Architects Chosen

The board voted approval of the selection of BASCO Associates of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, as architects to plan a district-wide expansion and renovation program. The contract will not be signed until the district is assured of state planning funds (a "guesstimated \$19.000 = \$20,000). Although the State Board of Education

has approved the planning project, the funds have not as yet been appropriated.

The local board received 17 replies to its advertisement for architects. Seven were interviewed

The firm selected has served the district in the past in planning. The auditorium, natatorium (pool), sports complex and additional classrooms at the high school as well as expansion at W.T. Chipman in Harrington.

Plans or specifications for the expansion/renovation program will be discussed at the board's April 11 workshop session prior to presentation at a public meeting.

Before the project goes further than the planning stage, the local board must get a certificate of necessity from the state board and then take the proposal to the public via referendum.

At Monday's monthly meeting of the Milford School Board, High School Principal Dan McGinniss gave a report on the use of computers in Milford High School. He pointed out that the high school has 24 computers. One is used by the administrative staff for such things as attendance, grade reporting and controlling student schedules.

There are two computers for teacher use. This includes one for the library. The other is used by teachers for grading and test construction. One is available for student guidance.

McGinniss pointed out that with this computer a student can give input such as a course he wishes to follow at college, what tuition range he can afford, the geographical area he would like to study in and any other information he would like.

The computer will feed back all colleges that meet the student's criteria. He can then "talk" to the colleges he selects and receive all the information needed to help him choose a college. The computer will even tell the student what scholarships are available at the colleges of his choice.

The other 20 computers are used for of its fourth graders, Heather Luiken. instruction. This includes an after school lab for high school students on Monday through Wednesday and for talented and gifted juniors on Thursday and Fridays.

The biggest use of computers is in the Business Education Department. McGinniss states "with the increased use of computers and word processors by small businesses, it is very important for students to be familiar with computers."

He further pointed out that new computerized industry such as the First Freedom Center in Millsboro are expected to expand in the future. Mr. McGinniss stated that he hoped to acquire another seven computers.

In other business the board regretted the retirement of Alfredia Fountain of the Banneker School. She has been a teacher with the Milford School District for 15 years and is retiring after 39 years of teaching.

Also, retiring is Jim Coverdale of the custodial staff of Ross School. Coverdale had been employed by the district for more than 18 years.


