Wright files for County Sheriff

by Harry G. Farrow, Jr. Carl Wright has been the "High Sheriff" of Kent County, ('75 and '76). He wants to be the Democrat candidate for Kent County Sheriff, and he wants to be the "High Sheriff" again. A lifelong Democrat and grain farmer who lives west of Harrington has filed for the office of Kent County Sheriff. Wright was first a Deputy in the County Sheriff's office in 1973 and 1974 under then Robert Donoway. Following a 2-year stint as Sheriff, he became a Deputy again in 1977 and 1978.

Carl Wright confides that he likes law enforcement work, which the Sheriff's Office affords him. After leaving the Sheriff's Office in 1979, Wright became associated with the Stevenson Home in Milford which is the home for youth offenders. There he was able to continue his work in the field of criminal law.

Wright feels the office should be for 4 years....."because you just can't learn the job in a couple of years. The laws and the office (of Sheriff) are much more complex today. The Sheriff and the Deputies must learn the nature of the actions," he said.

Wright says he would not favor putting more Deputies on the staff. 'This would only increase the budget... which I feel would have more of a disastrous effect than good," he said. "When I was Sheriff, I wanted the Levy Court to approve a plan to purchase radios for the cars....with the base station at the Sheriff's Office," he added. He explained that the plan for the purchase of the radios was by getting some that were regarded as surplus by the State Police. "With radios in your cars you could stay in touch with the office. This way you could move around outside the office without the need for other Deputies," concluded Wright.

Wright said he would not favor changes to the office. "I would want it to continue much as it does today," said Wright. He said he would not favor meriting the Deputies, "because they would then come under the Levy





DSEA calls for minimum teacher pay of \$20,000

Teachers' salaries have to be raised substantially if schools are to attract the brightest students into teaching and halt the flight of quality teachers who are tempted to leave their classrooms for better paying jobs

elsewhere. So says Wally Young, president of the Delaware State Education Association, who believes that beginning teachers should make \$20,000 a year and double that amount after 20 years experience.

"The salaries of teachers in this state prospective teachers will be attracted are a disgrace," Young told the Joint Finance Committee of the Delaware General Assembly on March 5, 1984.

The DSEA president said he was shocked by Governor Pierre S. du Pont's proposed state budget and the meager amount allocated toward increases in teacher salaries.

"The Governor has proposed an extra \$103 as an incentive to those considering teaching employment in our state," Young said. "I wonder how many

to Delaware for \$103.

Young went on to rename the First State the "Below Average State" for its failure to keep up with other states in the amount paid to teachers. Young

pointed out that, for the first time ever, Delaware teacher salaries have dropped below the national average -\$1,122 below.

Young urged the Joint Finance Committee to appropriate sufficient funds to stop Delaware's decline and to

return it to its former standing among the top 10 states.

Young recommended a minimum teacher salary of \$20,000 to be phased in over a three-year period, beginning with the 1984-85 school year. The state would provide a minimum \$16,000 salary, with the remainder to be made up from local funds.

Young also urged support for HB 429, DSEA's equalization bill, and the funds necessary to start the equalization to process this year.

New treatment center sighted for Milford

In early May, People's Place in Milford will open its Residential Treatment Center for adolescents. The program will "provide very close supervision of the residents at all times", according to Sondra Payne, Director of Residential Services for People's Place. "It will also require them to live together as a 'community'; that is, do chores, prepare their own meals; all the things that will help them to learn to live with and get along harmoniously with other people"



The Mosquito Control Section of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control commenced helicopter treatment of granular Abate insecticide in flooded woodlands throughout the state on Monday, March 26.

This woodland control program has been very effective in reducing particularly Aedes canadensis mosquitoes that breed in woodland pools and swamps and then migrate to urban populated areas, according to Chet environment, he said.

