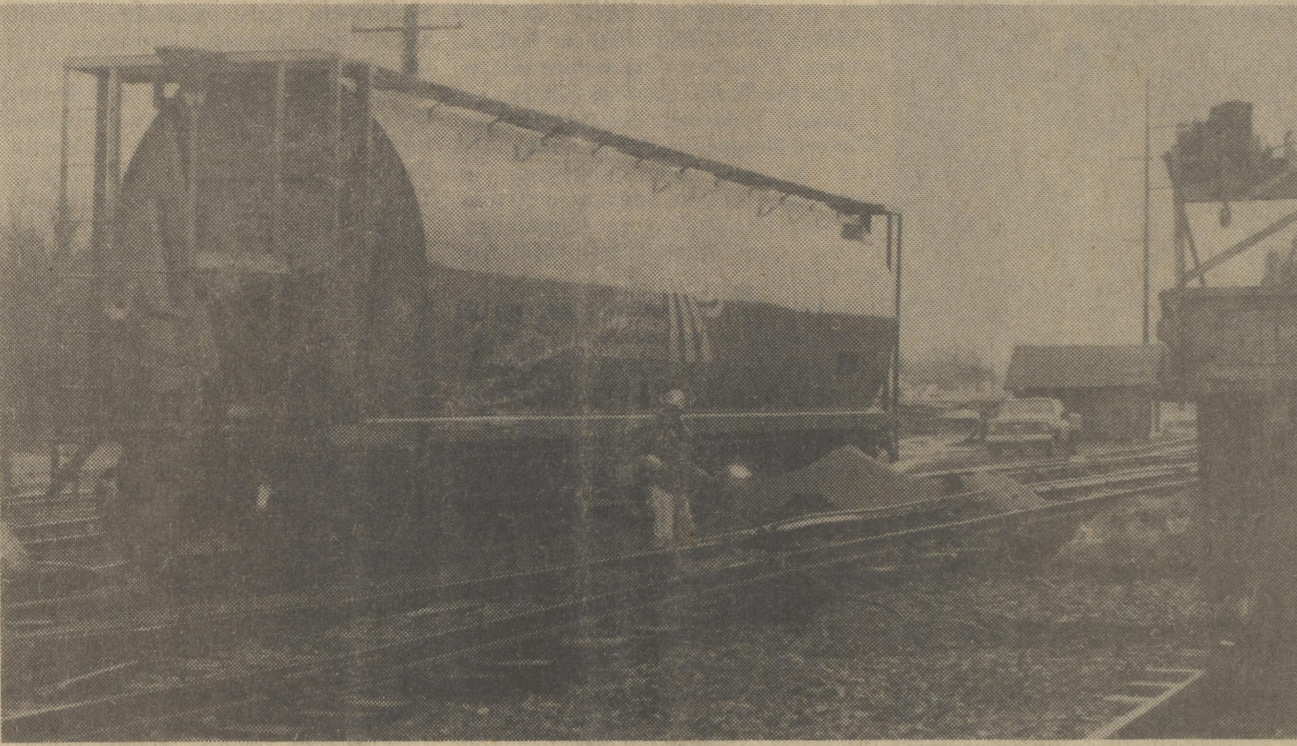


Derailed cars contain hazardous chemicals, but no leaks develop



Conrail was still straightening up Saturday morning after six cars derailed in Harrington Friday night.

A six-car derailment in Friday night's wild March weather could have spelled real trouble for Harrington. Three of the cars contained a diamine solution (hexamethylene diamine) bound for the du Pont Company in Seaford. The solution, a clear, colorless liquid used in the manufacture of nylon, is described as highly corrosive to metals and tissue (human tissue included). It does not burn easily, but when it does, it produces toxic (poisonous) oxides of nitrogen. The good news for Harrington, especially for emergency workers at the scene, was that the double or triple walled tanks (2 metal shells plus a glass liner) held. No leaks developed, and there was no fire.

Of the other three cars that went off the tracks, one contained adipic acid, a white crystalline solid also used by du Pont, and two carried a phosphatic fertilizer solution bound for Milford Fertilizer.

It was the diamine that concerned emergency workers most. Members of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company called out when the cars

derailed Friday night used air packs as a precaution until the situation was deemed safe.

