

## Parker's condition improved after horse accident

PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM THE FRIENDS OF JACKIE PARKER, JR. "We're all pulling for you, Jackie. You are in our prayers. Hoping for your speedy recovery." On Tuesday night at The Meadowlands, Parker and four other drivers (Jim Dolbee, Bill O'Donnell, Pat Crowe, and Jim Tirone) were involved in an accident on the first turn. Parker was driving Hope Valley from the two hole. Hope Valley went offstride and veared off to the right causing the accident. Parker went down with his horse and the other four horses went over either him or his

horse. "His helmet was knocked off and kicked across the track" said Fred B. Greenly, his uncle and current racing secretary at Brandywine Raceway. Parker suffered severe head injuries and was in a coma from late Tuesday night until Friday morning. It was not certain that he had suffered a fractured skull. Parker underwent brain surgery immediately following the accident at Hackensack (N.J.) Medical Center to stop internal bleeding, and two days later he underwent a second brain operation to prevent further internal bleeding. At

this writing (Tuesday morning) he seems to be responding to medical treatment. His condition has been upgraded from critical to serious. He remains in the intensive care unit, but is still in "...a semi-coma state". "He is responding to commands, and apparently hears what you are saying to him", a hospital spokesperson said. Parker has lifetime earnings of \$7,198,075 as of the end of '83. In 1983, Parker had his best year winning 151 times, 124 seconds and 111 thirds with total earnings of \$1.6 million. He has handled top horses such as Elitist,

Slapstick, Highland Bridget and Computer. He hails from a racing family on both sides. His maternal grandfather, Fred B. Greenly, Sr., owned some of the best pacers of his day. Some of those were Marion Direct, winner of the Reading Futurity in 1946, and

Direct Express (1:59.3) winner of the \$25,000 Invitational Pacing Derby at Roosevelt Raceway in 1947. From his father's side of the family, his grandfather Howard Parker is a member of The Saratoga Hall of Fame. His father, Jack, Sr. fields a huge stable. He has a

brother Howard who drives in California. Parker in the last five years has settled at The Meadowlands where he has become one of the five best drivers. He likes to race a horse on or near the lead, and to try those tactics at The Meadowlands requires a driver to have a light touch and ability to hold a horse together in the stretch. He has those qualities.

Parker, 28, his wife Kathy and their 2 year old twin boys make their home in Paramous, New Jersey. He is a 1968 graduate of Lake Forest High School.

## Library is still best bargain in town

Movies run about \$3.50. Tickets to a stage play go for between \$10 and \$20. But books are still free.

Free books? Where?

At the Harrington Public Library.

"Entertainment, education and just plain fun are at your library, just for the asking. Use it!" said William Wharton, newly appointed President of Friends of the Harrington Public Library.

Books are not the only free items available at the Harrington Public Library. Residents of Harrington can also borrow films, projectors, art, phonograph records, magazines, and a polariod camera.

Residents of other towns pay a users fee of \$5 per family per year.

The 50 members of the four-year-old Friends of the Harrington Public Library sponsor fund-raising events such as a wine and cheese party, book sales, and a chicken barbecue every Heritage Day.

"The chicken barbecue is the big money maker. It brings in about \$500," said Librarian Betty Ann Van Veen.

In addition to gift books for the library and a telephone answering machine, the Friends of the Harrington Public Library has paid for a library membership in Central Delaware Library Consortium, which is a computer network that ties in the Harrington Library with thousands of other libraries throughout the nation.

"It also does our card cataloging. It's much more efficient," said Christine Hayward of Harrington, Secretary of Friends of the Harrington Public Library.

The library has about 5,000 hardback books in stock and purchases about 20 new books each month. All paperbacks are donated by the public.

If the library doesn't have the book you want, the librarian, through an interlibrary arrangement, can borrow it for you from another library in Delaware or in another state, at no cost to the borrower.

There is a wide selection of children's books in addition to a free children's movie shown every Thursday at 3:30 p.m.

Friends of the Harrington Public Library is seeking new members. Dues are only \$1 a year. You can sign up at the library at 31 Commerce Street (next to Burton's Sport Shop) or call the library at 398-4647. Library hours are 1:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Monday and Friday; 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday; 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday. The library is closed on Wednesday and Sunday.

Even if you don't want to join the Friends of the Harrington Public Library, stop in the library anyway, and borrow a book.

