

Milford Hospital Fair huge success

Milford Memorial Hospital is over \$29,000 richer, thanks to the hard work of scores of volunteer workers and thousands of free-spending area residents who attended the 26th annual Milford Hospital Fair last Saturday.

This year the fair owes its smooth running operation to the efforts of Marilyn Draper, Martha Lee Evans and Marilyn Nelson, the three general chairmen who had organized their booth chairmen and volunteer booth workers with a diamond cutter's precision.

Proceeds from the fair will go toward the purchase of a Computerized Axial Tomographic Scanner (CAT scanner) for the hospital.

The scanner is a highly sophisticated piece of X-Ray equipment. The fair derived its CAT theme this year from the name of the scanner. Official opening ceremonies were held at 10 a.m. and fair activities continued until about 5 p.m.

Before the opening ceremonies there was a ten kilometer race.

The weatherman favored fairgoers with a cloudless sky, steady sunshine and temperatures in the mid-to upper 70's.

The various booths featured books, house plants, needlework, craft demonstrations, food items, T-shirts, pillows, autographed celebrity items, white elephant items and fortune telling among many other offerings in some 30 booths.

The fair provided fun and entertainment for the kids with a bean bag game, farm wagon, fire engine and locomotive rides, a petting zoo, tiny treasures, penny candy, balloons, a ducking tank, mini golf and assorted games.

Both young and old enjoyed continuous entertainment, including music provided by the Milford High

School Band, Milford Senior Center Chorus and Band, and The Journeymen, a Milford rock group, in addition to aerobic dancing and a twirling demonstration given by the Milford Fitness Center and the Diamond State Twirlers respectively.

For those who worked up an appetite there were foods and snacks ranging from hot dogs and hamburgers to pizza and the traditional chicken platter (one-half large frier, potato salad and buttered roll for \$3.25).

Service booths included a free blood pressure check given by the Delaware Department of Public Health and handmade clowns raffled off by the American Cancer Society which had as its theme "Don't Clown Around, Learn About Cancer." This booth had Sylvia Gilmore as its chairman. The Milford Alcohol Awareness Committee distributed free literature and presented a film on alcohol and drug abuse. Water and ambulance service were provided by the Carlisle Fire Company. Other service booths were Abbotts Mill Nature Center and the Delaware Animal Welfare Network (DAWN).

Perhaps the best bargains were offered at the used book booth where this reporter purchased two boxes of books, both hardcover and paperback, containing 42 books and two magazines for only \$4.90.

Just walking around the fair provided many interesting sights and sounds.

For example, if you kept your eyes and ears open you could...see a little girl pet a lamb and gush "ooh, Mommy, is that what they feel like?" ...see her younger brother pet a goat on the back and jump a foot high when the goat turns its head....see a big smile on a little Chinese boy as he bites into a slice of pizza....notice a touch of irony as you walk away from a booth with a handful of literature on alcohol abuse and hear strains of "Roll Out the Barrel" from the Milford High School Band...hear Tad Lynch intoning "I Can't Get No Satisfaction" to the rock fans who have gathered to hear The Journeymen's popular vocalist...see a dimpled little blonde girl savoring a sno-cone....hear and see an elderly couple, holding hands and singing "Home on the Range" along with the group on the

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"All Systems Go!"

In the early morning hours on Saturday, May 21, a new electronic digital switching system will begin serving customers in the Harrington (398) exchange. This cutover will culminate a 6 month and an over \$1.1 million Diamond State Telephone Company modernization program.

"When the over 2200 Harrington telephone subscribers hear the new sounding dial tone it will signal completion of the largest telecommunications project since the present electromechanical switching system was introduced to that community in 1940," said Jim Strickland, Diamond State's Kent County Manager. "Back then," he continued, "it cost us just a little over \$2,500 to introduce dial telephone service to about 165 customers in Harrington."

"The new switching equipment marks the third central office in Delaware to be served by digital technology. This switcheer in effect, a high speed computer with the ability to process over 10,000 calls an hour," Strickland said.

When the Diamond State Telephone technicians deactivate the current central office equipment and fire up the new digital gear a variety of optional custom calling services will become available.

