

Lake Forest Board: Discipline discussed, petition presented

In a long public discussion Monday night, the Lake Forest School Board focused on a district discipline policy as applied at the W.T. Chipman Junior School in Harrington. Although most of the time was consumed by that discussion, the twenty or more district residents who attended the special session also witnessed the presentation of a three-part petition circulated by a citizen's group. The petition asked an audit of district accounts for the time Dr. Edward M. Powell was superintendent, and the public release of the names of those who will serve on the advisory selection committee to screen candidates for his successor. It also called on the board to abide by Delaware's "sunshine law" in its proceedings.

Internal Suspension

The internal suspension policy of the

district, especially as it is applied at the W.T. Chipman Junior School in Harrington was questioned by two parents of Chipman students. The two felt that internal suspension was being applied too often in instances that would warrant a lighter punishment. Their plea was "make the punishment fit for the crime."

Internal suspension is the policy of assigning students to a special classroom under strict supervision for periods ranging from a half day depending upon the particular offense. As a disciplinary procedure, it replaces external suspension in which the students would have been out of school for the time. At Chipman there is no longer a detention policy. Thus some offenders who would have received one or more detentions previously are now being placed on internal suspension.

Those so assigned spend the entire period in the supervised classroom. Talking is not allowed, and the students must work on assignments provided by their regular classroom teachers or by the internal suspension supervisor. Even their lunch is served in the internal suspension room.

In contrast to the previous external suspension policy, students placed on internal suspension are allowed to make up classwork and tests missed while they are out. Thus, there is no academic penalty for being placed on internal suspension.

Chipman Principal Marjorie Davis explained the reasons for having internal suspension rather than detention or external suspension. Students at the junior high school are bussed from all over the district. Those serving detentions (two hours

after school) and living in areas other than Harrington would have to wait for the late bus to take them to Felton or Frederica. Often that bus did not arrive until ten minutes to a half hour after the detention period was over. That meant students were waiting outside, unsupervised and during the winter, often after dark for the bus to arrive. In the instance where a student lived in a rural area there was still the problem of finding a way home after the late bus delivered them to either Felton or Frederica. If parents were unable to pick them up, immediately, those students again would be left unsupervised on school property, often after dark. If no transportation were provided by the parents, a junior high school student who lived in Bowers Beach, for example, would end up walking home from Frederica. School

officials did not feel that appropriate or safe for a young person 12 to 13 years old. Mrs. Davis said parents had complained that the after school detention policy punished them (with the extra driving) more than their children.

According to Mrs. Davis, 184 Chipman students have served a half day or more for a total of 689 total suspensions so far this year.

Chipman Assistant Principal William Daisy said there has been a 15% decrease in the number of discipline problems this year as compared with last year.

The parents further questioned a statement in the present discipline policy for the district which indicated that internal suspension was not to replace detention. It was explained that the intention of the policy was that

a student assigned a detention (where such a policy was enforced) not be excused from that detention if he were assigned an internal suspension for skipping that detention. He would still have to serve both.

At the conclusion of the discussion, Board President Rick Feutz acted on member James Gussett's suggestion to re-activate the district discipline policy committee to review discipline procedures and see whether any revisions need to be made.

Petition

The conduct of district officers continued to be a matter of concern as area residents Athur Bright presented the board a petition bearing 240 signatures. Three requests were made in the petition. The first of these was that "...a full audit be made of the Lake

Meet Lynn Donovan, dancer extraordinaire

A Harringtonian is a talented, professional entertainer, but her name, ability and credentials are probably known to only a small percentage of the area's residents.

Lynn Donovan is a student, teacher and devotee of Middle Eastern Dancing, also known as Dance Orientale. An attractive brunette and a Lake Forest High graduate, she recently entertained 700 people, at a banquet in Ocean City, MD as the only entertainer on the program. She danced for half an hour to a very appreciative audience.

The entertainment chairman had made a futile trip to Baltimore, in search of talent, before auditioning the young, local woman, who more than filled the bill.

Lynn has danced at a couple of Harrington Heritage Day Celebrations with a trio known as the Veda Sereem Dancers, named after one of her teachers. Hope Popivchak of Felton and Mary Lou Melvin of Dover are the other Veda Sereem Dancers.