## Wright files for County Sheriff

Carl Wright has been the "High Sheriff" of Kent County, ('75 and '76). He wants to be the Democrat candidate for Kent County Sheriff, and he wants to be the "High Sheriff" again. A lifelong Democrat and grain farmer who lives west of Harrington has filed for the office of Kent County Sheriff.

Wright was first a Deputy in the County Sheriff's office in 1973 and 1974 under then Robert Donoway. Following a 2-year stint as Sheriff, he became a Deputy again in 1977 and 1978.

Carl Wright confides that he likes law enforcement work, which the Sheriff's Office affords him. After leaving the Sheriff's Office in 1979, Wright became associated with the Stevenson Home in Milford which is the home for youth offenders. There he was able to continue his work in the field of criminal law.

Wright feels the office should be for 4 years....."because you just can't learn the job in a couple of years. The laws and the office (of Sheriff) are much more complex today. The Sheriff and the Deputies must learn the nature of the actions," he said.

Wright says he would not favor putting more Deputies on the staff. "This would only increase the budget... which I feel would have more of a disastrous effect than good," he said. "When I was Sheriff, I wanted the Levy Court to approve a plan to purchase radios for the cars...with the base station at the Sheriff's Office," he added. He explained that the plan for the purchase of the radios was by getting some that were regarded as surplus by the State Police. "With radios in your cars you could stay in touch with the office. This way you could move around outside the office without the need for other Deputies," concluded Wright.

Wright said he would not favor changes to the office. "I would want it to continue much as it does today," said Wright. He said he would not favor meriting the Deputies, "because they would then come under the Levy

Court." Although the office is under the Levy Court, Wright said he feels the office is there more to serve the courts. "With merited Deputies, I feel the Sheriff would lose control of his people. It is very important that the Sheriff run the office and maintain control over his Deputies," he said.

Wright has served on the Board of Directors of the Delaware Electric Co-Op in Greenwood, a member of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Co. and its Board of Directors, former Harrington Ambulance Captain, member of Harrington Fire Police, former President of Harrington Democrat Club, Member of the Delaware State Fire Police and he and his wife Audrey have served as former leaders of the 4-H Andrewville Speedies.

Wright has been endorsed by Kent County Democrat Chairman Charles Pardee, Jr.

## DSEA calls for minimum teacher pay of \$20,000

Teachers' salaries have to be raised substantially if schools are to attract the brightest students into teaching and halt the flight of quality teachers who are tempted to leave their classrooms for better paying jobs elsewhere.

So says Wally Young, president of the Delaware State Education Association, who believes that beginning teachers should make \$20,000 a year and double that amount after 20 years experience.

"The salaries of teachers in this state are a disgrace," Young told the Joint Finance Committee of the Delaware General Assembly on March 5, 1984.

The DSEA president said he was shocked by Governor Pierre S. du Pont's proposed state budget and the meager amount allocated toward increases in teacher salaries.

"The Governor has proposed an extra \$103 as an incentive to those considering teaching employment in our state," Young said. "I wonder how many

prospective teachers will be attracted to Delaware for \$103."

Young went on to rename the First State the "Below Average State" for its failure to keep up with other states in the amount paid to teachers. Young

pointed out that, for the first time ever, Delaware teacher salaries have dropped below the national average — \$1,122 below.

Young urged the Joint Finance Committee to appropriate sufficient funds to stop Delaware's decline and to

return it to its former standing among the top 10 states.

Young recommended a minimum teacher salary of \$20,000 to be phased in over a three-year period, beginning with the 1984-85 school year. The state would provide a minimum \$16,000 salary, with the remainder to be made up from local funds.

Young also urged support for HB 429, DSEA's equalization bill, and the funds necessary to start the equalization to process this year.

## New treatment center sighted for Milford

In early May, People's Place in Milford will open its Residential Treatment Center for adolescents. The new Center is part of the new statewide system of community-based treatment programs for the youth currently residing at Governor Bacon Health Center. The program will be located on County Road 200 south of Milford.

The program is funded under contract with the state of Delaware with Dr. Frank Shavlik, Director of People's Place II to be the director.

The program will "provide very close supervision of the residents at all times", according to Sondra Payne, Director of Residential Services for People's Place. "It will also require them to live together as a 'community'; that is, do chores, prepare their own meals; all the things that will help them to learn to live with and get along harmoniously with other people".

The program will be located in a renovated and expanded farmhouse

that has, over the years, been used as a nursing home, a foster group home for adolescents, and a convalescent facility for adults. Renovations currently under way will enable the facility to be licensed for occupancy by youth. Alan Southard, Program Coordinator for the new program said he was "looking forward to the program having privacy and plenty of room for outside activities". The property consists of just over 5 acres. It's a temporary home-away-from-home for these young people", said Southard.

