

Tractor/truck collision injures Frederica youth

Terry Caulk, son of Lake Forest School Board Vice President George Wallace Caulk, was seriously injured in an accident on U.S. 113 Tuesday, August 16, 1983.

Delaware State Police from Troop 3, Dover, are investigating the accident involving two farm tractors and a tractor trailer. The accident occurred on the northbound lane of the Frederica Bridge on U.S. 113 approximately two miles south of Little Heaven.

Elias B. Gingerich, 56, of 120 Martin Road, Meyerstown, PA was operating a

1961 Mack tractor trailer loaded with potatoes across the bridge when he became temporarily distracted and failed to observe a slow-moving farm tractor directly in front of him, pulling a wagon load of hay. The tractor was being operated by Terry Caulk, 16, of R.D. 1, Box 470, Frederica, Delaware and a passenger, Douglas R. Huffstatter, 16, of R.D. 1, Box 38, Frederica, Delaware was riding on top of the hay bales.

A second farm tractor operated by Terry's father, George Wallace Caulk, 42, of R.D. 1, Box 470, Frederica, Del.

was traveling immediately in front of Terry Caulk's tractor. The second tractor was pulling a hay baler.

The tractor trailer struck the hay wagon being pulled by the first tractor and drove it into the second tractor. The truck tractor then veered to the left, bounced off of the retaining wall and swerved back into the right lane of U.S. 113, northbound, pinning the first tractor between the truck and the retaining wall.

The passenger on top of the hay, Douglas Huffstatter, was thrown over the guard rail and into the Murderkill

River. The operator of the tractor was pinned underneath the tractor and had to wait approximately 45 minutes until wreckers could lift the tractor off his legs to facilitate extrication.

Neither the operator of the truck nor the operator of the second tractor were injured.

Terry Caulk was transported to Kent General Hospital by Delaware State Police helicopter where he was treated for bruised lungs, a severe upper right leg laceration, a fractured wrist and possible abdominal injuries. He was admitted to the intensive care

unit at Kent General Hospital. An updated hospital report on Terry Caulk's physical condition shows that he is improving and was upgraded to serious from critical on Wednesday. He has been removed from intensive care and is improving.

Douglas Huffstatter was treated for hypothermia and released.

Frederica Fire Company ambulance transported Huffstatter to Kent General Hospital and fire company volunteers assisted with traffic control. Normal traffic flow was resumed on

U.S. 113 at approximately midnight after tow trucks were finally able to remove the wreckage of two farm tractors, a hay baler, a farm wagon, numerous bales of hay and a loaded tractor trailer. Traffic was detoured through Frederica for at least four hours.

Charges against the tractor trailer operator, Elias Gingerich, are still pending the physical recovery of the accident victim, Terry Caulk.

Alcohol was not a factor in this accident.

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Quillen holds fundraiser at Fairgrounds

HARRINGTON, DE - The State Grange Building at the Delaware State Fair was the venue for a political fundraiser last Friday evening. For \$7.50, potential supporters and voters were treated to fried chicken, clam chowder a la Gagne, all the fixings and their choice of either iced tea or draft beer. This was the start of a campaign that will end on election day 1984. The candidate's name is Quillen, and he is running for state office.

This Quillen is far more well known locally than the one from the other side of the canal running for a statewide office. G. Robert Quillen, State Representative of the 30th District, held his first fundraising event in a bid for a second term. More commonly known as Bobby to his many friends, he even lists his name in the phone directory under G. Bobby.

More than 175 people showed up to help Quillen kick off his campaign, including State Republican Committeeman Frank DiMondi; Kent County Comptroller Joe Raymond; Kent County Register of Wills Sandra Dean and State Treasurer Janet Rzewnicki.