The former Lynn Woodrum of Frederica has been dancing for almost ten years. For the last four or five

years, she has been making weekly trips to Philadelphia and Silver Spring, MD for more instruction in this many-faceted art.

Lynn does Tunesian, Moroccan, Egyptian, and other types of dances. The folklore dances from any of these countries follow a set pattern, but she also does a basic cabaret style performance, which allows a freer setup, in which additional ballet, jazz or other types of movements, may be incorporated.

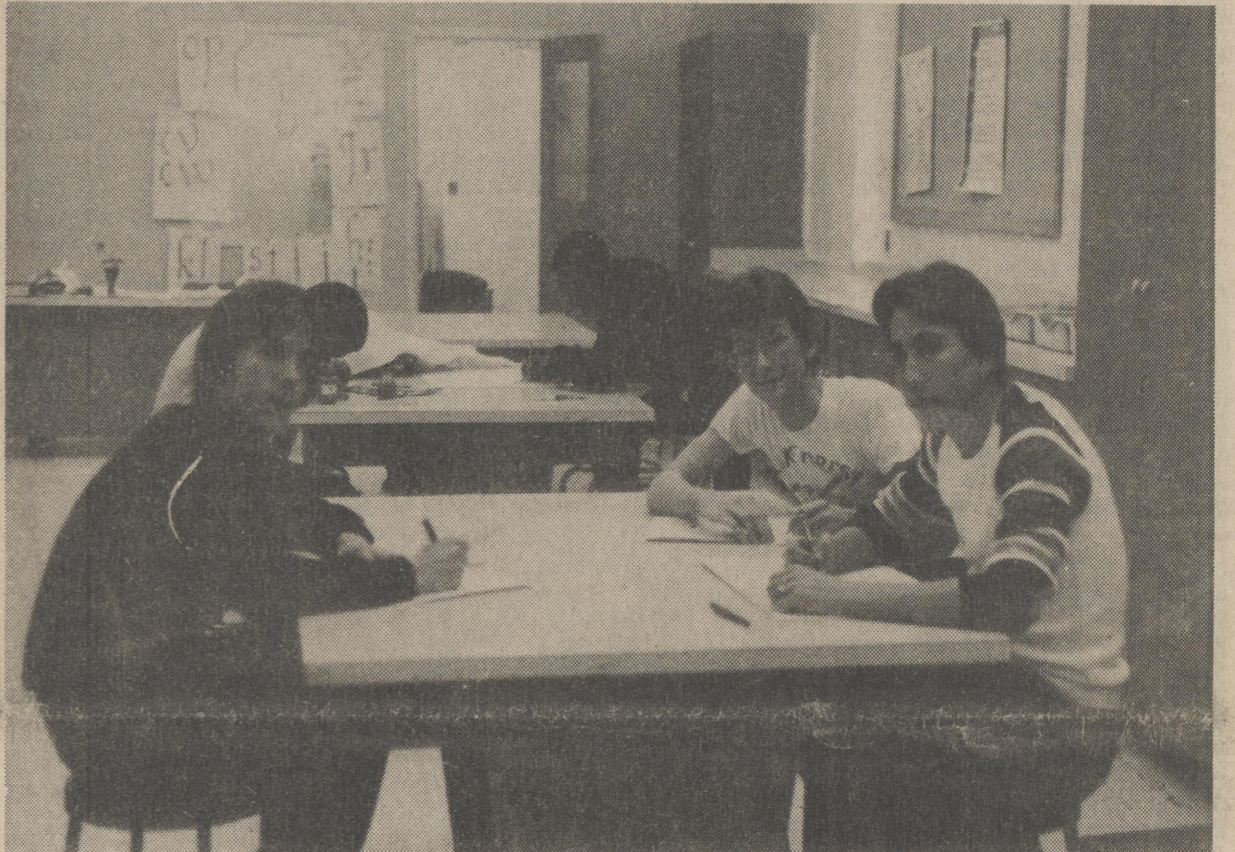

Alex's Story Part Two

Take a breath - now hold it and watch twenty seconds pass. Were you able to hold your breath for the whole time? Alex did - and neither was he trying or supposed to - "he just forgot!" But Alex was only three weeks old, and you just don't explain that you need to continually breathe to a 3-week old infant.

