## Touch of Country No. 2 in Country Music Championships

Touch of Country, the dynamic local country-rock music group, collects trophies like a hippy collects fleas.

The four-piece group recently returned from Kings Dominion with \$500 and the second place trophy after competing with the best country music groups on the east coast.

The final round of competition in the East Coast Country Music Championships was held at Kings Dominion September 25.

Over 40 of the top groups on the east coast had entered the competition.

There were four days of preliminaries at which the final eight contestants were selected.

After winning \$300 and the second place trophy in their preliminary round September 17, Touch of Country was called back for the finals.

Contestants had to be recommended by local radio stations in their geographic areas.

Dennis Hazzard, well-known disc jockey and program director at WAFL,

submitted the names of Touch of Country.

The group had already won the Country Music Talent Competition at this year's Delaware State Fair. In addition to winning the first place trophy at the State Fair, the group was awarded \$250 and six hours of recording time to cut a demo (demonstration) tape at Birch Studio in Secretary, Md.

All four members of the group are local men.

Terry McCready of Farmington is on bass guitar; Dean McNew of Dover is on lead guitar; Terry Porter of Felton on drums and Ray Millman of Laurel doubles as rhythm guitarist and lead singer.

"We didn't expect to get anything at Kings Dominion. We were really surprised," said McCready.

High and Dry, an eight piece band from Staunton, Va. was the choice of the seven judges for the first place trophy and the \$1,000 grand prize.

"They were really great. We don't

feel bad losing to them. We beat out the team that beat us in the preliminaries. That made us feel good. When that band was announced as third-place winner in the finals, we figured we didn't stand a chance. Then when they announced us as second-place winner, man, I'm telling you, we ran up to the stage. We were really thrilled," laughed McCready.

Each band was allotted a half-hour to play at least four numbers. Touch of Country played seven songs, including Ray Millman's original composition "Goin' Huntin' on Saturday Nights."

"Only two groups had original songs, and we were one of them," said McCready.

Two Virginia radio stations requested copies of the demo tape after it is made.

"A lady, I can't think of her name, wants to publish Ray Millman's song," McCready added.

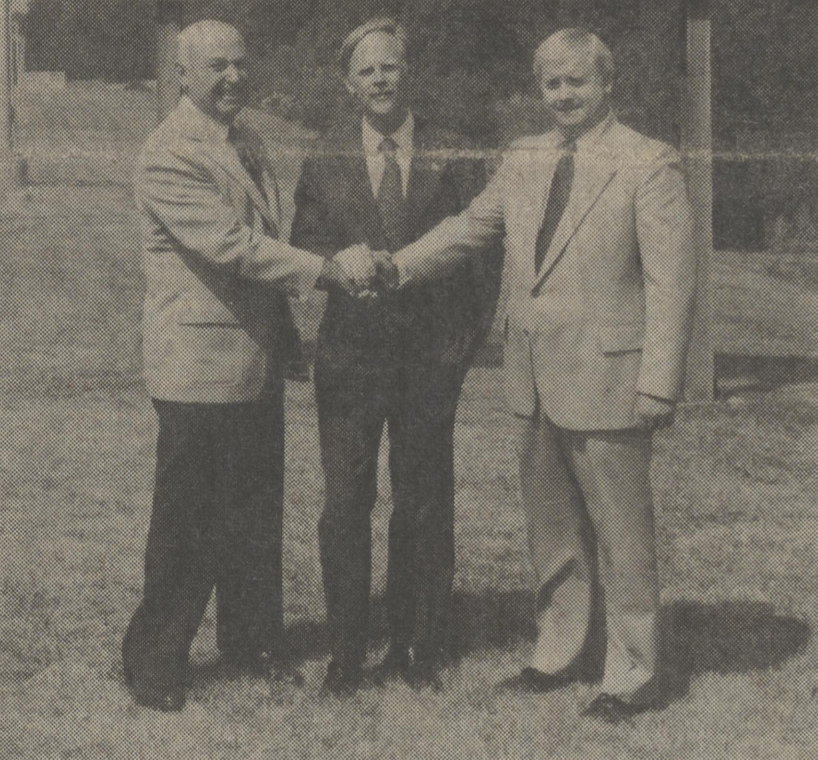

### Work to begin on sinkholes in Felton

At Monday's monthly meeting of the Felton Town Council, Mayor William Myers reported that he was still unable to settle the question of when the necessary repairs would be made to the streets from damage caused when the county installed the new sewer system. The work was done by Suburban Utilities under contract to Kent County Levy Court. Council has complained in the past to both Levy Court and the contractor about sinkholes in the road and damage done to shade trees.

