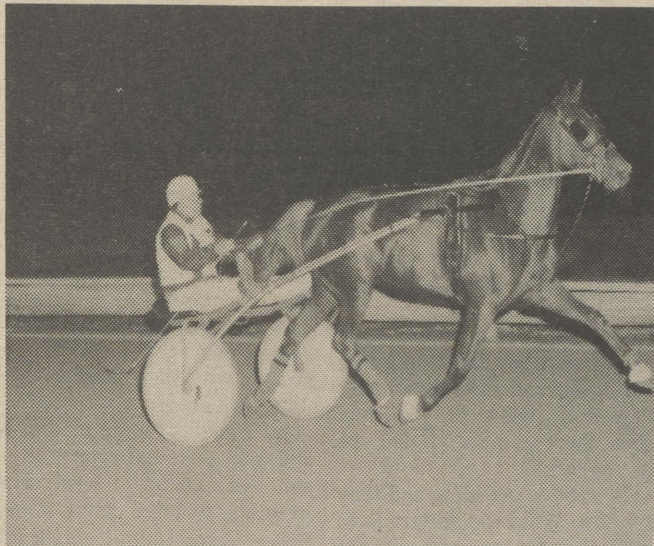

## Harrington training facility still turning out winners

Although the doors may have closed on racing this Fall at Harrington Raceway, the track there continues to be full 6 days a week as over 450 harness horses are in training for the Winter. And if this year's crop of young hopefuls turn out anything like last year's there promises to be many happy owners and trainers in the offing.

Topping the list of horses that trained at Harrington last winter and who have since gone on to fame and glory this year are the 2 year olds, Perfect Beauty, Big Shift and Polo Club. The latest addition to the "star" lineup, would also include the 3 year old trotting filly, Crown Rose.

Perfect Beauty's credentials have already been well documented; winner of 10 races in 10 starts, holder of Harrington Raceway's 2 year old

trotting record and holder of a 1:57 3/5 record, which is only three-fifths of a second off the world record for her age, sex and gait. Perfect Beauty is owned by Delbert Cain of Harrington, DE.

Big Shift only started 5 times this year, but one of those set the 2 year old pacing mark at Harrington Raceway when the Sam Belote driven youngster went under the wire in 2:02 3/5 for owner Gloria Belote and the HMW Stable of Dover, DE.

Polo Club was just one of a quartet of standouts from the Charles and Frances Pitts stable of horses. She took a 1:57 3/5 record and won close to \$100,000 in 16 starts this year. She joins stablemates Gold Creek Milt, Charlie Who and Maxi - all 2 year old pacers who have identical marks of 2:01 3/5 and all were trained at Harrington.

Crown Rose became the latest to make the Harrington training facilities roster of brilliant performers. Earlier this summer she established herself as a premier trotter when she won both heats of the Bloomsburg Fair's 3 year old filly division. On Saturday, Dec. 4, she went one step further for owners Deborah and Frank Lambert of Farmington, DE. That's when she broke the 3 year old trotting filly standard at Dover Downs and the all-age mark as well when she trotted home in 2:01 3/5.

Crown Rose shares barn space at Harrington with the Lambert's other trotting sensation, Reggie Crown. He took a mark of 2:01 3/5 earlier this summer and has amassed earnings of over \$60,000.

These are but a few of the top performers that had their early

education at Harrington last winter, but what about the prospects of this year's young hopefuls? Perfect Beauty's got a "spitting image" full sister that looks promising and Crown Rose has a full brother that's coming along nicely. Veteran trainer, Del Manges has a couple that he thinks will be hard to beat come summer and the Myer brothers, Bill and Ellis also have their fingers crossed about a horse or two in each of their stables. The hopes and dreams go on and on....

One thing for sure though, with over 450 horses in training at Harrington, you can bet that there's some future champions going around the track on almost any given day. Great horses have been coming out of Harrington's training facility for more than 40 years and no doubt they'll still be coming forty years down the road.

## Case, O'Donnell 1982 dash and money leaders

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Walter Case, Jr., who competes primarily in the New England area, leads all other harness drivers in races won this year.

The 21-year-old holds a 15-race lead, 440-425, over his nearest competitor, Herve Filion, the all-time leader in race wins.