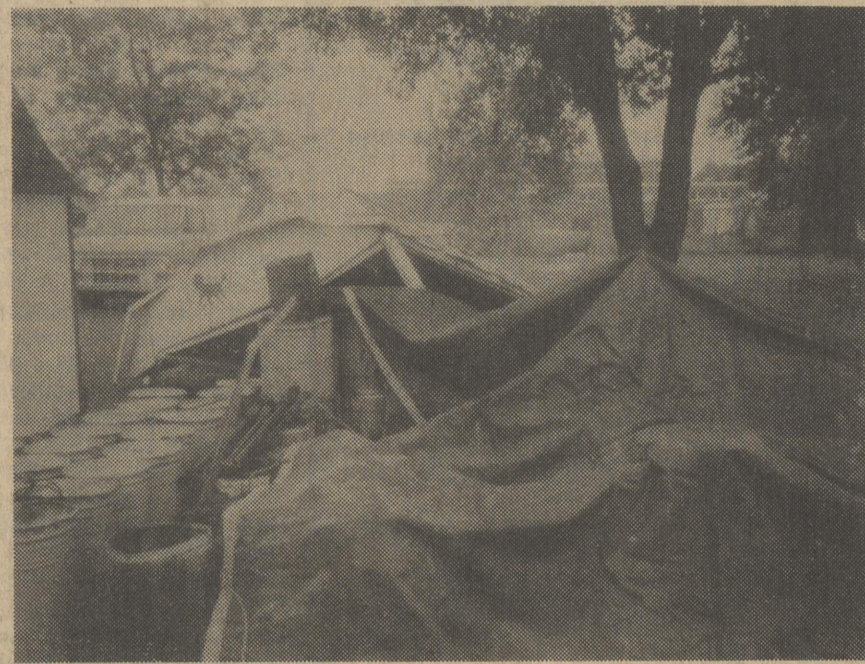

Quillen has spent most of his adult life one way or another involved in politics. He spent 12 years in the Kent County Active Young Republicans, serving that organization as Vice President.

First elected as a State Representative in 1966, he served three terms before deciding not to seek re-election. He made an unsuccessful bid for the State Senate in 1974. In 1967 Quillen felt that lower Delaware did not have adequate representation in state-wide offices and announced as a candidate for the Republican nomination for U.S. Representative. Pete duPont won the party's nomination and went on to win the election.

Quillen has been employed as the Harrington City Manager and was later elected as a City Councilman. In 1982 he decided to try and regain his old seat as a State Representative. He won his seat back by one of the largest majorities of any successful Republican candidates in a predominantly Democrat year.

"I deal with people as individuals and deal with them accordingly," Quillen said of his 1982 success. Quillen does not ask a person his party affiliation before trying to help him. His easy going and friendly personality has made him a popular representative of the people.

Local 1st & 4th graders No. 1 as Lake Forest /Cape elementary students lead C.A.T. parade

The results of the 1983 California Achievement Tests given in the spring indicate that Lake Forest and Cape Henlopen students in the elementary grades lead the parade in comparison with thirteen other public school districts statewide.

Those results, made public earlier this summer in what Lake Forest school board member James Gussett last week called "A media event", show Lake Forest and Cape Henlopen virtually tied when the average scores for students in grades one through six are averaged. Between the two there is less than one tenth of one percent difference. Taken to the nearest tenth of a percent, the scores for both districts come out at 63.8. The expanded scores give Cape a .005% edge.

Lake Forest and Cape are closely followed by Indian River, Brandywine, Appoquinamink, Milford, Seaford, Smyrna, Caesar Rodney and Christina. All eight districts were ten points or more above the national norm or average.

[NOTE: That national average is 50. The numbers here represent a national percentile score. A score of 63.8, for example, shows that district elementary students are doing better than 63.8% of the nation's elementary students. The score is not a percent of right or wrong answers on a test.]

When the scores are taken grade by grade, Lake Forest first and fourth graders were number one in the state by the 1983 C.A.T. comparison.

Although it is impossible to compare scores across grade levels, it is true that the district's first graders have the second highest score for the battery of tests comprising the C.A.T. of any grade level anywhere in the state. Their average score was 68.3. The only one higher was the 70.7 recorded by the second graders in the Indian River school district. The local first graders exceeded those in other districts by 1.4% more.

Lake Forest fourth graders, at 62.0 were 1.1% ahead of the nearest other district. (In both the first and fourth grades, that nearest competitor was Cape Henlopen.)

Country music singer dreams big

A young man with a dream sits at home in Milford, but his heart is in Nashville.

Country music singer and composer Lenny Dalious, a 27-year-old Milford native, dreams of the day he puts together that happy combination of notes that constitutes a hit record.

Dalious, now singing under the stage name of "Lenny Dallas," already has three singles and an album to his credit.

"I've been interested in country music since I was 11," Dalious said, "But it's only in the past year-and-a-half I've tried to do anything professionally."

In addition to singing and composing, he also plays the drums, piano and guitar.