One of the plans for the immediate future is to form a Community Advisory Committee for the program. "We will be inviting some of our immediate neighbors to serve on that committee" said Shavlik. "And we have already started planning for a public open house as soon as we get settled".

Two teachers also will be part of the staff, and the young residents will attend school at the facility.

## Third participant captured in 1980 robbery of First National Bank in Canterbury

Delaware State Police investigators from Troop 3, Dover, have arrested a third participant in the December 12, 1980 bank robbery of the First National Bank in Canterbury.

Keith W. Friudenberg, 25, of 30 Old Mill Road, Camden, Delaware has been arrested on three felony charges for his participation in the robbery. Friudenberg allegedly stole the 1975 Dodge Colt owned by Mona Lisa Zackers of Smyrna on December 4, 1980 from the parking lot of Kelly's Pub, located on U.S. 13 north of Dover and turned over same to Ronald Johnson and Charles

Craig knowing it was to be used in the robbery. Johnson, Craig and a fourth subject actually entered the bank and committed the \$14,000.00 robbery, however, Friudenberg's participation facilitated the crime. Police are still seeking the fourth subject.

Friudenberg was arraigned at J.P. Court 7 Thursday, March 22, 1984, on charges of conspiracy to commit bank robbery, felony theft of the automobile and hindering prosecution. He was committed to Delaware Correctional Center in default of \$35,000.00 secured bond.

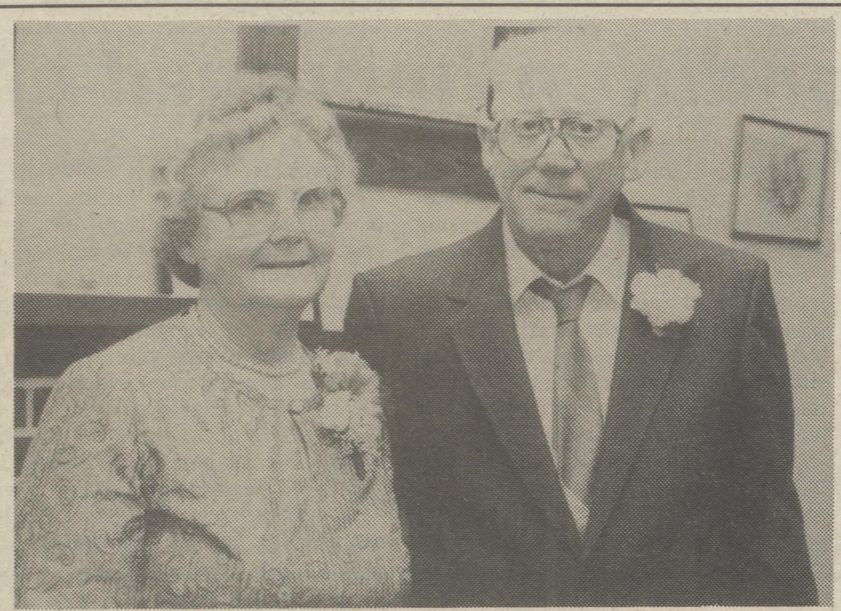
A twenty-nine year old Newark area woman was sexually assaulted by a man who gave her a ride while she was hitchhiking. The victim was hitchhiking on U.S. route 40 near Fairwinds at 10:35 a.m. trying to find a ride to work. A black male, approximately thirty years old, driving a dark blue, two-door coupe, stopped for her and she voluntarily got into his car. The suspect drove her to the vicinity of her employment, but drove past without stopping. He continued to drive south on Delaware route 71 through Kirkwood. At a point about a half-mile east of Delaware route 896, the suspect forced the victim into the woods

nearby. Using threats and physical force, he had the victim remove her slacks and attempted to have sexual intercourse with her. The victim resisted and was allowed to dress. The suspect then forced her back into the car, driving her to the intersection of Delaware route 71 and 896. He freed her there. She last saw the car going south toward the Summit Bridge. The victim described her assailant as being six feet to six feet three inches tall, thin built with a dark complexion and medium afro hair style. She states he had missing front teeth.

Three people were arrested at a trailer court behind the Delaware Auto Court at U.S. 13 and U.S. 40, New Castle, following a fight which ended where the son of one of the combatants fired a gun in the air.