Alex is classified as having Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). SIDS is the number one cause of death in infants after the first week of life, killing approximately 6,000-7,000 babies every year in the United States. (That's 2 per every 1000 live births). Sudden Infant Death Syndrome most commonly occurs to infants between the ages of 3 weeks and 7 months, but occasionally an older or younger baby may die of SIDS. There is no suffering; death occurs within seconds, usually during sleep.

After being transported to Delaware

Division Hospital in Wilmington, tests such as an EKG (electrocardiogram), X-rays, blood work, and a barium swallow test (to make sure he wasn't choking on food he had spit up) were run on Alex. During the next few days at Delaware Division, Jane and Bill were trained in the use of an apnea monitor on Alex. Once he was released from the hospital, they rented a monitor from Delaware Division and set it up in their home. Alex was hooked to the monitor at all times that he was not being held. By holding him, they could feel him breathing.

Their lives changed drastically. Jane quit her job - she did not want to place such a heavy burden of responsibility on anyone to watch Alex during the day while she would work. Both Bill and Jane as well as several members of their family and friends had to learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). For the next 3-4 months their house

stayed as quiet as possible. Just the noise of the washer, or dryer, or dishwasher, loud radio or television, or even running the bath water or taking a shower could drown out the tone from the monitor that would sound when Alex had not breathed for 20 seconds.

Did you try? Did you have to take a very deep breath just to count through 20 seconds? Think of Alex, or any infant not breathing for 20 seconds - they didn't even take that gulping breath you did to make the time limit - they just forgot to breathe all together.

Powell gets 3 years, term begins today

Former Lake Forest Superintendent Dr. Edward M. Powell today begins a three year prison sentence imposed on him for extorting \$32,800 from the Wilmington firm Training Services, Inc. in 1978 and 1979. He was also charged with income tax evasion for failing to report the money to the IRS.

Powell, who pled guilty on December 22, was sentenced last Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Wilmington by Judge Walter K. Stapleton. In addition to the three years prison term, Powell

received a \$5,000 fine in the extortion charge. For tax evasion he received a suspended sentence and four years probation.

Judge Stapleton rejected an offer by Dover Attorney Harold J. Schmittinger, Powell's lawyer, to have the former school chief participate in two community service projects in lieu of imprisonment. But he said he might consider a reduced sentence if Schmittinger came up with an

acceptable alternative plan within 120 days.

Powell was given until today at 2 p.m. to report to a federal penitentiary in either Lexington, Kentucky or Allenwood, Pennsylvania.

The offense for which he was sentenced was committed while he was Superintendent of the Capital School District. Powell served Lake Forest from July 1, 1981 until early January, 1983.

Seaford youth raped

Delaware State Police at Troop 4, Georgetown are investigating the rape of a 12 year old Seaford girl that occurred on Tuesday, February 1 at 6:00 p.m. Arrested for the alleged offense was Raymond Henry Williams, 28, of R.D. 1, Box 92D, Bridgeville, Delaware.

Investigation revealed that the victim went to the barn to feed her horses. While at the barn, Williams appeared. The victim knew Williams who had worked for her father in the past. As the victim went up into the hayloft to gather hay for the horses, she was followed by Williams who allegedly grabbed her around the neck and choked her with his hands. The victim

was then thrown to the floor and allegedly raped by Williams. The victim then allegedly was choked with twine until she passed out. When the victim gained consciousness, she ran to her house and her parents transported her to Nanticoke Memorial Hospital. The victim was treated and admitted for her injuries. Williams was arrested by Troopers near his home. Williams was taken to to J.P. Court 3 in Georgetown where he was arraigned on charges of rape and attempted murder. Bond was set at \$175,000.00 secured bond and Williams was incarcerated at Sussex Correctional Institution in Georgetown in default of bond.

