

# Lake Forest lifts spending freeze after asking for 5% cuts

The Lake Forest School District will be able to lift a temporary spending freeze imposed after the state of Delaware asked for a 25% return in the energy money allotted to each district. On the other hand, the district will request that each of its cost centers trim '82-'83 spending by 5%. The budget cuts, according to Acting Superintendent Melvin Luff, will make possible a \$100,000 contingency fund to insure the \$90,552 in energy dollars the state wants back will be there. If the weather continues to be mild, Luff said, it might be possible for some of that money to be returned to the cost centers. (Cost centers are the various areas or departments to which the district's discretionary operating funds are allocated. They include, among others, the five schools, the athletics and aquatics programs, administra-

tion, buildings and grounds, and transportation.)

So far this year the district has spent \$251,275.06 of the total of \$423,005 in state and local funds budgeted for energy (electricity, gas and oil). If current projections are accurate, it will lay out an additional \$111,485. That adds up to \$362,760.06 which would leave a \$60,244.94 energy budget surplus. If the estimate proves a reality, the portion of the surplus which represents state funds could be applied against the total to be returned to the state.

The mild winter, according to Luff, has been a saving grace which allows for such an optimistic estimate.

Another factor that may help is a \$20,000 surplus that may crop up in state appropriated, salary dollars. Normally those dollars could go for nothing except salaries. However,

because of its unusual budget request this year, the state is making a one-time exception to the rule.

The Lake Forest School Board Monday night approved the plan to lift the freeze and authorized Luff to ask for the 5% cuts.

The spending freeze on all but the most essential, day-to-day operating costs had been imposed following Governor duPont's request through Finance Secretary T. Dennis Sullivan for a 25% return of state appropriated energy funds from all the school districts. The request was a part of an effort by the state to shrink its estimated budget deficit.

**Revenue Down**  
A revised 82-83 budget submitted by Luff to the board showed the district's revenue predictions down in several areas other than energy. The largest decrease is \$15,000 less than the

projected \$40,000 to be realized as interest on deposited funds.

In addition, swimming pool activity receipts are now estimated at \$12,000 rather than \$14,000, and the district will get \$7,500 instead of \$10,000 in indirect cost reimbursements.

There are some increases in transportation funds, Division III (state equalization) funds and driver education funds expected.

In other financial news the district got word that:

1. The state (through the Deputy Attorney General's office) will pay for the district's long standing legal suit over the leaky roof which crowned the first Lake Forest High School building. That will take care of attorneys. But according to Board President Rick Feutz, \$5,000 in pre trial costs and another \$15,000 to \$20,000 in legal expenses will have to come from

district coffers.

2. Insurance will pay \$12,000 to \$15,000 of the costs in a legal suit brought by former teacher Kevin Dockerty.

3. State Auditor Dennis Greenhouse will perform an audit of the district's finances from July 1, 1981 through at least January 1, 1983. The school board had been under pressure to arrange for such an audit since the resignation of Dr. Edward M. Powell as superintendent.

## Architects Chosen

The board voted approval of the selection of BASCO Associates of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, as architects to plan a district-wide expansion and renovation program. The contract will not be signed until the district is assured of state planning funds (a "guesstimated" \$19,000 - \$20,000). Although the State Board of Education

has approved the planning project, the funds have not as yet been appropriated.

The local board received 17 replies to its advertisement for architects. Seven were interviewed.

The firm selected has served the district in the past in planning. The auditorium, natatorium (pool), sports complex and additional classrooms at the high school as well as expansion at W.T. Chipman in Harrington.

Plans or specifications for the expansion/renovation program will be discussed at the board's April 11 workshop session prior to presentation at a public meeting.

Before the project goes further than the planning stage, the local board must get a certificate of necessity from the state board and then take the proposal to the public via referendum.

## Lake Forest Parents: Articulation may not be clear

Webster (or one of his colleagues in the dictionary crowd) defines *articulation* in one sense as the "act of jointing" and a *joint* as "the place...in which two things...are joined or united." By those definitions and according to a number of parents who attended the Lake Forest School Board meeting Monday night, "the articulation of courses" between the junior high and the senior high may be slightly off in the area of advanced math. Things seem out of joint.

