

Purzycki inspires Lake Forest Grads

Connie Gerardi leads class

Lake Forest High School Stadium, June 5 - Nine and a half years ago this coming fall, after my wife and I had purchased the Harrington Journal, I expanded the coverage of the newspaper into the Woodbridge School District. I remember looking down the lens of my camera one Friday night at a Woodbridge football game. There was Joe Purzycki with his players surrounding him in a kneeling position under the goal post. He had engineered a stellar upset. Coach Purzycki in his freshman year of coaching at Woodbridge had turned an entire sports program around "overnight" and made a winner out of Woodbridge. Also standing alongside me that night were some friends from Caesar Rodney

who were scouting this marvelous leader. The rest on him is history.

This coach, Joe Purzycki, was the same Joseph Purzycki who addressed the 196 members of the 1983 graduating class at Lake Forest High School.

When I looked down my lens Sunday afternoon, I saw the same youthful man I saw 9 1/2 years ago whose enthusiasm for life is still there. He gave a message to the LF graduates with the basic theme being ".....experience and talent are overshadowed by enthusiasm. No matter what you do in life....don't ever underestimate the power of enthusiasm. It transcends mediocrity". As a closing example of his theme he drew on the life of Wilma Rudolph. "A

woman who suffered from many childhood ailments that left one leg paralyzed but who eventually realized her life's dreams of becoming a runner. "She wanted to run....yet from her first race through many more, she lost. She just didn't lose.....she lost miserably. Yet she never let the weak leg daunt her dreams. Her life is history and an inspiration to all because through all the set backs she never gave up. She went to the Olympics representing her country and won several gold medals. Becoming the fastest woman of all time."

Purzycki also urged the graduates to judge people on their merits, "not on race or religion, but on the person....the character of the person." He also urged the graduates

"particularly those who are quick to blame Lake Forest for their problems....are the same ones who will blame society or government for their problems when they take their place in society. You....are now part of that society. It is up to you now to make things work," he added.

The honor addresses were given by Valedictorian Constance Gerardi; Salutatorian Donna Elaine Underwood; third honors by Deanna Lynn Arrington; and fourth honors by Cheryl Lynn Donovan. Miss Gerardi

who was first in a class of 196 pointed out in her address that this class has no specific or traditional roles to follow. "We present America with a unique labor force," she said.

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Bowers launches "Back To Bowers Day"

BOWERS BEACH, DEL. - On Saturday, the townspeople of Bowers launched a new endeavor, which was a reenactment of "Big Thursday" once the big event in this area, when they staged a "Return to Bowers" theme.

The rains came early Saturday morning, which was the 15th straight weekend of rain for this area. The W.T. Chipman Junior High Band paraded despite the rains. Highlight of the day was two shows by country and western singer Freddie Hart, who has had thirteen #1 records to his credit in his illustrious career. Hart played to a full house at each show much to the

pleasure of those in attendance. Hart's biggest record was "Easy Loving" which was written in 1970 and produced in 1971. "Up until that point I had been around show business for about 19 years. I had the bitter with the sweet - but "Easy Loving" really put me on top," said the easy going man from Phoenix City, Alabama. He was one of fifteen children who received only a second grade education. "Easy Loving" sold seven million copies. "Music is in my blood. It is all that I know—and I love it," said the easy going country boy. Hart credited the music and the lyrics with being the most important part of the

success of a song. Hart will release a new single, "My Favorite Entertainer," this July. He has an album coming up soon, too, called The Sacred Album.

Bowers enjoyed "Big Thursday" years ago when oysters could be tonged off the Bowers Inlet. They became the supreme food and main course for "Big Thursday". The disease that killed off the oysters destroyed the annual celebration.

With the fishing industry returning now to Bowers, the townspeople wanted to revive the Bowers celebration. Fred Eubanks headed the organized celebration. Eubanks also

serves as Bowers' Mayor. "The rain hurt us, but when we were unable to secure rides for the children....I think that hurt the most, but we came out okay for the first year. We plan to do it again next year," said Eubanks.