Bob Weber, a spokesman at the du Pont Company said Monday, that diamine freezes at 73 degrees Fahrenheit. In Friday night's temperatures, it should have turned into a solid and dropped to the ground. But Harrington Fire Chief Bob Taylor cautioned that an unforeseen situation in which the corrosive chemical reacted with something else could have produced some possibly dangerous fumes.

Computer printouts furnished by Conrail advise that the diamine and the fertilizer solution are "corrosive" and the fertilizer as well as the adipic acid "environmentally hazardous". For all three, the advice is "avoid breathing vapors" and those fighting fires in which the diamine is involved are told to wear self-contained breathing apparatus.

The Harrington Fire Department was called out around 7:15 or 7:30 p.m. on Friday. Its personnel were on the

scene from then until about 10 p.m. and again from midnight until around 2 a.m. on Saturday. The Fire Chief said at least one person remained on the scene or very nearby throughout the night. After 10 p.m. it was a matter of waiting until cranes arrive to help put the cars back on the tracks.

The Harrington Police were also on the job keeping the curious from approaching the scene too close and seeing that the Clark Street crossing was cleared for traffic. When the derailment occurred, a caboose was left on the crossing. It had to be towed clear by tractor.

The mishap occurred on Friday, March 11, just 100 yards or so south of the Clark Street crossing in the vicinity of the former Harrington Lumber Company.

Fire Chief Bob Taylor said the mishap occurred on a portion of tracks that have not as yet been renovated. So far there has been no word from Conrail on an exact cause of the derailment or the cost of the clean-up.

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Saint Patrick's Day

Tomorrow, March 17, marks the anniversary of the death of Saint Patrick the patron Saint of Ireland. Saint Patrick lived between 389 to 461. He is recognized chiefly in the church as being the one who converted the Irish to Christianity. He was to become the Apostle to the Irish. Saint Patrick's Day has been recognized in this country since 1845.

Patrick was a native Englishman having been born in England. His father was a wealthy alderman. When he was about 16 years old he was kidnapped by pirates and sold into slavery. He spent six years in the captivity of an Irish chieftain as a shepherd. The Irish then were very primitive and non-Christian.

He devoted himself to religion and the study of it while in captivity. He escaped his captors, but he was doomed to be a slave for the remainder of his life. He returned to England, but what followed was a pursuit of preparing himself for the ministry and return to Ireland to convert the Irish to Christianity.

This he did. He studied in monasteries in France and under the guidance of Catholic bishops and priests. He returned to Ireland in 431 and settled in the northern and western part of Ireland. He soon won the confidence of many tribal chiefs in those areas.

He is said to have built 300 churches during his life and baptized about 120,000 people.

He brought priests from France and England for his new churches. His success in Ireland was resented in England. They opposed the way he organized the churches. The differences between England and Ireland possibly had their beginnings at about this time.

Saint Patrick published many writings notably the book "Confessions" dealing with his spiritual development. He also wrote "Letter to Coroticus", which is a criticism of a raid carried out by Coroticus, a British chieftain in Ireland. Many of those he converted were killed during the raid. It also characterizes Saint Patrick's resentment of his own people, the British, in this attitude toward Ireland.

Many legends have grown up and around Saint Patrick namely the fact that he charmed all the snakes in Ireland into the sea where they drowned. The other being that he used the three leafed shamrock to symbolize Trinity. The shamrock is the traditional symbol of Ireland.

Wear green, the color of the shamrock, tomorrow. It will bring you luck...too, for it is a show of Christianity and not one specific religious faith.

Quillen resigns from Harrington Council, Jarrell appointed

The Harrington City Council Monday night acted to accept the resignation of G. Robert Quillen, City Council member from the 6th ward. Donald T. Jarrell of Reese Avenue was appointed to fill Quillen's unexpired term.

Quillen's resignation came as no surprise. He was elected in November 1982 to serve in the state legislature as representative from the 33rd District. In a recent opinion, Delaware's Attorney General Charles M. Oberly III said that Quillen could not hold both elective offices at the same time.

Quillen was elected in January 1981 to serve a three year term on the Harrington Council. Ten months remain of that term. However, if a new

city charter is approved, the next municipal elections might be held in April 1984 instead of January 1984. One provision of the proposed new charter, now in its second draft, is moving the annual city elections from January to April.