Trooper hurt in Camden mishap

A two car collision last week at U.S. route 113A and route 10, approximately one mile east of Camden, Delaware, has resulted in injuries to both operators. The motor vehicle accident took place within the intersection when an unmarked Delaware State Police patrol car was struck in the left side by a privately-owned vehicle. Both Trooper First Class David Henderson, 30, of Troop 3, Camden, and Dorothy A. Curl, 60, of R.D. #1, Box 162, Magnolia, Delaware, were transported to the Kent General Hospital by area ambulances. Both are being held at the hospital pending x-ray results. TFC

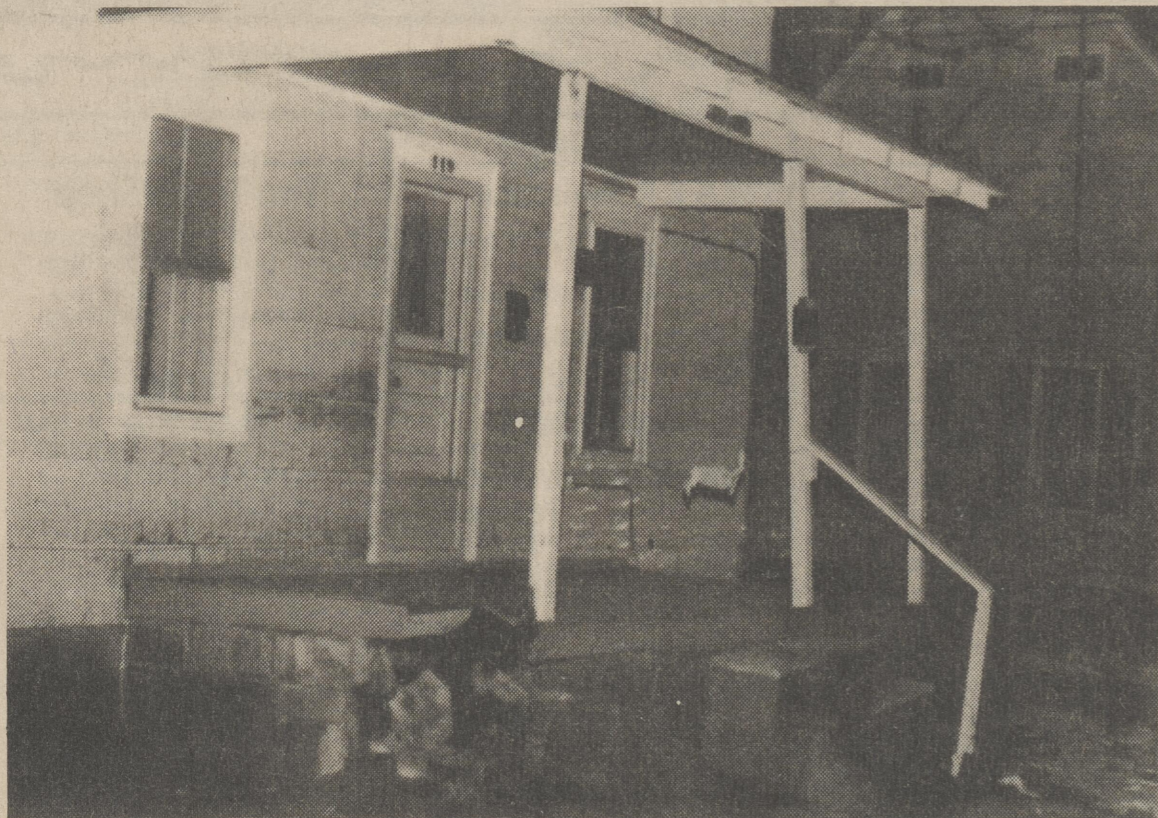
Henderson sustained possible rib and hip fractures. Mrs. Curl complained of chest pains. Both operators were seat belted at the time of the impact.

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Forest's District's accounts for the period beginning July 1, 1981 and extending to the present in order to ensure a clear record for the incoming administration."

There were still some questions floating around about a \$2000 expense account paid to former Superintendent Dr. Edward M. Powell and about vouchers he submitted for expenses over that \$2,000.

The petition's second request was that the board "publicly announce the names of the advisory committee for the selection of Dr. Powell's replacement." The school board has thus far declined to release the names of the 13 member committee.

The third request was that "all board action be taken in accordance with the Delaware Freedom of Information Act

(sunshine law) and be made public to the extent required and permissible by that act." The sunshine law places rather narrow limits on those things on which a public body such as a school board can take action in private or executive session. Secrecy in the conduct of board affairs, whether real or apparent, has been a complaint of a number of district residents who attend regular board meetings.

Bright said the petition was the result of a citizen's meeting held at the home of Roger and Sarah Williams last Thursday. The 240 signatures were collected over the weekend.

Although time was allotted for the purpose, there was no board discussion or further comment from the floor on the petition.