He has written over 70 songs, including "I Love You Son," which he recorded as a single for K-Ark Records under the name "Lenny Dee." He also sang and wrote the flip side "Crazy Me."

When another performer named "Dee" objected to his using that name, Dalious and his Nashville producer decided to go with the performing name of "Lenny Dallas." He signs his own name to the mounting pile of song titles.

The sheet music for "Roll Along," one of his latest, was published by Countrywine Publishing Co., and recorded for Majestic Records by Pat Callaway and Carol Stone.

On his album "Too Hot to Handle," also recorded for K-Ark Records, he is backed up by such country music legends as Vassar Clements on fiddle, Doug Jernigan on steel guitar and Leo Jackson, who does all the studio work for Alabama, on guitar.

The three singles have been released in Texas and contract negotiations are underway to release the singles along with the album nationally.

To publicize the recordings, Dalious has made appearances in clubs in Baton Rouge, La., Houston, Dallas and Nashville, in addition to numerous radio interviews.

"I can't wait to get back to Nashville, I'd like to hit the road again and start making appearances," Dalious said. While waiting for contract negotiations to be completed, he keeps himself busy at the piano banging out new songs.

But, like all of us, he still has to put bread on the table.

He has a wife and a 5-year-old boy, Lenny Jack, by a previous marriage.

The versatility he has shown in the music world carries over into other areas of his life.

"While waiting for royalties I've worked at just about every place in Milford," he laughed.

He's earned money as a factory worker, lifeguard, subscription salesman and has even tried his hand as a commercial fisherman.

Dalious has packed a lot of living experiences into his 27 years.

"I want to have as many experiences as I can, so I can tell my boy, this one is good and that one is bad," he said philosophically.

He joined the Army at 15 and served five months until Army officials discovered he was under age.

"They kicked me out when they found out how old I was," he laughed, "But they gave me an honorable discharge. I also got my G.E.D. while I was in."

The business brain behind Dalious is his 34-year-old brother and manager Bill Dalious.

Bill spoke proudly of his "kid" brother Lenny.

"Bobby Harden originally wrote 'Today All Over Again,' for a male vocalist," Bill said. "Then Reba McEntire got hold of it and she sold a million-and-a-half copies. Bobby was thinking of making it himself, but when he heard Lenny's version of it, he said no one could do it any better. We wanted to make a single of it, but our producer had other plans."

Bill has an unwavering devotion to his brother's career and complete confidence in Lenny's future success.

He told of Leo Jackson, the great guitarist, telling him, "Your brother Lenny really sings the hell out of a song."

A modest, unassuming young man, Lenny turns into an electrifying

5% cuts help Lake Forest balance 84 budget

When it came to planning the fiscal 1984 budget for Lake Forest Schools, Assistant Superintendent Melvin Luff (acting superintendent at the time) asked the various cost centers to hold the line on spending at the amount appropriated last year. But it turned out that holding the line was not enough to balance the budget. Luff then went back to the cost center managers and asked them to cut their requests by five percent. As a result of their compliance, he was able to present a second draft budget that was balanced. Last Monday night, the Lake Forest Board of Education adopted that budget.

The total 83-84 budget as detailed by Luff comes to \$8,684,820. But the biggest portion of that is represented by the state mandated portion of teachers' salaries and other items over which the local school board has no control.

In a detailed account of the budgeting process Luff explained to the school board and for the benefit of the public that the district is divided into sixteen cost centers, each with its own budget. For example, each of the schools is a cost center; the aquatics and athletic departments are cost centers.

Although most of the cost centers took cuts for the coming year, there was one notable exception. Lake Forest in the throes of a five year curriculum revision, and new textbooks in the language arts areas were scheduled for purchase. The money for the texts will remain in place, even though the original request submitted by Dr. Arthur Gilbert, who supervises curriculum planning, was scaled down by 5%. Gilbert said he could save the money in the area of postage and freight.

The new budget leaves a slim \$17,000 in contingency funds for the district.

In other business, the Lake Forest Board of Education:

- adopted a new promotion policy calling for 19 credits for graduation by 1986 and discussed this past year's California Achievement Test results (see future stories).
- heard from Lake Forest Superintendent Gerald Lysik about the proposed

Besides the Public Hearing, also cancelled was a Special Session of City Council called to discuss the renting of property at 110 Center Street for a new City and a Workshops Session called to discuss the new city budget.