Bobby Quillen is a former Harrington City Manager who also has six years previous service in the state legislature.

Police Commissioner Appointed
The Council further gave its approval to the appointment of Curtis Melvin as Police Commissioner. Melvin has served in that capacity since his appointment following his election to City Council in January 1982. He had

indicated previously that he did not want the job a second time, and the Council had tabled the appointment at its February meeting. Melvin reconsidered and agreed to accept the post.

In other business the Harrington Council:

-agreed to meet with Mike Thompson of the K.C. County Com. Dev. Office.

At its March 28 workshop session Thompson had offered to meet with the Council to discuss community development block grant projects that might be more likely to be funded. Harrington's proposal for water improvements on West, Dorman and North Streets was not one of those funded in the recent round of HUD

Community Development Block Grants now doled out by the federal government through the state's Department of Community Affairs.

-approved a change in the plans for taking sewer service to the Colony Inn, a motel and restaurant going up on the southbound side of U.S. 13 north of the traffic light.

-discussed a letter of interest sent by Viola Clendaniel in the availability of sewer service. Mrs. Clendaniel, whose property is on U.S. 13 south of Hardees, is within the city limits. However, it is on the opposite side of the highway from the sewer line. It would cost the city \$2,500 to take a

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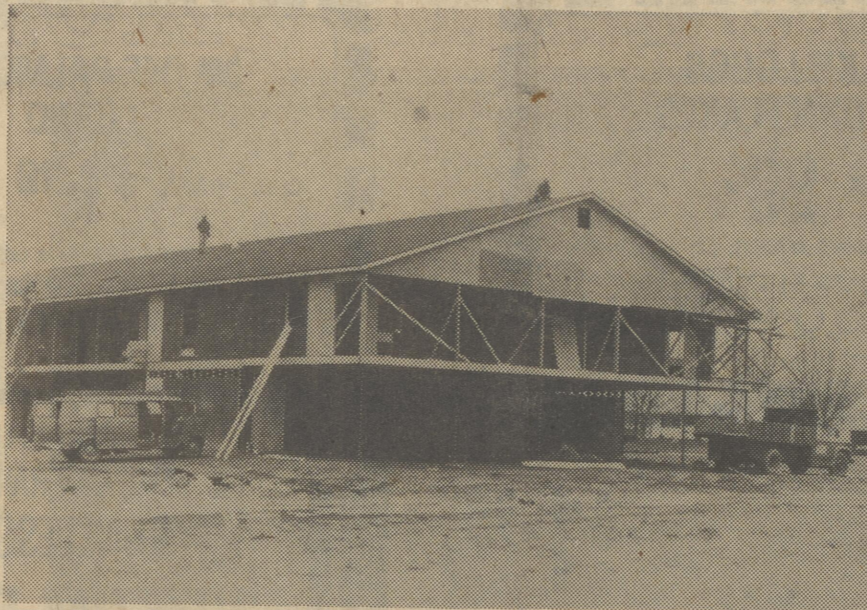