This race, however, should go down to the wire. Last year, Filion finished second, just one win behind Eddie Davis. Davis had 404 wins to Filion's 403.

The money crown should remain with last year's champion, Bill "Magic" O'Donnell, who already has purse earnings exceeding \$5.4 million this season. O'Donnell, the first driver to top \$4 million in seasonal earnings in

1982, now becomes the first to top \$5 million. John Campbell holds second place with earnings of \$4.3 million.

# Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

"In every school in America, kids are crying for help," says Dave Toma, who has spoken to 40-50 million kids, parents and educators in the last twenty years about the dangers of drugs.

Dave Toma was the New York cop who (was the basis for the TV character Baretta), the man of many disguises who busted the drug distributors, the pushers, the butchers and murderers of this world. They are losing sensations, like no feeling in their hand or no feeling in their leg. They're losing their memories, becoming psychotic or neurotic, and parents don't know!

Many kids overdose on drugs. Grass is not a piece of cake. O.D. on drugs were Elvis Presley, Balucci, Jimmy Hendrix, Freddie Price, and Janice Joplin. They would not be dead today but for drugs.

The American Medical Association finally woke up and admitted

marijuana is a killer! Yet, Jimmy Carter appointed Peter Borne as head of his Drug Administration and national drug enforcement body. Borne WANTED TO TAKE AWAY ALL SANCTIONS ON MARIJUANA!

"Not only do they come into school like mummies and parents don't know," says Toma, "but for thousands of kids a day, incest is epidemic. Suicide attempt is the 2nd leading cause of death among high school students. Alcohol is the first."

"What about responsible drinking?" kids ask.

"No," says Toma, "because 20 million alcoholics today were once responsible drinkers. Every day, 15 teenagers die of alcoholism, and 4 adults die EVERY HOUR of alcoholism!"

Yet the Illinois legislature once debated the problem to get kids off the marijuana, should they lower the drinking age.

"People must make a commitment and take some moral stand," says Toma. Yet, entertainers like Johnny Carson make a big joke of grass and alcohol. "Everybody's doing it!"

The major networks do not encourage Toma to speak. They pay writers and TV stars well to influence the young kids.

Toma's answer is "We've got to get back to the basics of life! We got to get back to loving!"

Personally, he didn't remember walking around his home without his mother touching him and his brothers and sisters. He said, "We needed to know that our parents loved us!"

Kids taking drugs don't ever remember parents telling them they loved them!

Toma urges parents to go together as a family unit to church. He tells us that we, as parents, are never done, from the moment of concept to the day they die.

If parents don't tell their children they love them, then the cults and the Moonies and the Jones' will.

People take drugs as a cry for help. They take drugs when the family unit is broken down, and they take drugs when they don't know the Word of God, when there is no direction, no discipline, no love!"

Then kids want to get high, and they don't care how. What the dealers have told Toma is they cut the grass with rat poison, dunk speed in Drano, put cracked glass in cocaine for school kids to snort, and sell grass and pills dipped in embalming fluid to pass to the Jr. High and the elementary school kids.

School officials may want to do something, but they are scared about it. Parents are almost afraid to acknowledge it. If they know their kids are smoking grass, they maybe don't want to acknowledge it, because they don't know what to do about it. You feel helpless.

Pat Robinson of The 700 Club led the audience in this prayer: "Father, I thank You for Dave Toma and the tremendous work he is doing. We ask You to bless him for alerting this nation, and Father, all we can say is there is a sickness in this land. It's almost like we're cursing ourselves

with this terrible blight of drugs and alcohol and permissiveness and sexuality and the things that are being done. And God, we pray for a spiritual revival. Cleanse this awful filth away from us.

Lord, may there be a great turning to God. Start with our government leaders and those who have been so blind, and the entertainment industry that influences these young people that they might see what their influence is doing and those court decisions, strictly with their power to deal with this lawlessness.

God almighty, wake us up, we pray, and help this land repent of our sins and we ask for forgiveness and cleansing in Jesus' name. Amen."

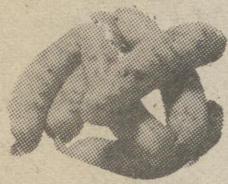