Troopers from Troop 9 have arrested Jonathan G. Keys, 29, of Lot 18, Delaware Auto Court, Kenneth R. Strawn, 41, of Lot 17 and Strawn's sixteen-year-old son based on the following account:

Jonathan Keys became annoyed at children playing near his trailer. Keys came out of his trailer, picked up a rock and threw it, striking Strawn's trailer next door. Strawn came out of his trailer and confronted Keys and a fist fight developed. Strawn's sixteen-year-old son witnessed the fight seeing his father being beaten, he went to his trailer and obtained a 20 gauge shotgun. When the two men refused to quit fighting, the boy raised the gun and fired it. No one was hit from the blast.

Two troopers heard the shot and went to the scene. They disarmed the boy and arrested all the participants.

The sixteen year old was charged with reckless endangering, first degree for firing the weapon. His father, Kenneth R. Strawn was charged with offensive touching and Jonathan Keys was arrested for assault third degree and criminal mischief for denting Strawn's trailer with a rock.

All three were taken to Magistrate Court #11 in New Castle for arraignment. However, the presiding magistrate refused to issue warrants on Jonathan Keys and Kenneth R. Strawn. The sixteen year old was, however, charged with reckless endangering first degree and was turned over to his parents pending Family Court action.

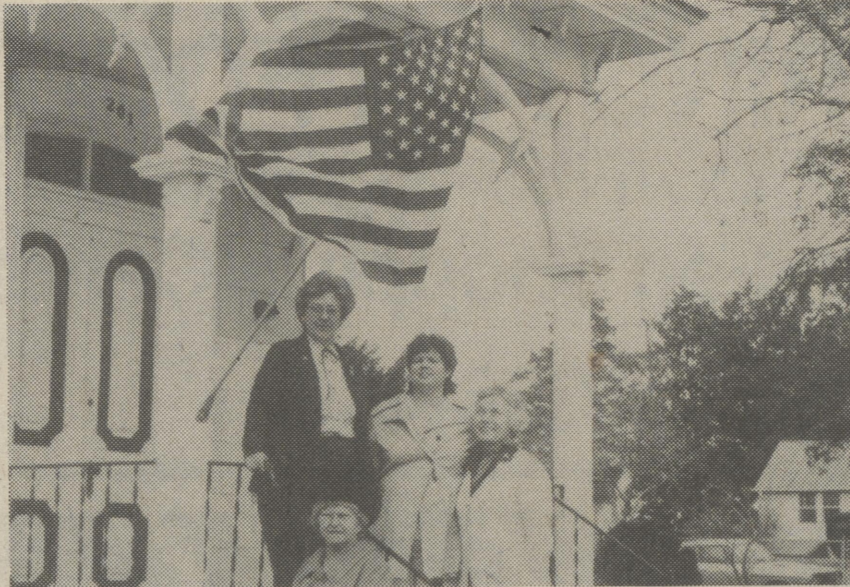

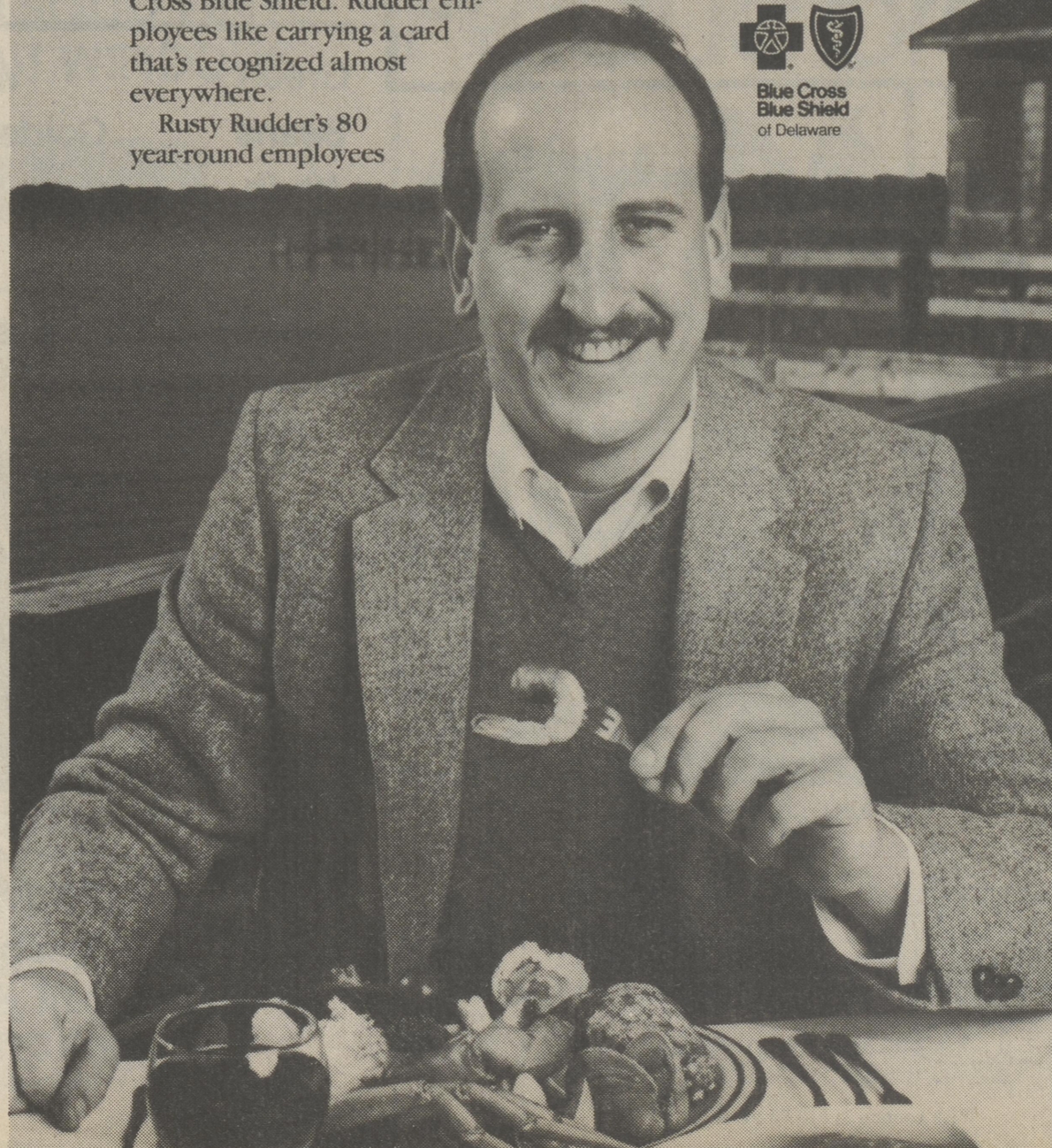

## Mosquito spraying begins

The Mosquito Control Section of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control commenced helicopter treatment of granular Abate insecticide in flooded woodlands throughout the state on Monday, March 26.

This woodland control program has been very effective in reducing particularly *Aedes canadensis* mosquitoes that breed in woodland pools and swamps and then migrate to urban populated areas, according to Chet

Stachecki, manager of mosquito control.

Stachecki predicts a large woodland mosquito population this spring and early summer due to the higher water table and extensive flooded woodlands. But he added that this control program should alleviate the degree of human discomfort caused by these mosquito species.