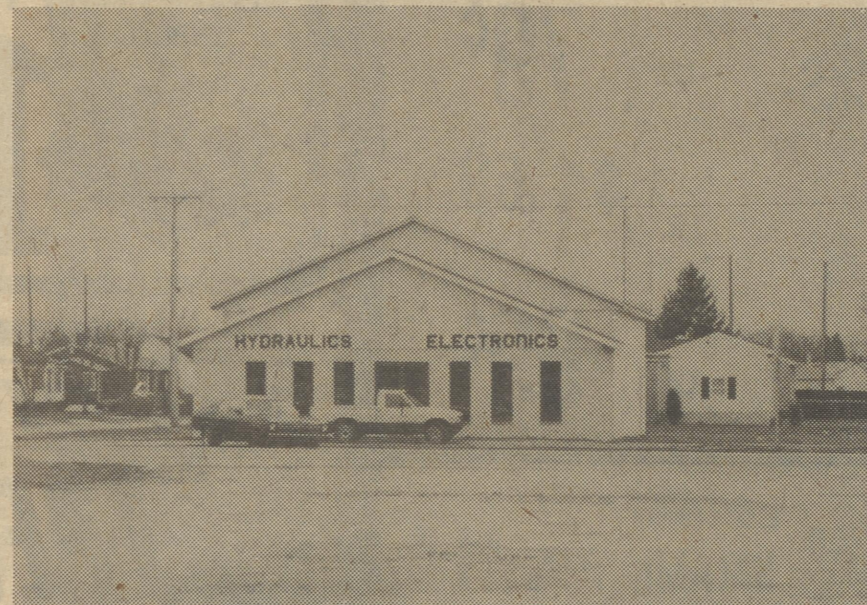
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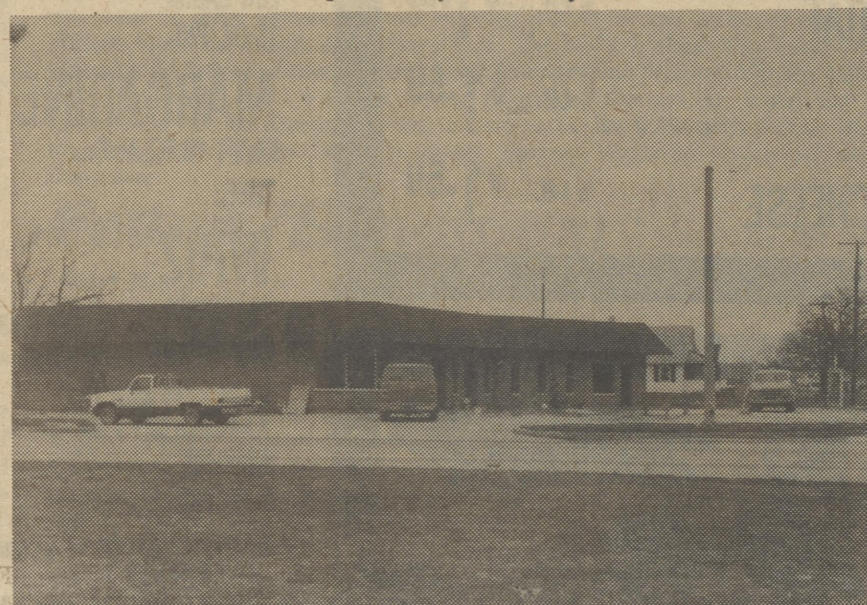

Bridgeville Town Council

The Bridgeville Town Commissioners adopted a budget of more than \$429,000 for Fiscal Year 1984. They foresaw no increase in taxes or rates. More than \$120,000 was earmarked for the Police Department and almost \$143,000 for Waste Treatment. The \$50,000 Revenue Sharing Budget will be discussed at a public meeting on Monday, March 21 to which Civic Groups have been invited.

A legal opinion was read stating that the Town does have the authority to cut-off water service in the case of unpaid bills. It was felt that the State Department of Public Health would only intervene in extreme cases.

In other action the Town Commissioners passed the Bicycle Ordinance. This

Ordinance will require that all bicycles be registered and inspected by the Bridgeville Police Department. The fee will be one dollar. All bicycles will be required to have a head light, red rear reflector and a horn or bell. Registration is to be by the first Monday of May. There is a provision for a \$5 - \$25 fine for any violations of the new ordinance. Parents or guardians will be responsible for minors.

It was proposed that bids be accepted for a new police car. Noting that the towns of Milford, Seaford and Rehoboth have purchased new police cars from Ryan Motors of Livingston, N.J. The Council authorized the Police Commissioner to obtain a quote from Ryan Motors.

Jeff Moore enjoys dramatic roles Part 2

"I enjoy portraying other characters, says Jeff Moore, who has the male lead in Lake Forest High School's spring play, *The Uninvited*. "It's a lot of fun trying to bring off another character convincingly."

An honor student at the high school, Jeff this year plays Roddy Fitzgerald, who, along with his sister, buys a house which has some uninvited "guests". 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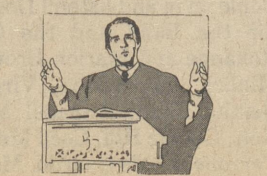