Levy Court had originally obtained a grant from the Environmental Protection Agency and the State of Delaware for the sewer system. County Engineer John Mogan states that he has given the contractor until

October 15 to start the necessary work to replace the temporary patches with permanent patches. It is the temporary patches that have caused the sinkholes. The contractor will have 30 days to complete the work. Mogan says he believes that the contractor will do the work because the county still holds a final payment in excess of \$100,000 due the contractor when the work is finished to the satisfaction of Levy Court.

In other business council voted to send a letter to Conrail requesting the warning lights be installed on the rail crossing at Sewell Street. Councilman George Egler said that, especially when crops are in the field, it is almost impossible to see oncoming trains.

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### Frederica man killed in bicycle/pick-up collision

FREDERICA, DE - At approximately 7:30 p.m. on Monday evening, Robert Cunningham, 25, of 23 David Street in Frederica was killed when the bicycle on which he was riding was hit head on by a 1977 Datsun pick-up driven by Robert O. Givens, 36, of 156 Laurel Drive in Frederica.

The bicyclist was west bound on County Route 18 approximately seven tenths of a mile east of Little Heaven. The driver of the pick-up truck, Robert O. Givens, was eastbound. The bicycle and the pick-up truck collided head on. The bicyclist was ejected from the bicycle, was thrown over the hood and cab of the pick-up landing in the bed

part of the pick-up. The pick-up travelled another 141 feet before coming to a stop.

The bicyclist was transported to Kent General Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival by Dr. Jones from multiple head trauma. There was no evidence of alcohol

involved in the accident, and there will be no prosecution according to the Delaware State Police of the operator of the pick-up.

The accident marks the 89th fatality over Delaware highways for 1983 as compared to 99 for the same period last year.

### Harrington Councilmen's terms of office

In last week's front page story "Know Your Councilman", I stated that due to a technicality, Councilman Curtis Melvin's term of office has been extended by a year. This was due to confusion on my part between the various drafts of the new City Charter. In the original draft all councilmen would have stood for election this coming January. Two

councilmen would have been elected for one-year terms, two for two-year terms and two for three-year terms.

This procedure would have been similar to what the State Senate did in 1982 due to reapportionment. The Attorney General ruled that because of reapportionment the entire senate had to stand for election because they could

not represent an area where their name did not appear on the ballot. Because the new City Charter contained a section which dealt with

re-districting in the city, the council felt this might apply in their case. The City Council was informed that this ruling did not apply to municipal elections. For this reason the plan was

scrapped and the councilmen continued with their original terms of office.

The expiration of terms are as follows: January 1984 - Raymond Gagne and Donald Jarrell; January 1985 - Richard Henry and Curtis Melvin; January 1986 - Jack Wyatt and Daniel Coleman. Mayor Al Mann's term of office expires January 1985.

### Federal funds available to municipalities

DOVER: Kent County Levy Court held a Public Hearing on September 27 to explain to local governments and residents the availability of federal funds. In an effort to assist county residents, Michael Thompson was on hand to explain how to apply for funds from the Delaware Community Development Block Grant Program (formerly HUD Small Cities Block Grant Program). Thompson stated that

the following are eligible activities for the program:

- A. Acquire real property and dispose of it.
- B. Clear, demolish structures of people who are of low or moderate income.
- C. Rehabilitate housing of low or moderate income.
- D. Rehabilitate renter-occupied or absentee owner housing so long as the absentee owner puts up 25% of the cost of rehabilitation.

E. Carry out code enforcement in the community.

- F. Can build community facilities such as senior centers, recreation facilities.
- G. Construct and repair utilities in target areas (low to moderate income people).
- H. These funds can be used to match other federal grants.
- I. Remove architectural barriers.
- J. Planning and design of the administration of the grant program.

Thompson stated that he hopes that the citizens of Kent County would be willing to share with his office the types of programs that would be of interest to them. Kent County can submit two applications (not including those of local municipalities). These two applications can be for un-incorporated areas of the county. The deadline for submitting applications is October 31.