Bowers Maritime Museum seeks help

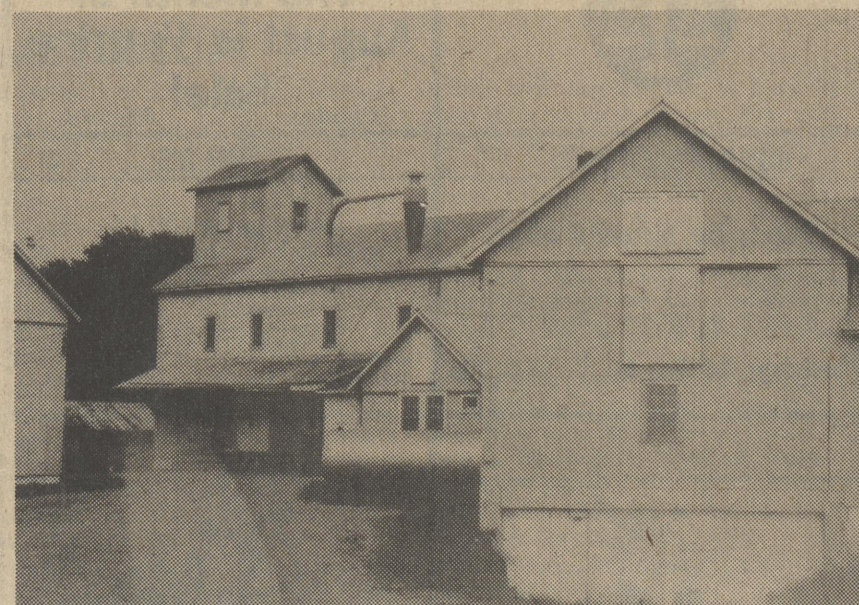

Helen Achtenberg, a board member of the Bowers Beach Maritime Museum, has asked the Kent County Levy Court for exemption from the county sewer charges. The museum first requested an exemption in a letter sent in January 1981 but this request was denied. The museum is a non-profit organization and the only funds it receives is from private individuals.

Kent County was originally responsible for obtaining the federal grant to purchase property for the establishment of the museum in 1976. The museum has been relying on private donations for its operation ever since. A \$268.33 sewer bill is owed by the museum to the County.

district task force on education. Lysik said at least a dozen phone calls from persons interested in the task force have been received. More are encouraged to call the district office at 398-3244 for information. The task force is preparing for a September organizational meeting, and Lysik hoped the group would be ready for a general report by December. Students will be invited to participate.

•heard that the audit reviewing the district's finances has been completed as far as the field work in the schools is concerned. But the state agency conducting the audit insists that no report be made to the public until its final report is complete (in two months) and the district has had a chance to make a response to its recommendations (three more months). Thus, it would be five more months before any results could be made known. This is the audit requested by the board after

public pressure following the registration of Dr. Edward Powell as superintendent.

•approved the educational specifications for the proposed renovation and expansion program in the district and voted to resubmit an application to the state for planning money. The first application was turned down, but the state's Department of Public Instruction has encouraged Lake Forest to reapply.

•gave qualified, one year approval to handbooks for the district's language arts and foreign language curriculums and approval to the vocational agricultural curriculum handbook. Science, physical education, industrial arts, home arts and aquatics are up for review this year.

•hired R. Dixon Shahan to teach science at the W.T. Chipman Junior School, Bonnie Maris as basic skills teacher at Chipman, Kathy Razzano as special education teacher at Lake

Forest South Elementary, Elneta Tatman Harrington as internal suspension aide at the high school and Grace Wanda Quillen as internal suspension aide at the junior high.

•approved the following coaching assignments for the fall sports season: **Varsity Football** - Jim Fleming, with assistants Bill Falasco, Chester Scott and Fred Duffy; **Freshman Football** - Tom Shaffer; **Cross Country** - Jim Blades; **Soccer** - Dave Buck; **JV Field Hockey** - Judy Berry; **Soccer Cheerleader - Advisor** - Doris Moffett; **Football Cheerleader Advisor** - Sheryl Ford; **Chipman Football** - Steve Vansant and Mike Smith. At the superintendent's request, the suggested appointment of Dave Adams as varsity hockey coach was tabled. Adams is athletic director. Still unfiled was the coaching position for the JV hockey team. No mention was made of the Chipman hockey or cross country programs.

According to Dr. Phelps, Lake Forest's top students are scoring high at all grade levels and even this past year's eleventh grade stayed above the national average when figures for special education students are eliminated. (State comparisons are based on averages for both regular and special ed students.)