In other business the Lake Forest

Board:

-discussed the progress of selecting an architect to plan district renovations. The board has completed initial interviews with seven candidates who must now be ranked in order of performance. Gary Homewood told the board the law indicates it must negotiate with one candidate at a time and must accept or reject the offer of the first candidate before going on to the second.

-heard Student Activities Director Dave Adams discuss the increasing difficulty finding qualified people to coach the sports programs. The spring coaching roster still shows vacancies for a girls tennis coach as well as a number of track and field assistants. Adams said inflation and the fact that teachers can make more at a brief part time job than in an entire season of coaching makes it difficult to attract qualified coaches.

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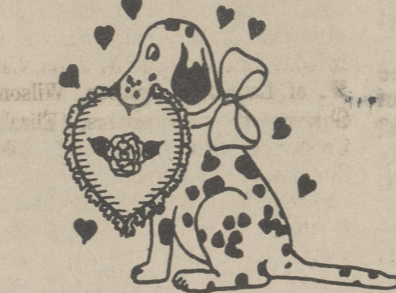

Extension Service offers training for young farm workers

Farm employers should insist that young employees and summer help have training exemptions before working on a farm, says Ron Jester, University of Delaware extension safety specialist.

According to the child labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, youths under 16 cannot be employed in certain hazardous agricultural operations unless they have had special training and received a certificate. The provisions do not apply to youth working on the farms of their parents or guardians, but the training is still essential.

Hazardous jobs not open to youth include operating a tractor over 20-horsepower; operating or assisting with the operation of certain pieces of farm machinery; operating or assisting with trenchers, fork lifts, chain saws, or other types of machines; and working inside airtight produce and grain storages or silos.

Other forbidden jobs involve working at high elevations, handling hazardous materials, working pens with breeding stock, handling explosives or anhydrous ammonia, working in heavy timber operations, transporting passenger in buses,

tractors, trucks or autos, and riding on a tractor as a passenger or helper.

In certain of these operations, Jester notes, 14- and 15-year-old farm workers can receive exemptions if they have completed formal training. The Cooperative Extension Service is setting up training programs to teach 14- and 15-year-olds about normal working hazards involved with tractor and farm machinery. Written and operational examinations will test their knowledge of the correct use of machinery.

The program will be conducted as a correspondence course, with formal classes interspersed throughout the 8-week program. The deadline for registration is February 15.

Exemptions are also available for 4-H'ers who have completed specific training requirements, and for students who have completed certain units in the vocational agriculture training program.

For further information contact county extension agents or 4-H youth agents in New Castle, Kent, or Sussex counties, or Ron Jester at the University of Delaware Substation in Georgetown.