-Call Waiting, which signals you with a "beep" tone when you're already on the phone and someone else is trying to reach you. You simply put the first call "on hold", answer the second call, then return to your initial call without hanging up.

-Call Forwarding, which lets you have your incoming calls transferred automatically to another phone when you're away from yours.

-Three Way Calling, which allows you to add to a third party to a conversation.

-Speed Calling, which lets you dial frequently called numbers by dialing only one or two digits.

"For information concerning these custom calling features just call the Diamond State Telephone Business office," Strickland concluded.

Lotto Jackpot Winner

DOVER, DE - The months during which the Kenton family of Milford celebrates birthdays proved to be the lucky combination which produced the first Delaware Lotto winner. Playing that combination in the third week of the new game won Mrs. Joyce A. Kenton the \$82,715 Jackpot, according to Ralph F. Batch, Delaware Lottery Director.

Batch said the prize will be paid in the form of an 8-year annuity, with the first \$12,715, less federal taxes, paid immediately and subsequent payments of \$10,000 each.

Mrs. Kenton was the only person who bet on 07-05-12-06-04-01 which were the winning numbers drawn during the Lottery WHY? TV-12 telecast on Thursday evening, May 12. Her reason for selecting those numbers, she explained, was that her family celebrates birthdays in January, April, May, June, July and December.

Mrs. Kenton, 39, and her husband, Duane A. Kenton, are the parents of six children -- three boys and three girls -- between the ages of 12 and 21. All are involved in the operation of Kenton Crate and Pallet, Inc., a family business. She is vice president of the firm.

"Since we have wall-to-wall kids, I'm anxious to get a new house," she said explaining her plans for spending her winnings. A native Delawarean, Mr. Kenton is a regular Delaware Lottery player. She has won smaller prizes in the past but said "this is my first big prize." Her winning Lotto ticket was purchased Thursday at Dyers Package Store, Milford.

The Delaware Lotto features a progressive Jackpot that grows each week there is no winner. Players select a combination of six numbers between 1 and 30, and bet \$1 for each two games played. The Jackpot is based on the number of Lotto tickets sold during the week, plus money carried over from previous weeks when there are no Jackpot winners. Batch said the Jackpot for the fourth week of play that will end with the Lotto drawing May 19 is estimated to total at least \$25,000. Delaware Lotto tickets are available from any Delaware Lottery Daily Numbers Agent.

In addition to Mrs. Kenton winning the Jackpot, the May 12 Delaware Lotto drawing produced 152 Second Prize winners of \$47 each, and 2,564 Third Prize winners of \$4 each, Batch noted.

Houston Council Swears in New Councilman and Seeks Advice on Stop Sign

HOUSTON, DE - The Houston Council last Thursday night swore in a new councilman, John Eisenbrey, III. The Council also voted to seek police protection by hiring Delaware State Troopers during their off-duty hours. "They will come in on a regular basis. They will set their own schedule. We want to stop a lot of the speeding going on in the Town as well as a rash of small crimes....I guess you could call them burglaries," said Town Mayor Richard Rollison.

The matter which faced the Council last month concerning stray dogs will be dealt with through the SPCA.

The Mayor also disclosed that he is still awaiting a decision from their attorney concerning the legality of placing the sign back at the corner of Mill and Richardson. The land owner claims the sign was on his property and not in the right of way. The two streets are owned and maintained by the Town of Houston. The State owned streets in the Town are Broad, School and Front. A decision is expected this week concerning the matter. "We want to get the matter resolved before a situation presents itself concerning liability," said Rollison.

Frederica Council Plans to Crack Down on Delinquent Taxes

FREDERICA, DE - At a recent council meeting in the Town of Frederica, it was agreed by the council members that a letter would be sent to all those whose taxes are delinquent "...right up through the present time", said one council member. "In

one case that delinquency goes back several years, and this isn't right. Our taxes are low as it is, and when you look at some of these delinquencies, you get the message that they are just not going to pay them," said one council member. A letter approved by their attorney Nicholas Rodriguez will be sent out in the mail in the very near future.