### Smyrna set for Historical Day

A certain sign of the coming of Autumn in the small historic town of Smyrna, Delaware is the excitement and bustle generated by the Duck Creek Historical Society as "Autumn in Duck Creek 1983" approaches. On October 15th, private homes and other historic sites and buildings will be open to visitors from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. with the evening Candlelight mini-Tour from 6-9 p.m.

Smyrna has many beautiful homes and buildings dating from as long ago as the seventeenth century. Many of these structures have been in continuous use since their erection.

The proceeds from "Autumn in Duck Creek" will be used to begin restoration on a property now owned by the Historical Society. This is THE BARRACKS, one of Smyrna's oldest postrevolutionary houses combining features of Colonial and Federal architecture. Monies raised from this event will also be used for the continuing maintenance of THE LINDENS, a state owned house dating from before 1725, which the Society saved in 1960.

On October 15th, this quiet town, once a busy grain port and mercantile center will display its unique sense of pride in its Colonial-Victorian heritage. Dressed in costume, the people of Duck Creek open their doors and welcome

baskets and others made in traditional styles. Mrs. Berry, who can make 7 or 8 baskets a day, has found her products to be so popular that she must restrict her work to craft shows and exhibits.

Many other crafts will be displayed and sold in the Autumn in Duck Creek Show including rushing and weaving, Tole painting on wood, hand painted clothing, fabric decoys, sewing, wooden toys, Victorian home plaques,

wreaths and herbs, country furniture, country fabric items, folk animal items, bread dough art, calligraphy, porcelain dolls, stained glass, chair caning, quilting (including traditional) and candlewicking.

As chairman of the Senate Executive Committee, I was as shocked as my Senate colleagues at the disclosure last week that a state official had been paid \$7,800 in unused vacation pay before she changed jobs.

We were assured by Administration spokesmen that the policy would be reviewed and the Executive Order fine-tuned to prevent a repetition of the Whittington case.

Marna C. Whittington, who left her job as budget director in August to become acting secretary of the Department of Finance, was paid for 44 days of unused vacation time before assuming her new cabinet post.

I have nothing but respect for the abilities of Mrs. Whittington and probably will vote for her confirmation at a later date.

Non-Merit System employees in the cabinet are covered by an Executive Order first implemented by former Gov. Russell W. Peterson and amended several times since. The order specifies that non-Merit employees may accumulate no more than 42 unused vacation days and may be paid for them upon leaving state service.

But I do think that the \$7,800 check she received raises some serious questions, especially in a year when all state employees are being asked to forgo pay raises in order to balance the budget.

Mrs. Whittington apparently asked State Personnel Director John A. Dillman III, what she should do about her vacation pay. He ruled that, since she had resigned as budget director, she could receive the lump-sum payment even though she was going directly to work in another state job and was not leaving state service.

Except for the four nominations in question, the Senate confirmed the Governor's other appointments at the special session called by the Governor last Wednesday.

Even after questioning Mr. Dillman for more than an hour about this strange decision, the majority of the Senate were not satisfied.

As a result, the Senate refused to act on the nomination of Mrs. Whittington and three other state officials in the same situation -- that is, transferring from one position to another -- until we have some assurance that the other three won't also get a huge check

Reagan receives War Powers approval

In a show of unity, the Delaware Congressional Delegation voted against authorizing the deployment of U.S. Military Forces in Lebanon for a further 18 months. The vote in favor of authorizing the deployment cut across the traditional conservative-liberal lines. Conservative Republican Senator Bill Roth and liberal Democrat Senator Joe Biden voted against the authorization in the U.S. Senate as did Delaware's lone member of the House of Representative, Tom Carper.

do so. Both Roth and Biden believe that U.S. Marines are "sitting ducks" with only 1600 troops in defensive positions.

Biden, as a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, voted against the resolution both in committee stages and on the Senate floor. Roth was against the original deployment of U.S. Marines as part of the multi-national peace keeping force. Roth has asked President Reagan to withdraw the U.S. Marines. Biden points to the fact that there are 16 major religious groups, at least 19 political factions and perhaps as many as 44 armed militia groups all fragmenting a small nation of three million people.

A further 2000 U.S. Marines are on Naval ships off the coast of Lebanon ready to be deployed. No major politician has yet mentioned that the U.S. Navy is firing its guns in direct support of the Gemayel Government. This is in an effort to prevent unfriendly forces from gaining control of the mountain range overlooking the U.S. Marines defensive positions. The philosophy of Marine training is being put to a test in Lebanon. Unless there has been some drastic change in its training concept, the Marines have always been taught that the "best defense is a good offense". To deploy U.S. Forces, with this training concept, into a totally defensive role is morally wrong.