The insecticide Abate has no harmful effects on other organisms or the environment, he said.

## How & Why - St. Stephen's

Editor's Note: This is the first part of an article written by Bessie Austin Burdziak. This article was written for St. Stephen's Day, December 26, 1983, as the church in Harrington celebrated its 109th birthday.

In this wonderful - God-Given - sphere, which we call "World" and wherein we are born and live and are privileged to enjoy the wonders of these modern days, and if we so desire, are also privileged to enjoy, and admire, and marvel at - the true beauties of our world, which we call our home, it behooves us to pause, a little - long enough - perhaps, to express some wonderment as to why we call it "home". An easy reply would be that it is derived from a word, which is a Latin and Greek combination meaning "man", and "man returning to his place" - that is - his birthplace, or, more accurately, in modern terminology, to his place of residence. In early times, that place would have been his shelter, the spot where his mate and he were sheltered. Thus, "HOME" became to mean a security, a haven, a togetherness place; it could mean rest, food, understanding, companionship - the good things of that man's existence.

Birds and animals go "home", naturally, by instinct. They also have and hopefully will always retain this miraculous talent for going "home". Today, scientists tell us that "a missile goes home. In other words, it goes to a

predetermined source of radiated energy!" Maybe our birds, and fish, and our animals, have always been blessed with an innate sense of "going toward some special source of radiated energy" which we humans do not yet have the knowledge to understand. So - the word "home" meant a place, a thing, but it also was a descriptive word meaning - haven, shelter, food, and even a place of succor from trouble and problems. Man also had at first, only one name, but as population increased he was given more than one name, so as to distinguish him from his companions, or other members in his family. These names, then, began to be more or less descriptive, as "John, the Shepherd, Big John's son, John from the Hill".