Performing with Freddie Hart were the "Heartbeats" who are Bobby Birkhead (Mo.), Ron Hogan (N.J.), Leland Martin (Mo.), Jimmy Morin (Canada), and Keith Bradford (R.I.)

Hart and the Heartbeats will be looking to do a regular TV show ".....perhaps sometime toward the end of this year." He also might perform more regularly on the Grand Ole Opry.

PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS, more Americans each year are choosing recreational boating as an ideal way to relax with their families and friends. All too often, however, what starts out as a pleasant cruise ends in tragedy because boatmen fail to teach their families to swim, fail to properly equip their craft with life preservers and other protective devices, or fail to instruct their passenger on the use of such devices prior to a boating cruise; and WHEREAS, every year, about 1300 lives are lost in boating accidents. These fatalities can be reduced and

boating made more pleasurable if those who engage in it will emphasize boating safety rules; and WHEREAS, recognizing the need for that emphasis, the Congress, by a joint resolution approved June 4, 1958, has requested the President to proclaim annually the first week in June as National Safe Boating Week. NOW, THEREFORE, I, Alfred G. B. Mann, Mayor of the City of Harrington, Delaware, do hereby designate the week beginning June 5, 1983 as

Felton man charged with assault on child

Delaware State Police from Troop 3, Camden, Monday, May 1, 1983, arrested Louis E. Dill, 24, of the Flying Dutchman Mobile Home Park, Felton, Delaware, on one count of first degree assault. The arrest culminated a two month investigation by state police detectives and the State Attorney General's Office dealing with injuries sustained by Shauna R. Larimore, 1, of R.D. 2, Box 160B, Dover, Delaware.

On Friday, April 1st, Shauna's mother, Gloria A. Larimore, 22, returned home from work at 10:15 p.m. The child had been left with Mrs. Larimore's boyfriend Louis Dill. Mrs. Larimore was told by Mr. Dill that Shauna was "very sick". The mother went to the child's bed to find Shauna unresponsive. Gloria Larimore took Shauna to the Kent General Hospital

where the child was examined and diagnosed as suffering from cerebral bleeding. Shauna was transferred by a Delaware State Police helicopter to the Delaware Division Hospital in Wilmington early on the morning of Saturday, April 2nd. The child was treated within the hospital until

Friday, May 27th, when she was released. Shauna Larimore remained in the custody of her grandmother, Connie Condron, also of Box 160B, Dover. Hospital personnel advised Mrs. Larimore that Shauna suffered neurological impairment. The impairment may be permanent and may affect the child's eyesight.

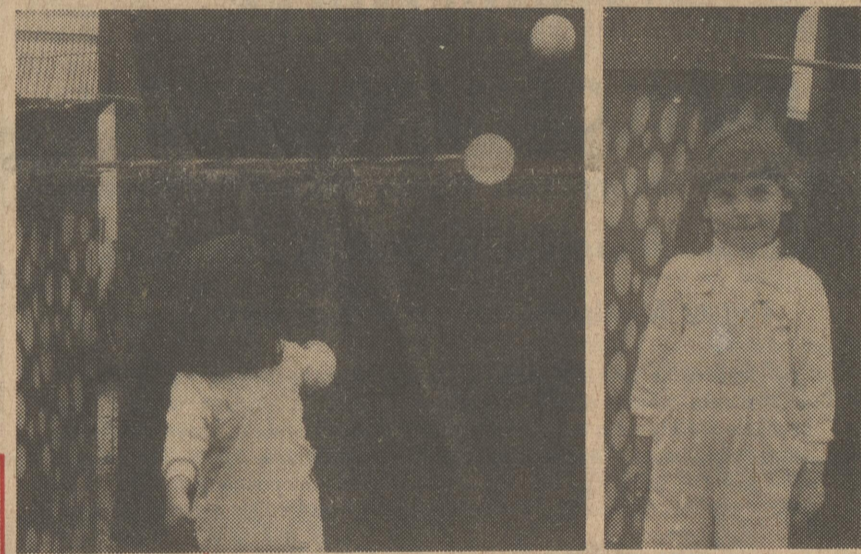
Louis Dill was arraigned at Magistrate Court 7, Dover, and released on a secured bond of \$10,000.