Stachecki, manager of mosquito con-

Stachecki predicts a large woodland mosquito population this spring and early summer due to the higher water table and extensive flooded woodlands. But he added that this control program should alleviate the degree of human discomfort caused by these mosquito

How & Why - St. Stephen's

Editor's Note: This is the first part of an article written by Bessie Austin Burdziak. This article was written for St. Stephen's Day, December 26, 1983, as the church in Harrington celebrated

its 109th birthday.
In this wonderful - God-Given sphere, which we call "World" and wherein we are born and live and are privileged to enjoy the wonders of these modern days, and if we so desire, are also privileged to enjoy, and admire, and marvel at - the true beauties of our world, which we call our home, it behooves us to pause, a little - long enough - perhaps, to express some wonderment as to why we call it "home". An easy reply would be that it is derived from a word, which is a Latin and Greek combination meaning "man", and "man returning to his 'place' - that is - his birthplace, or, more accurately, in modern terminology, to his place of residence. In early times, that place would have been his shelter, the spot where his mate and he were sheltered. Thus, "HOME" became to mean a security, a haven, a togetherness place; it could mean rest, food, understanding, companionship -the good things of that man's exis-

Birds and animals go "home", naturally, by instinct. They also have and hopefully will always retain this miraculous talent for going 'home'. Today, scientists tell us that "a missile goes home. In other words, it goes to a

predetermined source of radiated energy"! Maybe our birds, and fish, and our animals, have always been blessed with an innate sense of "going toward some special source of radiated energy" which we humans do not vet have the knowledge to understand. So - the word "home" meant a place, a

thing, but it also was a descriptive word meaning - haven, shelter, food, and even a place of surcease from trouble and problems. 

Just to give you an idea of the type and caliber of vehicles featured, we have enclosed a brief description of the 1912 Speedster that will be on display at Motorama 84.

1912 FÖRD SPEEDSTER

This car was not a production model. Cars of this type were built in the early 1920's as a poor man's Mercer Raceabout or Stutz Bearcat. They were examples of early Hot-Rodding. Many Model "T' Fords were being raced at fairgrounds during this era and there was an abundance of "Speed' Equipment to be found from various catalog supply houses. There were also several companies that specialized in sports conversion kits and plans to build open speedsters from older Model 'T' Fords. Following is a list of changes made to this car.

Engine: Steel Billet, counterbalanced crankshaft, .080 over size aluminum pistons, Rajo Model 'B' over-head valve head. Original timer and coils replaced by Bosch Distributor conversion. Winfield racing carburetor. Special exhaust exhaust headers, Assembly balanced.

Body: 1912 Front fenders and hood. 1913 front fenders on rear backwards. Steering column lowered. Buckboard style body hand crafted. All carbide lamps and generator and Kerosene side and tail lamps are original 1912 Ford, Center Sportlight, speedometer, clock, Amp and fuel gauges, horn and brass monical windshield are original acces-

Pit Chatter

Jack Ingram won the Martinsville Sportsman Miller Time 500 on Sunday at part of the twin billing on Sunday. His average speed of 77.751 mph was a new track record shattering the old record set in 1980 by Mike Porter in 70.731 mph. Just as the Sportsman Race ended, showers hit the track washing out the last half of the show for Modifieds. That race has been postponed until April 28th.

An additional 3.600 feet of concrete outside retaining wall has been constructed in all four turns at Charlotte Motor Speedway, leaving the entire length of the wall encompassing the 1.5 mile track in high-strength concrete.

The concrete replaces the antiquated metal retaining wall. The drivers who will compete in the May 27 World 600 Winston Cup Grand National race will find a cushion of safety with the wall.

"That's exactly what it does, makes it safer," said Darrell Waltrip, winner of the Winston Cup title in 1981 and '82. "Guard rails are a thing of the past. They have a tendency to suck a car in; it's harder to get out or recover. You can hit the concrete and just keep on going or hug the wall."

Neil Bonnett, who'll return to bid for his third straight World 600 title as a climax to Silver Celebration Speedweek at CMS, agreed that the concrete is more than cosmetic dressing.