Lake Forest offers junior high students who are capable the option of completing Algebra I in seventh and eighth grades. If they are successful, they can earn a high school math credit (not to be counted toward graduation) and are able to fit in Algebra II, geometry, trigonometry and calculus. However, some parents are not satisfied that the junior high and senior high math programs are in joint. They feel that Algebra I at the junior high school is not necessarily the same thing as Algebra I at the high school. They are not sure that students who complete Algebra I in eighth grade are really ready to cope with Algebra II when they go to ninth grade.

In a brisk discussion of the program it was admitted that some progress in coordinating the math programs between junior high and high had been made over the past year. However, there were still concerns:

-One parent worried that this year's Algebra I students in eighth grade are only halfway through the book three quarters through the year.

-Another wondered why seventh

graders capable of getting right into Algebra had to waste time with pre-algebra.

There were also questions as to texts at the junior high and the criteria for allowing incoming freshman to take Algebra II (passing Algebra I and teacher recommendations).

### Seniors Speak Out

In another area altogether, Senior Class President Valerie Voshell and Vice President Wayne Kelly were very articulate in representing the Class of '83's feelings about cutting the class trip from three to two days.

Miss Voshell said the class had fattened a \$217 treasury to \$8,601 through dues and fund raisers this year. They felt it unfair to penalize the two thirds of the class who stayed in school on an unauthorized and frowned upon "Senior Trip Day" because the other third was absent.

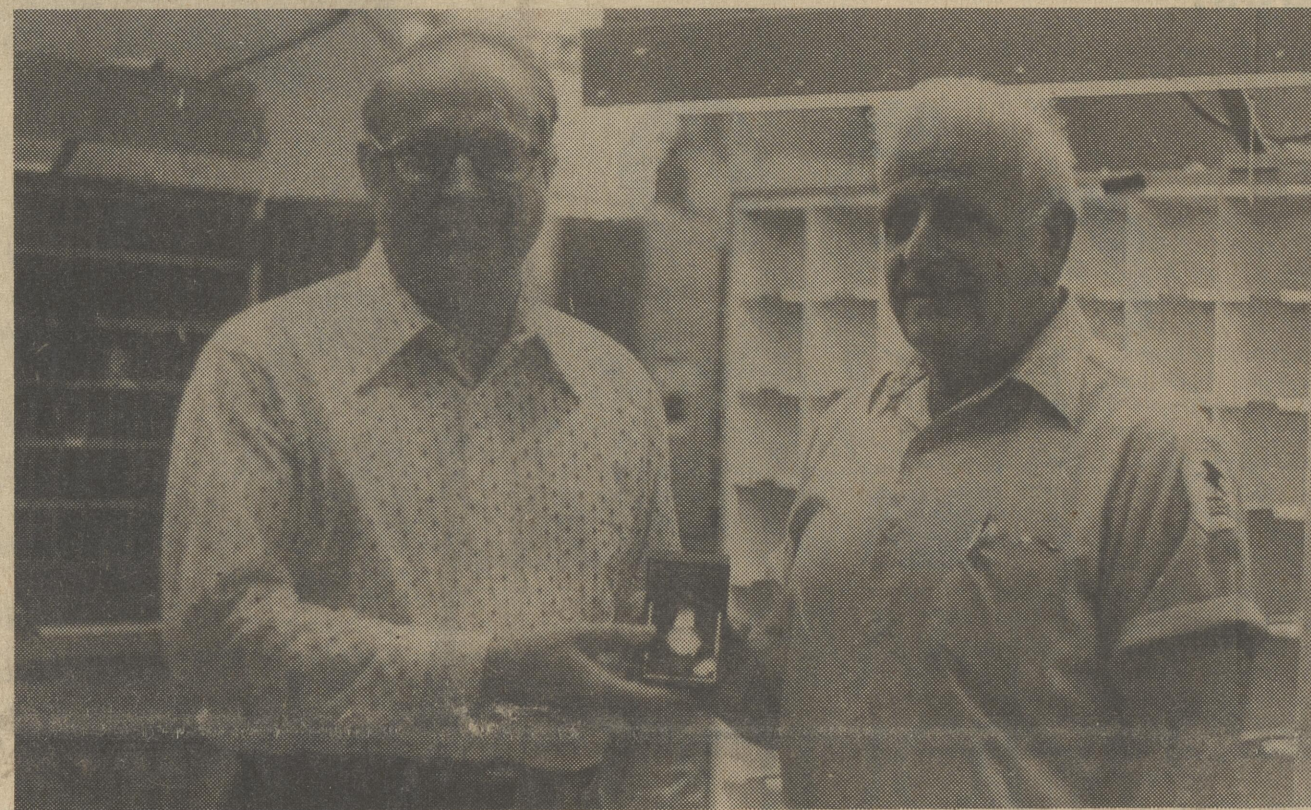
Lake Forest High School Principal Dr. Margaret Phelps said there were other reasons for cutting the trip short

-the health of a senior class advisor, a change in the date from May after exams to April during the first two days of a school week, and the unwillingness of faculty chaperones to go for two nights.