The central government of President Gemayel controls less than one-fourth of Lebanon's territory. Syrian troops occupy about half the land and Israel another quarter. Israel has agreed to withdraw but only if Syria does. Syria backed by the Soviet Union refused to

U.S. troops have been deployed in defensive positions in Europe since 1945. After the Korean stalemate of 1953, American troops are still there in defensive positions. Lacking any clear military or political objective, the United States was forced to withdraw from Vietnam. To deploy young Americans anywhere in the world without a clear military and political goal and an attitude of "Win the War" is morally wrong. BRING THE BOYS HOME!

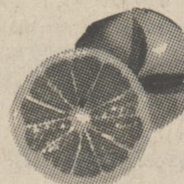

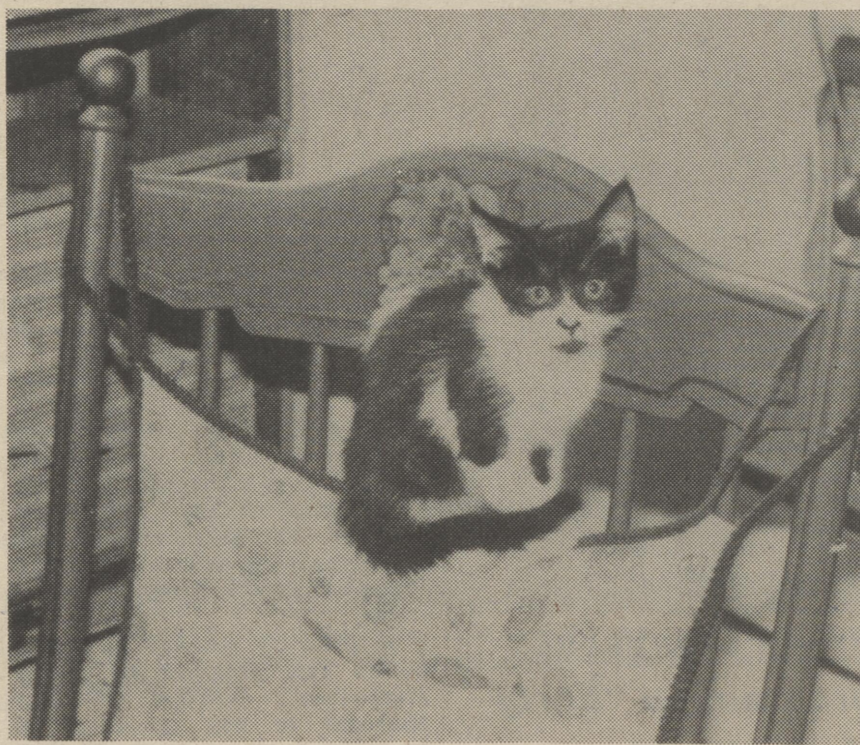

## Harrier Kelli Pelton is courage personified

For years this writer has been listening to the impassioned exhortations of high school athletic coaches, as they urge their charges on to greatness, hopefully. We remember specifically, Bill Caldwell, an ex-Caesar Rodney cross-country coach, screaming at his Christiania High harriers, in a meet with Lake Forest "It's got to hurt, you've got to want it to hurt."

Lake Forest coach, Jim Blades, is fortunately, much more low-key than was Caldwell. But, occasionally, that rare athlete comes along whose desire to excel is so fierce, that the pressure the athlete applies on his or her performance is far greater than any pressure applied by a coach.

Such an athlete is Kelli Pelton. She's only 14 and a sophomore. She's already the winner of two state championship events, on the track. In her first year of cross-country, she is doing a superb job. At the recent Lake Forest Invitational, she finished near the front, trailing four members of the veteran Ursuline Academy Raiders team of Wilmington.