The high-strength concrete wall extension, which will be completed about April 1 at an approximate cost of \$250,000, is a foot thick and stands about four feet above the surface of the

A Champion led NASCAR Grand National stock car driver Benny Parsons into victory circle Sunday, March 18, at Atlanta International Raceway. Cliff Champion, Parsons' crew chief, directed seven near-perfect pit stops which earned his team its second victory of the day - the Ingersoll-Rand pit crew competition.

Champion's men completed their seven stops, 15.56 seconds less than Cale Yarborough's team which finished second in the pit road contest. In third place was Dale Earnhardt's team.

"Our time spent with the Olympic people sure was worthwhile and our citory in the pits proves it," said Johnny Hayes, owner of Benny Parsons' Coca-Cola 500 winning team.

Hayes was discussing the intensive training program that his team underwent for several weeks during the winter with the Olympic Sports Medicine Team and his win in the Atlanta round off the Ingersoll-Rand National Pit Crew Championship.

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Photo and video highlights will be available for all interested. Drivers and track personnel will be on hand to sign autographs and answer any questions viewers may have.

Prizes will be awarded to lucky winners participating in the prize drawings to be held throughout the weekend. The show will be open to all during Mall hours, admission is free.

"We did pit stop after pit stop in front of a movie camera," Hayes continued, "and played the movies back frame-byframe while the Sports Medicine people analyzed our wasted motions. For instance, we lost the most time in tire changing — pushing the old tire to one side, then reaching to the other side for the new one. We gained several seconds by having the jackman lift the new tire into place while our tire man pushes the old one aside.

Besides beating the other teams, Benny Parsons' crew beat the heat in the pits at Atlanta.

They got a breeze. The breeze came from a 20" electric fan, stationed at the rear of Parsons' pit, that was aimed toward pit wall for the duration of the 3½ hour race.

"The only problem was that we were 75 feet from the nearest electric outlet," said Harry Graver, the team's windshield wiper, "so we had to run a long extension cord through Richmond's and Bodine's pits.'

At the halfway mark of the Coca-Cola 500, an equalized tire dropped Bobby Allison from the leading pack of cars. Extra stops to correct the problem relegated the defending Winston Cup driving champion to a fifth place finish, two laps off the pace.

'When a tire equalizes, it's impossible for the driver to tell whether it's on the right or left side," said Gary Nelson, Allison's crew chief. "So when Bobby complained that the car suddenly wasn't 'sticking', we took a guess and replaced the right rear. Well, we didn't have much luck, because he had to come right back in for a left tire change, that's where the equalized tire turned out to be.'

As opposed to standard tubeless tires on passenger cars, Grand National race cars have inner and outer tires - each filled to different air pressures (For example, Goodyear's recommended pressures for rear tires at Atlanta were 55 PSI (inner) and 35 PSI)outer). Equalizing occurs when the inner tire develops a leak either from a puncture or from a defective valve stem.

For the second year in a row Charlotte Motor Speedway has been named Media Track of the Year in a survey conducted by the American **Auto Racing Writers and Broadcasters**

The poorest score recorded was by Pocono International Raceway with a 1.60 in the IMSA section of the survey. PIR did significantly better but not well with a 2.53 in the Indy Car section and a 2.41 in the NASCAR section. Other bottom scores went to the Detroit Grand Prix at 1.81 and the Caesars Palace Grand Prix at I.95.

Denny Bonebrake slid past Charlie Wierman on the final lap to earn top money on Sunday, March 18th, 25 lap Late Model feature. For Bonebrake, driver of the Bonebrake Alignment Shop Special, it was his second win of the young season.

Bonebrake was sailing along with a safe lead when he tangled with a lapped car on the 20th lap. Relocated to the rear of the depleted field, Bonebrake roared through traffic. He ducked under Kendall Moore on the 24th tour and caught Wierman during the last half-mile. Wierman, was a disappointed runner-up with the young Moore, Tom Peck, and Jerry Smith completing the top five.

"I sure had to drive hard to get that one", Bonebrake remarked. "Sometimes you just never know what's going to happen to you during a race. I have to thank my crew, they sure worked hard all day."