It was just four years ago that quite another problem threatened to do away with the girls' tennis program. That was before Lake Forest got its brand new courts. Then, the only practice areas available to the district were the two courts behind the W.T. Chipman Junior School in Harrington. At the time the courts were cracked and sagging. The Lake Forest School Board took a look, pronounced them "unfit to play on" and said there would be no tennis that year.
The board reckoned without five feisty young ladies [Heather Billings, Sue Cox, Amy Calvert, Shelley Barthlow and Debbie Todd] who wanted very much to play tennis. The young ladies stormed a Lake Forest School Board meeting to protest. They were willing to play all their matches away from home and to find other places, on their own, to practice. Their coach thought the Chipman courts could still be used for some aspects of practice which did not involve running.
Upshot of the whole affair was that the school board retired to an executive session after which it reversed its earlier decision. The board also came up with some dollars to patch the courts.
By September 1980 the new courts at the high school were in place, the Chipman courts had been resurfaced and Lake Forest was ready to conduct both girls' and boys' varsity tennis programs. Now the program for which the feisty five went out on a limb seems a casualty of a problem that may be a little more difficult to tackle.
With the completion of athletic facilities, Lake Forest sports programs have expanded. Sometimes that has meant programs to give depth or act as feeders to the varsity level sports. Other times it has resulted in the addition of new programs.
With the addition of varsity swim teams this winter [not to be confused with the community age group swim team which just completed its third season], Lake Forest now has eleven different varsity sports. Out of the eleven, five have both girls and boys teams. In two of the five, the girls and boys teams have different coaches. That totals thirteen varsity coaches each year. Of course there are several coaches who do double duty by coaching and/or assisting in two or even three sports.
In addition to the varsity level, there are six separately coached JV teams plus a freshman football team and eight junior high teams. That makes 28 coaching positions which must be filled in a given school year. Add to those a number of assistants in such programs as spring track which brings out 90 or more participants.
It is difficult to count the number of hours any one coach puts in in any season. Spring coaching started on March 2 [or before] and runs to season's end on May 15. Teaching coaches, according to Dave Adams, are required to be on the job from 3:15 to 5:30 p.m. each school afternoon. Non teaching coaches [and in recent years this district as well as others has had to recruit some coaches and assistants from non teaching ranks] must be there from 3 until 6 p.m. Then there are some Saturdays and extra hours for competitive events that require travel.
The girls tennis coach position pays \$550 for the season. Other salaries vary.
Although many teachers remain dedicated coaches, season in and season out, it has become increasingly difficult to round up a full roster of qualified personnel to staff the school's competitive sports programs.
Economics and the time spent away from home and family are understandable deterrents to attracting teachers to the program.
Equally understandable is the school district's problem, in tight economic times, in stretching a budget to fit all deserving areas.
The problem looks to be with us for a long time. No easy solutions seem available; none are suggested.

Shawnee initiates "Year of the Back Nine"

The Shawnee Country Club of Milford last week initiated the "Year of the Back Nine" - clubhouse billing for the expansion of its nine hole golf course into a full, eighteen hole facility. The additional nine holes will be constructed on a 70 acre track located to the rear of the present course.
On Friday, March 11, Lida W. Wells, President of the Shawnee Country Club, announced the awarding of the contract to build the additional nine holes to Golf by Janis, Inc. of Berlin, Maryland. The "back nine" has been designed by the golf course architectural firm of Edmund B. Ault, Ltd. of Silver Spring, MD. Ault Ltd. is the same firm that designed and built Shawnee's original nine hole course 25 years ago.
According to Edmund Ault, work on the course should begin this week. "Nature willing," he said, the course should be ready for seeding late this fall, and the full 18 holes open for play by May or June of 1984. In the meantime, the original nine holes will continue to be in use. There should be no interruption for golfers who use the Shawnee facilities.
The land being used for the golf course expansion is mostly cleared, but is divided from the present course by a small stream, a pond and woods. When the new construction is complete, the two sections will be integrated to form an 18 hole course. A club spokesman said that the work will include lengthening two of the present holes to provide the challenge of distance as well as a water hazard from the tee. One of the new holes is described as a par 3 to be set in a wooded grove. The woods come into play on several of the new holes, and future plans call for the construction of another pond.
Al Janis of GOLF by Janis was ready to move his men and machines onto the site and begin work this week. He said