If we watch the wild birds around our feeders, or in our yards and fields, we soon come to realize that they, too, must have a "name", known not to you and me, but certainly to its mate - because - many, many times I have observed a male cardinal in one tree in the yard, call sharply - and though there may have been three female cardinals feeding at my feeder - only one of the females left quickly - responding to that call! Certainly, there must have been some slight inflection in that particular male cardinal's call that singled out his mate, and she was receptive to that tiny note

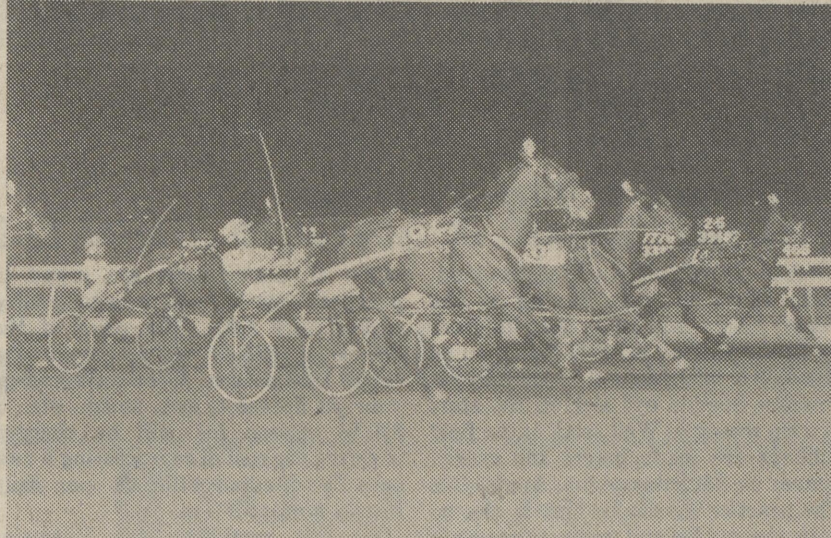
Friday at Yonkers in the \$20,000 Open Handicap Trot, Wee Janel wins it for Jim Rathbone in 2:02.2.

Just to give you an idea of the type and caliber of vehicles featured, we have enclosed a brief description of the 1912 Speedster that will be on display at Motorama 84.

**1912 FORD SPEEDSTER**  
This car was not a production model. Cars of this type were built in the early 1920's as a poor man's Mercer Raceabout or Stutz Bearcat. They were examples of early Hot-Rodding. Many Model "T" Fords were being raced at fairgrounds during this era and there was an abundance of "Speed" Equipment to be found from various catalog supply houses. There were also several companies that specialized in sports conversion kits and plans to build open speedsters from older Model "T" Fords. Following is a list of changes made to this car.

Chassis: Front lowering kit added to allow spring to mount below and rear of front axle. Engine crank lengthened to clear axle. Rear lowering shackles added to allow rear spring to mount below and ahead of rear axle assembly. The frame was shortened to accomplish this. Radiator is original 1912 Ford.

Engine: Steel Billet, counterbalanced crankshaft, .080 over size aluminum pistons, Rajo Model 'B' over-head valve head. Original timer and coils replaced by Bosch Distributor conversion. Winfield racing carburetor. Special exhaust exhaust headers, Assembly balanced.

Body: 1912 Front fenders and hood. 1913 front fenders on rear backwards. Steering column lowered. Buckboard style body hand crafted. All carbide lamps and generator and Kerosene side and tail lamps are original 1912 Ford, Center Sportlight, speedometer, clock, Amp and fuel gauges, horn and brass monical windshield are original accessories.

## Big Foot

"Big Foot", the super truck, will be one of the highlights at the Motorama '84 auto and trade show to be held March 30 and 31 at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center in Salisbury, Maryland.

"Big Foot" is the result of Bob Chandler's ingenuity and original ideas. This truck has been featured in the movie "Take This Job and Shove It", and is mentioned in many national magazines on a regular basis. Play-scool, a Milton Bradley company, has made a Big Foot toy which is now available.

From its humble beginning as a 1974 Ford F250, "Big Foot" has grown and will continue to grow to keep up with new ideas. This truck was built by hand using trial and error methods. Chandler was the first to popularize many features including individualizing his vehicle with a name, rear steering,

military axles, tilt front end and very large tires.