The school board gave permission for the three day trip, but cautioned the class it must have the full one to ten chaperones to student ratio. Otherwise, it's no go.

If the seniors do go, it will be to Mt. Airy Lodge in the Poconos in mid April.

Board members were invited to chaperone. So far none have accepted.

## McGinnis reports on classroom computer use

At Monday's monthly meeting of the Milford School Board, High School Principal Dan McGinnis gave a report on the use of computers in Milford High School. He pointed out that the high school has 24 computers. One is used by the administrative staff for such things as attendance, grade reporting and controlling student schedules.

There are two computers for teacher use. This includes one for the library. The other is used by teachers for grading and test construction. One is available for student guidance.

McGinnis pointed out that with this computer a student can give input such as a course he wishes to follow at college, what tuition range he can afford, the geographical area he would like to study in and any other information he would like.

The computer will feed back all colleges that meet the student's criteria. He can then "talk" to the colleges he selects and receive all the information needed to help him choose a college. The computer will even tell the student what scholarships are available at the colleges of his choice.

The other 20 computers are used for instruction. This includes an after school lab for high school students on Monday through Wednesday and for talented and gifted juniors on Thursday and Fridays.

The biggest use of computers is in the Business Education Department. McGinnis states "with the increased use of computers and word processors by small businesses, it is very important for students to be familiar with computers."

He further pointed out that new computerized industry such as the First Freedom Center in Millsboro are expected to expand in the future. Mr. McGinnis stated that he hoped to acquire another seven computers.

In other business the board regretted the retirement of Alfreda Fountain of the Banneker School. She has been a teacher with the Milford School District for 15 years and is retiring after 39 years of teaching.

Also, retiring is Jim Coverdale of the custodial staff of Ross School. Coverdale had been employed by the district for more than 18 years.

The Banneker School is proud of one

of its fourth graders, Heather Luiken, for being a finalist in the Elks Club National Free Throw Shooting Contest. She received a \$1,000 scholarship in the contest held March 5 on the campus of James Madison University, Harrisonburg, Virginia.

The Board approved the expenditure of \$4,500 for the acquisition of a milk

## Price to retire from Lake Forest Board

Albert Price on Monday night announced a second retirement within a year and a half. On December 16, 1981, Price, of Center St., Harrington, retired after 34 years with the U.S. Postal Service. On July 1, 1983, he will retire as a member of the Lake Forest School Board on which he will have served for fifteen years. He has decided not to seek a fourth term.

His leaving will mark the end of an era for the board. He will be the last board member to have served the entire time since the Lake Forest School district was formed by the consolidation of Harrington, Felton and Frederica in 1969.

Price served on the Harrington School Board for one year before he became a

part of the eleven member board which guided the newly formed district. Over a period of several years that group was whittled down to the present five man board with members serving five year terms.

In announcing his intention not to run again, Price said the decision was made with some "reluctance", but that it was time for "new faces and new ideas". Over the years, he said, there have been a lot of changes in education, "mostly beneficial". He concluded that the Lake Forest District would always remain "near and dear to my heart."

Price's "two retirements" do not really mean retirement for him. Already embarked on a second career in real estate, he is associated with Harrington Realty of Dover.

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# Debbie Roland finishes acting career at Lake Forest

(This is the final article of a three part series on Lake Forest High School's spring play, *The Uninvited*.)

Mr. Curtis Stickel, the director of the spring play at Lake Forest, smiled as he asked me one of his favorite trivia

question: Who is the only person to have performed in every theatrical production held in the Lake Forest auditorium? The answer was obvious -- Debbie Roland -- but I was rather stunned. Will they have to close the auditorium up after she graduates

this June? The auditorium was opened in the fall of 1979. The first play was the following March, and Debbie, a freshman then, had a small speaking part. Since then she has performed in three more major productions and two Christmas productions. This spring's production, *The Uninvited*, will be her last.

"Of course I'll be sad when the play is over. Over the years I've enjoyed not only the acting, but also seeing everything that goes into producing a play from tryouts to final performance," says Debbie.