Prince George's Chapel reopens

On Saturday, May 28th, the Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs opened Prince George's Chapel to the many summer visitors it attracts. Located near Dagsboro on State Route 26, eleven miles west of Bethany Beach, Prince George's is a popular stop for vacationers en route to area beach resorts.

Built in 1757, the Anglican chapel's interior remains largely intact. It is a unique translation of English design for masonry into wood, the only available material in the area at that time. A handsome vaulted ceiling of heart-pine, paneled box pews and pine pillars are among the unpainted and unadorned features.

Of further interest is General John

Dagsworthy's burial place beneath the chapel floor. Dagsworthy became a brigadier general of the Sussex County militia during the Revolutionary War and was responsible for the overland transport of munitions to Maryland during the British blockade of the Chesapeake.

Prince George's is open without charge on weekends through Labor Day. The hours for touring the chapel on Saturday are 10 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. and on Sunday from 1:30 until 4:30 p.m.

DEC granted rate increase

In accordance with a decision rendered by the Public Service Commission this month, the Delaware Electric Cooperative was granted the opportunity to earn approximately \$1 million in increased annual revenue. As a result, the typical customer's electric rate will increase about 4.5%.

This case was rather unique in that the increased revenues granted the Co-op were more than offset by reductions in the D.E.C.'s purchased power costs (the price DP&L charges

the Co-op for the electricity it buys). Therefore, the final rates approved by the PSC were actually lower than the rates in effect at the time the Co-op applied for rate relief in October of 1982. The combined effect of decreasing power costs and the Co-op's rate increase meant a decrease in the average customer's bill of about 80 cents per month.

This month, the Commission

The course will run for eight mornings - Monday through Thursdays - ending on Thursday, June 23.

The course will be taught by Mrs. Eunice Craig who has had much experience in teaching the skill. This will be the same speed reading course taught in July on campus at the University of Delaware for the Summer Youth program. One exception is that the course in Dover offers the students twenty-four hours of instruction in contrast to the eighteen hours offered to the New Castle County youth.

Learning this skill is an important tool for the college-bound high school student. Emphasis will be placed on study skills, and with practice on the student's part, he should be able to cut his study time in half. This is not a remedial reading course.

Blood Bank seeks donations for new building

The membership of Blood Bank of Delaware has been given a challenge that provides extra incentive in the Blood Bank's building campaign. The Longwood Foundation has made a pledge of \$250,000 to the fund with one provision - that contributions from all other sources total at least \$1 million. Once that figure is reached, the Longwood Foundation will make their gift which will take the Blood Bank very near its \$1.6 million goal. The Blood Bank initiated its first ever capital fund campaign in January to build a statewide blood center. The Bank has projected that by 1985, with blood use by Delawareans continuing to rise, its present leased facilities near Newark will be inadequate to meet the demand. The new blood center will be constructed on land donated to the

campaign by the Welfare Foundation. It will be located near Stanton across from the Wilmington Medical Center's new Southwest Division hospital and adjacent to Blue Cross and Blue Shield's Health Maintenance Organization. All of the blood for every hospital in the state will be tested and processed at the new facility. A massive mail campaign is underway to reach all of the Blood Bank's 136,000 member families. Each will be informed of the need and asked to make a donation to the fund to ensure an adequate future supply of blood. The "Investment in Living" campaign is a broad based program that will extend to every Blood Bank member - individuals and groups as well as corporations and foundations. "The response so far has been very

encouraging," according to Kenneth N. Edwards the Blood Bank's Executive Director. "In addition to the challenge grant from Longwood Foundation, Welfare Foundation has pledged \$50,000 and five acres of prime land. The Blood Bank's Board and staff have committed over \$100,000. If each member makes a tax deductible contribution and if Delaware businesses support the program, we will be able to reach our goal," said Edwards. It is expected that groundbreaking for the new blood center will take place early next year and the building completed in 1985. Blood Bank of Delaware is a non-profit, statewide organization which provides all the blood needed for every health care facility in the state of Delaware.

