School Board Vice President George Wallace Caulk, was seriously injured in an accident on U.S. 113 Tuesday, August 16, 1983.

Delaware State Police from Troop 3, Dover, are investigating the accident involving two farm tractors and a tractor trailer. The accident occurred on the northbound lane of the Frederica Bridge on U.S. 113 approximately two miles south of Little Heaven.

Terry Caulk was transported to Kent General Hospital by Delaware Sate Police helicopter where he was treated for bruised lungs, a severe upper right leg laceration, a fractured wrist and possible abdominal injuries. He was admitted to the intensive care

updated hospital report on Terry Caulk's physical condition shows that he is improving and was upgraded to serious from critical on Wednesday. He has been removed from intensive care

Douglas Huffstatler was treated for hypothermia and released.

Frederica Fire Company ambulance transported Huffstatler to Kent General Hospital and fire company volunteers assisted with traffic control. Normal traffic flow was resumed on after tow trucks were finally able to remove the wreckage of two farm tractors, a hay baler, a farm wagon, numerous bales of hay and a loaded tractor trailer. Traffic was detoured through Frederica for at least four hours.

Charges against the tractor trailer operator, Elias Gingerich, are still pending the physical recovery of the accident victim, Terry Caulk. Alcohol was not a factor in this accident.

Quillen holds fundraiser at Fairgrounds

HARRINGTON, DE - The State Grange Building at the Delaware State Fair was the venue for a political fundraiser last Friday evening. For \$7.50, potential supporters and voters were treated to fried chicken, clam chowder a la Gagne, all the fixings and their choice of either iced tea or draft beer. This was the start of a campaign that will end on election day 1984. The candidate's name is Quillen, and he is running for state office.

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This Quillen is far more well known locally than the one from the other side of the canal running for a statewide office. G. Robert Quillen, State Representative of the 30th District, held his first fundraising event in a bid for a second term. More commonly known as Bobby to his many friends, he even lists his name in the phone directory under G. Bobby.

More than 175 people showed up to help Quillen kick off his campaign, including State Republican Committeeman Frank DiMondi; Kent County Comptroller Joe Raymond; Kent County Register of Wills Sandra Dean and State Treasurer Janet Rzewnicki.

Quillen has spent most of his adult life one way or another involved in politics. He spent 12 years in the Kent County Active Young Republicans, serving that organization as Vice President.

First elected as a State Representative in 1966, he served three terms before deciding not to seek re-election. He made an unsuccessful bid for the State Senate in 1974. In 1967 Quillen felt that lower Delaware did not have adequate representation in state-wide offices and announced as a candidate for the Republican nomination for U.S. Representative. Pete duPont won the party's nomination and went on to win the election.

Quillen has been employed as the Harrington City Manager and was later elected as a City Councilman. In 1982 he decided to try and regain his old seat as a State Representative. He won his seat back by one of the largest majorities of any succesful Republican candidates in a predominantly Democrat year.

"I deal with people as individuals and deal with them accordingly," Quillen said of his 1982 success. Quillen does not ask a person his party affiliation before trying to help him. His easy going and friendly personality has the people.

5% cuts help Lake Forest balance 84 budget

When it came to planning the fiscal 1984 budget for Lake forest Schools, Assistant Superintendent Melvin Luff (acting superintendent at the time) asked the various cost centers to hold the line on spending at the amount appropriated last year. But it turned out that holding the line was not enough to balance the budget. Luff then went back to the cost center managers and asked them to cut their requests by five percent. As a result of their compliance, he was able to present a second draft budget that was balanced. Last Monday night, the Lake Forest Board of Education adopted

that budget. The total 83-84 budget as detailed by Luff comes to \$8,684,820. But the biggest portion of that is represented by the state mandated portion of teachers' salaries and other items over which the local school board has no control.

In a detailed account of the budgeting process Luff explained to the school board and for the benefit of the public that the district is divided into sixteen Lake Forest's eleventh grade on the test. But a number of district educators cost centers, each with its own budget. have been just as disgruntled over the For example, each of the schools is a cost center; the aquatics and athletic departments are cost centers. Although most of the cost centers took cuts for the coming year, there was one notable exception. Lake Forest in the throes of a five year curriculum revision, and new textbooks in the language arts areas were scheduled for purchase. The money for the texts will remain in place, even though the original request submitted by Dr. Arthur Gilbert, who supervises curriculum planning, was scaled down by 5%. Gilbert said he could save the money in the area of postage and freight.

A young man with a dream sits at home in Milford, but his heart is in Nashville.

"While waiting for royalties I've worked at just about every place in Milford," he laughed.

He's earned money as a factory orker, lifeguard, su man and has even tried his hand as a commercial fisherman. Dalious has packed a lot of living experiences into his 27 years. The sheet music for "Roll Along," one of his latest, was published by Countrywine Publishing Co., and recorded for Majestic Records by Pat Callaway and Carol Stone.

On his album "Too Hot to Handle," also recorded for K-Ark Records, he is backed up by such country music legens as Vassar Clements on fiddle, Doug Jernigan on steel guitar and Leo Jackson, who does all the studio work for Alabama, on guitar.