"It will be hard saying goodbye to her," says Mr. Stickel. "She has done so much both onstage and behind the scenes. She works on the stage crew, helps get props, and works on the make up. But the greatest enjoyment I've had has been seeing her develop her acting talents."

"I like being a ham," Debbie answered when I asked her how she got interested in acting. "It gives me a chance to bring out different parts of my personality. I like to be someone different, too. It's an adventure playing various kinds of people."

What has Debbie gained from her four years in the theatre at Lake Forest? "It has given me confidence in myself. I used to be uncomfortable around others. I didn't like having people looking at me. All that is gone. Acting has been a great experience for me."

She would like to be a professional actress someday, but she is realistic about it. "Because of the fierce competition, I'm not counting on an acting career. But I would like to stay with the theater, maybe in amateur groups."

Another thing saddens Mr. Stickel: the fact that very few people have seen Debbie perform. "Since Lake Forest moved away from musicals seven or eight years ago, attendance has been dismal. There are other reasons for the low attendance, but I think many people in the area are unaware of some real talent right under their noses. It would be a real shame if four or five hundred people didn't see Debbie's last play."

I can't add to that. Last chance, folks. The final performances of *The Uninvited* will be this Friday and Saturday nights at 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

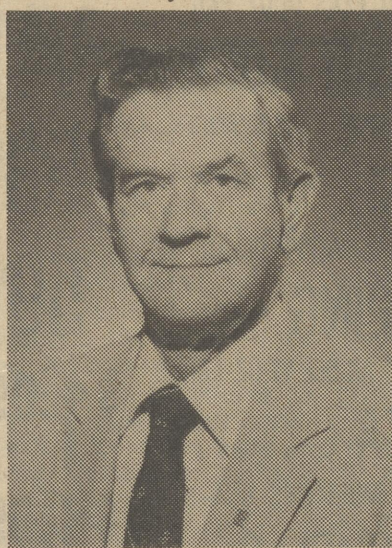

shake machine for the middle school. It was noted that this is the one item that the students really wanted for the cafeteria. It is felt that this would encourage students to finish their meals.

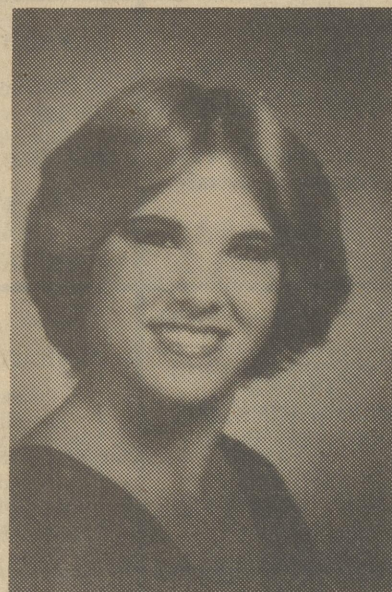

Lake Forest's individual finalists placed as follows:

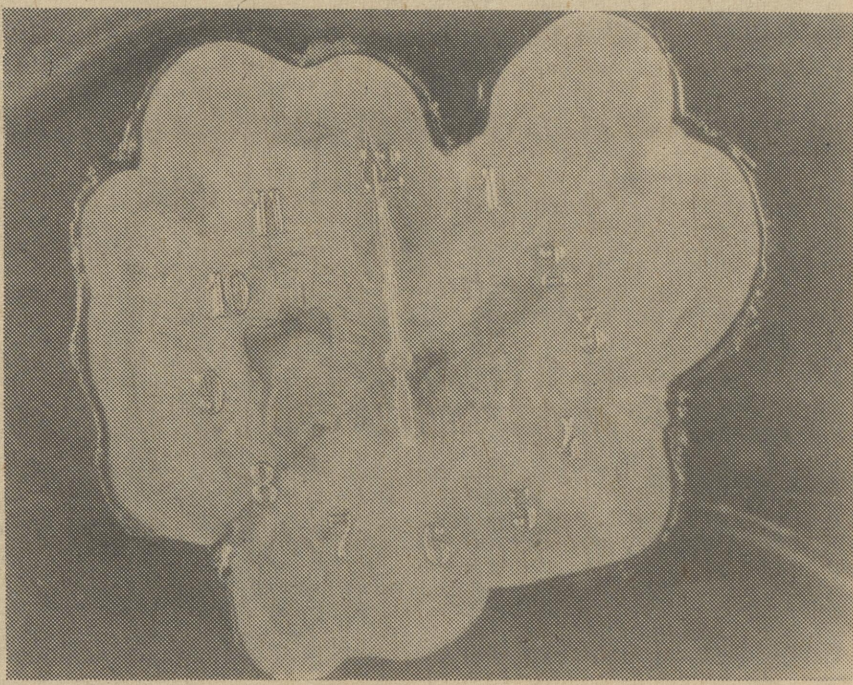

## Hunting and Fishing on Delmarva

 WILDLIFE REFUGE: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service plans to rehabilitate about 2,000 acres of marshlands on the Prime Hook National Wildlife Refuge by using chemicals to control phragmites. The refuge, consisting of 8,817 acres, lies east of Milton.

Nearly 80% of the refuge is classified as wetlands habitat. However, much of this land is dominated by phragmites (giant reed grass). This grass has little value to wildlife and crowds out other native plant species which are valuable as food to animals and bird life in the refuge.

The Refuge Manager Don R. Perkuchin states "Experiments with chemical control of the plant have yielded excellent results." An environmental assessment for the project is being carried out.

Federal Hunting Law: The current session of the U.S. Congress is considering a bill which deals with hunting lands in Alaska, according to information received by the Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife. This may be the first time that Congress has been faced with a direct vote on hunting.

During the past weeks you have been hearing through radio, TV and newspapers about how well recycling of aluminum beverage cans in Delaware is working. You should know that the presenter is a paid employee of ALCOA (Aluminum Co.). They have a conflict of interest. It is not an unbiased presentation; rather it has been lined up by a high-powered, out-of-state advertising agency. In several instances, the ALCOA representative has deliberately given the media data which can not be substantiated.

You should realize that this tactic is part of the beverage industry's program to allow continued littering. These paid publicists want to again thwart the will of a great majority of the citizens who for years have said "we don't want the litter from non-returnable bottles and cans and rising trash disposal costs."

With regard to recycling centers, ALCOA states there are 28 locations in Delaware. Many of these are in

hard-to-reach salvage yards or are in store-based stations which are open only a few hours per week.

As a jogger I find mostly cans rather than bottles along the road side. When the aluminum cans exemption for deposit ends June 30 then we will have 95% recycling of aluminum cans that the companies say they want.

Don't be fooled by ALCOA and the can makers. They want the General Assembly to continue to allow rising trash disposal costs and littering via cans discarded on our yards and fields.

## Matthews gets 5 years for burglary

Troy Matthews, 21, arrested in December after he attempted to break into a Harrington home, was sentenced this month to a five year term in Delaware Correctional Center, Smyrna. There was no word as to the disposition of the case against Lawrence Lee Casson, of Clark's Corner, Harrington, and two juveniles arrested in the same December incident.

All four were originally charged with burglary, second degree, and attempted theft.

## Archbishop to speak at Wesley

Mar Athanasius Y. Samuel, Syrian Orthodox Archbishop of the United States and Canada, will speak at the 1 p.m. Wesley College Chapel Service Wednesday, March 30, on his role in the discovery and preservation of the Dead Sea Scrolls. On August 5, 1947, Archbishop Samuel, then Syrian Orthodox Metropolitan of Jerusalem, acquired what was later determined to be a complete copy of the Book of Isaiah, a commentary on Habakkuk, an Aramaic rewriting of Genesis, and the manual of discipline of the ancient Jewish sect responsible for the Qumran library, generally assumed to be the Essenes.

Archbishop Samuel Exhibited the Dead Sea Scrolls, with accompanying lectures, at such famous institutions as Yale and Harvard universities, the Library of Congress and the Walters

Art Gallery in Baltimore from 1949 until 1954. Archbishop Samuel assumed his current post in 1957.

Born on Christmas Day, 1907, in Hilwah, Syria, Archbishop Samuel received his education at St. Mark's Monastery in Jerusalem and Coptic Theological College in Cairo. In addition to his work on the Dead Sea Scrolls, he worked on the famous manuscript collection at St. Catherine's Monastery in Sinai. From 1939 through 1945, he published a number of works

which included a series of Syriac readers. His translation of the Syrian Church's venerable Liturgy of St. James appeared in 1967 and he published English translations of his church's other rites in 1974. His autobiography, *Treasure of Qumran: My Story of the Dead Sea Scrolls*, appeared in 1966.

Archbishop Samuel's presentation will be in Room 206 of the DuPont College Center. The public is invited.