Board member Roberta O'Neal said that attitude may be a big factor behind the dramatic drop in the C.A.T. scores by eleventh grade. She also pointed out that elementary students (who generally score higher) are largely in a self-contained situation, getting pretty much the same thing. As students get into high school, their courses of study become much more varied.

The Delaware State Police 46th recruit class held their graduation exercises on Tuesday evening, August 9, 1983, at 7:00 p.m. in the Humanities Building at Delaware State College in Dover. Trooper Bruce Von Goerres, from Harrington, graduated with high honors.

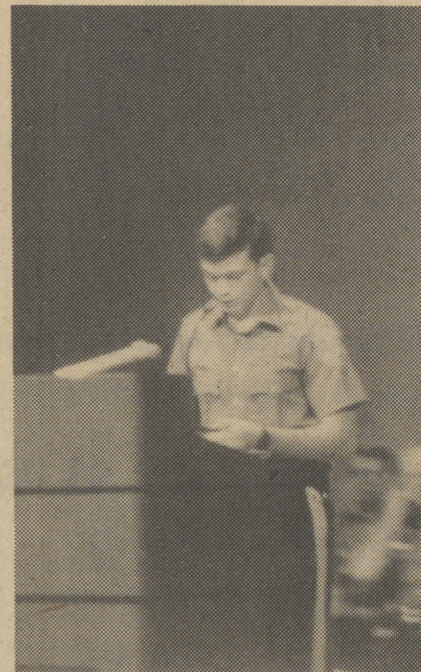
Presenting the awards was Lieutenant Paul F. Donahue, Ordnance Officer at the Delaware State Police Academy in Dover. Von Goerres received the "Outstanding Performance in Firearms and Weapons" and qualified as an expert. The highest GPA (Grade Point Average) was also maintained by Trooper Von Goerres during the six-month training period at the Academy.

The Governor's "Outstanding Recruit Trooper" Award went to Trooper Wayne H. Warren from Lewes, Del.

Graduation marks the final step in a six month process which began for this class back in February. Delaware State Police recruits spend three months in the Academy undergoing intensive physical and academic training and then an additional three months is spent in the field training program where the recruits rotate among specially trained field training officers who are able to evaluate their progress and fine-tune the skills most necessary to function as effective police officers.

A statistical overview of the class includes the following points of interest. There were originally 31 members hired on January 31, 1983. Two members were assigned directly to the F.T.O. program after a two week preparatory class due to the fact that they had already gone through the Academy as municipal police recruits at some point in the past.

The original class includes four females and six minority males. As far as geographical breakdown, six of the recruits were hired from Kent County, eight from Sussex County and

seventeen from New Castle County.

In terms of physical attributes, the average age of the class if 24 years old, with an average height of 5'9" and an average weight of 147.4 pounds. An interesting side note to these statistics include an observation that prior to the Division's affirmative action hiring policy, minimum physical standards

included that all state police applicants be at least 5'10" tall and weigh at least 150 pounds.

Academically, the average recruit has 14.46 years of education. Of the original class, ten recruits had Bachelor's degrees and fourteen held associate degrees. The class has .5 years prior police experience and .89 years prior military experience.

The class is much better racially and sexually balanced and by in large, represents a good cross-section of the work force in Delaware.

Superintendent Lysik said that it may also be true that there are many more "look alikes" in educational achievement in the primary grades. But just as physical growth (both in pace and potential) differs greatly as young people mature, so the gap between the educational ability and achievement of different individuals widens as they grow older.

Meanwhile, just as Delaware students have learned to spell C.A.T. with finesse, the State Board of Education has chosen a new and reportedly longer and more difficult test for next year. Instead of taking a C.A.T. in 1984, students will be measured by the California Test of Basic Skills which will be purchased by the state board from the California Test Bureau-McGraw Hill. In addition to reading, spelling, language arts and reference skills, the new test will cover social studies and science achievement.

Winterthur in Odessa to hold open house

ODESSA, DE - Winterthur in Odessa will hold an Open House from Saturday, September 3, through Labor Day, September 5. Two 18th-century historic house museums are featured for the occasion. All activities are offered free of charge throughout the three-day period.