Harrington Council hears report on sewage plant

The Harrington City Council met in a special session Monday night to hear a report from Betz, Converse, Murdoch, Inc. on the operation of the City's sewage plant. John W. Growshan of the consulting firm reported that from research done, there must be excessive water infiltrating into the sewer lines.

In March the volume of water passing through the sewage plant jumped dramatically. It was suggested that the city meter firms using the sewage facility but having private wells. At the present time such firms pay a flat rate. Systematically repairing old manholes was another suggestion put forth by the consulting firm.

In addressing the problem of the handling of sludge produced by the plant, the mayor, Al Mann, said he hoped he could obtain an amendment to the city's present grant. With the extra funds he would like to see the city purchase a truck and trailer to be used to haul the sludge away. One

proposal is to haul the sludge to the Kent County facility.

The mayor reported that preliminary discussions have already taken place between the city, Kent County officials and the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control. Mayor Mann also hoped to obtain needed laboratory equipment for the sewage plant if the extra funds are forthcoming.

It was pointed out that the city still owes the general contractor, CZ Enterprises, \$47,000 for the construction of the sewage plant. CZ Enterprises is unable to supply a release of lean on some of the equipment installed at the sewage plant. This is because of legal litigation between the contractor and one of the suppliers of equipment, Passavant. The mayor reported that this dispute does not directly involve the city but that he hoped it would soon be settled so that the city can make the final payment.

Two killed from bolt of lightning at Dover Downs

DOVER, DEL - A severe wind and rain storm swept in on Dover Downs with three laps remaining of the NASCAR Mason-Dixon 500. A huge bolt of lightning described by one observer as being approximately a foot in width touched down on the north side of the racing oval in the parking lot between the clubhouse and the stable area hitting nine persons. Two were killed. They were David C. Fowble, 34, and his wife Sandra, 22, of 406 Oak Hill Ct., Westminster, Md.

Five other persons were treated at Kent General Hospital and released. They were as follows: Charles R. Stein, 47, of Crumpton, Md.; Michael D. Stein, 18, of Crumpton, Md.; Benjamin

Welty, 25, of Hemstead, Md.; Sharon C. Smith, 25, of Hemstead, Md.; and Steve S. Eddy, 16, of Seaford. Two others were admitted to the intensive care unit. They were William E. Eddy, 48, of Seaford, and Brian W. Eddy, 14, of Seaford.