Bowers Maritime Museum seeks help by David F. Coady

Helen Achtenberg, a board member of the Bowers Beach Maritime Museum, has asked the Kent County Levy Court for exemption from the county sewer charges. The museum first requested an exemption in a letter sent in January 1981 but this request was denied. The museum is a non-profit organization and the only funds it receives is from private individuals.

Kent County was originally responsible for obtaining the federal grant to purchase property for the establishment of the museum in 1976. The museum has been relying on private donations for its operation ever since. A \$268.33 sewer bill is owed by the museum to the County.

Those results, made public earlier this summer in what Lake Forest school board member James Gussett last week called "A media event", show Lake Forest and Cape Henlopen virtually tied when the average scores for students in grades one through six are averaged. Between the two there is less than one tenth of one percent difference. Taken to the nearest tenth of a percent, the scores for both districts come out at 63.8. The expanded scores give Cape a .005%

Lake Forest and Cape are closely followed by Indian River, Brandywine, Appoquinamink, Milford, Seaford, Smyrna, Caesar Rodney and Christiana. All eight districts were ten points or more above the national norm or

[NOTE: That national average is 50. The numbers here represent a national percentile score. A score of 63.8, for example, shows that district elementary students are doing better than 63.8% of the nation's elementary students. The score is not a percent of right or wrong answers on a test.]

When the scores are taken grade by grade, Lake Forest first and fourth graders were number one in the state by the 1983 C.A.T. comparison.

Although it is impossible to compare scores across grade levels, it is true that the district's first graders have the second highest score for the battery of tests comprising the C.A.T. of any grade level anywhere in the state. Their average score was 68.3. The only one higher was the 70.7 recorded by the second graders in the Indian River school district. The local first graders exceeded those in other districts by 1.4% more.

Lake Forest fourth graders, at 62.0 were 1.1% ahead of the nearest other district. (In both the first and fourth grades, that nearest competitor was Cape Henlopen.)

Local students in the seventh through tenth grades continued the district and the statewide trend which showed Delaware students in all content areas and at all grade levels to be above the national average. (Lake Forest ninth and tenth graders took the C.A.T. this year even though it is not required statewide in those two grades. Results for Lake Forest ninth and tenth graders are available locally, but there are no statewide figures for comparison.)

In contrast to their younger counterparts, Lake Forest's 1983 juniors dropped below the national average, showing a 48.3 percentile rank on the C.A.T. total battery. In fact, they were one of only three classes statewide dropping below the national average. (New Castle County

were the other two.)

Some of that furor was evident in a discussion of the district C.A.T. scores at the Lake Forest Board of Education meeting on August 15.

However, superintendent Lysik said the scores, while revealing some weaknesses, also indicate that "...much is going quite nicely at Lake Forest." North Elementary principal Frank Young pointed out the top scores of the students in the first six grades.

A variety of ways of looking at the cat numbers were contained in a report presented by Dr. Arthur Gilbert, C.A.T. coordinator for Lake Forest. In part of the report Gilbert traced the progress of the grades (regular students only) over the five years the C.A.T. has been given. There have been some fluctuations, but for the most part, Lake Forest students have improved on the test as they have proceeded from grade to grade.

This year's fifth grader (who have dent Gerald Lysik about the proposed taken the test every year since they were in first grade) have shown the most progress, gaining 14.5 points over the time period. Six, seventh and eighth grades also showed better than a 10 point gain over the five years. Even this year's eleventh grade showed a 1.4 point improvement over

the last year it took the test (in 1980) and a total of 4.3 points since 1979 (the first year the test was given). Only this past year's fourth graders showed an overall dip (.5%) over the four years they have taken the test. BUT those are the same students who led the state's fourth grades on the 1983 test. Better than 80% of those fourth grade students (again using figures for regular students only) have scored above the national average for

the four years. Another way of looking at the figures is tracing the percentage of regular students who have scored higher than the national average. Over the long haul, these percentages increased with each class from year to year up through 1982.

This past year saw a drop in that percentage at all grade levels except the third and the eleventh.

Board member Rick Feutz suggested the top might reflect the general upheaveal in the district with the loss of a superintendent over the past year. High School Principal Dr. Margaret Phelps said teachers in the English classes had continued to prepare students for the C.A.T. by using the booklet. "Scoring High on the California Achievement Test." This year's ninth and tenth grade scores went up, she said.

The new budget leaves a slim \$17,000 in contingency funds for the district. In other business, the Lake Forest **Board of Education:**

•adopted a new promotion policy calling for 19 credits for graduation by 1986 and discussed this past year's California Achievement Test results (see future stories).

•heard from Lake Forest Superinten-

According to Dr. Phelps, Lake Forest's top students are scoring high at all grade levels and even this past year's eleventh grade stayed above the national average when figures for special education students are eliminated. (State comparisons are based on averages for both regular and special ed students.)

Board member Roberta O'Neal said that attitude may be a big factor behind the dramatic drop in the C.A.T. scores by eleventh grade. She also pointed out that elementary students (who generally score higher) are largely in a self-contained situation, getting pretty much the same thing. As students get into high school, their courses of study become much more varied.