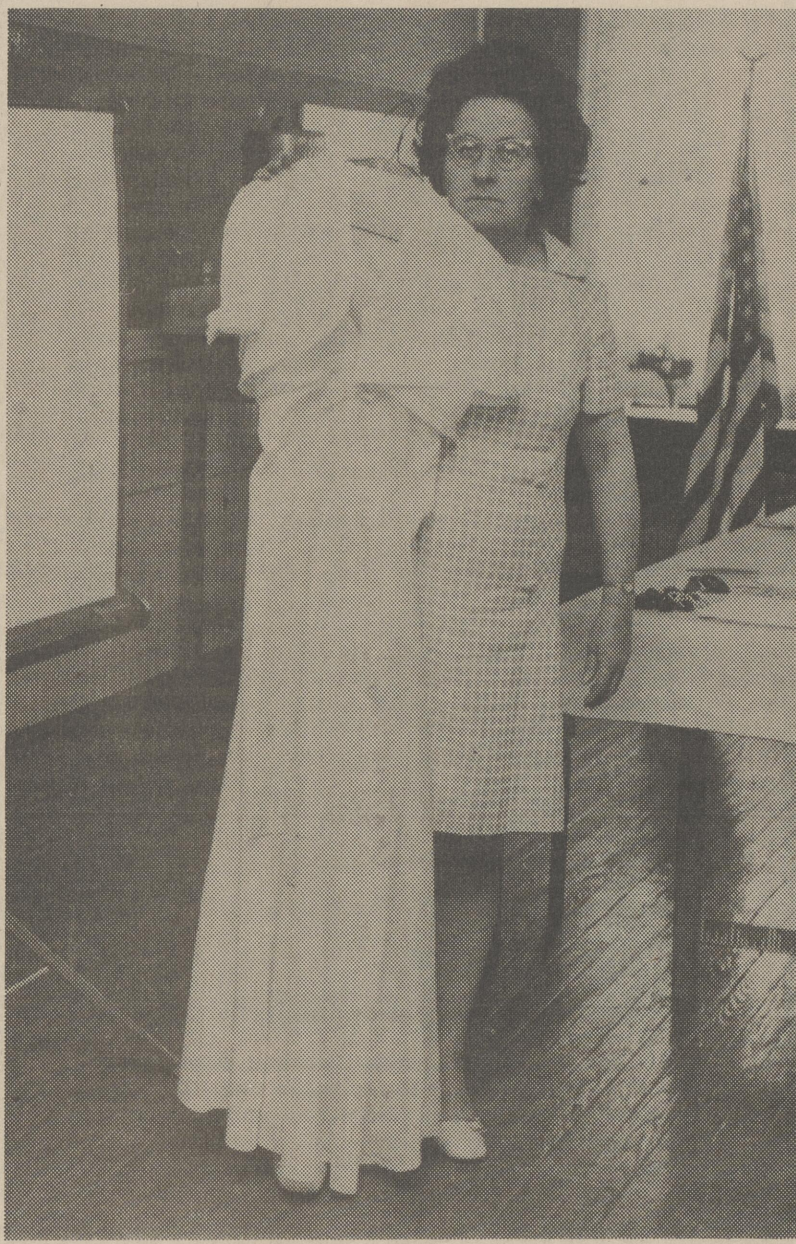

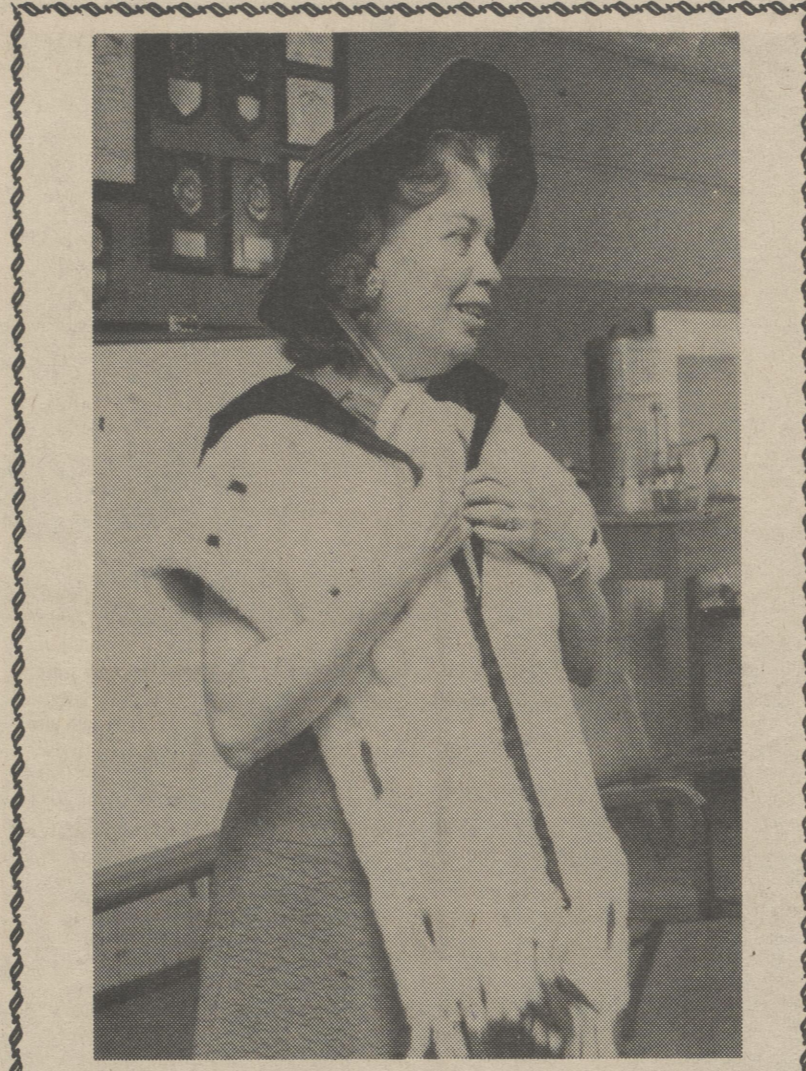

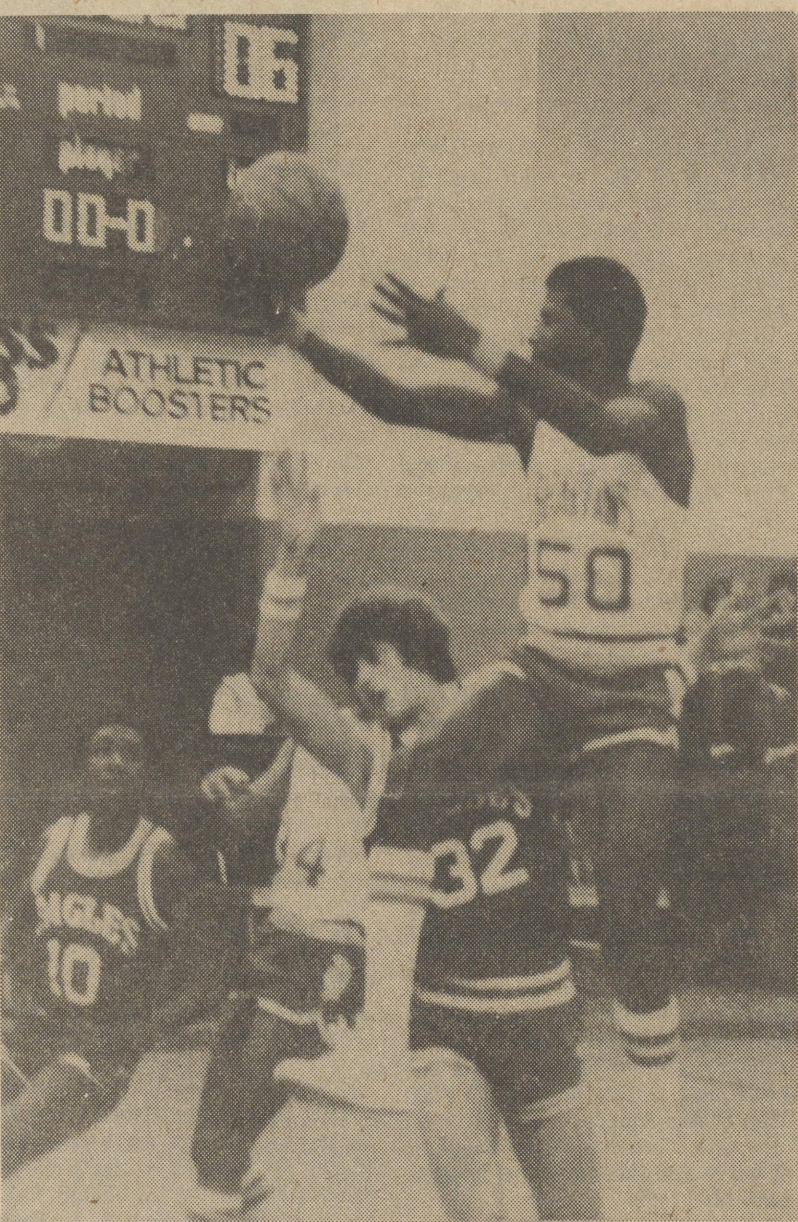
Three swimmers in the young (most of them are just 9 years old) 10 and under group posted "B" level times.

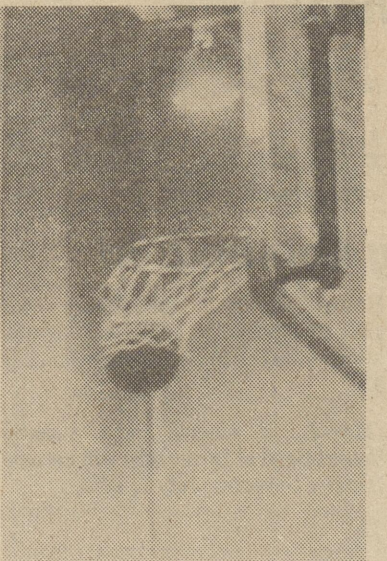
LF girls suffer tough loss