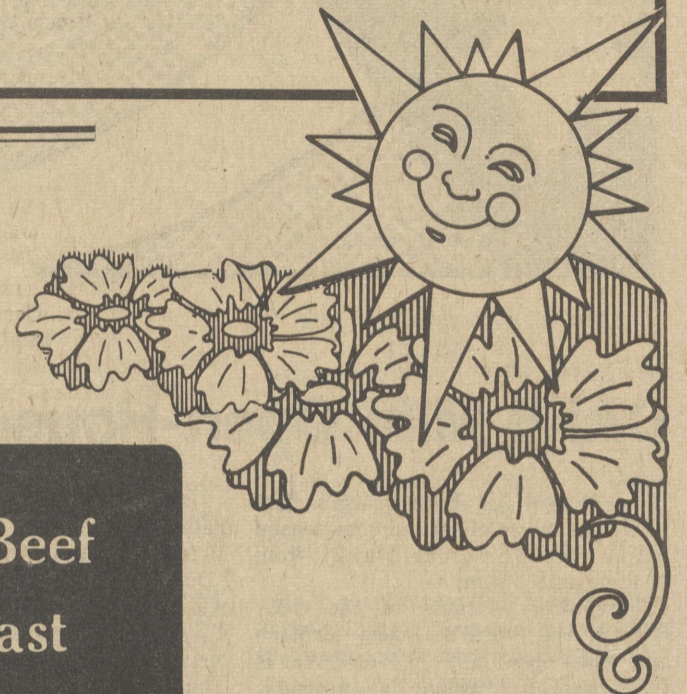

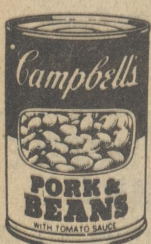

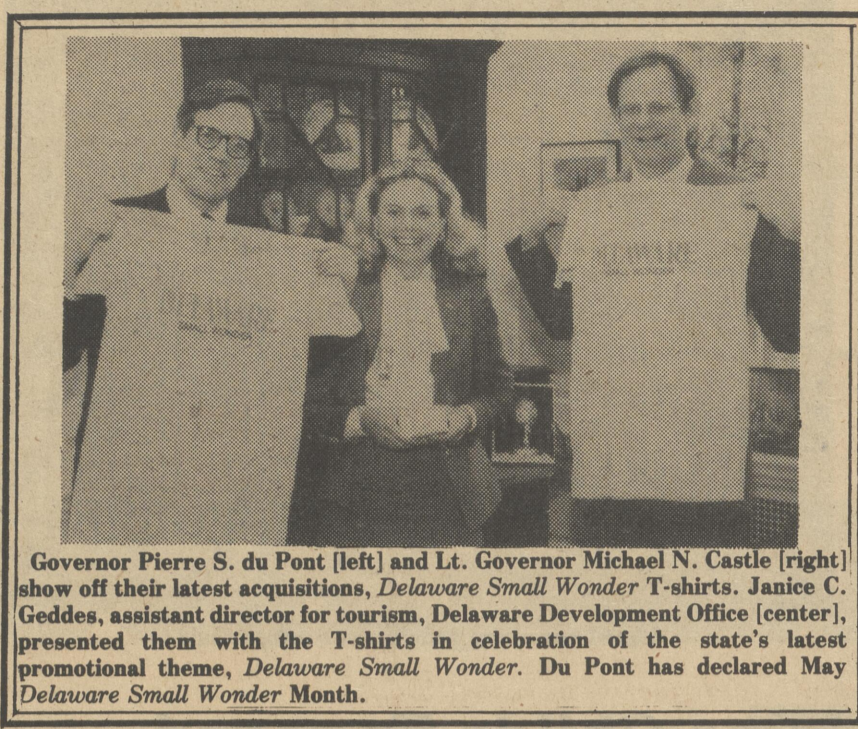

LF boys do well in loop track meet

Lake Forest's boys' track team lost only one dual meet, this spring and continued to do great work as they finished a strong third in the Henlopen Conference Championship meet.

Cape Henlopen was the winner, as expected, but Lake Forest finished only 12 1/2 points behind Dover. But the Spartans had three sprinters sidelined with muscle pulls and one of them, Ralph Taylor, was also a crack, long jumper. Without those injuries, Lake Forest would have been a sure second.

Jim Blades' locals turned in some terrific performances, setting several school records in the process. James Browne was responsible for one of the most amazing showings in Lake Forest athletic history, in any sport. James says he's five feet eight inches tall. He had the second best leap in the high jump, soaring over the bar, placed at a height of 6 feet, 4 1/4 inches, establishing a new Lake Forest mark. The winner Rodney Smith of Cape Henlopen is more than a head taller than Lake Forest's mighty little warrior. A record that is now one of Lake Forest's top standards, is the 400 meter run. Nelson Moseley, a rangy senior, had chopped a full second off the old mark up to a few days ago. In a dual meet, against Cape Henlopen, he lowered the Spartan record again, running 51.46. Friday afternoon he did it again, clocking 50.06, in the qualifying round. Saturday, in the final he finished a close third, after a torrid battle with two Dover Senators and was timed in a swift 50 seconds flat. Moseley has two meets left and just might be the first Spartan to crack the magic 50 second barrier.

Jerome Harris, a junior, set two more school records. Jerome was second in the 110 meter high hurdles, but was so close, he was timed in 14.6 seconds, same as the winner. In the 300 intermediate hurdles, he was second again, in 40.6 seconds. Tony Scott in third, tied the old Lake Forest mark of 40.8. Tony also was fourth in the 110

hurdle race and won the triple jump with a Henlopen Conference record jump of 47 feet, 6 inches.