"Big Foot" is powered by a 460 plus C.I.D. Ford engine with Carter electric high volume fuel pumps and two Predator racing carburetors atop a Hampton blower. The engine powers an Advanced Automatics, C-6 transmission. The running gear is 5-ton military with both axles having Detroit Lockers with special gear ratios. The unique steering system provides both front and rear steering. "Big Foot" has 14 special Rough Country racing shock absorbers and a wide variety of tires including the new Terra Tires, 66 x 43 x 25, that weigh 1,000 pounds each.

"Big Foot" will be on display at Motorama '84 Friday from 5 p.m. until 10 p.m. and Saturday from 12 noon till 10 p.m. at the Wicomico Youth and Civic Center in Salisbury, Maryland.

## Pit Chatter

Jack Ingram won the Martinsville Sportsman Miller Time 500 on Sunday at part of the twin billing on Sunday. His average speed of 77.761 mph was a new track record shattering the old record set in 1980 by Mike Porter in 70.731 mph. Just as the Sportsman Race ended, showers hit the track washing out the last half of the show for Modifieds. That race has been postponed until April 28th.

An additional 3,600 feet of concrete outside retaining wall has been constructed in all four turns at Charlotte Motor Speedway, leaving the entire length of the wall encompassing the 1.5 mile track in high-strength concrete.

The concrete replaces the antiquated metal retaining wall. The drivers who will compete in the May 27 World 600 Winston Cup Grand National race will find a cushion of safety with the wall.

"That's exactly what it does, makes it safer," said Darrell Waltrip, winner of the Winston Cup title in 1981 and '82. "Guard rails are a thing of the past. They have a tendency to suck a car in; it's harder to get out or recover. You can hit the concrete and just keep on going or hug the wall."

Neil Bonnett, who'll return to bid for his third straight World 600 title as a climax to Silver Celebration Speedweek at CMS, agreed that the concrete is more than cosmetic dressing.

The high-strength concrete wall extension, which will be completed about April 1 at an approximate cost of \$250,000, is a foot thick and stands about four feet above the surface of the track.

Dorsey Park Speedway will open the racing season on Saturday, April 21st. The first qualifying heat will take the green flag at 7:45 p.m. There will be a practice session for competitors starting at 1 p.m. with the gates opening at 12 p.m.

Nazareth Raceway 1/2 mile race track will get underway with its 1984 season on April 1st at 2:30 p.m. Both the modified and the street stocks will compete in heats, consi and feature events. On March 30th another practice session, plus a flea market will be held from 3 to 9 p.m.

A Champion led NASCAR Grand National stock car driver Benny Parsons into victory circle Sunday, March 18, at Atlanta International Raceway. Cliff Champion, Parsons' crew chief, directed seven near-perfect pit stops which earned his team its second victory of the day - the Ingersoll-Rand pit crew competition.

Champion's men completed their seven stops, 15.56 seconds less than Cale Yarborough's team which finished second in the pit road contest. In third place was Dale Earnhardt's team.

"Our time spent with the Olympic people sure was worthwhile and our city in the pits proves it," said Johnny Hayes, owner of Benny Parsons' Coca-Cola 500 winning team.

Hayes was discussing the intensive training program that his team underwent for several weeks during the winter with the Olympic Sports Medicine Team and his win in the Atlanta round off the Ingersoll-Rand National Pit Crew Championship.

Photo and video highlights will be available for all interested. Drivers and track personnel will be on hand to sign autographs and answer any questions viewers may have.

Prizes will be awarded to lucky winners participating in the prize drawings to be held throughout the weekend. The show will be open to all during Mall hours, admission is free.

"We did pit stop after pit stop in front of a movie camera," Hayes continued, "and played the movies back frame-by-frame while the Sports Medicine people analyzed our wasted motions. For instance, we lost the most time in tire changing - pushing the old tire to one side, then reaching to the other side for the new one. We gained several seconds by having the jackman lift the new tire into place while our tire man pushes the old one aside."

Besides beating the other teams, Benny Parsons' crew beat the heat in the pits at Atlanta. They got a breeze. The breeze came from a 20" electric fan, stationed at the rear of Parsons' pit, that was aimed toward pit wall for the duration of the 3 1/2 hour race.

"The only problem was that we were 75 feet from the nearest electric outlet," said Harry Graver, the team's windshield wiper, "so we had to run a long extension cord through Richmond's and Bodine's pits."

