Lake Forest Board will release names, but questions continue

Questions about the manner in which district business is conducted continued to plague the Lake Forest Board of Education Monday night. Even as the three-point petition presented by a citizens' group at the special meeting on February 7, as many questions as answers seemed to surface.

The board voted on Monday to request a full audit of the district's financial accounts "for the period beginning July 1, 1981 and extending to the present" (the time during which Dr. Edward M. Powell was Superintendent of Schools). It also voted to change the way in which expense vouchers for top level district personnel are approved. The board further acted on two resolutions to

publicly announce the names of an advisory committee for the selection of Dr. Powell's successor and to 'continue" to act in accordance with Delaware's "Sunshine Law".

(Since the resignation of Dr. Powell, board meetings have been attended by an average of 20 to 30 people - a number relatively large in comparison to the usual attendance of a half a dozen or

> There was also an apparent rift between board members over the matter of secrecy and whether or not the public and perhaps other board members are being kept adequately

The board did vote to request a state audit of all district accounts from July 1, 1981 to the present to "ensure a clear record for the incoming administration". However it faced questions as to whether an audit would provide a real investigation into whether expense monies legally approved are actually used for the purpose for which they are designated. For instance, an audit might show that the proper procedure was followed in reimbursing a district official for gasoline expenses while on school business. But would it turn up whether or not that person actually went where he said he did and reported the gas mileage accurately? If not, were checks into such situations a regular practice?

Along with the audit resolution the board approved a change in the way the district approves vouchers for reimbursement of expenses incurred by district officials on business. This change would affect the top four officials entitled to be signatories (superintendent, deputy superintendent, board president, board vice president). Live signatures of two of those four must appear on every purchase order for the district. However, invoices may be approved by one live signature and one rubber stamp signature. He couldn't go out and play as much because Mommy could only go as far as the back patio, in case the monitor would go off.

Sunshine Law

The Board cast a 3-2 vote to approve an amended resolution that "all Board action continue to be taken in accordance with the Delaware Freedom of Information Act (Sunshine

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Law), and be made public to the extent required and permissible by that act." The amendment, proposed by member James Gussett, was to add the words "continue to" to the original resolution proposed in a motion by

Caulk and member Albert Price voted against both the ammendment and the amended motion. Caulk said after the meeting he felt there were some specific ways in which the board has been violating the sunshine law. These he said he would point out later.

Member Bill Garey, on the other hand, feels the board has not acted in violation of the Freedom of Information Act. He said the resolution as originally proposed was somewhat like asking the question, "Are you still beating your wife?" (when in fact you had never beaten her in the first place.)

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