With four sprinters hurt or otherwise unavailable, Coach Blades' 800 meter relay team finished fifth, but ran 1:32.62, just two hundredths of a second off the Spartan record. This quartet was composed of Jay Harmon, Ralph Young, Darrell Benson and Nelson Moseley. James Browne replaced Moseley and Lake Forest ran 45.2, for fourth, in the 400 meters relay.

Jerry Mosley, Chris Caskey, Sheldon Powell and Daryl Tolson ran 8.34.7, for second place in the 3200 meter relay. Powell did Yeoman work on the third leg, running down a Woodbridge runner who was second at the time. Tolson easily anchored the foursome. Tolson continues to amaze. After an undistinguished career, on the diamond, he switched to track, as a senior and is doing excellent work, at any distance from 400 meters to 800 meters to 1600 meters. With just a few weeks experience, he is beating runners with four, five or more years of competition, under their belts. And we're talking about some of the top runners in lower Delaware, who run cross-country in the fall, then winter track, then spring track.

Daryl was nipped for third place in the open 800 meter run, by a foe, he had beaten earlier. But Tolson ran a full three seconds faster than ever before, close to 2 minutes flat. What a pity Daryl didn't try the running game earlier!

Dan Donovan placed sixth at 1600 meters in 4:51.8. In Friday finals, Rob Prutzman, was the shot put winner with 48 feet, 7 inches. Maurice Parker, a tremendous first-year leaper, did 21 feet, 6 1/2 inches and missed being Henlopen Champ by 1/4 of an inch. Parker holds the Spartan record of 22 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

Other Spartan scorers were Mike Briggs, fifth in the triple jump and Josh Howerin, sixth in the pole vault.

LF girls win Henlopen dual meet title

Jim Blades' Spartan girls' track team had expected to polish off Cape Henlopen with a modicum of trouble, thereby finishing a perfect, dual-meet season.

On the day of the meet, it developed that three, key Spartans would not be competing because of discipline problems. Suddenly the meet loomed a toss-up. Coach Blades gave the girls one of his patented, Kute Rockne-type pep talks. The girls responded with 10 percent plus effort and beat the Vikings 77-55, which was about the same margin prognosticated, if Lake Forest had been at full strength.

Caritha Clarke beat the heretofore best Henlopen Conference 100 meter hurdler, in 15.87. Caritha had been doing 17.5 or so, but picked up the right technique, just in time. Clarke

then triple jumped 35 feet plus to lead a sweep with Pam Smith and Christine Nichols.

Finally, Joann Smith set a new school record of 17 feet, 3 inches to win the long jump, with Clarke, close behind at 16-10. Clarke tallied 13, big points. 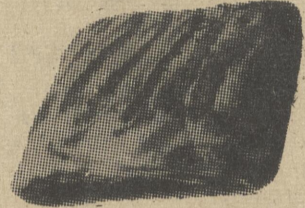

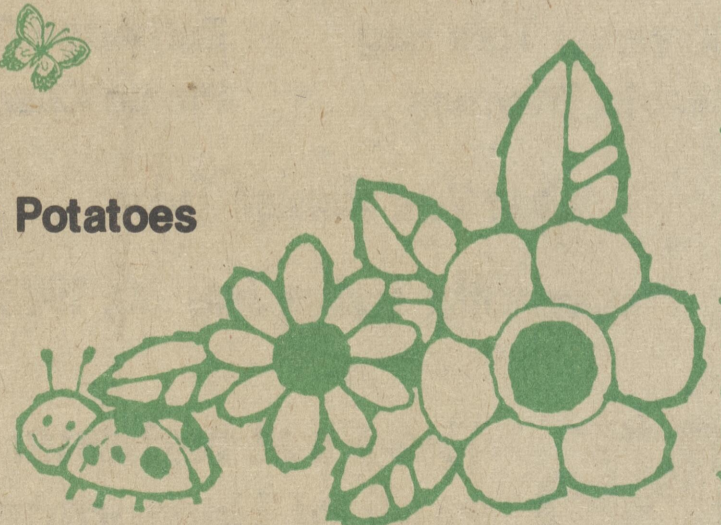