Saturday, Kelli competed in the 10th annual Salesianum Invitational, a mammoth event featuring over 1000 runners from several Northeast states. The course used is the permanent one, at Brandywine Creek State Park. It's 5000 meters (3.1 miles) long and it's a very rugged, hilly layout. The courageous young Spartan novice attacked the course, with such

ferocity, that she approached the finish line, in eighth place, in a field of 105 runners. Only one of the Ursuline runners was ahead of her and the Raiders were running on their home course. Only thirty yards from the finish, the gritty Spartan reached the absolute limits of her strength. She fell down, could not get up and crawled the thirty yards to finish 20th, in 22:51. We've had a few quitters, who defected from both the boys and girls cross-country teams, at Lake Forest, this autumn. Kelli Pelton has more courage than the entire group combined. They prefer sports in which a whistle blows, every few seconds, to give them a rest.

A tiny bundle of guts and determination is Spartan Denise Donato, who in her first harrier campaign was second. Donato was 22nd, in 22:55, followed by Pam Pierce's excellent 29th place finish, in 23:27 and Debbie Jester's 23:53 for 35th place. Debbie ran 26:01 in 1982. After Tara Gladden's 52nd place, came Becky Brown, in 57th. Becky ran two full minutes better than in 1982. Patti Drew was seventieth, three full minutes better than last year. Competing against mostly larger schools, from several states Lake Forest had a highly creditable, sixth place finish, in a field of fifteen teams. Pelton and Donato were "Harriers of the Week" for the last two weeks.

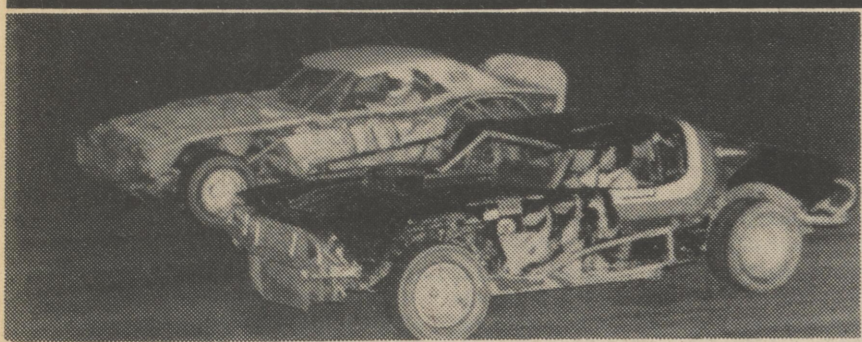

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### Allison leads Winston Cup by 91

DAYTONA BEACH, FLA - Darrell Waltrip of Franklin, Tenn., driver of the Pepsi/Burger King Chevrolet, used his victory in the October 2 Holly Farms 400 at North Wilkesboro (N.C.) Speedway to take a slender cut out of Bobby Allison's lead in the NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National points standings.

Allison, who finished third behind Dale Earnhardt in the Holly Farms 400, has accumulated 4078 points after the first 26 races of the 30-event NASCAR Winston Cup schedule. Waltrip, who enjoyed his sixth victory of the season and the 57th of his career, has picked up 3987 points.

In each of the past two Winston Cup seasons, Waltrip has come from behind to overtake Allison and win the NASCAR Winston Cup championship, the most prestigious title in motorsports. After the first 26 races last year, Allison led Waltrip by 37 points. After the first 26 of 1981, Waltrip held a 43-point lead.

Waltrip captured the Busch Pole Award for the Holly Farms 400, his sixth of the year, with a qualifying speed of 114.539 mph. He won the race

at a North Wilkesboro Speedway record average speed of 100.716 mph around the .625-mile oval.

Sterling Marlin of Columbia, Tenn., driver of the HESCO Exhaust Systems Pontiac, was the highest finishing Champion Spark Plug Rookie of the Year contender. Marlin leads the Champion Spark Plug Rookie standings with 191 points to the 175 of second-place Trevor Boys of Calgary, Alberta, Can., driver of the Hylton-McCaig Chevrolet. Ronnie Hopkins is third with 142, while Bobby Hillin is fourth with 123.

Morgan Shepherd of Conover, N.C. driver of the Robert Harrington-prepared ACM Equipment Sales Buick, improved his starting position eight spots and won the \$1,000 Chameleon Change Award. It was his second of the Winston Cup season, tying him with J.D. McDuffie.

Waltrip won the \$3,000 Gillette-Atra Lap Leader Award for the Holly Farms 400, leading 252 of the event's 400 laps. Waltrip is holding a comfortable lead in the \$20,000 season-long Gillette-Atra standings.

