## Powell out, Luff to fill in

last Wednesday accepted the resignation of Dr. Edward M. Powell as Superintendent of Schools making it effective at 4 p.m. December 31. At the same time the board announced that Deputy Superintendent Melvin Luff would be Acting Superintendent, taking on all the duties of chief school

Although Luff's job description as Deputy Superintendent indicated that he will fill in in the absence of the Superintendent, the appointment awaited Luff's acceptance. He was out of town visiting his son in St. Thomas and was to return today.

The vote on both motions was unanimous.

Board president Frederick Feutz said Powell's resignation was accepted "with some regret....we wish him the best in his trials and tribulations.' Powell, Feutz reported, had told the

board of his intention to plead guilty to extortion and tax evasion on Monday, December 20 in an executive session

The Lake Forest Board of Education that followed the regular board meeting. He submitted an "openended" resignation the next day. His guilty plea in U.S. District Court in Wilmington came on December 23.

The board had asked Powell to stay on for a transition period but decided to shorten that period. Public reaction may have had an effect. ## Police Beat

### Elliott disapproves Blue Cross rate increase

Insurance Commissioner David H. Elliott announced that he has disapproved the Blue Cross/Blue Shield 1982 Fourth Quarter Community Group Rate Filing. The term, Community Group, identifies the small group market made up principally of employers with 1-49 employees.

The Commissioner disapproved the rate increase request on the advice of an independent consulting actuary, James H. Hunt, F.S.A., who reviewed and assessed the rate filing's supporting materials. Mr. Hunt advised the Commissioner that the

documents as presented by Blue Cross justified an increase of no more than 13.7% (compared to Blue Cross's requested increase of 24.3%) for subscribers under age 65. A justification of only 22.3% increase (compared to Blue Cross's requested increase of 37.0%) was substantiated for medicfill subscribers over age 65. Commissioner Elliott stated, "I regret the necessity for the continuing dispute with the Blue Cross organization, but since they command such a large share of Delaware's health insurance market,

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### Experiments introduce new era in genetic engineering

The following news release gives further details of research in which Dr. Ralph L. Brinster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L. Brinster of Harrington, has been involved. The additional information was promised last week.

In a paper published in the December 16th issue of Nature, a group of scientists including Richard Palmiter from the University of Washington, Ralph Brinster from the University of Pennsylvania, Michael G. Rosenfeld from the University of California-San Diego, and Ronald M. Evans from The Salk Institute for Biological Studies, along with their colleagues Drs. Robert Hammer, Myrna Trumbauer, and Neal C. Birnberg, report the results of an intriguing series of experiments that point the way to a new era in genetic engineering.

Scientists have speculated for some years about the possibility of transferring genes from one animal into another, replacing defective or missing genes with normal genes from another source. Until recently, it was not clear that this would be technically feasible or, if it were, whether the transferred genes would be functional in their new host. In the last three or four years, several reports have appeared of the successful transfer of genes from one cell type into another, and even from one animal into an animal of a different species, but until the collaborative work done by this group of investigators, there had been no indication that the transferred genes were functional in a manner that was meaningful for the life of the host

The critical feature of the experiments reported in the Nature paper was the fusion of a strong and active regulating genetic element to a useful gene. What the investigators did was to take the gene that produces growth hormone in the cells of the pituitary gland of rats and combined this with a regulating element from the metallothionein gene of mice. This introduced into a fertilized mouse egg by a sophisticated microninjection returned to surrogate mothers where diseases and cancer.

Although the newborn mice appeared normal, within the next few weeks many of them grew very rapidly and continued growing until their body weights were almost twice that of normal mice.

animals and the large size that they attained clearly indicated that the injected genes were functional in the developing mice. This was confirmed by chemical analyses of their blood, which showed that the rapidly growing mice contained unusually large amounts of growth hormone -- the hormone that normally controls animal growth. The investigators discovered that growth hormone was being produced in substantial amounts by the liver, presumably because the gene-regulating element is normally active in the liver.

Although it is impractical to apply this technology to humans, it nevertheless has a number of important implications. It clearly indicates that it is possible to transfer genes from one animal to another and to have the transferred genes function in a more or less normal way. Applications of this technology to large farm animals may have practical consequences, allowing the production of important biological products, such as hormones, not previously available or available in only limited amounts. Also, the ability to accelerate growth rates in domestic animals could have beneficial effects by increasing the yield and quality of meat and milk. An especially important advantage is that the injected genes should be passed to the animal's offspring which, in turn, are likely to produce large amounts of the desired gene products. 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

on the premise that all the money would have to be raised through a tax increase. However, Council members feel that would not happen. They expect much of the money to come in through traffic fines, a portion of which is being set aside for the purpose.

The Council estimates that a 12 year loan for either of the two alternatives would result in a tax hike of six cents per \$100 of the assessed value of property. On a house assessed at \$35,000, that would mean a \$21 per year tax hike. Council members say any tax hike would operate on the 'sunset" principle so that the tax rate would go back down once the building was paid for.





Down with the old - up with the new.....In 1982 the city of Harrington took down the old water tower [right] and put up a new utility building in its place.



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