Originally owned by the prominent townsman William Corbit, who operated a tannery on the banks of the Appoquinimink Creek, the Corbit-Sharp House was built between 1772 and 1774. This handsome Georgian home remained in the Corbit family until 1938. At that time it was purchased by H. Rodney Sharp who restored it and in 1958, donated it to the Henry Francis du Pont Winterthur Museum. Numerous objects which have descended through the Corbit family furnish the home. Also displayed are many objects made by

local craftsmen.
Next door to the Corbit-Sharp House is the Wilson-Warner House built in 1769 by William Corbit's brother-in-law, David Wilson. A special exhibit "Cabinets and Coffins: The Janvier Family of Cantwell's Bridge" is featured in this 18th-century Georgian home through September 25. The exhibit highlights the social and cultural history of Odessa, formerly Cantwell's Bridge, where the John Janvier family of cabinet and coffinmakers made and sold their products.

Winterthur in Odessa is located east of the junction of Routes 13 and 299, halfway between Wilmington and Dover, Delaware. Open House hours: Saturday, September 3, 10:430 p.m.; Sunday, September 4, and Labor Day, September 5, 1:430 p.m. Information (302) 378-2681.

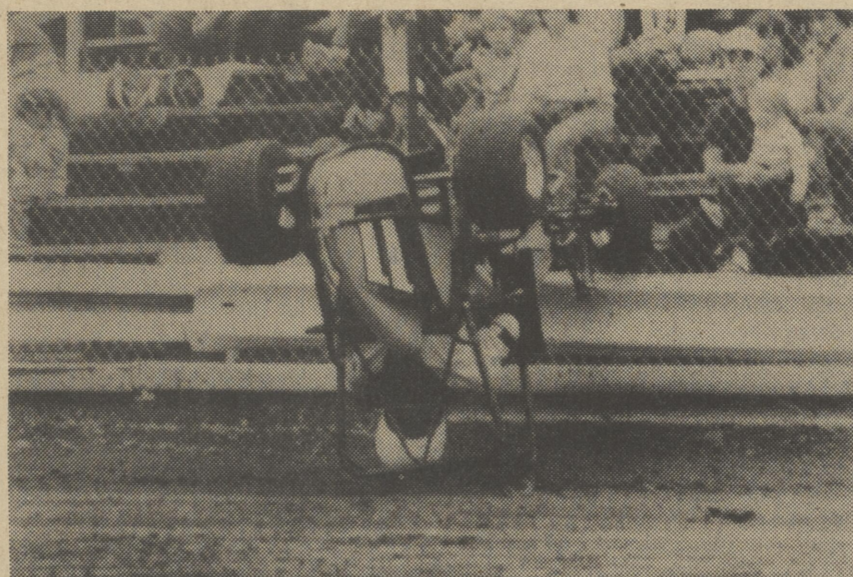

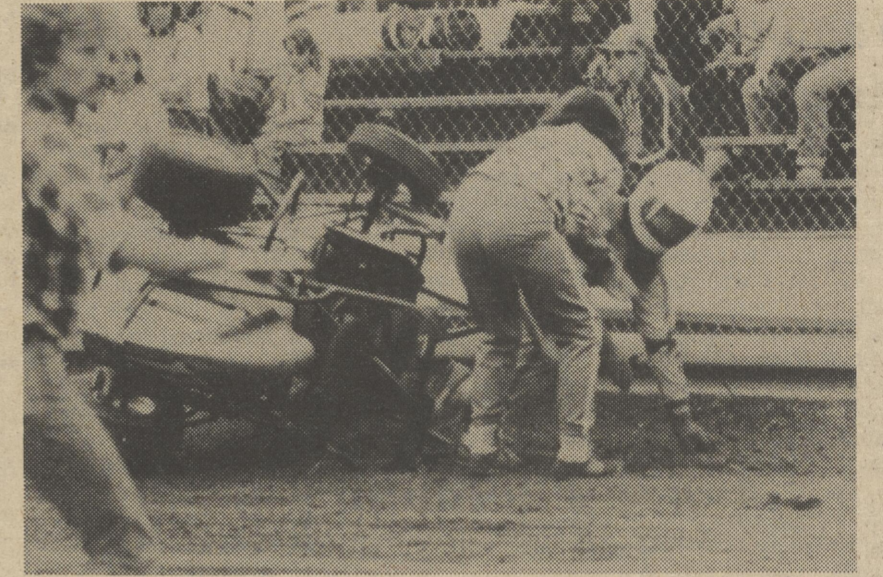