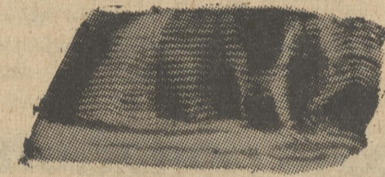

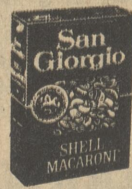

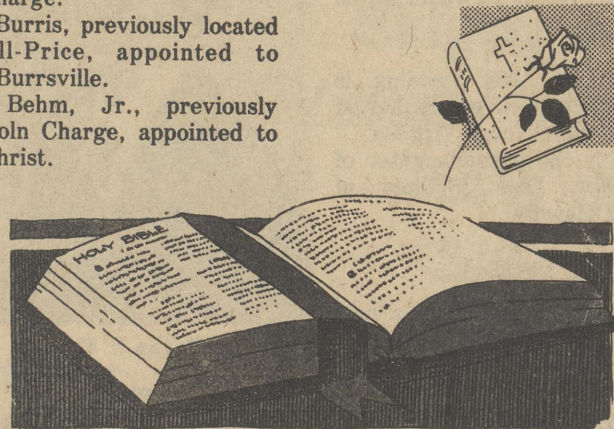

Charlie Baker ready to take on the "Monster Mile"

DOVER, DE - When the big rigs come rumbling into Dover Downs International Speedway for the Trucker's Big Rig "200", June 19, they will be led by the all-time winner in truck racing, Charlie Baker. The event will mark the first time the massive trucks will race on the one-mile superspeedway.

Glen Garnsey enters the Hall of Fame

Glen Garnsey, one of harness racing's premier trainer/drivers, will be inducted into the United States Harness Writers Living Hall of Fame on July 3 at the organization's annual dinner at the Hall of Fame of the Trotter in Goshen. He becomes the 33rd person to be honored at the sport's shrine, joining a legendary group of men whose names are famous in Standardbred history.

A native of Clayton, New York, who now lives in Lake Worth, Florida, Glen Garnsey got his start working for his father, Garland, who raced primarily in upstate New York. It was at Vernon Downs where young Garnsey excelled as a raceway competitor before focusing on the development of Grand Circuit-calibre horses. He has developed two Horses of the Year, Abercrombie (1978) and Fan Hanover (1981), in addition to such stars as Colonial Charm, Noble Florie, Incredible Nevele, and Bruce Gimble. In 1982, Garnsey campaigned three horses who were recognized as the best in their respective divisions: Fan Hanover (Aged Pacing Mare of the Year), Armbo Blush (Two Year Old Trotting Filly), and Delmegan (Aged Trotting Mare), as well as Armbo Aussie, who in a race posted a 1:51.4 winning time, second fastest in harness racing history.

Another highlight of the Hall of Fame dinner, the ninth to be held under the tents on the Museum lawn, will be the recognition of a group of Immortals elected to the Hall by the institution's

board of trustees. In addition, there'll be the "crowning of the champion" of the Billings Classic amateur trotting championship, the series of races that began the end of March and extended over tracks in eastern United States and Canada. The final, at Goshen's Historic Track, will be one of the features of Grand Circuit Day, July 3rd.

A reception party, beginning at 5 p.m., will precede the Hall of Fame dinner an hour later. Following the dinner ceremonies, a harness racing film festival is to be held in the Museum's large theater/gallery. Reservations for the evening may be made by contacting the Hall of Fame of the Trotter.