that rainy days might cause some delay, but that the tract drains well and soggy soil should not be a real problem.
Golf by Janis has constructed a number of golf courses in the northeast. These include those at Mount Airy Lodge and Pocono Farms Country Club in the Poconos and the DuPont Country Club in Wilmington. The company built and operates its own course, Pine Shore, in Ocean City, Maryland.
Edmund B. Ault Limited, engaged by the Shawnee Country Club 18 months ago to design the golf course expansion, has been responsible for the design and building of 300 courses across the United States and around the world. On the list are the Garrison's Lake Golf and Country Club, Smyrna, Delaware, the Palmetto Golf Course in Myrtle Beach and the Country Club of Las Vegas.
Ault and Janis teamed up to design and build the golf course at Dover Air Force Base.
Estimated cost of the golf course expansion is \$900,000. A commercial/recreational project, it is part of the Sussex County Council Industrial Bond Program and is funded through Wilmington Trust Company and the Bank of Delaware.
A Nine-Hole Expansion Committee chaired by Ray J. Bryan has met regularly as the plans have been formulated and the contractor selected. Other committee members are Tom Garbutt, Bill Nauman, Herman Sharp, Brett Warren, Bob Fischer, Lucy Hammond and Mike Kelley, Greens Superintendent at the Shawnee Country Club.
In addition to its clubhouses and golf course, the club has four lighted double tennis courts and an olympic-type swimming pool.

Hunting and Fishing on Delmarva

DSSA: The Delaware Saltwater Sportsfishing Association held a meeting on March 8, 1983 at Townsend Fire Hall, Townsend, Delaware. The Association is opposed to the proposed Finfish bill. Mrs. Marie Brittingham of Greenwood addressed the group. She proposed that the state enact a new fishing law that would:

1. Retract the number of nets any one fisherman could put out.
2. Require a separate license for each net with a \$100 fee per license.
3. Require that each net be suitably tagged with the necessary identification to enable fish wardens to identify the owners.
4. Establish a minimum mesh size and a maximum net size.
5. Authorize wardens to strictly enforce all laws.

Mrs. Brittingham requested the DSSA to hold some meetings downstate to enable residents of lower Delaware a chance to express their views on any proposed new Finfish Laws.

THE PROPOSED NEW FINFISH LAW: Section 912 reads "Sale, Trade and/or Barter of game fish prohibited unless authorized."

"(a) No person who catches or takes any species of game fish from or out of the tidal waters of this State shall sell, trade and/or barter said game fish, unless the Director has authorized such sale, trade or barter by issuing the person a permit."

On the surface the above seems reasonable and fair. But then, what about the industrious youngster who catches minnows and sells them for bait? It seems almost immoral to pass a law that would make an up and coming young businessman a criminal.

1983 DELAWARE TROUT SEASON: The new trout season will get underway at 7:30 a.m. on April 2. The Division of Fish and Wildlife will stock 30,900 trout (22,400 Rainbow Trout and 8,500 Brown Trout).

The streams to be stocked are: White Clay Creek, Red Clay Creek, Mill Creek, Pike Creek, Christina Creek, Beaver Run and Wilson Run. Areas stocked will be closed to all fishing from March 13 through April 1.

DELAWARE STATE CAMPING SITES: Delaware Seashore State Park on Route 1 south of Rehoboth Beach, has 141 campsites with three-point hookups (water, electric and sewage) and 158 campsites with no hookups. The campground opens March 11.

Opening April 1 are Cape Henlopen State Park, Lewes (160 campsites with no hookups); Trap Pond State Park, near Laurel (144 campsites with no hookups) and Killens Pond State Park, near Felton (60 campsites with two-point water and electric hookups).

The rates are: Three-point hookups \$12 per site for up to six persons; two point hookups \$8 per site. Improved campsites with central located bathroom and water outlets (no on-site hookups) Seashore Park areas \$8 per night per site; inland park areas \$6 per night per site.

NETTING LAWS TO BE ENFORCED - The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) was ordered to enforce the laws restricting gill netting in Delaware Bay effective April 1, 1983, by Sussex County Superior Court Justice Claud L. Tease. This was the result of an action brought against the DNREC by the Delaware Saltwater Sportfishing Association.

Attorneys for DSSA and the DNREC entered into a "Consent Agreement" whereby the DNREC is under court order to enforce the laws. DSSA in return agreed to a dismissal of its action, called a "Writ of Mandamus", on April 1, 1984. By this agreement, failure to properly enforce the laws between now and April 1, 1984 would immediately place the DNREC in contempt of court. The agreement was requested by the DNREC.