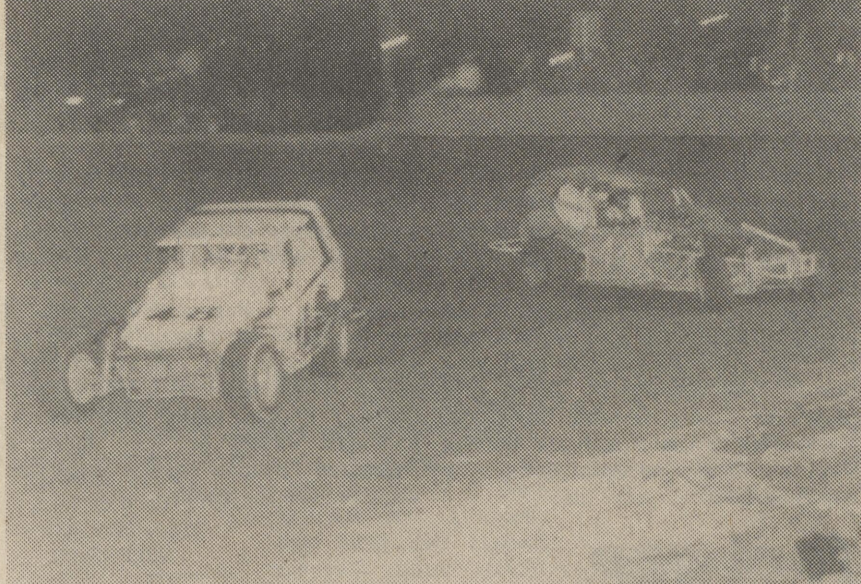

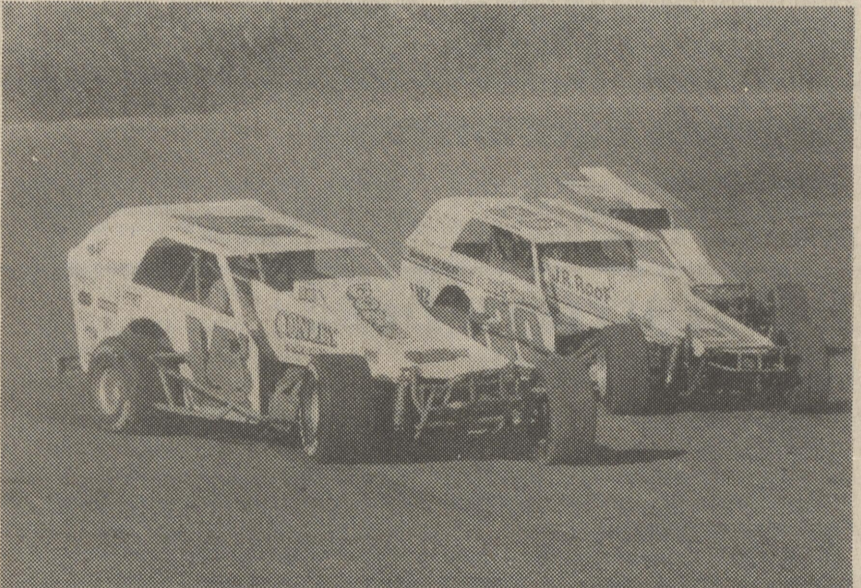

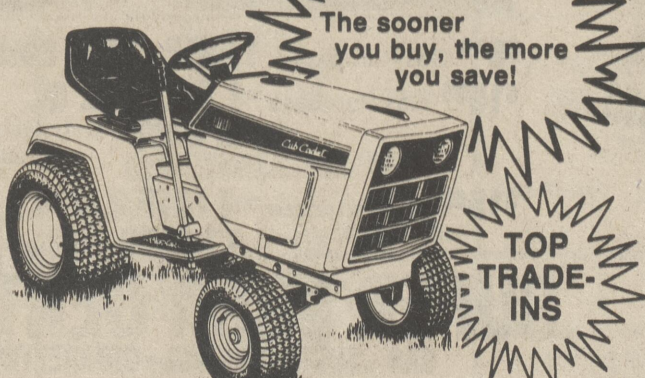

year. The 1981 national champion, Eddie Davis, is third with 283 victories, while 22-year-old driving sensation Walter Case, Jr. is fourth with 266.

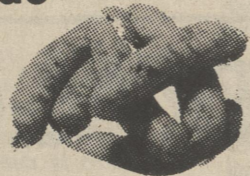