Cam Fella selected May Harness Horse of the Month

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Cam Fella, 1982's Harness Horse of the Year but a mild disappointment coming into May, regained much of his championship form during the past month. His feats earned him selection as the United States Trotting Association's Horse of the Month.

A four-year-old son of Most Happy Fella-Nan Cam owned by Norman Clements and Norman Faulkner of Ontario in partnership with JEF's Standardbred Country Club of New Jersey, Cam Fella won two out of his first six starts this year, performing well but not with the tenacity that marked his campaign of last season. But his three outings in May, all in the World Cup Series at The Meadows, saw "The Pacing Machine" return to top form.

In the first leg of the World Cup on

May 12, Cam Fella finished third after being saddled with post 13 in a bulky field. Cam posted a game head victory in the 2 1/2-mile second leg the next week. In the final leg he paced a 1:55 mile despite a sloppy track, defeating the world's best free-for-all pacers on both occasions.

In earning selection as Horse of the Month, Cam Fella becomes only the second horse to take the title twice since its inception in January, 1981. Fan Hanover was selected in July and September of 1981 en route to her election as Horse of the Year.

Honorable mention goes to last month's Horse of the Month, Trim The Tree, who was undefeated against the top three-year-old pacers and was the winner of the \$202,000 Windy City Pace at Chicago's Maywood Park.

I remember early on in the relationship with my wife when she took me to visit her grandfather, who she referred to with unbelievable affection as granddaddy. He was in his 90's then, still spry and still very much a gentleman...very kind, honest and sincere.

In my first meeting with him he prided himself in being a cowboy. Now here we were in the Blue Ridge Mountains far from Texas to be sure. As an eastern shore boy I associated cowboys with the west, and the Blue Ridge Mountains were not that far west. Still I was caught by his story. "I once spent three weeks in the saddle. It rained for three weeks. The creeks got high and the Shenandoah overflowed its banks. We were three weeks rounding up strays," he said.

Her grandfather with just a couple year of formal education didn't let that stop him. He became a trusted farm manager for those large estates in northern Virginia. Some had 5000 acres.....so I guess he was a cowboy in his own right.

Another cowboy visited Delaware on Saturday night. He slipped into Bowers and gave two performances. He was country and western singer Freddie Hart. A thirteen time winner of the #1 record, countless written songs, friend of the Grand Ole Opry as well as many other stars of stage and screen.

Although he wasn't a real cowboy, he had an air of honesty, sincerity and genuineness about him that marked him for that "cowboy category".

Hart is such a peaceful man and very low key that his expression of

appreciation and thanks to some can be misunderstood. He came from a family of 15 children on Phoenix City, Alabama where his father was a share cropper. He received only two years of formal education. By the time he was 14 years old he was in the U.S. Army fighting on Iwo Jima and other South Pacific Islands. Following the service he worked his way west singing songs - always with his music. In 1952 he began recording songs about the same time as his good friend Marty Robbins, who passed away recently. "It has been a long road, and there has been the bitter with the sweet. But...it's my life. I love it. It's all that I know," said the very personable song writer and singer.

He said that he thought what made his songs like "Easy Loving" so successful was because "...it came along at the right time. It was what every man wanted to say and every woman wanted to hear."

In his early life, his mother was to play a very important role in the future of her son Freddie. "She gave me the strength I would need later to persevere in this business (show business). She believed in me...really believed in me, which gave me a tremendous amount of confidence. You just have to keep believing in yourself and God. My mother encouraged me to go on," he said.

With all that he still epitomizes all that I associate with being a cowboy...even though he isn't in every sense of the word. But there is one more ingredient about him that puts him in close association with the people of Bowers. He, like them, is the salt of the earth. Freddie Hart appeared to be right at home in Bowers on Saturday night. The reason was that he was in fact right at home.