At the halfway mark of the Coca-Cola 500, an equalized tire dropped Bobby Allison from the leading pack of cars. Extra stops to correct the problem relegated the defending Winston Cup driving champion to a fifth place finish, two laps off the pace.

"When a tire equalizes, it's impossible for the driver to tell whether it's on the right or left side," said Gary Nelson, Allison's crew chief. "So when Bobby complained that the car suddenly wasn't 'sticking', we took a guess and replaced the right rear. Well, we didn't have much luck, because he had to come right back in for a left tire change, that's where the equalized tire turned out to be."

As opposed to standard tubeless tires on passenger cars, Grand National race cars have inner and outer tires - each filled to different air pressures (For example, Goodyear's recommended pressures for rear tires at Atlanta were 55 PSI (inner) and 35 PSI (outer). Equalizing occurs when the inner tire develops a leak either from a puncture or from a defective valve stem.

For the second year in a row Charlotte Motor Speedway has been named Media Track of the Year in a survey conducted by the American Auto Racing Writers and Broadcasters Association.

The poorest score recorded was by Pocono International Raceway with a 1.60 in the IMSA section of the survey. PIR did significantly better but not well with a 2.53 in the Indy Car section and a 2.41 in the NASCAR section. Other bottom scores went to the Detroit Grand Prix at 1.81 and the Caesars Palace Grand Prix at 1.95.

Denny Bonebrake slid past Charlie Wierman on the final lap to earn top money on Sunday, March 18th, 25 lap Late Model feature. For Bonebrake, driver of the Bonebrake Alignment Shop Special, it was his second win of the young season.

Bonebrake was sailing along with a safe lead when he tangled with a lapped car on the 20th lap. Relocated to the rear of the depleted field, Bonebrake roared through traffic. He ducked under Kendall Moore on the 24th tour and caught Wierman during the last half-mile. Wierman, was a disappointed runner-up with the young Moore, Tom Peck, and Jerry Smith completing the top five.

"I sure had to drive hard to get that one", Bonebrake remarked. "Sometimes you just never know what's going to happen to you during a race. I have to thank my crew, they sure worked hard all day."

Jeff Ward, Kawasaki Motors Corporation rider from Mission Viejo, California, rode to the first American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) Supercross victory of his career on Sunday, March 18, in the second

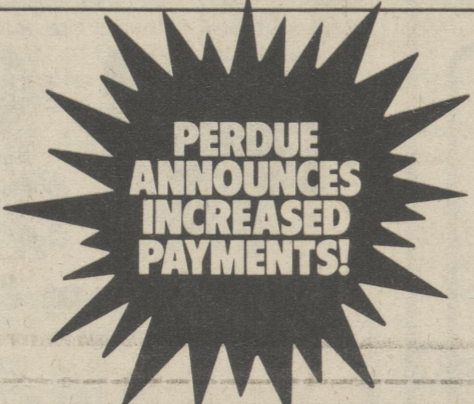

### Teacher salary bill introduced

Legislation designed to provide career incentives for Delaware's teachers was introduced March 22, 1984 by Rep. Katharine M. Jester and Sen. David McBride. The legislation would provide a 4.3% increase for each teacher for each year of experience.

The salary bill, HB 482, was prepared by the Delaware State Education Association. The current teacher pay scale provides across-the-board experience increments that translate into an average raise of 2.5%, though many teachers receive less than 2% and

teachers with more than 14 years experience receive nothing.

Under HB 482, teachers with no experience would start at an annual salary of \$10,800. Those with experience and education beyond the Bachelor's degree would receive more.

With experienced teachers with a Bachelor's degree and 12 years of experience who currently receive \$14,864, under the DSEA pay plan, the teacher would receive an immediate raise to \$17,898.

The DSEA plan differs substantially

from the one proposed by Governor du Pont who has proposed a one-time 4.3% increase for teachers in fiscal year 1985 at a cost of \$96 million. However, the DSEA plan would cost only an additional \$10 million.

"Our plan is also fairer than du Pont's because it would treat teachers more like other state employees, who receive a 4.3% step increase," said Wally Young of DESEA.

HB 482 would also provide incentives to teachers to continue their education by giving them a 4.3% increase for

advanced degrees and course work.

The DSEA proposal is based on the Association's comprehensive plan to bring excellence to the schools. The DSEA Challenge for Educational Excellence calls for a starting salary for teachers of \$20,000, with \$16,000 to come from the state. HB 482 phases in the DSEA proposal over three years. The first year of the plan the starting salary would be \$10,800, the second year \$13,500, and \$16,000 the third year.
